

City Council votes to extend lease with Clow Fitness Center

During its Feb. 5 meeting, Falls City's city council received another quarterly report from the Executive Director of Falls City Economic Development and Growth Enterprise (EDGE). Beckie Cromer reported that on a recent visit to Falls City, a Union Pacific official saw potential for development of a rail-served site in the Falls City area. She also reported that Falls City Foods had added a grinding operation to its manufacturing plant, that both Vantec and Kearney Welding had fulfilled Memorandum of Understanding obligations to the City and the Grand Weaver Hotel had qualified for a \$120,000 loan forgiveness based on major investments made in remodeling of the building's third floor and development of a first floor lounge. Cromer then reported new signage had been erected directing persons to the city's industrial area. She also said the EDGE Manufacturing Day was a huge success with 300 middle school-aged students having

had an opportunity to tour six participating local industries.

After a brief executive session, the council heard favorable testimonials by five customers of the Clowfit Fitness Center that is expanding its operation with lease of the former city hall building at 19th and Barada Streets. Several of the customers reported they traveled from neighboring communities to use Clowfit's downtown location and shopped at other businesses while here. The Council voted 8-0 to continue its lease agreement on the terms previously accepted.

Approved 8-0 on second reading was an ordinance updating natural gas rates mainly focused on increasing the charge for transportation of natural gas to \$440 per month plus \$2.89 per Mcf as recommended by J.K. Energy Consulting. The ordinance must receive one more vote of approval before it goes into effect.

Rental of Prichard Auditorium on Nov. 17 for an event that will involve the serving of alcoholic beverage received 7-1 council approval. All liquor license renewals received favorable recommendation by a unanimous 8-0 vote.

The appointment of Chuck Di Giacomo to the position of police sergeant and a number of committee and board appointments submitted by Mayor Jerry Oliver were also approved by 8-0 votes.

Commissioners consider hiring more deputies

Sheriff Pounds discussed with Commissioners efforts to obtain a drug dog for his department. A company that had been working to get a dog for the department reported that its attempts have been unsuccessful and stated it would be refunded to the County fees paid in advance.

Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr., updated the Board on county road and bridge maintenance. Commissioners authorized Darveau to sell surplus supplies during the Mar. 3 Frederick Consignment Sale. Supplies authorized for sale include

Cakes & 'Que gears up to give back

Nearing its first anniversary since it opened its doors, Cakes & 'Que has plans to give back to the community.

Owner Brooke Dean says she came across an opportunity that offers the perfect outlet for her to use her baking skills in a charitable way. Icing Smiles is a non-profit organization that partners with bakeries across the country to provide free, custom celebration cakes and other treats to critically ill children and their siblings.

"I just kind of stumbled upon it and I really like what they do, and the people there are so nice, you can just tell they're there because they really want to help," Dean said.

Dean says one of the goals of Icing Smiles is to take some of the hassle off of parents who are caring for a sick child and may not have the time to worry about small details such as birthday cakes.

"It is a lot of hassle trying to plan birthday parties and everything else," Dean said. "I can relate to it as a mom, and I like to give back to people ... if there's something I like to do that can help, I just figured, why not do it?"

Icing Smiles defines a "critically ill child" as a child with a malignant, degenerative or progressive illness. Upon approval for the program, a sick child is allowed four cakes: Two tiered cakes, or

"dream cakes," and two simple cakes. Siblings of sick children are allowed two cakes total.

"[The cakes] can also be used for things like their last chemo treatment or any other milestone," Dean said.

Dean says she has found Facebook to be a useful tool in spreading awareness of the organization and Cakes & 'Que's involvement.

"There are volunteers all over, and I like to get the word out because it's not just here," Dean said. "We have followers from all over the place who 'like' our [Facebook] page, so I like to share that [Icing Smiles] is out there so that people can sign up."

While the main focus of the organization is partnering with bakeries, Dean says there are several other ways for those who are not bakers to get involved.

"They are always accepting donations, and they just released something about hosting bake sales," Dean said. "They're also always looking for volunteers to help respond to emails and help organize [events]. So it's not something that would require a lot of time."

Dean says she has not yet gotten a request through Icing Smiles, but would like families in the Falls City area to be aware of the opportunity. Additional information can be found through www.icingsmiles.org.

From floor to ceiling, every detail was thought out, including a hand carved marble lionhead fireplace and the backlit onyx bar, which was cut, polished and shipped from Brazil via Tampa, Fla.

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A Pro-Life Budget for Nebraska

Life is precious. It is something that we can never take for granted. From our country's earliest days, our Founding Fathers recognized life as the first right in the Declaration of Independence. As Americans, we have an obligation to step up and protect life. The right to life comes with responsibilities to ourselves and to others. Nebraskans across our state recognize these duties by standing up for the unborn, caring for the elderly, and getting involved in their communities among many other actions.

Just a couple of weeks ago, I joined thousands of pro-life Nebraskans at the State Capitol for the 44th Annual Walk for Life. This event has happened annually since Roe v. Wade overturned state laws protecting unborn life in 1973. Nebraskans from all walks of life came together for this important event highlighting our state's pro-life values.

On the Capitol steps, numerous elected leaders spoke about the great work that has been going on at the State Capitol and in Washington, D.C. to promote our pro-life values. State Senator Dan Watermeier talked about the new "Choose Life" license plate that he worked with Senators to bring to my desk. U.S. Senator Deb Fischer touted the continued efforts to get the Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act passed. U.S. Senator Ben Sasse noted the numerous young people who attended the rally and are helping shape the future of the pro-life movement.

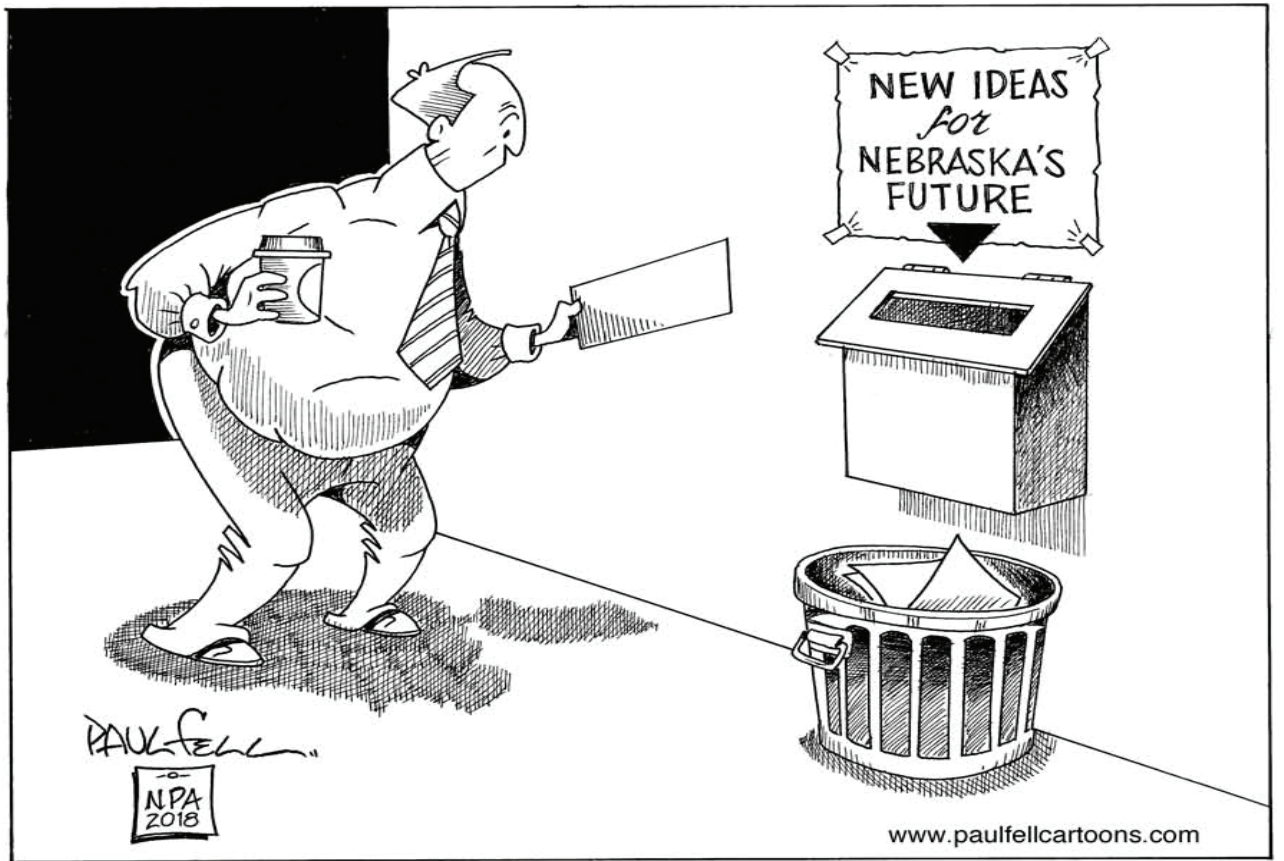
During the event, Lt. Governor Foley and I highlighted a new pro-life initiative currently under consideration by the Unicameral. Right now, healthcare providers that also perform abortions are receiving federal funding passed through the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services. This funding comes from Title X, or reproductive healthcare grants, from the federal government and is distributed by the states. Last year, President Trump signed H.J. Res. 43 into law to allow states far greater flexibility in the distribution of Title X funding than already exists under federal law.

In my budget recommendation, I am proposing to use this new flexibility and revise the distribution of federal Title X healthcare funding to prevent the use of taxpayer dollars for abortions. Nebraska is a pro-life state, and the state's budget should reflect those values. We already have language in our budget to ensure other funds do not get spent on abortions. Our proposal takes a logical next step: If you provide abortion services or refer or provide directive counsel for abortions, you cannot receive Title X funding. This helps ensure taxpayer dollars will not subsidize abortions directly or indirectly. Facilities that focus on providing life-giving healthcare, not abortion services, should receive our Title X tax dollars.

Some have tried to argue that changing the distribution could cause people to lose access to healthcare. This is simply not true. Under my budget recommendation, every community currently receiving funds would continue to be eligible for funding. Nebraska currently has over 40 Title X provider sites. The language recommended in the budget does not prohibit any provider from applying and receiving Title X funding as long as they do not provide abortion services or refer or provide directive counseling for abortions. If an organization has been providing abortions or related services, they can take steps to ensure that the entity providing Title X services is totally separate.

While this may seem to be a commonsense recommendation, there are still several steps before it can be finalized. The proposal now goes before the Legislature's Appropriations Committee for consideration. Senators will vote on the language in committee and then advance their recommendation for consideration by the full Legislature. If you want to see the Legislature's Appropriations Committee and the full Legislature adopt these pro-life reforms, I hope you will take the time to contact your State Senator. Senator dreams of future city, good for him, but good for us?

With apologies to the other 48, I think Senator Paul Schumacher of Columbus might just be the brightest bulb in the Unicameral lamp.

The Columbus attorney, who will be term-limited after this session, is often called "The Professor" by colleagues and observers of the legislature. He's a forward-thinking risk-taker, willing to float ideas that others have either not thought of or been afraid to mention.

It appears he may have saved his best for last with his proposal (LR269CA) to let voters decide if the state should create what he calls a New City, a sovereign 36-square-mile area with at least 10 people per square mile that would be granted complete or partial sovereignty for up to 99 years.

Sovereignty? A self-governing state, or colony, or city. Think autonomy, independence, self-government, freedom. That's avant-garde, but Schumacher said he's been daydreaming about the approach to the new global economy for years.

While the idea of no city or state taxes and no local or state regulations probably makes the average partisan politician very nervous, Schumacher thinks it would provide the kind of spark that ignites the minds of young people who can make it work. He believes Nebraska is "going nowhere fast." He wants to examine "the real situation that our state is in."

He said the state is currently: uninspiring; sparsely populated; culturally restricted; an inland state largely dependent on a very rudimentary economy. He wants to provide a mechanism for Nebraskans to leverage nothingness and emerge as a modern economic center over the course of a century.

I agree that the Legislature needs to have the discussion in a very public way, perhaps through a state-wide interim study with numerous local meetings. A task force could compile results to be discussed by the Legislature.

But, none of this is going to happen in a short session when lawmakers have a mess on their hands with challenges to education funding, property taxes, and corrections reform. Not to mention that it's an election year. The measure stands a snowball's chance right now.

Schumacher's daydream would create a city to attract industry and people by offering: a gigawatt of electric power generation and transmission facilities; Tier 1 fiber-optic communication; doorstep access to locally produced organic grains and meats and unlimited potable water; bullet trains to a major international airport and the Rocky Mountains; railroad rights of way and a "triangle of economic power bordered by Interstates 25, 76 and 80."

He said this would allow Nebraska "to ride the wave, rather than try to stand in the way of the wave." This could happen with a huge investment from a multinational corporation attracted by self-government, self-taxation and self-regulation.

Hey, if you're going to dream, dream big. Granted, the proposal doesn't answer the journalistic four w's and h - who, what, when, where and how - but the senator said that's the requirement to stick to a single subject, granting

sovereignty, on amendments to the Nebraska Constitution. If the idea were approved by voters, the Legislature would have to work out the details.

The public hearing for the proposal drew no proponents and opposition from the folks who don't want to see expanded gambling and a woman who said lawmakers should beware of simple solutions to complex problems.

I am troubled by the "triangle of economic power" which Schumacher touts in the bill's committee statement as "amplifying the dynamics of Denver and the front range, a bullet train less than an hour away from a major international airport and from the majesty of the Rocky Mountains."

In Nebraska, that's a pretty narrow range of options, basically

portions of Kimball, Cheyenne and Deuel Counties. I wonder how folks in the other 90 counties are going to take that?

Schumacher admits the proposal is insane. "So were the pyramids, circumnavigation of the globe, the transcontinental railroad, heavier than air flight, the Moon in a decade, and the inexplicable compulsion to be Great Again," his statement to the committee said, "Imagination has great value!"

He said he wants Nebraskans to define a future and, should they decline to do so, to inspire bolder spirits elsewhere.

I like bold, but let's think this through.

Dr. H.E. Tracey announced his dental office was open for appointments. The public was invited to attend the evening performance featuring five stage bands at the conclusion of a Tri-State Stage Band Clinic at Falls City High School Auditorium on Feb. 17.

Hinky Dinky was selling sides of freezer beef at \$.49 a pound and hind quarters were a bit higher at \$.59 a pound. Chaney Furniture was in the appliance business and Feb. was Hotpoint month, with ranges selling at just \$159.88.

A Dawson-Verdon School caucus and meeting was scheduled at the school on Feb. 27 to discuss school consolidation.

Gambles was having a one-cent sale offering those buying a new color TV the choice of a portable TV, a pair of white wall tires, a bicycle, a sewing machine, an occasional chair or six months of free cable service for just one cent more.

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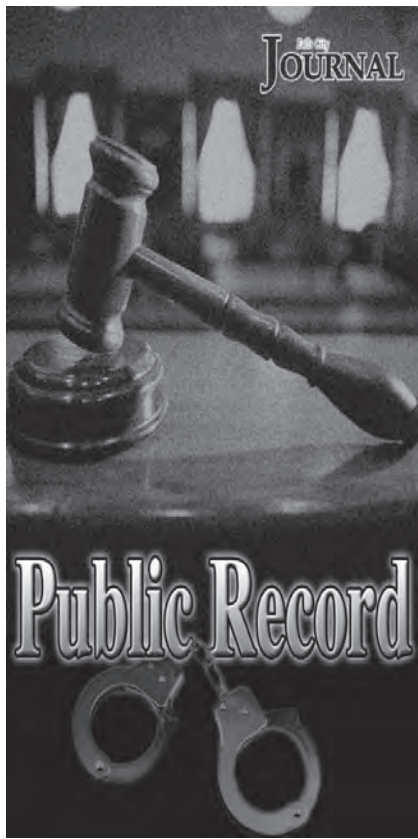

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Irish girls close out regular season with win

The Sacred Heart Irish girls traveled to Highland, Kan., on Thursday night and were looking to put their loss last week in the Pioneer Conference championship behind them. The 20-1 Lady Irish jumped out early on the 6-8 Doniphan West Mustangs 12-3 after the first quarter. shots and 16 steals in the game as well. Parrish had a big night for the Irish, finished with a game-high 14 points on seven of eight shooting. Parrish also added eight rebounds, two blocked shots, and a team-high five steals. Sara Wertenberger was right behind with 13 points, nine rebounds, and five blocked shots. Ahren Ebel added six points and a team-high four assists.

The two teams played a two-quarter JV game with the Mustangs winning 24-16. Danielle Bippes led the Irish with six points and Evi Schock and Teresa Morehead each added four points.

The win gave the #1 ranked Irish a 21-1 record heading into the postseason.

"Our older girls have a lot of experience from playing big games in the postseason. We're going to take it one game at a time," Coach Luke Santo said. "We've talked all year about playing our best basketball during this upcoming stretch. They all know what it takes."

The Irish will take on 1-13 Cornerstone Christian in the opening round of Sub-District play at Lourdes Central on Tuesday at 6:00 p.m. With a win, the Irish will take on the winner of 3-19 Lewiston and 13-10 Sterling at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday at Lourdes Central Catholic.

The Irish were to take on North Andrew last week but the game was twice called off due to inclement weather.

Irish roll into final week of regular season

The Falls City Sacred Heart Irish boys used a season-high 20 points by senior Sean Arnold to beat the Doniphan West Mustangs 67-50. The game was tight after the first eight minutes of action with the Irish holding on to a 17-14 lead. Theo Rohrer led the Irish attack with six points in the opening quarter.

The second period was tight as well with the Irish holding a 13-10 advantage in the quarter and a 30-24 lead at the half. Arnold hit two of three from behind the arc and led the Irish with eight-second quarter points.

SH continued to slowly pull away from the Mustangs in the third period outscoring the home team 21-18 and taking a 51-42 lead into the final quarter. Arnold again hit two three's to lead SH while Drew Bippes added five points on two field goals and a free throw.

Tigers continue hot streak

After a week off the Falls City, Tiger boys basketball team was back on the court last Tuesday, Feb. 6 in Tecumseh to take on the Johnson County Central Thunderbirds. The Tigers pounced on the home team early, doubling up the score 18-9 after the opening eight minutes. Falls City kept their foot on the gas in the second period as well, cruising into halftime with a 40-17 lead. The Thunderbirds, not ready to give in, outscored FC 14-10 in the third period but the Tigers put up 16 fourth-quarter points to JCC's 9 to walk away with a convincing 66-40 win.

Falls City connected on 46 percent of their field goal tries while allowing JCC to hit on just 33 percent. The Tigers also converted 14-20 attempts from the charity stripe and drained 6-16 from behind the arc. Falls City owned the glass, pulling down 35 rebounds to the Thunderbirds 20 and owned a decisive edge with 15 assists to just five for the Thunderbirds. Rudy Vrtiska had the hot hand for Falls City, leading the way with 17 points on six of nine shooting. Vrtiska also added five rebounds and three assists. Brandt Chapple was right behind with 16 points and seven rebounds.

"Thought we played well in the first half. Got a little sloppy in the second half," said Coach Don Hogue. "First quarter we had given JCC nine points, then in the next 12 minutes we only gave up eight points total."

With the win, the Tigers improved to 11-10 on the season while the Thunderbirds fell to 9-11. Falls City could see a rematch vs. JCC in a couple of weeks in Sub-District play at Norris.

On Thursday evening the 11-10 Tigers hosted the 6-13 HTRS Titans. The Tigers got off to a quick start with Brandt Chapple draining a three from the corner on the Tigers first possession. After a missed Titan shot, Chapple got the rebound and threw the ball down court to Collin Cook for a layup and a 5-0 lead one minute into the contest. Falls City grew the lead when Jake Craig hit Chapple in the lane for a basket on a bang-bang play, giving the Tigers a 7-2 advantage. Sophomore Mason Crawford then drilled a three from the left wing to make it 10-2 with 3:45 to play in the opening quarter. Falls City was scoreless for

the next three minutes until Chapple spun to the hoop, making the basket and drawing a foul. The three-point play ended a 7-0 Titan run, but FC led 13-9 after the first quarter.

The second quarter began with Cook scoring seven straight points for FC on two layups and a three-pointer from the wing. A layup by HTRS with 3:45 to play in the half stopped an 8-0 run by FC and a five-minute scoring drought by the Titans. After a pull-up jumper in the lane by Chapple, Collin Cook got another layup giving FC a 24-14 lead. Two free throws by Vrtiska and one by Craig made it 27-14 heading into the locker rooms. Cook led all scorers with 11 first-half points.

The third quarter started off the way Falls City wanted. Crawford dropped in a three from the top of the key to begin the half and a drive-by Chapple moments later saw Falls City's lead quickly grow to 18 points, 32-14. Cook then took over again, converting back to back layups, followed by a three-pointer from the right side and a free throw. Cook and the Tigers used another 8-0 run to close out the quarter, staking a 40-16 lead.

After scoring just seven points in the second and third quarters combined, the Titans finished the game outscoring FC 7-2 in the final period but eventually fell to Falls City 42-23.

The Tigers didn't have the most excellent night shooting the ball, hitting on just 34 percent of their attempts, but they held the Titans to only 25 percent on their opportunities. The Tigers outrebounded the Titans 25-17 and had nine assists to just four for HTRS. The Tigers used their defense to force the Titans into 16 turnovers, including 11 steals by FC. Cook had a huge night for FC scoring 19 points and adding three assists. Chapple added 12 points, five rebounds, two assists and three steals. Jake Craig scored just three points but led the team with nine rebounds and four blocked shots.

After losing five in a row in early Jan. the Tigers have now won five of their last six and are sporting a 12-10 record. The Tigers will wrap up the regular season with a home game against the 6-15 Fairbury Jeffs on Friday, Feb. 16 with JV action set for 6:00.

Pregnancy and heart disease

Pregnancy is a happy time for many women, but during the nine months of gestation, conditions can develop that put moms-to-be at risk a higher risk of heart disease and stroke. According to the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada, preeclampsia and gestational diabetes can develop during pregnancy, potentially putting women's long-term health at risk.

- **Preeclampsia:** There is no known way to prevent preeclampsia, a condition related to increased blood pressure and protein in expecting mothers' urine. An increase in protein is indicative of a problem with the pregnant woman's kidneys. How to prevent preeclampsia may remain a mystery, but women who have high blood pressure or are obese before giving birth may be prone to the condition. Age also may affect the likelihood that a woman will develop preeclampsia, as women younger than 20 and those older than 40 are considered to be at greater risk of developing the condition than those between the ages of 21 and 39. The risk for preeclampsia is also greater among women who are expecting twins and those who have diabetes, kidney disease, lupus, rheumatoid arthritis, or scleroderma. Physicians can treat preeclampsia, and women who develop the condition can have successful pregnancies and give birth to healthy babies.

- **Gestational diabetes:** Pregnancy hormones can interfere with the ability a pregnant woman's body has to use insulin efficiently. As a result, women must produce extra insulin while pregnant. If that cannot happen, then blood sugar levels can rise and lead to gestational diabetes. Gestational diabetes produces no warning signs, so women must ensure their glucose levels are monitored throughout their pregnancies. The long-term ramifications of gestational diabetes can be significant, as the condition can raise both mother and baby's risk of developing diabetes later in life.

- **Stroke:** Women can suffer from stroke at any time during their pregnancy, though the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada notes that their risk is high during childbirth and in the first few months after childbirth. Preexisting conditions, such as blood vessel malformation or eclampsia, are often the culprits when pregnant women or new mothers suffer strokes.



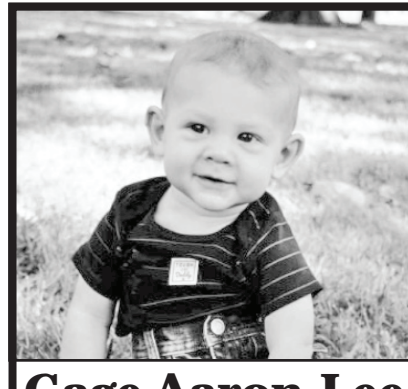
