Richardson County judge celebrates 25 years on the bench

Judge Curtis Maschman recently reached the 25-year anniversary of his appointment to judgeship, over the course of which he has presided over cases ranging from small claims to a triple homicide.

Maschman says his interest in law began with an internship at a law office in Blair during his senior year of college. Originally a business major, Maschman then decided to change paths and attend law school at the University of Nebraska, from which he earned his Juris Doctorate degree in 1980 before beginning his career at a private practice in Humboldt.

Maschman's business education proved useful during his time in private practice, as did his farm upbringing.

"The [firm] represented a lot of banks, and they did ... farm and ranch estate planning, which was of interest to me, so it was a good fit," Maschman said.

From his days as an attorney, Maschman says he enjoyed his experience working more closely with people than he does now as a judge.

"Being an attorney, I got to help people either solve a problem or build something, whether they've got an idea for a farm or a business, and I got to help them build that," Maschman said. "Problem-solving here in court is a little bit different ... but there are some things I don't miss about being an attorney, like the deadlines and the client is always right."

After 13 years of practicing as an attorney, Maschman was appointed as the Richardson County Court judge. At the age of 38, Maschman was 12 years younger than the average newly appointed judge at the time, according to the Federal Judicial Center.

Less than a year after becoming a judge, Maschman presided over the high-profile case of the triple homicide that took place in Humboldt in December 1993.

"It was kind of a baptism by fire," Maschman said.

WATCH OUT BIG TEN, FROST AND Co. ARE COMING FOR YOU

Last Tuesday morning, June 12, the 2018 Husker Nation Tour made a stop at the Pricard Auditorium in Falls City.

The stop, one of 26 throughout the state, included Athletic Director Bill Moos and Offensive Line coach Greg Austin. As the two spoke, there was an overwhelming sense of enthusiasm in their voices and optimism from the crowd. The two featured speakers spent a little more than an hour in town before heading off to the next stop, Auburn.

Early in the event, Athletic Director Moos repeated a statement that he had made recently at the Omaha Press Club luncheon about Ohio St. "Hey Urban, were coming for ya!" This statement drew a round of applause and set the tone for the rest of the morning.

Moos, ever the politician/athletic director, talked of how his great-grandfather homesteaded in Ogallala, his grandfather was born in Big Springs and how he was now coming home to his roots.

He began his administrative career at Montana in 1990 as athletic director, then Oregon from 1995-2007 before moving on to Washington State from 2010-2017. He discussed his press conference in which he was hired having more people in attendance than some basketball games he had been to at other places. He mentioned that he placed a call to Tom Osborne within twenty minutes of the conference's conclusion. "I'd be a fool not to draw from his experience. What an icon and tre-

mendous gentleman," Moos said of Osborne.

Moos shared a funny story from the press conference that ended up having a Falls City connection. A fellow yelled out to him "you a John Deere man?"

"Through and through," said Moos. Then he said he paused for a moment and thought to himself,

"you idiot, this may be Case IH country."

So, he said, "But my cousin is a Case IH guy" with a grin. Two days later he received an email that said, "Mr. Moos, great to have you here, welcome, we're excited about the future. One thing, you might want to

check your IMG people because one of your biggest sponsors is Masey Ferguson," signed Mitch Merz.

Upon arriving in Lincoln, Moos said his team had to hit the ground running. There was a problem with the football program, and he could feel that the fanbase was fractured. He knew a coaching change was needed, but he would never fire anyone during the season unless there were behavioral problems.

Moos said he always keeps a short list of coaching prospects in the top drawer of his desk. Back in 2012 when he hired Mike Leach at Washington State, Scott Frost was second on his list even then. He said that he always looks to hire coaches who have worked in the small schools, "where you don't have a silver spoon in your mouth."

Frost did that when he worked at Northern (Continued on page 10)

There's a five-month-old living in the basement of the First Presbyterian Church. It's not a boy or girl, but rather a service, and that service is growing rapidly.

Its name is The Community Diaper Closet. Born in January 2018, after months of planning and preparation, it offers basic items like diapers and wipes, shampoo and lotion, blankets, baby furniture (when available), clothing for children who range in size from newborn to 5T, and much more. There are no eligibility requirements, and every item is free.

The non-profit, charitable mission is located on the east side of the Presbyterian Church at 20th and Harlan Streets. There are signs that direct people down the steps, to the basement.

The Closet is open every Monday afternoon from 4-6 p.m.

Even though the project is the Presbyterian Church's baby, the organizers hope it becomes a cooperative effort, with help from individuals, and community and church organizations. The founders

are seeking donations from anyone who feels called to help.

The purpose of The Community Diaper Closet is to provide a judgment-free zone where families can choose basic items that they need for babies and toddlers. Everyone is welcome, whether they are from Falls City or not.

"The Community Diaper Closet is a hand up," said Judy Crawford, one of the founders and coordinators. "A hand up is not a hand-out."

In the past five months, the program has served 18 families. They include a working father who is raising his child alone, a grandmother who has custody of her grandchildren, and a young couple who stopped by with their newborn, on their way home from the hospital. All found something they needed.

The Community Diaper Closet was founded after Judy approached Reverend Nancy Tuma, pastor of the Presbyterian churches in Falls City and Hiawatha, KS., about doing a service project. Rev. Tuma had given a sermon about serving those in need, and the message had tugged at Judy's heart.

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Honoring and Serving Our Veterans

United States military veterans are our country's heroes. They put their lives on the line for the sake of freedom, and here in Nebraska, we work to honor them all year long. This week, I had the honor of hosting a 99-year-old World War II veteran, Sidney Walton, at the State Capitol. Nebraskans joined us to help honor him as well as hear directly from someone who served on the front lines. With the passing of time, it is critical that we connect younger generations with history, so that the significance of the war does not fade with the passing of

the Greatest Generation.

Remembering our veterans is important, but how we treat them is a pivotal part of honoring their service and sacrifice. President John F. Kennedy once said, "As we express our gratitude, we must never forget that the highest appreciation is not to utter the words, but to live by them." That is why I have made it a priority to make Nebraska the best state in the nation to be a veteran. To this end, we have been streamlining services for our veterans, expanding employment opportunities, and advocating for our veterans, among other things.

When veterans interact with the state, they generally work with the Nebraska Department of Veterans' Affairs (NDVA). Last year, the Legislature and I worked together to merge the state's two veterans-related agencies to create a one-stop shop for veterans, so we can better integrate service delivery. NDVA provides our veterans with information on their rights, benefits, and other sources of aid. And now they also oversee our veterans' homes in four communities from Bellevue to Scottsbluff.


Taking care of our veterans means we must work to retain quality staff who serve them. That is why I recently approved a 20 percent pay increase for staff care technicians, who serve our veterans. Wages for Nebraska's veterans care workers were falling behind peer states, so we took this step to become more competitive. This pay increase will improve recruitment and retention among our staff care technicians who take care of our veterans.

My administration also understands that our nation's veterans are not the only people who sacrificed for our freedoms. Our servicemen and women could not do it without the love and support of their family. Parents worry about their children, and spouses wonder if their loved ones will come home. This takes a toll on military families. Our understanding of the role military families play in the lives of our veterans and active duty service members was part of the inspiration for LB 639, a bill I signed in 2017. This proposal expanded the hiring preference at the State of Nebraska to include the spouses of veterans and active duty service members. Senator Bruce Bostelmann and I worked together on this bill to increase employment opportunities for the spouses of military members and veterans. They should also be rewarded for their sacrifice in times of crisis.

This year, I approved revisions to Rule 21 to make it easier for teachers from military families moving to Nebraska to get a teaching permit here. Military spouses with a valid out-of-state teaching license can now receive a three-year teaching permit in Nebraska. Cutting red tape makes Nebraska friendlier to military families, and it has given our schools the opportunity to employ high-quality teachers in a timely manner.

We have also been working with our federal delegation to advocate for our veterans at the federal level and support efforts to improve service in the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. Last week, President Donald J. Trump signed the VA Mission Act. The VA Mission Act is a bill aimed at strengthening the VA healthcare system and improving the lives of veterans, their families, and caregivers. It provides \$5.2 billion more in funding for our veterans. President Trump and Congress worked hard to get this priority done for our veterans, and we greatly appreciate their work.

The State of Nebraska has a duty to do what is right for our veterans, and we are working every day to make our state the best place to be a veteran. My team will continue to work to streamline services, expand job opportunities, and advocate for our veterans. We are always looking for ways to serve our veteran community better. Maybe someday, you can get there from here

Governor Pete Ricketts recently announced that a segment of the Heartland Expressway has been selected to receive an \$18.3 million federal grant through the U.S. Department of Transportation's Infrastructure for Rebuilding America (INFRA) program.

That's great news if you live and travel roads in Nebraska's Panhandle, especially that hilly, curvy part of US Highway 385 from the intersection of U.S. 26 north to Alliance – a popular route for getting to South Dakota's Black Hills. It's also good news for the folks in four states who have discussed the project – and seen some major segments built – over the past 30 years.

Yes, it has been 30 years since the 498-mile project connecting Limon, Colorado, with Rapid City, South Dakota, was first announced. The multi-lane divided highway has been called a \$500 million project with an economic benefit of about twice that over a 38-year span. That benefit includes: increased traffic volume; businesses and jobs to provide services for those travelers; travel saving time; and accident reduction (estimated at \$2.5 million) because of the improved roadway.

Ricketts touted the grant announcement as part of Nebraska's historic commitment to build the 21st-century infrastructure system to grow the state. Combined with (then Nebraska State Senator) Deb Fischer's Build Nebraska Act and the Nebraska Transportation Innovation Act – which he vetoed – Ricketts said the grant will help Nebraska fulfill Governor Kay Orr's vision for expanding the state expressway system. Mrs. Orr was governor from 1987 to 1991, 27 years ago.

Enacted in 2011, the Build Nebraska Act (BNA) dedicated 25 percent of sales tax receipts for expansion of the Expressway System, federally designated High Priority Corridors, and preservation of the existing transportation system. The act calls for 85 percent of the revenue generated for Nebraska Department of Transportation projects and 15 percent for local roads and streets.

That act is to provide about \$1.2 billion in its 20-year lifespan. In November 2011, NDOT announced approximately \$600 million in investments to expand 17 expressway, interstate or national high priority corridors. Seven of the corridors are complete and the remaining are under construction or funded for construction and on track for completion.

The Transportation Innovation Act (TIA), enacted in 2016, provided NDOT with new revenue, programs and tools to increase mobility, freight, economic growth and safety in Nebraska. The purpose of the act was to accelerate highway capital improvement, promote innovative solutions for deficient county bridges, and help finance transportation improvements to grow businesses and jobs.

That act, passed 30-16-3 in an override of Ricketts' veto, resulted in a total allocation of \$450 million for targeted infrastructure investment. The TIA legislation created the Transportation Infrastructure Bank (TIB) that received a one-time transfer of \$50 million from the Cash Reserve Fund in 2016. The TIB also receives annual revenue from a fuel tax increase, which Ricketts opposed, and will generate \$400 million for infrastructure investment prior to its 2023 sunset.

The segment of the Heartland Expressway selected for this recently

announced grant funding would convert 14.6 miles of existing two-lane on U.S. Highway 385 to a four-lane divided highway. It is part of a series of improvements to the corridor beginning at the junction of US 385 and State Link 62A, extending north approximately 24.8 miles to Alliance.

NDOT Director Kyle Schneeweis said the Heartland Expressway, the only designated expressway in the western half of the state, is essential to the movement of people and goods. He said the grant further cements his department's commitment to the project as the state works with partners in the Panhandle as funding pieces and construction dates are finalized.

The Heartland Expressway Corridor serves as the middle section of the Great Plains International Trade Corridor which extends from Mexico

to Canada. Given its significance for trade and freight transport, it's one of four federally designated High Priority Corridors that comprise the Ports-to-Plains Alliance.

It seems to me that completion of road projects is often slower than the pilot car that leads motorists through a two-mile patch of one-lane resurfacing on a hot summer day. This infusion of federal money and the apparent success of two state laws is truly a green light for all Nebraskans.

The feds have given NDOT until 2021 to spend the money. Let's hope they beat the deadline.

50 Years Ago – June 20 - June 26, 1968

The Historical Marker at Coon corner commemorating the discovery of the first oil well in Nebraska, a project of the Pollyanna 4-H Club, was dedicated during a program at the site.

Miss Falls City of 1968, Cindy Fuller, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Sterling Fuller of Reserve, competed in the Miss Nebraska pageant being held in York, NE.

The Sts. Peter & Paul Altar Society announced plans to hold a fund-raising Carnival on the Sacred Heart School Blacktop with pony rides, a balloon dart throw, Penny pitch, balloons, cotton candy and more.

Tom Roberts, son of Mr. & Mrs. Lee Roberts, was one of 15 finalists for a federal aviation agency Safety Award after he devised a landing gear safety lock designed to prevent potentially serious accidents.

Airport Manager Ed Garner's Bellanco 260 was on its way to the 2,469 mile Powder Puff Derby of the Transcontinental Air Race with former stewardess and experienced pilot Charlotte Kelly and Nan Scheer, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Floyd Larsen, on board.

Bill Hill was a leader on the Falls City Legion baseball team through the first five games of the season, the only player on the team with a batting average above .250 while also fanning 32 players in 19 innings on the mound.

As the community welcomed visitors for an Indian Powwow, beautification projects were underway in Rulo including a new public park along the Missouri River, a nearly completed ball park complex, a public library that occupied what used to be a bank, the opening of new streets, and soon to be available city water.

The Breezy Hill Drive-In was showing "The Wild, Wild World of Jayne Mansfield," described as "uninhibited, unforgettable, and unbelievable!" "Bonnie and Clyde," starring Warren Beatty and Faye Dunaway, was playing at the Rivoli.

Malts and Shakes at just 22-cents each were the 7-day special at Mr. Swiss.

Al Wergin wound up a 45 year career in the grocery business when he sold the Wergin's Food Center at 17th and Stone Streets to Al Prater.

Fifty Richardson County residents were among 403 students enrolled at Peru State College for the first five-week term of the 1968 summer session.

Gayle Swisegood tossed a one-hit game as the Falls City Elks Midgets defeated Hiawatha at City Park 10-0 after Charlie Heim drove Phil Aitken home with the tenth run to end the contest with two out in the bottom of the fifth inning.

Ralph Waniska, a 1968 graduate of Dawson-Verdon High School, was the recipient of a \$1,400 scholarship to attend the University of Nebraska.

Charles and Karen Radatz were married.

25 Years Ago – June 20 - June 26, 1993

Falls City's eighth annual Hot Air Balloon Show was limited by windy weather that kept the balloons grounded Saturday morning, resulted in a shortened flight of about 6 balloons from Seid Implement to the airport Saturday evening, but produced a beautiful scene when all 18 balloons entered took to the air Sunday morning.

Bingo players at the Iowa Tribal Bingo Hall escaped serious injury when a car lunged forward after being put into gear and crashed through the west wall of the building.

Chris Darnell of Falls City Sacred Heart was voted the game's most valuable offensive player after he scored on a 5-yard run as time expired to give the East a 26-20 victory over the West in the 16th Annual Sertoma Eight-Man All-Star Football Classic at Hastings.

Thirty-six persons were in attendance when the Golden Alumni of Sacred Heart held their eighth reunion.

The City Council voted to continue negotiations with the Union Pacific Railroad for its vacant depot in Falls City after learning the railroad was willing to donate the depot building but wanted to retain access to the depot site.

Matt O'Grady and Alicia Lemerond were recipients of the "Cecil Murphy Scholar Athletes of the Year" award at Falls City Sacred Heart High School.

Middle school physical education teacher Louis Fritz was honored as the Teacher of the Quarter.

Ron Hill was the new president of the Falls City Lions Club, succeeding Mike Dunn.

The River Twin Theater was showing "Dennis the Menace" and Arnold Schwarzenegger as the "Last Action Hero."

The Right Combination country band was entertaining at Howard's Tavern in Shubert.

The First National Bank was sponsoring a bus trip to a George Strait concert at the Devaney Sports Center in Lincoln.

15 Years Ago – June 20 - June 26, 2003

Trent Scholl, 14, son of Steve and Brenda Scholl, placed second in the Pepsi Pitch, Hit, and Run Regional at Columbus, NE and he and other competitors were introduced on the field at a Royals game in Kansas City.

Recognized as American Legion Baseball "Players of the Week" were Marty Pagnano, Darren Elliott, and Mark Dunn.

Commissioners award contract for County Insurance to Miller-Monroe Co

During their Tues., June 12 meeting, the Richardson County Commissioners awarded the contract for County Insurance to the Miller-Monroe Co. and the Berkshire Hathaway Home-state Companies it represents. The insurance contract covers general liability, errors and omissions, motor vehicle, property, and other miscellaneous items with a premium of \$266,917 that represented a reduction in cost of \$10,314 from the prior year.

Commissioners reviewed and approved a news release prepared by Sheriff Don Pounds explaining to the public the County's decision to make the south entrance of the Courthouse building the main and only public entrance to the building. Sheriff Pounds also prepared emergency and security procedures for the Courthouse for review by the Board. The Board also approved a request from the Sheriff for payment of on-call time for deputies at the rate of \$7.50 per day effective June 17. It also accepted the Sheriff's fee collections of \$12,170.28 for April and of \$4,211.06 for May.

Following the weekly report of Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr. on County road and bridge maintenance, Commissioners voted to certify to the State Department of Roads that the installation of the Advance Railroad Warning Signs had been completed, they voted to accept sealed bids at 10:00 a.m., Tues., July 3, for the purchase of steel materials, and they approved a new driveway/access policy, rules, and proposed permit application form.

The new driveway/access policy and an application form are both posted on the Richardson County website. Applications must be approved by the County Highway Superintendent. One access will be permitted per residential property and one field access be permitted per each quarter section. When culverts

are required, residential accesses will require a 30 foot culvert and field entrances a 48 foot culvert with landowners responsible for purchase of culvert materials with installation by either the County or installers approved by the County. Permit fees will be \$100 for a small access and \$150 for a larger access. For additional information go to the Richardson County website (<http://www.co.richardson.ne.us/>) and follow the links to the driveway/access application and access policy.

Tom Glennon of Black Forest Resources requested an opportunity to meet with the Board via teleconference to discuss a possible paid-up oil and gas lease for parcels of County owned property including county roads right-of-way. Commissioners informed Mr. Glennon it would be necessary to go through a public hearing process with advance public notice enabling presentations as well by other companies with an interest in obtaining such leases.

Commissioners met in executive session with County Treasurer Amanda Bartek-Young to discuss a personnel matter, but they took no action on the matter when they returned to regular session.

Commissioners approved the weekly claims for payment and officially closed out accounts that had become dormant including the Road/Bridge Construction Allocation, Chromatograph, Employment Security, State Institutions, Jail Law Enforcement Building, and Noxious Weed Control accounts.

Commissioners met as a Board of Equalization prior to their regular county board meeting. During that session they approved nine County Board of Equalization Notices of Valuation Changes as presented by County Assessor Pam Vice. The Board also approved a Three Year Plan for Assessment as presented by Assessor Vice.

Farm Service Agency County Committee nomination period in Richardson County launched June 15

According to CED Brenda Fields, USDA Farm Service Agency Richardson County Executive Director, FSA will accept nominations for the Richardson County Committee beginning Friday, June 15, 2018.

Producers across the country are already serving on committees where they play a critical role in the day-to-day operations of FSA, making important decisions on programs dealing with disaster and conservation, emergencies, commodity loan price support, county office employment and other agricultural issues.

"County committees are unique to FSA and allow producers to have a voice on federal farm program implementation at the local level," said CED Fields. "It is also important that committees are comprised of members who fairly represent the diverse demographics of production agriculture for their community. I encourage all producers, including women, minority and beginning farmers and ranchers, to participate in the nomination and election process."

Nationwide, more than 7,700 dedicated farmers and ranchers serve on FSA county committees, which consist of three to 11 members and meet once a month, or as needed. Members serve three-year terms.

Producers can nominate themselves or others. Organizations, including those representing beginning, women and minority producers, may also nominate candidates to better serve their communities. To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, producers must participate or cooperate in an FSA program and reside in the area where the election is being held.

This year, nominations and elections for Richardson County will be held in local administrative area 2, which includes Liberty, Ohio, Nemaha, Salem and Falls City Townships.

June 2018 FC Public Schools Superintendent's District Update

The Falls City Public Schools held its regular monthly meeting on Monday, June 11, 2018. Here are the highlights of the meeting.

Transportation Director's Report presented by Rob Baker provided a review of the District 56 transportation fleet. The eight rural bus routes traveled 92,886 miles during the last school year, compared to 86,060 in 16-17. On average, the district's bus routes transported 286 students on a daily basis to and from school. Over the past school year, District 56 students were transported to 364 school activities, covering 45,311 miles. Furthermore, the District 56 Board of Education policies covering buses, school vehicles, and the transportation of students by employees, were reviewed and discussed by the Board. The Board of Education tabled Policy 5320 Buses to consider the use of school buses for the purpose of District 56 alumni activities.

Sixpence Early Childhood Program – District 56 was recently notified the Nebraska Children and Families Foundation Board of Trustees approved additional annual funding of \$33,458 to help absorb the cost of additional personnel and facility operating costs. The Sixpence new allocated grant amount will be \$273,458 for the upcoming budget year. This additional funding will support the hiring of a half-time early childhood home visitor.

Tiger Booster Club has generously donated \$7,500 towards a new sound system in the main high school gym. The project will include the addition of loudspeakers, amplifiers, wireless mics, and new cabling. The project will be completed by Diode Technologies in mid-July.

The District 56 Board of Education acted on one item before concluding the regular meeting.

1) Approved Policy Reviews and Adoptions on 1) 5321 School Vehicles; 2) 5322 Transportation of Students by School Employees; 3) 5410 Collection of Debt; 4) 5335 Tuition Reimbursement for College Coursework or Advanced Degrees. 5) 7120 Dispensation of Medication.

Richardson County judge celebrates 25 years on the bench

fire," Maschman said. "I had to use some skills that I haven't had to use since, thank goodness ... but all in all, my job was to be sure things got started out properly before [the case] got handed off to the district court."

Since his early days on the bench, Maschman says there have been many changes in the court system.

"Probably the biggest thing that's changed are the technologies that are used in the court system," Maschman said. "We didn't have a scanner to get signed documents scanned, I didn't have a computer on the bench, and we didn't do video hearings and videoconferencing, which we're now doing."

Having a computer on the bench is a benefit to both judges and the public, Maschman says, as it provides key information that pertains to individuals and previous court cases, and allows a judge to access calendars and schedule next appearances.

In 2007, Maschman was presented the Nebraska Supreme

Court Outstanding Judge award, which is described by the Nebraska Supreme Court's website as "The highest honor given by the Chief Justice to recognize members of the judiciary for meritorious projects and exemplary accomplishments that enhance the vision of justice within Nebraska communities."

As a response to concerns recently expressed by Richardson County residents regarding crime in the community, Maschman says it is important for the public to have basic knowledge of the legal system so they can better understand the judge's role in criminal cases and what goes into sentencing decisions.

"It reinforces the education obligation with the legal system to make sure people understand that the judicial system is not law enforcement," Maschman said. "We're not part of enforcement of the laws; we administer the laws, ensure that rights are protected for both sides [of a case], and handle the conviction and sentencing process."

When deciding a sentence, Maschman says there are multiple factors that judges consider in each individual case.

"We have to consider, is this [sentence] going to get a result? It's part sentencing and part rehabilitation. And public per-

ception is a small component of sentencing in that it can deter others from violating the law," Maschman said.

While the internet is perhaps the best resource outside of formal education for adults who wish to better understand the justice system, Maschman said there are better opportunities for students to learn more.

"The best thing the bar association does to educate people is high school mock trial," Maschman said. "It gives a lot of people a new respect for the legal system."

Over the course of his time as a judge, Maschman says he has valued what he has learned from working with the public.

"One thing I have enjoyed about county court is the contact I get to have with people," Maschman said. "It's not always with attorneys. Even in traffic cases and small claims ... having contact with different types of people helps you understand the human condition."

Maschman says he occasionally gets feedback from people who approach him after a court case and say the sentence he handed down helped them "change direction" in their lives. While that feedback usually only comes years later, Maschman says those interactions have been his most rewarding moments.

"Actually, she told me it hit her upside the head," Rev. Tuma said, laughing. "Judy was ready to spring into action, but didn't know what to do."

A grandmother and retired kindergarten teacher, Judy had a special place in her heart for babies and young children. She suggested that the church provide items for families who needed assistance with pre-kindergarten children.

"Denny and I married young," Judy said, "And I remember times when five dollars would have made a huge difference. We were a working family, but we had three children, so we struggled at first. That's why I have great empathy for families who are working hard to make ends meet, but can't quite get there."

She and Rev. Tuma visited a diaper closet at West Side Baptist church in Topeka, Kansas, and another at their sister church—First Presbyterian church in Hiawatha, Kansas. After their visits, Judy felt called to open something similar in Falls City.

She and her husband, Denny, cleared out a room in the church's basement, and converted it into a warm and welcoming space. Denny transformed an old choir robe closet into shelving units, and built another shelf in a corner of the room. Several families in the church donated plastic shelves that the coordinators hoped would soon be filled with clothing for babies and toddlers.

And suddenly, The Community Diaper Closet was born.

The primary purpose of The Closet is, of course, diapers. But, according to Rev. Tuma, the nonprofit also gives away the things listed above.

"In addition, we have items that

were specifically made for The Closet. Several women from the Mormon Church provided newborn packets that include a few diapers and a variety of other items. The women purchased and bagged 145 of the packets. The Community Diaper Closet received approximately 60 of those. Most are still available."

Judy then said excitedly, "One of our Sunday School classes, which is taught by Maddie Huppert, made a blanket, too. The girls in the class, Ella and Brynna Glathar, and Mylie Crawford, were proud of their donation. The blanket went out the door very quickly."

She added that The Closet is looking for more blankets, which could possibly be donated by sewing and quilting circles or clubs. "I have a lot of fleece that I would give to anyone who wanted to make a blanket," she said. "Anyone who is interested, can call me at (402) 801-2738."

Donations have also come in from organizations and businesses. For example, SunMart and Great Western Bank have each

donated several boxes of diapers. The Rotary and Lions clubs have given cash so Judy and Rev. Tuma could purchase items.

So, how can the community help?

"The Community Diaper Closet seeks gently-used toys, and clothing for children up to 5T," Judy said. "But we also need new packages of diapers, wipes, hygiene items, things for baby's bath time, blankets, pacifiers..."

"Or any gently-used or new items for babies or toddlers that the kind souls of Falls City and the surrounding area would like to give," Reverend Tuma said. "Donations can be dropped off on Mondays from 4 to 6 p.m., or by calling the church at (402) 245-2650.

In addition, The Community Diaper Closet needs volunteers. Currently, Denny and Judy Crawford drive to Falls City from their home near Brock, every Monday afternoon. Rev. Tuma is also there most Mondays.

"If an individual or couple would donate two hours of his or

her time one Monday per month, it would help a lot," Rev. Tuma said. "The volunteers don't have to be members of our church. We want this to become a community-wide project."

It's a project that is still in its infancy. However, with TLC, and support from this generous community, Judy and Rev. Tuma know that this baby will only continue to grow.

WATCH OUT BIG TEN, FROST AND CO. ARE COMING FOR YOU

(Continued from Page 1) Iowa in 2007 and 2008. Moos even went as far to say that Frost should have gotten more of a sniff back when the job at Nebraska was open four years ago. Frost, a Wood River native, played at Stanford in 1993-1994 before coming home to finish his career. He played six seasons in the NFL before returning to the college coaching ranks. Frost took over a Central Florida program that was 0-12 the year before he was hired only to turn it around to a number six, undefeated program. He won six different national coach of the year awards.

Discussing the hiring process of Coach Frost, Moos said rookie Athletic Directors make the mistake of hounding coaches during the season. He mentioned Florida, Tennessee and Texas A&M to name a few. "I never called Scott Frost, didn't need to. I had Matt Davison."

Moos is, of course, talking about Tecumseh native Matt Davison. You may remember him from "the catch" in Missouri, that kept our national championship hopes alive in 1997. Moos said that Davison is exceptionally passionate, and he knew he had to incorporate Davison into his plan. Davison and Frost remained close friends years after playing together. He relayed the Athletic Directors thoughts to Frost without really bothering him during the season. He used Davison as a conduit to get his messages to Frost. In the end, Moos created a position for Davison in the football department, Associate Athletic Director. One of Matt's responsibilities includes organizing and embracing former players.

Moos also talked about what a special place the state of Nebraska is. When you cross the border, it's all red. For the first time, his program is the only

show in town. "We are known for great fans, and you are that," he said to the Falls City crowd.

When talking about the number one challenge he [Moos] faced in the upcoming years, he said "To get Nebraska back to its rightful place, to rebuild, because there are no quick fixes. We want to build on a sturdy foundation from recruiting and developing the players. We want to get to a point where if we do stub our toe, it won't be a house of cards, and we can recover quickly. We want to compete for championships year in and year out."

"These guys are good coaches and tremendous human beings. They all care about the players, not just on the field but in all aspects of life. From top to bottom these guys are on the same page and rowing in the same direction," said Moos.

"You deserve to smile, to be proud and happy. I thank you

for staying through the tough times." He finished his time with a quote from FDR, "Happy days are here again." However, its going take a while because we're going to do it right, from the ground up.

Also in town, Tuesday was former player and current offensive line coach Greg Austin. Austin was recruited by Frank Solich and also played for Bill Callahan at Nebraska. He shared his excitement to be back at Nebraska, and even though he's not from a small town, he has a small town mindset. He shared with the crowd the moment he realized what a special place Nebraska was when he was on a recruiting visit. At the grocery store a fan recognized him and not only asked his questions but knew so much about him. That was the moment he knew this is a huge deal. "We played a lot of football in Texas, but here it is a way of life," said Austin.

Austin went on to speak of coaching at a small school in Minnesota. He loved the affect he had on the guys. The reason he got into coaching was for the players and what kind of effect they could have in the community. Austin spoke very strongly about holding each other accountable and using horizontal and vertical leadership. In their first season at UCF Frost used his leadership with the coaches who passed it down to the players. They went from 6-6 in the first season to 13-0.

"As we implement these systems, the culture is what we are going to change," said Austin.

Frost knows how to relate the culture with history and traditions he said. Tough, physical, fast, and smart is how the team will play. They want guys on the team that will play for one another and the state. Austin also explained how they wouldn't recruit a kid unless he wants to be the best at his position, but they also have to be the best

teammate. He said he believes that good teammates will win championships. "You're going to be excited about the product you're going to see out there," said Austin.

Austin said the most significant problem coming into the program was accountability. He explained that there was no accountability from the players or the coaches. When discussing the offensive line, he said the effort was always there; it's just getting them coached up and maybe even getting better players.

Austin said strength and conditioning coach Zach Duvall is "the best in the business."

He said Duvall has a good touch of "old school" Husker Power with the addition of scientific research.

A hot topic discussed was the changing of the Tunnel Walk song. Moos mentioned that the music would be addressed. Austin talked about Coach Frost finding a way to honor the past, live in the present and create the future. Frost knows the traditions, but he also understands things need to change up from time to time. It's all about embracing a new way of doing things. Some traditions, according to Austin, will be altered from time to time, but trust and believe that every decision made is made with the success of this program in mind.

With the start of the Scott Frost era less than 75 days away curiosity, optimism and a sense of excitement are evident everywhere you turn. People again want to engage in conversations about recruits or where the program is headed. The Husker fan base should be excited without being overly critical and give the coaches and administration the time because they will bring the program back to the national stage. Allow them the time to build things the right way and before long the glory days will return.
