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FALLS CITY MAN DIES IN ACCIDENT NEAR HIAWATHA, KS

Charles Kreifels, 58, of Falls City was involved in a one-vehicle accident Monday afternoon, July 23.

The Kansas Highway Patrol reports that Kreifels was northbound, outside of Hiawatha, pulling a trailer with his pickup truck when he left the highway and entered the west ditch then traveled back across to the east ditch striking the bank of a creek bed. Kreifels was pronounced dead at the scene. It was believed he suffered a heart attack.

Dave Warner, 63, of Falls City, was the only other passenger in the vehicle. Warner was transported to the Hiawatha Community Hospital where he was treated for minor injuries and later released.

According to the Kansas Highway Patrol, neither occupant was wearing a seatbelt at the time of the wreck.

Charles Kreifels, 58, of Falls City, passed away July 23, 2018, in Hiawatha, KS. He was born February 23, 1960, in Falls City to Bernard and Mary Kathryn (Finck) Kreifels.

Charles was raised in Falls City and graduated Falls City Sacred Heart High School in 1979. He then attended Benedictine College and then attended carpentry trade school at Atchison, KS. He returned to Falls City to farm with his father and also worked a variety of jobs. At the time of his death, he owned and operated Season Lawn Care in Falls City. He was

Bailey Bindle feels like she's in a dream. She's earning double majors in criminal justice counseling and psychology at Peru State College, a school that she says is the perfect fit for her. She will graduate debt-free in 2020, thanks to the Susan Thompson Buffett Foundation. And, she currently works several jobs that she loves.

One of those jobs requires her to create posts for Twitter, Facebook, and Instagram. Plus, the organization flies her across the country as a representative at various events.

What more could a college student want?

"I'm living the dream," Bailey said, in a recent interview. "And I have no idea how I got here."

Bailey, whose parents are Brian and Shawna Bindle of Falls City, graduated from Falls City High School in 2016. As a student, she was on the honor roll, was a cheerleader, the homecoming queen, a band member, and a positive force on the high school campus.

When she was a junior, she became very active in the nationally-known organization, Students Against Destruction Decisions (SADD).

"My mom is a paramedic," Bailey said, "So I grew up hearing about car crashes, and drunk or distracted driving. I knew from a young age that car crashes kill more teenagers annually than anything else does."

She was passionate about the non-profit's primary focus on teen traffic safety, but appreciated, too, its mission to spotlight other teen concerns—things like body image, suicide prevention, substance use, and mental health concerns.

All of those issues were important to Bailey, so she

formed a local chapter of SADD. She also signed a contract with the organization, agreeing that she would not drink alcohol until she was of legal age. She has taken that vow very seriously.

"I just turned 20," Bailey said, "And I've never even had a sip of alcohol."



Not only that, but when she was a student at FCHS, she avoided parties altogether. "I just felt like attending parties would compromise my position on underage drinking," Bailey said, "And above all, I am true to who I am." (The fact that she was elected homecoming queen also speaks volumes about parties and popularity.) Her commitment to sobriety led to increased responsibility in the SADD organization, which in turn led to increased opportunity. The summer before her senior year, she got to attend the SADD National Conference in Nashville.

"I immediately felt at home," she said. "I walked in and thought, 'these are my people.'"

As a senior, Bailey became a member of the Student Leadership Council, and attended the national conference in Pittsburg. As a freshman at Peru State, she was selected to serve on the College Advisory Council.

"There are countless applications that come in each year for a position on the National College Advisory Council, but SADD only picked nine students," Bailey said.

As a council member, she also got to attend SADD's National Conference in Tampa, and was honored to represent the organization at other events. One of the most exciting ones was in New York City, in April

CO. COMMISSIONERS MEET TO DISCUSS QUAD CO. FUNDS AND ROAD MAINTENANCE

During their Tues., July 24th, meeting, Richardson County Commissioners received the annual statement of fund expenditures by the Quad County Historical Society of funds provided by the County for Fiscal Year 2017-18.

Presenting the report were Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Stalder and Mr. and Mrs. Dean Bogle. The Stalders and Bogles also made a request for continued funding for the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 budget year in the amount of \$5,000.00. Commissioners took no action on the request at this time.

Highway Superintendent, Steve Darveau, Jr. updated the Board on the routine maintenance being done on county roads and bridges this past week. During Darveau's report, a motion was made by Sichel to enter into a settlement agreement with an insurance company for damages done approximately ¾ of a mile on 703 Trail between 633 and 634 Avenue, commonly known as the Boy Scout Camp Road, in the amount of \$4,020.83. The damage was done when the tines of a machine used in the application of anhydrous ammonia made scratches on the road surface while the machine was being transported from one location to another. The motion seconded by Davidson and was approved unanimously.

The Board submitted an opt-in notice form to participate in a class action in the United States Court of Federal Claims, Kane County, Utah v United States, Case Nos. 17-739C and 17-1991C (Consolidated). The lawsuit seeks to recover monies that the Court has determined that the federal government owes each Class Member for the underpayment of its respective PILT Act entitlement funds in fiscal years 2015, 2016, and/or 2017.

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GROWING TRADE WITH JAPAN

International trade, direct investment, and partnerships are key to growing Nebraska. From providing markets for our quality ag commodities to creating jobs in communities across



our state, international partnerships are building great opportunities every day. Over the years, Japan has become a key trading partner for Nebraska. Japan is our largest direct international investor and one of our largest export markets. To build on these successes, I have led two trade missions to Japan aimed at expanding exports, recruiting new investments, and identifying new partnerships.


Trade missions have been key to successfully expanding our exports of agricultural goods to Japan. Japan is Nebraska's largest export market for beef, pork, and eggs and, overall, it is our third largest ag export market. From 2016 to 2017, Nebraska saw a 26 percent increase in our beef exports to Japan and a 46 percent increase in pork exports. During our trade mission to Japan in 2017, the Sagami Restaurant Chain in Tokyo signed an agreement with Smithfield to use Nebraska pork in their restaurants. Thanks to the efforts of many Nebraskans over the years, deals like these continue to create new opportunities for our farm and ranch families.

Since Kawasaki opened their first manufacturing line in Lincoln in 1974, investments from Japanese companies have been creating great job opportunities in Nebraska. In fact, since 2010, Japanese companies have invested \$4.4 billion in our state. About 35 Japanese-owned companies employ 9,400 Nebraskans in communities throughout the state including David City, Lincoln, Norfolk, Omaha, and Ogallala among others. From Yasufuku, which manufactures rubber parts, to Gavilon, a commodities management and trading firm, the companies from Japan investing in Nebraska are very diverse and they continue to invest in our state. In 2017, Kawasaki expanded their commitment to Nebraska and opened their first North American aerospace division in Lincoln. This investment followed a visit to their office during our trade mission to Japan in 2015.

This week, Governor Toshizo Ido of Hyogo Prefecture will be visiting Nebraska. Hyogo Prefecture is home to the city of Kobe, where Kawasaki is headquartered in Japan. A prefecture is a form of government similar to a state in America. Like Nebraska, Hyogo has agriculture and manufacturing as two of its top industries. During Governor Ido's visit, we plan to host a seminar on investing in Nebraska with the Lincoln Chamber of Commerce and to work on strengthening ties between Nebraska and Hyogo.

In September, Nebraska will have another opportunity to further strengthen our relationship with Japan. Our state has the great honor of hosting the 50th annual Midwest U.S.-Japan Association Conference. Governors, business executives, and hundreds of people from both Japan and the United States will converge on Omaha for a three-day conference focused on growing trade and job opportunities between our two countries. This is a once-in-a-generation opportunity to highlight Nebraska as a great place to do business and invest for major companies. Some speed limits increase and other new laws go on the books

An out of state friend once asked me what the speed limit was on Interstate 80 across Nebraska.

Based on personal observation and practice, I told him that it's 79 in the right lane and whatever you can get away with in the left lane. That's not what's legal; it's just the way it is.

What IS legal was changed by lawmakers during the 2018 session and went into effect recently, marking the end of the 90-day waiting period from passage to enactment. Even though the Governor and some lawmakers had favored raising the limit from 75 to 80 on Interstate 80, that didn't happen. Limits were changed on interstate subsidiaries and some secondary highways. That's a start.

State highway crews began replacing speed-limit signs in the Lincoln and Omaha areas July 19. That means a bump to 65 mph on Interstate 180 in Lincoln and stretches of Interstate 80, I-480 and I-680 in Omaha. The speed limit increases to 70 mph on stretches of U.S. Highways 6, 34 and 77 as well as on Nebraska 2 east to Nebraska City.

Transportation Department spokeswoman Vicki Kramer warns that the speed limits posted on signs remain in effect until the new signs are in place. That includes a 5 mph increase on most secondary highways statewide, but NOT Interstate 80.

The speed limit increases highlight more than 100 new laws being enacted. That says something about the recently completed session and people's high hopes about property tax relief and Medicaid expansion and school aid. Instead, lawmakers agreed to allow people who massage animals professionally to do so without a license.

The law was originally aimed at equine massage, a common practice to relieve tension in high-performance horses, but was expanded to include other animals. I have to admit I thought it was a joke when it was introduced, but previously so-called equine massage therapists had to be a veterinarian or a licensed human massage therapist with special training. I have since met such a therapist and realized it's a thing. I'm still pondering how horses get stressed.

On a serious note, another law places new safety restrictions on health care professionals when prescribing opiates. It's part of an effort to prevent widespread abuse, a problem in other states. Doctors will now have to discuss the risks with younger patients and limit the amounts they prescribe to minors in most situations. Additionally, pharmacists now must request identification from customers of such products unless they already know the person.

Likewise, doctors can now prescribe drugs and meet new patients through "telehealth" services that allow them to connect

remotely through the internet or by phone. It's the latest move in recent years to make Nebraska more welcoming to the technology of addressing a shortage of rural health care providers.

Speaking of technology, companies that store consumers' personal information will now be legally required to enact "reasonable security procedures and practices" to prevent data breaches such as the 2017 Equifax event that affected nearly 148 million people nationwide and thousands of Nebraskans. Consumer-reporting agencies will also be barred from charging any fees to place a temporary security freeze on a customer's credit.

Likewise, using the technology

of texting to threaten or harass someone will be punishable as a misdemeanor with three months in jail and a \$500 fine. The law expands the existing statute which covered only threatening or harassing phone calls.

There is talk that next year lawmakers will look at tightening regulations about texting while driving based on successful law revisions in other states. I'm all for that. Given the accident rates, not to mention the pure annoyance of being in traffic behind someone who is texting, something needs to be done.

50 Years Ago - Aug. 1st - Aug. 7th, 1968
The Chamber of Commerce announced Falls City Cable TV would air a videotape recording of a number of Horseplay Days events including the Parade on closed-circuit Channel 11.

The Parade Marshal, Frank Fraller, was not a dignitary who lead the parade but the one who blended the bands, floats, and business entries at its beginning and brought up the rear in his 1926 Model T Ford.

One of the parade's unique entries was that of Chase Street and West businesses with Deborah Kay Laney atop a huge bowl-shaped float decorated to look like her hoop skirt.

Free Horse Shows at the Riding Club arena included special performances by Jimmy Murphy and his trained horse and dog act.

Nine teams took part in a first-ever Horseplay Days "Pony Pull" with the winning team pulling 450-percent of its weight the length of the course at the Riding Club arena.

A band described as one of the ten best in the Midwest, "Forte Enterprise" of Omaha, was scheduled to provide dance music at the National Guard Armory during Horseplay Days.

Carolee Rieger, who had earlier been named queen of the 4-H Fair, was named grand champion of the 4-H Fashion Revue and advanced along with reserve champion Donna Matthes to compete at the State Fair.

Gary Fisher and Phil Bletscher were the top winners of the FFA tractor driving contest held at the Pee Wee Park.

Rita Seid of Auburn won first place in the four-county livestock judging contest for 4-H club youths at Humboldt.

The Rivoli was showing "Berserk!" starring Joan Crawford. The Breezy Hill Drive-In double feature included "Cool Hand Luke" starring Paul Newman and "The Bobo" with Peter Sellers.

Darwin Palmer, Verdun, a 1968 graduate of Falls City High School was awarded the \$800 per year Feed Technology Scholarship of the O.A. Cooper Company of Humboldt.

The Bronze Star, Purple Heart, and Good Conduct Medal were awarded posthumously to Sgt. Gary W. Dunn of Falls City who was fatally wounded in the Vietnam War.

According to the Beatrice Social Security office, one in five Richardson County residents were receiving social security benefit payments that collectively totaled over \$2 million.

A front-page photo of Mrs. Howard (Buddy) Simmonds accompanied an article about a "rain-making machine" she received from a representative of a California company who was a customer at her husband's service station, a machine that was in operation when Falls City received six inches of rain.

Shubert won the Junior Midgets league tournament by defeating Falls City's season champion, Merz-Armbruster 9-0.

Pharmacist Howard McGinnis joined the staff at Riesland Drugstore.

Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower was described as "in guarded condition" after suffering his 6th heart attack.

Hinky Dinky was selling on a book-a-week basis the 21 volume set of the Illustrated World Encyclopedia putting the total cost at \$40.29.

25 Years Ago - Aug. 1st - Aug. 7th, 1993

A group of 50 volunteers loaded 18 tons of foodstuffs and paper products from "Feed the Children" into a truck donated by Mr. & Mrs. Steve Hollens of R & R Express for shipment to Mound City, MO via Nebraska City for distribution to flood victims.

Floodwaters didn't keep Mary Thomas, 81, of Mound City from getting to Sunday morning mass at Sts. Peter & Paul, Falls City. She enlisted the aid of pilot Gerald Kurtz, owner of a crop spraying business, to fly her into Brenner Field.

Ewing Kauffman, owner of the Kansas City Royals, passed away at 76, but before his death "Mr. K" set up a complicated plan of succession to ensure the team stayed in Kansas City.

After a 4-4 tie vote by the Council, Falls City Mayor Steve Kottich cast the deciding 5th vote to defeat a proposal that would have raised the salaries for city council members from \$1,200 to \$2,400 and for the mayor from \$2,400 to \$3,600.

Cobblestone Festival Parade Chairperson Madeline Keller announced the theme for the parade would be "Cobblestone Trail Days" to coincide with the 150th anniversary of the Oregon Trail.

A Journal photo showed a deep gulch in Cottier Creek southeast of Barada caused by torrential rains and flooding. Farmers volunteered time and equipment to raise a section of road southeast of Barada so they could make their way to Falls City.

The State posted 35 mph speed limits on sections of Nebraska Hwy. 8 between Salem and U.S. Hwy. 75 as the surface was being ground into gravel in places due to the many trucks hauling gravel from the Dubois rock quarry to Rulo for repair of the flood-damaged Burlington Northern track bed east of Rulo.

The Rulo to White Cloud road was left in miserable condition due to flooding with an engineer estimating that repairs from the mouth of the Nemaha River into Kansas would cost approximately \$100,000 per mile. Highway 159 south of Big Lake, MO was undermined by floodwaters and in need of extensive repairs.

The Missouri River, out of its banks at many locations since June 24th, was reported to be below flood stage at Rulo.

Burden Prater won her 21st Falls City Country Club Ladies Championship shooting an 18-hole scratch total of 80. Jo Crofford was the handicap champ with a net 65 after a round of 87.

Falls City Sacred Heart standout Jennifer Froesch signed a letter of intent to play volleyball for the Lady Bobcats at Peru State College.

"Sleepless in Seattle" starring Tom Hanks and Meg Ryan and Walt Disney's "Hocus Pocus" were playing at the River Twin Cinema. The "Second Wind" band was performing at the Falls City Elks Lodge. "Charlie & the Stingrays" was providing the dance music at The Oasis.

When floodwaters receded, the Camp Rulo River Club and Keno Lounge ran an ad saying "We're still here and open for business."

15 Years Ago - Aug. 1st - Aug. 7th, 2003

Senior Division medal winners were Stephanie Weber, gold, and Laura Stevens, silver, during the annual 4-H Fashion Show at the Richardson County Junior Fair in Humboldt.

Former Falls City Sacred Heart standouts Allison Weaver and Katie O'Grady competed in the annual Nebraska Coaches Association All-Star Volleyball and Basketball Games in Lincoln.

The River Twin Cinema was showing "Spy Kids 3...3-D" and "Legally Blonde 2." "Partners in Crime" was performing at Camp Rulo and "Page 2" was the live band at Sportsmen's Bar.

Free hot dogs, polish dogs, and ice cream sundaes were served during Southeast Nebraska Telephone Company's Customer Appreciation Night.

The Library Building Committee elected Sandra Hartman as chairperson, replacing Ken Kunce who resigned due to personal reasons.

Nebraska Lt. Gov. Dave Heineman met with Richardson County Commissioners and law enforcement and emergency management officials and told them it was likely there would be another terrorist attack like 9/11 and that there needed to be an integrated, comprehensive approach to homeland security.

For only the second time in three decades, the Falls City Country Club had a new ladies golf champion. Mrs. Dorothy Towle shot rounds of 81 and 87 to defeat her mentor and long-time ladies champion Burden Prater.

of 2017. She and the other girls on the council got to model custom-made gowns for an internet business called PromGirl.

"The company is all about positive body image, and inner beauty," Bailey said.

After the fashion show, Bailey hosted a live chat on SADD's Facebook page, which has more than 13,000 followers. That chat reinforced the importance of a positive body image.

"That trip is still one of my favorites," Bailey said. "Because it was such an uplifting experience."

After that, the opportunities just kept coming.

Last year, as a sophomore, she was offered a part-time job through SADD's national office in Washington, D.C. "It came out of the blue," Bailey said. "I felt like I was dreaming! But I didn't even have to think about it. SADD has been such a big part of my life that I took the offer during the first phone call."

Her title is Social Media Coordinator. While maintaining 18 credit hours per semester at PSC, she works 20 to 25 hours per week for SADD, operating its official Facebook, Instagram and Twitter pages. (Search SADD Nation on Facebook.) In other words, Bailey creates posts, designs graphics, takes pictures, tweets, researches, and watches trends. And she gets paid well to do all of it.

In addition, she publishes SADD's monthly newsletter, and contracts out to prepare newsletters for the Ohio, Tennessee, Wyoming and California state SADD organizations. Plus, she gets to travel as part of her job. A lot.

She not only attends SADD-sponsored events, she also represents the organization at conferences and meetings sponsored by peer agencies like the National Road Safety Foundation, the Governors' Highway Safety Association, and the Foundation for Advancing Alcohol Responsibility.

She sets up and occupies SADD exhibit booths, gives presentations about the non-profit organization and its platforms, networks for SADD, and advocates for its policies.

One of the conferences she attended this past summer was in Washington, D.C. Through an initiative called "SADD Gives Back," she and other staff and student members made 100 tie blankets for kids who frequent a teen center there.

Seventeen of the students were selected to meet the first lady, Melania Trump, and Bailey was one of them. Melania was in the area promoting her "Be Best" campaign.

and stopped by to learn about SADD's project.

"She looked around the room, then headed straight for me," Bailey said. "She wanted to know what we were doing, so I told her. Then, she wanted to know how to make a tie blanket. So I showed her. I thought to myself, 'I am literally teaching the first lady of the United States how to make a tie blanket.'"

That moment was beyond her wildest dreams. And it happened because Bailey took a job that stretched her as a person, student, and employee.

However, the position with SADD isn't Bailey's only job. She also serves as a peer mentor at Peru State College, which means that she gets paid to listen to other students' problems regarding school or personal issues. For someone who hopes to be a counselor someday, that experience is priceless.

Secondly, she serves at the helm of a program called "Feeding 44," which is a monthly food bank for residents of Nemaha County (44). On the day of distribution, The Lincoln Food Bank brings in a semi loaded with pallets of donated food. The volunteers for Feeding 44 separate it all into categories and distribute it to waiting families.

"Last year, the program served approximately 500 people per month," Bailey said.

Imagine. Five-hundred people—some of them children—who may not have had enough food to eat without this program. She will continue on as its director for the 2018-2019 school year.

How does she do it all?

"I'm addicted to lists," she said. "If I don't write it down, it doesn't get done."

But those lists have helped her achieve some extremely lofty goals for a college student. Those achievements could take her anywhere. She has already fielded job offers, including one for a full-time job with SADD. But, at this point, she would have to move to Washington D.C., to accept it.

"I love traveling for my job," Bailey said. "But after a few days, I'm ready to be back at my house in Brownville. It's so beautiful and peaceful there."

That's right. She travels all across

the United States, but southeast Nebraska is where her heart is.

MARRIAGE AND MONEY: TAKING A TEAM APPROACH TO RETIREMENT

Now that it's fairly common for families to have two wage earners, many husbands and wives are accumulating assets in separate employer-sponsored retirement accounts. In 2018, the maximum employee contribution to a 401(k) or 403(b) plan is \$18,500 (\$24,500 for those age 50 and older), and employers often match contributions up to a set percentage of salary.

But even when most of a married couple's retirement assets reside in different accounts, it's still possible to craft a unified retirement strategy. To make it work, open communication and teamwork are especially important when it comes to saving and investing for retirement.

Retirement for two
Tax-deferred retirement accounts such as 401(k)s, 403(b)s, and IRAs can only be held in one person's name, although a spouse is typically listed as the beneficiary who would automatically inherit the account upon the original owner's death. Taxable investment accounts, on the other hand, may be held jointly.

Ownership and managing separate portfolios allows each spouse to choose investments based on his or her individual risk tolerance. Some couples may prefer to maintain a high level of independence for this reason, especially if one spouse is more comfortable with market volatility than the other.

However, sharing plan information and coordinating investments might help some families build more wealth over time. For example, one spouse's workplace plan may offer a broader selection of investment options, or the offerings in one plan might be somewhat limited. With a joint strategy, both spouses agree on an appropriate asset allocation for their combined savings, and their contributions are invested in a way that takes advantage of each plan's strengths while avoiding any weaknesses.

Asset allocation is a method to help manage investment risk; it does not guarantee a profit or protect against loss.

Spousal IRA opportunity

It can be difficult for a stay-at-home parent who is taking time out of the workforce, or anyone who isn't an active participant in an employer-sponsored plan, to keep his or her retirement savings on track. Fortunately, a working spouse can contribute up to \$5,500 to his or her own IRA and up to \$5,500 more to a spouse's IRA (in 2018), as long as the couple's combined income exceeds both contributions and they file a joint tax return. An additional \$1,000 catch-up contribution can be made for each spouse who is age 50 or older. All other IRA eligibility rules must be met.

Contributing to the IRA of a nonworking spouse offers married couples a chance to double up on retirement savings and might also provide a larger tax deduction than contributing to a single IRA. For married couples filing jointly, the ability to deduct contributions to the IRA of an active participant in an employer-sponsored plan is phased out if their modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) is between \$101,000 and \$121,000 (in 2018). There are higher phaseout limits when the contribution is being made to the IRA of a nonparticipating spouse: MAGI between \$189,000 and \$199,000 (in 2018).

Thus, some participants in workplace plans who earn too much to deduct an IRA contribution for themselves may be able to make a deductible IRA contribution to the account of a nonparticipating spouse. You can make IRA contributions for the 2018 tax year up until April 15, 2019.

Withdrawals from tax-deferred retirement plans are taxed as ordinary income and may be subject to a 10% federal income tax penalty if withdrawn prior to age 59½, with certain exceptions as outlined by the IRS.

Let's Go, Cornhuskers! (Meaning Those Who Husk Corn)

Cornhusking was once considered almost a sport. There were cornhusking contests, and farmers "kept score" on the bushels shucked per acre per day. Most of the crop was harvested in the field and called for extra hired men whose skill sometimes gained them a reputation well beyond their home communities.

J. D. Calhoun of the Lincoln Weekly Herald on December 3, 1892, reminisced about his "valuable and romantic experience as a corn shucker." Calhoun, a former homesteader in Franklin County, recalled that he had "farmed and raised corn, and shucked it, and hired other men to shuck. We once hired one of those 100 bushels [per day] men and at noon he hauled up a consumptive looking load of stuff—with shucks sticking out of it like feathers on a ruffled pigeon—that might measure but could not weigh out 25 bushels.

At night he would come in after dark with the same kind of a yield of his labor. He spent the evening around our hospitable fireside, telling how it was the hardest corn to shuck he ever saw, and how he had knocked out 100 bushels in a day for [neighbor] Dave Plasters the fall before. We let him go and got another man who held the championship belt of Atchison county, Mo. . . . He shucked 60 bushels one day and then laid up for repairs with mutton tallow."

Calhoun continued, "There is another queer thing about the

cultivation of corn—the yield per acre. To hear men talk about their crops one would think the average yield to be 75 bushels.

We remember once to have had by all odds the finest field of corn in the whole neighborhood for miles around. Nobody guessed it at less than 75 bushels per acre, and an editor made a note of it as promising 90. Everybody agreed that it was as good as had ever been seen in the county.

Flushed with honest pride we measured that corn as it came to the crib, and it turned out just 48 1/2 bushels to the acre. And yet there were men in that neighborhood, nice men, real pillars of the church, who sturdily maintained that they hadn't had an acre in corn that year which yielded less than 60 bushels. We wondered about it very much, but the next year a friend named Phipps explained the mystery."

When the expected yield per acre fell below projections, Phipps merely adjusted downward his total number of acres planted, and said, "This year I sowed 35 acres of oats, but I find that I have only harvested 14. By that means I keep up my average per acre."

According to the University of Nebraska's Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources, in 2016 Nebraska irrigated and rainfed corn yields averaged 199.9 bushels per acre and 147.2 bushels per acre respectively. That's no tall tale, and today's farmers are glad they don't have to shuck all that corn by hand.

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Arnold named NAIA Outdoor Field Scholar-Athlete of the Year

Doane Track and Field earned academic honors from the United States Track and Field-Cross Country Coaches Association (USTF-CCCA).

In a release from the USTF-CCCA, the association named their annual Scholar Team of the Year and Scholar-Athlete of the Year along with the All-Academic teams and individuals. The Falls City Blue Storm Seniors season came to a close last Sunday afternoon at Beatrice in the Area B1 tournament. With the loss, FC finished the season with an 11-12 record, much improved over last year's 5-18 finish.

As a team, this season Falls City batted .247 at the plate with 123 base hits, 14 doubles, one triple and two home runs. The seniors finished with 79 RBI and had a total of 112 runs scored. Carson Bredemeier saw limited action but finished with a .429 batting average, going 6-14 at the plate with four RBI. Zach Beaver was next in line with a .306 average finishing 19-62 with 14 runs scored, eight RBI and six stolen bases. Nick Novak was just behind Beaver with a .296 average going 16-54 with two doubles, seven RBI, and ten stolen bases. Kade Bredemeier was 19-68 at the plate for a .279 average. 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Cooper Nuclear Station exercise process to be discussed at public meeting

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Region VII office announced today the states of Missouri and Nebraska, along with Atchison County in Missouri and Nemaha and Richardson counties in Nebraska, will participate with the Nebraska Public Power District in a one-day exercise on July 31, 2018, in support of the Cooper Nuclear Station, located near Brownville, Nebraska.

The routine exercise will test the abilities of the states, the utility, and the participating counties to protect the health and safety of the public living and working in the vicinity of the Cooper Nuclear Station. The exercise is a biennial requirement to determine the adequacy of the state and local radiological emergency preparedness and response plans. It will require the activation of emergency facilities by the participating state and local officials. The activities of the state, county and local units of government will be observed and evaluated by the FEMA Region VII Radiological Emergency Preparedness (REP) Program. Cooper Nuclear Station on-site performance will be observed and evaluated by officials from the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC).

On Thursday, August 2, 2018, a public meeting will be held to describe and explain the full-scale response exercise process. Since the process of evaluating the full-scale response exercise will take months, the preliminary findings are very limited in scope. Members of the public and the media are invited to attend this meeting beginning at 10:00 a.m. (CDT) at the Nebraska Public Power District, Emergency Operations Facility, 902 Central Avenue, Auburn, Nebraska. Representatives from FEMA Region VII will chair the meeting and explain the exercise process. A representative from the NRC Region IV office, located in Arlington, Texas, will discuss activities conducted on-site at the power plant during the exercise.
