CITY COUNCIL DISCUSSES RISE IN SALARIES OF ELECTED CITY OFFICIALS

Councilperson Judy Murphy suggested it may be time to raise the salaries of the Mayor and city council members during the Monday, Aug. 6th, meeting of Falls City's City Council. Murphy who is not a candidate for re-election suggested maybe more people would seek public office if the salaries would be \$5,400/year for Mayor and \$4,200/year for council members instead of the present \$3,600 and \$2,400 respectively. Mrs. Murphy cited salaries for similar sized cities including Auburn, Cozad, Fairbury, Wahoo, and Waverly. Only Auburn pays its elected officials the same as Falls City; the others all paid more. City Administrator Gary Jorn offered to have an ordinance drawn for consideration if the council wanted to take the issue up.

No one provided public comment during a public hearing on an application by the local Sunmart store for a Class C liquor license allowing the sale of beer and liquor in original packages supplied by producers and distributors and the Council on a 5-1 vote made a positive recommendation on the application to the state liquor commission that issues such licenses.

The Council voted 6-0 to provide favorable comment on an Elks Lodge addition to the south side of its building and extension of its liquor license to include that area.

By 6-0 margins the Council voted to allow one percent growth in the budget for the next fiscal year as permitted by state law, it approved the Airport Authority's levy request for \$0.29482/\$100 of assessed valuation, and it transferred \$320,000 from the Capital Improvements Budget to the General Fund for the current fiscal year.

By a 5-1 vote, the Council approved on second reading amendments to the city's Tree Ordinance reducing the number of members on the Tree Board and clarifying how the city and its residents need to deal with removal and replacement of diseased trees on city and

PAUL WEINERT NAMED 2018 COBBLESTONE GRAND MARSHAL

Paul Weinert of Falls City was recently selected to lead the 2018 Cobblestone parade as its grand marshal. The retired history teacher, and current pastor and farmer received the honor after being elected by an anonymous committee comprised of parade volunteers and community leaders. "This recognition is like a lifetime achievement award," said Falls City chamber manager, Amber Holle.

"The committee had numerous deserving candidates, but Paul's exemplary lifetime of leadership and generosity stood out." The honoree will immediately follow the color guards down Harlan Street on Saturday, August 25th, and will lead all other entries.

"I'm flabbergasted," Paul said, during an interview Sunday evening, at his home. Paul Weinert grew up on a farm northeast of Falls City, and attended District 54 school, which was nicknamed "Pig Hill" because of the cattle and pig farms that lined it on three sides. "A kid

had to be pretty tough to survive Pig Hill school," Paul said, with a laugh. He was active in his church, Zion E.U.B., until its closure. Then he and his family joined the Bethel United Methodist Church, which was built on a portion of the Weinerts' farm land. Paul graduated from Falls City High School in 1948, then Westmar College in 1952, and Evangelical Theological Seminary in 1955. He started his career as a pastor in Derby, Kansas, then assumed a teaching position at Verdon High School, where he served from 1956 - 59. During that time, he also "filled a pulpit from time to time."

From there, he and his wife, (the late) Donna Weinert, moved to Warden, Kansas, where he pastored a church with more than 125 in attendance every Sunday. However, the family struggled to make ends meet on a pastor's salary, so they returned to Falls City when Paul was hired to teach history for

We've been complacent. We thought everybody knew how important a free press was to our world and that all this talk about us being the enemy of the people would be dismissed for the silliness that it is.

But the reckless attacks have continued, instigated and encouraged by our president.

When the leader of the free world works to erode the public's trust in the media, the potential for damage is enormous, both here and abroad. We once set an example of free and open government for the world to follow. Now those who seek to suppress the free flow of information are doing so with impunity.

The time has come for us to stand up to the bullying. The role journalism plays in our free society is too crucial to allow this degradation to continue.

We aren't the enemy of the people. We are the people. We aren't fake news. We are your news and we struggle night and day to get the facts right.

On bitter cold January nights, we're the people's eyes and ears at town, village and school board meetings. We tell the stories of our communities, from the fun of a county fair to the despair a family faces when a loved one is killed.

We are always by your side. We shop the same stores, attend the same churches and hike the same trails. We struggle with daycare and worry about paying for retirement.

In our work as journalists, our first loyalty is to you. Our work is guided by a set of principles that demand objectivity, independence, open-mindedness and the pursuit of the truth. We make mistakes, we know. There's nothing we hate more than errors but we acknowledge them, correct them and learn from them.

Our work is a labor of love because we love our country and believe we are playing a vital role in our democracy. Self-governance demands that our citizens need to be well-informed and that's what we're here to do. We go beyond the government issued press release or briefing and ask tough questions. We hold people in power accountable for their actions. Some think we're rude to question and challenge. We know it's our obligation.

People have been criticizing the press for generations. We are not perfect. But we're striving every day to be a better version of ourselves than we were the day before.

That's why we welcome criticism. But unwarranted attacks that undermine your trust in us cannot stand. The problem has become so serious that newspapers across the nation are speaking out against these attacks in one voice today on our editorial pages.

As women's rights pioneer and investigative journalist Ida B. Wells wrote in 1892: "The people must know before they can act and there is no educator to compare with the press."

INTERNATIONAL TRADE GROWS NEBRASKA

Trade has been a great way to grow Nebraska for many years. With over 95 percent of the world's population living outside the United States, we have billions of potential customers for the food we grow and the things we make here in Nebraska. Over the past few years, I have led international trade missions to Japan twice, China twice, the European Union, and Canada. International trade representatives from state agencies have led additional missions in recent years including visits to Bulgaria, Germany, Israel, South Korea, and Vietnam among many others. To create opportunities internationally, my administration has worked to grow exports, attract foreign investment in Nebraska, and expand partnerships.

In 2016, Nebraska exported over \$8 billion of goods worldwide out of a total gross domestic product of \$117 billion. When it comes to trade, Nebraska's agricultural products are some of our top exports. For example, we export about \$2 billion worth of soybean products, \$1.2 billion of beef, and almost \$1.2 billion of corn. When it comes to promoting these products, trade missions help market our products to customers. A great example of this is our work in Japan. With two trade missions in the past three years, Nebraska has seen a 26 percent increase in beef exports to Japan and a 46 percent increase in pork exports in the last year.

Trade missions also help attract investment in Nebraska that creates job opportunities. Denmark-based Novozymes manufactures enzymes used in ethanol production in Blair. During a 2015 trade mission to Denmark, our trade delegation visited their headquarters to urge them to expand their commitment to Nebraska, and they subsequently announced a new \$50 million investment in their facility. Similarly, Kawasaki located a new \$12-million production line in Lincoln with 50 new jobs after a visit to their offices in Tokyo, and Agri-Plastics, a Canadian firm, built a new plant in Sidney with 20 new jobs after a meeting during a trade mission last year.

During trade missions, we have also been working to establish new partnerships and exchanges with universities overseas. Last fall, the University of Nebraska-Kearney (UNK) signed a new agreement with Toyo University in Japan during our trade mission. UNK already is home to over 100 students from Japan. The agreement will help facilitate more student and faculty exchanges. Two years ago, we signed an agreement with Yangling Hi-Tech Agricultural Demonstration Zone in Shaanxi Province in China. This agreement created a model farm that now features center pivots from Nebraska, and is helping create greater awareness of the modern farm equipment available from Nebraska's farm manufacturers.

We are taking all these efforts to the next level. Last year, I formed the Governor's Council for International Relations (Council). It is focused on growing exports, attracting new international investment, and identifying new opportunities for partnerships. From the Nebraska Farm Bureau to the Nebraska Chamber of Commerce, the council includes 30 members from state agencies to major groups and associations working to raise Nebraska's international profile. The Council is helping Nebraska organizations that do work internationally better coordinate resources and leads.

This week, the Council is joining me at the State Capitol to unveil a new international strategy paper that will inform our work in this area for the next five years. This month, I am headed to Mexico to promote Nebraska's quality agricultural products and look for new opportunities for investment. To grow Nebraska, my team will continue to make international trade a top priority. 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WILL EXPANDED HEALTHCARE IN NEBRASKA FINALLY SEE THE LIGHT OF DAY?

For seven years, lawmakers have failed to expand health care coverage for an estimated 90,000 Nebraskans who can't afford to purchase insurance on their own.

Governor Pete Ricketts and Gov. Dave Heineman before him successfully thwarted the attempts in what has become one of the largest, most divisive partisan struggles in the officially nonpartisan Legislature. In case you forgot, there are way more Republicans than Democrats in the Legislature, well, in Nebraska for that matter. And the oft-suggested vehicle for providing the insurance - Medicaid expansion - apparently sounded too much like Obamacare.

Supporters such as Sen. Adam Morfeld of Lincoln have argued that the infusion of federal funding would spur economic development and help secure the future of rural hospitals in Nebraska while treating health conditions before they spiral into serious health challenges that may result in far more expensive and uncompensated care. The vast majority of current Medicaid recipients are children and the elderly. The stories abound and are heart-wrenching. Life is not good for the working poor.

Nationwide, 32 states have approved Medicaid expansion. Meanwhile, in Nebraska, Morfeld and others must have felt like the mythological Sisyphus during years of a mostly uphill struggle. That changed last session when Morfeld and company decided to support an initiative petition measure instead.

Working with the same zeal that Rickett's-backed petitioners used a couple years ago to get a death penalty reinstatement on the ballot after lawmakers repealed the death penalty over his veto, the pro-expansion supporters turned in more than 133,000 petition signatures to place the expansion on the November ballot. They needed 84,268 valid signatures after a review by county election officials and a decision by Secretary of State John Gale.

But, don't get too excited. The Republicans found another way to try to derail the proposal. State Senator Lydia Brasch of Bancroft, Nebraska's National Republican Committeewoman, and former Sen. Mark Christensen of Imperial have filed a lawsuit to block the initiative. They are being represented by Nebraska's National Republican Committeeman J.L. Spray, a Lincoln attorney.

The term-limited Brasch, who will be gone in January, is identified as a plaintiff who is "opposed to the Medicaid expansion petition because of the negative impact it will have on property taxes in Nebraska."

Christensen is described as "concerned that if the Medicaid expansion petition proceeds, his son's existing benefits will be reduced or altered."

Medicaid expansion campaign manager Meg Mandy has called the lawsuit "a desperate attempt to block the people's ability to voice their opinion on this issue and ensure affordable health care for 90,000 Nebraskans." She characterizes the plaintiffs as "two politicians who have failed to find solutions for working Nebraskans to access health care."

The expansion proposal would provide health coverage to single adults and couples without minor children who cannot qualify for Medicaid

now, as well as parents and disabled people, with incomes up to 138 percent of the poverty level — \$16,753 for a single person or \$34,638 for a family of four. The proposal would bring an estimated \$1 billion in federal funding flowing into the state while requiring a state match that officials in the Ricketts' administration have said would eventually accumulate to some \$800 million over a 10-year period.

Federal law has allowed states to expand their Medicaid coverage since 2014 as part of the Affordable Care Act. The ACA requires the federal government to pay 94 percent of the cost of Medicaid expansion programs in 2018, with the federal share declining year by year until plateauing at 90 percent by 2020. The state pays the rest.

The lawsuit suggests a number of procedural, statutory and constitutional flaws that would render the initiative petition "invalid and legally insufficient," including a claim that language in the initiative seeks to "exercise legislative power specifically reserved to the executive branch."

If the election proceeds and voters approve the initiative, there remains an implementation debate in the next session of the Unicameral. Remember, the current mix of that body is 31 Republicans, 16 Democrats, 1 Independent and 1 Libertarian. The November elections will change that number some. But one can still expect a partisan battle. Stay tuned.

50 Years Ago - Aug. 15th - Aug. 21st, 1968
Concerned that a live Japanese aerial bomb was among war relics he had purchased from an itinerant dealer, antique dealer John Dyblie turned the device over to Sheriff L.D. Camblin who had it checked out by military experts.

The Salem public school was set to open Sept. 3rd with three teachers, Mrs. Edna Schuler, Anna Marie Albrecht, and Elaine Schwartz, each of whom were teaching three grade levels.

Nick Kentopp with a .383 average was the top batter and Bill Hoy (3-2, ERA 2.19) and Tom Zimmerman (8-2, ERA 2.52) were the top pitchers for the Falls City Elks Midgets who made it into the semi-finals of the Class A baseball tournament.

The VFW and its Auxiliary was having a picnic at Sycamore Springs. Bette Davis was starring in "The Anniversary" playing at the Rivoli and Truman Capote's "In Cold Blood" was the chiller being shown at the Breezy Hill Drive-In.

A two-day "trunk showing" of "gorgeous coats for fall" was being advertised by Tober's.

Leon Frederick joined the Missouri Air National Guard and was scheduled to begin his training at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, TX.

Ten Southeast Nebraska school age children in the "trainable" classification were scheduled to begin classes at the former St. Mary's school in Dawson.

Bands from Falls City, Humboldt, Pawnee City, and Auburn High Schools were scheduled to participate in the Shrine Football Game parade in Lincoln.

Hot Fudge Sundae was just 22-cents each for three days at Mr. Swiss. Homer Henke's Farm Feeds was a dealer for Circle Steel Bins manufactured in Falls City.

The Journal published a feature story about the experiences of former Falls City and Auburn school teacher Jeff Falter as a Nelson Rockefeller backer during the Republican National Convention in Miami Beach, FL.

The O.A. Cooper company of Humboldt discovered that piglets like little kids like chocolate and the company announced production of a new chocolate flavored pig starter that little pigs would start eating two to three days earlier than other pig starters.

A tornado severely damaged an Omaha shopping center at 120th & Center, destroyed about a dozen homes, and damaged dozens more, but miraculously no deaths were reported.

The Rulo Boat Club hosted 85 members of M-I-N-K (Missouri, Iowa, Nebraska, and Kansas boat clubs) for two days at the Jerry Jones and Steve Long trailer site two miles south of Rulo.

Dr. William Glenn and Jayne Monroe were winners of the Scotch Four-some golf tournament at Falls City Country Club, touring the course in 40 strokes.

Julius Boros, 48, sank a 15-foot birdie putt on the final hole to defeat defending champion Jack Nicklaus by one stroke to win \$50,000 of the \$250,000 in prize money at stake in the Westchester Golf Classic.

The City Council voted to contract with an engineering firm to design changes necessary to make possible an interconnection of the City utility with OPPD.

Gambles was advertising a free 30 day supply of Green Giant vegetables with purchase of a fifteen cu. ft. chest type freezer for \$149.

Dean Kimmel sold his service station real estate and was advertising a Closing Out auction to dispose of shop equipment and warehouse merchandise.

Morehead Auto Sales was advertising an "Overstocked Sale" of used autos including a 1968 Corvette Coupe for \$5395 and a 1966 Cadillac sedan for \$3795.

The Journal did an in-depth article about the experiences of Boatswain's Mate Third Class Roger Crofford, 23, of Falls City aboard an armored troop carrier transporting troops through the many rivers and streams of the Vietnam Mekong Delta region.

25 Years Ago - Aug. 15th - Aug. 21st, 1993
Sidewalk superintendents had something to talk about when Woodings-Verona acquired a 195,000 pound forging press that had to be unloaded from a rail car and transported by semi-trailer truck to the company's Falls City plant by a firm aptly named the Heavy Company.

The Cobblestone Festival was approaching and the Little Mr. Cobblestone contestants were Colton Martin, Kraig Coonce, and Newton Simpson and in the running for Little Miss Cobblestone were Brittany Propper, Shandelle Lovenburg, and Mikala Helmiak.

Trev Alberts, now athletic director at Creighton University, was an All Big Eight outside linebacker who was looking forward to Nebraska's change from a five-two defense to a four-three.

The Falls City Library Board members were cooking and serving hamburgers at Hinky Dinky as a library fundraiser during the Cobblestone Festival.

The City Council approved a budget requiring an additional \$673,713 in additional property taxes, a 4.9% increase.

The Richardson County Board of Commissioners approved a budget expected to require a five percent increase in property taxes.

Three members of Boy Scout Troop 396 earned their Eagle Badges, Bill Harkendorf, son of Mr. & Mrs. Mark Harkendorf; Tyler Strecker, son of Mr. & Mrs. Dan Strecker; and Nick Fischer, son of Mr. & Mrs. Philip Fischer.

A vote was set Nov. 9th on a \$3.9 million bond issue to finance remodeling of Falls City High School and construction of a 13,600 addition to the east side of the building.

Falls City's four financial institutions, First National Bank & Trust, Richardson County Bank & Trust, American National Bank, and First Federal Lincoln, purchased and presented to the City and Chamber of Commerce 34 American Flags and 34 Welcome Flags.

15 Years Ago - Aug. 15th - Aug. 21st, 2003
An estimated 125 persons attended a public meeting at the Christian Church in response to an appeal by the church's pastor, Rev. Steven Wainright, to fight the area's drug problem. The crowd divided up into smaller groups to brainstorm on how to deal with the problem.

A Catholic Social Services "Rolling Thrift Store" was set up in the industrial spec building (now Vantec) for two days offering furniture, bedding, clothing, major appliances, small appliances, and much more, at bargain prices, to needy families.

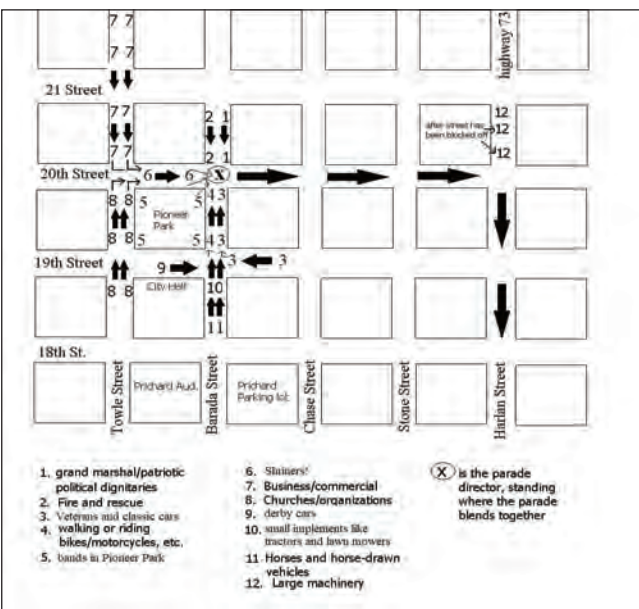
The Swimming Pool Task Force and The Schemmer Associates consulting firm hosted a Feasibility and Site Analysis kickoff meeting, one of the initial steps in the process of developing what we know today as the Falls City Aquatic Center.

Money matters were the focus of a school board meeting at Southeast Consolidated School in Stella with Supt. Michael Montgomery reporting that staff reductions would lower the payroll cost going forward.

The LPN to RN Bridge program at Community Medical Center was about to graduate its first group of nurses completing a 31 hour program in association with Bryan/LGH College of Health Sciences in Lincoln.

A four ounce bass landed by Elizabeth Eickhoff was the largest catch of the Falls City Volunteer Fire Department's annual Stanton Lake kids fishing contest that attracted 195 youngsters.

Logan Fallor, Trevor and Mitchell Harling, Grant Woods, William Porter, and Danelle and Andrew Tramp represented Falls City in eight track meets sponsored by the Nebraska division of the U.S. Track & Field Association.

While he and Donna raised five children, Paul taught, and served on the board of directors for the Nebraska State Education Association. He also pastored churches on the weekends, first in Julian, then in Brownville and Nemaha. And, he farmed the homestead where he was raised. AND, for 12 years, he served on the Falls City city council.

"From 1982 - 1984, I was the accidental mayor, too," he said. "I got the job when my predecessor resigned."

Several community leaders encouraged him to run for office when his term ended, but he finally had to say "no" to something.

"The evening meetings weren't fair to my family," he said.

Paul retired his teaching job in 1988, and his preaching position in 1995. He sold most of his cattle then, too, but he continued to farm. He also substituted for preachers in the area, for any church that asked. On any given weekend, he was probably filling a pulpit somewhere. (He continues to do so to this day.) Longtime friend, Mildred Appleoff put it this way - "Regarding protestant churches, Paul is Richardson County's pastor."

"That's very flattering," Paul said.

He has also married and buried people.

"I've conducted weddings in churches, courtrooms, at Indian Cave, along the Missouri River, and one time, even in my own home," he said. That's where his daughter, Sue, was married.

"Regarding funerals, I've probably held services for more than 400 people," he said. Some were parishioners, some friends, and some even former students. Many were strangers who were unchurched. Yet, Paul did his research well. His parting words made it sound like he had known the deceased person intimately.

"I believe everyone has the right to a decent burial," he said. Always the storyteller, he shared an anecdote about one burial service. He pastored the ceremony in Auburn, then led the funeral procession from Auburn to the Harris Cemetery in Barada.

"The son-in-law of the deceased chewed me out because I had taken a rock road instead of a paved one from highway 67 to Barada," Paul said. "He was angry because he had a new Buick and didn't want rocks dingling it."

Then he laughed.

"I tried to tell him that there wasn't a paved road from highway 67 to Barada."

That wasn't the worst part of the burial service, though.

"The grave digger had dug the grave in the wrong place," Paul said. Then he shook his head and

smiled. "That wasn't my day."

Things like that happened more often than one would expect. "They weren't very fun at the time, but made for some lasting memories," Paul said. The toughest funeral in Paul's memory was one that he hadn't conducted, though. That service took place in 2005, when he buried his wife of 53 years, and his children and eight grandchildren said goodbye to their mother and grandmother.

"That one was the hardest," he said. "And the second toughest was the funeral I did for Bill Schock just a month or so ago."

Bill, the former owner and longtime editor of the Falls City Journal, was a close friend of Paul's. He had asked the pastor to conduct his service more than 25 years prior.

"We were good friends," Paul said. "And that made his funeral very hard for me."

Talking about losing his wife

and one of his best friends made

the 88-year-old pastor emotional, so his voice trailed off.

"When he continued, he said, 'About a year after my first wife passed away, I called Mary Jane (Lampe), who had also been widowed, and I said, 'I'm not looking for a wife, just someone to have dinner with, and maybe see a movie.'"

They just celebrated their 11th anniversary, on a two-week trip to Alaska.

Now, they are home. And in two weeks, Pastor Paul Weinert will get the recognition he deserves for the countless lives that he has touched. As a teacher, volunteer, pastor, farmer, husband, father, and friend, Paul has given everything he had and more.

He will join a list of grand marshals that includes his longtime friends, Bill Schock, and Mildred Appleoff. And just as he has earned, he will receive a place of distinction in Falls City's history.

YOUNG IRISH LOOKING TO FILL HOLES

The Falls City Sacred Heart Irish will be looking to give Coach Doug Goltz his 300th win early in the 2018 campaign. Goltz enters his 32 years at the helm and sports an impressive 298-51, including eight state titles.

The Irish, a 2017 state semi-finalist with a 10-2 record, will again compete in Class D2. Sacred Heart's only losses last season came to eventual state champion Brunning-Davenport/ Shickley who finished 13-0. Coach Goltz will again be helped on the sideline by Luke Santo, Brian Lemerond, and Chris Sharp.

The Irish return nine letter winners from last seasons' team but also lost nine seniors. Among the losses the Irish will have to replace are All-State selections Christian Harring and Theo Rohrer. Harring led the ground attack last season with 79 carries for 743 yards and 15 touchdowns. Harring also led the team with 123 tackles. Rohrer was a rock on the offensive line and added 62 stops, including three sacks.

Also gone are Sean Arnold (34 carries for 302 yards and 69 tackles), Will Morehead (37 carries for 156 and 98

tackles) and Brandon Scheitel (56 stops and a team-high seven sacks).

However, the Irish return third year and all-state quarterback Drew Bippes, Del Casteel, Branson Darveau, Jake Hoy and Sloan Lenard. Bippes ran for 663 yards on 79 touches and completed 86-158 passes for 1100 yards and 22 TDs. Casteel ran for 132 yards and had 68 tackles. Darveau had 90 stops, including four tackles for loss. Hoy really came on at the midseason point finished with 167 rushing yards and a team-high 26 catches for 345 yards and eight touchdowns. He also finished with 30 tackles and three interceptions. Finally, Lenard had 34 total stops and four sacks for the Irish.

On offense, the Irish will look to again take advantage of their speed and athleticism and run the spread offense. Bippes, a 6'0, 160lb QB has a strong, accurate arm and also can tuck it and run when needed. Del Casteel, a 5'11, 200lb back has all the tools to be an outstanding ballplayer.

Just a sophomore, Casteel has the size and speed to be a handful on offense and has a nose for the ball on defense.

Look for Hoy to make some catches out of the backfield when Bippes looks to throw the ball. Hoy had a knack for going up and getting the ball last season and making a play once he caught it.

On defense, the Irish will run a 3-3 and will look to be aggressive with stunts and blitzes. Lenard, Tanner Cromer, and Darveau will look to put pressure on the offensive units. Also look for Tyler Witt, end/defensive end and Jamie Stice, end/defensive back to contribute this season on both sides of the ball. Neither player was on the roster last season.

"We hope to be playing our best football by playoff time. Lots of new starters to develop," said Coach Doug Goltz.

The Irish will begin the season at home on Friday, August 24 against Nebraska City Lourdes. Other big games on the Irish schedule this fall include Lawrence-Nelson (8-3 last season), Diller-Odell (6-3 last year) and Johnson-Brock (6-5 last season). Both Johnson and Lawrence should be in the mix as the season winds down, and with a little luck, the Irish will be right there with them.

The 1874 State Fair: a time to show off

These days, fairs promote entertainment, but when Nebraska was a new state, fairs were mostly seen as a way to promote Nebraska by demonstrating its potential for agriculture.

In 1874 the state fair was held in Omaha. Earlier that year J. Sterling Morton (future US Secretary of Agriculture and founder of Arbor Day) sent an appeals to newspapers around the state. As printed in the Nebraska Herald (Plattsmouth) on May 21, 1874, Morton described the coming fair as "a complete demonstration of the wonderful fertility of Nebraska soil, and its perfect adaptability to the production of all cereals, root crops and fruits incident to this latitude."

He wanted Nebraskans to get involved. "Every citizen has an interest in helping to the best of his ability, and each farmer in the State will certainly have some product worthy of exhibition."

He wanted people to make a point of producing examples that could serve as bragging points.

"If without especial effort seventy and eighty bushels of corn is frequently raised upon an acre of ground, why not by extra tillage, produce an hundred bushels, and even an hundred and forty of the same grain upon the same breadth of land?"

The fair would showcase these agricultural wonders, but this was about more than the fair itself. Morton and others believed that by demonstrating the upper limits of the land's productivity, prize-winning farmers would generate publicity to entice more people to settle in Ne-

braska and invest money here.

This wasn't just about blue ribbons, in other words, though Morton promised that the "premiums (cash prizes) offered by the State Board of Agriculture are liberal and will be promptly paid." The railroads, too, were offering "special inducements, as purchasers, at rich and remunerative rates, of specimens and samples from all premium or extraordinary large and fine crops."

Unfortunately, 1874 was a bad year for Rocky Mountain locusts. They descended in huge swarms across the Great Plains, darkening the skies and eating up everything wherever they landed. The state fair went on as scheduled, but you can bet the fair's promoters had nothing to say about it. That wasn't the sort of record bounty the fair existed to promote.
