CITY COUNCIL TURNS DOWN EFFORT TO LIFT BURNING BAN

An effort to enact an ordinance to allow burning of cardboard and paper in a barrel or fireproof incinerator two days a week failed on a 6-1 vote during the Falls City City Council meeting Tues., Sept. 4th. The change was proposed by Steve Hoffman of 1713 Fulton Street and was brought before the Council by 4th Ward Councilman Jim Wisdom. It would have in effect weakened an ordinance recently passed by the Council banning all outdoor burning except that in fire pits and fireplaces with exception of annual controlled burning at the Itha Krumme Memorial Arboretum. Hoffman's proposal called for issuance of three year permits allowing burning on Mondays and Thursdays in incinerators meeting prescribed standards located at least 20 feet from all buildings and attended by a person of 16 years of age or older with permits subject to revocation for any violation.

Speaking against Hoffman's proposal were Councilman Mitch Merz and Terry Stradtman of 301 W. 16th Street. Merz

said he originally was for the idea but reconsidered after considering the cost to police such permits. Stradtman said she and other asthmatics have difficulty breathing when people are burning and said she would be happy to buy a paper shredder for anyone who thought it was necessary to burn paper. She said she saw no reasons why those who did not previously follow the rules for burning would suddenly do so.

An ordinance that would increase the salaries of the Mayor to \$5,400 annually and of City Councilpersons to \$4,200 annually received a 6-1 vote of approval on second reading. The new salaries would go into effect at the beginning of the next full term of each official. It must receive one more round of approval before being enacted.

The Council formally approved an application by Schenck Process, LLC for use of Prichard Auditorium for hosting an employee Christmas Party, Jan. 5, 2019, that would be catered by the Buzz Cafe of Sabetha with alcoholic beverages served by

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SAYING GOODBYE TO THE MAN WHO SERVED OTHERS

Last Friday morning, as cloudy skies blocked the sun and a cool mist hung in the air, two fire trucks owned by the Falls City's volunteer fire department were parked on the east side of the courthouse, across the street from the First United Methodist Church. Attached to the bucket of the ladder truck was a large American flag, which hung above the other truck.

As cars passed by and people looked on curiously, mourners filled the church's sanctuary, and

overflowed into the balcony and foyer. They were there to lay to rest one of Falls City's longest-serving public servants—Kenny Simpson. Kenny, who had worked as a full-time fire fighter since 1979, was also a veteran, and former commander of Falls City's American Legion. He had battled cancer since 2012, and in November of last year, suffered a debilitating stroke. His health continued to deteriorate, and he passed away on Monday, September 3rd – Labor Day. He was 65 years old.

In addition to Kenny's career in public service, he was a sports enthusiast (especially baseball), husband, father, grandfather, and first cousin to more than 60 people. And, to many, he was a mentor, and very dear friend.

Dorr and Clark Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements, and Reverend Young Je Kim officiated. He spoke about Kenny's love for God, his wonderful sense of humor, and his obsession with the Nebraska Cornhuskers and Kansas City Royals.

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GOLTZ JOINS PRESTIGIOUS GROUP

Falls City Sacred Heart Head Coach Doug Goltz did something truly amazing two weeks ago. Not only did his Irish team defeat a top-five ranked Class D2 school in Lawrence-Nelson, but he also joined a very elite club in the head coaching ranks. Coach Goltz, in his 32 season coaching, got his 300th career win on Thursday, August 30. With the win, Goltz joins a small group of Nebraska high school coaches with 300 wins. How small? Well, only seven coaches have reached that mark, with Jeff Bellar of Norfolk Catholic leading the way with 349 wins.

Goltz, who hit the 600 win plateau last December in basketball, needed the fewest games of any 300 win coach to reach that mark. After the win this past week he has a career 301-51 record over his 31+ seasons at the helm of the Irish. That's a .855 winning percentage. Twenty-three of those 51 losses have come in the playoffs, and he has coached eight state champions over the years, without ever losing in the championship game. His teams were crowned champions in 1989, 90,

91, 92, 93, 94, 2013 and 2016. His Irish teams have made the playoffs every year since 1987. From 1989 to 1995 his Sacred Heart teams went a combined 87-0 with six consecutive state titles. Those 87 wins in a row are a state record for any class and at the time was a national record. Other records in the state that he holds are most class D2 titles with eight, most consecutive titles-tied with Howells with six. Most undefeated seasons in state history with six and of course the 87 game winning streak, second all-time in the state is Cambridge with 48.

Goltz took over a team that went 0-8 in 1986 and was 0-4 in conference play. In his first game in 1987 his Irish beat Craig, Mo 48-0 in a game called at the half, for his first career win. His first loss, well that came a week later at the hands of defending Kansas eight-man champion Midway-Denton 53-20. SH finished the year with a 6-3 mark that first season, falling to the Humboldt Cardinals 32-22 in the first round of the playoffs.

On November 17, 1989, Goltz got his first

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NO INCREASE IN TAXES REQUIRED FOR COUNTY BUDGET

During their Tues., Sept. 4th meeting, Richardson County Commissioners set a 10:30 a.m., Tues., Sept. 18th, public hearing on a Fiscal Year 2018-19 Budget and Tax Levy that will require no increase in the levy for the support of County Government. The budget will require a tax levy of \$0.340156 per \$100 of assessed valuation or \$340.16 on a property with a valuation of \$100,000, the same that was required by the 2017-18 spending plan.

Commissioners held the line on taxes despite a \$47,911,694 (3.35%) decrease in the valuation of taxable property and a \$768,925.29 (or 5.8%) increase in the budget of expenditures. The total tax requirement of the 2018-19 spending plan is \$4,469,397.19 for the General Fund (that includes a \$300,000 Cash Reserve) and \$400,000 for the Jail Bond for a total of \$4,869,397.19. The tax asking to support the General Fund/Operating Budget is \$170,314.15 less than that of the 2017-18 budget.

Commissioners voted unanimously to provide 30 days notice to the City of Falls City of the County's intent to terminate a contract for 911 service provided to the County by the City.

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CONNECTING NEBRASKANS TO GREAT JOB OPPORTUNITIES

Nebraska is the best place in the world because of our people. Our people are hard-working, loyal, and family-oriented, and are constantly striving to make Nebraska the best place in the world to live, work, and raise a family. Our work ethic is reflected in national rankings: Nebraska has one of the highest labor force participation rates. Since 2014, our state has ranked third best out of all states for wage growth. And we consistently have tens of thousands of job openings in any given month along with one of the lowest unemployment rates in the nation.



This week, Labor Day is a celebration of the unparalleled work ethic and unique Nebraska grit that lies at the foundation of the Good Life. Throughout the year, my team works to connect Nebraskans to great job opportunities. We have launched three major programs that are helping get Nebraskans back to work more quickly and connecting young people to great career opportunities.

At the Nebraska Department of Labor, we have transformed the state's unemployment program into a first-in-the-nation reemployment program. Nebraska now requires all individuals seeking unemployment benefits to create a searchable, online resume, meet with a job coach, and apply for jobs multiple times a week. This individualized program helps each person to develop a reemployment plan tailored to their skills and career goals. With the help of the Legislature, people will no longer be able to quit their job to go on unemployment benefits.

These reforms are producing great results for Nebraskans. The number of individuals exhausting their unemployment benefits is down nearly 37 percent. The number of weeks claimed for unemployment benefits is down 23 percent. This is having a positive effect for taxpayers. We have been able to reduce the unemployment insurance tax rate by over 25 percent, saving Nebraska's job creators nearly \$20 million in 2017. All of this has led to winning national and industry awards, while putting Nebraskans back to work more quickly.

Because this program has been so successful, we are now utilizing it in partnership with the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) to help families on food stamps find better job opportunities. The program started with a pilot in Grand Island and expanded to Hastings, Columbus, Norfolk, and Scottsbluff over the last year. The program has helped participants achieve greater stability, a higher income, and less reliance on government assistance for those who participate and successfully complete it. We have helped 36 percent of participants find a new job, and those families have increased their pay by approximately \$10,000. Each of those families has reduced or eliminated their need for food stamps. Over the next year, we will be expanding the program to North Platte, Sidney, and Lexington.

For young Nebraskans, we have launched a program to help connect middle schoolers to great opportunities in the fields of manufacturing and information technology. In 2015, I worked with the Legislature to create the Developing Youth Talent Initiative (DYTI). As more jobs become available in these fields, we need to do more to make the next generation aware of these great opportunities and share the technical skills and knowledge they require. By establishing partnerships between businesses and school districts, DYTI provides career exploration and hands-on learning opportunities geared toward seventh and eighth graders. Right now, we have programs running in Broken Bow, Hastings, Hebron, Kearney, Omaha, Scottsbluff, and York. This year, we announced new partnerships with schools in Norfolk and Deshler.

DYTI is making a difference. Research shows that students involved in similar programs show increased interest and are more likely to pursue careers in STEM fields. Over the past few years, DYTI has resulted in higher student enrollment in science and technical courses among incoming high school freshmen, as well as greater interest in pursuing technical careers after graduation.

As we work to grow Nebraska, these are just a few of the ways we are helping connect Nebraskans of all ages with great job opportunities. We will continue to innovate and look for new ways to help develop our people. BIG RED HYPE WILL SURVIVE THE INITIAL WASHOUT

"Massive depression sweeps across the state as we now have to wait another week to watch the Huskers."

That tweet by a University of Nebraska football fan sums up months of hype and waiting that were wiped out by a massive rain storm, complete with thunder and lightning, during what was to be the season opener and the beginning of the Scott Frost era on September 1.

What, you ask (in case you have been under a rock for a few years) is so important about the Frost era? This T-shirt slogan speaks to that. "Devaney. Osborne. Some other guys. Frost."

As a refresher course for those of you who may need it, football became a big thing in Nebraska in the early 60s when Bob Devaney was hired away from the University of Wyoming to replace Bill (three plays up the middle and punt) Jennings. It wasn't long until football-crazed Nebraskans had some more recent big times to discuss in addition to their 1941 Rose Bowl appearance (they lost 21-13 to Stanford). Coach Bill Jones went 4-5 the next season and left.

While we're digging in the archives, you might be interested to know that this team name Cornhuskers came about in 1899 when Cy Sherman, sports editor of the Nebraska State Journal, used it. Before that, the team, which actually formed in 1890, had been known as the Tree-Planters, the Rattlesnake Boys, Antelopes, Old Gold Knights and the Bugeaters. Shame on you for laughing at the team name of Nebraska's almost first 2018 opponent, the Akron Zips.

Before Devaney, Nebraska endured its first "some other guys" stretch with six coaches in eight years. Devaney went 47-8-0 in his first five seasons. After 6-4 seasons in 1967 and 1968 he turned to a young assistant coach, Tom Osborne, and his plan for the I-formation which brought Nebraska football out of the doldrums and started a streak of 9-win seasons from 1969 to 2002. Devaney also set an NCAA record with 35 bowl trips from 1962 to 2003.

Devaney's Nebraska teams won national championships in 1970 and 1971. Devaney wanted to retire but was convinced to stay on and try for a third championship. It didn't happen and he became athletic director in 1972 and hand-picked Osborne who coached for 25 years. Osborne's teams won national championships in 1994, '95 and '97. Frost was a member of that '97 team.

So now you understand the significance of that T-shirt, right? As for the second round of "other guys," the consensus is that Nebraskans would like to forget what happened after Frank Solich, a former Osborne player and assistant coach, had consecutive winning seasons.

Solich was fired by the first of two forgettable athletic directors who hired a couple coaches who weren't a good fit. The second athletic director also hired a dud of a coach, by Nebraska standards.

But, it's a new day with new faces and a new attitude about Nebraska football. Only Nebraska spirit would keep 90,000 fans waiting in a rainstorm with lightning flashing well within view for nearly 3 hours. Months of preparation and speculation came down to the weather. Fitting in a state where people know the weather almost better than they know winning football of late.

One sports reporter noted that many students stayed in the stadium, dancing and singing in the rain. Laughing and talking ... to each other and not looking at their phones or tablets.

Folks who normally sit in the same rows or sections to watch football had a good chance to get acquainted with long talks in the concourse areas and parking garages where they planned to wait out the storm.

The first in-game delay at Memorial Stadium since Sept. 7, 1991, was taken in stride by a fan base that has seen its fortunes rise and fall a lot in the last 14 years. It's easy to understand the excitement of a possible return to glory days.

This Husker football stuff should be a good main event to take our minds off the side-show of state and national politics and the November election. Let's hope so!

50 YEARS AGO - SEPT. 12TH - SEPT. 18TH, 1968
Pioneer Farm Families honored at the Richardson County Free Fair in Humboldt included Mrs. George Belden, Sr. and Mr. and Mrs. George Belden, Jr., Dawson, Carl and Opal Georges, Shubert, John and Edna Rutz, Dawson; Henry Schulerberg, Falls City; William and Catherine Thiltges, Falls City; and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Vogele, Sr., Rulo.

The Journal published an interview it conducted with school dropout Ed Bax who had high praise for the Job Corps training he was receiving at a Center in Chadron where he was receiving training in welding and firefighting.

Taking part in the coin-flip for the Huskers opening game of the season with Wyoming was defensive Halfback Jim Hawkins who suffered a near fatal cracked sternum in the 1965 Spring Game but battled his way back to become a starter and a candidate for All-Big 8 and All-American honors.

Mice, 31 of them in all, were the focus of a Journal article on pets of the Dr. Sam Cowan, Jr. family that included besides the mice a compatible cat and rabbits as well.

Glen Gatz, 14, Falls City was the senior champion showman at the 4-H Fair in Humboldt. Patty Fisher, 10, Rulo was the junior champion showman.

The Falls City's police department hired its first meter maid, Rose Mary Lippold, 22, who replaced Ivan Bieck, as a parking meter checker. Thanks to a 51-yard field goal by sophomore Paul Rogers the Huskers defeated Wyoming 13-10 in their season opener.

Patricia R. Ryan, Dawson, was one of four Peru State College students to receive \$200 Knights of Ak-Sar-Ben scholarships to assist with their college expenses.

The governing board of Nebraska's state colleges approved and sent to the state budget director a plan for spending \$3,263,775 for remodeling and replacement of outdated facilities at Peru State College.

25 YEARS AGO - SEPT. 12TH - SEPT. 18TH, 1993
Area youngsters rode bikes and trikes around the track at Jug Brown Stadium in a "Wheels of Life Bike-A-Thon to earn pledges for each lap they completed to go to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

Talk for Oprah Winfrey wasn't cheap. In fact, her talk earned her the title as the nation's richest entertainer.

Brown's Shoe Fit was celebrating its 43rd Anniversary in Falls City by giving its customers \$5 back on every \$50 spent at their store through Sept. 18th.

The Nebraska football team was 2-0-0 and was ranked as the number 8 major college football team in the nation according to the Associated Press poll of sportswriters.

The Johnson-Brock Eagles captured the championship of the Dawson-Verdon Invitational volleyball tournament by defeating Pawnee City 15-10 and 15-8. Sacred Heart claimed third place by defeating Seneca Nemaha Valley 15-5, 15-8.

The Ken's Pharmacy Lunch Counter ad asked "Who could this grain price quote be?" about whom it said "During harvest time weighing, testing, and the keeping of the books really elevates me, but Ken's for lunch scales-down my appetite!"

On a 5-1 vote the District 56 Board of Education passed a resolution calling for a Nov. 2nd public vote on a \$3,995,000 bond issue to finance an addition to and renovation of Falls City High School.

A "Memory Walk" was sponsored by Falls City Care Center to raise money for the Alzheimer's Association of Lincoln and Greater Nebraska.

The top Small Group Beef Herdsman-ship team at the Nebraska State Fair was Jason Wissman, Seth Reimers, and Robert Eickhoff from Falls City.

A Falls City Chamber of Commerce ribbon-cutting ceremony was held at 4-Corners Ag Supply to celebrate addition of lumber products at their business.

Ralph Huettner was presented an Award of Achievement by District 1 of the Nebraska Association of School Boards for his 10 years of service to the District 56 school board.

Richardson County Highway Superintendent Tim Baxter reported that two years of very wet weather and flooding caused over \$4.5 mil. in damage to the county's roads, bridges, and culverts.

The Journal recognized Clay Crawford of Falls City High School as the Richardson County Athlete of the Week after he rolled up 193 yards on the ground in a game with Fairbury.

The Southeast Consolidate Mustang girls presented a plaque and 200 balloons to their coach after defeating Rock Port 17-15, 15-6, the 200th volleyball victory for Coach Dennis Williams.

Amy Glathar was crowned Richardson County Fair Queen and Myron Leech was crowned Fair King.

15 YEARS AGO - SEPT. 12TH - SEPT. 18TH, 2003

The Richardson County Fair Queen, Kelly Jean Moyer, was crowned by WOWT news anchor John Knicely. Korean War veteran Don Holder, a member of the Richardson County Agricultural Society board for 21 years was honored as King of the County Fair.

U.S. Marine Sgt. Michael McCullough who had served in Iraq for 5 1/2 months with the Third Battalion, Fifth Marine Regiment, arrived back at Camp Pendleton, CA.

Preliminary school enrollment numbers for Richardson County schools were published. Falls City Public Schools had 899 enrolled, Falls City Sacred Heart 223, Humboldt-Table Rock/Steinauer 306, Southeast Consolidated 173, and Dawson-Verdon 142.

Honored as Richardson County Athletes of the Week were Falls City High School junior Alyssa Gyhra, who won the Tecumseh Cross Country Invitational, and Falls City Sacred Heart senior Adam Gruber, who scored two touchdowns in a 22-8 victory over Baileyville.

The Falls City/DV high school volleyball team improved to 3-0 after defeating Nebraska City 16-14 and 15-11.

Death row inmate Michael Ryan filed a petition in U.S. District Court asking to be returned to the Nebraska State Penitentiary in Lincoln saying the Tecumseh Correctional Institution was so noisy it was interfering with his ability to do legal research and to get sleep.

The City Council approved a budget that eliminated two Lydia Bruun Memorial Library full-time jobs, one Prichard Auditorium custodial position, and one paid fire department driver position.

The Council voted to authorize the mayor to execute an agreement to make a \$6.5 mil. investment in the coal-fired power plant to be built at Nebraska City to entitle Falls City to a 5 megawatt share of the plant's output.

Following a 34-17 loss to Nebraska City Lourdes, Sacred Heart, winner of six consecutive state football championships and a perpetual contender, fell out of the ratings as one of the top teams in its class.

Pawnee City defeated Nebraska City Lourdes to claim the championship of the Southeast Consolidated Invitational volleyball championship. Southeast defeated Sacred Heart for third place.

Humboldt-Table Rock/Steinauer suffered its 18th consecutive C-2 loss, defeated 65-6 by Sandy Creek.

The Richardson County Fair's "Woman of the Year" was Ruth Goodhart who at 89 was still going to work six days a week at Wilhelm Plumbing and Electric.

County Fair to begin this week with Coronation program and introduces new exhibit

The annual County fair starts this week with the Coronation program which will be held at the park in Humboldt tonight, Wednesday, Sept. 12, starting at 7:00 p.m. The free program will feature the crowning of the new Richardson County Fair king and queen as well as a show presented by the HTRS school kids.

The parade will be held each day at 11:00 a.m. with floats being judged on Friday. The parade will be held around the Humboldt town square.

Thursday-from 8:00-noon exhibits will be entered at the Ag Building. The free acts (Matt Rolf Show) will be featured at 2:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. (Sound Exchange), and more.

Friday-The free acts (Southern Fryed) will be featured at 2:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m.

Saturday-The free acts (Dylan Bloom Band) will be featured at 2:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m.

A new exhibit is featured this year at the Richardson County Fair. "Remember the Fallen" is a photographic war memorial that honors our country's military fallen from the War on Terror (9-11-01) to the present. the Spirit Shoppe of Falls City whose permit had been approved at the previous council meeting.

Bob Witt and Stan Coupe of the Take Our Community Back group met briefly with the Council. Witt complimented city officials for taking the Library Wi-Fi offline during evening hours saying it limited internet access by persons who habitually appear in Court for a variety of offenses. Coupe complained that the City was being, to use his words, "scammed by the presentation of false receipts" by the operators of a fitness facility operating out of the former City Hall building at 18th & Towle. Coupe said he would come back to the Council to discuss the matter further at a subsequent meeting.

During his report to the Council, City Administrator Gary Jorn reported a hearing on the 2018-19 City Budget would be conducted during the Sept. 17th meeting of the Council. Jorn invited the public to attend a meeting this (Wed., Sept. 12th) evening at 5:30 p.m. at the Falter Art Gallery during which

comment will be received on the Stone Street streetscape project proposed for the area between 15th & 17th Streets. Jorn also invited the public to attend an Open House 9 a.m. to Noon, Sept. 25th at the Rulo water treatment plant where a new well has been drilled and other upgrades have been made to the facility.

The City Administrator reminded citizens that the Electrical Utility would be relying on its own generating capability during weekdays (Mon.-Fri.) for a four week period while the transmission facilities of Omaha Public Power District would be taken offline for installation of updated equipment. Jorn also reported that the city water tower was drained Sept. 6th and would be taken offline for six weeks while the tower was cleaned and repainted on the inside. Waterlines he said would be pressurized by pumping equipment during this period of time.

Jorn also told the Council that the city decided to make no recommendation on bids received for a new Park Department Building at Stanton Lake and said the City would rebid the project. He also reported that Police Officer Perez has submitted her resignation and the City would be advertising for a replacement officer.

Check out fields for weed problems

Late summer, fall and harvest are good times to check out where you may have a problem with specific weeds or where a new weed is invading or possibly even herbicide resistance is developing. By identifying the weed, extent of any infestations and locations of weed problems, you will have a better strategy for managing these weeds in the future, maybe even this fall.

Marestail or maybe more specifically, glyphosate resistant marestail has become a major problem in Nebraska. In traveling around southeast Nebraska, marestail control seemed to be much better than some years, although we had some very challenging weather conditions this spring, with the hot and cold weather fluctuations in temperatures. Once marestail bolts from the rosette state it is hard to control. It can emerge in the fall, so keep an eye out for it. Several growers have actually found that cereal rye has been very effective in control of marestail. This may be another option and at the same time provide erosion control and potentially improve soil health.

Fall control of winter annuals should improve field conditions next spring for planting and weed control in next year's crop. Another very tough weed to control is field horsetail or scouring rush (Equisetum). This is the weed that looks like a small bamboo plant and it grows in wet areas, especially along railroad right-of-ways and ditches. Unfortunately, it many times is invading more into fields and is very tough to control. The University of Nebraska-Lincoln has conducted research in controlling this weed. They found Chlorsulfuron, labeled as Glean for use in wheat, or as Telar for use in non-crop areas, was very effective at controlling scouring rush for more than one year when it was applied at 3 oz /A. Chlorsulfuron has a long soil residual and can cause significant injury to corn and soybean. The maximum use rate in wheat is 0.33 oz/A (approximately 10 times less than what was applied in noncrop areas, and the rotation interval to corn or soybean is 24 months. If chlorsulfuron were used to control a scouring rush

patch that is expanding from a non-crop area into a corn or soybean field, individuals should only consider planting an IR-corn or STS soybean in the treated area in the subsequent 3-5 years, and may still suffer some crop injury from herbicide carryover.

Another major concern in Nebraska is palmer amaranth. While I have not seen infestations of it in the area, I know there are fields in southeast Nebraska that have it. In southwest Nebraska glyphosate resistant palmer amaranth is causing all kinds of problems.

The best method of controlling these resistant weeds is to limit their seed production by alternating herbicides, combining herbicides with glyphosate in treating weed problems or even hand-walking fields. It is important to recognize fields that have herbicide resistant weeds so you can prevent them from producing seed. If you think you may have palmer amaranth in a field, do whatever you can to limit seed production. Recent research at Kansas State University, shows promise for the use of cereal rye as a cover crop in slowing down early spring emergence and growth of Palmer Amaranth. If it becomes a problem in southeast Nebraska it may be a valuable tool to use.

Finally be aware of the noxious and invasive weeds in the area, specifically musk thistle and Sericea lespedeza. It is important if you can identify these weeds in pastures or CRP before they become major problems. If we can control Sericea lespedeza before it spreads to levels like it is in Kansas, we should be able to control it. Other weeds that are showing up in southeast Nebraska and could cause problems include: phragmites, common teasel and cutleaf teasel. Phragmites can be found growing along some of the wet ditches and wetland areas in southeast Nebraska. Teasel can be found in non-cropped areas and in pastures or CRP. It is a problem in the neighboring states Kansas and Missouri. Young Tigers finding their groove

The Falls City Tigers picked up their second straight win on Friday night when they traveled to Syracuse and toppled the Rockets 24-6. The Rockets began the game on their own 21-yard line and slowly drove down the field, with the QB keeping it on third and eight down the left side going in for a 36-yard touchdown with 6:48 to play in the quarter. FC began its first possession at their own 28-yard line with 6:47 to go. Running back Alex Rathje took the ball on the first offensive play for FC, taking it up the middle, sidestepping a defender going 72 yards for the score, with 6:33 to go. Lukas Aldana kicked the extra point to give FC a 7-6 lead.

The Tiger defense forced a punt on the next Syracuse possession, giving FC the ball back at their own 27 with 3:14 to go in the quarter. A three and out on offense by Falls City gave the ball back to the Rockets. After a nice punt by Collin Cook, the Rockets took the ball at their 30-yard line with 1:38 to play in the first period. The Tiger defense again forced a three and out and took over on their own 34-yard line to begin the second quarter.

FC moved the ball to the 48, but the Rocket defense forced a punt, giving the Rockets the ball at the 26 with 9:00 to play in the half. Again, the Tiger defense gave up no yards to the Rockets, and a bad snap on the punt attempt allowed Jaden Nolte to bring down the ball carrier at the 20-yard line with 7:07 to go. However, the Ti-

gers failed to capitalize on good field position turning the ball over on downs at the 26 with 4:58 to play. Neither team was able to punch it in the end zone, and the score remained 7-6 at the half.

The third quarter began with FC getting the kickoff and starting at their own 37. The Tigers road Rathje all the way down the field, until they reached the 10-yard line. On fourth down Aldana came on and split the up-rights for a 27-yard field goal to give FC a 10-6 lead with 8:10 left in the third. After a three and out, Kade Bredemeier came up with a big punt return to give FC the ball on the Rocket 29-yard line. Then on third and goal from the one, Cade Schawang took the direct snap and went in for the one-yard touchdown with 3:15 to play in the third. That drive was all set up by the nice punt return by Bredemeier.

On the first play of the next drive, the Syracuse QB fumbled, and Cook pounced on top of it at the Rocket 32-yard line. However, Cook was hit as he went to pass on the next play and Syracuse recovered the fumble. The quarter came to a close with FC leading 17-6.

The Tigers began their next drive in the fourth from their own 22 with 9:00 to play. The Tigers drove down the field and on second and goal from the 16-yard line Rathje broke a couple of tackles for a 16-yard touchdown run with 5:36 to go. After the extra point, FC led 24-6, which is where the game would end. FC was led in the game by

Rathje who finished with 28 carries for 258 yards and two scores. FC had 331 total yards to just 143 by Syracuse. Trey McAfee led the defense with six stops, two for losses.

"I thought we played pretty well. We improved again this week, and that is exactly what we need to be doing. Alex really had a good game; the offensive line really played well at times. We are looking for consistency with them, and they are getting better each week. I thought our guys tackled really well in the second half with a lot of guys getting to the ball. I thought it was a really good team effort in all three phases of the game," said Coach Fritz. FC will be on the road again this week as they look to avenge last season's loss to Fairbury.

Nebraska moved the ball well all day on offense, and for the most part, the Blackshirts played well on defense. Spotting a team a 14-0 lead is never good, not converting a pair of fourth and shorts hurts also. A few holding and personal foul penalties can doom a good team, let alone a team trying to be more than just average.

A 41-yard touchdown run by QB Adrian Martinez in the first quarter was a definite bright spot. The true freshman made a few mistakes but in his first game action in over two years he showed athleticism and poise, and I think he's going to be very good in the future for the Huskers. He not only did it with his legs but save for a couple of passes, he put the ball on the money most of the day. His 57-yard pass to JD Spielman down the left sideline in the third quarter was a thing of beauty. Our defense finished the game allowing just 44 yards on the ground on 35 carries and came up with seven, that's right seven sacks. We haven't seen that kind of pass rush in years. Just for comparison, the Huskers had only 14 sacks all of last year.

Greg Bell, the JUCO transfer looked good picking up 104 yards on the ground on just 13 carries while Martinez led the way with 117 yards on 15 rushes while Morgan, Spielman, and Mike Williams led the receiving corps.

The biggest question coming out of the game is whether or not Martinez is ok, after leaving the game with an apparent knee injury with 3:29 to play in the contest. So far the coaching staff is pretty mum, but hey Andrew Bunch did ok coming off the bench in crunch time. He had a couple of nice passes that could have or should have been caught. He put us in an opportunity to win the game on the last couple of plays. Anybody else thinking maybe Tristan Gebbia should have stuck around, perhaps he jumped the gun a little too fast. Oh well, I wish the kid well at Oregon St. Right now the Huskers have to focus on Troy who comes to town last week. Hopefully, they come out with the same fire and intensity and get Coach Frost his first win.

Hey, it's only one game, sure we would love to be 1-0 or 2-0 right now, but last years squad would have let the 14-0 deficit grow into a blowout. IRISH PUT ON CRUISE CONTROL VS. EAGLES

On Friday night the Falls City Sacred Heart Irish picked up their third win to begin the season with a pounding of Omaha Christian, 64-6. After the Irish forced a three and out on the game's first possession, they quickly got on the board on offense with a four play, 27-yard drive that ended with a 14-yard touchdown run by Jake Hoy. The conversion run by Bippes was good, and SH led 8-0 with 8:25 to go in the first quarter. The Irish immediately got the ball back when Branson Darveau recovered an Eagle fumble to give the offense the ball back at the Omaha Christian 18-yard line. On the first play, Bippes hit Del Casteel for an 18-yard strike through the air to score again. The PAT pass from Bippes to Tyler Witt made it 16-0 with 6:56 to go in the first.

After the defense forced yet another three and out, the Irish took over at the Eagle 33-yard line after a twenty-yard punt return by Hoy. Three plays later it was Hoy again, this time from 10 yards out for the score. The pass to Hoy from Bippes made it 24-0 with 3:29 still to play in the opening quarter. After another strong stand by the defense, it was Hoy again with a nice punt return for the Irish. With 2:05 to go in the quarter Bippes found Jamie Stice for a 13-yard touchdown to make it 30-0 after the initial twelve minutes of play.

After the fourth three and out in a row by the Irish defense, Hoy struck again, this time he returned a punt 23 yards for the score to give the Irish a 36-0 lead with 11:49 to play in the half. Jack Fiegenger came up with an INT and a 37-yard return to the Eagle five-yard line on the following drive. Jakob Jordan then got in on the ac-

tion with a five-yard run for the score, and he accounted for the two-point conversion as well to make it 44-0 with 10:47 to go in the half. Omaha Christian then put together a 65-yard, six play drive for their one and only score to make it 44-6 with 7:12 left on the clock before halftime. Not to be outdone, Casteel took the following kickoff and busted through for a 70-yard touchdown to make it 50-6.

The Irish got on the board in the second half when Stice hauled in a Jordan pass from 15-yards out to cap off an eight-play, 38-yard drive to make it 56-6. The final score of the game came when Jordan kept it on a 41-yard scamper for the score. After the conversion run by Jordan, the Irish led 64-6 with 1:28 to go in the game.

The Irish defense was stalling all night as they held the Eagles to -14 yards rushing on 20 attempts. Omaha Christian did complete 9-22 passes for 119 yards. The Irish on the other hand rushed 29 times for 141 yards, and they were 8-9 through the air for 138 yards. Jordan led the ball carriers with 52 on 11 rushes and two scores. Hoy finished with 46-yards on four attempts. Bippes was 4-4 throwing the ball with two touchdowns. Stice led the receivers with three grabs for 86 yards and two scores. Casteel had the one kick return for 70 yards, and a score and Hoy had three punt returns for 66 yards and a score. Darveau and Luke Schawang each had a fumble recovery, and Fiegenger had an interception. Tyler Catlin had seven total tackles, and Darveau added four stops, with three going for losses.

The Irish have a bye next week before returning to action on Friday, September 21 vs. Meridian at Daykin.

NATIONAL FARM SAFETY WEEK NEXT WEEK

Next week, Sept. 16 through Sept. 22, is National Farm Safety Week. Each year in Nebraska and other states there have been tragic farm accidents. It reminds us of the importance of farm safety and how dangerous farming can be. Statistics indicate that in 2014 there were 568 fatalities in the agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting category, compared to 500 in 2013, a 13.6 percent increase. With fall harvest just beginning, safety needs to be an important focus for farmers and others in our rural community. Agriculture is one of the most dangerous industries in the United States. Approximately 100 children and youth die in farm work accidents annually in the United States. In the spring of 2010 there were five farm fatalities in Nebraska in a matter of a few weeks. In 2017 there were four farm fatalities in Nebraska, with 3 men fatally injured in different farm accidents. A young adult was killed in a loader accident, another man became tangled up equipment while feeding livestock, and another died when he was working on equipment and it fell on him and crushed him. It is extremely important to be aware of farm hazards to prevent potential farm accidents and even fatalities on the farm.

Corn grain harvest will start in earnest soon, with soybean harvest following here in southeast Nebraska. It is very important for all of us to remember safety during this busy time of the year. It is important for farmers and travelers alike to be aware of the dangers of harvest equipment being transported on the highways and country roads.

The days are getting shorter, so sometimes it is very difficult to see, especially around dusk or dawn when the sun sometimes blinds you as you drive toward it. Country roads can be dusty, making driving particularly hazardous when harvest equipment is moving from field to field. Last spring a driver was killed on I-80 near York, NE in a multicar pile up due to the blowing dust off of a field. A semi-truck driver was also killed last spring near Schuyler when he tried to pass a tractor pulling a feed wagon and he ran off the road into a creek. These situations call for cautious driving for the trav-

eler, but it is important for farmers to have the proper SMV (Slow Moving Vehicle) signs on their equipment as well. It is also important that farm tractors and combines have functioning hazard-warning lights. Operating headlights and hazard-warning lights provide advance warning for other drivers on highways and country roads.

Safety at the farmstead and in the field must not be overlooked either. Equipment, tractor, and truck operators must always be aware of other people in the area, particularly young children and elderly people. When entering the farmyard, especially at night, be alert to pedestrians. If you are starting up and will be moving equipment, check to make sure everything is clear and there isn't anyone playing or looking around the equipment. Many times young children may be playing in and around equipment and are difficult to see. Sometimes people may be looking at equipment and they do not hear it being started up and may end up in the way and at risk of getting injured. The most common accidents that occur in handling grain involve suffocation, falls, entanglement, and electrocution. In 2018 there were two fatalities reported in grain bin accidents in Nebraska. Another farmer was electrocuted on the farm this year. There was also a fatality from a utility vehicle accident in Nebraska. Always protect yourself, use caution, and practice safety first! Finally safety in the field must not be overlooked. While you may be very careful when you're on the road or at the farmstead when other people are involved, don't forget safety in the field. During harvest there is pressure to get the crop harvested as soon as possible. We must not ignore safety when we're harvesting the crop. Always be sure to follow all safety guidelines listed in the manufacturer's operator manual and always have shields in place, and support equipment properly when working under it. Never try to unplug a combine when it is running. There have been too many people that have lost a limb or have died trying to do this. WWII Victory Gardens

World War II wasn't just about far-off battlefields. The home front was also important. With farming disrupted in much of the world, and with many farm workers joining the military, food became a huge issue.

On July 4, 1943, the Sunday *Omaha World-Herald* Magazine printed a special "Nebraska at War" edition. It included an ad sponsored by the Nebraska Seed Company of Ralston congratulating Nebraska "Victory Gardeners" for their patriotism and success.

The Victory Garden program was part of a general government effort to encourage home food production and conservation. The ad included the text of an Associated Press article from the *World-Herald* of June 19, 1943, describing Victory gardeners as "Home Heroes": "Victory gardeners may prove to be the greatest heroes of the home front food war this summer, authorities said today after viewing early results. "Indications that urbanites were harvesting successful crops of early vegetables and thus alleviating tight market conditions in metropolitan centers were verified here this week, department of agriculture officials said. "For the first time in weeks," a department spokesman said, "We have had enough of everything to provide a good diet and demands on several vegetables have not been as heavy as last year. We trace this sudden improvement in market supplies to the fact that Victory gardeners are harvesting and eating their own early crops."

"A survey by the war advertising council this week showed that 53 per cent of all city families planned victory gardens in May. Market men said movements in green onions, radishes, lettuce, spinach and a variety of greens had been comparatively slow, giving rise to the belief that home gardens this summer and fall would continue to supply vegetable needs in thousands of homes.

"Indications of a good potato production, with predictions of a nationwide 15 per cent increase in the commercial crop over the estimated 1942 total of 371,150,000 bushels were also evident." The idea was that if people raised some of their own food, they'd buy less, leaving more food to be shipped overseas to US troops and allies. As people harvested their gardens they enjoyed a double satisfaction: fresh, home-grown produce and the knowledge that they were doing their part to help the war effort.

NATURAL WAYS TO FIGHT FALL ALLERGIES

As the days become shorter and the weather cools down, a new crop of allergy symptoms can arise, turning the autumn season into one marked by sneezing, scratchy throats and itchy eyes. Medications can alleviate such symptoms, but allergy sufferers may want to investigate some natural ways to beat allergies.

According to the American College of Allergy, Asthma & Immunology, ragweed is one of the more common triggers of autumn allergies. Ragweed contributes to "hay fever," which is a term to describe allergic rhinitis that occurs as a symptom of ragweed pollen in the air. Ragweed releases pollen in mid-August, and it can continue to be problematic until a deep freeze arrives.

Other sources of fall allergies include leaf mold and pollen that is present on fallen leaves. This gets circulated when people begin to rake or blow fallen leaves. Classroom pets and chalk dust in schools (although chalkboards are largely a thing of the past) are other autumn allergens.

The good news is that many natural remedies work just as effectively as over-the-counter medications in regard to combating ragweed and pollen problems. Here's how to beat the fall allergy blues.

- Stay away from pollen. Stay away from pollen and prevent it from being tracked indoors. Remove shoes when walking through the door. Take off clothes worn outside and launder them promptly, showering to wash pollen off of the body. Use an air conditioner or keep windows closed when the pollen count is high.

- Increase omega-3 fatty acids. It is well documented that fatty acids are good for brain health and cardiovascular well-being. But these acids also may help with allergies. A German study linked foods high in omega-3 fatty acids with the ability to fight inflammation, which is a hallmark of allergy suffering. Foods that are high in fatty acids include walnuts, flax, eggs, and cold-water fatty fish.

- Rinse off pollen. Use a mild cleanser to rinse the eyelids and eyelashes of pollen, as this is where it tends to congregate after being outdoors. Use saline spray to clear nasal passages of excess pollen as well.

- Take natural supplements. A study published in the journal Clinical and Experimental Allergy found participants who used tablets of the herb butter-bar showed significant allergy relief after only one week. Select herbs from reputable manufacturers who certify them.

- Use eucalyptus oil. This oil is great to have in the house to help clear up sinuses and provide nasal congestion relief. Mix a small amount with coconut oil and rub onto the chest. There also is some evidence that adding a few drops of eucalyptus oil to cleansing products can help kill dust mites around the house.

- Wear a mask. When doing housework or yard work, wear a mask to reduce the inhalation of specific allergens.

Avoid seasonal allergies by exploring natural ways to find prevention or relief of symptoms.

"His house was like a Husker museum," the pastor said. The Methodist Church choir, of which Kenny had been a member, then sang "When We All Get to Heaven."

Kenny's long-time friend, Ted Godemann, gave the eulogy, and talked about the man with whom he had become "fast friends," when they were just boys playing summer recreation baseball. They had graduated from high school together, gone to basic training for the Air Force together, and had served together in England.

"Kenny never lacked for comments about anything," Ted said, eliciting chuckles from the congregation. "He was rich in friends, and now lies in eternity. Kenny's real life is just beginning."


After Ted's comments, several people in the congregation stood to recount favorite memories, many of which centered around Kenny's love for practical jokes. One of his cousins, Lou Jackson of Craig, MO, said that she and her husband had gone to the zoo with another couple several years ago, and when they got home, their car was up on concrete blocks, and all four wheels were gone.

"It wasn't unusual for us to come home and find our recliner on the roof," she said. Kenny's friends and family laughed through their tears.

After the congregation sang a few of Kenny's favorite songs, including "Take Me Out to the Ballgame," the Simpson family led mourners to their vehicles. Kenny's brother, David Simpson, carried the small wooden

urn that held Kenny's ashes, and handed the urn off to First Assistant Fire Chief, Matt Beer, who drove the fire truck to the Rulo Cemetery. A line of cars stretched behind the truck for miles. At the cemetery, seven members of the newly-formed American Legion Riders stood at attention, holding American flags that formed a walk-way for the mourners. Off to the side, stood sixteen volunteer fire fighters, all of whom were honorary pallbearers. (The others were: Tom Hinrichs, Paul Romine, Mark Hogue, Brian Gilkerson, Galen Harmon, and Ted Godemann)

Kenny's family—his widow, Tami, son Ben and his family, step-daughter Nicole, and many of his other relatives, donned their favorite baseball caps in his honor. Reverend Young Je Kim also led the graveside service, which included full-military honors. As Robert Zentner presented a folded American flag to Tami, and as Donnie Simmonds played "Taps" on the bugle, the American Legion members and the row of volunteer firemen, saluted. Then the throng of mourners said goodbye to a man who lived to serve others, the long-time fire chief, Kenny Simpson.

state championship on a frigid night in Butte, Ne. With temps in the teens at kickoff Goltz's team went on to win 56-18 to finish the season 13-0 and state champs. His team that season outscored opponents 662-99. His sixth consecutive title came in 1994 at Jug Brown Stadium against the Elgin Eagles. After a close game at the half, the Irish scored 36 unanswered points in the third quarter on their way to the win, his 77th in a row, both a state and national record at the time.

On November 7, 1995, the Journal headline read, "After 87 games and six titles, amazing run comes to a close." The Irish came up one yard short in double overtime and lost to Table Rock 34-28 in front of an estimated 2,500 fans. With the loss, Goltz's record fell to 101-8. His 100th win had come a week earlier in a 40-8 win over Clark. It was his 25th straight playoff win in just eight years.

When asked about his biggest win in the 300 he smiled and said there were so many. "I don't know about that, during the winning streak there were some games I'm not sure how we won. The East Butler game versus Joel Makovicka, that was a heck of a game against great players. The year the streak ended there were a couple of games we probably had no business winning," said Goltz.

(Authors note: I had the honor of playing for Coach Goltz from 1991-1994. We were in the midst of the winning streak, but he never put pressure on us, it never seemed like we were worried about the streak coming to an end. He had us prepared each week on the field and with scouting reports and had us ready to do battle. No one was ever more prepared than Coach Goltz. I can say it was truly an honor to play for Coach and now to work with him for the paper.)
