## FALLS CITY EXPLOSION BEING INVESTIGATED

Few outward signs of damage were visible at the Spirit Shoppe at 1123 Harlan Street in Falls City on Tuesday Morning after a reported 'explosion' rocked the business hours before.

A loud explosion reportedly woke Falls City residents early Tuesday morning around 3:30 a.m. People tell the Journal they heard the explosion as far as seven-miles from Falls City.

The incident is currently under investigation by the Nebraska Fire Marshal's Office. The Falls City Police Department is providing no additional details.

## COMMISSIONERS FINALIZE 2018-19 BUDGET REQUIRING NO TAX INCREASE

No public comment was received during a Public Hearing on the proposed Fiscal Year 2018-19 Richardson County Budget at the County Commissioners meeting Tues., Sept. 17th and the Board approved the spending plan that requires no change in the tax levy for county government. The tax levy will remain at \$0.340156 per \$100 of assessed valuation or \$340.16 on a property with a valuation of \$100,000, the same that was required by the 2017-18 spending plan.

Commissioners held the line on taxes despite a \$47,911,694 (3.35%) decrease in the valuation of taxable property and a \$768,925.29 (or 5.8%) increase in the budget of expenditures. The total tax requirement of

the 2018-19 spending plan is \$4,469,397.19 for the General Fund (that includes a \$300,000 Cash Reserve) and \$400,000 for the Jail Bond for a total of \$4,869,397.19. The tax asking to support the General Fund Operating Budget is \$170,314.15 less than that of the 2017-18 budget.

Commissioners received a letter from IPC, Intellectual Property Corp., requesting permission to film the old jail facility in the Courthouse as part of a documentary series about cults that murder to air on the Oxygen Channel in early 2019. The Board reviewed the request but did not grant approval.

Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr. updated the Board on the routine maintenance being done on county roads and bridges. Darveau reported on informal quotes he received for the purchase of tires for road department trucks and other vehicles. Quotes were obtained from Harmon's OK Tire, Falls City; Koch's Auto Service, Dawson; Cross Dillon Tire, Lincoln; and Kansasland Tire, Topeka. The Board directed Darveau to purchase different tires as needed from Harmon's and Koch's Auto Service. Also during the Road and Bridge Department report, Commissioners voted to approve a permit to allow Ensor Movers, Inc. to operate an oversize load on a county road.

## FALLS CITY EXPERIENCES 3-HOUR POWER OUTAGE

At approximately 6:15 a.m., on Tues., Sept. 18, Falls City experienced a city wide power outage.

A press release issued by the City said 'The City is generating the City's power due to an OPPD Substation outage. The City was running one generator during the evening and early morning hours as the load was low. However as the morning started the load began to increase quickly and the need for another generator was needed.'

It continued, 'When the additional generator was being brought on-line both generators tripped off-line putting the City out of power. The plant then needed to be brought back from a "black start" condition, which must be done very systematically and is a time consuming process.'

Electrical Utility will be relying on its own generating capability during weekdays (Mon.-Fri.) until Oct. 4 while OPPD is taken offline for installation of updated equipment.

The city recently purchased a new electrical generator with a price tag of more than \$11-million and reported it up and running during the June 18 City Council meeting.

The public is advised to limit usage during the generation times.

## VIRTUALLY NO LEVY INCREASE REQUIRED BY 2018-19 CITY BUDGET

No public comment was received during a public hearing on the proposed 2018-19 City of Falls City Budget and the City Council during its Sept. 17th meeting by a 7-0 vote adopted the spending plan as presented.

The budget will require 44-cents per \$100 of assessed valuation in local real estate taxes, virtually the same amount as the 2017-18 Budget. Local property taxes totaling \$690,769.30 will be required to support a budget that includes \$29,765,871.00 in total disbursements and transfers. While there was an increase of \$1 million in the property assessments that only produced an additional \$4,800 in local property tax revenue.

City Administrator Gary Jorn said the Council's Budget Committee had been working on the budget since July 5th. Jorn said the Committee began by projecting the revenues anticipated from state and federal sources and local sources other than property taxes. Allowance were made for a three percent increase in most city insurance, Inc. of Pawnee City to provide a wine-tasting event at the Gathering Market in connection with the Falls City Chamber of Commerce on October 14th.

Jorn said department requests were evaluated and a number of department requests had to be reduced or denied including a request for an additional part-time library employee, capital improvement requests from the

fire department, park department, auditorium, tree board, and library. Also denied was a request from the Chamber of Commerce for \$10,000 to be used for community promotions. Among the capital items surviving was \$53,000 for the update of computer hardware and software for the Police Department to meet requirements of state and federal law enforcement agencies.

There was brief council discussion about the potential loss of \$120,000 in revenue for 911 law enforcement dispatch service provided by the City to Richardson County with Commissioners recently providing notice to the City that the County intends to do its own 911 dispatch.

Approved on third and final reading by a vote of 6-1 was an ordinance raising the salaries of the Mayor to \$5,400 and of City Council members to \$4,200 effective with the beginning of the next term of office for each.

Favorable comment was provided by a 7-0 vote for a designated liquor license for Stonebridge Vineyard, Inc. of Pawnee City to provide a wine-tasting event at the Gathering Market in connection with the Falls City Chamber of Commerce on October 14th.

The Council also voted 7-0 to approve use of city streets, sidewalks, and barricades required for a "Spooks on Stone" Chamber event between 15th and 17th Streets on Stone, October 31st.

## FALLS CITY PUBLIC SCHOOL RECEIVES GRANT FROM EDUCATIONQUEST


Falls City High School is among 22 Nebraska high schools selected to receive a College Access Grant from EducationQuest Foundation.

The school will receive \$5,000 a year for four years to develop or enhance programs designed to increase the number of students who pursue education beyond high school. In total, EducationQuest will award \$580,000 in grant funds to the 22 selected schools over the next four years. The amount each school receives in based on their enrollment.

The high schools will use the grants to fund programs and activities such as college visits, financial aid sessions, scholarship searches, career exploration, ACT test preparation, and completion of college applications.

The grant program also promotes involvement with families and businesses to help ensure the program's success.

The recipient schools have set goals to increase their college-going rates by approximately 10 percentage points over the next four years. EducationQuest 131 grants to 89 NE high schools since the program began in 2006.

# CELEBRATING 100 YEARS OF THE AMERICAN LEGION

This week, we kicked off a year-long celebration of the 100th anniversary of the American Legion, which was chartered by Congress in 1919. Leaders from the American Legion joined me at a ceremony at the State Capitol to kick off the "Year of the American Legion" with an official State of Nebraska proclamation. The organization, which boasts more than 2.1 million members nationwide today, is one of our country's preeminent veterans and community service organizations.



In Nebraska, 31,000 of approximately 130,000 veterans are American Legion members. The Legion has 14 districts in the state with a combined 358 community posts. Their members are active in their communities and also at the State Capitol, where the Legislature and I have teamed up on a number of veterans initiatives. Over the past few years, we have brought a renewed focus to making Nebraska the best place in the nation to serve in the military and be a veteran. Together, we have delivered better service to our veterans, opened a new veterans' home, and expanded opportunities for the next generation of servicemen and women.

We have been cutting red tape and delivering better service for our veterans by streamlining the service they receive from the state. Last year, the Legislature and I worked together to merge the state's two veterans-related agencies to create a one-stop shop for veterans for better, integrated service delivery. The Nebraska Department of Veterans Affairs (NDVA) provides our veterans with information on their rights, benefits, and other sources of aid. Now, they also oversee our veterans' homes in four communities from Bellevue to Scottsbluff.

In August, the agency and I hosted a ceremony to cut the ribbon on the new Central Nebraska Veterans' Home (CNVH), which will provide world-class accommodations to hundreds of Nebraska veterans. The CNVH is a 338,000-square-foot facility that is comprised of ten buildings on 67 acres. The main building is home to administration offices, a beautiful chapel, library, ceramics area, woodshop, lounge, guest rooms for traveling visitors, pharmacy, medical clinic, dental suite, and more. Connected to the main facility are two hubs, which house physical, occupational, and speech therapy areas and a restorative kitchen. The therapy area will be one of the few in the country with an anti-gravity treadmill. This new home will deliver a state-of-the-art experience for our veterans.

We are also working to expand job opportunities for the families of the next generation of Nebraska's military servicemen and women. Last year, Senator Bruce Bostelman of Brainard and I worked together on LB 639 to increase employment opportunities for the spouses of military members and veterans. Senators and I have also successfully worked together on legislation to help provide reciprocity for spouses who hold professional licenses from other states, such as nurses. This year, I approved revisions to Rule 21 to make it easier for teachers from military families moving to Nebraska to get a teaching permit here. Military spouses with a valid out-of-state teaching license can now receive a three-year teaching certificate in Nebraska, so our schools have the opportunity to employ high-quality teachers in a timely manner. In recent months, the Nebraska Supreme Court approved a new rule which gives active duty military spouses greater flexibility to practice law in Nebraska.

As we celebrate the Year of the American Legion, this is an opportunity for us to thank our veterans for their service and to look for new ways to better serve them as a state. We should always be looking at how we can better serve the men and women who have sacrificed so much for the cause of freedom. ## AUDITOR, AUDITOR, WHERE'S THE STATE AUDITOR?

About a month after he blew the whistle on a discrepancy in the State Treasurer's office, a newspaper has blown the whistle on the alleged workday habits of State Auditor Charlie Janssen.

Janssen acknowledged the accuracy of an Omaha World-Herald report that he sometimes spends more of his Lincoln workday at a sports bar 16 blocks south of his Capitol office. The 47-year-old Republican also admitted that he's not perfect but promised that he's taking immediate steps to change.

The newspaper said its three-month investigation revealed late morning arrivals to work, three-hour lunches and afternoon absences from his office. Such activity could have easily been ignored in a state office that wasn't really high profile until Lincoln businessman John Breslow was elected in 1991 on the promise that he would become the watchdog of state government.

The Democrat Breslow was the first auditor in 52 years to not be named Ray Johnson. Republican Ray C. Johnson was auditor from 1939 to 1971. Ray AC Johnson, no relation and also a Republican, served from 1971 to 1991.

In a surprise move in 1994, Breslow changed his party affiliation to Republican. He was replaced in 1999 by former state Senator Kate Witke of Omaha, a Republican who changed her party affiliation to Democrat in 2006. She served until 2007 and was replaced by another former Republican state Senator Mike Foley. He managed two terms without changing parties and is currently Lieutenant Governor. Republican Janssen, a former state Senator, defeated former Senator Amanda McGill, a Democrat in 2015.

Janssen said he sees no problem with the time he spends outside his office, saying his workday is over early because he starts at 5 a.m. at his Fremont home. He also said he conducts business at those lunches and contends the \$85,000 annual job is not based on hourly productivity.

Also, there's no specific state rule on employees drinking alcohol over lunch, but individual agencies prohibit employees from being impaired while at work. But are we wrong to expect accountability from an elected official who manages an agency with a \$2 million plus annual budget?

Three-hour lunches have been the running joke — or maybe a reality in some circles — of corporate America for years. But, the newspaper contends they saw Janssen take 10 of them in a 20-day period. Excuse me, that sounds like somebody is in denial about a problem bigger than absenteeism.

Janssen's well-chronicled behavior is, sadly, not new to state government. You might remember a lieutenant governor who had to step down over the misuse of a state-issued cell phone. A former state treasurer also lost his re-election bid in the 1990s after it was revealed he used state pay warrants to buy candy for a lady friend in another state. He also used a state-owned landline to call that woman numerous times. Capitol rumors surfaced at that time about one of his predecessors

who used to take the daily state receipts in a bank bag and walk them from the Capitol to the National Bank of Commerce, about six blocks away, often stopping at a favorite bar for a mid-afternoon drink, or two. The popular version of the story also included reports that he once left the full bank bag on the bar and a bartender had to "chase him down" so the treasurer would have something to deposit when he got to the bank.

There was also talk — and some proof — that the best place to track down the 28-year veteran Lancaster County Assessor/Register of Deeds was at a downtown Lincoln bar and restaurant during or after the lunch hour. I made that contact several times.

Given that the auditor's job is rooting out government mismanagement, waste and misconduct, we should be concerned. The office also audits local and state agencies, reports findings and makes correction suggestions.

So, who should be auditing the auditor and making similar suggestions?

Janssen is seeking re-election, running against political newcomer Democrat Jane Skinner of Omaha. State Democratic chairwoman Jane Kleeb wants Janssen to remove his name from the ballot.

Janssen said he wants citizens to give him a chance to be an even better state auditor. He said he wants voters to consider the work his office has done to correct problems of other government bodies so they can better serve the citizens.

Maybe the auditor needs to figure out how his own office can better serve the citizens. Being there during business hours would be a good start.

## From the Journal Files

50-25-15 Years Ago

**50 Years Ago - Sept. 26th - Oct. 2nd, 1968**  
A delegation from the Falls City Chamber of Commerce toured the site where the Cooper Nuclear Station was under construction and learned that the plant was to be operational in 1972 and would eventually employ approximately 900.

"A Fistful of Dollars" starring Clint Eastwood was being shown and "Yours, Mine, and Ours" was the coming attraction at the Rivoli Theater. KFEQ-TV, Channel 2, was advertising an evening line-up of programs including "The Flying Nun", "Bewitched", and "That Girl".

Donna Matthes was crowned queen of Falls City High School homecoming and was to be the Falls City entrant in the Hiawatha Halloween Festival queen contest.

Heasty Reesman, Falls City, Farmers Home Administration Director for Nebraska, led a delegation of 40 persons involved in agriculture on a tour of rural water facilities in Jackson and Shawnee counties in Kansas.

Kenneth Wittwer was re-elected chairman of the Richardson County ASCS committee.

The Bronze Star, the Purple Heart and other decorations were presented posthumously to Sgt. Gary W. Dunn who died of combat wounds in Vietnam.

Eddie Motors was a dealer for American Motors, a company better known for its "Rambler" that was advertising its luxury "Ambassador" sedan, and two sports cars, the "Javelin" and the "AMX".

The Falls City Chamber's retail committee invited farmers to leave ears of corn at the Chamber office to be judged in various categories. Oct. 10-11 Falls City auto dealers were invited to display their new 1969 models in the downtown area.

First National Bank & Trust and Richardson County Bank & Trust made a joint announcement that their banks would become affiliated with the Master Charge permitting cardholders to make credit purchases with the bank issued cards.

Two moose and a black bear were bagged in Canada by Patrolman Robert Chah and Dr. Robert Burghart of Falls City and Wendell Fairbanks and Jim Newcome of Auburn.

The City of Rulo received a \$103,000 Federal Home Loan to finance construction of a water tower and distribution system to supply water purchased from the City of Falls City to homes and businesses in Rulo.

Nebraska had the top ranked defense in the Big 8, allowing the least yards rushing, 204.7 per game, the fewest yards passing, a total of 544, and was second in points allowed per game.

Tom Clark retired after 48 years of employment at the Falls City electrical power plant including 25 years as the chief engineer at the plant.

Chicken fryers were 29-cents/lb. at Kenny's Food Center and 25-cents/lb. at Hinky Dinky.

**25 Years Ago - Sept. 26th - Oct. 2nd, 1993**  
Two former Humboldt Cardinals, Ken Mehlin and Jamie Weyers, who played for the Nebraska Cornhuskers, were honored by 200 fans from their home community following a Husker victory over Colorado State.

The Falls City Tiger football team won its 1993 home opener with a 14-6 victory over the Trenton Bulldogs.

The Sacred Heart Irish pushed their consecutive victory mark to 55 by defeating East Butler 28-26 in double overtime.

Inducted into the Peru State College Athletic Hall of Fame were running back Alvin Holder who played from 1978-81 and PSC shortstop Whip Wilson who played softball for PSC from 1977-80.

This week's Ken's Pharmacy lunch counter ad riddle was "I love balancing the 'press' books, but Ken's for lunch really 'ads' it up!"

Eagle Scout Badges were presented to four members of Boy Scout Troop #396: Tyler Strecker, Nick Fischer, Bill Harkendorff, and Chris Young.

President Clinton announced plans to negotiate an international treaty to ban production of nuclear, chemical and biological weapons of mass destruction.

In balloting at the Richardson County Fair elected to three year terms on the Richardson County Extension Board were Judy Munn of Falls City and Lee Zentner of Shubert.

Immanuel United Methodist Church celebrated the 100th anniversary of its congregation.

The Richardson County Board voted to notify the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality of intent to designate landfills in Brown and Nemaha Counties, KS for disposal of solid waste generated by residents of unincorporated areas of the County.

Falls City Country Club Men's League Champions were the teams of Bob Werner, Bill Schock, and Bill Kentopp in the Early League and Bill Simon, Larry Merz, and Dennis Hullman in the late league.

The honor of Richardson County Athlete of the Week went to Janelle Boden of Southeast Consolidated for her outstanding volleyball play.

With a farewell ride around Kauffman Stadium and with a kiss of home plate, George Brett left his home ballpark for the last time as a player.

Joe Hutfles, a Sacred Heart 5th grader won a Gold Award for his work, "Crazy Guy" in an International Children's Art Contest. Also winning art awards were two Falls City Public School students, 6th grader Jason Palmer and 4th grader Jill Simpson.

It was a wet September with 7.33 inches of precipitation recorded at Brenner Field compared to the average of 4.69 inches for the month.

Announcement was made by American National Bank and by Peggy Backer of a \$500 annual Community Service Award to be presented annually in memory of the late Terry Backer who was president of the Falls City Branch at the time of his death.



The Falls City Sacred Heart Irish football team improved to 4-0 on the season last Friday night when they traveled to Daykin to take on 3-0 Meridian. The Mustangs began the game with a big kick return to the Irish 27 but were stopped at the Irish 20-yard line on fourth and one.

Two plays later Drew Bippes covered 56 yards for the score with 9:53 to play in the first. A pass from Bippes to Hoy made it 8-0. After a quick three and out the Irish struck on the first play, a 30-yard pass from Bippes to Hoy to make it 14-0 with 7:18 to go.

Another big punt return by Hoy, his second of the game, gave Irish good field position again. This time Bippes kept the ball 28 yards for the score on the first play from scrimmage. Bippes hit Jamie Stice for the conversion to make it 22-0 with just over six minutes gone by in the first quarter. The Irish scored three touchdowns on their first four plays from scrimmage. After a turnover on downs on the next Irish possession, the Mustangs drove to the Irish five-yard line before being stopped on downs.

After trading possessions, the Irish got another nice punt return by Hoy and had it first and ten at the Mustang 25 to start their sixth drive of the contest. This time Bippes hit Hoy for a 25-yard touchdown with 4:23 to play in the half. The PAT pass to Del Casteel was good, and SH led 30-0. After a three and out the Mustangs chose to punt again and Hoy made them pay. He sailed 58 yards to paydirt to make it 38-0 with 2:52 still to play in the half. Hoy seemed to be everywhere Friday night as he got a pic on the next Mustang possession and returned it to the Meridian 12-yard line. With :12 to play in the half, Hoy hit Bippes on a halfback pass to make it 44-0 heading into halftime.

Meridian struck first to begin the second half as Garrett Klipp scooped up an Irish fumble on the first play of the half and went 15 yards for the score to make it 44-6 with 11:07 to play in the third

quarter. Hoy, a thorn in the Mustangs side all night, took the following kickoff to the house for a 67-yard touchdown to give the Irish a 50-6 lead just over a minute into the second half. The Irish then subbed in the JV for the remainder of the contest while Meridian continued with its starters. Meridian got a couple of scores late to make the final 50-22, but the game was never in question.

The Irish picked up 164 yards on the ground on 21 attempts and 102 through the air. Bippes led SH with 88 rushing yards on five carries and two scores. Hoy added 42 yards and a score on five touches. Bippes completed 5 of 7 passes for 80 yards and two TD's while Hoy was 1-1 for 22 yards and a score. Hoy led the receivers with two grabs for 55 yards and two touchdowns. Hoy also had one kick return for 67 yards and a score and four punt returns for 109 yards.

On defense, Hoy had seven stops and two INT's. For the game, Hoy contributed 295 all-purpose yards on 13 touches. Casteel had 11 stops, including three for losses. Branson Darveau added 11 tackles, and a stop behind the line and Sloan Lenard had ten stops.

The Irish (4-0) will host Parkway Christian (1-3) on Friday, September 28 at Jug Brown Stadium.

The Tiger defense forced a three and out to begin the second half, and FC took over first and ten at their own 45 with 10:22 to play in the third. Rathje capped off a 55-yard drive with a one-yard plunge to give FC a 21-14 lead with 6:27 to play in the third. The Crusaders came right back though as the QB went 63-yards for the score to tie the game at 21 with 3:53 to go.

The fourth period began with FC facing a second and seven at the LC 22-yard line. On third and four from the 19, Cook kept the ball for the score to make it 28-21 with 11:28 to go in the game. The lead was short lived as Trent Lockard of LC took the kickoff 80 yards up the middle for the touchdown to tie the game at 28 with 11:28 to play. On the kickoff, Lincoln Christian squib kicked it and recovered at the Tiger 43-yard line. Less than two minutes later Alex Kock went in from 19-yards out to give the Crusaders their first lead of the game 35-28 with 9:32 to play.

After a three and out by FC, Lincoln Christian took over at their own 23 with 7:45 to go. However, a fumble recovery by Jaden Nolte gave the Tigers hope and the ball at the 22 with 7:41 to go. On fourth and five at the 17 Cook hit Cade Schawang for an 11-yard gain to extend the drive. Then on second and goal at the four Cook called his own number up middle for the game-tying score with 5:49 to play. Neither team could push any points across the rest of the way and the game headed to overtime, all knotted at 35.

On the first play of overtime, Rathje took the handoff going right for the 10-yard score to make it 42-35. Lincoln Christian had one last shot and at third and goal at the five put the ball on the turf, and Trey McAfee pounced on it to seal the win, 42-35.

When asked about the game-winning TD Rathje said, "Really on the O-line, I've got to trust them to do the job, and if they do good, I'm doing good. My success is 100 percent on the line. They pulled through the whole game. We have a great team and haven't hit our full potential yet, we're getting there. We have to keep improving, keep grinding."

For the game, Rathje led the ground attack with 30 carries for 137 yards and two TD's. Cook added 124 yards on 20 touches and three scores. He also complet-

ed 6-11 passes for 95 yards and a score. Butler had two catches for 79 yards, and Schawang added three grabs for 22 yards. McAfee, on top of the fumble recovery to end the game, had eight tackles, two for losses. Schawang had eight stops, and Cook added six, including three for losses.

"I thought they responded really well in the face of adversity and continued to fight. As far as preparing for AG, more of the same. We strive to get better every day in practice," said Coach Fritz.

Next week the (3-2) Tigers will hit the road to take on the (4-1) Ashland-Greenwood Bluejays in Ashland. The Bluejays only loss came last week at Auburn 19-7.



# WHAT KIDS CAN DO IN THE FACE OF BULLYING

Many adults may recall being bullied or witnessing bullying when they were in school. Despite that, it's important that adults, including parents and educators, not see bullying as an inevitable part of growing up. The effects of bullying can be severe, affecting those involved — including the bullied, the bullies and those who merely witness bullying — long after their school days have ended.

According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, bullying has been linked to various negative outcomes, mental health issues, substance abuse and suicide.

When taking steps to combat bullying, parents and educators should not overlook the benefits of enlisting children in their efforts. Kids can be great allies in the fight against bullying, and the following are some ways adults can work with youngsters who want to stop bullying.

Teaching kids to respect others—StopBullying.gov, the DHHS website devoted to stopping bullying once and for all, notes the importance of teaching kids to treat everyone, including other children, with respect. Parents can teach kids to pause before saying or doing something that can be harmful to someone else. Bullying inflicts physical and emotional pain on its victims, so teaching kids to recognize that words can be just as harmful as fists may encourage them to think twice before saying something mean to a classmate.

The DHHS also recommends advising children to do something else if they feel an urge to say or do something mean. Walk away from a situation to watch television, play a video game or engage in another activity rather than saying or doing something hurtful.

What kids being bullied can do—Kids being bullied also can employ certain strategies to overcome bullying. The DHHS recommends teaching children to look at bullies and telling them to stop in a calm, clear voice. Laughing it off might also work for kids who find joking comes naturally to them. The DHHS advises against fighting back, instead suggesting kids walk away and stay away before finding an adult who can stop the bullying on the spot.

Encouraging students to confide in adults they trust also can help them overcome bullying and the feelings of loneliness that bullying can elicit. Trusted adults can help children devise a plan to stop the bullying. The DHHS notes that most bullying happens when adults are not around, so staying near adults and other children can help kids avoid situations where they might be vulnerable to bullies.

What witnesses to bullying can do—Bullying can have a negative impact on children who witness bullying, even if they aren't the victims. Adults can encourage children to speak to trusted adults and to report instances of bullying. In addition, children should be encouraged to be kind to children who are being bullied, inviting them to sit with them on the bus or in the lunch room and engaging them in conversations about topics that interest them.

Bullying affects children whether they're being bullied, doing the bullying or witnessing it. But bullying can be overcome if adults and children work together and keep lines of communication open at all times.

### Remember car seat safety during Child Passenger Safety Week Sept. 23-29

Children's car seats, booster seats, and seat belts make all the difference in keeping us safe. Tragically, on average, 2 children under 13 were killed every day in 2016 while riding in cars, SUVs, pickups, or vans. But think about this: the same year, there were 328 children under the age of 5 saved because they were in car seats. Make sure your child is in the correct seat and buckled up - every trip, every time. It is a life-saving measure.

As a parent, I do not make choices that knowingly risk the safety of my children. An easy choice is to buckle our children properly into the correct car seats for their ages and sizes. Every day in Nebraska, many parents and caregivers travel with children in their vehicles. While some children are buckled properly in the correct car seats for the ages and sizes—most are not. Nationwide, of the 8 to 14 year olds killed in car crashes in 2016, 26% were sitting in the front seat, and 45% of those children were unbuckled. All children under 13 belong in the back seat, buckled up—every trip, every time.

Car seats and booster seats are

designed to precise specifications to keep children safe, which is why the seats need to be installed and used correctly. Unfortunately, nearly half of all car seats and booster seats are installed incorrectly. Make sure that your children's car seats and booster seats are used in your vehicle properly. A new law, Legislative Bill 42, will be take effect in Nebraska on January 1, 2019. This law will require all children up to age eight to be secured in a federally approved child safety seat. Be watching for more information about the new law coming in the next couple months.

Join Four Corners Health Department, September 23-29 during Child Passenger Safety Week and check to see that our children are buckled in the correct seat and that those seats are properly installed. You can be a good role model too. You can protect your life, as well, by wearing your own seat belt, every time you drive or ride in a vehicle.
