More than \$15,000 to Cancer Fund

Allyson Vonderschmidt is a 21-year-old survivor of one of the rarest and most aggressive malignant round-cell cancerous tumors doctors find.

Allyson, though, is also tough and aggressive. Even more so than the Ewing's sarcoma that surreptitiously infiltrated her life at the age of 18. Instead of going off to college like her Class of 2009 mates, the rodeo competitor underwent a brutal therapy plan that included 40 weeks of chemotherapy. In the midst of that, she also took radiation treatment in an effort to avoid surgery to remove cancer-ridden bone mass in her face and skull.

This past year, the current Northwest Missouri State University graphic design student gave illustration to her brave fight with a drawing titled, "Life's Wild Ride." The picture depicts a cowboy riding the fury of a bucking bronco.

"It's really important to me; I think it reflects my wild ride," she said.

But the people of this community who rallied for Allyson are important to her, too. And she wanted to express her gratitude by donating the personal symbol of her 'wild ride' to the annual Richardson County Cancer Fund Auction March 31 at the Elks Club.

The Past Exalted Rulers Association of Falls City Elks Lodge #963 sponsored the 7th annual BBQ and Auction for the benefit of the Cancer Fund.

"It's going to be sad to see it go," she said three weeks ago. "But I really want to give something back. Everybody's been so supportive of me."

They still have Ally's back. Stalder Cattle Co., Merle Stalder, and Lonnie Goff and Sons, went "wild" on Allyson's picture, winning the item at \$1,400. They weren't going to lose and they weren't going to

let Allyson lose her drawing. It was presented back to her before the end of the evening by Cancer Fund Director Peggy Davidson.

"She was thrilled to get her picture back," Allyson's mother, Beth Vonderschmidt, said. "We were honored that it did so well for the Cancer Fund and glad she was able to help in some way."

To say the evening was a success would be an understatement. The event netted more than \$15,000 for the Cancer Fund.

"A big thank you goes to Mike Gilmore and Don Campbell for their 50/50 project, which really boosted the amount of this year's benefit, and to the winner, Jim Hill's, who shared their proceeds with the Cancer Fund," Davidson said.

As of December 2011,

230 benefits have been paid to cancer patients in Richardson County. The benefits total \$82,400. Since Jan. 1 of this year, another 13 patients have received benefits bringing the total benefits paid to \$88,900.

If you live in Richardson County and have cancer, or know of someone who has cancer, and must travel out of Richardson County for treatment, this benefit is available to you. Forms are available at the out-patient clinic at Community Medical Center, at each of the doctor's offices in Falls City and in Humboldt, as well as from Tony Brunette at First National Bank or Peggy Davidson. There is no income guideline.

"It takes a lot of people to

County Assessor retires via letter to Commissioners

Richardson County voters will not decide to either remove or retain its County Assessor during the May 15 primary election, as Regina Cummings officially retired her position, effective April 1. The County Commissioners April 3 unanimously accepted Cummings' retirement and the issue will not appear on the ballot.

Cummings, who served as Assessor for 17 years, submitted the following retirement letter to the Commissioners on March 27:

"After extensive discussion with my family, friends and a lot of consultation with my doctors, I have decided to retire from my position as Assessor of Richardson County as of April 1, 2012. It is with much regret and sadness that I do this because I have served the taxpayers of Richardson County and been an employee of Richardson County approximately 30 years. For 17 of these years it was my honor and pleasure to serve as County Assessor of Richardson County, which is an elected position in the Richardson County Government.

"During my tenure as County Assessor of Richardson County, I feel that I have performed my job thoroughly, impartially, and with the degree of professionalism that the office deserves. I have always tried to remain independent in my approach to my job, which has not been easy when you are dealing with the valuations of taxpayer's property for taxing purposes. Opinions about individual valuations of real estate, buildings, etc., can vary widely from one person to another, especially when the exchange of money is involved.

"In my opinion, the 'recall election' for my position concerns this very subject of valuation of property. The real question was not if I was doing my job properly, but was the result of anger of a certain minority of taxpayers for the valuations assigned to their respective property. If you remember only thing about me in my service as Richardson County Assessor, remember that I strove to treat everybody equally and fairly.

"In closing, I would like to thank all the taxpayers who supported me over the years and all state and county employees that I have worked with over the years. There are lots of wonderful public servants in all levels of government."

Terry Lotter and Fred Brewer, both of Falls City, submitted recall affidavits Feb. 6, each stating, "I feel that Regina Cummings is personally not performing her duties as County Assessor."

The two then spearheaded a petition for recall circulation effort and collected 935 valid signatures from registered voters - well surpassing the required number of 851.

The County will advertise for resumes until Monday, April

Councilman Brad Campbell holds off on resignation

Falls City Four Ward City Councilman Brad Campbell did not resign his position as anticipated last Monday at the Council's regular meeting at City Hall.

Prior to the meeting, Campbell, who has purchased a home outside the fourth ward and will move sometime this spring, asked that his resignation be removed from the agenda.

In a March 20 email addressed to Mayor Tim Hersh, City Clerk Gary Jorn and the members of the Council, Campbell said he planned on resigning at the end of May, but "I do not like the direction that the City is headed, therefore, I submit this resignation effective immediately."

Campbell has served as Fourth Ward Councilman for eight years.

In other news from the 15-minute meeting, the Council approved resolutions to levy a special assessment against real estate property in three locations: 1604 Morton St., 1201 McLean St. and 1407 Fulton St. The cost to the City to raze the

Tiffany starting using drugs right here in Falls City. She first used marijuana, which led to the use of many other drugs including meth and prescription drugs.



A recent office visitor reminded me that when the construction of the new baseball complex begins in late summer, a portion of it will cover what at one time was the Falls City Zoo. Yep, we had a zoo but no circus, even though we had clowns aplenty.

You have to have a few years on you to remember that the municipal government funded and operated—or tolerated—a zoo in what was then City Park.

The zoo was located where the Pee Wee ball diamond is today. It featured two mean, aged monkeys, one raccoon, a couple of peacocks, four or five pheasants, some ducks and geese and two deer which no longer could jump over a hula hoop. The zoo's superintendent was Herman Schrieber, who, with his wife, lived in a house in the park. I don't remember what they did with the zoo's primates during the winter. They might have housed them in the park's "sheep shed" which had been the locale for chautauquas in the earlier days. But a local historian doesn't think that was the case.

The zoo existed until the late 1940s, probably to give the elderly Herman, who was devoted to it, something to do. He had given his life to the park and its maintenance. It's safe to say the Chamber of Commerce didn't tout the zoo as one of the town's top tourist attractions.

However, the zoo's demise later led to a great step in the Summer Rec program, which was then in its infancy and operated through the United Fund.

Claire Hurlbert, the Journal's sports editor and a tireless youth worker, was determined that the Pee Wee League should have its own diamond since the big diamond had too busy a schedule and Pee Wee play was limited both to space and kids. So with the help of Spike Bennett, Tom McGinnis, Rita Gibson, Tim Zinn, Nelson Merz, Ernie Prosser and others pressured the City Park Board into letting them build a baseball diamond for Pee Wees where the zoo had been located. But it had to be leveled. It took lots and lots of work, all volunteer, after regular working hours and on Saturdays and Sundays. Trees had to be uprooted, dump truck loads and loads of fill dirt were hauled in from Towle properties on the Nemaha bottoms. Harlan Street was being re-constructed and Mayor Ralph Steinbrink arranged for the excess extraction material to be hauled to the site as filler. Spike Bennett recalls when the work was finally completed and the Pee Wee League began playing games there, the pre-game ritual always included a walking survey of the diamond to pick up rocks from the street debris which had worked their way to the surface.

So there you have it. How the demise of the Falls City Zoo led to the Pee Wee baseball diamond, to the initial expansion of our super Summer Rec program, which has led to the upcoming construction of a fabulous baseball complex.

In their heavenly jungle, those two mean old monkeys who had inhabited the Falls City Zoo should be grinning.

A story in the April 4th edition of the *Omaha World-Herald* featured the presentation of the long-overdue Purple Heart award for being wounded in action to two veterans—one a World War II soldier and the other an Iraq War veteran. It took some doing to get both men an award they had earned the hard way.

I would imagine that many servicemen wounded in action never received their Purple Heart ribbons and pins. One was Dale Hottendorf of Falls City, who passed away in 2002. Dale served as an infantry sergeant in the Korean War in the 2nd Infantry Division in Korea in 1950-51, participating in some of the fiercest combat in those terrible terrain and weather conditions. He was wounded in action twice and was hospitalized both times. When he was discharged his service record showed the Korean Service Medal and the Bronze Service Star—but no Purple Hearts. He suffered with shrapnel in his body the rest of his life. Dale wasn't the kind of guy to make waves, in fact it took me a couple of years to talk him into letting me write about his Korean War days; however, there were efforts on his behalf to get him the two Purple Hearts he deserved. They were unsuccessful.

But the Disabled American Veterans determined that he was qualified to belong to that organization and Dale was a lifetime member.

Falls City's Community Clean Up for 2012 is scheduled for the end of the month.

On Saturday, April 28, Falls City Sanitation and Koelzer Salvage will accept items such as furniture and metals that are too large for personal trash removal. This collection will take place in the City parking lot across the street from Prichard Auditorium from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. In charge of the operation are Mark Harkendorff and Tim Koelzer.

Also on that Saturday, unwanted or outdated prescription medication will be collected at the Richardson County Courthouse parking lot, 18th and Harlan, from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Sheriff Randy Houser and members of his department will collect the medications.

Donations to Goodwill Industries, Inc., can be made at Prichard Auditorium (use east door on Barada Street) on the following dates and times: Thursday, April 26, 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.; Friday, April 27, 9 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and 5-8 p.m.; and Saturday, April 28, 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. A Goodwill employee will be happy to provide tax receipts for the donations.

Full recycling began in the parking lot of Sun Mart on April 7 and will continue on the first and third Saturdays of the month from 9 a.m. to noon. Glass (clear, green, brown) items, plastics (#1 and #2) and tin and aluminum cans should be cleaned of labels and lids.

Cardboard, magazines, catalogs and newspapers can be recycled at Carol Hamilton's Recycling Center, located south of 6th and Stone Streets on the west side of the street. These materials can be left on any day.

And, plastic bags can be recycled inside the Sun Mart store.





Denied health insurance? An option:

If you have been turned down for health insurance because of a pre-existing condition, you may have another option. You may be eligible for the Pre-Existing Condition Insurance Plan, a new program created under the Affordable Care Act.

Currently in most states, private health insurance companies can refuse to insure you if you have a pre-existing condition. Available since July 2010, the Pre-Existing Condition Insurance Plan provides a health coverage option for children and adults in all 50 states and the District of Columbia who have been locked out of the health insurance market because of a pre-existing condition.

The absence of affordable health insurance can wreak havoc on people's lives.

An untreated medical condition may prevent people from working and frequently disrupts their relationships with friends and family. It can cost people their livelihood — and in some cases their lives.

The transitional PCIP program will continue until 2014 when Americans, regardless of their health status, will have access to affordable health insurance because insurers will no longer be allowed to deny coverage to people with *any* pre-existing condition, like cancer, diabetes and asthma.

Under PCIP, you'll be insured for a wide range of benefits including physician's services, hospital care, prescription drugs and treatment for your pre-existing condition.

You won't be charged a higher premium because of your medical condition and your eligibility isn't based on your income. Like standard health insurance plans, you'll be required to pay a monthly premium, a deductible and some cost-sharing expenses.

The maximum out-of-pocket cost for enrollees in the Nebraska PCIP program who go to in-network providers and who are enrolled in the Standard or Extended plan options has been reduced from almost \$6,000 in 2011 to \$4,000 in 2012.

And, although the maximum out-of-pocket cost for going to out-of-network providers is still \$7,000, enrollees will not have to meet these out-of-pocket limits separately. In 2012, out-of-pocket costs for services received both in and out of network will be combined, so that the *most* enrollees will pay out of pocket is \$7,000. In 2011, enrollees had to meet the maximum limits for in and out-of-network services separately.

After the out-of-pocket limits are reached, either \$4,000 for in-network services or at the most \$7,000, for both in and out-of-network costs, the PCIP plan will pay the rest of your costs until the end of the year. This means comprehensive health insurance without financial ruin.

Since July 1, 2011, Nebraskans enrolled in PCIP will pay 20.5% less in monthly premiums than they were paying and people applying for the PCIP program will no longer have to wait on an insurance company to send them a denial letter. Applicants can simply provide a letter from a doctor, physician or assistant, or nurse practitioner dated within the past 12 months stating that they have or, at any time in the past had a medical condition, disability or illness. These reduced premiums and new eligibility standards make it easier for Nebraskans to get the health

LINCOLN – It is too much, but the sadder thought is that more and worse could be ahead.

Virtually anything might be alleged these days, regardless of how ridiculous or disgusting, in a political campaign.



Millions of people track millions of others these days on Twitter accounts. It's a big deal to have a big following. Last time I looked, Lady Gaga led the world.

Political campaigns track opponents, friends and just about everyone. The Tweet

search is pretty much generic.

Republican Senate candidates Jon Bruning and Don Stenberg debated in western Nebraska recently; moreover they recited their standard assertions and allegations about people and things, including each other.

An audio recording captured this exchange:

Bruning: "Well let me ask you this, Don. This Sunday my daughter walks in and she says, 'Don Stenberg's trying to follow me on Twitter.' My daughter's 14-years-old. Now...I'd like to know why does a 62-year-old man want to follow a 14-year-old girl on Twitter. I'd really like to know. She said, 'Dad that's kinda creepy.'"

Stenberg: "First of all I don't do it myself."

Bruning: "I was just kinda curious. It's not an attack. My daughter... you tried to follow her on Twitter. Don, that's kinda weird."

Stenberg: "Quite honestly I don't do my own Twitter. Dan Parsons (Stenberg's campaign manager) does it for me. We've got thousands and thousands of folks. And as soon as we get done here I'm gonna call Dan and make sure that's taken off. I don't think it's appropriate and I don't know if Dan even knew who he was communicating with, cause I don't know what the name was."

Bruning: "Well, she's 14 Don."

Stenberg: "Well, yeah."

Parsons noted the campaign tracks a ton of people on Twitter and no one had an interest in the child's account, or even knew it was on the list.

The stomach-bothering part of this deal is in the quote from Bruning, although saying he was wasn't attacking Stenberg, he tosses out:

"Now...I'd like to know why does a 62-year-old man want to follow a 14-year-old girl on Twitter. I'd really like to know..."

In today's world, obvious and awful things are implied by that rhetorical question.

It is, as observed earlier, too much.

We are certainly in for worse.

This was just an example of one family-values, conservative Republican taking a slap at another.

Imagine the depths of the general election.

Then again, don't. We will be caught among those depths soon enough.

CITY PLANS TO FLUSH FIRE HYDRANTS

Falls City Utility and Fire personnel will be flushing fire hydrants throughout the city over the next few weeks to flow test and remove any sediment built up in the water mains. This is scheduled to start on April 4, 2012.

Customers may experience a temporary brownish-red discoloration of their water during this flushing process. However, Alan Romine of the Utility Department notes that this water discoloration does not pose any health threat and is safe to use.

Persons, who notice flushing in progress in their area, are advised not to use water for a short while until the flushing is complete, so as to not pull discolored water into their service piping. For those who do experience discoloration of water, the Water Department reminds them not to wash white clothes during this time since the brownish-red minerals will stain white cloth.

Romine commented: "The Water Department apologizes for any inconvenience that this flushing process might cause for consumers. The process of flushing the system at the fire hydrants removes as much of the build-up as possible. If we do not flush the system, excessive iron and manganese build up over time and could lead to long-term problems such as clogging of lines and water fixtures. Your patience is appreciated."



Eric Crouch, Jason Glock among High School Hall of Fame inductees

The Nebraska High School Hall of Fame Foundation will induct its 19th group at a ceremony Oct. 7 at the Lied Center in Lincoln.

The induction class includes 12 athletes, five coaches, an official and two contributors. The Hall selected Heisman Trophy winner Eric Crouch and his Millard North classmate, Kelly Lindsay, in their first year of eligibility.

— Eric Crouch, Millard North (1997): The 2001 Heisman Trophy winner was a four-year starter at quarterback for Nebraska. At Millard North he rewrote the Class A football record book as one of the top quarterbacks in state history. The 1996 Parade All-American's

50 touchdowns and 308 points over three seasons were records, as was his 5,134 yards of total offense. In track, he was the Metro Conference champion in the 100 and 200 meters as a senior and the 200 as a junior.

— Jason Glock, Wahoo (1991): Cornerstone of the Wahoo basketball dynasty that won four state championships during his career, he was a two-time all-state selection who scored 2,167 points and an all-state defensive lineman in football (Glock and Wahoo competed at Jug Brown Stadium in Falls City during the 1990 Class B football playoffs). He lettered four years at Nebraska in basketball.

— Clester Johnson, Bellevue West (1991): A two-time all-state quarterback who went on to play wide receiver at Nebraska, Johnson won the all-class gold medals in the 110 and 300 hurdles at the 1991 state meet and reached the state championship match in wrestling.

— Kelly Lindsay, Millard North (1997).



E15 gets EPA approval

In 2009, more than 5,000 Nebraskans voiced their support of E15, a 15 percent ethanol blend, by sending yellow postcards created by the Nebraska Corn Board to the Environmental Protection Agency. Three years and a lot of hard work later, EPA has approved E15 as registered fuel, helping clear the way for E15 to be used in cars, light duty trucks and SUVs model year 2001 and newer — more than 120 million vehicles across the country.

“This has been a long road,

filled with a lot of research, a lot of technicalities and a lot of work by many organizations who support the use of ethanol and biofuels,” said Kim Clark, ag program manager of the Nebraska Corn Board. “The end goal is to increase the amount of renewable fuel available to motorists in the U.S., which can help lower fuel costs and reduce our dependence on petroleum-based fuels. The decision by EPA is a milestone, and we are very happy to have reached it.”

The approval by EPA comes at an important juncture for the ethanol industry.

The industry hit a “blend wall” in the last year since a vast majority of the fuel sold in the U.S. is already an ethanol blend, mostly E10, a 10 percent ethanol blend. “The industry has the capability to produce beyond that wall, and we need to take advantage of it, especially since we are producing ethanol for \$1 per gallon less than petroleum-based gasoline right now,” she said.

While EPA gave its go ahead for E15, it may take more time before the higher blend is available at pumps in Nebraska and elsewhere. 

Ballpark work starts at Grandview
