Main Street Falls City, Inc. has been designated as an accredited National Main Street Program for meeting the commercial district revitalization performance standards set by the National Main Street Center®, a subsidiary of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Each year, the National Main Street Center and its partners announce the list of accredited Main Street® programs that have built strong revitalization organizations and demonstrate their ability in using the Main Street Four Point Approach® methodology for strengthening their local economy and protecting their historic buildings.

"We congratulate this year's nationally accredited Main Street programs for meeting our established performance standards," says Valecia Crisafulli, acting director of the National Main Street Center. "Accredited Main Street programs are meeting the challenges of the downtown in the economy head on and are successfully using a focused, comprehensive revitalization strategy to keep their communities vibrant and sustainable."

mance is annually evaluated by Heritage Nebraska Main Street, which works in partnership with the National Main Street Center to identify the local programs that meet 10 performance standards. Electronic Medical Records at CMC

Imagine you are on vacation and encounter some sort of medical issue. Your medical records, all on paper, are located hundreds if not thousands of miles away. Those records need to be accessed immediately.

Beginning May 1, Community Medical Center in Falls City has initiated EMR, or Electronic Medical Records, which will enable virtually instant accessibility to your vital information. Quickly sharing medical information can be a

lifesaver. And it is done privately.

CMC CEO Ryan Larsen said advances in healthcare often are "assisted with technology," but that many facilities have not yet taken advantage of the computerization that has taken place, certainly in medical records. "The technology is now in place," said Larsen, to store records electronically and that is "what patients and their families expect."

He said CMC recently completed a "lengthy selection process," involving board members,

Wind energy tax incentive bill advances

Nebraskans are keenly aware of a term called "wind chill" or the wind chill factor. It is the perceived decrease in air temperature felt by the body on exposed skin due to the flow of cold air. Said temperatures are always lower than the air temperature where the formula is valid. That would be just about everywhere. Likewise, the "heat index" is used to describe an apparent temperature higher than the air temperature.

The wind chill factor coming from the office of lame-duck Governor Dave Heineman has turned up the heat index on the Legislature's Revenue Committee and, most recently, on the 30 senators who gave first-round approval to a measure aimed at increasing the number of wind turbines being built in Nebraska.

The bill, LB104, offered by Omaha Democrat Steve Lathrop, a potential candidate for the post Heinemann will vacate in a couple years, would provide state tax incentives for companies that create sources of renewable energy. Lathrop said Nebraska is the fourth largest producer of wind energy but lacks economic incentives for companies to invest in the state. He said the state has wind energy potential and is facing a time-sensitive opportunity that can significantly grow Nebraska's economy.

His bill was amended by a Revenue Committee proposal, adopted 27-0, that essentially replaced the bill with provisions of LB501, a bill originally introduced by Senator Galen Hadley of Kearney. As amended, the bill would expand the definition of qualified business to include renewable energy producers in the existing incentive tiers. It also would define sources of renewable energy to include wind, solar, geothermal, hydroelectric, biomass and transmutation of elements.

Senator Jeremy Nordquist of Omaha said the discontinuation of federal production tax credits at the end of 2013 adds a sense of urgency. He noted that developers have to get projects started by the end of the year to get tax credits. Nordquist and Senator Jim Scheer of Norfolk urged colleagues to advance the bill to help get the developments started.

Nebraska has 11 operating so-called wind farms, ranging from two turbines built by the Lincoln Electric System north of the Capital City in 1998, to the 54 operating near Petersburg in Boone County. Eight projects are on the books, including 120 turbines planned near Elgin by the end of 2014 and a massive project — 1,000 wind turbines — planned for Banner County in Nebraska's Panhandle.

Scheer answered critics of the proposal by saying he doesn't care who owns the companies. "Nebraskans are going to build and maintain them. This is about providing employment and income for rural Nebraska."

Omaha Sen. Beau McCoy — one of the senators who carried a massive tax break bill that the Governor later dropped early on in the session — opposed the bill, saying the timing is not right for new incentives. He said he opposed the bill in committee as well because

there are a lot of priorities that have to be made this session.

In July 2010, Heineman wrote that wind energy has a bright future in Nebraska. These developments and future ones reflect Nebraska's commitment to clean energy, energy independence, rural economic development and the Good Life for all Nebraskans. In October 2012 he went on record thanking Edison Mission Energy for developing and operating its third wind energy project in Nebraska. He said that the company's continued investment in our state and our natural resource enhances Nebraska's portfolio of providing renewable energy sources.

Governors are certainly allowed

to change their minds. Former Governor Bob Kerrey used to change his mind and stand on major proposals almost daily. So, we'll give Heineman a pass for seeing things differently seven months later. But one has to wonder what's blowing in the wind this time. Is it more than just a matter of "priorities?"

Could it have something to do with the Governor not getting his way on his sweeping tax proposals in January? Or is it just more hot air, the kind that could probably turn a few turbine propellers and light a few more Nebraska homes economically and efficiently. Let's drop the grudges and illuminate the future.



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
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50 Years Ago

Ballpark Dedications

Following the Sunday, April 28 program that signaled the opening of the "Fiedler Family Ball Complex," first pitches were tossed at each of the new diamonds. Last week's Journal included photos of those initial pitches. Today, we recount the introductions (by Rod Vandenberg and Brian Poppe) before the ceremonial pitches (not necessarily in order).

SNC Field

Vandenberg said while he and others are used to the name 'Legion Field,' he believes the "name SNC Field is far more appropriate because it is representative of one of the few independently owned communications companies remaining in Nebraska.

He acknowledged director and owner Dorothy Towle, managers Ray Joy and Chuck Whitney and all SE Nebraska Communications employees, who are "considered her (Dorothy's) family," which includes sons Brian, Tom and Mike and daughter, Denise. Dorothy's "first and most important love is her family," said Vandenberg. He spoke about SNC's Fiber-to-the-Home project that will provide this area of southeast Nebraska with "a major advantage" in regard to future growth and development, as well as SNC's soon-to-be-implemented Skitter TV option. "This outstanding company and its owner and staff are constantly looking for nice things to do for this community in an attitude of 'giving back' to their community," Vandenberg said, describing SNC as "a unique and wonderful corporate citizen."

Hartman Field


Vandenberg explained that all of the fields bear the names of those who made "very generous, major" gifts to the ballpark fund drive. Ed and Sandy Hartman, he said, made their pledge early in the effort and "their gift could not have come at a better time as it gave us a second (after The Richardson Foundation pledge) 'jump start,' which added greatly to our successful fund-raising campaign!" He saluted the Hartmans for their efforts in other successful community projects, especially for the Falls City Library and Arts Center. The speaker said Ed and Sandy "are fortunate to have their entire family in Falls City," including son Scot, daughter Kristen and their families. He expressed "this community's sincere gratitude for the Hartmans' wonderful generosity."

F&M Bank Field

F&M Bank was described by Vandenberg as "another great corporate citizen in the community," and, headed by "three of the best bankers I have ever known, Merle Veigel, Kevin Malone and Tony Brunette," as "solid as the Rock of Gibraltar." F&M Bank (formerly First National Bank and Trust Co.), "has always been most generous in 'giving back' to its community," Vandenberg said. He expressed "this committee's most gracious thank you to F&M Bank and its entire staff for your very generous gift to this wonderful project."

Vandenberg Field

Brian Poppe introduced the Vandenberg family, and said "for many years Rod has been most generous in sharing his leadership skills with this community, as well as his dollars." His "monetary giving has been unprecedented as I know of no one who has exceeded the monetary gifts Rod and his family have made to this community." In addition to a major gift to the ball field project, "Rod led the very successful fund-raising campaign, which raised nearly \$2 million for this project," Poppe said. That may not have been possible "without Rod's leadership," he said. Poppe, on behalf of the community, thanked Vandenberg and his family "for all you have done for Falls City, as well as (for) your wonderful major gift to this ballpark project."



Some bits and pieces.

The May—June issue of "Nebraska Life" has an excellent feature story with the headline, "Broadcaster Lance Schwartz Covers Nebraska." Lance is the son of our Hank and Marcia and films and interviews people on "Lance's Journal," which is on Lincoln TV station 10-11 on Sunday and Wednesday evenings' news. He does an excellent job of it and comes by it naturally—his mother is a super writer and a published storyteller.

Lance has been at 10-11 since 2002 and previously did sports events while attending UNL, was a cameraman for HuskerVision at Cornhusker games and was sportscaster at North Platte and Kearney TV stations. And I'm sure he wouldn't mind me relating that he was a good footballer and basketballer at FCHS.

It was interesting to me that of six seniors with brief bios in the May issue of the Humboldt/Table Rock/Steinauer High School newsletter, "The Bolt," one was headed for the Marine Corps, one for the Army and one probably for some branch of the military.

Sometime back the Journal received a query about a playground on the northeast corner of 21st and Chase in the late 1930s or early 1940s. I kinda remembered a Dutch windmill root beer stand in that location but I wasn't around much during those years. Lucy Gist filled me in. Her dad, Glenn D. Martin, built and operated the One Stop and owned property in question. She did not recall a playground but sure there was a big Dutch windmill selling Hires root beer.

At that time Highway 73 entered Falls City on West 21st Street after coming in from Coon's Corner (just west of the Country Club) and between Towle and Stone there were three gas stations, Uncle Tom's Cabins (our first motel) and the colorful root beer stand. Nobody asked, but just for local history's sake, Highway 73 turned south on Stone at 21st Street, went through the business district to 7th Street, turned and went east to Morton Street, south around the curve and over to Fulton, then south over the railroad tracks, up Breezy Hill and into Kansas just like it does now.

This should be somewhat interesting to farmers and landowners who are paying big property tax bills. With some of the mementoes saved for who knows for what reason in one of my desk drawers was a 1896 postcard addressed to Mr. Ed S. Towle, Falls City, Neb.

"Dear Sir:

"The amount of taxes against your four forties in Nemaha Tsp. is \$25.38. Amount of the Road Receipt \$1.00 can be used. If you wish to pay to the Tsp. remit above amount to above address and oblige.

"Rice Page

"Treas. Of Nemaha Tsp."

The moving of City Hall to the former Family Medicine Clinic over the weekend stirred a memory of my visit to City Hall when I was about 10 or so.

At that time City Hall was located on the second floor of the Lydia Bruun Woods Memorial Library. It definitely was not handicapped accessible (an unknown two words back then) and for those with some age on them those steps were very, very long and steep. For a kid it was only two steps at a time.

I had a somewhat collie named Spot (as were lots of 57 brand pooches) and it was time to renew her license. My dad gave me the buck or so for the license and told me to tell the clerk that Spot was a denaturalized female, making the cost less.

City Clerk Russell Pollard, later the water and light department superintendent, waited on me and he asked, "Male for female?"

"Female," I answered, "and she's been denaturalized."

Russ and his assistants, Merle Sutton and Evelyn Eaton, began laughing—at what I had no idea—but so did my mom and dad when I got home and related the miscue. Mr. Pollard never forgot that Spot was denaturalized and in later years occasionally reminded me of it.

staff and doctors and several trips to different hospitals, before deciding on the best system for the local medical center. After the selection was made, the system was installed and hospital and clinic staff members have been reviewing the process that "captures needed information and tracks it all," Larsen explained.

The EMR system, Larsen said, represents a \$3.5 million investment.

Larsen said the system went "live" on May 1. Updates will be made for at least a year to come.

So, what should patients expect? At first, a bit longer visit. CMC and Family Medicine Clinic ask that patients arrive 15 minutes prior to an appointment and bring the following information: current photo ID; insurance cards; advanced directive/POA with signed consent forms; medication list; allergy list. The idea is to "assure safe care," Larsen said, regardless of where that care may be delivered.

Eventually, those vital records will be able to be moved virtually anywhere and instantly.

Larsen assured CMC and clinic patients that they will receive the "same great care and personal touch." He said past hospital administrations have urged the implementation of EMR, and that while CMC "wasn't behind," EMR will "help us keep pace." In fact, EMR "will take us a couple of generations ahead."

Change is not easy, the administrator said, and lots of plans had to be double-checked. But the staff is now ready and patients should not "feel our learning curve."

Larsen said converting to EMR "was the right thing to do as a community hospital going forward." Doctors "want these technologies," he said, especially young or new doctors.

When the Journal recently visited CMC, Mary Campbell

was a patient under the care of Dr. David Borg. "I think it's great," Mary said, noting that the new system will "insure no mistakes" on such things as medication. Nurse Cheryl Finck, who was attending Mary, described the new system and "exciting and challenging" and "more user friendly," making "health history research so much easier." Presently (but not for long) patients' health histories are "part paper and part computer." But before long, those histories will be "all computer," Cheryl said.

Nurse Ann Hoy, who also was helping with Mary's care, said "patient safety is enhanced" with the EMR system. "It is all there," she said of the easily accessed computerized records. Ann described the system as "more efficient" and allowing for "fewer chances for error."

Better hearing, speech month

Since 1927, the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association has celebrated Better Hearing and Speech Month each May to raise awareness of speech and language disorders that affect 14 million Americans.

Speech and language disorders can take many forms and can limit academic achievement, social adjustment and career advancement. An individual may be born with a speech or language disorder, or it may be caused by accidental injury or illness.

"Fortunately, most people with speech and language problems can be helped," said Falls City's Speech/Language Pathologists, Jo Crawford, Tracie Heckenlively and Sherry Maddox, who provides services in the local schools. "Even if the problem cannot be eliminated, we can teach people with speech and language problems strategies to help them cope. People may not fully regain their capacity to speak and understand, but a speech-language pathologist can help them live more independently."

Speech-language pathologists are the professionals who treat all types of speech, language and related disorders. They hold at least a master's degree and are certified by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association. In Nebraska, they also are licensed by the state. Speech-language pathologists work in schools, private practice, hospitals, clinics and other health and education settings.

The American Speech-Language-Hearing Association is the national professional, scientific and credentialing association for more than 145,000 audiologists, speech-language pathologists and speech, language and hearing scientists.

Falls City High athletes were recognized Sunday night for their efforts the past year during the 43rd annual Tiger Booster Athletic Club Banquet, held at the Falls City Elk's Lodge.

The Elk's officers prepared and served the meal, then newly installed

Exalted Ruler Josh Ramer welcomed and thanked those.

The guest speaker for the night was Tim Wilson, a 1976 Falls City High graduate who currently serves as the Strength and Conditioning Coordinator for the University of Nebraska Men's Basketball Program. Wilson just finished his second season with the Huskers after spending three seasons at the University of Oregon. Wilson spent 11 seasons in the NBA working with the Milwaukee Bucks and had stops at the University of Pittsburgh, UNLV and the Chicago White Sox.

Wilson shared stories about working with baseball Hall of Famer Carlton Fisk, NBA head coach George Karl and one of the greatest shooters in NBA history, Ray Allen.

Wilson pointed to four important traits a person should possess in order to be successful, in any endeavors. The four traits he noted were being passionate, a great work ethic, persistence and learning from mistakes.

"Some times there is a fine line between success and failure, you don't even know you are standing on it," Wilson said. "If you are just a little more persistent, give a little bit more effort you can go over that line to success."

Wilson compared this to a stone-cutter, who repeatedly hits the stone without seeing any results, but will not

give in or quit because of frustration.

"This guy hits this big stone 99 times and he's not even making a dent in it. Then, on the 100th strike, it splits in two. The accumulation of hits because of persistence finally broke that stone. You have to be persistent. You have to hang in there. And if you do those things, at some point, you'll go over from being a failure to being successful.

"Failure is like fertilizer. It helps future things grow. And always remember this, the road to success is always under construction."

The Tiger coaches then gave brief summaries of their seasons and handed out team and individual awards.

Booster Club Secretary Kristen Poppe presented 31 student-athletes with Scholar Athlete Awards. Booster Club Treasurer Judy Ivey and past president Gina Scheitel handed out the six Tiger Booster Club Scholarships – Claire Poppe, Cord Huettner, Tressa Chandler, Wade Maddox, Wade Witt and David von Behren.

The final awards handed out were for Outstanding Girl and Boy athlete. Seniors Claire Poppe and Cord Huettner, who both received the award as juniors and were the clear favorites to repeat, were honored again as the Outstanding Girl and Boy Athletes.

Outgoing Lady Tiger head softball coach Joe Dunn, as he did a year ago, presented Poppe with the award.

"I feel very honored to be giving this award away to such a deserving young lady," Dunn said. "She was a great role model to all her teammates. She will be missed and always remembered for her accomplishments as a student-athlete at Falls City Public Schools."

In softball this past fall, Poppe was the offensive player of the year, pitcher of the year and was voted as the team's most valuable player. She was a first-team All-State selection in Class C by the *Lincoln Journal Star* and was vital in leading FC to a school-record 21 wins. Poppe set single-season records in 2012 in batting average (.489), runs scored (41), hits (46), doubles (11), homeruns (9), on-base percentage (.560) and RBIs (38). Poppe was also FC's ace on the mound and set a new single-season mark for wins with 21 and finished just three strikeouts (104) shy of Laura Jones 2005 total.

Claire, whose parents are Brian and Kristen Poppe, was a three-year starter for head coach Max Milam and the Lady Tigers basketball team. She broke the school record this past season with 49 made 3-pointers en route to the fifth best single season point total (297) in school history. Her 530 career points ranks 13th all-time at FC.

Poppe has also competed in track all four years and leads the girls' team in scoring this season.

Big Red Recruiting Report

In-State News

Nebraska's coaches have been on the road recruiting and making offers during the spring evaluation period. This year has been a little different nationally, as the number of early commits is down from prior years. Still, NU having only one commit (Lincoln SE athlete **Luke Gifford**) is somewhat concerning. With the recent blitz of offers going out, expect Gifford to have some company soon.

The top in-state possibilities continue to be Lincoln SE offensive lineman **D.J. Foster** (6-3/327) and Millard West def. end **Harrison Phillips** (6-4/246). However, recent success on the combine circuit has vaulted Gretna defensive end **Mick Stoltenberg** (6-6/248) into the fold also.

At the Rivals Camp Series (RCS) in St. Louis, Mo. Stoltenberg was named the No. 6 overall defensive performer. He followed that up with impressive testing numbers at the Under Armour All-Nebraska Top 50 Combine in Lincoln. Stoltenberg ran a 4.89-second electronically-timed 40-yard dash and did 26 reps of 185 pounds on the bench press. He has the frame to easily add 20-30 pounds and could get even bigger. Rumor is that both Iowa and Kansas State are close to offering him. Will Nebraska follow, or will they offer Phillips instead or neither prospect?

Phillips' biggest offer at this point is Kansas State, but he also holds 10 other offers from schools such as Northern Illinois, Harvard, Yale and Florida Atlantic. Nebraska has asked him to camp this summer where they can fully evaluate him for an offer.

Foster continues to add Big Ten and SEC offers, with Florida and Georgia as the two biggest names. NU holds a good position with him, but if Alabama drops in it may be too much for the Huskers to overcome.

Linemen are Key

NU has needs on both sides of the ball along the front lines, specifically at offensive tackle where NU will graduate three of their top four players after the 2013 season.

The biggest name still on NU's radar is **Braden Smith** (6-6/292) of Olathe, KS. Smith holds dozens of offers from around the nation, and recently visited Michigan, Ohio State and Notre Dame unofficially. The Irish, TCU and Texas A&M are his current leaders, but I don't believe Smith will decide anytime soon. If NU can somehow get him to visit during the season they might be able to keep the nation's No. 2 tackle prospect near home.

Brian Wallace (6-6/297) of St. Louis is considering NU, along with offers from Iowa, Missouri, Arkansas and Georgia. Wallace was dominant at the St. Louis RCS in limited reps, and has college coaches intrigued.

Another recent offer for NU was Victoria, MN, lineman Frank Ragnow (6-5/284). Florida State and Missouri are also hot after Ragnow who visited Lincoln during spring practice. Although he isn't ready to decide yet, Ragnow was excited about the Husker offer.

Defensively, **Khairi Clark** (6-2/325) of Hollywood, FL, is near the top of NU's list. The Huskers made his recent cut to six schools along with Clemson, Florida, Georgia, Miami and Notre Dame. He's said that Miami leads, and a recent visit to Florida had him strongly considering the Gators, as well. It's an uphill battle for NU, but if they can get Clark on campus this fall things could turn.

Nearby prospects **Taven Bryan** (6-5/250) of Casper, Wyo., **Billy Hirschfeld** (6-6/270) of Hartland, Wis., and **Peyton Newell** (6-3/280) of Hiawatha, Kan. are others to keep an eye on. Bryan and Hirschfeld both visited Lincoln for the Red-White game and enjoyed their time on campus as well as meeting each other.

"My favorite part was between the fans and the weight room. If I had to pick I'd say the fans, they were pretty awesome," Bryan told Huskeronline.com. "I also had fun meeting some of the other recruits. I met [Billy Hirschfeld]. He's a big kid, 6-foot-6, 270-pounds, and was a pretty cool kid."

Bryan also holds offers from Oregon, Washington, and Tennessee while Hirschfeld is weighing Wisconsin and Michigan State among others. NU's in good position with both.

Newell was scheduled to attend the spring game but did not make it. NU has made him a high priority, as line coach John Garrison continues to check in with him weekly. 247Sports.com predicts that Newell will pledge to the Huskers during the summer – holding off South Carolina, Kansas and Kansas State.

At quarterback, Nebraska will be selective after signing Tommy Armstrong and Johnny Stanton in the past two classes. I expect them to take at least one and possibly two players, with one of them being an athlete who could switch positions a la Jamal Turner and Alonzo Moore.

NU's top two targets right now are **Brandon Harris** (6-3/186) of Bossier City, La. and **Zack Darlington** (6-1/205) of Apopka, Fla.

Harris recently added Ohio State to his 15-plus offers which include Texas A&M and Arkansas. Recruiting coach Terry Joseph has done a great job, and Harris recently told Huskeronline.com, "I love their quarterback (Taylor Martinez). I think he is one of the best quarterbacks in the country. His running style and what he is able to do with his legs is similar to what I can do."

With Urban Meyer now in play, Joseph will have to ratchet up his pursuit of Harris.

Darlington has been near of the top of NU's list (and vice versa) since the Huskers held their Citrus Bowl practices at his school the past two Januaries. Tim Beck has developed a strong relationship with both Darlington and his high school coach, who also happens to be his father. The question is whether that relationship can withstand the onslaught of Urban Meyer, as the Buckeyes also offered Darlington this past week.

Quarterbacks usually commit in bunches, as there are few slots available. Harris has publically stated that he will make his decision July 5, which should trigger Darlington's choice as well.

One other top prospect who is starting to blow up nationally is wide receiver **Monte Harrison** (6-3/190) of Lee's Summit, Mo. Nebraska was in on Harrison early and still sits at the top of his list. He was named the offensive MVP of the St. Louis Rivals Camp and already lists Arkansas, Iowa and Michigan State among his numerous offers. The Huskers will have to work hard to keep him interested as other schools join the fray.

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New shotput record at FCSH

Athletes from both Falls City Sacred Heart and Falls City High competed at last Monday's Auburn Junior Varsity Invitational. Schools were allowed to enter more competitors, both varsity and junior varsity, due to the cancellations of so many events.

Falls City Sacred Heart sophomore Emily Rohrer highlighted the event with her school-record-breaking throw in the shot put. Rohrer's throw of 38 feet, 7.5 inches captured first place and broke Jenny Koelzer's heave of 37 feet, 11.5 inches set in 2006. Rohrer also captured third place in the discus with a throw of 95 feet, 10 inches.

Irish senior Kathryn Bieker claimed first place in the 1600-meter run and along with freshman Maggie Goltz, sophomore Kelsi Fouraker and junior Rachel Parrish, helped take home first in the 1600-meter relay team.

Goltz finished first in the triple jump and fourth in the long jump. Sophomores Abby and Elizabeth Magdanz were second and third, respectively, in the pole vault, while freshman Natalie Kreifels was sixth in the event. Sophomore Nicole Fiegenger took third in the 1600 meters; Fouraker was third in the 400; Elizabeth finished third in the 800 and Parrish was fourth in the 100-meter hurdles.

Falls City High sophomores Jordan and Morgan Phroper and freshman Faith Williams were the only Lady Tiger participants and finished eighth, 16th and 28th, respectively, in the shot put. Jordan was 13th and Mor-

gan 15th in the discus.

The Tiger boy's lone competitor was freshman Montana Mirelez, who competed in the discus and finished 24th.

The Irish boys fared well with first-place finishes in six events. Junior Jarod Fiegenger was first in the shot put; sophomore Austin Malone was first in the triple jump; tops in the 100-meter dash was sophomore Sawyer Kean, as was junior Yianni Haralabidis in the 200 meters. Finally, both the 400-meter relay team (Colin Niemeyer, Haralabidis, Chaz Dunn and Malone) and 1600-meter relay team (Haralabidis, Kean, Malone and Henry Arnold) captured first place.


Finck awarded Cecil Murphy Scholarship

an University in Lincoln in the fall with the intent to play softball for the Prairie Wolves.

Cord Huettner is the son of Jim and Mary Jo Huettner and was a three-sport athlete for the Tigers all four years. Huettner was a three-year starter in football and basketball and qualified for the State Track Meet and in the shot put as a junior and could very easily qualify in the same event at Thursday's Class B-1 District Meet in Auburn.

Huettner's 356 points on the hardwood this past winter ranked 15th all-time for single-season scoring and in three varsity seasons for head coach Don Hogue, he climbed all the way up to seventh in career scoring with 855 points, despite being one of the smaller "bigs" in southeast Nebraska at 6 feet 2 inches. Huettner helped lead FC to 23 wins in 2012-13, which tied the school record for single-season wins set in 2009-10 and the Tigers 13-0 start this winter was the best in school history. He was a part of 74 wins, three district finals and a member of the 2010 Class C1 State Qualifier.

Tiger head football coach Darin Fritz introduced Huettner and presented him with his award.

"A coach could not ask for a better leader, or role model," Fritz said about Huettner. "Along with his talent, he is a student of the game and is a tireless worker in the weight room and the class room. Above and beyond all that, he is a great person with a great heart. He defines the word teammate."

Huettner excelled on the gridiron and helped rejuvenate a Tiger football program that prior to last September had dropped 13 games in a row. His 6-2, 210-pound frame presented opposing tacklers plenty of problems, as few teams had an answer for Huettner, whose toughness was second-to-none and his deceptive speed helped him pull away in the open field.

Huettner showed the entire repertoire in the 54-7 dismantling of Lincoln Lutheran on Homecoming. In the first half, Huettner gashed Lutheran for 313 rushing yards, five rushing touchdowns and added a 25-yard touchdown pass. Huettner finished the game with a new single-game school record for rushing yards with 369.

Cord was a member of the *Lincoln Journal Star's* All-C1 offense and the *Omaha World Herald* selected him to their All-C1 defense as a linebacker. Huettner led the Tigers with 95 tackles, 38 of which were solo.

He leaves the Tiger football program as the career leader in rushing yards with 2,403 yards and his 1,418 yards last fall ranks second all-time at FC for single-season rushing yards.

Cord is also headed to Lincoln in the fall and will attend Nebraska Wesleyan University with the intent to join his older brother Michael on the Prairie Wolves football team.

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The Huskers' Hero

Childhood is a time for growing – growing bodies, growing minds, and growing hearts. It is a special, brief time given to us by God to live without fear or physical pain, or the burdens of responsibility.

For too many children, though, childhood is very different. Many are forced to grow up too quickly and learn hard lessons of courage from the cruel, unyielding teacher of sickness.

Despite this premature transition from innocence to the harsh realities of life, these children remain beacons of hope. They challenge us to overcome our own seemingly trivial trials in comparison to the heavy burdens they shoulder. They prompt us all to believe in the power of miracles, because they have no other choice.

One such child is a friend and personal hero of mine, Jack Hoffman.

Many Nebraskans are familiar with Jack's story. Jack is a remarkable 7-year old boy born and raised in Atkinson, Nebraska.

He experienced a childhood like many children his age in Nebraska, but his life abruptly changed two years ago when Jack suffered a sudden, life-threatening seizure. Upon examination, doctors discovered heartbreaking news: Jack had brain cancer.

The two surgeries he endured to remove the cancerous mass on his brain did not bring about the ultimate results physicians hoped, and doctors determined the remaining cancerous mass was inoperable.

Jack quickly began 60 weeks of chemotherapy, employing an outdated regimen used by doctors for over 25 years. Unfortunately, reduced research funding for pediatric brain cancer has stunted medical advancements and treatment options remain limited.

However, Jack and his parents remained hopeful and determined to discover God's will in their hardships. The Hoffmans set out to raise awareness of pediatric brain cancer, a rare, devastating disease that poses unique health and developmental problems for the 3,000 child patients diagnosed each year.

Jack and other children suffering from brain cancer endure seizures, difficulty speaking, and trouble with their balance. The list, unfortunately, goes on.

Many Nebraskans have been inspired by Jack's story, but he was introduced to most Americans after becoming an overnight football star at the Huskers spring football game on April 6, 2013. Jack suited up with football pads and a Number 22 jersey and fearlessly ran 69 yards to score a touchdown in front of 60,000 screaming fans at Memorial Stadium in Lincoln.

In a single dash across the gridiron, little Jack Hoffman touched the hearts of millions of Americans – including 7.6 million YouTube viewers – and increased awareness of pediatric brain cancer.

It didn't take a touchdown, though, to make Jack a hero. Jack's courage and resilience represent the very best of the human spirit – and the very best in our nation.

Jack and the Hoffmans' have demonstrated an unwavering commitment to turn their personal trial into a force for good. The Hoffmans' fundraising efforts through the "Team Jack" campaign have yielded over \$300,000 for pediatric brain cancer research.

Although there are countless worthy charities across America, my husband, Bruce, and I feel a special connection with Team Jack and have worked closely with the Hoffman family to increase awareness of pediatric brain cancer.

Last week, the Senate unanimously adopted a bipartisan resolution I offered with Senator Amy Klobuchar (D-Minn.) to recognize the unique struggles of pediatric brain cancer patients and their families. It commends the scientists, researchers, and healthcare providers working tirelessly to modernize and improve diagnosis and treatment options. And, importantly, it designates September 26, 2013, as "National Pediatric Brain Cancer Awareness Day" to encourage efforts toward the early diagnosis and ultimate cure of the disease.

We hope and pray the efforts of medical researchers will someday lead to a cure for the thousands of children suffering from pediatric brain cancer and their families.

In the meantime, young heroes like Jack Hoffman press on in the face of their challenges with enduring courage and optimism, reminding us that in an often dark and frightening world, some of the brightest lights are often the smallest.

Thank you for taking part in our democratic process, and I'll visit with you again next week.



Peru State College science professor awarded National Science Foundation grant

Peru State College Professor of Biology Dr. Michael Barger has been awarded a \$267,000 grant by the National Science Foundation to conduct a biodiversity survey and inventory of parasites in fish in the Big Thicket National Preserve in Texas.

Barger's grant, which runs through 2016, brings the total amount of National Science Foundation grants awarded to Peru State faculty to well over \$1 million in the past 17 years.

Vice President for Academic Affairs Dr. Todd Drew said, "It's gratifying to see our science department's work and national reputation in parasitology rewarded with another NSF grant. These grants are not just an opportunity to advance our understanding of the natural world; they are opportunities for uniquely engaging educational experiences for our science students who often plan to go on to graduate school."

The NSF grant will fund at least two stipends for undergraduate research each year. Students will participate in collecting field trips, laboratory work to process and identify parasites, describe species new to science, publish results in peer-reviewed journals, and present findings in platform presentations at regional and national scientific conferences.

Barger said there are two primary goals to the grant's research. First, the work is part of an All Taxa Biodiversity Inventory in the BTNP, which is an effort to document and catalogue all of the species of organisms (microbiological, animal, plant, fungi) that occur in the historical Big Thicket area. The NSF grant will allow Barger to greatly expand and accelerate the pace of the work that he began in 2007, including the discovery of species previously unknown to science.

Second, Barger will test hypotheses related to the utility of the BTNP as a conservation unit. He will use parasites of fish as indicators of overall biodiversity and key ecological interactions in the BTNP to determine if areas protected by the preserve successfully maintain more diverse and healthier communities of animals than do similar areas not protected by the preserve. The tests may be of practical utility in the design of future conservation preserves and in setting priorities for acquisition of land for the BTNP itself. Barger hopes to be able to shed a bit of light not only on what is there, but also on how it can be effectively managed for future generations.

Barger said, "NSF grant panels are highly competitive, so getting funded for this work is a great thrill and I look forward to doing the work to make it successful. The Peru State Department of Natural Sciences has an excellent and growing reputation for high-quality education and training in the sciences. Our faculty are dedicated to maintaining the highest standards of rigor in the education of our students, and we work together to provide opportunities for professional growth that allow our students to transform the hard work we demand of them into successful futures in their chosen fields. Funding like this allows us to expand and intensify those efforts and more fully immerse our students in genuine scientific exploration and discovery.

"We are in the business of turning students of science into scientists, and mentored undergraduate research is the best way to do so. When the grant term is over, there will be papers published, presentations given, hypotheses tested, databases filled in, and the like; but, the most lasting and important outcome will be those students who are now pursuing their own careers as scientists."

Since his arrival at Peru State in 2001, Barger has published a number of scholarly works in

peer-reviewed publications and has been a presenter at several regional, national and international meetings. He has also served as a reviewer for nine academic journals, the NSF, and in leadership roles in a variety of scientific societies. He is a member of the American Society of Parasitologists, the Ecological Society of America, the Helminthological Society of Washington and the Southwestern Association of Parasitologists.

Barger has developed eight new courses at PSC and has secured five other research grants during his tenure at the institution. Under his guidance and leadership, several of Barger's students have won awards for their research presentations and have pursued graduate study in the scientific field. He also led the design and implementation of the college's Honors Program.

Barger is past chair of the PSC Faculty Senate and the General Education Committee. In 2009, Barger was named PSC's Teacher Excellence Award winner.

An Arlington, Neb., native, Barger earned a Bachelor's degree in biological sciences and a Master's degree in parasitology from the University of Nebraska - Lincoln. He earned a Ph.D. in ecology and parasitology from Wake Forest University.

2.2 Principal Reports:

2.2a Ernie Valentine for North School reported on the following: Student enrollment is 213 students; parent-teacher conferences went well and had a 95% turnout of parents/guardians and strong support for the Scholastic Book Fair; the Math RtI Team completed their final training with Dr. Lemke at ESU 4; curriculum teams have started meeting to update curriculum maps and make suggestions on improving instruction for 2013-14 school year; Principal Valentine will attend the State Conference in Kearney on April 29 and 30; NeSA testing has begun and MAPS will start soon.

2.2b J.P. Holys for South School reported on the following: Student enrollment is 186 students; Laurel Valentine, Kris Ogle, Cece Simon and Denise Kurgeweit will attend the NETA Technology Conference in Papillion-LaVista April 25-26; North School 2nd graders will go to South School on May 2nd for an orientation as they prepare to transition to 3rd grade in the fall, and 5th graders will visit FCMS May 8th for their orientation; 4th, 5th and 6th grade field day is scheduled for April 19th at 12:45 p.m. and 3rd grade field day is scheduled for April 30th at 1 p.m., to be held at Jug Brown Stadium; Life Skills students will attend an annual Prom Event sponsored by NCECBVI in Nebraska City April 25th, which consists

of a formal dinner, dance, and post prom activities; April 22nd the 3rd grade will go to the Peru State College Math Event. ZNEZ

2.2c Rick Johnson for Middle School reported on the following: Students of the Month: Jessica Burns, Meredith Poppe, and Hannah Pfohl; Parent-Teacher Conferences was well attended with 92% of parents/guardians in attendance; Chautauqua Night is April 15th from 6-7:30 p.m.; April 16th Internet Safety Presentation to Middle School students by ESU4 Greg Robke; April 18th is the School Safety/Intruder Meeting with law enforcement, fire dept. and administration team; the Quiz Bowl with Sacred Heart is April 22nd, 5-7 p.m.; April 30th is the Band/Chorus Concert at Middle School at 7 p.m.; Supt. Johnson attended the Principal/Teacher/Pilot Committee meetings on March 12-13 and will attend a Marzano sponsored meeting in Lincoln April 23, and the NDE meeting April 24th in Lincoln; NeSA testing has begun and will continue through next week and also MAPS testing begins; the band students attended their first local competition at HTRS Middle School and did very well with students also performing in small groups or solo and brought home ten superiors and two excellent ratings and the band as a whole receiving an excellent rating; there are 67 boys and girls participating in track; and the student enrollment is 178 students; the FCMS calendar of events is on the school website.

2.2d Gale Dunkhas for High School reported on the following: Student enrollment is 261 students; Teacher In-Service was a very productive and timely work session for the upcoming NeSA and MAPS testing; NeSA testing is currently underway and MAPS will begin shortly; Parent-Teacher Conference attendance was some higher this year with 65% parents/guardians in attendance; Why Am I Tempted (W.A.I.T.) Training is coming back to Falls City on May 1st with Shelly Donahue presenting to four student groups and a parents meeting; student registrations have been collected and the process of setting the 2013-14 schedule has begun; there was an excellent turnout for the 8th grade registration event; the Red Cross Bloodmobile was a success and Sara Barker and the National Honor Society and Student Council students doing a tremendous job hosting it; Palmer and Dunkhas are recommending that the admission prices and season passes remain the same for the 2013-14 school year; Graduation will be held on May 12th at Prichard Auditorium; Ernie Valentine will replace Roger Windle as Head Wrestling Coach for the 2013-14 season; Students of the Month are Rasmus Nurmimen, Kirstyn Buchholz, Morgen Valentine, and Maygan Ramsey; important calendar dates were listed and can be found on the school website.

2.3 Board President's Report: President Hollens had no report at this time.

Board Member Kathy Bartek was unable to attend the NRCSA Conference recently held in Kearney. To honor Mrs. Bartek, Mr. Jack Moles, NRCSA Co-Chair of the Awards Committee, Mr. John Bonaiuto, Government Relations, NASB/NCSA, and Dr. Jon Habben, NRCSA Executive Director and former Superintendent of District 56, made a surprise visit to this meeting for Mrs. Bartek and presented her with the "Outstanding School Board Member Award." This award is annually presented at the NRCSA Conference. The administration, Board members and others present at the meeting expressed their gratitude and congratulations to Mrs. Bartek for the well-deserved award. Members of Mrs. Bartek's family were also in attendance for the presentation.

2.4 Superintendent Report:

2.4a Legislative and Organizations Report: Per LB 408, the certification date for 2013-2014 State Aid and Budgeting Factors has been changed from on or before March 1, to on or before June 1, 2013.

The Retirement Committee has not yet advanced any major legislation for first round consideration. The committee is waiting to receive reports from the state's appointed actuary to make certain the pending legislation is actuarially sound. The reports should be received sometime this week for the School Employees, Judges, and State Patrol defined benefit plans. LB 553 will be the legislative vehicle for changes to all three state sponsored defined benefit plans and also the OPS (Class V) Retirement Plan. LB 553 is designated as a priority bill for the Retirement Committee.

LB 470 is the superintendent contract transparency bill by Sen. Scheer, and will need to be closely watched. Essentially, the bill will require school boards to post the contract of a new superintendent to the district's homepage within 48 hours after the board approves the contract. For existing superintendents, the board would be required to post the superintendent's contract to the district's homepage three days prior to the board taking action on the superintendent's contract. The board would also be required to submit the superintendent's contract annually to NDE.

LB 346 introduced by Senator Kolowski, addresses safety and security. This bill would require a 1-cent spending lid exclusion and a levy limit exclusion. Most likely, this bill is expected to stay in committee until next year. The main issue with this bill is that it would increase the local tax.

LB 276 – Nordquist, is a Medicaid expansion bill that would expand services available for Medicaid reimbursement and increase reimbursement rates. This would directly affect the

reimbursement process schools participate in with their speech-language pathologists, occupational therapists, and physical therapists. However, this bill carries a hefty price tag and would require reduction to other government programs.

LB 407 – Sullivan, addresses a change in the calculation provisions under the Tax Equity and Educational Opportunities Support Act. Expect a great deal of debate on this bill as schools of varying sizes lobby for provisions most beneficial to their particular sized district.

The Nebraska School Law Seminar is June 7 in Kearney, featuring a full-day presentation of the Nebraska Council of School Attorneys covering changes in the laws and regulations governing schools.

2.4b Building & Grounds Update: Projects are being planned and scheduled for spring and summer. One of the boilers at middle school that has been giving us problems for the past month has been diagnosed as having a crack in the heat exchanger part of the boiler, determined by the Plibrico technician. The parts and labor to repair the boiler will be in the neighborhood of \$10,000. Fortunately, some of the equipment replacements are under warranty, and the remainder of the cost will be submitted as a claim to ALICAP/Hartford Boiler Insurance. In the past, they have been excellent in covering all claims, minus our deductible. The work is scheduled to begin later in April.

Pro-Track & Tennis was here to re-appear the track where it is separating.

2.4c School Improvement & District Goals: With a focus on the District Goal of Improving Student Achievement and our School Improvement Goal of Problem Solving (Math) and a continued emphasis on reading instruction, the administration recommends reallocating resources and instructional time at the Middle School in 2013-2014, in order to support a much more focused instructional strategy designed to provide directed interventions that support the RTI process and interventions for students at-risk of meeting acceptable proficiency on the Nebraska State Standards.

The instructional initiative will require the addition of a half-time, appropriately endorsed teacher. The funds to support this additional half-time position will be recouped from a combination of sources including the elimination of a 1.0FTE paraeducator position, the discontinuation of a .25 Spanish position, and Federal Title I grant funds, requiring no additional district expenditures.

The Intervention Program teacher's main goal will be to assist students and provide targeted intervention strategies that will contribute to their math and reading skill level in the small group setting. Responsibilities of the Intervention Program teacher will include implementing strategic support curriculum and appropriate supporting materials. The teacher will provide continuity with skills being taught in the classroom by communicating with the student's classroom teacher on a regular basis. The teacher will monitor data to assist in the intervention process. The teacher will provide the core classroom teachers, principal, and parents with information on an on-going basis regarding the student's academic progress. The instructional activities of the Intervention Program will relate to measurable student outcomes through the continuous small group instructional format provided by the program. Growth and progress will be assessed through measures on an every 2-3 week pattern and formally assessed 3 times per year with NWEA-MAPS. The data from these assessments will assist in program evaluation and instructional decision-making.

The Middle School principal and faculty will continue to monitor all the students with both the NeSA and the MAPS assessment. Progress updates will continue to be reported to the board through the Data Retreat Report, Board Retreat, and monthly meetings. This plan would continue to increase the focus on student learning, especially in the areas of math and reading.

Additionally, to enhance the Continuous Improvement Mission of Falls City Public Schools, the administration and faculty continue to investigate 1:1 instructional technology (TIGR's) at the high school (Innovative, Resourceful, Resilient, Responsible) Learning Initiative. Possible benefits for students at Falls City High school include becoming more information literate through daily instruction and exposure to the technology of 1:1 iPads. In modeling the characteristics of the mission, the learners will utilize these tools to develop a strong ability to collaborate, communicate, and solve problems to better prepare themselves for continuing education and jobs in the modern workforce.

The 1:1 initiative's impact on student achievement, engagement, curriculum delivery, and financial sustainability all continue to be issues that deserve a careful consideration before recommending a move to the 1:1 learning environment at Falls City High. More information will develop as our continued research into the 1:1 technology environment advances.

2.4d Staffing Plan Update: Interviews for a third grade teacher position are complete with a recommendation for contract approval at the May 13 Board meeting. Principal Holys stated that he has received a verbal acceptance from Kelsey Haug, a Peru State College graduate, who is highly recommended. Considerations for a school psychologist and a Middle School teacher will also be recommended for Board approval in May. The District anticipates vacancies for special education paraeducators for the 2013-14

school year.

2.4e Policy Planning: Policy subject area for second reading: 1) Policy Code 9110 The Implementation of the Individuals with Disabilities Act of 2004. The policy revisions and updates individually address each of NDE's "Checklist of required policies, procedures and practices." Also, some headings have minor title changes.

Additionally, I will be forwarding draft policy language to the board policy committee as it relates to the pilot principal and teacher evaluation policies that will need to be updated and adopted prior to 2013-14 school year.

2.5 Reports by Board members and/or Board Committees: Board Member Teresa Olberding reported that she attended the NRCSA Conference in Kearney and was very proud of the Show Choir's performance prior to the meeting. Heckenlively also commented that they had a great performance and received many compliments from those in attendance. Olberding also commented that the Show Choir then competed at Norfolk and took home a 2nd place trophy. Olberding stated that they make our school proud.

3.1 2013-2014 School Lunch Prices: Heckenlively reported that he has spoken with Carol Zimmerman, Nutrition Services Supervisor, and due to the increasing cost of food and the passing of the Healthy, Hunger-Free Kids Act which requires the purchase of additional and higher priced food to be in compliance, school lunch programs are struggling financially.

It was moved by John Martin and seconded by Scott Huppert to provide General Fund support to the school lunch program by payment of insurance for the nutrition staff for the months of June, July, and August, and to increase adult meals by \$.25 to \$.340. Discussion was had by the Board and administration with various other suggestions on how the lunch program could be changed. 

We want you to realize that there is a rare well kept secret in Richardson County. Shubert, Nebraska has one of the nicest village libraries in the area tucked away in a refurbished building on it's main Street.

The Shubert Library Museum is located at 113 Main St. The Museum has the class pictures and memorabilia from the high school, as well as collections of pictures of Shubert's early days, when Shubert had a doctor and many active businesses.


The library has been active since the early 1970's. Men from the community volunteered to build the library book shelves which still are in use. We have around 3,000 books in our adult and children's section. The books and authors are currently being put in a soft ware program so we can search for items. There are 10-15 magazine subscriptions which can be checked out. People with laptops can come in and use our facility for wireless internet connection. Joining the library costs \$0.25 for six months and \$0.50 a year.

Our library is open on Tuesdays from 4:30-6 p.m. and Saturdays from 8:30-10:30 a.m. The facility is manned by a seven-member board and a honary life member. Telephone numbers are displayed in the window so anyone can make arrangements to come in at another time.

We try to create community events. We offer a \$250 scholarship to any high school student that lives in Shubert and our rural area. We have had a summer reading program. In December we invite Santa to come. In the last couple of years we have had sleigh rides. An ingenious man, Bob and Cathy Davis from Stella, refurbished a golf cart to look like a sleigh and he and his wife offer rides during the holidays.

Christmas 2012 we had 40 children come to the library to have their pictures taken with Santa. Each child is offered a gift bag and refreshments are offered.
