RIOT REPORT: WHO KNEW WHAT AND WHEN COULD HAVE MADE A DIFFERENCE

It's that age-old question of government and politics: Who knew
what and when? In the case of an
independent report on the May
2015 riot at the Nebraska State
Prison in Tecumseh that left two Prison in Tecumsen that left two dead, that question lingers like the smell of burnt microwave popcorn. Especially since that report just surfaced. Particularly because one has to wonder if the report's findings could have helped prevent a March 2017 riot at the same institute that 1,5ft transfer in the 1,5

tution that left two more inmates Really Governor, you're excusing Really Governor, you're excusing the fact that the report didn't sur-face until November 2018 because administrators get a lot of reports and you can't publish every one? We're not talking about sugges-tions for a new vendor for pens and pencils, we're talking about mat-ters of life and death and a culture

terms of life and death and a culture that thrives on control and looking for ways to hedge on the rules. Here's a head's up: That's dangerous business and the old saw about the immates running the prison, that's not a good thing. The Critical Incident Re-view Team report, made public soon after the riot, concluded the riot had happened as a matter of chance. In other words, it just happened.

The controversial undisclosed report attributed the riot to conditions at the prison that primed the immate rebellion and said it was a coordinated effort by certain immates and

rebellion and said it was a coordi-nated effort by certain inmates and gangs. That paints a more serious problem; one that I believe would require immediate action and a dif-ferent strategy. As these conditions persist, the pot continues to boil. Governor Pete Ricketts has de-fended Corrections Director Scott

fended Corrections Director Scott Frakes saving all state directors get Frakes saying all state directors get multiple reports and write many memorandums. This second Te-cumseh report was just one of the sources of advice on how to take the Corrections agency forward, he said, adding that it probably con-tained information that the depart-

tained information that the department wasn't going to use.

Excuse me? Then why did we pay \$20,000 in taxpayer funds for a couple experts on the subject of prison riots to do a study? That's a pretty pricey project to place on a shelf. Sadly, ignoring it will likely wasne much higher grios in the cause a much higher price in the long run. The lawsuits from the long run. The lawsuits from the families of the deceased and the victims of the incident – a diabetic inmate who was left for 18 hours without food or medication – have barely started.

leased when people ask for them. Stop. How do we ask for something we didn't know existed? I don't know whether I ought to laugh or

The previously undisclosed report was written by consultants Dan Pacholke, of the Washington State Department of Corrections, and Bert Useem, of Purdue University. They concluded conditions at the

They concluded conditions at the Tecunseh pris-on left it primed for a rebellion.

"The prison was under stress; inmates were unsettled; the 'barometric pressure' was high and rising," wrote Pacholke, formerly responsible for operations at the Washington State Department of Corrections, and Useem, a professor who has published two books on prison riots.

Their report explained that when the initial resistance took place in the prison yard on May 10, 2015, stress on the facility permitted

the prison yard on May 10, 2013, stress on the facility permitted small acts of resistance to spread quickly from the yard into two housing units and the gymnasium. The report pointed to staffing is-

sues, apparent coordination among inmate gangs and a "somewhat disjointed" response. Other findings: -The day of the riot, the Tecuseh prison was understaffed by four, so four program areas were closed. The shift had areas were closed. The shift had a high concentration of relatively new, inexperienced staff, 45 percent who were hired on or after 2013.

-Too many inmates on the yard and too few staff dinnished the capacity to contain the initial assault. Once the disturbance started to errow and the need for additional

sault. Once the disturbance started to grow and the need for additional staff was apparent; the facility had already maximized its response and exhausted staff resources.

"The state consider changing the population of the Tecumseh prison to lower custody immates "who

population of the Tecumseh prison to lower custody immates "who would be better suited for supervision by more junior staff," and create separate housing units for different custody levels to give inmates incentives to work toward lower security levels and more opportunities for programming and activities. activities.

-The greater a prison's orienta-tion toward rehabilitation through case management and program-ming, the safer it becomes. "Giving inmates the opportunity to engage in activities they find meaningful (e.g. treatment, education, voca-tional training) reduces idleness and incentivizes desistance from violent and disruptive behavior." Go back and read those six para-graphs and let the recommenda-tions sink in. Then look at the Gov-erron's characterization again: This

ernor's characterization again: This ernor's characterization again: This second Tecumseh report was just one of the sources of advice on how to take the Corrections agency for-ward, he said, adding that it prob-ably contained information that the department wasn't going to use. That's just disgusting. It's time for the Judiciary Com-pittee of the Nebrase's Legislature

mittee of the Nebraska Legislature to get to the bottom of who IS run ning the prison. Let's just hope it's not the inmates.







IFTTT (If This Then That), camelcamelcamel and Price Tracker for Amazon will keep an eye on prices for you to make sure you're the first to see the best deals.
- Credit Card Points/Discounts: Credit cards can encourage overspending, but when used carefully and within budget, offer certain advantages. For example, store-specific credit cards often offer special dis-counts, kickbacks and coupons for cardholders. Just think how you could double up on the savings by using some of the above tools, as well as by purchasing with a card with added bonuses. Remember though, that any savings you earn will quickly be eaten up if you pay interest charges. To avoid this trap, never use a credit card unless you can pay the entire balance in full each month. Also, think very carefully about opening a new account, as this can negatively affect your credit.

Print newspapers are still the primary way that tens of mil-lions of Americans receive information about their communities and the world. They are also the way that many people find out about job opportuni-ties. While we assume that evervone has an internet connection, the fact is that many areas of the country have limited or no internet service. According to the Federal Communications Commission, nearly 40 percent of Americans living in rural ar eas lack access to fixed broadband internet. Without their local newspapers providing the information and job listings they need, they would be at an extreme disadvantage.

But if the Department of La-bor (DOL) has its way, these would be sufficient, and is therefore proposing removing the print requirement and moving to digital-only listings.

Without the print requirement, job seekers will not only have a harder time finding job listings in their local newspapers, but online as well. By maintaining the print requirement and add-ing a digital requirement, the DOL will ensure the widest possible distribution of an ad so U.S. citizens can learn of em-

simply posting an ad on a web-site would make it too easy for employers to just "check the box" and by-pass available US workers. If the Department of Labor truly wants to support its mission to serve American job seekers, it should require both print and digital distribution of recruitment ads.

In many cases, newspaper publishers also publish the job listings on their websites and social media channels, as well as employment websites such as Monster com and CareerBuilder, with whom newspapers have part-nerships. # "POST OFFICE SORTING ROOM" December 8, 1945



When Artist John Falter out to paint a picture of the Christmas-mail rush, he made his sketches in the busiest post office in the world, the one properly known as the New York, New York, Post Office, at 33rd Street and 8th Avenue. In spite of all the urging to mail early-did you?--the rush never gets fully under way until about this date. Then it's a torrent. In the first nineteen days of last December, this post office handled more that 12,000,000 parcels. The biggest day for mailing is De-cember nineteenth, ordinarily, but the mailman's worst day for deliveries, is December twenty-third. That is the day he staggers around under a sack of gifts that would dis-courage Santa Claus himself.
