SHERIFF COMPARES SALARIES AND BENEFITS OF CITY AND COUNTY OFFICERS

During the Tues., Dec. 11th meeting of the Richardson County Commissioners, Sheriff Don Pounds updated the Board on the business within the Sheriff's Office and the Law Enforcement Center during the past week. Sheriff Pounds presented to the Board an information report on the comparability between the wages and benefits of the police officers of the City of Falls City and the officers of the Richardson County Sheriff's Department. The Sheriff had previously expressed concern about the ability of his department to hire and retain officers because of the disparity in the salaries and benefits offered by the City compared to those offered by the County.

Laura Osborne, 4 County Juvenile Services Grant Coordinator presented to the Board the application for the 2019 grant funding. A motion was made by Commissioner Frank to approve the grant application for the continuation of the 4 County Juvenile Services Grant for the 2019 funding from the NE

POLICE DEPT. SEIZES WEAPONS AND DRUG PARAPHERNALIA AT FC HOME

On December 12, the Falls City Police Department served

a search warrant at 319 W. 15th Street in Falls City.

During the search, several pieces of drug paraphernalia were located. Substances found at the scene were tested and confirmed to be methamphetamine, a Schedule II Controlled Substance. Officers also located two handguns, three large machete style weapons, and a hatchet.

Tylor J. Fritts and Julia M. Sprouse were arrested at the scene on the following charges. Possession of a Controlled Substance-Methamphetamine; Possession of a Firearm During the Commission of a Felony; Possession of a Deadly Weapon During the Commission of a Felony and cited for possession of drug paraphernalia.

RIOT REPORT: WHO KNEW WHAT AND WHEN COULD HAVE MADE A DIFFERENCE

It's that age-old question of government and politics: Who knew what and when? In the case of an independent report on the May 2015 riot at the Nebraska State Prison in Tecumseh that left two dead, that question lingers like the smell of burnt microwave popcorn. Especially since that report just surfaced. Particularly because one has to wonder if the report's findings could have helped prevent a March 2017 riot at the same institution that left two more inmates dead.

Really Governor, you're excusing the fact that the report didn't surface until November 2018 because administrators get a lot of reports and you can't publish every one? We're not talking about suggestions for a new vendor for pens and pencils, we're talking about matters of life and death and a culture that thrives on control and looking for ways to hedge on the rules.

Here's a head's up: That's dangerous business and the old saw about the inmates running the prison, that's not a good thing. The Critical Incident Re-view Team report, made public soon after the riot, concluded the riot had happened as a matter of chance. In other words, it just happened.

The controversial undisclosed report attributed the riot to conditions at the prison that primed the inmate rebellion and said it was a coordinated effort by certain inmates and gangs. That paints a more serious problem; one that I believe would require immediate action and a different strategy. As these conditions persist, the pot continues to boil. Governor Pete Ricketts has defended Corrections Director Scott Frakes saying all state directors get multiple reports and write many memorandums. This second Tecumseh report was just one of the sources of advice on how to take the Corrections agency forward, he said, adding that it probably contained information that the department wasn't going to use.

Excuse me? Then why did we pay \$20,000 in taxpayer funds for a couple experts on the subject of prison riots to do a study? That's a pretty pricey project to place on a shelf. Sadly, ignoring it will likely cause a much higher price in the long run. The lawsuits from the families of the deceased and the victims of the incident - a diabetic inmate who was left for 18 hours without food or medication - have barely started.

Ricketts says the reports are released when people ask for them. Stop. How do we ask for something we didn't know existed? I don't know whether I ought to laugh or scream at that one.

The previously undisclosed report was written by consultants Dan Pacholke, of the Washington State Department of Corrections, and Bert Useem, of Purdue University. They concluded conditions at the Tecumseh pris-on left it primed for a rebellion.

"The prison was under stress; inmates were unsettled; the 'barometric pressure' was high and rising," wrote Pacholke, formerly responsible for operations at the Washington State Department of Corrections, and Useem, a professor who has published two books on prison riots.

Their report explained that when the initial resistance took place in the prison yard on May 10, 2015, stress on the facility permitted small acts of resistance to spread quickly from the yard into two housing units and the gymnasium. The report pointed to staffing is-

...sues, apparent coordination among inmate gangs and a "somewhat disjointed" response.

Other findings: --The day of the riot, the Tecumseh prison was understaffed by four, so four program areas were closed. The shift had a high concentration of relatively new, inexperienced staff, 45 percent who were hired on or after 2013.

--Too many inmates on the yard and too few staff diminished the capacity to contain the initial assault. Once the disturbance started to grow and the need for additional staff was apparent; the facility had already maximized its response and exhausted staff resources.

--The state consider changing the population of the Tecumseh prison to lower custody inmates "who would be better suited for supervision by more junior staff," and create separate housing units for different custody levels to give inmates incentives to work toward lower security levels and more opportunities for programming and activities.

--The greater a prison's orientation toward rehabilitation through case management and programming, the safer it becomes. "Giving inmates the opportunity to engage in activities they find meaningful (e.g. treatment, education, vocational training) reduces idleness and incentivizes desistance from violent and disruptive behavior."

Go back and read those six paragraphs and let the recommendations sink in. Then look at the Governor's characterization again: This second Tecumseh report was just one of the sources of advice on how to take the Corrections agency forward, he said, adding that it probably contained information that the department wasn't going to use. That's just disgusting.

It's time for the Judiciary Committee of the Nebraska Legislature to get to the bottom of who IS running the prison. Let's just hope it's not the inmates.

Apollo 8 headed into space to provide man's first look at the back side of the moon.

Fire gutted the residence of Mrs. Maudie Roth at 723 Chase Street. Richardson County had 25 operating school districts.

Richardson County Bank & Trust Co. began offering a new computer based record keeping service for its customers. Men had no excuse for not looking spiffy on Christmas Day as all four Falls City Barber Shops, announced they would be open Mon., Dec. 23.

Among the "Letters to Santa" published were those of Krystal Kay Schulz who wanted "a piano most of all", Terry Kratz who promised to "leave a lunch for you", and Jean Eckwert who admitted "I have been naughty sometimes and good most of the time".

Clayton Hardenberger's Imperial Service Station was providing a coupon good for a free Malt or a Coke and hamburger at Mr. Swiss with the purchase of eight or more gallons of gas.

Traffic restricted to one way on Harlan Street during construction was returned to two-way four lane traffic with completion of construction.

Tom Pritchard and Dave Kottich picked up the only victories in a wrestling match between Falls City and Nebraska City.

Homer Henke's "Homer Sez" this week included this bit of wit: "Opportunity knocks only once, but temptation bangs on the door for years."

Construction began on Rulo's \$103,000 city water system. Journal sports writer Del Sutherland described Nebraska City's lead over the Falls City Tigers in boys basketball "as brief as French lingerie" in a game won by the Tigers 71-51.

After 11-months in captivity the 82 survivors of the USS Pueblo "intelligence ship" were released by the North Vietnamese in time for them to return home for Christmas.

An estimated 400 persons were left stranded by a winter storm in Eastern Nebraska that blew powdery snow into huge drifts requiring the National Guard to assist motorists.

The Christmas lighting display of Roman Fleskoski at 26th & Lane was judged the overall winner in the Jaycees home Christmas lighting contest.

The Humboldt Cardinals moved into second place in the Southeast Border Conference by defeating Southeast Consolidated 91-83 in a game that saw 38 fouls whistled against the Cards and 30 against the Mustangs.

Falls City native Del Bowers was promoted to be supervisor of retail stores for the Kansas City zone of the B.F. Goodrich Tire & Rubber Co. operating out of the home office in Akron, Ohio.

Mr. & Mrs. Perry Castle were in the midst of their 12th straight season of never missing a single home game of the Falls City Tigers (and only a few away games) as they were following the games in which their sons, Tom, Mike, and Pat played.

The Falls City Lions Club was delivering bags of fruit and candy to about 100 residents of Falls City nursing homes.

The Nebraska Wesleyan Band was chosen to represent Nebraska at the Presidential Inauguration, a band that included Falls Cityans Dale Comer, Steve Holland, and Susan Dunn.

Paul O'Grady, 2420 McLean St., filed as a candidate for Sheriff on the Democratic ticket.

The Falls City Tigers lost a 61-48 see-saw battle with Nebraska City dominated by the Pioneer's senior Seth LeGrand who scored 32 of the Pioneers 61 points.

Falls City Middle School Students of the Month were Rachel Hundley, Katie Parsons, and Michelle Grady.

Falls City fireman Bob Martin was seen on the front page of the Journal showing off the department's new pumper truck.

Milton Brewer was recognized for 50 years of devotion and service to the Scottish Rite of the Masonic Lodge during a luncheon at the Wright Place restaurant.

Nebraska's men's basketball team was 7-2 after a 86-61 victory over Florida A&M with a starting five that included Erick Strickland and Eric Piatkowski.

Chase and Cole Hoy were pictured on the front page of the Journal telling Santa what they wanted for Christmas when he visited the Shubert Post Office.

Among wishes for gifts addressed to Santa were those of Derek Hall who asked for a train set and a "Talking Barney" and Ashley Hall who asked for a burping doll and a new Barbie.

The Falls City Tigers delivered a Christmas gift to Coach Crawford, A double overtime 82-80 victory over Lincoln Christian.

Southeast District Health Department reminds community to receive the flu vaccine

With influenza season currently underway, the Southeast District Health Department would like to remind you to take steps to protect your health and the health of those around you.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends all persons aged 6 months and older receive the flu vaccine. Vaccination is considered the best protection against the flu, and frequently decreases the severity and duration of symptoms for those exposed to the influenza virus. Symptoms generally include fever, body aches, cough, and sore throat, and can prog-

ress to hospitalization and death in more severe cases. The CDC reported that as many as 80,000 influenza-related deaths were recorded across the United States during the 2017-2018 flu season.

The health department provides the following recommendations for individuals to help decrease the spread of influenza in our communities:

Avoid close contact with people who are displaying symptoms. Stay home when you are ill to avoid exposing others.

Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or

sneezing. Wash your hands often, and use hand sanitizer as appropriate.

Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth to limit exposure to contagious pathogens.

Practice good disinfection habits in your environment. Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces at home, work, or school, especially when someone is ill.

Falls City Public Schools Superintendent's District Update – Dec. 2018

The Falls City Public Schools held its regular monthly meeting on December 10, 2018. Here are the highlights of the meeting.

District 56 Audit Completed - The meeting opened with a presentation on the School District 56 Audit Report – The Audit Report for 2017-2018 was presented by Julie Bauman, CPA, P.C. The report included the Auditor's report, a statement of financial position, a statement of activities, and a review of the expenditures of federal awards.

The 2019 Legislative Session official kicks off on Wednesday, January 9th for the 90-day session. Key information from the election last month reveal 19 of 49 (39%) seats were a contested race, 13 seats will be new in 2019 (Up to 12 rookie Senators), 6 Senators were term-limited out, and our District 1 Senator Dan Watermeier was elected to the Public Service Commission. Beginning in the January Session, 88% of the body will have 4 years or less experience - (43 of 49 are new as of 2014).

School Board Facility Planning Workshop Scheduled for Monday, January 14. The Board of Education will meet with architects from BVH Architecture for a review of the Master Plan drawings and discussion on initial ideas for the facility improvements at Falls City High. This will help narrow which options the school district will consider and establish a preliminary timeline for estimates as well as phasing options.

The District 56 Board of Education acted on several items before concluding the regular meeting. 1) Approved the final reading on Board Policy Reviews and Revisions: 1) Separation Incentive Program 6120; 2) Substitute Teachers 6140; 3) Student Records 7114; 4) Student Directory Information 7132. 2) Accepted the August 31, 2018 Audit and Financial Report. 3) Authorized the Superintendent to Enter into a Rental Agreement for Managed Copier Services. 4) Amended Teacher Employment Contract of Pam Joy to .40 FTE. Pam Joy will lead and facilitate the school district's visual impairment instructional program, starting January 2, 2019. Ginger Feek will serve in the capacity of long-term substitute teacher in the Special Education department, beginning January 2, 2019.

Prior to concluding the Board of Education meeting, the Board met in closed session with the Superintendent to review the Superintendent's annual performance evaluation and to discuss the upcoming teacher negotiations and bargaining session.

The next regular monthly Board of Education meeting is scheduled for January 14, 2019, at 7:00 P.M. in the Central Office in Falls City Middle School. A Special Planning Workshop is scheduled for January 14, at 5:30 P.M., in the Central Office in Falls City Middle School. Regular and special meeting agendas are kept in the Office of the Superintendent.

Tell the DOL to put American workers first and save the print requirement for temporary job listings

Print newspapers are still the primary way that tens of millions of Americans receive information about their communities and the world. They are also the way that many people find out about job opportunities. While we assume that everyone has an internet connection, the fact is that many areas of the country have limited or no internet service. According to the Federal Communications Commission, nearly 40 percent of Americans living in rural areas lack access to fixed broadband internet. Without their local newspapers providing the information and job listings they need, they would be at an extreme disadvantage.

But if the Department of Labor (DOL) has its way, these communities may soon be out of luck. On November 8, the DOL proposed to change the way temporary job openings are shared with potential workers. Currently, employers are required by law to notify U.S. workers of these openings through publishing the listings in local newspapers. However, the DOL says it now believes publishing the listings on "widely viewed" websites, instead of in print newspapers, would be sufficient, and is therefore proposing removing the print requirement and moving to digital-only listings.

The purpose of the existing policy is to ensure that job opportunities are made known to U.S. workers before they can be offered to foreign workers. By publishing announcements in the print newspaper, employers are able to reach an extremely wide audience, both geographically and in income level. Sunday newspapers – the main sources of print job listings – reach roughly 34 million adults in the U.S., according to the Pew Center for Excellence in Journalism. In many cases, newspaper publishers also publish the job listings on their websites and social media channels, as well as employment websites such as Monster.com and CareerBuilder, with whom newspapers have partnerships. The newspaper, in effect, serves as a local agency to ensure the broadest distribution of recruitment ads. If the Department of Labor ends the print requirement, it will be much more difficult for people who need jobs to find them.

Without the print requirement, job seekers will not only have a harder time finding job listings in their local newspapers, but online as well. By maintaining the print requirement and adding a digital requirement, the DOL will ensure the widest possible distribution of an ad so U.S. citizens can learn of employment opportunities.

The proposed alternative of simply posting an ad on a website would make it too easy for employers to just "check the box" and by-pass available U.S. workers. If the Department of Labor truly wants to support its mission to serve American job seekers, it should require both print and digital distribution of recruitment ads.

When Artist John Falter set out to paint a picture of the Christmas-mail rush, he made his sketches in the busiest post office in the world, the one properly known as the New York, New York, Post Office, at 33rd Street and 8th Avenue. In spite of all the urging to mail early--did you?--the rush never gets fully under way until about this date. Then it's a torrent. In the first nineteen days of last December, this post office handled more than 12,000,000 parcels. The biggest day for mailing is December nineteenth, ordinarily, but the mailman's worst day, for deliveries, is December twenty-third. That is the day he staggers around under a sack of gifts that would discourage Santa Claus himself.
