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Growing Nebraska in 2018

Growing Nebraska is the vision for my administration and drives the work our team is doing every day. Over the last year, we have seen a lot of success.

For the third year in a row, Nebraska achieved one million nonfarm jobs. Our population grew 11,600 and is nearing 1.93 million people. The state earned our second consecutive Governor's Cup



from Site Selection magazine for the most economic development projects per capita in the nation. are #1 for fiscal condition, #2 for cost of doing business, #3 for wage growth, #4 for workforce participation rate, #5 for best states for business, #6 for low unemployment. and #7 best state overall - although we all know Nebraska is the best place in the world!

This pro-growth environment s brought new investments to Nebraska. Facebook expanded their data center in Papillion, bringing their total investment to over \$1 billion. Prairie Catalytic cut the ribbon on a new \$50 million bio-

based ethyl acetate production facility in Columbus. Kawasaki won a \$3.6 billion contract to build railcars in Lincoln. In October, BD announced they would invest \$200 million and add 300 jobs at their facilities across Nebraska, bringing their total two-year investment in Nebraska to \$340 million. We also visited Silicon Valley to thank some of the partners who are helping grow and develop the Silicon Prairie in Nebraska.

Developing our people is key to attracting these investments which create great job opportunities. This year, we expanded the Developing Youth Talent Initiative to two new programs to help expose more students to opportunities in manufacturing and IT. From Boys Town in Omaha to Aulick Industries in Scottsbluff, we launched new registered apprenticeship programs for young Nebraskans. Apprenticeship programs have increased 31 percent since 2016. The Department of Labor and Department of Health and Human Services are expanding a program that helps families receiving food stamps find better job opportunities to five new communities.

We have been cutting red tape and speeding up service for the job creators who interact with state government. The State Patrol and leaders in agriculture came together to launch new guidelines for livestock hauling to give truckers greater certainty about the rules of the road and to help ensure livestock receive proper care. We slashed wait times at the Omaha Metro South DMV, saving customers an average of 21 minutes per visit. We expanded the number of leaders in our agencies who have received special training to identify waste and facilitate process improvement projects to deliver better service. Also, President Trump has been helping us at the federal level approving E-15 for year-round use and rolling back President Obama's job-killing Waters of the U.S. rule.

Cutting taxes helps to get government out of the way and spur job creation. This year, the State of Nebraska delivered \$2 billion in property tax relief and aid to local governments – a record amount. Working with the Legislature, we helped families avoid a \$200 million unintended tax increase due to changes in the federal tax code. We also delivered important tax relief for Nebraskans on fixed incomes by indexing our Social Security tax rates.

Promoting Nebraska's brand globally is critical to growing our

state. That is why I worked with my Council for International Rela-tions to unveil a new strategic plan for international engagement. Our work this year included a trade mission to Mexico and hosting Japanese executives in Omaha for a major trade conference. Ne braska had the honor of welcoming 400 business executives and public officials to the 50th Annual Midwest U.S.-Japan Association Conference in Omaha. This conference allowed us to show off Nebraska as a great place to do business and to encourage our Japanese friends to sit down to talk about a new trade deal. President Trump signed new trade deals with South Korea, Mexico, and Canada, giv ing Nebraska's farm families and manufacturers opportunities to grow these key trade relationships. The United States also launched trade negotiations with Japan and the European Union, two key markets for Nebraska.

2018 has been a great year of growth for Nebraska. With a legislative session around the corner, there are opportunities to do more to get government out of the way and help our families achieve their dreams. 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Twelve new faces as the $106 \mathrm{th}$ legislature convenes January 9

The Legislature is a week away
from convening, but boy howdy,
when they do. Thanks to a combination of term limits, resignations and three incumbents losing
their roces, there will be 12 neary. their races, there will be 12 new faces and a familiar one among

faces and a familiar one among the 49 state senators. Fresh from a term-limited four-year hiatus, Omaha attorney Steve Lathrop, 61, returns to represent District 12 where he defeated incumbent Mery Riepe. Lathrop joins Ernie Chambers as the only other senator (so far) to the only other senator (so far) to sit out one term and get re-elect

In addition to Riepe, incumbents Theresa Thibodeau of Omaha, a Governor Pete Ricketts 2017 appointee, and Laura Ebke of Crete lost to challengers. Ebke was the Legislature's only Libertarian af-ter switching from the Republican Party a couple years ago after Ricketts called out a number of Republican senators for failing to support several of his veto over-

Machaela Cavanaugh, 39, the daughter of former Democratic Rep. John Cavanaugh of Omaha, defeated Thibodeau. Cavanaugh works for the Buffet Early Childhood Institute. Ebke was defeat-ed by Tom Brandt of Plymouth, a farmer and livestock feeder. The 58-year-old is also a Republican. Ricketts appointed Gretna attor-ney and legislative aid Andrew LaGrone to fill the vacancy cre-ated by District 49 Sen. John Murante's election as State Treasur er. LaGrone worked for Murante and the Government Committee he chaired. Rickett's re-election campaign press secretary Julie Slama of Peru was chosen to fill District I Sen. Dan Watermeier's seat. He was elected to the Ne-braska Public Service Commission. Both are Republicans in the

ture. Two senators decided not to seek a second term. Sen. Rov Baker of Lincoln called it quits in District 30 where 63-year-old farmer Myron Dorn of Ad-ams, a Republican, won a hotly contested race for the seat. Sen contested race for the seat. Sen. John Kuehn, a Heartwell veterinarian and rancher also declined to seek a second term in District 38. He'll be replaced by Glenvil farmer Dave Murman, a 64-year-

Six term-limited senators their replacements: Republi-can Lydia Brasch of Bancroft is can Lydia Brasch of Bancroft is being replaced by 39-year-old Ben Hansen, a Blair chiroprac-tor and Republican; Democrat Burke Harr of Omaha is being replaced by 31-year-old Demo-crat Megan Hunt, a boutique owner; Democrat Bob Krist of Omaha is being replaced by Omaha is being replaced by 44-year-old Wendy DeBoer of Bennington, a Democrat and college instructor; Republican Tyson Larson of O'Neill, is being replaced by 59-year-old Tim fragert of Creighton, a Republi-can and retired military and fed-eral employee; Republican Paul Schumacher of Columbus is be-ing replaced by Republican Mike Moser, a 66-year-old retail music store owner; Jim Smith of Papillion is being replaced by 62-yearold John Arch of Lavista, a Re-publican and vice president of health for Boys Town. Five incumbent senators had no

opposition and were re-elected: Republicans Curt Friesen of Henderson; John Stinner of Gering and Matt Williams of Gothenburg; Democrats Adam Morfeld and Patty Pansing Brooks of Lin-

Eight incumbents withstood challengers. Democrat Matt Hansen of Lincoln won re-election as did seven Republicans: Rob Clements of Elmwood; Bob Hilkemann, Brett Lindstrom and John McCollister of Omaha; Mark Kolterman of Seward; Mike Groene of North Platte and Dan

Hughes of Venango.

The Legislature is tentatively scheduled to be in session through June 6. That includes 14 recess days and four holidays. Here's hoping they can hit the ground running, agree quickly to a set of rules and actually get some meaningful work done. With 30 Republicans, 18 Democrats and one Independent in the legislative chamber, let's hope they find a way to remain nonpartisan.



North School implements new program

Falls City North School has implemented a new program to assist in helping each and every individual to be successful! Circle of Friends (COF), is funded by a \$300 grant provided through Autism Action Network and the Nebraska ASD network. Circle of Friends was implemented to provide a support network around individuals in our school community who experience social difficulties, often due to a specific disability, difference, or behavior.

COF provides a systematic approach to developing social and language skills of our identified focus students, providing them with a small group, inclusive setting where friendships are established be-tween students with disabilities and their trained, non-disabled peers (mentors). Two groups were established and involve both FOCUS students (i.e. those with disabilities or social difficulties) and peer MEN-

TORS who were recommended by classroom teachers.

On-going training/awareness is provided to peer mentors one time per month, where they learn and become more aware of how their friends' lives are impacted by various disabilities. Mentors are shown how to communicate more effectively with their peers and how to model and shape appropriate social skills. They learn how to become student leaders and advocates for each other

Whole group meetings are held two-three times per month and offer additional opportunities to socialize and bring together all CoF participants to have fun while getting to know each other better. This allows for the rest of the school community to see how effortlessly students with and without special needs interact. As peers talk to peers and other with and without special necess in the interact. As peets take to peets and other teachers/staff about their CoF experiences and issues that matter, our school climate is positively impacted and becomes more mindful. Attitudes shift to becoming more "inclusive" with an increased understanding, acceptance, and appreciation of our students with special needs. So far this year, activities have included: pumpkin decorating, Down Syndrome awareness and creating handprint turkeys which was a great expectly learning conporting as some of our students struggle, with

Approaching application deadline for market facilitation program

Richardson County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Ex-Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Brenda Fields is reminding producers that the deadline to apply for the Market Facilitation Program is Jan. 15, 2019. The Market Facilitation Program (MFP) was designed to assist farmers in response to for-eign market trade disruptions. FSA is administering MFP. The program provides payments to producers of almonds, corn, cotton, dairy, hogs, sorghum, soy-beans, fresh sweet cherries and wheat. Fields said the applica-tion period runs through Jan. 15, 2019; by that date producers must complete part D of the CCC-910 MFP application. Producers have until May 1, 2019, to complete the remainder of the application, which includes certifying their 2018 production totals.

Fields said she also wants to remind producers of hogs/dairy that they may be eligible for this program, depending on dates of production and/or ownership of the livestock. Fields encouraged producers of hogs/dairy to contact the county office with eligi-bility questions. Producers are en-couraged to contact the Richardson County FSA office at (402) 245-2401, extension 2, to make an appointment to begin the application process. There also is an option to print the application, fill it out and then fax, mail or email it. Car seats and booster seats protect your kiddos in the car. Starting January 1, 2019, Nebraska's child passenger safety law changes to help keep children safer as they travel. According to the new law: Children must ride rear-facing up to age two or until they reach the upper weight or height limit allowed by the car seat manufacturer; Children up to age eight must ride in a correctly installed car seat or booster seat; Children up to age eight must ride in the back seat, as long as there is a back seat equipped with a seat belt and is not already occupied by other children under eight years old; Children eight to 18 years old must ride secured in a seat belt or child safety seat/booster.
"Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for children

in Nebraska," said Judy Martin, Deputy Director of Public Health for the Nebraska, said Judy Martin, Deputy Director of Public Health for the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services. "As children get older, their risk increases because they're moved from a safety seat to a seat belt only too soon or they're allowed to ride in the front seat where an airbag could cause injury. 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Never Forget: what the past can teach us about today's problems

(StatePoint) While history may feel like the distant past (and something you may think you don't need to know much about outside the classroom), many experts believe it can offer valuable lessons for today. In the case of World War II,

author Kim Dana Kupperman says the stories that came out of this dark time in history can help us gain a new perspective on today's global refugee crisis, be better prepared to see the warning signs of totalitarianism and genocide, and examine the best and worst of human proclivities.

Her new novel, "Six Thousand Miles to Home," was inspired by the true story of a Jewish family from western Poland during one of World War II's lesserknown episodes, the imprison-ment of 1.5-2 million Polish citizens in the Soviet Union's infamous Gulag. The novel de-tails a family's enslavement in a forced-labor camp, and their eventual escape to Iran where they found refuge.


"I feel a generational responsi-bility to help preserve the memory of what happened during World War II. Because so many died without their stories being told or collected, we must try to imagine how they lived and how they perished," says Kup-perman. "Such narratives and personal stories build empathy for those of us fortunate to be remote from these experiences. They also remind us that genocide is a persistent phenomenon, and that by not acting, we

are complicit."
Starvation, disease, and hard labor in adverse environmental conditions combined to make the Gulag a ruthless environ-ment in which people perished by the thousands. Despite the horrors of this history, accounts of Soviet deportations and enslavement of Polish citizens are largely absent from the litera-ture of the Holocaust. As those who lived through it grow older, historians say that the time for collecting and understand-ing these stories is now.

Kupperman draws parallels between the historical events detailed in her novel to today's global refugee crisis. As a result of World War II, tens of millions of people were displaced, an amount of people which seemed staggering at the time. In 2016, an estimated 65.6 mil-lion people were forcibly displaced by persecution, conflict, or violence, according to the UN, amounting to 20 people every minute. Understanding history can change perceptions about today's refugees and en-courage individuals to help, whether it's by providing shelter, volunteering time, or donating resources.

Proceeds from sales of Kup-perman's book will support The Suzanna Cohen Legacy Foundation and its mission to collect, preserve, publish, and teach the life stories of men and women who exhibited resilience in the face of forced displacement, and to honor the bravery and generosity of those who provided compassion and assistance to refugees, exiles and persecuted peoples. 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
