FEIGNER MAKES PLEA DEAL IN SEPT. SPIRIT SHOPPE EXPLOSION

On February 19, April Feigner plead no contest to reduced charges as part of a plea deal stemming from a September 2018 incident where she was accused of setting off an explosive device near the Spirit Shoppe in Falls City.

Feigner had initially been charged with one count of use of an explosive to commit a felony without a permit and attempted third-degree arson, both felonies. Tuesday, Feb. 19, Feigner entered a no contest plea to amended charges of use of explosives without a permit and attempt of a class four felony.

She posted bond after it was reduced to \$1,000. Sentencing is set for April 30, 2019, in District Court.

HEARING HELD ON COUNTY ONE AND SIX YEAR ROAD PLAN

A public hearing was held by Richardson County Commissioners Tues., Feb. 19th, on the One and Six Year Road Plan prepared by County Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr. That plan calls for completion in the next year on 13 projects estimated to cost \$823,000 and another 14 projects in the following five years that would, if completed, cost a collective \$6,922,000. Darveau told this reporter that many of the long range projects have languished on the list for years because of a lack of funds to see them to completion and may only be completed if they become part of a future disaster declaration and eligible for federal funding.

The largest of the Fiscal Year 2019 projects are two bridge projects eligible for up to \$150,000 each for state assistance under the County Bridge Match Program with each of them estimated to cost an estimated \$250,000. One is a bridge in a segment of 710 Trail between 639 Blvd. and 640 Blvd. The other is a bridge in 635 Avenue between 718 Road and 719 Road. To be eligible for the Bridge Map Program these bridges had to be rated at least 40 percent to 45 percent structurally deficient.

The remaining eleven projects are these: \$75,000 for a Falls City Shop Bridge, \$15,000 for a Concrete Box Culvert 3/10th of mile east of 642 Blvd. on 719 Rd., \$25,000 to replace a 48" in diameter 44' tube in 693 Ave. between 713 Rd. and 714 Rd., \$10,000 to replace a 48" in diameter 50' tube in 711 Rd. between 651 Ave. and 651 Blvd., \$50,000 for two 66" in diameter 42' corrugated metal pipes in 654 Ave. between 709 Rd. and 710 Rd., \$20,000 for a 6' by 50" metal pipe in 711 Rd. between 631 Ave and 732 Ave., \$8,000 for a 30" by 40' corrugated metal pipe in 719 Rd. ¼ mile west of 632 Ave., \$15,000 for a 36" by 42' corrugated metal pipe 8/10ths of a mile North of 714 Rd. in 635 Ave., \$30,000 to rehab one mile of 645 Ave with culverts between 709 Rd. and 710 Rd., \$40,000 for a two mile

regrade of 718 Rd. between 650 and 652 Ave., and \$35,000 for a Concrete Box Culvert north of 711 Rd. in 635 Ave.

This reporter was the only person to speak during the hearing and made a recommendation that a list of the projects on the one and six year program be made available to the *Journal* two weeks in advance of the hearing so that it could be included in the *Journal* published six days prior to the hearing. The suggestion was made to allow persons with an interest in one or more projects to offer comments at the public hearing. This reporter also noted that paving of the Falls City Airport Road project was not included on either the one or the six year program and encouraged the Commissioners to work with their counterparts in city government to develop a plan for cost sharing on the project similar to that developed in 2002 that remained in effect until 2010.

Highway Superintendent Darveau updated Commissioners on routine road and bridge maintenance and was commended by Commissioners for work of his Department in clearing roadways following recent snowfalls.

Ashley Robertson of Project Response met with Commissioners to review services provided by the organization and

CITY COUNCIL REMEMBERS TWO OF THEIR OWN

The City Council at their last meeting on Feb. 19th, honored Councilmen Charlie Bentley and Kirby Robidoux who recently passed away.

The President of the Richardson County Historical Society, Richard Meinzer, appeared before the Council to request a waiver of the \$1,115 city building permit fee and the utility connection fees for the Society's new building across the street from its Museum.

The Council voted three to two to waive the building permit fee, but suggested the Society speak with the Board of Public Works about the utility fees. Councilmembers Derrick Leyden and Lucas Froeschl expressed concern that the Council was setting a precedent they might regret in the future by waiving the building permit fee.

The Council received and placed on file the annual report from head librarian Hope Schawang of the Falls City Library

and Arts Center, now in its 13th year of operation. Ms. Schawang assured the council members despite the dawn of the computer age, patrons continue to come to the library to borrow books and read periodicals. She reported the library's 26 public computers are in regular use with little wait times for patrons, and she reported the Library has become increasingly used for meetings of community groups with 365 meetings attended by approximately 1,800 persons over the past year.

Ms. Schawang said time donated by volunteers over the past 12 months was valued at \$12,000. She also reported that Sandra Hartman was retiring from the Library Board after having served for 22 years, and gave recognition to Mrs. Hartman for being a founding member of the Library Foundation and commended Mrs. Hartman's family for being a major donor to that Foundation. She also paid tribute to "her friendly, helpful, and knowledgeable staff".

LET'S KEEP NEBRASKA PRO-LIFE

It's well-known that Nebraska is a pro-life state. Over the years, Senators, Governors, and pro-life advocates have worked to make Nebraska a national leader in public policy protecting the dignity of human life. Less than a year ago, the Legislature stood with Nebraskans and voted for a pro-life budget. This was a big step forward in protecting the dignity of human life.



The pro-life budget approved by the Legislature in 2018 built on Nebraska's bipartisan work in leading on pro-life policy going back many years. In 1991, Senator Bernice Labeledz of Omaha, a Democrat, led the effort to enact a law requiring parental notification before a minor receives an abortion. In 2002 and 2004, Lt. Governor Mike Foley, who was a

Senator at the time, helped create new laws making fetal homicide and fetal assault a crime. In 2010, then Speaker Mike Flood of Norfolk successfully championed the "Pain-Capable Unborn Child Protection Act," making Nebraska the first state in the nation to ban abortion after 20 weeks of gestation. In 2011, Senator Lydia Brasch of Bancroft successfully passed a new law requiring parental consent before a minor receives an abortion. These are just a few of the many examples of great pro-life bills passed into law over the last three decades.


This week, however, things took an unexpected turn in the Legislature. In a major break with our state's pro-life traditions, the Legislature's Appropriations Committee narrowly voted to strip the pro-life budget language, which prevents taxpayer dollars from going to abortion providers. This is a victory for radical pro-abortion activists. This decision by the budget committee is appalling, and I have strongly urged them to reverse it.

Pro-life Senators have also urged the Appropriations Committee to reconsider this initial vote, because how the state spends taxpayer dollars has deep implications for the dignity of human life and Nebraska's core values. If the Appropriations Committee fails to take action, Senators are already stepping up to ensure that the pro-life budget provision gets put back in when the full Legislature votes on the budget. In the coming weeks, I will continue to visit with Senators about the importance of having a pro-life budget again this year.

This news from the Nebraska Legislature is especially troubling given recent events in New York and Virginia. New York recently voted to end all protections for unborn human life, allowing elective abortions up to the point of birth, and removing protections for babies that are born alive during failed abortion attempts. In Virginia, scandal-plagued Democrat Governor Ralph Northam suggested that babies could be born and kept alive while a decision is made whether the baby deserves to live. This is nothing less than an assault on the dignity of human life.

In light of these events, now more than ever it is time for Nebraskans to stand up and fight for life—and there are great opportunities to do so right now. In addition to the pro-life budget, there is another important pro-life bill that needs your support this year. Senator Joni Albrecht of Thurston has introduced LB 209. This bill would strengthen the state's informed consent protections by requiring doctors to provide information about how to reverse the abortion pill when the drug is prescribed. At the federal level, Senator Ben Sasse has been working to pass the "Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act." This bill would protect babies that survive abortions by requiring that babies born alive receive professional medical care. Democrats recently tried to block a vote on this bill, however, Senator Sasse has successfully secured a roll-call vote on this measure, which is scheduled for February 25th.

Stripping important pro-life language out of our state budget is wrong and sends the message that Nebraska is no longer committed to our core values. As Senators work on the budget, they will be listening to you. If you would like to see a pro-life budget again this year, I encourage you to contact your Senator and let them know. THAT GREEN DREAM OR WHATEVER IS ... INTERESTING

Who knew that one of the loudest new voices in Congress — Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, D-N.Y. — would come up with an idea that would impact Nebraska: The Beef State?

Her so-called Green New Deal is a resolution aimed at paving the way for what she and her supporters tout as a government overhaul of virtually every aspect of American life guaranteeing a host of taxpayer-covered benefits for all and a phase-out of fossil fuels.

Bear with me here, her office says the plan would aim to make air travel obsolete, upgrade or replace every building in America to ensure energy efficiency and give economic security even to those "unwilling" to work. Lofty goals, enough to make one smile about youthful enthusiasm, question intelligence and be thankful that these folks have to run for re-election every two years.

It's the "green" part that raises eyebrows. An FAQ accompanying the proposal notes that it has set a goal of net-zero, rather than zero, emissions in 10 years "because we aren't sure that we'll be able to get rid of farting cows and airplanes that fast." Take a minute to read that again. Now you'll understand Governor Pete Ricketts concern that Ocasio-Cortez is advocating abolishing cattle production.

"As the Governor of the Beef State, this announcement is shockingly ignorant," Ricketts said. "Congresswoman Ocasio-Cortez's plan to end cattle production would kill our state's number one industry, and destroy countless jobs and family businesses. I urge congressional leaders to kill this resolution swiftly and decisively to send a message to anti-agriculture socialists that we will fight for our way of life." Resistance is not only coming from Republicans like Ricketts. Sen. Mazie Hirono, D-Hawaii, was asked about the plan to replace planes with high-speed rail, and did not seem impressed. "That would be pretty hard for Hawaii," she laughed.

The non-binding resolution itself would do very little, but it's the first time the policy proposal has been formally outlined for Congress. It says "a new national social, industrial and economic mobilization on a scale not seen since World War II and the New Deal" is an opportunity to tackle systemic injustices toward minority groups, create millions of high-wage jobs and "provide unprecedented levels of prosperity and economic security for all people of the United States."

With promises of: net-zero greenhouse gas emissions; job creation; infrastructure investment; guarantees of clean water, healthy food and sustainable environment; and a curiously undefined "access to nature," one critic calls it a press release word salad of platitudes, slogans and talking points.

Ocasio-Cortez prefers to call it a comprehensive agenda of economic, social and racial justice

in the United States of America. But there is not yet a package of implementable ideas or policy. In fact, some of the FAQ pages have already disappeared from her website and others have been revised. So, who really knows what, when or even if this will all be discussed.

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said the proposal will "be one of several or maybe many suggestions that we receive. The green dream or whatever they call it, nobody knows what it is, but they're for it right?"

While admitting that she hadn't read it yet, she said she knows "it's enthusiastic and we welcome all the enthusiasm that is out there."

The major Democrat presidential contenders are on board. The Republican National Committee has labeled it as a dangerous social agenda.

I'm still thinking about the farting cows. My late father was a butcher and was always amused — maybe even a bit befuddled — by the animal rights activists who abhorred the slaughter of cattle. His favorite line was about the one who said we shouldn't kill cattle anymore because people should just go to the grocery store to get their meat.



50-25-15 Years Ago

50 Years Ago - Feb. 27, 1969 - Mar. 5, 1969

An ice jam at the mouth of the Nemaha River broke loose and the Missouri River was back in its banks after dropping eight feet overnight. Dairyman and purebred Holstein breeder Milton Bletscher, rural Falls City, was elected president of the Nebraska State Holstein-Friesian Association. Elk Creek defeated Sacred Heart in the district semi-final 67-61 but not before Tom Hill put up another 26 points pushing his career total to a Richardson County record of 1,260 points.

The Falls City Tigers picked up their fourth victory of the season defeating Tri-County 91-79.

"The Boston Strangler" starring Tony Curtis and Henry Fonda was being shown at the Rivoli. The coming attraction was "Pretty Poison" starring Tuesday Weld.

A District Court jury awarded John Huber \$2,524.80 for land taken and damages to his property at 2109 Harlan Street as the result of the widening of Harlan Street.

Dale Yoessel, president of the local chapter, served as the master of ceremonies for the annual Falls City FFA banquet. The Honorary Chapter Farmer award was presented to Francis Seid.

The Falls City Volunteer Fire Department was one of seven departments responding to a fire in Hiawatha, KS that gutted the Chief Theater owned by Oscar Johnson of Falls City.

Apollo 9 Astronauts separated their spacecraft from the third stage of its rocket and linked up with it again to remove a lunar landing machine that they would guide to the surface of the moon.

Three tracts of land north and northwest of Falls City were sold for \$15,595 with a 160 acre tract bringing the highest price, \$350/acre paid by Gordon Rea.

New York Yankee slugger Mickey Mantle retired from professional baseball.

Two Falls City High School students, Connie Appleoff and Becky Schatz, received superior ratings at the Aksarben conference speech contest.

Movie star, Marjorie Main celebrated her 79th birthday and was still doing her own cooking and house cleaning after having made 8 "Ma & Pa Kettle" movies, three of which earned \$8 million.

Mrs. Robert Deckinger was recognized as the top Mrs. Jaycee during the group's annual awards dinner.

A YMCA physical education specialist from Lincoln told Rotarians to "run for their lives" to avoid heart attacks and was shown in a Journal photo measuring fat content on Charles Simon who had a cigar in his mouth.

Law's Market was selling Mickelberry ham at 59-cents/lb. and ground beef, 3 lbs. for \$1.49, and Pickard's Market was selling bananas at 10-cents/lb. and 20 lbs. of red potatoes for 59-cents.

25 Years Ago - Feb. 27, 2004 - Mar. 5, 1994

The Trinity United Methodist Church Sunday School was sponsoring an appearance at Prichard Auditorium, Falls City, by Trev Alberts a consensus All-American who played linebacker at UNL.

Lori Gottula was honored by the Falls City BPW as their Young Careerist Award winner; Ernest J. Prosser of Prosser & Prosser, P.C. as Employer of the Year; and Ruth Groothuis as Woman of the Year.

The Nebraska City Pioneers, led by by Seth LeGrand with 33 points, defeated the Falls City Tigers in district boys basketball play 61-58.

The Dawson-Verdon Jets season came to end when they bowled to Filley 70-52 in Class D2 District boys basketball.

The Nets coached by Bill Simon finished their Jaycee basketball season unbeaten. Team members included Rachel Isaacs, Erica Flynn, Amanda May, Deirdre Hall, Jessica Frederick, Vicki Kirkendall, Julie Froeschel, and Jenny Lyons.

Falls City Tiger Wrestler Jeremy Vice had a record setting season finishing third in his weight class at the State Wrestling Tournament and setting team records with 758 team points, 109 victories, and 85 pins.

"Grumpy Old Men" and "Blue Chips" were showing at River Twin Cinema. County Commissioners scheduled work on four bridges destroyed or damaged by two summers of flooding in Richardson County.

A building permit was issued for the construction of a Casey's General Store in the 1200 block of Harlan Street.

The honor of Richardson County "Athlete of the Week" went to Missy McLaughlin of Dawson-Verdon who scored 54 points and had 36 rebounds in the district basketball tournament and was named to the Homesteader Conference all conference basketball team.

Pinewood Derby race winners were Adam Sailors in the Scout competition and Jeff Frenzel in the Tiger Cub event.

Falls City High seniors Missy Noll and Kim Fritz and junior Stan Smith were Silver Key Award winners and Chris Vice received honorable mention at the annual Scholastic Arts Contest.

15 Years Ago - Feb. 27, 2004 - Mar. 5, 2004

"Falter Illustrated" an exhibit honoring Falls City native John Philip Falet was scheduled at the former Falter Clothing building at 1601 Stone Street.

Two seniors, Elizabeth Hoy of Sacred Heart and Carley Hunzeker of HTRS, were among 50 recipients of Peter Kiewit Foundation Distinguished Scholar Awards for 2004.

Sacred Heart (21-3) advanced to play Nebraska City Lourdes (14-7) in the D1 boys district basketball tournament after victories in the sub-district over Lewiston and Southeast.

Falls City Journal Athletes of the Week were FCHS senior wrestler Josh Kaster who earned a 5th place medal during the State Wrestling Tournament and Jenni Choate who scored 12 points in a Sacred Heart girls basketball subdistrict upset victory over Johnson-Brock.

The Falls City High School Cheerleaders finished first in the Class B Cheer and Dance Championships at Lincoln.

A group called "Citizens for Progress" was formed to educate the public about issues on the Spring ballot that included extending the current sales tax and bond issues to finance a new library and aquatic center.

A \$200 reward was being offered for the safe return of the St. John's B.V. Lutheran church, Arago, NE "original" Church Book, a record of the births, marriages, deaths, and confirmations.

Two-time defending state champion Freeman defeated Sacred Heart in girls' basketball 45-40 in the D1-1 District final.

The Class D1 No. 1 Falls City Sacred Heart Irish boys received word that they qualified as a wildcard team and would play in the State Basketball Tournament regardless of the outcome of their Class D1-1 District final.

Ashley Cudney was selected as a member of the Nebraska Cheerleading Team at the 16th Annual Down Under Bowl in Australia.

HTRS senior Chris Riley racked up a career total of 1,364 points passing the previous HTRS record held by Matt Mezger.

The 2004 Jaycees boys basketball champions were the Sooners and winners of the girls championship were the Spartans.

The Richardson County Board of Supervisors decided to include money in their budget for the Richardson County Historical Society but delayed a decision on an amount.

After impressive performances in the District contest, the Falls City FFA Ag Mechanics, Agronomy, Welding, and Livestock Management teams qualified for state competition.

Richardson County speech teams dominated the Pioneer Conference Speech Contest with HTRS finishing first, Sacred Heart second, and Dawson-Verdon third.



How close is too close during flu season?

Want to beat the odds of getting tagged with the flu? Given the severity of the 2017-18 season, it may be a good idea to put some distance between you and the contagious culprit that peaks annually from December through May.

Where's the safety zone? The virus is primarily transmitted from one person to the next through droplets emitted when we cough, sneeze or talk. These tiny particles can travel up to 6 feet after a cough, according to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). Sneeze particles can be propelled 200 feet!

When am I most at risk? People are most contagious during the first three to four days of the flu. What makes things more complicated, however, is that even seemingly healthy adults who have been infected by the flu can be infectious one day prior to experiencing symptoms, and

up to seven days after becoming sick, the CDC estimates. Individuals with weakened immune systems or children may remain contagious for longer periods. If you suspect you or a family member may have the flu, it may be best to consider staying home from work or school.

Does the flu shot really work? The flu vaccine ups your game by reducing the risk from being exposed to the virus by up to 40 to 60 percent, depending on the seasonal flu illness that is in the community. While many misconceptions exist, immunization is the key strategy to protect yourself and others, particularly vulnerable infants, young children and older adults.

Take proactive steps to help avoid influenza: Take care. Help your body stay healthy by getting plenty of rest, eating right and drinking fluids. Wash your hands. Most people don't do it well enough. Here's how. Minimize germs. Alcohol-based hand sanitizers are particularly helpful in group settings. Choose products that contain at least 60 percent alcohol.

Clean sweep. Use disinfecting wipes to sanitize high-use areas around your home, work and school. A few hot spots where germs spread include keyboards, door knobs, faucet handles and countertops. Schedule checkups with caution. Clinic visits may expose you and your family members to more germs. The American Academy of Pediatrics issues guidelines for bringing children to the doctor's office. Consider a germ-free

virtual visit to connect with your doctor via computer or phone. Wondering whether you have the flu or just a pesky cold? Review common symptoms. If you suspect you have influenza, contact your care provider.



Tigers battle but come up short

The FC boys basketball team hit the road last Tuesday to take on the Bulldogs from Auburn in subdistrict play at Lourdes Central High School. Senior Collin Cook got the first hoop of the game for FC with 6:30 to go in the first period. Caden Simon tied the game at four with a kiss off the glass with just under six minutes to go. Cameron Binder of Auburn hit back to back three-pointers to give the Bulldogs a 10-4 advantage

halfway through the quarter. Cook was on a mission, getting an offensive rebound and put back to make it 10-6 and backed the defender down on the next possession and got a bucket to make it 10-8.

A trey by Kade Bredemeier from the left wing with :40 to go made it 15-11 at the end of the first.

Auburn opened the second quarter with a three to go up 18-11. Binder then made 3-4 free throw attempts to make it

a 10-point game. Cade Schawang finally got the Tigers on the board with a free throw at the 3:18 mark to make it 21-12. Bredemeier knocked down another triple with 2:50 to go and Schawang hit one of two free throws to make it 25-16 with 2:17 to go in the half. Bredemeier finished the scoring in the half, sinking 2-2 free throws with :05 to go to make it 29-18 with a half of basketball left in the Tigers season.

Cook tried to keep the Tigers in the game in the third quarter and Schawang drained a three with 3:45 to go but Auburn maintained a 46-34 lead with just eight minutes to go. A hoop by Cook to begin the third and a three by Simon with 6:00 to go made it 47-39.

Cook then used a spin move in the lane to get the Tigers within six at 47-41, but that's as close as Falls City would get. Auburn was 9-10 from the foul line in the final 1:49 to seal the game with Binder going 6-6 down the stretch to give Auburn the 61-50 win. Binder, a sophomore, finished with a game-high 29 points.

The Tigers outshot the Bulldogs 50 percent to 48 percent, but Auburn hit 19-24 from the charity stripe while FC was just 5-10. The two teams were even with 18 rebounds, and Falls City committed only six turnovers to Auburn's eight.

Collin Cook finished his Tiger career with a huge game, dropping in 28 points, making 13-17 shots from the field. No other Tiger scorer reached double digits as Bredemeier had eight points and five rebounds. Cade Schawang, also playing his final game finished with seven points and four rebounds. Simon added five points, and Mason Crawford finished with two points and four rebounds.

The loss dropped the Tigers to 8-13 for the year and ended their season. The Bulldogs went on to win the subdistrict with a 47-36 win over Syracuse.

The Bulldogs, (20-3), will face 15-9 Fort Calhoun in Weeping Water with the winner heading to the State Tournament.

Lady Tigers season ends at the hands of rival Bulldogs

On February 12, the Falls City Tigers girls basketball team was in Nebraska City to take on Wilber-Clatonia in the class C1-1 subdistricts at Lourdes Central High School. The #4 seed Tigers took on the #5 seed Wolverines in the play-in game.

The Tigers got off to the start they needed leading 15-5 after one period and increased the lead to 33-10 by halftime. The Wolverines played better in the second half, outscoring FC 23-17, but the Tigers held on for the win 50-33 and advanced to the next night to take on the Auburn Bulldogs.

Falls City shot well in the contest hitting 20-41 shots while holding the Wolverines to 14-42 from the floor. FC also capitalized at the free throw line, making 10-12 attempts. FC had a slight edge under the hoop with a 28-23 rebounding advantage.

Hannah Clary led the Tigers with 17 points, three steals, and two blocked shots. Hannah Kirkendall also had a huge night with 13 points, six rebounds, and three assists. Michelle Beer just missed double figures with eight points, and four rebounds and Brynna Bruxellas added six points and two assists. three minutes to go before half-time, the Wolves managed to get on the board, but the Irish rattled off six straight points before the half to take a 27-point lead into the locker rooms.

Hahn had 15 points to lead Johnson while Glynn added 12. Cole Fossenberger had three against the Irish reserves for his

only points. Fossenberger, who averages 13 ppg has scored just eight points total in three games against SH.

With the win, the Irish improved to 23-1 for the year with their only loss coming to 21-1 Mound City in early January. The Eagles fell to 20-4, with three of those losses coming from the Irish by an average of 17 points. The Irish now travel to Cozad to meet the Crawford Rams (7-16) in the District final on Monday afternoon at 4:00.

On Tuesday in the first round of the sub-districts, the Irish faced the Lewiston Tigers. Lewiston (4-15) fell behind early, and the Irish never looked back, leading 28-6 after one and 42-18 at the half. SH continued to dominate in the second half outscoring the Tigers 18-10 in the third period and 15-10 in the fourth as they cruised to a 75-38 win at Auburn High School.

Senior Drew Bippes led the Irish scoring attack with 16 points while Jarrot Simon hit for 11. Tyler Witt led the Irish under the boards with eight rebounds, while Del Casteel added six. Jake Hoy added five steals for



The ballot box that went to dinner

Nebraska's admission to the union as the 37th state in 1867 was accompanied by controversy both nationally and locally. Locally, one of the most heated controversies involved "the ballot box that went to dinner."

In 1866 Nebraska's voters were called upon to approve or reject a state constitution drawn up by the territorial legislature. If the constitution met approval, it would

be presented to Congress as the basis for admitting the territory as a state. If rejected, statehood would be postponed.

Territorial Republicans strongly favored statehood and enthusiastically nominated a slate of candidates for state offices to take over when Nebraska was admitted. The Democrats were opposed to statehood, but decided to nominate candidates, just in case.

Ralph Stutheit, 81, of Humboldt passed away on Wednesday, February 20, 2019, in Humboldt, Nebraska.

David Butler of Pawnee City was the Republican nominee for governor. Opposing him was Democrat J. Sterling Morton, an ardent opponent of statehood. Butler and Morton conducted a vigorous campaign. Morton was one of the ablest stump speakers Nebraska had produced. Butler was also a good debater and made the campaign a lively one.

The first state election was very close, and for a time, because of poor communication, the outcome was in doubt. It became evident, however, that the election was in the hands of the canvassing boards rather than the voters, and particularly the Cass County board.

The action of the board gave Rock Bluff, now a ghost town, a degree of permanence in Nebraska's political history. The vote was 107 for Morton and 50 for Butler. The Cass County canvassing board threw out the entire vote because the poll book and tally list had not been certified correctly. At the same time, they allowed the vote of the strongly pro-Butler Plattsmouth precinct even though its returns were certified in the same way.

There was another element in the Rock Bluff action. The election judges closed up shop during the noon hour. To protect the ballot box, one of the judges took the ballot box home during the dinner hour. Charges as to what happened to its contents during that hour ensued.

The Cass County action was decisive in determining the results of the election. The voters approved statehood and David Butler became the first state governor. The Cass County vote also tipped the scale in the legislature in favor of the Republicans and enabled that party to elect Nebraska's first two United States senators.

A. Goodwin Building Contractor in Lincoln, NE, moving to Colorado in 1979 and continued to work for G. A. Goodwin until 1984 when he started Arnold and Beau-din Construction Company. He moved back to Falls City in 2003 following his retirement. He was an avid reader and enjoyed using the Falls City Library. He was a

member of St. Peter's Lutheran Church northeast of Falls City.

Roy is survived by his brothers, Walter and his wife Elizabeth of Nebraska City, Marvin of Falls City, Leon and his wife Beverly of Council Bluffs, IA, sister, Helen and Carolyn Arnold both of Falls City, nieces, nephews, great-nieces and nephews. Community Medical Center Ground Breakers

The history of Community Medical Center continues with recognition to a group of doctors that pioneered health care in our western part of Richardson County. They made a difference in our medical history - people we call **Ground Breakers**.

WESTERN RICHARDSON COUNTY DOCTORS

Mary (Russell) Quick - provided medical care to the pioneers in western Richardson County from 1867-1895. She earned the respect of the medical community of her era and was remembered for her superior ability and strength.

James L. Gandy, M.D. - graduated in 1867, came to Humboldt in 1869. He served Nemaha, Johnson and Pawnee counties and also ran a drug store. His son, G.G. Gandy, M.D. also practiced in Humboldt.

P.F. Patrick, M.D. - came to Humboldt in 1872 and practiced until 1883 when he died. He was ranked as one of the foremost surgeons in southeast Nebraska at the time.

A.L. Williamson, M.D. - practiced in Humboldt from 1893 until he passed away in 1903. He was known to always treat the sick regardless of their ability to pay for services rendered.

P.W. Hays - graduate of Jefferson Medical School, Philadelphia, moved to Humboldt in 1879. He practiced for many years, returning to Pennsylvania for a year, then returned to Falls City and actively practiced until his death in 1896. One of his sons, E.R. Hays was also a physician in Falls City.

J. A. Waggoner, M.D. a graduate of the University of Kentucky, came to Nebraska and began his practice in Dawson in 1879 and also ran a drug store. In 1886, he moved to Humboldt for four years, then to Bern, KS and four years later returned to Dawson. In 1907, he went back to Humboldt. In 1927, the Richardson County Medical Society presented him with a gold medal as a token of his 50 years of medical career.

They had no trouble posing for this one: he simply wanted to see how they look starting out on a snowy morning to catch the school bus. There was plenty of snow out their way, too-Falter lives in a 144-year-old farmhouse thirty-five miles north of Philadelphia. The kitchen in the painting is his own, as it looked before the Falters modernized it. We think Falter is overly optimistic on one point. The mother of a family this big would be worn to a frazzle at this stage of the daily crisis called Getting Them Off to School. In reality, these are children of three families—the Kummerts, the Chews and the Coltmans.
