

NE SUPREME COURT AFFIRMS DISTRICT COURT RULING IN FAVOR OF FALLS CITY IN SUIT OF SALEM GRAIN CO, INC.

The Nebraska Supreme Court in a case released Friday, March 22, 2019, affirmed the decision by Richardson County District Court Judge Daniel J. Brian, Jr. in favor of the City of Falls City, its Community Redevelopment Authority (CRA) and Consolidated Grain and Barge Company.

The Supreme Court opinion states: "This is the latest [fourth] in a series of appeals involving litigation over a redevelopment project in the City of Falls City, Nebraska. In this case, the plaintiffs filed suit seeking a declaratory judgment that the redevelopment projects was not planned or adopted in accordance with the Community Development Law and requesting a permanent injunction to prevent the project from proceeding. Most of plaintiffs' [Salem Grain Company, Inc.'s, David Leon Frederick's, et al] claims were dismissed on summary judgment, and the remaining claims were dismissed after a bench trial [in District Court]. The plaintiff's appeal. Although our reasoning differs from that of the district court, we affirm."

The injunctive relief was sought by Plaintiffs, Salem Grain Company, Inc., and David Leon Frederick, to reverse the sale of Tax Increment Finance (TIF) bonds and grant of the proceeds of those bonds to assist the development of the Consolidated Grain & Barge Company loop train grain handling facility on Falls City's southside. The High Court's decision on two issues came after a review of briefs filed by attorneys on behalf of the plaintiffs and defendants and following the oral arguments. The two issues were whether the plaintiff had filed their lawsuit in the time frame allowed by Nebraska's Community Development statute and whether the Community Redevelopment Authority (CRA) had violated Nebraska's Open Meetings Act (NOMA) during its proceedings. The City of Falls City was represented by City Attorney Michael R. Dunn.

The Court focused on two statutes made part of the Community Redevelopment Law, §§18-2129 adopted in 1951 that stated bonds issued for Redevelopment purposes "shall be conclusively deemed to have been planned, located, and carried out in accordance with the purposes and provisions of [the Community Development Law]," and §§18-2142.01, adopted in

1997, that specifically stated that in case of any lawsuit filed "that after 30 days" such bonds would be deemed to have met the requirements of the Community Development Law. The Court ruled: "We find that all of Salem Grain's claims challenging the procedure by which the redevelopment project was adopted and the validity and enforceability of the redevelopment agreement and bond are conclusively foreclosed by §§18-2129 and §§18-2142.01."

The plaintiffs claimed that Falls City's Community Redevelopment Authority (CRA) had violated Nebraska's Open Meetings Act (NOMA) on two occasions. They alleged that the first violation occurred when three members of the five-member Authority attended an informational dinner meeting on the CGB project Aug. 15, 2012. But, the Supreme Court agreed with the District Court: "...there is insufficient evidence that the dinner involved any 'briefing, discussion of public business, formation of tentative policy, or the taking of any action by the Authority.' The dinner did not constitute a meeting under NOMA." The second violation alleged by the plaintiffs involved an email exchange between CRA Chairman Charlie Radatz and other members of the Authority. The Supreme Court again concurred with the District Court: "... the record shows the purpose of the email communications was to let Authority members know Salem Grain had filed suit and advised that the previously approved contract was being amended to disclose the litigation and to include additional indemnification language recommended by counsel." "Properly understood," stated the Supreme Court, "the chairman's email demonstrates it was sent not to circumvent the requirements of NOMA, but, rather, to adhere to them."

COMMISSIONERS APPROVE DISASTER DECLARATION

During their Tues., Mar. 19th meeting, Richardson County Commissioners voted to amend their agenda to add "Consideration of Declaration of Disaster" as farmland and a number of structures in the Missouri River floodplain were already under water or were expected to soon be invaded by floodwater. A motion was made by Commissioner Terry Frank to approve signing a Declaration of Disaster due to severe flood damage. The motion was seconded by Commissioner John Caverzagie, and approved by a 3-0 vote.

Passage of such a declaration is the first step in making the County eligible for federal assistance. As this report was being prepared Thurs., Mar. 21st, the River was already at 27.4 feet or 10.4 feet above flood stage, re-

cord flooding was occurring and record flooding was forecast. The National Weather Service reported anything above 27.3 feet would eclipse the flooding that occurred in 2011.

Earlier in the day Thurs., President Trump issued a disaster declaration and ordered federal aid administered through the Federal Emergency Management Agency to assist State, tribal, and local recovery efforts in nine Nebraska counties including Nemaha County impacted by winter storms, straight line winds, and flooding. Assistance approved for the nine counties included grants for temporary housing and home repairs, low-cost loans to cover uninsured property losses, and other programs to help individuals and business owners recover from the effects of the

disaster. Damage assessments were continuing and additional areas were expected to be added. Richardson and neighboring Pawnee and Johnson Counties were already eligible as of the first declaration for assistance on a cost-sharing basis for emergency work.

Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr. updated the Board on the routine maintenance being done on county roads and bridges during the previous week.

During the Highway Superintendent's portion of the meeting, a motion was made and approved to adopt Resolution 2018-2019-26 to set a public hearing date of Tues., April 16, 2019, to receive input from the public to close a road located beginning at the west approach of the bridge lo-

FC VOLUNTEER AMBULANCE SQUAD BATS OVER 500 FOR THE SECOND CONSECUTIVE YEAR

FCVAS finished out the year with 572 calls for service in 2018, its second consecutive year with more than 500 calls. Part of this is due to the 2017 agreement between CMC and FCVAS cooperate on transfers of patients to tertiary care facilities. For CMC, this represented a way to provide more timely transfers for critical patients.

For the squad, it was a way to help the community, further develop critical care skills, and earn additional revenue to reinvest in squad readiness. Under the agreement, CMC provides a paramedic to partner with an FCVAS EMT on long-distance transfers to Lincoln, Omaha, St. Joseph and Kansas City. FCVAS ambulances are used, aug-

mented, as needed, by specialized equipment and medications from CMC. Both groups operate under the same physician medical direction and meet regularly to train and discuss cases. The squad now averages 12 transfers a month, in addition to 30-40 local 9-1-1 calls.

For several years, two topics frequently recurred at FCVAS board meetings: the need for additional EMTs and the need for additional funds. When the squad decided to act, the community response was strong. A number of individuals volunteered to become drivers or train as EMTs. In late 2017, FCVAS began raising funds for a new ambulance. After a spaghetti feed, donations for local individuals, businesses and

the Richardson Foundation, FCVAS received a loan from F&M Bank for the remaining costs of purchasing a 2017 Ford ambulance—a unit designed for long-distance transfers. CMC provided some additional equipment to outfit the rig. Future plans include replacing another new ambulance for 9-1-1 calls, upgrading equipment on all squad ambulances, increasing the squad's licensure level from BLS to ALS (it already operates with ALS capabilities when operating jointly with CMC), and recruiting and training additional EMTs.

Here's how you can help: Safety: We continue to ask everyone not to travel in areas where roads are closed. Do not cross flooded roads. Over the last week, wise decisions have been keeping people safe even under extreme conditions. While flood waters are receding, please remain vigilant. It will be quite some time before infrastructure is back in place to prevent recurring flooding. If flood waters have subsided in your community, make sure that you return only when local officials have given the all clear.

Relief: The Nebraska Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) and the Nebraska National Guard have been working around the clock with numerous partners to deliver relief to communities across the state. Members of the National Guard have been deployed to communities around the state to support relief efforts. 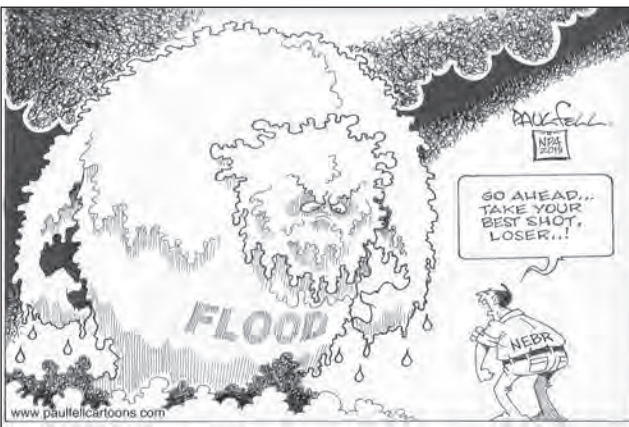
Assistance: There are lots of resources and more are coming online every day. Here are a few hotlines that can help as we recover:

NEBRASKA STRONG! HERE'S ANOTHER CHALLENGE

Blizzards on one end of the state, floods on the other. Nebraska, now more than ever, it's not for everyone!

Nebraska has 79,056 miles of rivers, more than any other state, and it seems like every one of them flooded. Disasters have been declared in 80 percent of the state and thousands of Nebraskans were forced to find high ground with friends, relatives or in shelters.

On March 12, Governor Pete Ricketts declared a state of emergency to deal with two very different, yet equally devastating weather disasters. All hell was yet to break loose, but it did a few days later. A week later Vice President Mike Pence visited Nebraska, one of those mostly square states out west, to view the damage.

What he found is Nebraska Strong. If you must ask: we do it on our own, without fanfare; we don't draw attention from the national media; we are a flyover state and we accept that, maybe even embrace it.

Ricketts spent several days before Pence's arrival touring flooded areas, viewing the devastation from the air and meeting with concerned officials and applauding volunteers on the ground. He did his best to expedite the federal disaster aid paperwork required by the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

"We are going to be far over what we need to be to declare that. We've got bridges out and levees broken, lots of roads, utilities, everything," said Ricketts.

But, he added, it's Nebraskan's optimism that's truly helping everyone get through this tragedy. "The spirit of Nebraska, there have been so many people impacted and they just have a spirit of how they're going to get through this."

Touring flood damage is somewhere in the When You Become Governor handbook. It's also a given that reporters will accompany the governor at some point, usually as a pool reporter tasked with sharing information with the rest of the media. I did such a trip with then-Governor Kay Orr in a military helicopter years ago. It's not glamorous work, but necessary.

Some years earlier I flew in a fixed wing aircraft with a different governor and a couple state senators and military personnel to see a massive blizzard that buried the Sandhills and scenic northwest Nebraska.

But neither of those incidents held a candle to what Nebraska is enduring right now. The flooding has even impacted high and dry Lincoln, the Capital City miles from any massive rivers. The city has been under mandatory water restrictions because the pumps in the Platte River well fields near Ashland, have been flooded. Lincoln's water comes from the aquifer beneath the river, but pumps that aren't pumping are problematic.

Yup, Nebraska, you can't get there from here. At one point, 79 highways and 1,568 miles of roadways were closed. Residents of one north central Nebraska county had to go to South Dakota as part of a detour caused by flooding and infrastructure damage. Grandparents had to miss grandkids' dance recitals and birthday parties. The stories were repeated statewide.

While flooding took its toll on livestock, blizzards compounded calving for farmers and ranchers in central and western Nebraska. The state Department of Agriculture said they have been overwhelmed with the outpouring of support for producers. They are working to coordinate with people who have offered hay, feed stuffs, fencing materials and equipment.

The grim task of estimating the damages to infrastructure, real and personal property continues with an initial estimate of \$1.3 billion likely to increase. Other costs will come. But Ricketts and others are certain that Nebraska will remain strong.

As someone who survived the big blizzards of 1949 and 1975 (and a lot of others in-between), I share that optimism. This has been a long hard winter and March has been a particularly bad actor, but I have seen the tiny green shoots of crocus and peonies sticking their heads up through the mulch.

50 Years Ago - Mar. 27th - Apr. 3rd, 1969
Former World War II General and two-term U.S. President Dwight D. Eisenhower died at the age of 78.

The Nebraska Supreme Court rejected a legal challenge to legislation authorizing the state game and parks commission to use eminent domain to obtain land for Indian Cave State Park.
Janet Zentner, rural Shubert, was selected by the L.O.O.F. and Rebekah Lodges to be their representative on the 1969 United Nations Pilgrimage.
Falls City 6' 6" senior Larry Malick, who scored a season total of 220 points, was named to the Aksarben All-Conference Team.
"Lady in Cement" was being shown at the Rivoli Theatre. "Coogan's Bluff" was on the big screen at Breezy Hill Drive-In, and "Rebel Wright and the Renegades" were providing dance music at Ye Ole Tyme Saloon, Rulo.
Rebecca Hill, Stella, was chosen Girls State representative of the Shubert American Legion Auxiliary.

Seventeen Rulo teenagers formed a club called RTTA (Rulo Teens Take Action).
A Department of Revenue agent came away "bleeding" after an encounter with an irate Falls City woman from whom he tried to collect sales taxes on proceeds of a home basement sale.

Falls City native Darwin Karsten established a new three year scoring record of 1,449 points while a member of the Concordia University, St. Louis men's basketball team.

Terry Bahr & Janice Martinosky were king and queen of the Dawson-Verdon activities banquet.
An effort was being made to form a hospital district that would provide an ambulance service.

Nick Kentopp was selected Boys' State representative of the Shubert American Legion Club.
Mutt & Jeff Drive-In advertised that Root Beer was free with a sandwich order on opening night.

After election day voting was tallied Leonard Fritz held a one vote margin over Berthal Kelley for 4th Ward Councilman and absentee ballots were expected to decide the race.

Election victors were for city council: Cliff Charbonneau, Ward 1; Jim Hill, Ward 2, and Bill Jones, Ward 3; and for school board: Jim Sfried and Howard Auxier.

The Falls City High School track team defeated Auburn in its opening meet 98-34.

Hinky Dinky was selling shank portion hams at 39-cents a pound, Eggs were 39-cents a dozen at Shaffer's, grapefruit and oranges 5-cents each at Kenny's Food Center, and turkeys 35-cents a pound at Safeway.

25 Years Ago - Mar. 27th - Apr. 3rd, 1994
The annual CMC Health Fair was wrapping up with hearing, blood sugar, blood pressure, glucose, and vision tests offered by the Lions Club screening van.

A settlement was reached by Richardson County regarding the overpayment of real estate and personal property taxes by Southeast Nebraska Telephone Co.

Nebraska Cellular announced construction of a new cellular tower to improve coverage for local residents and travelers.

Among bygone retailers promoting Spring values were Edgar & Dollies, Falters Clothing, Humm's Market, Katy's, Ken's Pharmacy, Mary's Waterbeds, Mommy & Me, PJ's Jewelry, Pamida, Style Masters, and Sheets Pharmacy.

-cated on the road beginning at the SW corner of the SE1/4 of Section 30, Township 2, Range 18 and then east approximately 2620 feet through the S1/2 of the SE1/4 of Section 30, Township 2, Range 18, and thence running in an easterly direction through and between Sections 29 and 32 of Township 2, Range 18 to the west bank of the Missouri River, also known as 709 Road east of 661 Avenue.

Windbreaks – Conservation for home and field

Spring is the time to begin planning windbreak planting or renovation

Near record snowfall, relentless cold temperatures, and high wind speeds have combined to make the winter of 2018-19 a challenging one. This winter should serve as a reminder of the need for windbreaks for protection of homes, farm facilities, crop and pasture fields, as well as livestock and wildlife.

A well-designed windbreak can reduce wind speeds by 60 percent, cutting home energy costs by 20 to 40 percent in some circumstances. Windbreaks also influence snowfall; preventing drifts from accumulating around houses, buildings, driveways and sidewalks. Windbreaks can also be used to protect livestock handling and feeding areas from excessive wind and drifting snow. Reduced wind pressure often lowers feed requirements and improves rate of gain in livestock.

Windbreaks are often used to disperse snowfall across crop fields or pastures; helping to distribute moisture more evenly and to dry field edges more quickly. They also act as screens against undesired sounds, sites, chemicals, odors, and dust.

Additionally, windbreaks provide needed habitat for many wildlife species. Windbreaks offer birds places for breeding, nesting, brood rearing and shelter from weather and predation. Windbreaks can also be designed with wildlife food and forage in mind. Common species which utilize windbreaks in Southeast Nebraska include fox squirrel, eastern cottontail rabbit, eastern wild turkey, northern bobwhite quail, northern cardinal and dozens of other bird species.

Many windbreaks in Southeast Nebraska have met their lifespan

and are often deteriorating. Others have suffered common pests such as bagworms, pine wilt, overcrowding, invasive species, and herbicide drift. These windbreaks are prime candidates for renovation.

Late winter and early spring is a good time to begin planning windbreak planting or renovation. Windbreaks can be assessed and designed in the spring and summer. Then site preparation may begin in the fall for planting the following spring.

If you have interest in renovating an existing windbreak or planting a new one, contact your local Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) or Natural Resource District (NRD) office. Conservation agents at those locations are available to provide cost free technical assistance.

Assistance may include answering questions regarding windbreaks and tree health, assessing current windbreak condition, designing a new or renovated windbreak, and offering recommendations on appropriate tree and shrub species. NRDS also offer trees for sale and site preparation, and tree planting for a fee. Both Nebraska NRCS and the NRDS around the state have programs which may be able to provide financial assistance in windbreak renovation and planting. 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Nebraska Extension offers resources to flood victims

Those affected by the flood are likely unsure of where to begin. Extension encourages individuals returning to homes and properties to first take steps to ensure their safety. When a home or building is flooded, there is likely damage to the structure.

Buildings need to be thoroughly dried, and before drinking water it is critical to test domestic wells for bacteria. Also, be cautious when working in and around contaminated floodwater.

Extension has compiled a list of the state's certified public health environmental laboratories where homeowners can obtain a water test kit. This information is available on Nebraska Extension's flood resources website, <https://flood.unl.edu>, which serves as a resource hub for families, homeowners, businesses and producers facing flood cleanup. New and updated information will be added to the site on an ongoing basis.

Tips for homeowners facing food-safety concerns after the flood can also be found on the flood resources website. This includes guidelines to help people decide when to throw out food and how to disinfect food that can be saved. For instance, screw-topped or crimp-topped jars or bottles of food that have come into contact with floodwaters should be thrown out, even when the jars have not been opened.

Extension is also a resource for those wanting to help flood victims. The Eastern Nebraska Research and Extension Center near Mead and Haskell Ag Lab near Concord are serving as donation locations for hay (large bales) and fencing materials for livestock owners and managers impacted by the flood. Those wishing to obtain the donated materials should contact the Nebraska Department of Agriculture.

"We're partnering with a number of state agencies and organizations to do what we can to help those who need it most," Hibberd said. "We're all in this together."

The Falls City Sacred Heart track season got underway last Thursday when the athletes competed at the 2019 Pioneer Indoor Meet held at Doane University. The Irish have 36 athletes out for track this season, 15 girls and 21 boys, 19 of the 36 kids out are

Funds from USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service help with livestock mortality

As the flood water recedes and snow melts, farmers and ranchers are getting a better look at the amount of damage their operations have suffered from last week's extreme weather events.

One of the more significant losses experienced by landowners has been livestock death. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service has assistance available to help landowners cope with the aftermath of livestock death. Through NRCS' Environmental Quality Incentives Program, commonly referred to as EQIP, farmers and ranchers can apply for assistance to properly dispose of dead livestock. Applications are being accepted now through July 1, 2019.

NRCS State Conservationist Craig Derickson said, "This was an unprecedented and devastating event for Nebraska. Some ranchers are dealing with hundreds of dead animals. This is not only damaging to their bottom-line, but if these animals are not disposed of properly, there could be negative impacts to water quality and other natural resources. NRCS conservationists are available to provide technical and financial assistance to help producers dispose of livestock carcasses in a safer manner."

Producers who have not already disposed of livestock can apply for EQIP now. Producers can then get a waiver to allow them to begin working to dispose of deceased livestock before having an approved EQIP contract.

"Typically, producers cannot begin working on an EQIP practice before their EQIP contract has been approved. But since this situation is so time-critical, NRCS is encouraging producers to sign up for EQIP first, then submit a waiver to go ahead and begin animal disposal prior to having their EQIP contract approved," Derickson said.

Producers in the area who suffered other damages due to the blizzard and flooding – such as damaged fencing, water sources, or windbreaks – may also seek assistance from NRCS through general EQIP funding. The sign-up period for general EQIP is continuous and has no cut off application date.

Derickson said, "NRCS is committed to helping producers get back on their feet after these extreme weather events while also ensuring Nebraska's natural environment remains healthy and productive." City moves forward with downtown project

During its Mon., Mar. 18th, meeting Falls City's city council voted 8-0 to move ahead with the second phase of the downtown streetscape project. AHRB, Bern, KS, was the only bidder on the project submitting a bid of \$438,977 for extending from 17th to 16th Streets sidewalk and curb improvements along Stone Street similar to those made in the 1700 block of Stone and adding a smaller but similar pedestrian bump out into 16th & Stone similar to that at 7th & Stone. The project will be financed largely by a \$243,000 Downtown Revitalization Fund Grant with the remainder coming from the city's Capital Improvement Fund and from community donations. The project is to be completed prior to this year's Cobblestone Festival. During discussion, City Administrator Gary Jorn indicated the project fit within the guidelines for use of Capital Improvement funds, he anticipated private donations would be received, and the city would lose the grant money if it did not move forward on the project.

Administrator Jorn reported he had received calls from water utility customers concerned about the impact Missouri River flooding may have on the City's water system wells. Jorn said he had personally inspected the site and was confident that flooding would not impact the wells. The Council approved the award to Frederick Brothers of Falls City a contract for \$14,200 for the demolish of houses at 1203 Lane Street and 915 Wilson Street. The Council decided not to move forward with demolition of a third house at 2215 Lane after a private party offered to purchase that building from the present owners with the expectation it may be refurbished. The Council voted to allow use of City right of way for construction of a retaining wall near Falls City Mercantile buildings to control the flow of rainwater with the understanding the business would erect a sign warning motorists of the existence of the structure. It also voted 8-0 to approve a request for favorable comment on an application for a Special Designated Liquor License sought by the Would Eye enabling them to serve alcoholic beverages at a wedding reception at Prichard Auditorium on May 25, 2019.
