

HOT AIR BALLOON FESTIVAL THIS WEEKEND

For the first time since 1995, Falls City will be the setting of the beloved Falls City Hot Air Balloon Festival.

This Saturday from 5:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. the public is invited to Brenner Field in Falls City where the Chamber has organized "Field of Fire" Balloon Glow at Dark, six food trucks including BBQ, Tacos and Kettlecorn; a beer and wine garden; music, face painting, and a balloon artist.

The main event, balloon liftoff, will be held at 7:00 p.m.

The cost for adults is \$10; ages

13-18 is \$5 and children ages 12 and under are free.

The food and drinks are separate, but everything else is included in the admission.

The following morning, the balloons will lift off again at 7 a.m. In addition, there will be a free-will pancake and sausage breakfast with planes arriving and taking off all morning.

Don't forget to bring your blankets and lawn chairs. There will be no outside food or drinks.

According to the June 20, 1995 edition of the Falls City Journal, 18 balloons lifted off into a

hazy atmosphere a few minutes after six a.m., including the two balloons pictured above. A large crowd gathered for that year's balloon launch and included former Falls Cityans that traveled from as far as New Mexico and North Carolina to witness the event.

In Bill Schock's 'Hangin' Out The Warsh' column, he wrote about the weekends festival, "The Balloon Show isn't supposed to be a money-maker for the Chamber-just an activity for the community."

The launch itself should be worth the price of admission.



ST. THOMAS EPISCOPAL CUTS RIBBON TO LITTLE FREE LIBRARY

The St. Thomas Episcopal Church, 1602 Harlan Street, in Falls City cut the ribbon on their 'Little Free Library' on Friday, May 31. The new Little Free Library was placed in the garden outside of the Church and will bring people together in sharing books and create a community of readers.

The idea for the 'Library' came about when Mary Whitehouse and Joyce Fee, two of the Churches parishioners would read books and share them back and forth.

"Joyce said wouldn't it be cute to have one of those, and we have the perfect place to put it," said Verneda Kelly, Priest in charge at St. Thomas Episcopal Church. That place would be the little garden that sits just to the north of the Church.

Tom Whitehouse purchased the materials and built the little library based on a plan that he and another parishioner, Martin Fee came up with for the 'Library.'

The books for the library are mostly donated by the Church with some of them being donated by Southeast Community College. The people of St. Thomas Episcopal Church want the community to know that the Library belongs to the entire town of Falls City and not just the Church.

Little Free Libraries are small book exchanges that number more than 75,000 around the world and in 85 countries. Little Free Libraries play an essential role by providing 24/7 access to books.

The Little Free Library non-profit organization has been honored by the Library of Congress, the National Book Foundation, and the American Library Association.

WHERE TO INSTALL C.R.I.M.E.S. SOFTWARE REMAINS UNRESOLVED

While minutes of the April 23rd meeting of the Richardson County Commissioners clearly indicated that Commissioners liked what they saw after reviewing a new records management system for the Richardson County Sheriff's Department and Law Enforcement Center

and voted to go ahead with purchase of the C.R.I.M.E.S. system from Justice Data Solutions. The original motion called for installation of the program on the Falls City Police Department server where it could be accessed by the Sheriff's Department, County Attorney, and the State Probation Department.

During the meeting, Sheriff Pounds reiterated what he had written in letters to the Commissioners, that he did not want the program to operate through the City of Falls City server.

Sheriff Pounds also stated once again to the Board that he was not going to sign the agreement if the requirement was to put the program on the city server.

During their Tue., June 5 meeting, further discussion was held by Commissioners with Sheriff Pounds regarding the installation of the C.R.I.M.E.S. software program. However, no action was taken to enter into the agreement with Justice Data Solutions for the implementation

COUNCIL RENEWS LEASE OF SENIOR CENTER AND APPROVES USE OF PUBLIC FACILITIES FOR SEVERAL EVENTS

During its June 3rd meeting Falls City's City Council voted 7-0 with one councilperson absent to approve a one year extension of the lease of the Senior Center Building at 221 W. 16th Street to Blue Rivers Agency on Aging from July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2020. Blue Rivers will have use of the building from 6 am to 3 pm Mon. through Fri. to prepare and serve meals and conduct recreational activities for seniors. The Agency will pay monthly rent of \$200, pay for health department inspections, and provide \$500,000 in liability insurance and \$50,000 in property insurance.

Following a public hearing without public response, approval was given 7-0 to an application for a \$36,200 USDA grant for an upgrade of the



CASSIA KITE IS TAKING THE ART WORLD BY STORM

Cassia Kite, a Florida-based teacher and artist, and a 1998 graduate of Auburn (NE) High School, was standing in front of her late grandmother's dilapidated home east of Auburn one day, when she had an epiphany that changed her life forever.

Eight months pregnant at the time, she was visiting her parents, Jim and Nancy Kite, to reminisce a little before she became a very busy working mom. While she stared at her grandparent's house, which had been in the Kite family for five generations, she took in every inch of her surroundings. A light breeze blew, so she heard the nearby trees rustling. Birds chirped as they soared through the air. On a nearby country road, tires crunched on the rocks as people drove by.

Listening to those sounds, Cassia thought back about her time at the house as a child, and the hours upon hours that she and her Grandma Kite had spent together, playing the baby grand piano. Then, in her memories, she saw her grandma's hands playing the piano keys, and heard the songs that the two had often played.

Goosebumps raised on her arms. At that moment, all of the sights and sounds blended together to create a beautiful symphony that filled her heart with joy. And she wondered how she could create a connection like that for her art shows so that her viewers could truly feel her art, instead of just looking at it.

Then, the answer hit her. Music and the visual arts can connect human beings in emotional ways the rocks as people drove by.

Last week, Senators wrapped up the First Session of the 106th Nebraska Legislature. From property taxes to a new pro-life law, the Legislature did important work on a wide variety of issues. Here are a few of the highlights from the session over the last five months.

When session began in January, it was hard to imagine that Nebraska would endure its most widespread natural disaster in state history within a matter of weeks. As Nebraskans stepped up to recover

and rebuild bigger and better than before, the Legislature took on the cause of #NebraskaStrong and did its part as well. Senators put \$11 million in fresh funding into the Governor's Emergency Relief Fund to help rebuild the state. They also passed legislation to provide property tax relief for natural disaster victims, so that families and farmers don't get taxed out of house and home.

In this session, property tax relief was my number one priority. In addition to property tax relief for Nebraskans impacted by natural disasters, Senators achieved three other important priorities on taxes. First, I signed LB 103 into law to end automatic property tax increases. Before, local governments were taking in additional tax revenue from increased land values without having to hold a hearing or a vote. LB 103 requires a public hearing and vote before boards can take more of your money. This is a big win for taxpayer transparency.


Second, the Legislature approved my recommendation to add \$51 million annually to the Property Tax Credit Relief Fund. This is a 23% increase for a total of \$275 million in property tax relief per year for Nebraska's farmers, ranchers, and homeowners. To put this in perspective, direct relief increased about 20% in the six years before I took office. Over the last five years, Senators and I have successfully worked to almost double direct property tax relief for taxpayers.

Finally, the Legislature wisely voted down attempts to raise sales taxes, which would have been detrimental to growing Nebraska. Some Senators had wanted to raise taxes to put more money into big government spending. This has been tried in the past, and hasn't resulted in lower property taxes in the long-term.

While these steps were important, the Legislature concluded without delivering structural reforms to our property tax system. There's one key reform that Senators should make a top priority: Capping growth in property taxes. Nebraska has over 2,300 units of local government making decisions about property taxes without any limit on what they can take from you. This year, I proposed LR 8CA which would give the people of Nebraska a vote on capping the growth in property taxes. I have already been sitting down with Senators to talk about this idea and others that can deliver the property tax relief Nebraskans need in the next legislative session.

In addition to flood relief and work on property taxes, the session yielded other important results. Senators worked to control spending in the next two-year budget to 3%. At my request, Senators voted to merge state agencies to create the Department of Environment and Energy and make state government more effective and efficient. Senator John Lowe of Kearney helped move three safety programs from the Department of Labor to the Fire Marshal's Office, which is a better fit for their mission. Thanks to the leadership of Senator Joni Albrecht of Thurston, the Legislature enacted new pro-life legislation that strengthens Nebraska's informed consent laws. Unnecessary occupational licensing requirements for appraisers and realtors were rolled back. Senator Julie Slama of Peru brokered a compromise to update Nebraska's civics education and Americanism standards. And Senators passed new laws to make Nebraska more veteran and military-friendly.

These are just a few of the results from this year's legislative session. While several important priorities were addressed, Senators have more work to do on property taxes. I will continue to work closely with Senators to deliver structural reforms and real, sustainable property tax relief. Here's what really broke the 2019 Legislature

Fear of retaliation and distrust broke the 2019 Legislature.

As lawmakers approached the end of a session shortened by four days at the Speaker of the Legislature's prerogative, passage of an upgraded economic development incentive bill was tied to the approval of a property tax relief bill. Both failed after threats of retaliation.

Distrust of one another as individuals became almost as strong as Democrats not trusting Republicans and vice versa, in the officially nonpartisan Nebraska Unicameral. Speaker Jim Scheer and several of his colleagues mentioned the situation in remarks on the final day of the session. All of this played out against a well-established (four years) record of retaliation by a Governor who has been known to make large personal cash contributions to defeat candidates he opposes – even members of his own party.

So, it was a bit of a surprise on the last day of their shortened session that lawmakers overrode a gubernatorial veto which had been characterized as a property tax increase. Omaha Senator Justin Wayne and others called bull on the Governor's assessment of a bill (LB492) creating a Regional Metropolitan Transit Authority as a \$17 million property tax increase. "The bill allows the Omaha Transit Authority to convert itself into a new political subdivision that will have broader taxing authority," Governor Pete Ricketts said in his veto message. "LB 492 amounts to an incredible \$17 million property tax increase for all residents of Omaha and Douglas County because it moves the transit authority's property tax levy authority outside of the city and county tax lids and authorizes the new authority to double its existing property tax levy amount."

The measure is permissive and simply allows participating entities to solve a transportation problem, Scheer said. The override vote was 33-16.

A second override of a bill (LB533) from Omaha Senator Michaela Cavanaugh was scrapped after the sponsor warned her colleagues that the bill, dealing with wording on marriage license paperwork, advanced unanimously from committee and cleared three rounds of debate before passage with no objections. The Governor vetoed the bill saying he would direct the Department of Health and Human Services to make the changes administratively.

Currently, the state marriage license applications refer to Groom/Party 1 and Bride/Party 2. Cavanaugh proposed to reference all couples on the marriage license application, the marriage license, and the certificate of marriage as Applicant 1 and Applicant 2.

"The term selected in the bill is workable for the marriage license application at which time the couple are applying for a license; however, both the marriage license and the formal certificate of marriage are issued after the parties are married," Ricketts veto message said. "They are no longer 'applicants.' The mandated use of this term would be factually inaccurate on both the marriage license and the marriage certificate."

Cavanaugh said "every single

person in this Legislature should be put on notice by the Governor's action on this bill" which had no opposition and had not generated comment from the Executive Branch before the veto. At least one lobbyist and one colleague tried to urge her to push for an override vote, but she declined.

Veteran Sen. Ernie Chambers of Omaha warned his colleagues that he may derail the next session – his last after 44 years before he is again term-limited. "You can set the rules, but I set the pace," he said. Scheer, noting the divisiveness that caused tax reform and a renewed business incentive package to fall by the wayside, urged his colleagues to take the summer to reflect and get to know one another better.

In closing the session, Ricketts said the example of "Nebraska Strong" in response to the Spring

storms and state-wide flooding, is a picture of what can happen when we work together.

Lawmakers introduced 739 bills in the opening 10 days of the session. Of that number, 294 passed. They did fulfill their constitutional obligation to pass a balanced budget. But, beyond that, it wasn't a very pleasant or productive time. Lincoln Senator Patty Pansing Brooks sadly noted that some of her colleagues did not attend the annual Sine Die party on May 30. The event features skits and an opportunity to unwind and put the session in perspective.

Apparently, some wounds will take more time to heal.

Darwin Karsten received his bachelor of divinity degree and was ordained at Christ Lutheran Church, Falls City.

The Falls City Elks Exalted Youth Week brochure was judged as the best in the state in its division.

The Rivoli was showing "Hell in the Pacific" and "The Mini Skirt Mob" to be followed up "Smith" and "The Incredible Journey".

The twin bill at the Breezy Hill Drive-In included "Angel in my Pocket" and "Arizona Bushwhackers" to be followed up by "Rosemary's Baby" and Jane Fonda in "Barbarella".

Tania Gilliland, Humboldt, was the winner of the Richardson County home extension club \$100 scholarship.

The "Friends of the Library" group's first project was acquiring an air conditioner for the Book Room.

The Falls City Legion baseball team put together a three game winning streak and of those in the regular lineup David Kotich was the leading batter with a .412 batting average.

Cecil Reafs was honored as Toastmaster of the year by the Falls City Toastmasters club.

A congratulatory letter from President Nixon was read during the 100th anniversary celebration of St. Peter's Lutheran Church, 12 miles north of Falls City.

A team consisting of Scott Magdanz, Doug Sefried, Mike Whalen, and Melvin Shafer won the 220 relay and Mike Whalen won the 50 Yard Dash in the Bantam division of the Midwest Junior Olympics at Omaha.

An ordinance was introduced to annex a strip of land north of Appleoff Addition to Stanton Lake and the city council passed an ordinance extending the natural gas franchise of Gas Service Co.

The Falls City Chamber of Commerce general membership meeting was planned at Camp Rulo following a ribbon-cutting ceremony marking the end of toll charges on the Rulo bridge.

Dr. Bill G. Farmer announced he was giving up his Falls City practice and was moving to California. Dr. Robert L. Heins also closed his practice to join the Lincoln General hospital staff.

Stan Kotich hurled a no-hitter for the Falls City Elks Midgets who defeated Syracuse 5-2. The Legion won its game with Syracuse 10-3.

Roger Kiekhauer started work on a new building in Rulo to house a coin-operated laundry with 10 washers and 4 dryers.

Sally Kelly was one of 32 State College System students to participate in a Scandinavian Summer Institute.

Food Club Baby Food was 10 jars for 95-cents at Hinky Dinky and two large heads of lettuce were 25-cents at Safeway.

25 Years Ago - June 12 to June 18, 1994

The District 56 School Board adopted a negotiated pay package for teachers providing approximately five percent increase in salaries and benefits.

Tom Jones, Joel Baker, Dwayne Lundy, and Everett Watkins, all members of Company B, 134th Infantry, Falls City and Auburn, were among 23 Nebraska National Guardsmen making a trip to France in observance of D-Day.

The Shubert Run of the Gold Wing Touring Association included a parade of 135 motorcycles.

"The Notables" jazz ensemble of the Air Combat Command Heartland of America Band provided musical entertainment at Brenner Field on Saturday during the Hot Air Balloon Show.

Movies playing at the River Twin Cinema were "Getting Even With Dad" and "The Cowboy Way".

The Falls City Elks Midgets scored five of their runs in the bottom half of the opening inning and went on to defeat Craig 11-5 at Dallas Jones Park.

Two players from Sacred Heart's state championship football team, Matt O'Grady and Jason Lenard, were chosen to play in the Eight-Man All-Star football game at Hastings.

Southeast Consolidated Outstanding Students for May included 7th grader Janelle Havenman, 8th grader Joe James, and Juniors Brooke Beckett and Mike Skinner.

The bright red, yellow, and blue playground equipment at Dallas Jones Park was installed thanks to a \$6,000 grant, \$2,500 in private donations, and \$3,500 in city funds.

The Falls City Elks Lodge received its 24th national championship in its community size category for the brochure on its Elks Youth Week competition.

District Judge Robert Finn scheduled a pre-trial hearing in Lincoln but had yet to rule on motions for a change of venue by attorneys for John Lotter, 22, and Thomas Nissen, 21, both charged in a triple homicide at a Humboldt farmhouse.

Another challenge: finding the right follow-up care after hospitalization

"Thinking About Health," is part of the Nebraska Press Association's partnership with Rural Health News Service, which will provide Nebraskans with unbiased health-related information, designed to help better understand the health issues facing our communities, state and nation.

If ever there were a weak link in hospital care, it's what happens when you or a loved one leaves the hospital. It's becoming clear that the process known as discharge planning is deficient, can be harmful, and sometimes results in a patient's decline.



One in five patients across the country needs further care after discharge from a hospital, according to a series of four reports published by the United Hospital Fund in New York City. That's a lot of people, and many times their families don't know where to turn for help. The Fund reported that hospitals themselves sometimes prove to be of little assistance.

Patients are being sent not only to nursing homes but also to long-term acute care facilities (LTACs), a relatively new type of facility that treats sicker patients for an average of at least 25 days for recovery, or to sub-acute facilities, home care agencies or rehabilitation centers with little input from their families and little explanation of what these facilities can do.

How many families have ever heard of an LTAC, for instance? Mine never had, and neither had I when I found myself transferred to one early in 2018 after a long hospital stay necessitated by a series of ailments caused by what seemed to be a simple infection.

When my daughter called facilities in Manhattan - where we live - looking for care, most wouldn't even take her calls. "I called around and realized you cannot find a place on your own," she said. "That's not how this works."

Too often families find that hospitals limit the options for them. The United Hospital Fund found that even though hospital staff stressed patient choice, patients and their families actually had little choice.

One woman sent me a tweet not long ago saying that a VA hospital gave her father and his family "zero" time to make a choice. Instead they were given the names of three facilities, "all one star," she said. Presumably she was referring to a ranking from the federal government's Nursing Home Compare website that rates the country's nursing homes. "We had to fight daily for basic human needs to be met," she told me.

David Lipshutz, associate director of the Center for Medicare Advocacy, told me hospitals have electronic systems and share profiles of patients they are about to discharge with prospective recovery facilities. "They shop the patient around and say, 'This is the facility to go to.'"

If hospitals are hitting the limits of what Medicare will pay for a patient's care, they have a great incentive for moving people out. To them it doesn't matter if a patient is moved to another state, as I was, or to another town. Either one can make it difficult for family to visit and keep an eye on the care, which is all-important.

The Hospital Fund also noted that legal safeguards don't go far enough to protect patients and help their families and care givers choose high quality options. That means hospitals are not giving enough good information to families, already stressed by the illness of a loved one.

Even if a hospital recommended the Nursing Home Compare website, families often found the site lacking information about services families needed. Hospital staff did not have or provide information about the quality of care or a facility's relevance to the patient's needs.

In the end, when families did have a choice, location and transportation were key to their decision, the Fund reported. In the absence of any other compelling information about a facility, who wouldn't select a place where you could easily visit your relative?

But even if a family did make an informed choice, if their preferred facility did not have a bed available, they had to go elsewhere. The hospital made the decision.

Because the system is such a mess, it's hard to give good advice to families. But there are a couple things I can suggest.

Medicare requires a discharge notice, which sets out a patient's appeal rights and procedures, to be given no later than two days after a person is admitted to a hospital. Some are given at admission, usually a time of confusion, and the explanation of rights is likely to be overlooked. Be aware of it, though, and read it carefully. You may need to rely on it if you think a relative needs to stay longer in the hospital.



Cassia kite is taking the art world by storm

that no other medium could. What if she took her hand-stitched, embroidered tapestries, and translated the colors into color maps, then assigned a musical note to every color?

The lighter the color, the higher the note. The darker the color, the lower the note. Her art would not only be visual, but audible and participatory as well.

A new, innovative medium was born. Cassia named it "Soundstitching."

Excited to experiment with her idea, she headed back to Florida. She carried with her a renewed passion for her work. But she didn't tell anyone. Prior to her pregnancy, she had been a painter, and had experienced some success with brushes and a palette. Her friends had just assumed she would return to painting once her daughter was born.

But Cassia had birthed a new baby, and she was overwhelmed with the possibilities.

She wanted time to nurture it, to give it roots, to let it grow.

When her daughter, Nina, arrived one month later, Cassia and her husband, Tim Jaeger, were elated. Already blessed with Tim's son, Jett, from a previous marriage, the couple felt like their family was complete. In addition, Cassia had such passion for her new project that she felt like her creative life was evolving. She started working tirelessly to launch her idea.

First, she created two intricately-detailed embroidered pieces that were based on her memories of home. Then, she developed a color mapping system, and placed corresponding notes on musical scoresheets. She arranged compositions based on the notes, and when she was finished, turned the musical score over to musicians who "played" her art at local shows.

People didn't get it. "Some of my friends told me to go back to painting," Cassia said, in a recent telephone interview. "But Soundstitching was my passion. I wasn't going to let other people's opinions keep me from my calling. So I went back to the stitching studio, arranged the colors on the map, and kept creating more work."

The more persistent she was, the more the local artists and musicians opened up to her vision.

After a few successful exhibitions in Florida, (where she teaches at IMG Academy, a boarding school for elite athletes), she started branching out. Each step was a little more daring than the one before.

In 2016, she traveled back to Nebraska and visited the Flatwater Folk Art Museum where she met the museum director, owner and fellow artist George W. Neubert. He encouraged her to research the nationally-known KANEKO organization in Omaha. Their mission

was a match for Cassia's Soundstitching project, and they exhibited her work in July of 2017, in tandem with the Omaha Under the Radar Music Festival. There, she had the opportunity to collaborate with a composer, 14-person ensemble and an Omaha dance troupe. That was truly her break-out moment.

"All of it came together in an opportunity that I couldn't believe," Kite said. "The interpretations performed by the musicians and dancers were just incredible."

In 2018, she traveled back to Nebraska and Missouri, and opened an exhibition at her college alma mater, Northwest Missouri State University, where she graduated in 2010 with two bachelor's degrees. (She earned a master's degree in 2010 from the University of Florida.)

Since then, she has exhibited at music festivals and universities, and in museums and galleries in Nebraska, Florida, and several places in between. She has been featured in magazines and newspapers from Auburn to Chicago, and from Chicago to Florida.

In 2018, her work from the Kaneko exhibition was selected by a magazine called Fiber Art Network as the winner of its Paul J. Smith "Excellence in Fibers" award.

"The things that have happened since the creation of Soundstitching have been extremely humbling," Cassia said. "That's how I know that this is what I am meant to do."

Since developing her love for textiles, she has also ventured into the quilting world. Her maternal grandmother, Lenore Bailey Mikelsen, was a quilter, and influenced Cassia's early love for the soft, warm blankets.

Her first quilting project was for baby Nina. Cassia pieced together a quilt using Papa Jim's old work shirts.

"I like taking things apart and putting them back together to make something new and entirely different," Cassia said. "Plus, knowing that my dad wore those shirts, and that Nina will now have pieces of him forever, well, that is very special and nostalgic to me."

Her latest quilts will help audiences understand the thought processes that she uses for her Soundstitching projects. The quilts are large color maps, the ones that she uses to translate color into musical notes.

"I can't wait for people to see them," she said.

Those pieces have become part of her latest show, and will be on display this month, when Cassia opens her solo exhibition at the Falls City Library and Arts Center. The show, titled "Soundstitching: Common Threads," will hang in the Stalder Gallery from June 20th to July 31st.

A reception, gallery talk, and opening will be held there on Thursday, June 20th, beginning at

6 p.m.

The show and opening are being sponsored by the Richardson County Arts and Humanities Council, and will be produced in part by a grant from the Richardson County Visitors Committee.

As a special treat, Cassia has hand-stitched an embroidered piece that depicts the Gehling Theater. Natives of Falls City will recognize that name as the one that is embedded, not only in their memories, but above the True Value hardware store owned by Roger and Patty Kiekhafer.

The business is housed in the old Gehling Theater building at 1519 Stone Street. Kite and performance artist Kenneth Be' of Omaha will meet in the theater earlier in the day, and will record Be's interpretation of Kite's hand-stitched work that features the theater.

That night, Be' will again interpret Kite's work for the audience at the opening.

Be', a virtuoso on a folk instrument called the lute, currently serves as the paintings conservator at the Gerald R. Ford Conservation Center in Omaha. He has been performing on the lute since 1974.

"I am so excited to hear his interpretation of this piece," Kite said. "To work with a performer of such amazing caliber, in a gallery just minutes from my childhood home, is beyond my wildest dreams."

The opening will also be interactive. Kite has created a system by which audience members can record and post to social media their own interpretations of her work. According to gallery curator, Christina Wertenberger, that is, in itself, brave for an artist.

"It shows that she's interested in the way that the viewer reacts and interacts with her art," Wertenberger said. "Many artists are so protective of their work that they want to be the only ones interpreting it. That is understandable, too, though. They've worked on individual pieces for months, if not years. Cassia's selflessness with her work is pretty amazing, as is her ability to modernize a traditional textile technique; tapestry, and create a multidisciplinary art that leaves the viewer wondering about the location, history, and personal connection of each piece. This is an exhibition you will not want to miss."

Cassia said, "I really love being able to create a project, then give it to a collaborator so he, she, or they can create their own work with it. That way, I get to see another artist's vision of what I have created. I am constantly learning from my collaborators, and as an educator, there's nothing more exciting than teaching, and learning."

Spoken like a true artist, who's on the verge of something big. This local girl, whose roots are stitched into every fiber of her being, is taking the art world by storm.

There's probably only one person who's more excited about that than Cassia is. Grandma Kite is no-doubt looking down from the bench of her baby grand piano, and smiling with pride as she plays the songs that she and Cassia played together all those years ago; the same songs that she played in Cassia's memories that day, when Cassia stood in front of the farmhouse and had an epiphany—one that floated down on the notes, to change her life forever.

Goltz and Simon to be honored at All-Star game in Hastings

On Saturday, June 15, the 42 annual Sertoma Eight-Man All-Star game will take place at the Tom Osborne Family Sports Complex in Hastings, Nebraska.

Representing our area will be Falls City Sacred Heart graduate and three-sport standout, Drew Bippes. Bippes led the 9-2 Irish last season, completing 67 percent of his passes (117-174) for 1662 yards and 25 touchdowns. On the ground, Bippes added 424 yards and 11 touchdowns. Defensively Bippes added 39 tackles and a fumble recovery.

At halftime of the game, two coaches, fourteen players, and one sportswriter will be inducted into 2019 Eight-Man Football Hall of Fame. The Hall of Fame is presented by the Nebraska Eight Man Coaches Association and sponsored by Pinnacle Bank of Nebraska.

Receiving the hall of fame recognition this year are local standouts, Steve Simon and Coach Doug Goltz. Simon was instrumental in helping to build the "dynasty" that Coach Goltz has put together at Sacred Heart. Simon was part of the teams that began the 87-game winning streak for the Irish. Simon was named first team All-Conference all four years and first team All-State three times. Simon finished his Irish career with 4,616 yards on the ground and 106 touchdowns.

Coach Doug Goltz is being recognized for being one of the top coaches in Nebraska high school history. Goltz has amassed a .852 winning percentage (307-53). His teams have won eight state championships, qualified for the playoffs 32 consecutive seasons and had six straight undefeated championship seasons from 1989-1994, which included the state record 87 game winning streak. Goltz has sent nearly 40 players to the all-star game over the years and has been an assistant and head coach in the game. Goltz also was the head coach of the 2005 Nebraska vs. Oklahoma All-Star game.

Kickoff for the 8 Man All-Star game is slated for 6:00 p.m. at Hastings College on Saturday, June 15.

SENCA and SNAP-partnering to feed hungry households

Even though Southeast Nebraska Community Action Partnership has been providing a variety of programs and services to residents and communities throughout southeast Nebraska for more than 53 years, the basic need for food is still one of the most requested of all available services.

In response to this identified need, SENCA continues to provide a variety of food-related programs that include: emergency food pantries available throughout the six core county service areas of Cass, Johnson, Nemaha, Otoe, Pawnee, and Richardson; Meal's on Wheels that provides balanced, nutritional meals to qualifying residents of Humboldt, Pawnee,

and Tecumseh, Congregate Meal Programs available in the communities of Pawnee City and Tecumseh; scheduled nutrition classes; in addition to teaming up with schools and community partners to provide weekend and summer backpack food programs for youth.

Did you know that SENCA is also a partner with the Food Bank of Lincoln by helping qualifying families throughout southeast Nebraska apply for SNAP (Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program) benefits? SNAP, formerly known as the Food Stamp Program that is administered through the Department of Health and Human Services, helps individuals and

families purchase nutritious food by providing a monthly allotment of benefits on an Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) card. SNAP cards resemble a bank debit card, making shopping easy and discreet for those who qualify for the program.

SNAP benefits are available to anyone that qualifies. Program eligibility is calculated by Gross Monthly Income and the number of people in the household. Individuals can own a house and a vehicle and still receive SNAP benefits. Many working families are eligible to receive SNAP benefits if they fall within the income guidelines. Individuals can also receive SSI (Supplemental Security Income), disability-related Medicaid, or other insurance benefits while participating in SNAP. Depending on household size, income resources, and expenses, the SNAP benefit amount will vary for each family or individual; thereby, every family situation is unique.

If an individual is over the age of 60 and interested in applying for SNAP benefits, different eligibility requirements may exist. Seniors can utilize SNAP benefits and still receive commodities and meals-on-wheels.

Individuals interested in finding out more about the SNAP program or any of SENCA's programs that address food insecurity, are asked to contact the SENCA outreach office near you and speak to a trained Family Development Associate or contact the SENCA Central Office at 402-862-2411. Insert: 1950 Section 105.2 delete paragraph 1 through 6, one (1) copy of the International Building Code, 2012 Edition is on file at the office of Municipal Clerk and is available for public inspection at any reasonable time. (Ref. 18-132 RS Heb.) (Amended: Ord. #2002-100; Ord. #2008-102)

Section 2. That Chapter 9, Article 3, Section 9-302 of the Falls City Municipal Code be amended to read as follows:

Insert: City of Falls City, Table R301.2(1) Insert:

TABLE R301.2(1)

CLIMATE AND GEOGRAPHIC DESIGN CRITERIA table with columns: WIND DIRECTION, WIND SPEED, SUBJECT TO DAMAGE FROM WEATHERING, and FLOOD HAZARD.
