FCHS STUDENT STARTS 'HIT AND RUN CHALLENGE' TO RAISE MONEY FOR FALLS CITY VOLUNTEER AMBULANCE SQUAD

Zach Beaver, a former Junior at Falls City High School and son of Mike and Kris Beaver, wanted to do a community service project that would help the community in the most direct way, so he decided to help the Falls City Volunteer Ambulance Squad. He called his project the "Hit and Run Challenge."

"They are a great group of people who could really benefit from this," said Beaver, about the Falls City Volunteer Ambulance Squad.

The Hit and Run Challenge was an idea that Beaver got from a group called Athletes 4Children. They had the same kind of approach by donating a specific dollar amount per a particular baseball statistic. Athletes 4 Children helps others by merely playing high

School Sports. Students chose how much they donate by their stat, game, or sport and select the goal that best works for their budget. At the end of their season, they can donate their earnings to Children's Hospital and Medical Center. Beaver wanted to keep his monies local, so he chose the ambulance squad.

"I chose the Ambulance Squad because they are completely volunteer, and they selflessly give their time to protect the community. I thought that would be the best way to directly help the community of Falls City," said Beaver.

The Falls City Volunteer Ambulance Squad is volunteer based EMS service that provides ambulance service to the citizens of Falls City, Rulo, Verdon, Salem, Stella and Shubert areas.

At the end of the season, Bea-

ver ended up with 14 hits, six runs, four stolen bases, and as a pitcher he had three strikeouts. That was \$27 on the season. Beaver had five people donate along with him for a total of \$330.

"The Falls City Ambulance Squad was very grateful to Zach for his fundraising efforts. It's refreshing to see the young people of our community give back and get involved in organizations," said FC Volunteer Ambulance Squad member, Amy Olberding.

Beaver will be attending York High School for his senior year. He is looking for a Falls City High School athlete to continue the challenge and help out the Ambulance Squad.

"It doesn't just have to be baseball, but any sport can find a few stats that they would like to use," said Beaver.



UTILITY RATE INCREASES GIVEN FINAL APPROVAL

During the Mon., July 15, meeting of the Falls City, City Council, Council President Don Ferguson presided in the absence of Mayor Shawna Bindle due to family obligations. The final approval was given to ordinances increasing Electrical, Water, Natural Gas, and Sewer Utility rates. Approvals were by 7-0 votes with Councilman Lucas Frosesch absent.

Electrical rates are to be increased by 2% annually Oct. 1 in 2019, 2020, and 2021 in all rate classes with the increases directed more toward monthly customer charges and summer usage. The base or minimum monthly charge for city residents will be \$17.00/month in 2019, \$18.50 in 2020, and \$18.87 in 2021. The base rate for rural residents will be \$21.75 in 2019, \$24.50 in 2020, and \$24.99 in 2021. According to the J.K. Consulting Falls City's rates will still be competitive with those of neighboring utilities even with the proposed rate increases. The consulting firm stated that on a cash basis, the electrical utility experienced a loss of \$26,000 in 2019. They stated if no changes in rates were made, that amount was anticipated to increase to \$426,000 in Fiscal Year 2022 due to general cost escalation and the desire of the utility to fund capital improvements from revenue without issuing new debt.

Water utility rates are to increase by five percent annually for all rate classes in 2019, 2020, and 2021 for a cumulative rate increase of approximately 22 percent by 2022. The base, or minimum monthly service charge, for a one-inch meter will be \$9.62 in 2019, \$10.10 in 2020, and \$10.60 in 2021. On a cash basis, the water utility experienced a deficit of \$125,000 in 2019, and without a rate increase, deficits would reach \$194,000 by Fiscal Year 2022. The major causes of the deficit were due to increased costs of operation and the capital costs of water treatment improvements. J.K. Consulting said Falls City water rates would be competitive with those of neighboring cities after the increases.

Residential sewer rates will increase by \$2.09 per month in 2019, \$2.24 per month in 2020, and \$2.40 per month in 2022, an increase of about seven percent per year for a cumulative increase of 22.5 percent. The minimum monthly charge for a one inch or less water meter will become \$19.69 in 2019, \$21.07 in 2020, and \$22.54 in 2021. The consulting firm indicated that on a cash basis the wastewater utility experienced a defi-

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ACTING SHERIFF MEETS WITH COMMISSIONERS NEW RESIDENTIAL SUBDIVISION UNDERWAY

Acting County Sheriff Roland Merwin met with the Richardson County Board of Supervisors for the first time since being appointed to that post following the resignation of former Sheriff Don Pounds. Sheriff Merwin briefly discussed with the Board routine business at the Sheriff's Department during its Tue., July 16, meeting.

Richardson County's I.T. specialist, Joe Buckminster, reported on his findings regarding what type of extension of the contract was possible with the current Sheriff's Department software provider, I.T.I. Buckminster said I.T.I. would not agree to a three-month service agreement for the existing software, only a six-month extension. Buckminster recommended that the County authorize the six-month extension to allow the Sheriff's Department sufficient time to move all its data accurately and securely from the current system to the new C.R.I.M.E.S. software program.

A motion was made by Caverzagie to authorize a six-month extension of the I.T.I. Software programming, from August 1, 2019, through January 31, 2020, to allow for sufficient time for transferring data from the I.T.I. System to the C.R.I.M.E.S. software program. Frank seconded the motion. Approval was by a 2-0 vote with Commissioners Frank and Caverzagie both voting aye, Commis-

sioner Dave Sichel who is recovering from a medical condition, was unable to be present.

The Board conducted its quarterly jail inspection and found the facility to be in good order.

Vice-Chairman Terry Frank opened a public hearing at 10:00 a.m. to receive input from the public either in support or in opposition to the vacation and abandonment of a County Road. Mr. and Mrs. Charles Mack was present at the hearing and spoke in favor of the vacation of the road. Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr. was also present for the hearing. Vice-Chairman, Terry Frank declared the public hearing closed at 10:05 a.m.

Highway Superintendent Darveau reported on the routine maintenance being done on county roads and bridges this week. He reported that rock hauling is being done and that the new rock trailer had been received and was put into service. Superintendent Darveau also reported that bridge construction at Dawson is proceeding.

The Board received a recommendation from County Building Maintenance Technician Tyler Cooper, on disposal of surplus vehicles. A motion was made by Caverzagie to advertise that Richardson County will offer for sale at the Frederick Consignment Auction on Saturday, September 7, 2019, the following surplus vehicles: 2004 Dodge

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SIMPLY THE BEST

I say it all the time: Nebraska is the best place in the world to live, work, and raise a family. It's not just a slogan—it's my sincere conviction. And there's plenty of evidence to back up my belief. From great-paying jobs to a family-friendly culture, a wide variety of measures help make the case that Nebraska is simply the best.

The Best Place to Live: Nebraska is a place where neighbors look after one another, and take pride in their communities. After the blizzards and floods in March, and again during last week's flooding in Central Nebraska, the people of our state rallied to help one another recover. They donated hay, stacked sandbags, volunteered with the Red Cross and United Way, and so much more. It should come as no surprise that the Corporation for National and Community Service ranks our state as having the sixth-highest rate of volunteerism.

Nebraska is also a great retirement destination. I know common wisdom points to Arizona or Florida. However, last week Bankrate named Nebraska as the top place to retire in the nation. Bankrate's ranking considered such factors as wellness, culture, and crime rates.

Nebraskans spend very little of our lives stuck in traffic, too. Last month, US News and World Report (US News) reported that Nebraskans enjoy the fifth-fastest commute times in America. Unsurprisingly, US News rates the quality of our roads as sixth-best in the country.

The Best Place to Work: Not only is Nebraska livable, it has a vibrant economy and an abundance of rewarding jobs. Nebraska three-peated as Governor's Cup champion this year for having the most economic development projects per capita of any state. In February, CNBC ranked Nebraska #4 on its list of "best states to find a job in 2019." And in last week's CNBC report of the "Best States for Business," Nebraska moved up the charts, jumping six spots overall. Nebraska performed especially well in the "Economy" category, soaring from #37 in 2018 to #9 this year! With a great economy, lots of jobs, and short commutes, Nebraska is the best place to work.

This pro-growth reputation has helped us build the "Silicon Prairie." Fast-growing, Nebraska-born companies like Sojern and Hudl have demonstrated that our state has a great climate for tech startups. Meanwhile, America's established tech titans are making their way to Nebraska. In February, Google unveiled plans to build a data center in Nebraska. And just last month, Facebook and Amazon both opened their first physical locations in Nebraska. Furthermore, in June, Compute North announced its decision to build a multimillion-dollar data center at Kearney's tech park.

Nebraska is also experiencing a bioscience boom. Last Wednesday, Veramaris opened a \$200 million facility in Blair to produce animal feed that's rich in omega-3 fatty acids. The company's innovative process mixes dextrose from Nebraska-grown corn with fermented natural marine algae to make nutritional feed for aquaculture (fish farming). The Dutch company's grand opening comes two years after Novozymes, a global biotechnology firm from Denmark, built a \$36 million expansion in Blair. And less than a year ago, Columbus also welcomed a major bioscience commercial plant, when Prairie Catalytic began operations. Its factory manufactures ethyl acetate from ethanol produced with Nebraska corn.

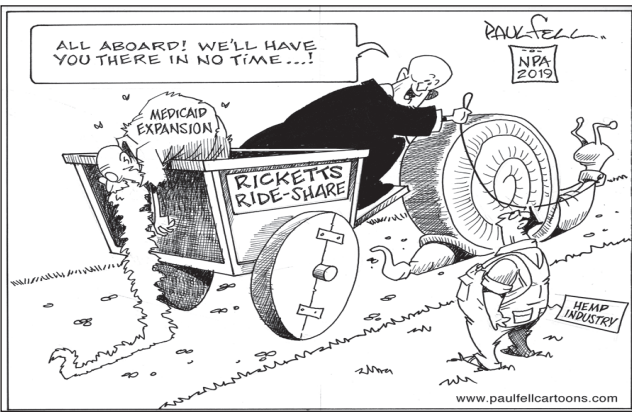
All of these investments are bringing desirable, high-paying science and technology jobs to our state. And they represent a broader trend of economic growth occurring everywhere from Scottsbluff to Sarpy County.

The Best Place to Raise a Family: Many Nebraskans who travel out-of-state to start their careers end up moving back when they have kids. Why? Because they remember what lifelong Nebraskans already know: That the Cornhusker State is the perfect place to raise a family. It's safe, affordable, and offers outstanding outdoor recreation and family fun.

Again, research supports Nebraska's family-friendliness. For instance, Nebraska leads the nation in high school graduation rates. US News ranks Nebraska sixth in the nation for overall affordability, and in the top five for housing affordability. WalletHub has Nebraska on its list of the top ten Best States for Families. The Annie E. Casey Foundation, which annually measures child well-being in America, ranks Nebraska #5 for children's economic well-being.

In terms of family fun, the Henry Doorly Zoo in Omaha is among the best in the world—let alone the United States. Nebraska also regularly hosts family-friendly sporting events such as the College World Series in June and Nebraska's Big Rodeo in Burwell in July. Each fall, fans of Nebraska Cornhusker football can take their kids to Husker Pavilion outside of Memorial Stadium for game day fun. Families can also go to Lincoln to be part of the record-setting crowds that cheer on the University's volleyball team. In 2020, the Olympic Swim Trials and the NCAA basketball tournament will be in Nebraska, giving families even more access to sporting activities.

Is the State Agriculture Department slow-walking hemp growers?

The state senator who introduced the Nebraska Hemp Farming Act (LB657), which was passed and signed into law with immediate implementation, said he thinks the Governor and the Nebraska Department of Agriculture slow walked the process.

Slow walking is defined as delaying a request or command, dragging one's feet, stalling, obstructing, dragging out a process.

The department recently announced that 176 applications were filed to participate in the newly established industrial hemp 2019 growing season. That came after they opened the application process June 28 and gave growers, businesses and corporations one week to apply. The department hasn't said how many were chosen, but they have been notifying those who were not successful.

That group includes Sen. Justin Wayne of Omaha, the bill's sponsor, who said he applied on the manufacturing side so he could monitor the application process. Wayne said he's been contacted by many people who said they wouldn't be allowed to participate in the hemp program this year. He said two companies told him they'll look at Iowa or Texas for hemp manufacturing.

Wayne said lawmakers had envisioned 1,000 applicants with 400 to 500 approved. After all, hemp was first grown in Nebraska in the late 1800s and many people grew it under government contract for World War II. So, it's not a new crop and there's sufficient evidence that it will grow well in Nebraska. The rub is that it would have had to be planted by June 1 to avoid a possible early frost.

The Nebraska Hemp Farming Act, which Wayne worked on extensively, recognizes the plant as a viable agricultural crop and aligns state law with federal law — industrial hemp was legalized in the 2018 farm bill — regarding its cultivation, handling, marketing and processing. It is meant to open up new commercial markets for farmers and businesses through sale of hemp products. The agriculture department has reporting and enforcement requirements under the law. Plants are required to be submitted for testing to determine whether they contain less than 0.3 percent THC, the psychoactive drug in marijuana.

Wayne said his trust with the department is gone. Nebraska will be behind surrounding states. Kansas has approved 202 industrial hemp licenses, for 150 growers, 15 distributors, 30 processors and seven universities. More than 3,605 acres will be planted in the first year.

One of those who was denied, Firth farmer Diane Mulder, wanted to grow a quarter-acre for CBD oil. She said the state seemed to throw up obstacles for growers and businesses to get approvals, with the one-week-only time frame to apply, and requiring a background check that the State Patrol said would take five business days to get. She was able to apply because she found a place online to get a background check faster.

She attended a Midwest Hemp forum last month in David City and said many of those present were frustrated with the process. She is hoping now there will be

wider approval in January so she can participate.

Mulder said she was impressed by how many products come off of a hemp plant, including food, CBD oil, fuel, fiber and wood products. Another benefit is that its root system can pull impurities out of the soil.

The prospect for a new agricultural crop comes at a time when commodity prices are lagging on traditional crops. It was also something of a ray of hope countering the devastation of the bomb cyclone and massive statewide flooding and destruction in March.

Robert Byrnes of Nebraska Screw Press in Lyons, a company focused on development of oil seed-processing systems throughout the United States and Central and South America, didn't like the short window for applications. He called it a slap in the face to those

who have been advocating for the crop for years. With his nationwide experience, he said the Nebraska government environment is unbenevolently restrictive.

He questioned why the department insists on calling hemp production a pilot program. He said the department's reluctance to diversifying agriculture is a paranoia reminiscent of the old "reefer madness" mentality.

Given that one of the most vocal opponents of Wayne's bill was a state senator who called hemp production a gateway for allowing recreational marijuana in Nebraska, I'd have to agree with Byrnes.

Give hemp a chance. It might just re-energize Nebraska farmers. J.J. Schmidt has been covering Nebraska government and politics since 1979. He has been a registered Independent for 20 years.

 -cit of \$160,000 in Fiscal Year 2019 that would increase to \$226,000 by the fiscal year 2020 if no changes were made in rates. According to the rate study, even after the increases, the Falls City rates would remain competitive with those of neighboring communities.

Natural Gas Rates will be increased by 1.3 percent annually in October of 2019, 2020, and 2021. The typical residential bill will increase by \$1.11 per month for each of the three years. The new minimum monthly charges will be \$14.00 in 2019, \$15.00 in 2020, and \$16.00 in 2021. J.K. Consulting reported the existing rate structure was considered sufficient to pay projected operating expenses, and the increase was recommended to provide sufficient revenue in case of low gas sales.

The Council voted 7-0 to approve an Airport Authority General Fund levy request of \$0.029482 per \$100 of assessed valuation. No sinking fund levy was requested. City Administrator Gary Jorn said the Airport Authority request has been for the same amount for several years.

After a public hearing during which no comment was received, the Council voted 7-0 to approve an animal permit for pasturing four equines by Levi Jones on a 12 x 169' parcel of land on East 17th Street owned by David Knobbe.

During his report, Administrator Jorn reported that the Aquatic Center had to be closed five times due to weather conditions this year. That's compared to only two times during the same period, and as a result, attendance was down 670 persons and revenues were down \$3,500. He stated the Aquatic Center slide had been repaired and reinstalled and that no violations were found as a result of a regular state inspection.

Jorn also reported the City budget building process has begun and that meetings are being scheduled with representatives of the three unions representing city workers. He also stated that efforts are underway to solve drainage problems at Hartman Field and the Splash Pad at Dallas Jones Park.

The Council also received its Second Quarterly Report from EDGE Executive Director Beckie Cromer who furnished a similar report to the Board of Richardson County Commissioners. That report is detailed in this week's Journal.

"In-car cameras have become vital for law enforcement these days. The industry is becoming more technology sophisticated and this will help improve both highway and law enforcement safety," stated Segerstrom.

The NDOT-HSO has utilized this funding primarily to aid local law enforcement in obtaining in-car cameras and alcohol testing equipment used to assist in the apprehension and conviction of impaired drivers. The total grant funding assistance for this project is up to \$2,996.25.

"Law enforcement serve an essential role in our community and they have to be properly equipped to do their jobs. Their dedication and this funding continues to positively impact alcohol related crashes and the injuries and fatalities that result," Segerstrom said.

The EDGE executive said during a recent corporate visit Herzog officials indicated they have very good employees in Falls City and they have good employee retention. They indicated a new Union Pacific Railroad contract will stabilize their workload and provide a more routine business model in Falls City. Herzog also reported it will be investing in additional track at the Falls City site for Burlington Northern Railroad railcar storage.

EDGE responded to five local business inquiries, identified a build-to-suit site for one business, is currently working with property owners on subdividing the industrially zoned site, and is working with a prospect requiring 2.5 acres of highway access along U.S. Highway 73.
