Richardson County Fair 2019 "Woodstock to Cornstalks"

The Coronation Program, the annual opening ceremony of the Richardson County Free Fair, was held on Wednesday, September 11, where the 2019 County king and queen were crowned. The weather was perfect for a night of entertainment and community camaraderie.

The Honorable Judge Curtis Maschman served as emcee and welcomed the large crowd that filled the Humboldt town square.

The colors were advanced by the Sons of American Legion Post 269. Members were Danny DeJonge, Randy Burgett, Dave Farwell, and Brad Rausch and the Humboldt Boy Scout Troop 387.

"Star-Spangled Banner" was performed by Teresa Blecha Gartner.

County Judge Maschman took a moment of silence to honor those who passed away on September 11, 2001.

"On September 11, 2001, 18-years ago today, 19 terrorists hijacked four airplanes and carried out suicide attacks against targets in the United States. Two of the planes were flown into the twin towers of the World Trade Center in New York City, a third plane hit the Pentagon just outside Washington, D.C., and the fourth plane crashed in a field in Shanksville, Pennsylvania. Almost 3,000 people were killed during the 9/11 terrorist attacks. I am going to ask that our color guard lower the flags and that everyone joins me in a moment of silence as we respectfully remember the losses suffered that day," said Emcee Maschman.

Humboldt Mayor Bob Mendenhall presented the City Keys to the

2018 Queen Randee Witt and King Mike Blecha.

The HTRS Jazz band, directed by Sarah Volker, performed as the Queen candidates and their escorts walked to the stage and were introduced by Emcee Maschman.

Serving as this year's Junior Attendants were, Halle DeJonge, daughter of Danny and Maren DeJonge; Hank Glathar, son of Trent and Michelle Glathar; Wyatt Guenther, son of Jason and Angelyn Guenther; Avery Hilgenfeld, daughter of Kyle and Lindsay Hilgenfeld; Lola Stewart, the daughter of Nick and Valerie Stewart; and Brock Tomek, the son of Karmen and Branch Tomek.

Serving as Senior Escorts were, Lennis Blecha III, son of Lenny and Bonnie Blecha; Trey Drake, son of Les and Shari Drake; James Eickhoff, son of Lowell and Mary Eickhoff; Cameron James, son of Teri James; and Isaiah Lockard, son of Jessica Mason.

This year's Richardson County Fair queen candidates were, Katilyn Glathar, Emily Hutton, daughter of Vance and Crystal Hutton; Shannon Jones, the daughter of Brian and Rene Jones; Peyton Schardt, the daughter of Steve and the late Lisa Jo Schardt; and Abby Stalder, the daughter of Dave and Sally Stalder.

Julie Slama, a Nebraska state senator in the unicameral Nebraska Legislature representing District 1, was selected to crown the king and queen. Slama is a Republican and fifth-generation Nebraskan from Peru. She filled Dan Watermeier's vacancy in Legislative District 1 on January 9, 2019. Upon taking office, Slama became the youngest female state senator in Nebraska history at age 22. Slama's first year in the Nebraska Legislature included successful efforts to strengthen Nebraska's civics education statutes and a comprehensive pack-

COUNTY BUDGET HEARING HELD

A Public Hearing was scheduled to be held during the Tuesday, Sept. 17, meeting of the Richardson County Board of Commissioners. The meeting was held on the Fiscal Year 2019-2020 Budget and Tax Levy given final review by the Commissioners during the Sept. 10, meeting. According to the budget summary provided by Richardson County Clerk Mary Eickhoff, the budget of expenditures totaled \$14,923,372.01, an increase of \$918,482.15 or 6.5% over that of the previous fiscal year and the assessed value of Richardson County property declined by \$39,765,620, an about 3.00% decrease. An increase in the tax levy seemed inevitable, but because of funds anticipated from other than real estate taxes and a reduction of the amount required to pay down Jail bonds from \$400,000 to \$245,943, Commissioners were able to increase the amount of cash reserves from \$300,000 to \$400,000 and still accomplish a tax levy reduction.

The levy for County general/operating budgets increased by 2.6% from \$0.312214 in 2018 to \$0.319720 in 2019 but the levy for the Jail Bond declined from \$0.027942 to \$0.017671 putting the total levy at \$0.337391, a decrease of \$0.002765 from that required by the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 budget. The net result is that the county property tax on a property valued at \$100,000 will go down from \$340.16 to \$337.39, a reduction of \$2.77.

During the Tuesday, Sept. 10, meeting of the Commissioners a motion was made by Sichel to approve the additional 1% increase in the restricted funds subject to limitation for the FY 2019-2020 budget. This is an

action taken annually by Commissioners to remain under the state-imposed levy limit and still allow for a small increase in spending. Approval was by a 3-0 vote.

Commissioners, in another budget-related item, voted to adopt Resolution 2019-2020-10 regarding the salary of the Chief Deputy Sheriff to be established at 86.15% of the Sheriff's salary, calculated to be \$25.60/hour.

At 10:00 a.m. Chairman Sichel presented the proof of publication for the opening of sealed bids for the sale of bridge, structure CO07472425 located on 709 Road in the southeast corner of the SE1/4 of Section 30, Township 2, Range 18 also known as 709 Road East of 661 Avenue. One bid was received. That bid was received from Drainage District #8 for \$1,001.00, and Commissioners by unanimous vote approved the sale.

The Board also voted to adopt Resolution 2019-2020-5 to vacate and abandon a portion of road described as: beginning at the west approach of the bridge located on the road beginning at the .S.W. corner of the SE1/4 of Section 30, Township 2, Range 18 and then east approximately 2620 feet through the S1/2 of the SE1/4 of Section 30, Township 2, Range 18, and thence running in an easterly direction through and between sections 29 and 32 of Township 2, Range 18 to the west bank of the Missouri River, also known as 709 Road east of 661 Avenue with a certified survey to be performed and filed with the resolution in the official records of the Richardson County Register of Deeds.

International Trade Grows Exports and Creates Jobs

Trade missions open the door to Nebraska exports while bringing great jobs to our doorstep. Over the past few days, I led a trade mission to Vietnam, where I met with Prime Minister Nguyen Xuan Phuc, business leaders, and government ministers. The potential to grow Nebraska's agricultural exports to Vietnam is enormous.



Vietnam's economy has been growing by leaps and bounds—with annual GDP growth having averaged 6% over the past 15 years. Their population is young and growing. From 2017 to 2018, total U.S. agricultural exports to Vietnam grew from \$2.5 billion to \$4 billion, and Nebraska's exports to Vietnam tripled. Demand is soaring for commodities that Vietnam does not locally produce given its tropical climate—like beef and dry edible beans. In 2018, Vietnam also implemented a policy to introduce E5 into its fuel supply, with plans to transition to E10 by 2020. This move, combined with an

overall rise in the country's fuel consumption, is steadily increasing demand for ethanol. For all of these reasons, now is an ideal time for Nebraska to forge closer trade ties with Vietnam.

I just returned from Japan, the world's third largest economy. It was exciting to be there at a time when the Trump Administration is finalizing details on an agreement to make our countries' relationship even stronger. Nebraska already exports more ag products to Japan than to any other country, and it's the top international destination for Nebraska beef, pork, eggs, and wheat. The revised trade deal reduces tariffs and will soon make Nebraska-made goods even more accessible to Japanese customers. In Tokyo, we learned that the U.S. and Japan hope to finalize the agreement at an upcoming meeting of the United Nations before the end of the month.


Trade missions have also spurred growth in our state's bioscience industry. In 2015, I led a trade delegation to the European Union and met with leaders of Novozymes in Denmark to encourage them to expand their presence in Nebraska. In May 2017, the Danish bioscience company announced a \$36 million expansion to its operations in Blair, where it produces enzymes for use in ethanol production. A month later, German firm Evonik and Netherlands-based Royal DSM chose Blair as the site of an innovative joint venture to produce omega-3 fatty acids from fermented algae. Veramaris, the company resulting from their partnership, opened its \$200 million facility in Blair this July.

The economic development occurring in Sidney is yet another example of the ripple effect trade missions can have. In August 2017, I met leaders from Agri-Plastics, a manufacturer headquartered in Toronto, during a trade mission to Canada. A few months later, Agri-Plastics announced plans to build a new facility in Sidney to make calf shelters and enclosures. Agri-Plastics has since ramped up operations and now runs its Nebraska facility 24/7 to keep pace with growing demand.

In addition to international trade missions, we also travel nationally to attract investment in Nebraska. For example, in the fall of 2016 I went on a trade visit to Menlo Park, California to highlight Nebraska's strengths to Facebook executives. In April 2017, Facebook selected Papillion as the site for a major data center. This June, Facebook officially opened the data center, which will represent a \$1 billion investment in our state by the time it's fully completed. Other tech firms are following Facebook to our state. Earlier this year, Google announced its intention to build a data center in Nebraska, and Compute North chose Kearney as the location of a data hub.

After I return from Asia this week, I'll continue my work to grow international trade when I attend Husker Harvest Days in Grand Island. This year, for the first time ever, Husker Harvest Days will have an International Visitors Center. The Center gives international guests an up-close look at Nebraska's global leadership in agriculture. The Center also provides Nebraskans an opportunity to promote farm equipment, machinery, and technologies that are made here and used all over the world. In addition, it will serve as a connection point for international businesses considering an investment in our state.

Both at home and abroad, my team is working tirelessly to grow Nebraska through international trade. We will continue to lead trade missions, open new markets, and attract new investments to our state. PRISON SYSTEM STILL A MESS, IS ANYBODY SURPRISED?

Staffing at the Nebraska State Penitentiary in Lincoln has been below a critical staffing level 18 times since early July and caused an occasional halt to visitations and sporadic closure of the library, gymnasium and various programs.

Inspector General Doug Koebnick has reported to the Legislature's Judiciary Committee that the staffing issue, combined with a population at more than 180% of design capacity, is "quite disturbing" for both staff and inmates. Critical staffing positions include correctional officers, corporals, sergeants, shift supervisors and caseworkers. During one week in August, the Penitentiary was below minimum staffing at least six times, he said.

He said he e-mailed the Judiciary Committee about the situation in July. He even called the Governor's office and asked if anyone wanted to discuss the situation with him. He said they told him to call Corrections Director Scott Frakes.

Frakes said prisons across the nation are struggling with the same issues of employee recruitment and retention. Nebraska is taking multiple approaches to solve the problems, including recent pay increases to many employees as the result of union negotiations. That's on top of agency-initiated monetary initiatives offered beginning in April and again in July. Frakes said the state continues to host job fairs, offer internships, incentivize employee referrals and provide compensation to supervisors.

Koebnick said he's also concerned about construction that will begin in the next year at the penitentiary to add a 100-bed housing unit and require extra staff that just isn't available.

It's not as if the Department of Correctional Services isn't working to improve the situation, he said, but the problems continue.

On top of all that, critical shortages can also cause restricted movement within housing units and forced overtime. Koebnick said sometimes nearly half a shift consists of people working overtime.

A recent report indicated all available first-shift staff was mandated to stay, and staffing was still below minimum.

He said the recent growth in overtime is alarming. Based on conversations with those who work and are locked up there, and his own observations, Koebnick said he is alarmed that the penitentiary may be in the worst shape of all of the state facilities.

Judiciary Committee Chairman Steve Lathrop said solving the staffing shortages would take increases in starting pay, which is up to the executive branch. Stopping mandatory overtime is not an option because that would make it impossible to staff the prison.

The high prison capacity, combined with staffing problems, less yard time and limited activities have raised tensions at the penitentiary. Both staff and those incarcerated are affected.

Good for Koebnick for staying on top of this. Kudos to Frakes for trying to increase staffing levels. Hat's off to the

tireless – or maybe that's tired – workers who are trying their best to keep a lid on things.

Here's hoping the entire Nebraska Legislature, not just Lathrop and the Judiciary Committee, see the on-going problem and are receptive to new solutions. Of course, some of those are old suggestions such as alternative sentencing and expanded programming.

Let's make 2020 the year this happens. We can't keep ignoring it, because it's not going away.

50 Years Ago - Sept. 18, 1969 - Sept. 24, 1969

A nominating committee was appointed to select Richardson County representatives on a Four County Health Planning Council.

A new paving machine used at Wilson and 9th eliminated the need for forms and much manual labor.

Among members of the 1969-70 Peru State football cheer corp was Vicki Hall of Stella.

Floyd Nuzum's Catfish Pond south of White Cloud was open for fishing on weekends for \$1.00 per pole with a limit of two persons per pole.

An 18-year-old Guernsey cow named "Cookie" was put out to pasture by Doris & Clarence Yoessel after having claimed all kinds of championships and prize money.

For the first time in 2 1/2 years, Company B, 134th infantry, the local National Guard unit was able to enlist new men.

In his first seven years at Nebraska, Head football coach Bob Devaney compiled a record of 60-15 but his Huskers were defeated 31-21 by Southern CA in the season opener.

Jim Stephenson acquired the former "White City Motel" and renamed it the "Stephenson Motel".

Miss Nebraska, Jane D. Briggeman, who was named "Miss Congeniality" in the Miss America contest, was the speaker for a Falls City Rotary Club meeting.

The State awarded contracts for improvement of Highway 8 from Salem to its junction with U.S. Hwy. 75.

The District 56 mill levy dropped by 10.89 mills after consolidation increased the value of district real estate and state aid to schools was increased.

Wymore Southern defeated Falls City in high school football 8-0. Dawson-Verdon lost its opener to Barneston 46-20. Humboldt was defeated at Wilber 35-6, and Sacred Heart lost its game at Hiawatha 34-6.

The Buchers dominated in swine carcass yield at the Richardson County Fair. Gerald won first place.

The first ever Jr. Golf Tournament at Falls City Country Club was won by Bill Hoy who carded a 93.

Senior class officers at Falls City High School included Bob Jones, president; Dave Kottich, vice-president; Linda Steinman, secretary; and Lynn Shafer, treasurer.

Milton Bletscher, Falls City, was honored at an Ak-Sar-Ben banquet for his leadership in the field of purebred Holstein production.

Among TV shows advertised were "Marcus Welby, MD" and "The Beverly Hillbillies".

Georgia Gratwohl, 14, Hamlin, KS, showed the reserve champion of the Shorthorn breeding heifer class at the Ak-Sar-Ben livestock show, Omaha.

County Attorney Harold Gurske told County Commissioners it would take 30 days to research the law and verify signatures on petitions seeking formation of a hospital district in eastern Richardson County.

Pawnee County Commissioner Floyd Vriska reported a new saw mill at Table Rock would produce wood for the furniture manufacturing industry. Nebraska football coach Bob Devaney praised sophomore quarterbacks Jerry Tagge and Van Brownson saying "They gave us as good a job of quarterbacking as we've seen for some time."

25 Years Ago - Sept. 18, 1994 - Sept. 24, 1994

1994 revenue from Community Hospital operations was only \$44,917.4, but after the addition of non-operating revenue, the hospital realized a profit of \$196,958.

The first metric bridge in the U.S. was the under construction south of Salem, the Highway 8 over Rock Creek.

Mayor Steve Kottich signed a resolution passed by the Council urging passage of an amendment to the U.S. Constitution prohibiting desecration of the American flag.

The Ainsworth Bulldogs defeated the Falls City Tigers in a game played at Grand Island by a score of 14-0. Table Rock defeated Dawson-Verdon 45-2.

Marty Froeschl, Steve Simon, and Darren Thorson birdied the first playoff hole to win the NEK three-man scramble at Falls City Country Club.

Eric Lippold of the Falls City Tigers captured the championship of the Hiawatha Invitational cross country meet by running the distance in 18:00.

The Sacred Heart boys defeated Humboldt in football 68-21 and the Irish girls claimed a two set victory in volleyball.

Sacred Heart fourth graders Alicia Keithley and Matthew Sells were pictured in the school library benefiting from the help of library volunteer Mary Thomas, 82, Mound City.

Recognized as *Journal* Richardson County Athlete of the Week was Brian McKim of Sacred Heart who carried the ball 10 times gaining 169 yards in a victory at Humboldt, scoring five touchdowns, and passing for another.

Southeast Consolidated's Janelle Findlay celebrated her 15th birthday with nine ace spikes and five ace blocks as the Mustangs outlasted the Falls City Tigers, 10-15, 16-14, and 15-10.

In a volleyball triangular at Humboldt, Southeast won matches with College View 15-1 and 15-1 and with Humboldt 15-6 and 15-1. The Cardinals beat College View 15-9 and 15-12.

Beth Kiekhaefer was 12 for 12 serving as Sacred Heart defeated Rock Port 15-5 and 15-10. The Lady Irish were victorious at Dawson-Verdon 15-7 and 15-9.

Dawson-Verdon played host to Table Rock and made quick work of the visitors, 15-0, 15-6.

The Pioneer Conference was set to begin competition in the 1995-96 school year with seven charter members.

Eric Lippold of Dawson-Verdon, participating as a Falls City Tiger, took first place in a cross country meet at St. Joseph Benton with a time of 17:46. The Tiger boys team finished second. The Tiger girls finished third.

15 Years Ago - Sept. 18, 2004 - Sept. 24, 2004

The City Council voted to set the salary of the newly created position of Public Works Operations Superintendent at \$42,000.

Council members voted to suspend the requirement of three readings for passage of an ordinance to authorize issuance of \$1,445,000 in bonds to build a new library.

No comment was received during a public hearing on the City's 2004-05 budget that required a tax levy of \$518,594.

Sacred Heart seniors Wes Taft and Tiffany Foster were crowned King and Queen of Homecoming. The Irish won their Homecoming game versus Freeman 50-0.

The Falls City High School girls softball team dropped its sixth and seventh consecutive games in a row, 3-2 at St. Joseph Lafayette and 12-2 at Nebraska City.

Humboldt-Table Rock/Steinauer after having lost 25 games in a row started the 2004/05 season 2-0, but that win streak ended with a 54-6 loss at Omaha Christian.

Falls City, Sacred Heart, HTRS, and Southeast Consolidated were among 10 schools to participate in the Sixth Annual Living History Day at Table Rock.

Weekly winners in the *Journal* "You Pick 'em" football contest were Mike Stoller, \$50 1st Place Prize and Lyle Wissman, \$20 2nd Place Prize.

The Sheriff's Office was investigating vandalism done at Silver Creek Cemetery, some that were broken beyond repair.

Providers don't want to say what that surgery will cost you

"Thinking About Health," is part of the Nebraska Press Association's partnership with Rural Health News Service, which will provide Nebraskans with unbiased health-related information, designed to help better understand the health issues facing our communities, state and nation.

You would think that making the prices charged by hospitals and doctors available to their patients would be a no-brainer. After all, we've become accustomed to knowing the price we pay for cars, carrots, comic books, and almost everything else we buy. Why not knee surgery or appendectomies?

The medical establishment, it seems, isn't keen on letting the public in on what health practitioners charge for their services. Despite lots of talk about price transparency from government officials, including the Trump administration, the actions of hospitals and physicians speak otherwise.

"Price secrecy is a calculated strategy," says Jeanne Pinder, founder and CEO of ClearHealthCosts, a digital start-up that works with news outlets to disclose the costs of medical care. "All that money collected from overpriced care and mysterious bills goes into lobbying and behind the scenes pressure. They lobby lawmakers and regulators to protect the current system and to skew it even further to their benefit."

That's what has happened in Ohio where the hospital industry and its lobbyists have succeeded in killing two laws passed by the state legislature, the first in 2015 and the second this summer, that would have allowed patients to know the prices of the medical procedures and services they were about to receive. The 2015 law would have required hospitals and other health care providers to give patients an estimate of their costs no later than the same day a procedure or medical intervention would take place. The hospitals objected. The governor's office never wrote rules to implement the law, and hospitals and other health care groups sued to prevent implementation.

The law was passed as part of the worker's compensation budget bill, and the medical industry argued that it violated the state prohibition on including multiple subjects in one bill. A lower court judge sided with the hospitals. The matter is now before the Ohio Court of Appeals and likely to go to the state supreme court.

This year Jim Butler, speaker pro tempore of the Ohio House of Representatives and champion of the 2015 law, succeeded in getting a second bill passed that he said took into account the health industry objections. He called it a "much better version of transparency." Health care providers would not give price estimates. Instead, they would have to notify a patient's insurance company within 24 hours of scheduling the procedure and disclose what the service would cost. The carrier would then give patients an estimate of those costs.

Patients would not have to ask for the information. Butler said that requiring patients to ask for a price estimate is not satisfactory since most people won't do it.

In 2012 Massachusetts passed a law requiring medical providers to disclose to patients within two business days the amount their insurer would pay for a procedure or the hospital list price if a patient was uninsured - but only if the patient asked. It turned out very few did, even though the prices for services like MRIs vary widely. Butler's latest attempt at price transparency has failed, too.

Using his line-item veto power, Ohio Gov. Mike DeWine nixed Butler's second attempt at medical price transparency, saying his veto was "in the public interest" and citing efforts by the federal government to address transparency. It's important the state not put "duplicative or burdensome regulations on health care providers," he said.

What's really at stake for the hospitals? Armed with price information, patients not in the midst of an emergency may be able to find cheaper providers for their care. With medical prices rising and insurers demanding larger deductibles and more expensive coinsurance, patients may be looking for all the help they can get. A study by insurance giant United Health Group found that hospital prices for inpatient care increased by 19 percent and physician prices by 10 percent between 2013 and 2017.

"Hospitals certainly don't want transparency because it will create competition," Butler told me.

I've been covering consumer issues for decades. Most businesses I've written about have fought government regulation. Instead, they've pushed for more information and price disclosure to solve whatever consumer abuse was taking place. As we see in Ohio, sellers in the health care marketplace seem to want neither.

SENCA CASA Volunteer program expanded to RC

In January the SENCA CASA Program expanded the program to Richardson County, and they're looking for volunteers.

CASA, which stands for Court Appointed Special Advocates, supports and promotes court-appointed volunteer advocacy so that every abused and neglected child can be safe, establish permanence, and have the opportunity to thrive.

With the social welfare system, overburdened, abused, and neglected children can often slip through the cracks. Appointed by judges, CASA volunteers typically handle one case at a time and commit to staying on the case until the child is placed in a safe and permanent home. The volunteers provide constant guidance a child needs to thrive and sometimes are the only constant in a child's life.

The volunteers tend to meet the children at the foster home. Once they meet the child and get comfortable with them and vice-versa they can see the child at school too. Volunteers can also take them out to the park or something once they're on the case for at least four months. "It doesn't always just happen, it just depends on the volunteer and what they feel comfortable doing. Most of the time if they go to the biological parents' house it would be more to see the condition of the house, what sleeping arrangements are, is there food available, etc.," said CASA Coordinator, Debbie Green.

"Or they may go visit the child at home if the parents are having visitation with the children in their home to see how the parents are interacting with the children. However, if they feel uncomfortable in any situation I can go with them or they can go with the DHHS worker."

Though there is a paid attorney for the child, the Guardian Ad Litem (GAL) on the case only has to see the child once every six months where the CASA is required to see the child at a minimum - once a month. The volunteer can get information to the GAL and bring any concerns to them and the GAL can also make motions in court if necessary. The volunteer is not able to make any legal motions, it would have to go through the GAL, so that might help ease some of the

intimidation factor. With a volunteer on the case it does help reduce the hours that the GAL is needed which in turn reduces costs to the taxpayers.

A CASA volunteer makes a one-year minimum commitment to the program. Volunteers work approximately six to ten hours per month engaged in activities including conducting an objective examination of the situation, including relevant history, the environment where the child is living, relationships and the needs of the child; assisting in the implementation of any plan prescribed by the court; speaking up for the best interest of the child and appearing in court hearings to offer testimony if requested; and monitoring the orders of the court and advising of changes that may require modification of the court order.

To become a CASA volunteer, you must complete a thorough interview and screening process with CASA staff; a criminal background check and abuse registry check; and a thirty-hour pre-training program tailored to suit volunteers schedules. Through volunteering you would be making a difference in the life of a child who has become a victim of abuse, abandonment, exploitation, and/or neglect; help a child find permanency in a safe, loving home; and assist judges to obtain an accurate picture of a child's life and better understand the child's wants, needs, and desires.

**Falls City Public Schools Superintendent's District Update
September 10, 2019**

The Falls City Public Schools held its regular monthly board meeting on September 9, 2019. Here are the highlights of the meeting.

The School District 56 Budget and Property Tax Request Hearings for fiscal year 2019-2020 were held on September 9 at the Central Office in Falls City Middle School. The school district budget increases by 1% for 2019-2020 and calls for a property tax requirement of \$9,371,691, representing a -2.80 percent decrease in the property tax requirement, amounting to a reduction in tax asking of \$271,047. Furthermore, the Richardson County School District 56 assessed property valuation decreased by \$24,701,487, resulting in over a three-percent property value reduction for the 2019 tax year.

School District 56 Receives Donation - The Family of Dr. Larry Stednitz has pledged a donation of \$20,000 to the Falls City Public Schools to assist in the construction of a new press box at Jug Brown Stadium. Dr. Larry Stednitz, 78, of Falls City, NE, passed away August 18, 2019 at Falls City. Larry was raised at Falls City and graduated Falls City High School in 1959. Construction of the new press box is expected to begin at the conclusion of the 2019 high school football season.

Summer Reading and Math Programs Serve 52 Students - The North and South School Reading Summer Programs helped children practice effective comprehension strategies and increase vocabulary, while encouraging reading for pleasure and writing with a purpose. The Math Summer Programs assisted children in math skills based on the goals of the Saxon Mathematics program through small group instruction, math games, and independent practice. The Reading and Math Program ran for 2 weeks. The Parent Child Center Summer School Program served children ages 3-5, and had 13 students the first 3 weeks of summer break.

Student Enrollment - Enrollment figures as of September 4, 2019 show an increase from the 2018-2019 school year. Current enrollment numbers show 846 students in pre-kindergarten through 12th grade, which is up 24 students from a year ago. The largest class is the kindergarten with 68 students, and the smallest is the 1st grade class with 51 students.

F&M Bank Presented the Fourth "Spirit That Pays" Donation earned by Tiger debit cardholders. F&M Bank is all about Family, Service, Community and Hometown Spirit! The Spirit that Pays Program was launched two years ago. The donation of \$1,962.99 is the biggest donation to date and brings the total earned to \$5,618.22.

South School Teacher Recognized - Congratulations to the Noyce STEM Master Teaching Fellow Leigh Anne Blankenship who earned a master's degree from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in August 2019. The Capacity Resolution for 2019-2020 Approved by the School Board - The option enrollment capacity resolution outlines how many students are allowed to opt into the Falls City Public School District from their home school district. The number of students Falls City Public School District will accept each year will be based on a number of factors, including: the maximum capacity of each school/program; projected enrollment and available staff and facilities. No option enrollment students are allowed currently for preschool, which is at capacity with 70 students, elementary level II and III special education programs, which is at capacity at four students, middle and high school level II and III special education programs, which are at capacity at eight students, and the alternative education center, which is at capacity at 14 students.

The District 56 Board of Education acted on several items before concluding the regular meeting.

1. Approved the District 56 Budget of Disbursements, Receipts, and Transfers for 2019-2020 as published.

Richardson County Farm Bureau celebrates 100 years

The Richardson County Farm Bureau was organized in 1919 to hire a county agent and organize farm cooperation in the county. The newly-organized group was discouraged by inadequate funding, and in April of that year met with a Mr. Gillmore of University farm in Lincoln. Gillmore explained several forms of the constitution. A constitution was adopted, providing for the organization by township and calling for a leader or chairman and one co-operator from each school district.

Heavy rains that spring interfered with a membership drive, but a membership and prospect list were drawn up. Unfortunately, before any action could be taken, all records were destroyed in a fire that leveled the courthouse.

To meet emergency expenses, it was decided that those signing membership cards would be asked to pay an optional fee of one dollar for the year 1919, only. The plan met with an enthusiastic response as 108 of the 334 members contributed. William Peck was elected the organization's first president.

In 1920 Richardson County Farm Bureau became part of the state federation and the first membership campaign was organized. A girls' sewing club and pig clubs were organized for the young people.

County financial support was withdrawn in 1924 putting Richardson County Farm Bureau on a paid membership basis. One hundred and twenty-six members

at ten dollars were not sufficient to carry the organization, so the Chambers of Commerce in both Humboldt and Falls City responded by hosting fairs. Farm exhibits, husking contests, banquets, and workshops added to the coffers.

Cooperative purchasing was organized with gopher poison, hybrid and seed corn, seed oats, barley, and petroleum being purchased in quantity. In addition to sponsoring all types of Extension work and encouraging in cooperative buying and marketing, Farm Bureau in Richardson County was responsible for the organization of a Rural Electrification District.

Unfortunately, many of the Farm Bureau record books have been misplaced. For many years two Farm Bureau groups met within Richardson County, later combining.

Richardson County Farm Bureau continues to work for farming interest. Young people from Richardson County participated in the Nebraska Farm Bureau Youth Citizenship/Safety Seminar. Members take part in state conventions, policy development, leadership training, and legislative schools. The group also has members that participate in Ag in the Classroom program. The state now offers student memberships for students in High School and College. There is also a Young Farmer and Rancher program.

Descendants of Richardson County's pioneer families are still listed on the membership rolls of this organization. For several

years monthly meetings were held in the homes of members.

Since 1992, Richardson County has continued to support 4-H by being a member of the 4-H boosters which helps buy trophies for exhibitors. Recently they have also provided a concession stand voucher to every 4-H member who exhibits at the 4-H fair. The organization has also provided meal vouchers for judges at the same fair. At this year's 4-H Fair, members served free Root Beer floats on Friday for anyone attending the fair. This was a way to celebrate 100 years as an organization.

At the Richardson County Fair, the county president helped present the Heritage and Pioneer Farm Awards which are sponsored by Ak-Sar-Ben and the Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation.

Most county meetings are held at the Verdon Community Center, which is a central location for current members. A family picnic at the Candlelight Cabin in Falls City is always a summer highlight for the membership. Anyone is welcome to attend any of the meetings to find out what the organization is about.

Officers for 2019 were: Quentin Bowen, president; Andy Dunn, vice-president and Liz Hilgenfeld, secretary-treasurer. For the first time since coaching at Falls City, Coach Darin Fritz has the Tigers setting at 3-0 to begin the season. The game was never in question as the Tigers led 31-0 at the half before going on for the 44-8 homecoming win over the Syracuse Rockets.

Falls City turned the ball over on the opening possession, but things went the Tigers way the rest of the game. After stopping the Rockets and forcing a punt, the Tigers took over on the Syracuse 39-yard line after an excellent punt return by Jace Heckenlively. On the first play of the drive, Drake Butler took a handoff, made a defender miss, and went down the sideline for the touchdown with 7:51 to go. The PAT kick by Lukas Aldana made it 7-0.

The Tiger defense forced a three and out, and FC took over on their own 46 to begin the next drive. On second down and eight from the Rocket 41, Heckenlively took a jet sweep handoff going left to right, racing into the end zone untouched for the score. The PAT kick was good, and FC led 14-0 with 4:34 to go in the first quarter.

The Tiger defense again came up big. Syracuse got down to the Tiger 30, but a penalty and tackle for loss forced the Rockets to punt. This time it took

two plays for Falls City to get on the board. Kade Bredemeier took a three-step drop and found Trey McAfee coming across the field who outran the defense for a 66-yard score to give FC a 21-0 lead with 9:32 to play in the half.

The Tigers weren't done yet. The FC defense got two tackles for loss and forced an incomplete pass, forcing the Rockets to punt yet again. This time Leighton Vice got in on the scoring. Vice took a handoff up the middle, was hit, but bounced it outside for the 42-yard TD run to give the Tigers a 28-0 lead with 5:15 remaining in the half. FC got one more chance, taking over at their own 42 with 3:13 to play in the half. Facing a fourth and three at the Rocket four-yard line, Aldana booted a 22-yard field goal as time expired to give FC a 31-0 advantage at the half.

On the opening drive of the second half, Jayden Kreifels came up with an interception to give the Tigers the ball at their own 48 with 9:00 to go in the third. Bredemeier capped off the 52-yard scoring drive with an eight-yard quick out pass to Heckenlively, who ran over a defender on his way to the end zone. With 6:05 left in the third, Falls City led 37-0.

In the fourth quarter, FC finished

ished off a 45-yard drive with a six-yard run by Lane Burns to give FC its final score of the game with 9:02 to go, leading 44-0. The Rockets tacked on a late score to break up the shut out, but FC came away with the 44-8 win, much to the delight of the big homecoming crowd.

Falls City ran up 381 yards of total offense, 122 passing and 259 on the ground. Meanwhile, the Tiger defense surrendered just 130 total yards, 31 through the air and 99 on the ground.

Bredemeier had another solid performance, completing 6/7 passes for 122 yards, two TD's and an INT. Drake Butler finished with six carries for 86 yards and a score. Leighton Vice had 65 yards on six attempts, and a score and Heckenlively had a TD to go along with 58 yards on three touches. McAfee led the receivers with 66 yards on one catch and a TD. Heckenlively added three grabs for 29 yards and a score. Defensively Jaden Nolte led FC with nine stops, including one sack and three tackles for loss. Butler added eight stops and Hunter Arnold had eight tackles and one TFL. Kreifels added and INT for the Tiger defense.

Falls City at 3-0 will host 1-2 Fairbury at Jug Brown Stadium on Friday, September 20 at 7:00 p.m.



Aedes Aegypti mosquitoes identified in Nebraska-first time unique mosquito seen in state

The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) in conjunction with Four Corners Health Department recently identified *Aedes aegypti* mosquitoes in York County. It is the first time this particular type of mosquito species has been found in the state. *Aedes aegypti* is common in more tropical climates where it transmits such diseases as Zika virus, chikungunya, dengue and yellow fever.

Each year, the Department along with its local health department partners conducts mosquito surveillance to track and monitor the amount of West Nile virus carrying mosquitoes in Nebraska communities. Occasionally, the mosquito traps yield unexpected findings with potential public health impact.

"*Aedes aegypti* can carry and transmit various diseases that can have serious health consequences like Zika virus, chikungunya, dengue and yellow fever, and that is of concern to public health officials," said Dr. Tom Safranek, State Epidemiologist for DHHS. "However, the transmission of these pathogens would require a person currently infected with such a disease to be bitten by an *Aedes aegypti* mosquito and then that mosquito would need to bite another uninfected person. The risk of these infections to local residents is low but also dependent on the presence or arrival of an infected individual in the area."

The *Aedes aegypti* bites primarily in the daytime and only feeds on people. It doesn't have the ability to fly very far, only about 500 feet.

"Four Corners Health Department is working closely with DHHS and vector-borne disease specialists from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention regarding control of these mosquitoes and risk reduction approaches," said Laura McDougall, Executive Director of Four Corners Health Department.

Many prevention methods that work for other types of mosquitoes also apply to the *Aedes aegypti* including: Dumping or draining any standing water around the home. Standing water and warm weather breed mosquitoes; Throw away containers or objects that can hold water or cover them to prevent water from accumulating inside; Wear mosquito repellent when you go outside. Repellents containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535 and some lemon eucalyptus, and para-menthane-diol products; Dress in long-sleeved shirts, pants and socks when you're outside.

"This discovery underscores the importance of our mosquito trapping system," said Dr. Safranek. "Tracking and monitoring the types of mosquitoes that exist in Nebraska communities is critical, which in turn helps us identify potential public health implications and implement prevention measures to reduce risk."

What to know about bed bugs

Bed bugs are small, flat, parasitic insects that feed solely on the blood of people and animals while they sleep. Bed bugs are reddish-brown, wingless, range from 1mm to 7mm, and can live several months without a blood meal.

Bed bug infestations usually occur around or near the areas where people sleep. These areas include apartments, shelters, rooming houses, hotels, cruise ships, buses, trains, and dorm rooms. They hide during the day in places such as seams of mattresses, box springs, bed frames, headboards, dresser tables, inside cracks or crevices, behind wallpaper, or any other clutter or objects around a bed. Bed bugs can travel over 100 feet in a night but tend to live within 8 feet of where people sleep.

One of the easiest ways to identify a bed bug infestation is by the tell-tale bite marks on the face, neck, arms, hands, or any other body parts while sleeping. However, these bite marks may take as long as 14 days to develop in some people. Other signs of a bed bug infestation include:

The bed bugs' exoskeletons after molting; Bed bugs in the fold of mattresses and sheets; Rusty-colored blood spots due to their blood-filled fecal material that they

excrete on bedding or nearby furniture, and; A sweet, musty odor

Bed bug bites usually do not pose a serious medical threat. The best way to treat a bite is to avoid scratching the area and apply anti-septic creams or lotions and take an antihistamine.

If you suspect a bed bug infestation: Vacuum infested areas (including mattresses and box springs) and dispose of the contents in a sealed garbage bag or trash container; Remove the pillows, sheets, blankets, mattress, and box springs and wash sheets and blankets. Dry blankets, sheets, and pillows on medium or high heat; Dispose of items that cannot be inspected thoroughly and treated; Tightly seal mattresses and box springs inside mattress encasements specially designed to exclude bed bugs.

Bed bug infestations are commonly treated by insecticide spraying. If you suspect that you have an infestation, contact your landlord or professional pest control company that is experienced with treating bed bugs. The best way to prevent bed bugs is regular inspection for the signs of an infestation.

Check out fields for weed problems

Late summer, fall and harvest are good times to check out where you may have a problem with specific weeds or where a new weed is invading or possibly even herbicide resistance is developing. By identifying the weed, extent of any infestations and locations of weed problems, you will have a better strategy for managing these weeds in the future, maybe even this fall.

Marestail or maybe more specifically, glyphosate resistant marestail has become a major problem in Nebraska. In traveling around southeast Nebraska, marestail control seemed to be better than some years, although we had some very challenging weather conditions this spring, with the hot and cold weather fluctuations in temperatures, heavy rains and as usual windy conditions that limit timely application of herbicides for control. Once marestail bolts from the rosette state it is hard to control. It can emerge in the fall, so keep an eye out for it. Several growers have actually found that cereal rye has been very effective in control of marestail. This may be another option and at the same time provide erosion control and potentially improve soil health.

Fall control of winter annuals should improve field conditions next spring for planting and weed control in next year's crop. Another very tough weed to control is field horsetail or scouring rush (*Equisetum*). This is the weed that looks like a small bamboo plant and it grows in wet areas, especially along railroad right-of-ways and ditches. Unfortunately, it many times is invading more into fields and is very tough to control.

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln has conducted research in controlling this weed. They found Chlorsulfuron, labeled as Glean for use in wheat, or as Telar for use in non-crop areas, was very effective at controlling scouring rush for more than one year when it was applied at three oz/A. Chlorsulfuron has a long soil residual and can cause significant injury to corn and

soybean. The maximum use rate in wheat is 0.33 oz/A (approximately 10 times less than what was applied in noncrop areas, and the rotation interval to corn or soybean is 24 months. If chlorsulfuron were used to control a scouring rush patch that is expanding from a non-crop area into a corn or soybean field, individuals should only consider planting an IR-corn or STS soybean in the treated area in the subsequent 3-5 years, and may still suffer some crop injury from herbicide carry-over.

Another major concern in Nebraska is palmer amaranth. While I have not seen infestations of it in the area, I know there are fields in southeast Nebraska that have it. In southwest Nebraska glyphosate resistant palmer amaranth is causing all kinds of problems. The best method of controlling these resistant weeds is to limit their seed production by alternating herbicides, combining herbicides with glyphosate in treating weed problems or even hand-walking fields. It is important to recognize fields that have herbicide resistant weeds any so you can prevent them from producing seed. If you think you may have palmer amaranth in a field, do whatever you can to limit seed pro-

duction. Recent research at Kansas State University, shows promise for the use of cereal rye as a cover crop in slowing down early spring emergence and growth of Palmer Amaranth. If it becomes a problem in southeast Nebraska it may be a valuable tool to use.

Finally be aware of the noxious and invasive weeds in the area, specifically musk thistle and Sericea lespedeza. It is important if you can identify these weeds in pastures or CRP before they become major problems.

If we can control Sericea lespedeza before it spreads to levels like it is in Kansas, we should be able to control it. Other weeds that are showing up in southeast Nebraska and could cause problems include: phragmites, common teasel and cutleaf teasel.

Phragmites can be found growing along some of the weed ditches and wetland areas in southeast Nebraska. Teasel can be found in non-cropped areas and in pastures or CRP. It is a problem in the neighboring states Kansas and Missouri. 
