

AUTHORITIES THWART BOMBING ATTEMPT OF AUBURN PHARMACY

Owner of the Hyrum Family Value Pharmacy, Hyrum Wilson, of Auburn, was arrested on Friday, April 17, 2020, and is being charged with conspiracy to distribute controlled substances, conspiracy to use fire and explosives, and a weapons offense. Wilson was arrested after Federal prosecutors say that he and another man, William Burgamy, of Hanover, Maryland discussed destroying a competing pharmacy in Auburn.

According to court documents obtained by the Journal, Hyrum T. Wilson conspired with William A. Burgamy IV to distribute prescription medications, including opioids, to which Wilson had access as a licensed pharmacist. From at least August 2019 through April 2020, Wilson regularly and unlawfully mailed controlled substance to Burgamy. Burgamy advertised and sold the drugs using the Darknet through encrypted e-mail accounts, and provided a cut of the illicit profits to Wilson through Bitcoin payments, wire transfers, and bundles of cash through the mail. Burgamy unlawfully distributed medications he received from Wilson to locations in Virginia and elsewhere.

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RICHARDSON CO. COVID-19 UPDATES

Governor Pete Ricketts announced that the State's tenth COVID-19 related Directed Health Measure (DHM) includes new businesses. The measure is being issued to bring greater consistency between state and local DHMs, which had previously closed a handful of categories not covered by the State.

Additions to the Statewide DHM are, all beauty/nail salons, barbershops, massage therapy services, gentlemen's clubs, bottle clubs, indoor theatres, and tattoo parlors/studios are closed until April 30, 2020. All organized team sports, youth, and adult, including but not limited to club sports, are suspended until May 31, 2020.

The statewide, State issued DHM Provisions: Imposes an enforceable, 10-person limit on public gatherings. This prohibits medical and dental elective surgeries and procedures. Requires schools (public, private, and parochial) to operate without students through May 31, 2020. Cancels all school-related extracurricular activities through May 31, 2020. Requires restaura-

HELPING FALLS CITY WITH MEDICAL SUPPLIES

This past month, in an attempt to help the Falls City medical community prepare for the coronavirus, local volunteers set to work on a massive sewing project. That project eventually involved scores of seamstresses, hundreds of dollars in donations, and hospital gowns and masks that were adorned with everything from tractors to Husker logos, and American flags to Hello Kitty.

It all began with Celeste Jones, a physician's assistant at Falls City Family Practice. Intending to stay ahead of the curve, Jones posted an APB on Facebook, stating that the clinics and the hospital needed gowns and masks.

"People in this town really stepped up," Celeste said. "Bart Keller at Farm and City Supply ordered painters' gowns and masks, which are N-95 masks just like we use. He also delivered a pallet of gloves. Then, some of the seamstresses in town said they could make gowns if they had a pattern. Peggy Davidson used a disposable gown from the clinic, and created a pattern for us."

Meanwhile, Cheryl McCann was searching for a way to help. Her daughter, Chris Eichhoff sent her Celeste's post.

"I don't really sew all that well," Cheryl said, in a recent interview, "But I knew people who did."

She contacted local seamstress Rita Seid, and the two decided to join forces to organize volunteers. While Cheryl called a list of sewers, Rita contacted administrators at the Community Medical Center, clinics, and nursing homes, to see what they needed. The nursing homes wanted 50 gowns each, the clinics wanted 20 each, and the ambulance squad, 12.

Then, Tiffany Johansen called from Community Medical Center, where she is a registered nurse. The hospital had gone into "incident command" and Tiffany had been placed in charge of quality control, which included the collection of gowns and masks.

"If possible, we need 100 gowns," she told Rita. "We'll provide the material if you have the people to make them."

Undaunted, Cheryl and Rita set to work.

"We were a little unorganized at first," Rita said, during a recent interview at Seid's Event Center. "All Cheryl and I were doing was making phone calls and cutting out patterns."

Cheryl posted a message on Facebook, and asked for help creating a Facebook page specifically for the cause. She also asked for monetary donations to buy more material, thread, and other supplies.

"People answered immediately," Cheryl said. "Jolana Randall built a Facebook page called 'Helping FC Nebraska Medical Supplies,' and things changed very quickly after that. Bill and Becky Jenkins gave a substantial donation to get us started, and other people started donating, too. We had offers of \$10, \$20, \$50, whatever people could afford. The Facebook page made a huge difference."

Rita agreed. "We could finally communicate without making two-dozen phone calls," she said.

After receiving the donations, Rita bought all of the breathable material she could find.

'SAINTS IN SCRUBS' PROJECT LAUNCHED

"Saints in scrubs."

When Angie Hunzeker saw those words online, she immediately thought of the Falls City medical community—the people who are on the front lines of the war against the coronavirus. The more she thought about it, the more she wanted to find a way to honor them. "T-shirts," she thought. Everybody wears T-shirts, so Angie decided to spearhead a project that would allow people to buy T-shirts for the doctors, nurses, and CNAs at the medical and care facilities in town. She thought the phrase "Saints in scrubs" would help boost their morale.

"I just wanted the healthcare community to know that Falls City appreciates them, and that we are praying for them," Angie said, during a recent telephone

interview. "I also hoped the gesture would show God's love and compassion. God isn't just inside a church building."

She immediately contacted Nicole Witt at Merz Farm Equipment and received confirmation that Nicole could make the shirts. Nicole came up with a design for "saints in scrubs," and said she could print the shirts in sizes small through 5XL.

Angie was thrilled. She sent messages to her family members then, to see who would donate. Dozens of people replied. By the end of the evening, she had pledges for 90 shirts.

The problem was, the hospital alone had nearly 200 employees. Angie turned then to Facebook. She posted a message with the information, and her nephew Aaron Johansen offered to purchase 100 shirts for the hospital

staff. Other people jumped on board, as well.

"Within 24 hours, we had enough pledges to purchase shirts for the medical staff at Community Medical Center, Falls City Care Center, Falls City Nursing and Rehabilitation Center, Family Practice, Family Medicine, and Jonesbrook," Angie said. "In just 24 hours!"

She faxed order forms to each site, and asked the employees to pick their favorite colors and designate their sizes. The orders were placed and filled, and all of those shirts have been distributed.

Knowing that the project couldn't stop there, Angie began working on shirts for the other essential employees at the medical facilities.

"They're all important in this fight," Angie said. "Administra-

tors, support staff, maintenance, housekeeping, the dietary servers, everyone. And we want them to know that we recognize their sacrifices during this time."

Those shirts read, "Saints in Service, #Strongertogether," and have also been distributed. With those done, Angie and her donors turned to the other front-line employees in Falls City. She asked Nicole to design a general shirt that covered as many of the positions as possible that have been deemed "essential employees."

Nicole came up with a design that features a heart filled with hashtag words like #farmers, #grocers, #military, #postal workers, #truckers, and on and on through a list of positions that are important to our survival. The shirts have already

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For just the second time in its 70-year existence, the Nebraska spring game was canceled this season. The game was to have taken place on Saturday, April 18. In 2012, the spring game was halted due to a storm, the first cancellation of the spring scrimmage. Of course, this year, the stoppage was nation-wide due to the Covid19 virus. The Huskers were coming off back to back Aprils with over 80,000 fans in attendance for the final practice of the spring semester. When the game was called off by Athletic Director Bill Moos on March 17, ticket sales had exceeded 60,000.

Dickerson, Class of 2021, chose the Gophers over Nebraska, Ohio St. and LSU, among other schools. Dickerson, at 6'0, 175, runs the 40-yard dash in under 4.4. Don't look for Nebraska to back off; there is still plenty of time to swoon in and change Dickerson's mind.

I know everyone is missing something right now, but boy do I miss high school baseball and track. I've spent many evenings in the last few years at the ballpark, and there is nothing like it. For many of you who haven't had the opportunity, I highly recommend taking an evening to watch some great action, even if it has to wait until next spring. 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HAPPY EARTH DAY AMERICA, HERE IN NEBRASKA WE'RE ACTING LIKE WHAT PANDEMIC?

At this writing, there is still no mandatory "shelter-in-place" restriction in Nebraska, one of nine states to enjoy such "freedom."

Just as I was about to laud Governor Pete Ricketts for his transparency in doing an afternoon COVID-19 news briefing five days a week to keep Nebraskans informed about the burgeoning pandemic, the Governor gets a letter from 45 doctors in Grand Island begging him to shut down the state.

Yes, these front-line medical professionals want the state's elected Chief Executive to go beyond the "medical directive" which covers all 93 counties and requires restaurants to serve take-out only and other businesses to limit crowds to 10 or fewer and for everyone to practice social distancing. No mention of why the other states, representing most of the nation's population, must be wrong and Nebraska is right.

It's obviously about state's rights and Ricketts is obviously preening to be the poster boy for that movement. But I'm not sure why, given that he's in his second term as governor and doesn't appear to be running for any higher office - yet. Both Nebraska Senators and all three members of Congress are already Republicans, so there's no opening there.

It's been joked about for several years that Rickett's father, Joe, the founder of the recently sold TD Ameritrade, wants his kid to be President of the United States. Who knows, maybe Pete wants that too and figures a presidential appointment - assuming the Republican incumbent wins re-election - would be his best ticket to the top.

He's being strangely very political in a time of national crisis when people want leadership over partisanship. As I said, I was about to praise the Governor for being a leader and a great communicator. I don't like the fact that he talks too fast and appears a bit too arrogant and condescending behind the podium. But he has been surrounding himself with the right state officials and getting some good information out there.

Sadly, we come back around to the refusal to order a "shelter-in-place" directive while the numbers of new cases and deaths increases exponentially. Questioned on it, by doctors and reporters, Ricketts clings to what is already in place as working for Nebraska. "One size doesn't fit all,"

he says. But, most caskets are the same size, Governor. I would think that having the opportunity to prevent just one Nebraskan from being in one of those caskets would be a laudable goal.

So what does a sunny pandemic Sunday afternoon look like in my neighborhood? People and kids and their pets out in the yard, playing games and visiting and washing their cars in the driveway. Darned few of them wearing masks.

As I drove down the street with my windows up on my way to pick up curbside carry-out at a local restaurant where

I would be greeted by a gloved and masked worker, I didn't bother to count to see if there were no more than 10 people in a group and if they were all six-feet apart. I just saw people acting like everything is all right and there is no big health thing that is killing thousands of Americans. And I saw germs, lots of germs and a clear path to spreading them.

Is that on us? Or the people who lead us? Or both?

Wash your hands, Nebraska. Wear a mask in public and don't touch your face!

Falls City was creating paving districts for the surfacing of 8 1/2 blocks of streets.

A high of 80 was expected in Falls City Wednesday afternoon. Tiger runner Gayle Swisegood ran the 880 in 1:58.7 at a track meet in Nebraska City bettering by 2.6 seconds a record set by the legendary Gil Dodds in the same event.

Mrs. Robert Wentz was elected President of the South School P.T.A. Mrs. Bob Deckinger was elected president of the Mrs. Jaycees. Over 600 farm ponds were constructed in Richardson County with ACP cost-sharing.

Mrs. Leslie Herr, Humboldt, was president of the southeast district of the Women's Societies of Christian Service of the United Methodist Church. Bud Bohrer was president of the Falls City Lions Club.

Three Sacred Heart track athletes set school records at a Galaxy Conference meet. Dan Bird ran the 220 in :23.4, John May cleared 5-11 in the high jump, and Ed Taft was clocked at 4:54:00 in the mile.

Wayne Shafer was elected president of the Richard County Education Association.

The Southeast Nebraska Telephone Co. filed for an increase in rates to offset inflation and the costs of modernization.

Farmers began planting corn in Richardson County.

Falls City Mayor M.O. Armbruster and OPPD Assistant General Manager Raymond Borg jointly flipped the switch energizing the interconnection of OPPD to the municipal electrical system.

Led by Chuck Whitney the Falls City Golf team finished fourth in the four-man portion of the Sabetha invitational.

John Reed, Redondo Beach, CA, rode his bicycle and hitch-hiked his way to the Dawson area to attend the golden wedding anniversary of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Albin, Dawson.

Mary Jo Standerford and her brother Tom of Humboldt were chosen to represent the County in the District 4-H Speech Contest.

25 Years Ago - April 22, 1995 to April 28, 1995

Lori Gottula, Falls City, was first runner-up in the Nebraska State Young Careerist competition of the Business and Professional Women's state conference.

Kirkman's Cove Recreation Area northwest of Humboldt was closed to boating and swimming while the level of the lake was lowered in advance of several renovation projects.

Southeast Consolidated students in grades one through six who earned "Mustang Bucks" for reading books and reporting on them were treated to a school carnival.

County Commissioners were seeking loans of up to \$200,000 from county banks to pay for two murder trials and flood damage in 1992 and 1993.

Humboldt Specialty Co. was going strong with 45 employees making such items as commercial lawn mower grass bags, veterinary straps, surgical jumpsuits, and custom truck bed sheets.

Naomi Kohles of Sacred Heart earned a superior rating for her violin solo at a District Music contest.

Dawson-Verdon students earned gold medals in the FHA/HERO State Leadership Conference including Sara Glath, Shauna Balke, Andrea Taft and Steph Dunlap.

Winners of \$500 Richardson County Bank & Trust Co. scholarships were Kari Hilgenfeld of Dawson-Verdon and Aaron Hill of Falls City Sacred Heart.

A Chamber ribbon-cutting ceremony was held at Lem's Norhvue Cafe. Teri Langen was the winner in the senior division of the Nebraska Habitat Stamp Contest. Other Falls City High students with entries in the traveling exhibit were Corey Comer and Lori Kelley.

Falls City High art students who won awards in the Federal Junior Duck Stamp Contest included Alysia O'Banion, Tillman Vice, and Luke Jones.

"I got enough for 90 gowns," she said. "Tiffany Johansen brought over the material for the hospital gowns, and we were ready to go."

Rita and Cheryl determined that the most efficient way to make the gowns was to compile "kits" that could be sent home with individual seamstresses. So the women set up a factory-style assembly line at Seid's Event Center, and asked for help via the Facebook page. They assured everyone that social distancing guidelines would be followed.

Several people showed up. Most were hauling sewing machines. Others said they couldn't sew but were good with scissors, and dozens said they would sew from home as soon as the kits were available.

"We set up three different stations of assembly," Rita said. "At the first one, volunteers used Peggy David's pattern to cut out material. At the second, seamstresses serged the material and made two back panels, two front panels, and two sleeves. At the third station, Cheryl and I put the kits together, along with belts and Velcro for closing the gowns."

The assembly started on Saturday

April 4th. There were three shifts with at least six people at each shift. The seamstresses were stationed six feet apart.

"Home volunteers started picking up the kits right away," Rita said. "We had at least 20 sewers working from their homes at any given time. Some people from out of town even got involved, like Kathy Hopp of Lincoln. Most of us were also making masks, but we developed our own patterns for those."

The volunteers worked every evening, and all day on Saturdays. They took Sundays off. "Some of our people were here most of that time," Cheryl said. "People like Glenda Taft, Pat Rieschick, Barb Kelly, Jessica Fischer, Jan Deckinger, Sue Bangert, Kristy Fischer, Allison Joy, and Christina Wertenberger. Christina's girls, Sara, Jessica, and Emily were here a lot, too."

Those who were sewing from home also dedicated extraordinary amounts of time. By Saturday of last week, the volunteers had made nearly 200 gowns, and more than 250 masks. All of the products have

since been delivered to the medical community.

"It's been amazing to see how everyone has pulled together," Tiffany Johansen said.

"Community Medical Center has had to prepare for the unknown, and we don't know the extent to which additional supplies will be available. Having such great support from the community has overwhelmed us all. It shows, too, that Falls City's residents know the importance of having a local hospital. That means so much to us."

"It was definitely a community effort," Rita Seid said. "All total, we had at least 50 volunteers."

"We couldn't have done any of it without them or the donors."

National Drug Take-Back Day postponed due to Covid-19 outbreak

The annual spring National Prescription Drug Take Back Day scheduled for Saturday, April 25, 2020, has been postponed due to the ongoing COVID-19 outbreak.

For Nebraskans, every day is take-back day.

Over 300 pharmacies across the state participate in the Nebraska MEDS Initiative and will take back unused or expired medications, free of charge, any day of the year.

"There's no need to hold on to old medications or wait until a scheduled take-back day," said Sarah Hunter of the Nebraska Pharmacists Association. "With more people staying in their homes, it's even more important that medications are disposed of safely to prevent accidental poisoning or misuse."

Hunter points out that pharmacies are considered essential services and are still operating during local health directives or stay-at-home orders in response to the COVID-19 outbreak.

During the COVID-19 outbreak, Nebraska MEDS Initiative pharmacies will still take back your medications for safe and legal disposal, but there are important guidelines to follow in order to protect public health and minimize person-to-person contact.

Follow all local directive health measures.

Ensure you follow social-distancing recommendations and stay at least six feet from other customers and pharmacy staff.

Before you arrive, call your pharmacy to verify their process for accepting medications.

Envelope disposal systems are available for free at-home disposal. You can do your part to help protect public health and local water supplies by taking medications back to a participating Nebraska MEDS pharmacy. Find one near you at leftovermeds.com.

Authorities thwart bombing attempt of Auburn Pharmacy

(Continued from Page 1)

Given the success and profitability of the drug trafficking scheme, Wilson repeatedly hit limits, set by his distributor, on the amount of prescription drugs he could obtain and provide.

Wilson and Burgamy developed a scheme to break into, steal the opiate supply of, and firebomb a competing pharmacy in Auburn.

The men regularly discussed the firebombing plot in detail. Burgamy told Wilson that he intended to carry at least one rifle and at least one handgun while breaking into, stealing from and firebombing the victim pharmacy. Burgamy also discussed with Wilson his intended use of Molotov cocktails, enhanced with Styrofoam as a thickening agent, to burn the victim pharmacy down.

Wilson and Burgamy believed that the destruction of the competing pharmacy would cause Wilson's Pharmacy, Hyrum Family Value Pharmacy, then the only remaining pharmacy in Auburn to flourish and that, in turn, Wilson's distributor would increase the amount of controlled substance that Wilson could order to meet the increased demand.

Only due to law enforcement intervention, which thwarted the plot, as well as delays imposed by the COVID-19 outbreak, did Wilson and Burgamy's attack plan not come to fruition.

Since December 2019, the FBI, the United States Postal Inspection Service, and the Food and Drug Administration Office of Criminal Investigation (FDA), and the Drug Enforcement Administration, in coordination with the U. S. Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of Virginia, have been investigating a Darknet market vendor account operating under the name NeverPressedRX. A review of the NeverPressedRX account on April 9, 2020, revealed that the account had 2,569 sales, a vendor level of seven and a trust level of seven with 99.95 percent positive reviews. Between January 2020 and April 2020, federal agents with the FBI and FDA, acting in undercover capacities, made and received nine purchases of controlled substances from NeverPressRX. The pills were ordered from and delivered to the Eastern District of Virginia.

On April 9, 2020, Federal law enforcement agents arrested Burgamy at his residence on charges of unlawful distribution of controlled substances and money laundering.

Burgamy stated that he only had one supplier, whom he named as Wilson. Burgamy described Wilson as a pharmacist in Auburn, NE, who operates a pharmacy named 'Hyrum's Family Value Pharmacy.'

Simultaneous with the arrest of Burgamy, federal law enforcement agents executed court-authorized search warrants at Wilson's residence and his business, both located in Auburn. Wilson refused to speak with agents.

Evidence seized from Burgamy's residence included a notebook. In a journal entry dated January 10, 2020, the following text was handwritten in a section labeled 'Top Priority.'

"Hyrum [referring to Wilson] responded w/no more orders until Operation Firewood is complete."

On April 10, 2020, text messages were contained in an encrypted messaging application located on Burgamy's seized iPhone. The messages were between Burgamy and a user identified as 'Hyrum.' After further investigation, the telephone number listed on subscriber records, and address matched the house in which Wilson was residing.

According to text messages, Burgamy asked Wilson "if operation firewood is still in play and if it would help the amount you are able to process," to which Wilson replied in part:

"I hit my limit again this month, and that's just with my customers. And while operation firewood would help my volume. I can't give him [referring to another individual] whom Burgamy alleged was prepared to help conduct the firebombing anything upfront, so I understand if he doesn't want to make the trip."

On November 13, 2019, Burgamy requested instructions from Wilson regarding where to go to the victim pharmacy and whether he should buy a cordless metal grinding wheel in the event there was a safe.

On November 13, 2019, Wilson provided detailed instructions to Burgamy concerning the victim pharmacy's location. Wilson also provided what appears to be a screen

capture of a Google map. Burgamy asked Wilson to find "the best getaway route." Wilson replied with suggestions on how to reach the Kansas border. Wilson noted, "I would think the fire would take precedence over a high-speed chase, especially if they don't know what direction you're heading."

Later Wilson discussed police response time and the reaction time to an alarm. Burgamy stated, "Hope the owner isn't a hero and tried [sic] to show up or he may have to go down too." Wilson replied that the "Owner lives 20 miles away.

He's not an issue."

Burgamy asked Wilson via text if he was "for sure good with firewood."

"It's fine if you think it's too high risk," said Wilson. "Our cops are pretty lazy. There are two ways out. The short way is 15 minutes, but you go all the way through town. The long way is maybe 30 minutes, going straight south," said Wilson.

Burgamy replied, "I'm not gonna surrender quietly; God forbid anyone did show up I'm bringing my (semi-automatic rifle) and blasting my (explosive) way out."

Burgamy replied to Wilson on January 16, 2020, and stated, "Sounds good. I'll get the mission done for you. Rather do it my way anyway plus its more profitable overall." Wilson responded, "I'll leave operations up to you, then."

On April 13, 2020, Burgamy was ordered detained following a detention hearing, conducted by video conference, in the U. S. District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia. The government's investigation of Wilson, Burgamy, and others remains ongoing.

If convicted, Wilson faces life in prison.

(StatePoint) It's always the right time to commit to healthy habits, behaviors and steps to improve your physical and mental health. Here are simple steps from the AMA to maintain your physical and mental health during the unusual times of COVID-19:

Channel your feelings of anxiety or helplessness into action. Practicing physical distancing and making sure to wash your hands with warm soapy water for at least 20 seconds are two steps that protect your health and the health of others. Create a safety action plan for you and your family. Also consider how small gestures -- like offering to pick up groceries for an older or at-risk neighbor who may be anxious about leaving home -- can make a big difference.

Take care of yourself physically. Get as much sleep as you can, try to include fruits and vegetables into your diet, and make sure you move. With many gyms and parks closed and physical distancing in place, it may seem harder to work out, so consider options at home, including dancing, to stay active.

Create new routines. With more people working from home and/or caring for school-aged children, the daily lives we had before COVID-19 are a distant memory. But building routines -- time for work, time for meals, time for decompressing -- is critical to creating a new normal. In the world today, there are so many things we can't control, but our schedules are something we can.

Take time to turn off social media and the news. It is critical at this moment to know what is happening in the world and to stay connected with family and friends, but if social media and 24-hour news are making you anxious, consume them in doses.

Feel your feelings. It's natural to worry and be afraid at a moment like this. It is also important to remember there are physicians, public health officials at all levels of government, as well as experts in the private sector, working tirelessly to limit the spread and impact of COVID-19.

Stay connected. Social media gives us a common connection point during times of isolation, but there is real opportunity at this moment to stay connected via phone calls and video chats with friends, family, and even people you haven't heard from in a while. Physical distancing is important, but it's still okay to socialize.

If you have children, talk to them in an age-appropriate way, and avoid ascribing feelings to them. Don't say, "I know you're scared." Kids are observant and they're wise. They may know things are different, but they may not be afraid. Let them know smart people are working on ways to keep us all safe. Model healthy coping.
