

LAW ENFORCEMENT CENTER BONDS TO BE REFINANCED - COUNTY SURVEYOR TO REMAIN AN ELECTIVE OFFICE

The annual meeting of the Richardson County Board of Commissioners was called to order by Chairman Sickel at 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, January 28, 2020. During that meeting, Andrew Forney, Vice-President of D.A. Davidson & Co. reviewed with the Board the benefits to the County for the refinancing of the Limited Tax Obligation and Refunding Bonds, Series 2015 (Law Enforcement Center). Following discussion, a motion was made by Sickel to adopt Resolution 2019-2020-36, calling the series 2015 bonds for redemption. The motion was seconded by Frank and approved by a unanimous vote. Commissioners then voted to adopt by a 3-0 vote Resolution 2019-2020-37 to authorize the refunding of limited tax obligation bonds series 2015.

Chairman Sickel declared a public hearing open at 11:04 a.m. to receive comments from the public regarding the continued election of the county surveyor position in Richardson County pursuant to NE Revised State Statutes 32-525. No one from the public appeared at the hearing, and Chairman Sickel declared the hearing closed at 11:08 a.m.

Following a public hearing, because the County has fewer than 150,00 residents, Commissioners were permitted to maintain the County Surveyor as an elective office, consolidate the office with any other office, or put the issue on the Fall election ballot to let voters decide if the Surveyor should be elected or appointed as either a full or part-time position. Having received no public comment, Commissioners voted to adopt Resolution 2019-2020-34 in reference to keeping the County Surveyor in Richardson County as an elected position.

Two equipment purchases were approved during the portion of the meeting when Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr. updated the Board on the rou-

tine maintenance being done on county roads and bridges. After reviewing the quotes that were received, the Board voted 3-0 to approve the purchase of a 2020 Western Star from Truck Center Companies with the Nebraska State bid contract #14541 (oc) REN 3 for \$120,000.00. Also approved unanimously was the purchase of a 2020 belly dump trailer from Brazos Trailer for \$31,838.00.

Two requests for the use of County road rights-of-way for utility line installations were approved. A motion was made by Frank to enter into agreements with Windstream (job #150000606-90638, #150000606-90647 and #71500006600008) for the use of county road right-of-way for a utility line on 710 Road between 630 and 631 Avenue located between Sections 19 and 30, T2, R13. The motion was seconded by Sickel and approved 3-0. A motion was made by Sickel to approve an agreement with the City of Falls City to use the county road right of way for placement of utility lines in a right-of-way for 658 Avenue south of 159 Hwy then east on 705 Road for 2 miles to 660 Avenue then south for ½ mile; from the ½ mile mark on 661 Avenue between Sections 19 and 20, T1, R18 south for approximately 1/3 mile. The motion was seconded by Frank and also approved 3-0.

Mr. Darveau also presented to the Board the study on the use of 708 Road east of 658 Avenue. A motion was made by Sickel to adopt Resolution 2019-2020-35 to hold a public hearing on Tuesday, February 25, 2020, at 9:45 a.m. to receive public comment on whether the County should vacate or abandon 708 Road east of 658 Avenue. That motion was seconded by Frank and approved 3-0.

Brian Kirkendall, EMA Director, reviewed with the Board plans for the replacement of the generator at the Courthouse. After review of quotes received, Commissioners chose to approve the purchase of a 150W generator with 120 hours from IAO Electric of Hiawatha, KS, for the purchase price of \$46,998.80 that included all expenses related to the installation of the generator.

Laura Osborne, grant coordinator of the Four County Juvenile Services Grant, updated the Board on the grant activity and programs that are being offered and done within Richardson County. Following her report, a motion was made by Commissioner Caverzagie to enter into an agreement with LMO Consulting, LLC, to provide administrative services for the Four

'DO YOUR JOB WE'RE DROWNING DOWN HERE'

During the second session of the 106th Nebraska Legislature's ten-day session, the only time Senators can introduce bills; Senator Julie Slama introduced a bill pertaining to the U.S. Corps of Engineers and last year's severe flooding.

LR 288 is a resolution to Congress and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers requesting them to prioritize flood control on the Missouri River as a top priority for the management of water systems under their authority.

In a January 26, 2020 post to her Facebook page Slama said she was "done sugar-coating it" and said the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is systematically

failing to control the Missouri River.

Senator Slama said Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, and Missouri have united in splitting costs of a study with the Corps of Engineers on how to prevent future flooding.

"This partnership should not be necessary. The Corps has had a decade to address flooding. This is not a 'feel-good story' of states working together with the federal government.

Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri, and Iowa are being forced to use our tax dollars to pressure a federal agency to do its job. That's unacceptable. The Corps has refused to take action, even in the face of consistent failures and

flooding since 2011. That's unacceptable," said Senator Slama.

Slama said that the \$400,000 study referenced would take years to complete several more years before any action takes place.

"That's unacceptable," said Senator Slama.

"These floods are killing people, destroying livelihoods, and wrecking homes. Each flood is a hit to local economies, destroys roads, and forces an outward migration from impacted communities. There's a sense of apathy amongst those with the power to do something, so it's up to us to refuse to accept this as 'the new normal,'" said Senator Slama.

Senator Steve Erdman of Bayard says his new tax reform proposal (LR300CA) represents "Thinking outside the box on steroids."

Sorry Senator, we opened that box in 1993 and the Legislature's Revenue Committee held a public hearing and quickly closed the box. It was LB195, the Transaction Tax. It looked a lot like your consumption levy act to replace sales, income and property taxes with a single tax levied during every business transaction. The committee voted 6-0 to kill the bill.

The Transaction Tax was brought to Lincoln by longtime McCook businessman Don Klein who represented Nebraskans for Equal Taxation. He convinced Sens. Cap Dierks of Ewing, Owen Elmer of Indianola and Rex Haberman of Imperial to carry the bill. Sens. Tim Hall of Omaha and Jim Jones of Edaville also signed on.

To their credit, the proponents of LB195 actually presented specific definitions of a transaction and suggested that the state establish eight taxing districts to coincide with the existing state Highway Commission Districts. Each district would have a five-member board to determine how the proceeds would be distributed to political subdivisions in the district. One member of each of the district boards would serve on a state tax commission.

The proposed Constitutional Amendment (LR300CA) says it shall be submitted to the electors with the following ballot language: "A constitutional amendment to prohibit the state and all political subdivisions from imposing any form of taxation other than a single-rate consumption tax and to require the Legislature to enact such a tax."

Aye, there's the rub. It doesn't suggest how said tax is to be defined, collected or distributed. It simply says the Legislature has to enact such a tax. Isn't that what lawmakers have been arguing all along in this whole "tax reform" discussion? And hasn't it all boiled down to property tax relief and school finance?

Then there's the overriding Constitutional issue. Experience says to be very, very careful about what you put into the Constitution, because it's easier to put something in than it is to remove it. Be very careful about who calls the shots on such changes. Do we trust the electors to authorize a proposal without knowing the details of implementation?

As we await a hearing on the proposal before the 106th Legislature Second Session, let's look back at the hearing for LB195 before the 93rd Legislature, First Session in March 1993. There were 13 proponents and seven opponents. Two people spoke in a neutral capacity, one of them representing then Gov. Ben Nelson.

According to the introducers' statement of intent, LB195 would have established a one percent tax on every commercial transaction undertaken in the state. Each participant in the transaction would be responsible for payment of half of the tax. As of January 1, 1994, the bill would have repealed the state sales and income tax and prohibited subdivisions from levying any property tax. Let me repeat, the committee killed the bill 6-0.

In his consumption tax proposal, Erdman is joined by Sens.: Tom

Brewer of Gordon; Bob Clements of Elmwood; Curt Friesen of Henderson; Tim Gragert of Creighton; Steve Halloran of Hastings; Robert Hilkemann, Mike McDonnell and Justin Wayne of Omaha and Dave Murman of Glenvil.

Erdman hinted at some ideas he has for implementation in a Local View opinion piece in the Lincoln Journal Star. His key points are in italics. My thoughts on each follow.

All other taxes would be eliminated. The voters did that right before Norbert Tiemann was elected Governor in 1966. The state was left with no source of income and the current tax structure had to be implemented in a move that cost him a second term.

The consumption tax would never tax low-income residents. They would get a monthly "pre-bate" check equivalent to the amount of

consumption tax they would pay up to the federal poverty level. What could possibly go wrong with that scenario?

The consumption tax would only tax new goods and services "such as dry cleaners, dog groomers and garbage collectors." Erdman says "new" is the key word here. So, if you buy a used car and shop at garage sales or thrift stores, you're tax-free. But what, what about food?

There would be no need for several state agencies and business tax incentive programs would be unnecessary, saving the state millions of dollars, he wrote.

Again, I ask, what could possibly go wrong?

County Juvenile Services Program. That motion seconded by Sickle and approved by a 3-0 vote. A motion was also made by Caverzagie to enter into an agreement with Maxine Schatz, LLC, to provide services for the Four County Juvenile Services Program, including acting as the 4 County Juvenile Diversion Instructor. That motion was seconded by Frank and approved by unanimous vote.

The Board traveled to the Law Enforcement Center to meet with Sheriff Hardesty and Chief Deputy Sheriff Roland Merwin. Discussed were grants that are currently available, and the salaries and salary increases for years of service for the deputy, dispatcher and jailer positions that are currently vacant due to recent resignations. No action was taken at this meeting on a resolution to approve a deposit of funds to the Sheriff Fee Account. The Board also conducted the quarterly jail inspection and found the facility to be in good order.

Commissioners adopted Resolution 2019-2020-33 regarding the rate of mileage reimbursement for County employees. Approval was by a 3-0 vote.

The reappointments of Bill Niefeldt and Bonnie Kanel to the County Visitors Committee to terms of three years expiring December 31, 2022, also received a unanimous vote of approval.

County Treasurer Amanda Bartek-Young presented to the Board the distress warrant report for 2019 in which she reported that the Sheriff's Department had collected all but two of the warrants, one of which was deemed to be uncollectible and was recommended to be stricken from the tax roll, and one that will be reissued. Commissioners then voted to strike distress warrant #740270538 from the tax rolls in the amount of \$529.75 as it has been deemed to be uncollectible and to approve the 2019 distress warrant return report as presented by the County Treasurer.

Executive Director Beckie Cromer of Falls City EDGE presented to the Board her organization's quarterly report to the Commissioners, the same information that she had reported a week earlier to Falls City's City Council.

Commissioners adjourned their Board of Commissioners' meeting after voting to allow the payment of all claims submitted during the week prior to their meeting. The Board's next meeting will be held Tuesday, February 11, 2020, at 9:00 a.m. in the Commissioner's Meeting Room, Courthouse, Falls City, NE. The agenda is kept current at the County Clerk's Office.

Prior to meeting as a Board of Commissioners, the Supervisors met as the Richardson County Board of Equalization was called to order by Chairman Sickle at 8:45 a.m. During that session, a motion was made by Commissioner Sickle to approve one tax list correction. The motion was seconded by Caverzagie and approved by a 3-0 vote. The meeting was then adjourned at 8:52 a.m.

Primary Election information

Preparation is underway at the Office of the Richardson County Clerk for the Tuesday, May 12, 2020, Primary Election. Approaching deadlines for candidates and voters to remember are detailed below.

Tuesday, 5:00 p.m., February 18, 2020 is the incumbent filing deadline. (Incumbent is any person who is elected or appointed to an elective office, NE §32-111). Monday, 5:00 p.m., March 2, 2020, is the non-incumbent filing deadline. A complete list of candidate filings on record at the Richardson County Clerk's Office who will be considered for nomination at the Primary Election are listed below with the incumbents denoted with an *.

County Commissioner District 2 seat is up for a four-year term—no filings.

District 2 serves the following precincts: Falls City Ward 1 and Falls City Ward 2 north of 21st Street, precincts of Falls City Rural/Ohio, Jefferson/Rulo and Arago/Barada.

County Commissioner District 3 seat is up for a four-year term—Terry Frank*. District 3 serves the following precincts: Salem, Liberty, East Muddy, West Muddy/Porter, Franklin/Humboldt Rural/Speiser and Grant/Nemaha.

School Districts 56 and 70 all have three positions up for election this year with up to six candidates being considered for nomination at the May 12 Primary Election to be voted upon at the November General Election. Persons who have filed for these positions are: School District 56 four-year term—no filings; School District 70 four year term—no filings.

The City of Falls City and the City of Humboldt Council Member seats up for election to a four-year term. Those persons filing for these positions are as follows: City of Falls City Ward I—no filings; Ward II—no filings; Ward III—no filings; Ward IV—no filings; City of Humboldt Ward I—Larry A. Stauffer; Ward II—no filings.

The Airport Authority in the City of Falls City has two members up for election for a six-year term. Persons who have filed for this position are: David Mullins.

Unlike years past, there will no longer be candidates on the ballot for delegates to the Republican Party County Convention. The law now states (NE Revised State Statutes 32-706) that anyone who wishes to attend the Republican Party County Convention as a delegate must register with the County Clerk by March 2, 2020. Those registering thus far are: Vincent Metzner. Any questions or further information on the Republican Party County Convention should be directed to the Nebraska State Republican Party headquarters at 402-475-2122 or via their website at <http://negop.org>.

Other offices to be nominated at the Primary Election are: President of the United States, United States Senator, Representative in Congress- Dist. 3, Southeast Community College Board Members for District 2 and At-Large, Nemaha Natural Resource Districts 8, 9, 10. Filing forms for these offices can be obtained at the Office of the County Clerk, but the candidate filing must be made with the Secretary of State.

The candidate filing deadline for Village Board of Trustees and Educational Service Unit #4 is July 15 for incumbents and August 3 for non-incumbents.

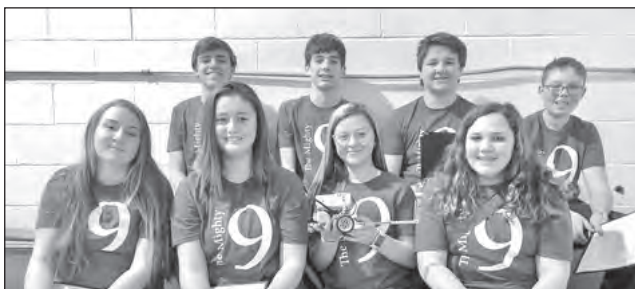

AND WHEREAS, the following was recommended by Steven J. Darveau, Jr., the Richardson County Highway Superintendent in a report dated January 28, 2020 to the County Board of Commissioners:

Richardson County Bridge C007452615 has been closed since 1990, due to the bank caving away exposing the piling. It is recommended this structure be permanently closed at this time. This segment of minimum maintenance road has no resident or businesses located along it. It has not been used since the closing of bridge C007452615 in 1990; furthermore, said roadway has been planned to crops for several years. Adjacent landowners are in favor of said road and bridge closure and have requested to also return the closed bridge eliminating the need for County removal of said structure. Neighboring landowners can access to their property from the remaining portion of county road.

On Tuesday night, the Sacred Heart Irish girls basketball team hit the road for a contest against 13-3 Wymore Southern. The Lady Irish jumped out quickly on the Raiders, taking an 18-5 first-quarter lead and cruised into the half holding a 26-12 advantage. The Irish allowed just seven second-half points, picking up the 38-19 win.

Sacred Heart hit 56 percent of their shot attempts (14-25) while allowing the Raiders to make just 6-19 shots. SH was solid behind the three-point line, making 5-8. Rachel Magdanz led the offensive attack for SH with 11 points, making 3-6 from behind the arc. Danielle Bippes added 10 points, going a perfect 4-4 from the field. Bippes also led the Irish with

six rebounds. M. Witt was the top playmaker with five assists. Scoring vs. Southern, Magdanz 11, D. Witt three, M. Witt five, Vonderschmidt six, Eickhoff three, Bippes ten.

In the second contest of the week, the Irish hosted the Johnson-Brock Eagles at the Roh Activity Center on Thursday night. Again, the Irish wasted little time in setting the tone, taking a 19-7 first-quarter advantage and a 37-14 halftime lead. The Lady Irish continued to hammer away in the final two quarters, picking up the 59-33 win.

Sacred Heart outshot the Eagles 40% to 28% from the floor in the contest. SH connected on 23/38 shot attempts, while the Eagles made just 11/39. The rebounding battle was tight, with SH holding a slight

She ended her message by saying, "My official message to the Corps is simple: do your job. We're drowning down here."

Legislative Resolution 288 introduced by Senator Julie Slama states: "Nebraska has experienced severe flooding in the past several years; and the frequency of severe flood events due to anthropogenic factors and releases from Gavins Point Dam is increasing; and Nebraska's preliminary assessment of damage to bridges, roads, and other infrastructure caused by the 2019 severe flood event reached approximately four hundred and fifty million dollars; and states rely on the Federal Emergency Management Agency to pay for the majority of recovery efforts related to flood damaged infrastructure; and because of the increasing frequency of flooding in Nebraska, the subsequent failure of dams, levees, and dikes caused by high water levels, and the increase in expenses for recovery efforts to restore damaged infrastructure, it is imperative that flood control be a top priority; and the Flood Control Act of 1936, an act passed by Congress and signed by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, authorized civil engineering projects such as dams, levees, dikes, and other flood control measures to be

managed by the United States Army Corps of Engineers; and the United States Army Corps of Engineers has authority over many of the levee systems in Nebraska as well as management of water flows in the Missouri River basin using a network of six dams; and as a result of a lawsuit the United States Army Corps of Engineers was ordered to address a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service biological opinion outlining measures that must be taken by the Corps to come into compliance with the Endangered Species Act, which led to a revision of the Missouri River Mainstem Reservoir System Master Water Control Manual for the Missouri River Basin; and the Master Water Control Manual for the Missouri River Basin issued in 2004 provided that the Corps, in consultation with affected interests and other agencies, would appropriately consider endangered species protection in order to obtain the optimum development and utilization of the water resources of the Missouri River basin to best serve the needs of the people; and while development along and downstream of the Missouri River has increased, the standards put in place by the Corps for levee design, construction, and maintenance have not been updated in over twenty years; and the Corps should consider

the impact of flooding on people and agricultural land and economies and prioritize flood control over fish and wildlife under the authority of the federal Endangered Species Act when creating future Missouri River Mainstem Reservoir System Master Water Control Manuals and updating levee standards.

Nebraska Legislature hearings began January 21 and will end February 27, 2020. Each bill introduced receives a public hearing with public testimony. A Notice of hearing on LR 288 has been set for Wednesday, February 5, 2020.
