By: Charlie Radatz The annual meeting of the Richardson County Board of Commissioners was called to order by Chairman Sickel at 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, January 28 , 2020. Following discussion, a motion was made by Sickel to adopt Resolution 2019-2020-36, callResolution 2019-2020-36, calling the series 2015 bonds for redemption. The motion was seconded by Frank and approved by a unanimous vote. Commisby a unanimous vote. Commissioners then voted to adopt by a 3-0 vote Resolution 2019-202037 to authorize the refunding of limited tax obligation bonds series 2015. Chairman Sickel declared a public hearing open at 11:04 a.m. to receive comments from the public regarding the continued election of the county surveyor position in Richardson County pursuant to NE Revised State Statutes 32-525. No one from the public appeared at the hearing, and Chairman Sickel declared the hearing closed at 11:08 a.m. Following a public hearing, because the County has fewer than 150,00 residents, Commissioners were permitted to maintain the County Surveyor as an elective office, consolidate the office with any other office, or put the issue on the Fall election ballot to let voters decide if the Surveyor should be elected or appointed as either a full or parttime position. Having received no public comment, Commissioners voted to adopt Resolution 2019-2020-34 in reference to keeping the County Surveyor elected position. elected position. Two equipment purchases were approved during the portion of the meeting when Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr. updated the Board on the rou-

## 'Do YOUR JOB WE'RE DROWNING DOWN HERE'

During the second session of the 106th Nebraska Legisla ture's ten-day session, the only time Senators can introduce bills; Senator Julie Slama introduced a bill pertaining to the U.S. Corps of Engineers and last year's severe flooding.
LR 288 is a reoding. gress and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers requesting them to prioritize flood control on the Missouri River as a top priority for the management of wate systems under their authority ystems under their authority.
In a January 26,2020 post her Facebook page Slama said she was 'done sugar-coating it' and said the U S Ar-coating it of Engiters is syst of Engineers is systematically

Senator Slama said Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, and Missouri have united in splitting costs of a study with the Corps of Engineers on how to prevent future flooding.
"This partnership should not be necessary. The Corps has had a decade to address flooding This is not a "feel-good story" of states working together with the federal government.
Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri, and Iowa are being forced to use our tax dollars to pressure a fed eral agency to do its job. That's unacceptable. The Corps has re fused to take action, even in the face of consistent failures and
flooding since 2011. That's unacceptable, said Senator Slama. Slama said that the $\$ 400,000$ study referenced would take years to complete several more years before any action takes place. Senator Slama
"These floods are killing people, destroying livelihoods, and wrecking homes. Each flood is a hit to local economies, destroys roads, and forces an outward migration from impacted communities. There's a sense of apathy amongst those with the power to do something, so it's up to us to refuse to accept this as "the new refuse to accept this as "the new (Continued Senator Slam (Continued on Page 14)

Legislative Resolution 288 introduced by Senator Julie Slama states: "Nebraska has experi enced severe flooding in the past several years; and the frequency of severe flood events due to an hropogenic factors and releases from Gavins Point Dam is increasing; and Nebraska's preliminary assessment of damage to bridges, roads, and other in frastructure caused by the 2019 severe flood event reached ap proximately four hundred and fifty million dollars; and states rely on the Federal Emergency Management Agency to pay or the majority of recovery ef forts related to flood damaged infrastructure; and because of the increasing frequency of flooding in Nebraska, the subequent failure of dams, levee er levels, and the increase in expenses for recovery efforts to restore damaged infrastrucure, it is imperative that flood control be a top priority; and the Flood Control Act of 1936 an act passed by Congress and signed by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, authorized civil engineering projects such as dams, levees, dikes, and oth er flood control measures to b
managed by the United States Army Corps of Engineers; and the United States Army Corp of Engineers has authority over many of the levee systems in Ne braska as well as managemen of water flows in the Missour River basin using a network of six dams; and as a result of a lawsuit the United States Army Corps of Engineers was ordere to address a U.S. Fish and Wild life Service biological opinion outlining measures that mus be taken by the Corps to com into compliance with the Endan gered Species Act, which led to a revision of the Missouri River Mainstem Reservoir System Master Water Control Manual for the Missouri River Basin and the Master Water Contro Manual for the Missouri Rive Basin issued in 2004 provided that the Corps, in consultation with affected interests and othe agencies, would appropriately consider endangered specie protection in order to obtain the optimum development and utilization of the water resources o the Missouri River basin to best serve the needs of the people and while development alon and downstream of the Missour River has increased, the stan dards put in place by the Corp for levee design, construction, and maintenance have not been updated in over twenty years and the Corps should conside
