## FCL&AC does more with less

Hope Schawang, director, illustrated how the Falls City Library and Arts Center provides more services with fewer staff and a lower budget when she reported to the City Council during their regular meeting two weeks ago.

The numbers, provided by the Nebraska Library Commission are impressive. With a population of just over 4,000 and a staff of four, the local Library and Arts Center recorded a circulation of 136,960 in 2013. By comparison, Nebraska City, with a population over 7,000 and nine staff members, reported circulation of 88,604, and Plattsmouth, at slightly more than 6,500 in population and 10 staff members, had circulation of 79,722.

Falls City's library is open 43 hours a week and its budget is \$228,524. In Nebraska City, the library is open 52 hours a week and operates on a \$516,909 budget. Plattsmouth's library is open 64 hours a week and its budget is \$315,726.

The Falls City Library and Arts Center offers more Internet and Wifi portals than any of the small town libraries listed, with 26. The only library listed that comes close is at Scottsbluff, where 25 connections are avail-

## After 92 years, Hoy's Ideal Cleaners closes its doors

Owner Steve Hoy flipped the 'Open' sign to 'Closed' for the final time Thursday evening at Hoy's Ideal Cleaners. After 92 years, the family-owned dry-cleaning business with one of the most recognizable storefronts in southeast Nebraska closed its doors for good.

Hoy returned to the family business on January 1, 1986 and took over the owner-operator title when his father, Stacy William "Bill" Hoy, Jr., passed away in September of 2005, after more than 55 years as owner. Steve and current employee, Lisa Ramer, were joined Thursday by Steve's wife, Stacy, and their two sons, Ryker and Patrick, as they hung two poster board signs on the large, eight-sided storefront window that read, "OUR FAMILY WILL NEVER FORGET YOUR SUPPORT! BUSINESS CLOSED."

Ideal Cleaners began in 1922 in the back of Steve's grandfather Stacy Hoy's home, which was located at 1215 Stone. The establishment moved to a location on West 16<sup>th</sup> Street, west of the old Father's Clothing, and then into Stephenson's Hotel before building on the present 1817 Harlan site in 1937.

Bill grew up in the dry cleaning business and attended Notre Dame for two years after high school. In the summer of 1950, he took a summer course at the National Institute of Dry Cleaning in Maryland and returned to Falls City to take over for his father.

Steve said his father never considered retirement and the one time the two discussed the topic, a rather timid squabble ensued.

"When he was about 70-years-old, we got into a little argument because I said to dad, 'Why don't you retire?'" Hoy said. "He told me he was afraid to because any time one of his friends retired, they passed away within a couple years. So he kept working and doing what he wanted to do."

Bill and wife, Tootie, raised eight children – Bill, Pat, Mike, Tim, Kathy, Jim and Brian – who, according to Steve, also "grew up" in the family business. Steve laughed as he reflected on his first days on the job.

"January 1<sup>st</sup>, 1986 was my official first day in here, but I grew up in here working. We all did," Hoy said. "Actually, we started working in here when we were about nine-years-old."

Much changed during the nine-plus decades Ideal Cleaners served Falls City. From the cleaning methods used – gasoline and a clothesline

## 40 YEARS AGO - SHOOTOUT IN FALLS CITY

*(Forty years ago last Saturday, on Feb. 2, 1973, a shootout at the north edge of Falls City left a 19-year-old St. Joseph, MO, youth dead after 35 minutes of pure terror for the number of persons involved. The Journal staff felt the re-telling would be interesting to today's readers.)*

It was just about straight up noon when three cars came racing by the Journal office, shots coming from the car in front being fired at the two cars behind. Sirens were blaring. The chase through the city was on.

Chief of Police Ivan Bieck and Patrolman Lester "Perk" Sailors had been keeping track by police radio of the report that Kansas State troopers were chasing two youths who were headed north toward Falls City on Highway 73. Bieck and Sailors stationed their patrol car just north of viaduct and had been there only minutes when a green Buick came speeding across the viaduct at a high rate of speed, on the wrong side of the highway. The police car gave chase with sirens blaring. At 13th Street State Trooper Robert Strickland, who had been summoned while at home and now was southbound, did a quick 180 and joined the

The morning started about as normal as it can when you are in Las Vegas. We had to beg our bodies to cooperate and start the day. Only two hours before we had watched the sun come up in the desert from the now dark and quiet Fremont Street. We had stayed out far too late for what we wanted to accomplish today but we were on a mission.

Our first stop was breakfast. We were by no means starving. We just needed something in our queasy stomachs. I was nervous as I inhaled coffee, two runny eggs, toast, bacon and French toast. Midway through my meal I realized this may be a terrible idea. I have one of the weakest stomachs ever recorded. I get motion sick really easily and grease, well that usually spells disaster for me. So what was I thinking?

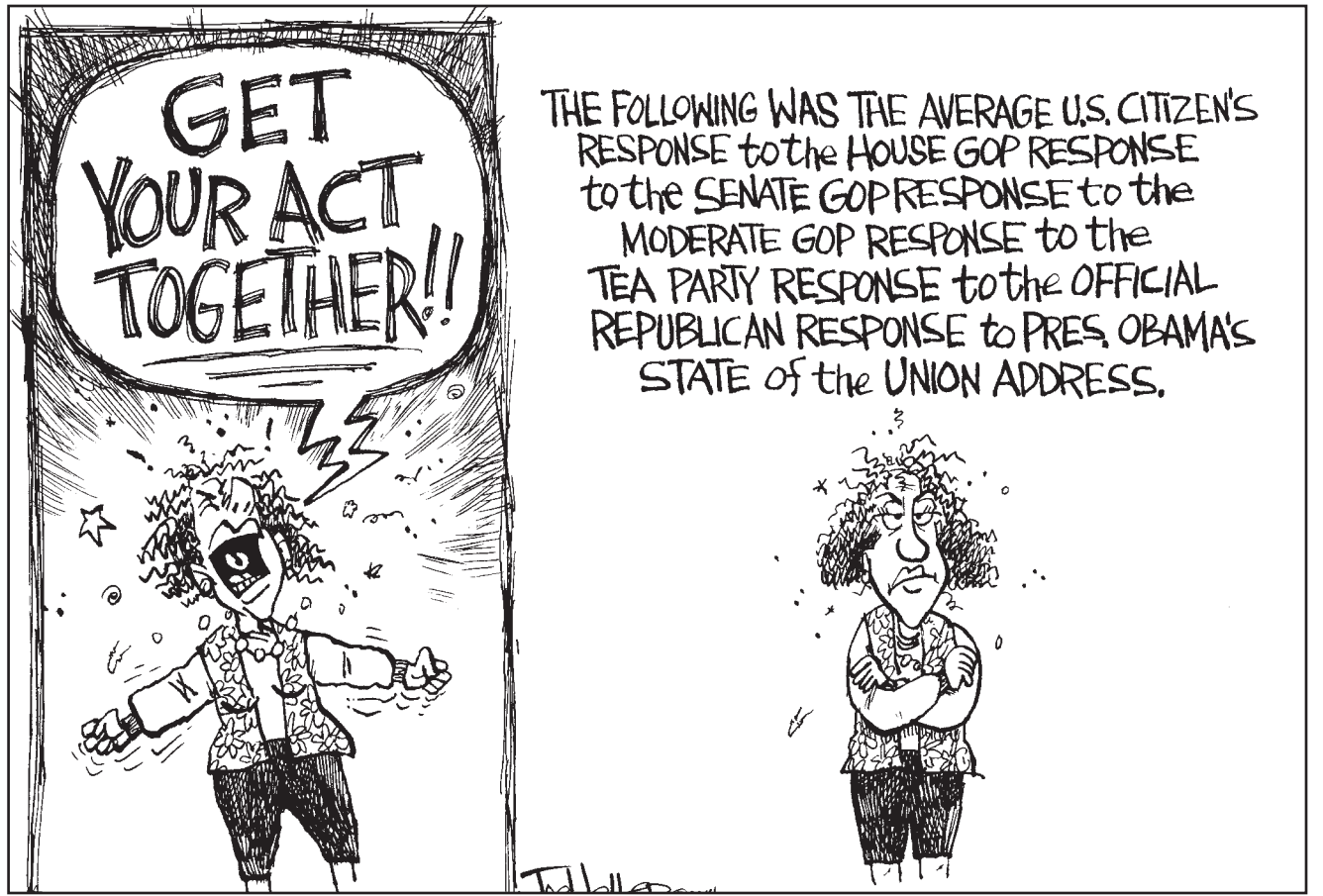
As we walked to our destination after breakfast I started to get even more nervous. I started to question this entire thing. What if I get sick on someone? I would be mortified. But, I love trying new things and really love heights. I would have to power through these nerves or I'd regret it. We walked into the little storefront shop. First we were weighed, then we signed the proper "We won't sue you if we die" paperwork. As soon as we finished signing our lives away they took us five stories up in the air.

When I rolled out of bed that morning I dressed for ultimate comfort. This included sweat pants and a t-shirt. I regretted this decision immediately. They placed the four of us in a row each on a large black X. Two young, oh-so-impossibly-young, men started fitting us for our harnesses. They looked like they didn't even have drivers' licenses yet, but here we were placing our safety in their hands. Those nerves of getting sick were replaced with nerves of bodily injury.

Soon it was our turn. We were waved over to a line of four crates. We climbed on them and stood looking at each other. Each of us did our best not to look at the steep drop off a few feet in front of us. As soon as I made the mistake of looking out in front of me I noticed the net. They had a net, just in case we fell. It started to get more real by the second. I watched these young guys hook my sister's harness to the line directly above her. This hook was far smaller than it should have been. They moved on to me and as soon as I was hooked in they told me to pull my feet up off of the crate and hang. And before we had time to even think about it someone was yelling, one, two, three, go! They released us and we were off.

You just soar. I'm not a girl who yells or cheers. I wasn't a cheerleader in school and I'm only vocal when angry. I'm that strange girl who sits and takes it in. I couldn't hear anything but some crazy person screaming WOOOO! Half way through I realized it was me. I was cheering! I had no control over the sounds flowing from my mouth. I looked below at all of the tourists watching and pointing at us. Some people were clapping some were horrified. I watched all the classic casinos of Fremont Street pass me by. I wanted this moment to last forever. It was euphoric. I could stick my arms out in front of me and kick my feet around. It truly felt as if I was flying. I looked at my cousin, sister and friend all flying out in front of me. It was thrilling, until I turned and looked out ahead of me. The man at the end was staring right at me with the most horrified look on his face. Soon his hands went out as if he was wishing me to stop where I was. It turned out my catch wasn't set and I came in at full speed. Next thing I knew I closed my eyes and crashed into both the horrified man and the wall at the end of the line. I hit hard, so hard I was sore the next two days. All I could do was laugh.

We got out of our harnesses and climbed down five stories to get our feet back on solid ground. My legs were shaking but it wasn't from nerves anymore, it was from sheer excitement. I had conquered the zip line down Fremont Street. I didn't get sick and I didn't back down. I followed through and was ready to do it again. We picked out some expensive photos to buy of our experience and left to catch our plane back to the snow awaiting us in Nebraska. The warmth and excitement was over and we had to head back to our normal lives, the ones where we don't find ourselves screaming "WOOOO" at the top of our lungs.



## Leave it to Ernie - Chambers sets a snare in tax debate

Maverick veteran lawmaker Ernie Chambers is at it again, this time in an unlikely arena, the debate on taxes.

To the joy of some and the bewilderment of others, the proclaimed atheist state senator has offered a bill (LB675) that would end the property tax exemption for Nebraska churches. The man who sued God back in 2007 is, once again, quoting the Bible to prove his point. Wait, an atheist quoting the Bible? Not surprising to me.

Years ago when I ventured out of the Capitol press room in search of a Bible to fact-check a story I was writing, I found three in Chambers' office. Daily inspiration? Recreational reading? Debate fodder? Just Ernie being Ernie.

Since some of his colleagues aren't likely to be well versed in the Word, Chambers has an edge to take scripture out of context to make it work for him. Much of it is done sarcastically to poke at those who occasionally intone God's word in pressing their favorite issues. But sometimes he contradicts himself. Seven years ago he claimed that he could sue God in Douglas County "because He's everywhere." That's quite an admission for an atheist.

Yes, he made his point against frivolous lawsuits. One has to wonder what his point is with taxing churches. Perhaps it's just another avenue to rail against something he dislikes while raising the ire of some of his pontificating colleagues. Or maybe it's just setting the stage for him to delay the passage of any massive tax changes that Governor Heineman wants passed in his last year in the executive office. Or he may even be paving the way for a filibustering lecture about the separation of church and state.

Without citing exact Scripture references, Chambers said Jesus declared that we must "render unto Caesar what is Caesar's" when asked whether taxes should be paid to Caesar. He said that's reason enough to undo the exemption on churches because the people who go there want to see Scripture fulfilled. Chambers noted that the Governor and candidates for governor have said that everything should be on the table for discussion. He said he was simply putting churches on the table.

So, what about the Scripture reference? It appears twice in the New Testament of the Bible: Mark 12: 13-17 and Matthew 22: 15-22. Note that I have included the surrounding verses in order to put Chambers' selected verse in context.

"13Later they sent some of the Pharisees and Herodians to Jesus to catch him in his words. 14They came to him and said, 'Teacher, we know that you are a man of integrity. You aren't swayed by others, because you pay no attention to who they are; but you teach the way of God in accordance with the truth. Is it right to pay the imperial tax to Caesar or not?"

15Should we pay or shouldn't we?' But Jesus knew their hypocrisy. 'Why are you trying to trap me?' he asked. 'Bring me a denarius and let me look at it.' 16They brought the coin, and he asked them, 'Whose image is this? And whose inscription?' 'Caesar's,' they replied. 17Then Jesus said to them, 'Give back to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's.' And they were amazed at him." —Mark 12:13-17 New International Version of the Bible.

English Presbyterian minister Matthew Henry (1662-1714) explained the verses in his widely recognized "Complete Commentary" on the Bible and what he wrote sheds some light on this most recent use of the reference.

Those asking the question were more interested in accusing Jesus, Henry wrote. "Nothing is more likely to ensnare the followers of Christ, than bringing them to meddle with disputes about worldly politics. Jesus avoided the snare, by referring to the submission they had already made as a nation; and all that heard him, marveled at the great wisdom of his answer. Many will praise the words of a sermon, who will not be commanded by the doctrines of it," he wrote.

Senator Chambers has set the snare. It will be interesting to see if the Governor and the Legislature and interested religious leaders will avoid it. Remember, it is a short session.

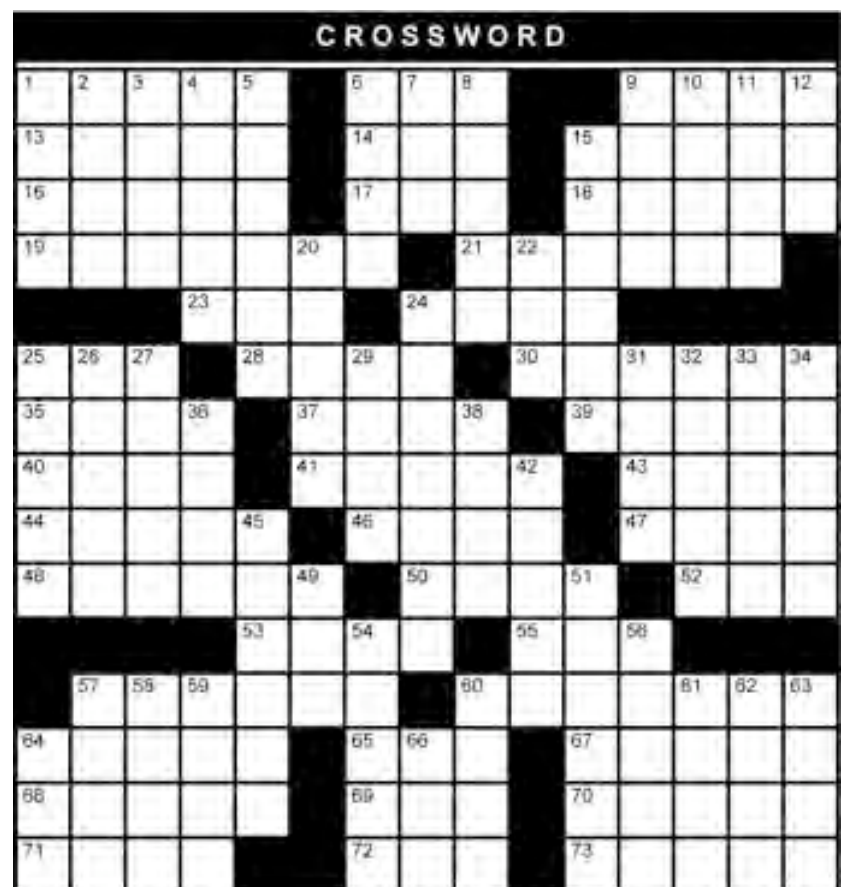

# 40 YEARS AGO - SHOOTOUT IN FALLS CITY

pursuit, lights on and siren going full blast.

This reporter grabbed a Journal camera and headed out, a probable "scoop" in hand.

Up ahead Roy Kirkendall, a salesman for K. E. Morehead Auto Co., slowed to a stop on the highway, waiting for the oncoming traffic to get by him, before turning into the Zentner Phillips 66 station, approximately where Personal Care, Inc. now is located. A car swished around him on the shoulder on the east side of the road and then went into a spin and stopped as it came back on the highway. Kirkendall completed his turn into the station and out of the corner of his eye saw the male passenger in the stalled car on the highway opening the car door and shooting down the highway. Then both occupants were shooting down the highway, the male with a pistol and the female with a rifle.

Trooper Strickland had pulled up, had gotten out of his car when the youth with the pistol pinned him down. The red-headed girl ran into the service station. Bill Lee, who had just purchased the station, his son David, 9, and Herb Killingsworth, an employee, were standing inside. They had seen the Buick spin out of control.

The girl yelled at Lee, "You're being covered, see if the keys are in that car (the Chevelle deserted by Kirkendall). I'm using you as a shield and I have a knife in your back—walk to the car and don't pull nothing funny." It was Bill Lee's lucky day.

"I just knew that woman was going to put me into that car and take me with her," he later said.

She jumped into the driver's and headed north out of the station to pick up her companion, who had ran from his hideout. She didn't reckon with the freezing mist which had put a glaze on the highway. As she turned north she "lost it," the car skidding into a ditch on the east side of the road and turning over on its side.

Just to the north Subby Lombardo had left his Fireside Inn and was headed south on the highway. He noticed the police cars with red lights flashing at the service station and thought there had been a wreck. Patrolman Gene Ramer frantically waved him into the station. As Subby

got out of his car, a shot was fired. He crawled into the station then quickly called Fireside Inn where his father Sam Lombardo and his brother Jim and two cleaning ladies were inside to warm them of what was happening. Jim grabbed a gun and stood at the front door. Shots were being traded back and forth by Trooper Strickland and the two youths, who were shielded by the overturned car. More patrol cars, both Nebraska and Kansas, had arrived on the scene. By this time a small crowd, drawn by the police scanner and the screeching sirens had gathered back of a police barricade near where Lem's is now located. At that distance they could see a little of what was going on.

Nebraska State Troopers Kent R. Rumpf and John L. Wisecarver, both of Nebraska City, were at the scene, having been advised by radio to approach from the south.

(This reporter and a Kansas State trooper were sharing the protection of his patrol car and following the action.)

As the shots continued, the two youths suddenly left the overturned car and took cover in some brush nearby.

Trooper Rumpf, armed with a .351 caliber magnum rifle, got on his patrol car's public address system and called on the two to surrender. The boy emerged from the brush and ran across the highway, then back to the east side and started north in a narrow ditch. A shot came the trooper's way. He again warned the fleeing youth, armed with a pistol, to halt—he was headed for Fireside Inn and its four occupants. He had to be stopped.

Rumpf fired two warning shots over the youth's head. He kept running, about 150 yards ahead. Rumpf's third shot was for real. The youth went down. He was dead.

Trooper Rumpf then got back on his PA system and ordered the girl to come out.

"Your companion is down," he said. "Come out with your hands above your head." She stumbled out of her hiding place, hands up, and officers moved in to put her in custody. She had sustained a leg injury in the melee and was taken to Community Hospital and then to jail. Her dead companion was taken to the Chaney-

Hodgens-Clark Funeral Home. It was all over.

Later in the day County Attorney Henry F. Schepman called a coroner's jury and an inquest was held at the Chaney-Hodgens-Clark Funeral Home. There was a parade of first-and witnesses and after three hours Schepman ended the inquest. The unanimous decision: the homicide was justified. (Roger Kiekhaefer was a member of the jury—the others are deceased.)

What triggered the chase and the shootout?

Earlier that morning, the St. Joe youths, William D. Kotsonis, 19, and Maxine L. Wood, 16, were arrested in a stolen car near Effingham, KS, by two Kansas State Patrolmen. While they were in custody, Kotsonis, pulled a knife on the patrolmen and handcuffed them, then the couple fled.

Northwest of Atchison, KS, they burst into the rural home of a retired couple, Mr. and Mrs. William Glamann, and proceeded to terrorize them while cutting the telephone wires. The boy, with a revolver in his hand, demanded any guns in the house. Mr. Glamann gave them his .22 rifle. They demanded the keys to his car, which were in the car, and then fled in the blue Buick, the girl driving. The farm couple immediately got into their pickup and notified the Kansas State Patrol. The pursuit began and the chase up Highway 73 became hot.

You have the rest of the story.

Maxine Wood was charged for her involvement in the shootout and within several weeks she was found guilty and sentenced to 10 years in the Nebraska Women's Reformatory at Geneva, where she was taken by Sheriff L. D. "Blackie" Camblin and Bob Ferguson.

Perhaps a year or so after she had served her time at Geneva, she came into *The Journal* office with a boyfriend and asked to view the files with the stories of the shootout and her trial. She was permitted to do so. *Journal* employees just shook their heads.

able. Scottsbluff's population is more than 15,000.

Ms. Schawang praised the work of the members of her staff — Pat Deckinger, Kathy Kirkendall and Dianne Hinz — as well as the Library Board, headed by Tim Heckenlively and the Library and Community Foundation of Richardson County, chaired by Ken Kunce. She also saluted the 589 volunteers who donated more than 1,000 hours of service in 2013. "Pretty remarkable," Ms. Schawang said.

She thanked the Mayor and City Council for their "continued support."

Ms. Schawang said she regretted the library can't be open on Fridays because of staff limitations. She said part-time help had been requested but was not budgeted during the year.

Council member Judy Murphy said her hope is that at some point the library can be open on Fridays; Saturday afternoons, too. Mrs. Murphy described the library as "one of Falls City's best assets."

The library has experienced a large increase in patrons who are accessing e-books, take advantage of its many programs and use the computers that are available. The library received more than \$34,900 in 2013 for 23 public computers and chairs from the Bill and Melinda Gates

Foundation and the Nebraska Library Commission.

Monthly attendance at the library consistently tops 3,000 and approaches 4,000 in some months.

Among the goals for the next three years at the library are to maintain excellent accreditation status, increase the staff and hours of service and increase the program schedule.

The library is open Monday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. and on Saturday from 9 a.m. to noon.

to petroleum-based solvents and expensive equipment – to the ever-changing fashion choices of their customers, which through the years included everything from three-piece suits to leisure suits, formal gowns to mini-skirts, derby hats, Open Road Stetsons and fur coats.

Steve looked back on the years fondly, as he recounted stories passed along to him by his father or through his own firsthand accounts.

“My dad would tell me about the early days of the business when my grandfather cleaned clothes at their old house on Stone, he’d hang them out on the clothesline to deodorize and some times on a hot day the clothes would catch on fire,” laughed Hoy. “My dad remembered watching my grandfather running around trying to put the fire out. I always thought that was kind of funny.”

His father told him about Saturday nights in Falls City during the 1950’s and 60’s when people gathered in the town square and all the men wore hats.

“He used to tell me people would come to town on Saturday nights and he would stay open until 10 o'clock at night,” Hoy said. “Every gentleman who came into town wore a hat. On Saturday nights my dad stayed open and cleaned 15 to 20 hats and watched as they walked the square. The old square was ‘hoppin’ he said.”

Business picked up during the last few weeks Hoy said, but with fabrics increasingly becoming “wash and wear,” as Hoy referred to them, the need for dry-cleaning slowly decreased over the years, beginning in the late 1960’s.

“My dad said there was a big change in dry cleaning in the late-60’s and early-70’s when they developed polyester,” Hoy said, adding that prior to polyester most worn fabrics were made out of wool or cotton. “Polyester was a new fabric and the new thing about it was ‘wash and wear.’”

“Wash and wear” Hoy explained, are fabrics that are safe

for people to wash at home, which saves them time and, more importantly, money spent dropping items off at their local cleaners. Hoy also pointed to the increase in more casual-dress attire.

“People dress more casually now,” Hoy said. “They don’t dress up as much as they used to for functions and even in the workforce, business people tend to dress down more than they did.”

As customers entered the business to pick up items one final time, Steve paused his storytelling to thank them for their many years of support and they replied with thank-you’s and well wishes of their own.

“We’re sure going to miss you,” one customer said.

Hoy mentioned the hard work of former employees, Stephanie Vice, Delpha Vice, Shirley Wilhelm, Carol Dodds, Walter Huettner and Bob Casey,

and thanked them for their time spent at the business.

The decision to close was a difficult one for Hoy, but one made easier by the support of his family.

“My biggest hesitation or concern was closing the family business, but they were all very understanding.

“I’ve had a lot of great customers over many years, even those from my dad. Your regulars every week, people like that I’d like to thank and we’ll definitely miss them.”

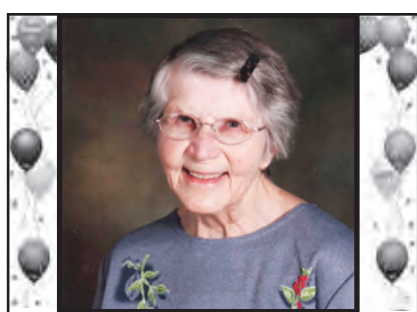

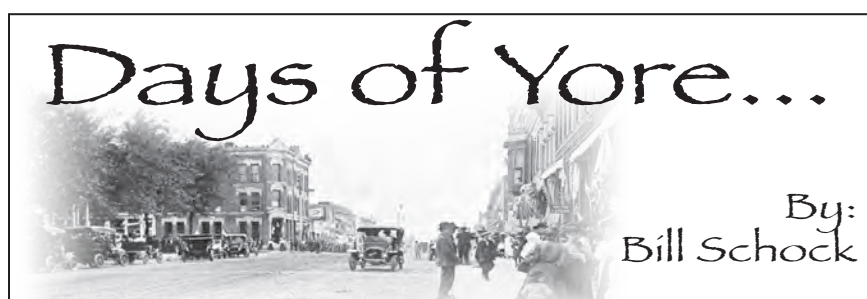

**Director sought  
for NNRD Board**

With the recent resignation of Ted Godemann from the Nemaha Natural Resources District board of directors, applications of interest are sought to fill this vacancy in Subdistrict 10. Applicants must be registered voters who also meet all other eligibility requirements for holding an elected office. They must also reside within the boundaries of Subdistrict 10, which includes all of the city of Falls City but none of the rural area surrounding the city.

Twenty-one members serve on the Nemaha NRD board and represent 10 subdistricts, two directors per subdistrict, who are elected in alternating election years. One member of the board is elected at-large from throughout the entire District. Currently the other director in Subdistrict 10 is Bruce Walker.

NRD board members are normally elected to four-year terms during the primary/general elections in even numbered years. Since the vacancy in this subdistrict occurred during the first 19 months of the term, however, state law now requires that the vacancy be filled by appointment but only through the end of this calendar year. The remaining two years of the term will be filled through the general election process. Deadlines to file for the 2014 election are February 18 for incumbents and March 3 for non-incumbents.

Nemaha NRD board meetings are held in Tecumseh on the second Thursday of each month, generally in the evening. Board members are eligible to receive \$50 per diem (set to increase to \$65 on July 1) and reimbursement of mileage and other expenses incurred while conducting NRD business.

# Tigers surge late, prevail over NCL

The first half belonged to Weston Witt. Jordy Stoller came through in the second half. But, fittingly, the duo – both juniors – combined for Falls City's biggest play Friday night in the Tigers 60-58 victory over Nebraska City Lourdes.

Leading 58-57 with 19.9 seconds on the clock and Lourdes inbound the ball from FC's baseline, Stoller jumped the pass from NCL's Noah Vasa to Tom Gress, turned toward the lane from the left block and found a wide open Witt, who completed the sequence with the game-winning lay-up.

Two last gasps from Lourdes came up short and Witt converted the front-end of a 1-and-1 to seal up

the victory.

"In the timeout, we told the players we needed to gamble some," Falls City High Head Coach Don Hogue said. "We knew what their press break was and he (Jordy) knew where the ball was going and did what an instinctive player does."

Stoller's swipe at the end of the fourth quarter was by far the biggest steal of his team-leading 40 this season and his defensive pressure late in the game helped FC erase a five-point deficit in the game's final two minutes.

"His defense down the stretch was huge" Hogue said.

Stoller finished with 19 points – 13 of which came in the second half – and his third three-pointer after the intermission cut Lourdes lead to three, 50-47, early in the fourth quarter.

Witt also came through down the stretch with nine fourth-quarter points, including five knee-knocker free throws. But his 14 points off the bench in the first half kept the Tigers close, when points were hard to come by.

"Weston has been such a lift coming in off the bench," Hogue said of his sixth man, who finished with a game-high 24 points. "His ability to knock down the three and he does a great job of getting into the paint and finishing in the paint for us."

Tiger senior Mitchell Harling had seven of his nine points in the first half, but saw limited scoring opportunities as NCL seemed determined to have someone other than him beat them in the second half. Harling finished with five assists and in doing so, became the new career assists leader at FC.

Junior Jack Hartman led FC with seven rebounds and also recorded two steals.

Hogue, who now sits one win shy of tying Jug Brown's school-record 193 wins, raved about his team's ability to battle through ad-

## Irish boys seek ninth Pioneer title

Coming off a pair of one-sided conference victories last week at Wymore Southern (70-31) and home against Johnson-Brock (76-41), Falls City Sacred Heart – winners of four-straight games and the defending conference tourney champs – enter this week's 19th Annual Pioneer Conference basketball tournament as the top seed and new number one team in Class D2.

Last week's opponents also served as a preview of the Irish's first round opponent, as Wymore (3-13) and J-B (4-13) faced off last night in Johnson with the winner advancing to play FCSH tonight at 6 in Johnson.

FCSH, now 16-2, also have the opportunity of defending their title in the friendly confines of Prichard Auditorium, as the tournament returns to Falls City for the first time in seven years. The Irish have won 14-straight at Prichard and lost only three times over the past three seasons.

FCSH rolled through Diller-Odell, Lewiston and Sterling by an average of nearly 23 points per game en route to last year's eighth conference tourney crown, but haven't repeated as champions since 2006 when they won their fourth-straight title and sixth overall. Moreover, the last time Prichard was as the backdrop for the event – 2007 – the Irish finished fourth after a 1-2 week.

Matt Goltz scored 11 points in the first half for the Irish last Tuesday against Southern, as FCSH built a 33-3 halftime lead. The 6-foot-3 senior converted all four free throws, hit 6-of-8 shots from the floor and finished with a game-high 16 points. Senior Colin Niemeyer added a pair of three-pointers and finished in double-figures with 12 points.

Irish senior Chaz Dunn finished 7-for-13 from the floor and 3-for-4 at the line in the rout of the Eagles Friday night. Dunn added four steals and six assists to his 19-point performance, while Goltz and junior Austin Malone contributed 15 and 11, respectively. Freshman Bryant Jorn joined Goltz with seven rebounds.

FCSH outscored J-B 43-21 in the second and third quarters after leading by only six, 17-11, at the

end of the first. Dunn had 11 in the third, while Malone (7) and Niemeyer (6) posted 13 of the team's 19 points in the second quarter. Niemeyer finished with nine points, all via the three-ball.

Class D2 tenth-ranked Lewiston (11-7) is seeded fourth and faces the five seed, Pawnee City (11-6), tonight at 7:30 in Johnson. The bottom of the bracket includes D2 No. 7 and third-seeded Sterling (11-6) against six-seed Friend (7-9) tonight at 6 at Lourdes Central Catholic in Nebraska City, while second-seeded and Class D1 fifth-ranked Lourdes (13-4) hosts the winner of Monday's game between Diller-Odell (8-9) and Humboldt-TR-S (2-14) tonight at 7:30.

Thursday's semifinals at Prichard are scheduled for 4:30 and 7:30 p.m., with the Irish, should they advance, set to play in the late game.

The Lady Irish held off Lourdes Central Catholic, 35-29, Friday in Nebraska City, after defeating Johnson-Brock 58-34 in Falls City Thursday night. Last Tuesday, FCSH traveled to Wymore and left with a 49-37 win over Southern. NCL and J-B are both on FCSH's side of the bracket this week, as sixth-seeded NCL (10-7) faced D2 fourth-ranked and third-seeded Sterling (14-4) last night in Johnson in the first round. Seventh-seeded J-B (8-10) hosted No. 10 seed Lewiston (2-16) in their opening round game, with the winner advancing to face FCSH today at 4:30 in Johnson.

The Lady Irish struggled from the floor Friday night at Nebraska City where they finished just over 40 percent (11-for-27) from the floor. Outside of sophomore Maggie Goltz, who led FCSH with 15 points on 7-of-10 shooting, only

three others – senior Ashli Jordan, junior Elizabeth Magdanz and freshman Jade Hill – finished with a made field goal.

Fortunately though, FCSH converted 11 of 16 free-throw attempts and defensively, held NCL to less than 32 percent shooting and forced 14 turnovers. Lourdes kept it close with a 28 to 15 advantage on the glass, which included a 12-to-2 edge on the offensive boards.

Defense also highlighted Thursday's win over J-B, as FCSH tallied 11 blocked shots, 15 steals and forced 20 J-B turnovers. Goltz was responsible for seven blocks and added 17 points and seven rebounds. Freshman Haylee Heits also pulled down seven boards and swiped a team-high five steals to go along with 10 points, while junior Abby Magdanz finished with 14 points, including 2-for-5 from the three-point line, and senior Ashli Jordan finished with nine points, three steals and six assists.

Goltz's big week started last Tuesday at Wymore where she topped her previous season-high of 20 points with 23 points on 9-of-13 shooting against Southern. Goltz and senior Emma Schock each grabbed five rebounds, while Abby

Magdanz dished out five assists to go along with seven points.

Defending their conference title will be another tough task for the Lady Irish, who have won 10 of the 18 Pioneer tournaments and finished runner-up six times. Barring a pair of upsets, FCSH would face Sterling Thursday at 6 p.m. in the semifinals. FCSH defeated Sterling 59-31 in the season-opener.

# Armory lease offer accepted

The Richardson County Commissioners have approved a bid for the lease/rent of the county owned Armory Building.

During their Jan. 28 meeting, a bid was accepted from Tom Townsend representing Medics at Home, Inc. The bid was approved for \$700 per month. The board authorized Chairman Dave Sickel to sign a lease agreement with Medics at Home, Inc., for the \$700 a month fee.

Highway Supt. Scott Huppert held his weekly meeting with Commissioners Sickel, Jim Davidson and Jim Standerford. A resolution was adopted to authorize Sickel to sign an agreement with the State of Nebraska for the programming of the Verdon Northwest project. And the board moved to approve the agreement with the State for that programming.

Falls City EDGE executive director Beckie Cromer presented the organization's quarterly report.

County Attorney Doug Merz met with the board to review items of county legal business and the Commissioners moved to authorize Sickel to sign the Section 125 Plan document with First Concord Benefits Group, LLC.

# Encouraging EDGE report

EDGE executive director Beckie Cromer recently delivered a very encouraging and detailed report to the City Council and later to the Richardson County Commissioners for the fourth and final quarter of 2013.

Several Falls City industrial concerns have attained five-year highs in employment numbers, Mrs. Cromer reported. Airlanco was at 81 employees at the end of December, well above the goal of 73 full-time workers. Vantec was at 16 and WASP was at 89.

Airlanco and Herzog, which had 30 employees, were reported to be hiring. And WASP plans to add 10 to 12 new employees in 2014.

At the end of the year, Ames True Temper employed 20 workers and Consolidated Grain and Barge was at 12 employees.

A North Highway 73 development opportunity "did not materialize," Mrs. Cromer said, because of the high selling price of land per acre (\$26,000). However, the client continued

to look for suitable sites and appears to have found one in Falls City.

EDGE is working with Excel Development on a Wilderness Falls II housing project, including on funding applications. Excel Development Group has a 50+ person waiting list. If funding is approved, the project would include 14 units — eight three bedroom and six two bedroom, as well as a clubhouse.

Also on the housing front, Falls City Homefront, LLC, was scheduled to take delivery of two homes early this year. The homes are for sale and, once sold, the group will look at adding more in the future. The homes are to include full basements and double car garages.

In the 2013 report that was included as an insert in the Journal, the "multiplier effect" of the CGB development was showcased. Businesses impacted by the construction were listed and the following numbers provided: \$25 million dollar development project; \$1.5 to \$2 million in contractors awarded within the area; more than 25 local businesses provided goods and services; and 12 full-time jobs created.

In closing her report, Mrs.

Cromer said "EDGE would like to extend special thanks to the Mayor, City Council, and County Commissioners for their continued support both financially and in time given through Board representation.

EDGE will continue to utilize funds to encourage growth and improve the business conditions of the greater Falls City area."

That effort is evident. And it is working.
