

## FEWER CASES OF COVID-19 IN RICHARDSON CO., DRAMATIC INCREASE IN NEMAHA CO.

The Southeast District Health Department (SEDHD) has confirmed four more cases of COVID-19 in Richardson County bringing the total to 27.

Two cases were confirmed on Monday, August 10; and two were confirmed on Friday, August 14.

The Southeast District Health Department have stopped releasing the gender and age range of the individuals who tested positive for COVID-19.

On Friday, August 14, 2020, Falls City Public School confirmed one high school student tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19) within School District 56. The identified individual had not been present at school and is in self-quarantine under the direction of medical professionals to avoid transmitting the virus to others.

Nemaha County continued to see a massive jump in cases adding an additional 17 cases in the past week.

All identified close contacts will be asked to self-quarantine. Individuals with symptoms consistent with COVID-19 should self-isolate to avoid transmitting the virus to others. COVID-19 symptoms include cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fever, chills, muscle pain, sore throat, and new loss of taste or smell.

As of August 16, 2020, the total cumulative confirmed cases of COVID-19 within the district is 154.

Case counts by county are: Johnson, 14; Nemaha, 45; Otoe, 59; Pawnee, nine; and Richardson, 27.

Local COVID-19 testing available every Wednesday from 7:30 a.m. to 9:30 a.m. at Community Medical Center in Falls City. Pre-Register at TestNebraska.com

## THE 1918 "FLU" PANDEMIC IN RICHARDSON COUNTY JUST KEEP YOUR FLU AT HOME DON'T PEDDLE IT AROUND

This article is the sixth in an eight part series about the 1918 "flu" epidemic that killed millions worldwide.

Christmas was approaching and a resurgence of the 'Spanish Flu' had been seen. Officials from each county meet in Lincoln to discuss how to proceed, but there was light at the end of the tunnel as 1918 came to a close.

### Quarantine state law

It was reported on December 17, 1918, by the *Falls City News* that local men from Richardson County had returned from a meeting in Lincoln where a state quarantine ban was discussed.

Rev. Fink, Dr. Hays and Dr. Husted returned from the Lincoln meeting called by the State Board of Health and reported 'a fine meeting,' with every county in the state being represented. It was decided that no general ban would be put on in the state, but that a most drastic quarantine would be carried out. The resolution adopted at the session was enacted into law with a severe penalty. Doctors will be prosecuted for failure to report by telephone immediately or quickened conveniently

for every new case. Should any member of a quarantined family leave their premises, they will also be prosecuted. This is now state law and it will be enforced in both towns and rural districts to the limit. While we haven't heard so much of the flu in this county, it was shown by statistics that Richardson County is the only county in the state that is approaching normal conditions, that it is the best-organized county for fighting the epidemic and that the percentage of deaths have been far smaller than in other counties. Instead of one commissioner of health, there will be five in the county to enforce the state regulations. This is no small affair when state and nation join in stamping out the disease and it is the moral duty of every citizen to cooperate to end that the epidemic may be stamped out speedily.

### "Flu Epidemic"

#### Let the truth be known

The *Falls City News* printed a letter submitted by H.C. Doran, Mayor and City Board of Health discussing Falls City papers printing misleading statements regarding the 'flu' situation at Humboldt on December 19, 1918.

We wish to say that they are entirely without any foundation whatsoever. They are mere rumors and common gossip, perpetrated for the purpose of disorganizing the business interest at Humboldt. The facts of the matter are that conditions at Humboldt, are among the best in any town in Richardson County. On account of the strict quarantine, the disease has been practi-

## FROM BULLIED TO BENEFACTOR

Larry Cook was eight years old when he got his first bike. His aunt gave it to him, so it was a girls' bike, but he was still proud to call it his own. However, the boys at school soon started making fun of him, and their taunts hurt. A lot.

Instead of tossing the bike into a shed and letting it decay, Larry used it to make money so he could buy a boys' bike. He got a paper route and delivered 125 papers every morning, seven days a week. He saved every dime he made. When he had raised enough money, he bought a new bike. It was shiny and colorful. And it was a boys' bike.

Needless to say, his buddies didn't bully him anymore. That was 66 years ago. Larry is 74 now and retired, but he

still remembers how sick he felt when he was bullied, and how free he felt on his new bike. Because of those two experiences, he has now made bicycles his passion. He buys returned bikes from the WalMart store near his home in Kearney, MO, repairs the bikes, and gives them away. (He also accepts gently-riden bikes from donors).

Two weeks ago, he pulled a trailer into his hometown of Falls City and delivered 30 bikes to the Sixpence office on Stone Street. The employees there distributed them to some of the families they serve, and put big smiles on the faces of two dozen children.

Sixpence director Susan Johnson said, "This is Larry's third donation to us in three years. He is a quiet angel."

Larry will come back in a few

weeks, with 13 adult bikes so that parents can ride with their kids. He also plans to donate some to Community Medical Center for a health initiative that administrators hope to implement for employees.

So why has Larry chosen Falls City?

"My family has lived here for eight generations," Larry said, during a recent interview.

"Six generations are buried at either Maple Grove Cemetery or the Verdon Cemetery. This is my hometown, so I just wanted to give back to the kids here."

Larry was born and raised here, along with brothers Jack and Jim, and sister, Bonnie.

He has great memories from his childhood.

"When I was a teenager, I worked for the Godemanns and just about every other farmer in

## EMA DIRECTOR APPOINTED COUNTY FEDERAL DISASTER REPRESENTATIVE

Plagued by severe damage to County roads and bridges, loss of crops, and damage to fields and private structures from flooding in recent years, Richardson County Commissioners took the proactive step during their Tue. Aug. 11 meeting to officially appoint Brian Kirkendall, EMA Director, as the authorized representative for Richardson County for Federal Declared Disasters.

Commissioners voted to authorize the Board Chairman to sign the Community Wildfire Protection Plan for Southeast Nebraska. Community Wildfire Protection Plans (CWPP's) are the result of the Healthy Forest Restoration Act of 2003. The plan assesses the wildfire hazards. It helps communities identify essential assets and enhances protection to those assets in case of a wildfire. The plan also identifies local wildfire hazard mitigation priorities and actions.

Cory Matty and Brett Berger representing the Nebraska Strong Recovery Project supported by Region V Services presented to the Board an outreach program working in partnership within Region communities to provide counseling and identify needs

during the current COVID-19 pandemic.

Tyler Cooper, County Building Maintenance Technician, met with the Board to review a quote for the replacement of drain and sewer pipes and a quote for the replacement of the water supply lines to the restrooms and offices within the Courthouse. Further information will be obtained and reviewed again at next week's meeting.

Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr. updated the Board on the routine maintenance being done on county roads and bridges this past week. Commissioners reviewed with him, his department's FY20-21 proposed budget.

Richard and Ann Meinzer of the Richardson County Historical Society presented to the Board the Society's annual report, which included a listing of how the funding received last year from the County was used. The Society is requesting continued funding from the County for FY20-21 in the amount of \$15,000.00.

The Board reviewed the proposed budgets for FY20-21 with Pam Vice, County Assessor and County Treasurer, Amanda

Bartek-Young.

Roland Merwin, Chief Deputy Sheriff, updated the Board on the routine business within the Law Enforcement Center this past week. He also reviewed further with the Board the proposed FY20-21 budgets of the Sheriff, Jail and Humboldt Law Enforcement Contract. During their Aug. 4 meeting, Commissioners voted to approve entering into a contract with Holt County, Missouri, for the safekeeping of its inmates. A fee report for fees collected during the month of June 2020 by the Sheriff's Office was approved. The amount collected was \$16,188.15

The Veterans Service Committee has two new members. During its Aug. 4 meeting, the Board approved the appointment of Fred Sikora for a term of five years (07/01/2020 through 06/30/2025) for the vacancy left by Wayne Kreutzer whose term of office had expired on Jun. 30, 2020 and of Dale Oehm to fill the vacancy of Paul Sells a term that expires Jun. 30, 2022.

Commissioners adjourned their meeting after voting to allow the payment of all claims that were submitted during the previous week.

# GAMBLING WITH NEBRASKA: A LOSING BET

Over the years, Nebraska has decided against allowing casino gambling in the Good Life—and for good reason. Gambling can ruin families, hurt communities, and pile on costs to the state. By keeping Nebraska casino-free, our state has minimized the social harms associated with problem gambling. In fact, research shows that Nebraska ranks as the fourth-least gambling-addicted state in America.

It's not just about the rankings. There's a real human cost to casinos. When thinking about casino gambling, it's important to remember that the house always wins. The allure of hitting the jackpot overshadows the more common reality of players going broke chasing the dream of winning it all. In 2017, Americans lost \$107 billion from all forms of legalized gambling. These losses are a reflection of one of the sad realities of gambling: It can be a habit-forming and addictive activity. While some gamblers harmlessly lose a little cash, others have a harder time knowing when to stop. Compulsive gamblers get a "high" from gambling that rewires the neural circuitry of the brain much like an addictive drug. As with drug abuse, gambling addiction leads to anti-social and self-destructive behaviors.

Even without casinos, Nebraska already experiences some of the negative impacts from gambling on our communities. The Nebraska Commission on Problem Gambling offers counseling to individuals with gambling disorders and their families through its Gamblers Assistance Program (GAP). From July 1, 2018 to April 30, 2020, GAP provided long-term counseling to 280 Nebraskans. Surveys of these individuals reveal the financial distress and mental health challenges common to problem gamblers. Thirty percent of participants said they had considered suicide in the past year. For those who reported gambling debts, the average amount owed was over \$28,000. This nearly equaled the group's median annual income. Half of those receiving counseling services earned less than \$30,000 a year. Financial crimes aren't the only negative effects of problem gambling. It shatters relationships and destroys families. Time and money spent gambling can wreck a marriage or lead to child neglect. The financial pressure of gambling losses can also motivate domestic violence or child abuse. Additionally, the stress of gambling debt may trigger anxiety, depression, and behavioral health disorders.

Problem gamblers also hurt our communities when they commit crimes like embezzlement, forgery, and theft to finance their addiction. For example, in 2012 a Nebraska State Senator pled guilty to illegally spending campaign funds at casinos in Kansas. In 2016 a Lincoln pharmacist was sentenced to nine years in prison after defrauding Nebraska's Medicaid program of \$14.4 million. He squandered the money playing craps and blackjack at casinos in Council Bluffs. Also in 2016, a bookkeeper at an Omaha travel agency was arrested for stealing \$1.2 million from her employer to cover gambling losses incurred at Iowa casinos.

Many try to argue that we need casino gambling because they say that it would be a financial windfall to the State with no strings attached. This kind of thinking is short-sighted. For every \$1 a community gains from casino gambling, it pays \$3 in social costs. These costs go toward regulating the casino industry and dealing with the many negative side effects of problem gambling, such as child abuse, spousal abuse, crime, family breakdown, and bankruptcy. Legalizing casinos to improve the state's budget situation makes about as much financial sense as playing the slots to get rich.

In light of the social costs, it's also unfair to argue that governments should allow casino gambling in order to generate tax revenues. Low-income Americans disproportionately struggle with problem gambling, and the net outcome of casino gambling is to transfer money from the poor to the rich. The Open Door Mission in Omaha serves many people who are impacted by gambling addictions. In self-disclosed surveys of the homeless people they serve, they have studied the impact of casino gambling. Before casinos came to Council Bluffs, about nine percent of the homeless people they serve came to them due to gambling. After the casinos, about 36 percent of the homeless people they serve disclose that they are experiencing homelessness due to gambling addictions.

As you can see, the harms of gambling are very real. We can all do something about it. By detecting warning signs of problem gambling, Nebraskans can seek help before a gambling disorder spirals out of control. According to GAP, these signs include:

- Someone betting more than they can afford to lose
- Gambling more to win back money lost
- Borrowing money or selling something to gamble
- Experiencing health or financial problems associated with gambling
- Feeling guilty about gambling
- Needing to bet ever-increasing amounts of money to feel the same level of excitement

## NO BIG RED FOOTBALL OR VOLLEYBALL OR OTHER FALL SPORTS, SAY IT ISN'T SO!

No Big Red!  
Just when you thought 2020 couldn't get any worse. Just when you wondered if the pandemic was going on and THIS! The Big 10 announces no cross-country, no soccer, no volleyball, NO FOOTBALL.

For the first time in decades, NO Big Red! The horror. Since 1890, University of Nebraska football has been the glue that holds Nebraska together. What about the longest sell-out streak in the nation, 375 games dating back to 1962?

There will be no Herbie Husker, Lil' Red, scores of red balloons floating skyward when the home team scores on game days (and nights) in Lincoln. No packed bars and restaurants and gift shops and hotels and motels.

After days of speculation, rumors and fake news, The Big Ten confirmed August 11 that it is postponing all fall sports, including football. The league said in a statement that moving football or other fall sports to the spring remains "a possibility."

"When you look at this decision, we just believe collectively that there's too much uncertainty at this point in time in our country to encourage our student-athletes to participate in fall sports," Big Ten Commissioner Kevin Warren said during an interview after the announcement.

The Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors had a meeting earlier in the day, which appears to have led to the final call.

"The mental and physical health and welfare of our student-athletes has been at the center of every decision we have made regarding the ability to proceed forward," Warren said. "As time progressed and after hours of discussion with our Big Ten Task Force for Emerging Infectious Diseases and the Big Ten Sports Medicine Committee, it became abundantly clear that there was too much uncertainty regarding potential medical risks to allow our student-athletes to compete this fall."

Nebraska leadership took a strong stance against the decision in a statement on behalf of Head Football Coach Scott Frost, UNL Chancellor Ronnie Green, athletic director Bill Moos and NU President Ted Carter. The statement said, in part:

"We are very disappointed in the decision by the Big Ten Conference to postpone the fall football season, as we have been and continue to be ready to play. Safety comes first. Based on the conversations with our medical experts, we continue to strongly believe the absolute safest place for our student athletes is within the rigorous safety protocols, testing procedures, and the structure and support provided by Husker Athletics."

"We will continue to consult with medical experts and evaluate the situation as it emerges. We hope it may be possible for our student athletes to have the opportunity to compete."

So, emotion aside now folks, let's look at the economic impact of all this. One Lincoln bar owner, Eric Marsh, told the Lincoln Journal Star that he and other bar and restaurant owners "live for those seven Saturdays a year." He said his revenue on home game Saturdays is about 50 times more than an average weekday. "It's the money that allows us to make it through the rest of the year."

Frost has said the NU athletic department would lose as much as \$120 million in revenue if there was no football season. A 2014 study done by the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Bureau of Business Research found Nebraska athletics, as a whole, had a \$245.5 million economic impact on the city, supporting more than 3,400 jobs and \$87 million in worker income. The numbers

for football alone (based on eight home games, plus the Spring Game) were \$44.8 million in spending outside the stadium, supporting \$14.8 million in wages.

Based on that study, each home football game sends an estimated \$260,000 in tax revenue to the city, Lincoln City Finance Director Brandon Kauffman said. That includes sales and gas tax, and other funds.

Apparently the only thing to cross the goal line in Lincoln this year was a heavily amended bill (LB1107) that creates a new property tax relief plan, enacts a new business-developing tax incentives program and provides a pledge of \$300 million in future state appropriations to help fund a proposed \$2.6 billion mega-project at the UNMC campus in Omaha. That project is built around the Medical Center's effort to win federal designation as the site for development of a new national

panic and all-hazard disaster response center to serve both civilian and military needs.

Property tax relief under the measure would begin with \$125 million in state funding rising to \$375 million in five years, all in addition to the \$275 million already provided through the state's property tax credit fund. Fiscal analysts have cautioned that the bill will wind up costing too much in the post-pandemic economy.

I would have given better odds to Nebraska winning a national championship than this bill passing. But, if the pandemic and its social distancing tax incentives program and quarantines have taught us anything, it's how to wait. I'm just waiting for the other shoe to drop.



**50 Years Ago - August 19, 1970, to August 25, 1970**

Remodeling of Community Hospital was nearing completion with patients on the third floor who moved to the second floor.

Former Falls City Rev. Dr. Rawley Myers, an instructor in philosophy, told Rotarians that the so-called generation gap was a reality, and probably always had been.

After two weeks of voting, Jerri Bucher continued to be the leader in the Richardson County Fair Queen's race.

The Rivoli Theatre was showing "A Boy Named Charlie Brown" and "King of the Grizzlies."

Movies at the Breezy Hill Drive-In were "Marooned," "The Kremlin Letter," "The Molly Maguires," "The Ballad of Cable Hogue," and "Once You Kiss a Stranger."

Jaycee of the Month awards were presented to Ron Keller for the Jaycees "Horseplay Days" float and to Dick Gilkerson, chairman of the Jaycees Horseplay Days bingo stand. Outstanding directors of the quarter were Keller and the Rev. James Hankins.

Classes were beginning August 31 at the Salem school.

Two high school-age Venezuelan boys were spending the week at the William Kopsky residence.

Dan C. Riley was celebrating 50 years as a rural mail carrier out of the Dawson Post Office.

Hank Schwartz, Neal Bachman, and Dallas Jones invited all interested persons to attend an organizational meeting to form a (Falls City) Tiger Booster Club.

The Journal listed the teachers for the 22 rural schools in Richardson County.

William Heiser, past state president of the Nebraska Elks, twice past exalted ruler of the local lodge, and a past district deputy grand exalted ruler conducted the complete initiation of his sons Robert and Roger fulfilling the roles of all six officers in the proceedings.

The City Housing Authority presented a check for \$1,676.95 to Mayor M.O. Armbruster, it's first in lieu of tax payment from the Eastview housing complex.

A deluge of rain forced cancellation of a Rulo Tractor Pull with two classes remaining to pull, but not before 1,200 showed up for a pull that attracted 64 entries.

Big Eight Co-Champion Nebraska had a potent backfield, including quarterbacks Jerry Tagge and Van Brownson and running backs Jeff Kinney, Joe Orduña, and Dan Schneis.

A total of 225 horses from 13 clubs were entered in the Dawson-Verdon Saddle clubs' annual horse show.

Honey Creek School was scheduled to begin classes on August 31.

Thirty-seven persons attended the 20-year reunion of the Falls City High Class of 1950.

Virgil Ankrum, Shubert, was elected commander of the local VFW post.

Paul Rieger and Dean Stevens of the Falls City FFA finished second and fifth respectively in a tractor driving contest at Wilbur.

**25 Years Ago - August 19, 1995, to August 25, 1995**

Thousands lined Harlan Street for the annual Cobblestone Festival Parade and big crowds greeted the Firemen's Fishing Contest, the Children's Theatre production of "Charlie and the Chocolate Factory," the flea market, and the Area Fellowship of Churches Vesper Service.

the county," Larry said. "Someone would call me at five a.m. and ask me to bale hay, and I'd be there by 5:30."

As a young man, he learned about life from his mom and dad, and some of his dad's buddies—people like Bill Schock and several of the Zimmermans.

He graduated from Falls City High School in 1964, worked at the Sherwin-Williams store downtown, and followed the job to a sales position in Kansas City. He rose through the ranks until he was a regional sales manager with national responsibilities.

"I led 128 sales directors from across the nation," he said. "In the early years, we didn't have cell phones or the internet or Zoom, so I traveled frequently. I loved every minute of it."

He spent his entire career with Sherwin-Williams, and retired in 2010, after 47 years.

"They were a good company to work for," he said. "I didn't need to look anywhere else."

After he retired, he needed to find something to fill his time. He had a neighbor who was active in the Church of the Nazarene, so he started repairing bikes for the kids in that congregation. Donors began delivering used bicycles to him and told him to repair the bikes and just give them away.

So that's exactly what he did. "One time, I had a grandfather approach me," Larry said. "He was raising his grandson, but had been laid off from his job, so he didn't have any money. When I gave his grandson a new bike, the boy smiled so widely that I'll never forget it. That's why I do this."

Repairing bikes was supposed to be a part-time gig, though—just something to keep him busy.

"I work full-time on it now, four or five days a week," he said, with a laugh. "I'm in my shop by six a.m., so I can work while it's cool."

Last year, he repaired and gave away 270 bikes. This year, he has already given away more than 70. And he has done it all without fanfare.

"I haven't really allowed people to use my name up to this

point," he said. "I haven't done this for the recognition. I've done it because I love to see the kids' faces light up. However, my brother, Jim, talked me into coming forward so that people would know where to donate their old bikes, or so they could donate money if they wanted to."

"Life has been very good to me and my wife and family," he said. "But bikes and parts can get pretty expensive. I generally spend about \$5,000 out of pocket per year, so I guess I'll accept the help if anybody ever wants to donate."

Susan Johnson said, "I hope people open their checkbooks and are as generous as Larry has been. The Sixpence program, which is part of the Falls City public school system, has been very blessed by his talents."

"The bikes aren't limited just to the Sixpence community either," she said. "Larry has also given bikes to needy children through the SENCA program. His generosity has made a difference in the lives of many children here."

"Two years ago, we had three brothers come in with their parents. The two older ones were going to get bikes, but the little one looked really disappointed, so I said, 'We'll take care of you, too.' You should've seen

the smile on his face."  
Larry knows exactly how that feels.

"I remember so vividly how I felt when I rode my new bike for the first time," he said. "I think every child deserves to feel that joy and that freedom."

If he has anything to do about it, every child in Falls City will. Susan Johnson called him "a quiet angel." Larry Cook is that, and more. He learned, through the school of hard knocks, that life can be tough and kids can be cruel. But he didn't shove his feelings into a shed and let his life decay. Instead, he built a successful career, and afterward, used a difficult experience from his childhood to create something good.

Too often, we let negative experiences overcome us and make us bitter. Larry took a tough memory and used it to make other people's lives better.

If we all did that, imagine how joyful and free we would be—just like little kids riding new bikes for the very first time.



## SACRED HEART IRISH FOOTBALL TEAM OUT FOR REDEMPTION

The Falls City Sacred Heart Irish football team fell one game short of the Class D2 championship game played at Memorial Stadium last fall. The Irish dropped the semi-final game at eventual champion Humphrey St. Francis 24-16.

It won't be an easy task for Head Coach Doug Goltz as he looks to

replace nine letter winners and three all-stars. However, never count a Goltz coached Irish team out. SH had made the playoffs all 33 years since Goltz took over the coaching reins. Overall, his record with the Irish stands at 318 wins against just 54 losses. Assisting Goltz will be Luke Santo, Brian Lemerond, Garrett Harring, Austin Ahern, and Cole

Fiene.

While the Irish lose nine lettermen, they return 11, with four returning starters on each side of the ball.

Senior Del Casteel, a three-year starter, will look to lead the Irish on the field. Casteel, a 6'0 195 lb. linebacker and running back was named all-state the last two seasons and is considered one of

the top players in Class D2. Joining Casteel are fellow seniors Kyle Bauman and Jack Fiegner. Bauman is a 6'1, 200 lb. lineman and Fiegner is a 6'2, 200 lb. linebacker and end. Also, back for the Irish are 6'3, 215 lb. lineman Brogan Nachtigal and 6'0, 155 lb. QB Jakob Jordan. Look for Tyler Catlin, Derek Schawang, Evan Keithley, and Jake

Froeschl to contribute for Coach Goltz as well.

"We return a solid group of starters, but we must replace a strong senior class, including three All-Staters," said Goltz. "We have a good mix of experience in our line plus skill players. Depth will need to be built."

Gone from last year are Branson Darveau, Jake Hoy, Sloan Lenard, Tyler Witt, Jamie Stice, and Jarrot Simon.

According to Goltz, there are a lot of good candidates to step up and make contributions this fall. As the season winds down, the Irish expect to be in the hunt, even with a more difficult schedule on the docket.

On offense, Jordan will return at QB, and Casteel will be the workhorse in the backfield. Look for Keithley and Catlin to give Casteel a rest once in a while. Fiegner and Froeschl will handle most of the tight end/receiver duties, and Nachtigal, Bauman, and Schawang will look to anchor the line.

On defense, it will again be Nachtigal, Bauman, and Schawang with Casteel and Fiegner providing help at the linebacker position. Jordan, Keithley, and Froeschl will be called upon to take over at defensive back. According to Goltz, the linebackers will be a strength, while the secondary will be all new players.

Nachtigal will again handle the kicker duties, and Keithley will staff the punter position.

The Irish will open the season against Nebraska City Lourdes on August 28 at Peru St. College. FCSH will also host BDS on September 11 and Johnson-Brock on September 25. Sacred Heart will host its first home contest on Friday, September 4, against Nebraska Lutheran at 2:30 in the afternoon. Also, back on the schedule is an old foe, HTRS. The Irish and Titans haven't met on the football field since 2007. The Irish will play in Humboldt on October 2.

By the time the season comes to an end, look for the Irish to be right in the mix of the post-season, shooting for the school's nine football State Title.

## LADY TIGERS EAGER TO HIT THE FIELD

The Falls City Tiger softball team feels like they have what it takes to make that next step and continue to build on last season. FC finished 13-14 last season, improving from 2-22 the year before.

Head Coach Joe Dunn enters his 19th year at the Tiger program's helm and will be joined by co-head coach Trista Hutchings this season. Also on the staff will be Haley Ruiz as a first-year assistant coach.

FC made significant gains last season, adding 11 more wins on the season than the year before. Coach Dunn has ten letter winners back in the mix and looks for them to finish even better than last year.

"We will have girls that put the ball in play," said Dunn. "Contact hitters and smart batters. We will have pitchers that throw strikes and make our opponents put the ball in play. We will be solid at most positions defensively."

The Tigers, competing in Class

C, will be looking to return to State for the first time since 2006. Accomplishing that won't be easy as Falls City looks to replace seniors Maggie McNeely, Hannah Clary, Josie Hollens, and Faith Zimmerman. The four seniors accounted for 73 of the teams 197 hits last season, 23 of the teams 56 stolen bases, and 55 RBI.

That being said, Falls City has its sights set on a winning season and the chance to compete for a district championship. The Lady Tigers return seven starters, with only one returning senior. Look for the youth of FC to bring some pep to the program.

Returning for Falls City is senior infielder Sara Black. Last season, Black batted .246 with 17 hits, seven RBI, and 17 runs scored. Also, back for FC is Courtney McClintock, a left fielder. McClintock batted .244 last season, with ten hits, eight RBI, and three walks. Pitcher/outfielder Elyse Poppe returns for her sophomore season. As a freshman, Poppe hit .350 with

28 base hits, 14 RBI, and had a 4.87 ERA over 60 1/3 innings on the rubber. Maddie Jones, the team's catcher, also returns for her second season. Last year, Jones hit .397 with 29 hits, including two home runs. Jones knocked in 19 runs on the season. Kacy Brewer, a pitcher and third baseman, had a successful freshman year, batting .309 with 25 hits and 23 runs batted in. Christina Gilkerson, a designated hitter and second baseman batted .304 last year with 14 hits

and 13 RBI. The final returning starter is Hannah Collier. Collier, a center fielder, played just five games last season, going 1-2 at the plate and scoring three runs.

As a team, the Tigers have 21 girls out, with only five of them seniors.

The Lady Tigers will begin the season at home on Thursday, August 20, when they host Nebraska City. The JV will play at 5:00, and the Varsity will have a 6:30 first pitch.

# The 1918 "flu" pandemic in Richardson County; Just keep your flu at home Don't peddle it around

 cally stamped out here, only six cases remaining at present. Only one death has resulted and this was caused by Bright's disease and the patient contracting the flu later. There are not many towns in the state that can show better conditions that exist here. These facts are true and can be verified at the office of the County Physician, Dr. C.L. Husted. People should not pay any attention to rumors and heresy, but should only give credence to articles signed either by the City Board of Health, of the county physician.

Furthermore, the county physician should publish the number of cases in the different towns and rural districts of the county, in all county papers each week. These reports would be authentic and would discredit all false rumors. Dated this, the 10th day of December 1918 at Humboldt, NE. Signed, H.C. Doran, Mayor; C.E. Novak, Doctor of Medicine; E.S. Cope, Albert Young, City Board of Health.

**Influenza a quarantinable disease**  
 On December 21, 1918, the Falls City Journal published a notice to its readers.

Influenza in the state of Nebraska has reached a state that must be met with the strictest measure known to health officers. From this date, influenza is a quarantinable disease.

All persons where quarantine is established must remain in; all exposed persons must remain with the sick until the quarantine is over.

**Public funerals discontinued**  
 It was reported in the Falls City Journal on December 23, 1918, on the terms of public funerals, quarantine and worry about out of state visitors.

First public funerals will be discontinued in all flu cases and exposed persons will only be permitted at the grave, providing they remain in their automobiles. Second-Quarantine five days after fever is normal. Third-The real problem confronting Falls City is the constant flow of people from Kansas who are scattering the disease. In Kansas, influenza is not quarantinable. Fourth-There will be an organized corps of nurses trained along practical lines to act under the instructions of the county board of health and to be sent to places in the opinion of the board of health they are most needed. Promiscuous nursing will not be permitted.

**School Board controversy**  
 At the end of the month, the Board of Health reported to the Falls City News of controversy and wanted the facts addressed.

The board of health of this City having had some controversy with the school board and their physician wish to make a statement of facts to the public: The board of health finds that the school failed to report influenza cases properly and that he refused to meet with the board of health on several different occasions when requested to do so.

We also find that he employed an office girl from a quarantined home of which he was the attending physician and that she was in his office from day to day until the board of health ordered her home. We also find that he allowed 30 to 40 children to congregate from 8:30 to 10 am in his office for examination and he did not appear until 9:45 am. For these reasons, the board of health asks the school board to have the city physician make the school examination, which the school board refused-they also refused to admit children to the schools who had health certificates from the city physician.

We took this matter up with the attorney general of this state and he informs us that the board of health is right and that we have full charge of all infectious and contagious diseases in this City and that the certificate of the city physician is final and he recommends that we commence action in court to enforce the rules and regulations of the board of health. All that we have ever asked from the school board or from their physician is service and since we have had this controversy, we would not ask better service than he has been giving the schools, and if this service continues, the board of health will not enter further complaint.

We wish to say further that this board has not tried to injure any physician or citizen but have been working for the best interests of all the City. Some people have said this was a doctor's fight and a few that it was a coal fight, all of which is too small for more than a mention. What we are working for is the cooperation of all the people to down this disease as quickly as possible and service is the only thing that will do the work. We have no friends to reward, no enemies to punish. However, we have made some enemies in our work, yet we have no apologies to offer.

**Are they criminals?**  
 As 1918 came to a close, the Falls City Journal asked if those who acted careless should be considered criminals. The Journal published this three-sentence article. People who run around from one flu nest to another are unwelcome visitors at The Journal office. Just keep your flu at home. Don't peddle it around.

In mid-December, 1918, 2,807 deaths were reported in Nebraska. A total released in February 1919, estimated by The Nebraska State Medical Journal, was to be between 25,000-30,000 deaths throughout the state, which is now known to be an extreme understatement.

"The year 1918 has gone: a year momentous as the termination of the most cruel war in the annals of the human race; a year which marked the end, at least for a time, of man's destruction of man; unfortunately a year in which developed a most fatal disease causing the death of hundreds of thousands of human beings. Medical science for four and one-half years devoted itself to putting men on the firing line and keeping them there. Now it must turn with its whole might to combating the greatest enemy of all - infectious diseases. In this battle, there must be no armistice; no peace without victory. Here's wishing every member of The Journal family continuous courage in the glorious struggle, with victory succeeding victory, and to all a Happy and Prosperous New Year." The Journal of the American Medical Association.

I was pleased that the Nebraska Legislature was finally able to pass LB153, providing a 50% income-tax exemption for veterans' retirement pay starting in 2022. Unfortunately, Iowa has provided 100% exemption of retirement pay since 2014. Missouri has exempted all military pension from income taxes since 2016, and military retirement pay is not subject to state tax in Kansas or Minnesota. Wyoming and South Dakota don't even have a state income tax. So, while this was a step in the right direction for Nebraska, we're only halfway there if we want to be competitive with neighboring states.

Other neighboring states - Iowa, Kansas and Missouri - offer things like the Homestead Tax Credits for disabled Veterans, Homestead Refund to rebate a portion of property taxes and Personal Property Tax Credit for disabled Veterans and Prisoners of War (POWs) - including both renters and homeowners.

Nebraska has a Homestead Exemption Program too, but it's restricted to only provide property tax relief for certain Veterans who among other things must be 100% disabled. And, Nebraska laws haven't been updated in over a decade and does not include America's longest serving armed conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan.

If we truly want to make Nebraska Veteran friendly then we have more work to do. We must adjust our tax laws to be more competitive with neighboring states. We have to work with our Nebraska Department of Tourism to help get the word out and encourage military Veterans to bring their families and visit our battlefields, military bases, historical forts, enjoy some good Nebraska beef and marvel at our natural beauty.

We also need to have future discussions about challenges of Veteran suicide, unemployment, homelessness and State Veteran Retirement Homes (Bellvue, Norfolk, Kearney, and Scottsbluff). I look forward to fighting for all Veterans in the Nebraska Legislature. 

Who needs some good news? Go ahead, raise your hands. I know, I know, we all do. Well, here is a little bit of good news. Our local high school sports teams are on the cusp of beginning the fall season, and so far, it looks like a go. Softball, volleyball, cross country, and football will soon begin playing competitively, and what a relief it will bring.

The NSAA has set forth a few guidelines to follow, and if that happens, we may be able to squeeze in some sports. First off, the NSAA has said teams must restrict attendance and have separate seating areas for both schools. Secondly, each team needs to have a different point of entry into the events with separate concession stands as well. Also, multiple bathrooms must be made available to keep the towns separated. The NSAA has also encouraged fans to wear masks. You may not like it, but if we want to see fall sports all the way through, masks will be an essential part of that. Finally, there must be thorough cleaning and disinfecting of frequently used areas. It has also been recommended that players, coaches, and fans have their temperatures checked before entering the venue. The NSAA has also eliminated the pre and post-game handshakes.

If all the guidelines can be met, and the student-athletes are not involved in large gatherings outside of school, the fall season can go off without a hitch. However, this process greatly depends on the athletes making the right choices on and off the playing field.

With all that being said, let's talk about college football. It was officially announced last week that the Big Ten was shutting down all fall sports. This really comes as no surprise. On Sunday morning, NCAA Chief Medical Officer Brian Hainline told CNN that "Right now, if testing stays as it is, there's no way we can go forward with sports." Something parents and fans need to realize is, the conferences and NCAA are trying to make decisions that will keep kids safe. You may disagree with it, but safety really should be the biggest issue, and if they conclude that it cannot be done safely, then respect the decision and begin training for next season.

In a press conference last week, Coach Scott Frost stated that Nebraska would be looking to play football, basically regardless of what the Big Ten said. Everyone got fired up about his comments but then soon realized he has no control over that. It was a great soundbite, and it shows he will go to bat for his kids, but that's about as far as that goes. We have a good thing in the Big Ten, and trust me; there is zero chance we go back to the Big 12. Highly likely, the Big 12 wouldn't even want us back. Not to mention we have to give the Big ten a buyout, take a substantial cut in revenue, all to play in a conference that probably won't have a season anyway. Just because the ACC, SEC, and Big 12 haven't canceled the season yet, doesn't mean it won't happen eventually.

For now, enjoy the fact that we currently have a high school sports season. Get out and support your local teams, safely and socially distanced from others. Show the young athletes that you are behind them and show leadership by abiding by the NSAA and school recommendations. It's an excellent opportunity for our small town to step up, support our kids, and be proactive against the spread of COVID-19.

### Are you eligible for this COVID-19 study?

(StatePoint) A new COVID-19 study is currently enrolling patients, and researchers believe it has the potential to change the course of the virus around the world.

The study is examining the effects of Colchicine, a widely available and inexpensive anti-inflammatory drug on one of the most common, and most debilitating side effects of SARS-CoV-2—acute respiratory distress syndrome (ARDS).

ARDS is caused by an intense inflammatory response that results in what's called a cytokine storm. Cytokines are molecules that signal to inflammatory cells that there's a problem within the body that needs their attention. Any normal immune response involves cytokines. In a cytokine storm however, they're released in larger numbers than necessary, resulting in an immune response out of proportion to the threat at hand, whereby immune cells attack healthy tissues.

Cytokine storms in COVID-19 are common and potentially do more damage than the virus itself, causing some patients to develop pneumonia or ARDS, which are life-threatening lung conditions. Many such patients require admission to ICU wards to be provided with respiratory support via mechanical ventilation.

One research team believes they may have the solution, however. Dr. Jean-Claude Tardif, director of the Research Centre at Montreal Heart Institute, professor of medicine at the University of Montreal, and primary investigator of the study, believes that these cytokine storms seen in COVID-19 patients are manufactured by a tiny inflammatory cell part, or organelle, called inflammasome. Colchicine, targets that one tiny organelle.

"More than 10 years ago, it was shown that the most closely related virus to SARS-CoV-2, which causes COVID-19, is Sars-CoV-1. That's the virus that caused SARS caused 15 years ago," says Dr. Tardif. "It's very close to SARS CoV-2 and it was shown in this very elegant paper that SARS CoV-1 directly activates inflammasome." Dr. Tardif and his team are currently enrolling patients with a positive COVID-19 diagnosis for a Colchicine study. If his hypothesis is correct, it could change the way COVID-19 is treated globally. Colchicine is a widely available, inexpensive drug that has already been in use for years in the treatment of conditions like gout, familial Mediterranean fever (FMF) and viral pericarditis. The side effect profile is well-known and side effects are rare.



### FCHS CROSS COUNTRY TEAM READY TO NAVIGATE THE COURSE

As the start of the high school cross country season draws near, Coach Cody Hawley has a high number of kids out and ready to compete. The high school team boasts eight girls and 13 boys, while the middle school team has 12 competitors. For the first time in 40 years, the team will have the opportunity to compete in a conference as the Tigers were accepted into the East Central Nebraska Conference last spring. Senior Jared Hawley, a returning state meet competitor, and senior Eli Bottom, will lead the boy's team. Last season, Hawley finished 41st at the State Meet in Kearney, running the challenging course in 18:02. Hawley qualified for Kearney by finishing fifth at the C-1 district meet held at Boys Town. FC has five seniors on this year's team, including Hawley, Bottom, Will Vitosh, Brock Hogue, and Riley Kobza. Juniors include Raymond Feek, Pressler Bruxellas, and Carson Bredemeier. Joe Vrtiska, Bryson Butrick, and Kyle Daake make up the sophomore class, and newcomers include

Alex McKim and Ira Adams. Brenna Leyden will lead the Lady Tigers team. The senior will be looking to make the State meet for the first time. According to Coach Hawley, Leyden had a strong summer offseason and will compete very well this fall. Gone is a four-time State qualifier Mazey McCullough, who finished 44th in Kearney last October. Joining Leyden will be juniors Nia Crawford and Emmy Lu Feek. Arienna Hayes is the only sophomore, and Ava Armbruster, Ella Kobza, Mikaela Hawley, and Elianna Bruxellas make up the freshman class. "Jared is a returning state qualifier, and Eli will be a force this fall," said Hawley. "The next four runners will be running as a tight group and hope to finish every meet in close proximity to each other. There will be a competition each week to see who runs Varsity. They can achieve high team places at every meet if they can achieve this goal." The girls will make a lot of noise this fall as well. "They should be a fun group to watch in the team standing too," said Coach Hawley. "This group has

been very self-motivated in the offseason and shares the same goal of getting to Kearney. I feel this has the potential to be the highest achieving group in my tenure." Coach Hawley enters his 21st season coaching the Tigers cross country team. Joining him for her fifth year as an assistant is Amanda Merz. Hawley praised Merz as a considerable asset to the team's overall success. It will take a lot of hard work and self-accountability, but both the boys and girls have good qualifying shots as a team for the State Meet. Falls City on Thursday, October 8, at 4:30 p.m. The Class C-1 district meet will take place on Thursday, October 15, and the State Meet in Kearney will be held on Friday, October 23.
