The Richardson County Board of Commissioners met at 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, March 23, 2021.

The motion was made by Sickel to approve the minutes of the March 16, 2021. Motion was made by Sickel to approve the agenda as posted and seconded by Karas. The agenda is posted at the Richardson County Courthouse in the First Floor Lobby, the Lower Level Lobby and on the Commissioner's Meeting Room door on the 2nd Floor and the Richardson County website www.co.richardson.ne.us. Commissioner Caverzagie arrived at 9:15 a.m.

Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau reported on maintenance done on county roads and bridges. The Board approved

the request to solicit sealed bids to be received by 9:30 a.m. on April 13, 2021, to purchase culvert materials. Darveau reported that he would be obtaining informal quotes to buy equipment and tires for the Road Department.

Commissioner Sickel excused himself from the meeting at 9:20 a.m.

The Board was updated on business at the Sheriff's Department and Jail. A used light bar will be transferred by the Department to the Stella Rural Fire Department and has been determined to be surplus equipment with a value of approximately \$50.00.

The regular meeting went into recess. The Board went into executive session at 9:30 a.m. with

HERBSTER ANGUS FARMS AND TD ANGUS AT RISHEL RANCH CLOSE LARGEST TRANSACTION IN STATE HISTORY BETWEEN NEBRASKA-BASED

PUREBRED CATTLE BREEDERS

Herbster Angus Farms Owner, Charles W. Herbster has announced the record-setting purchase of T/D Doc Ryan 049. At \$525,000, Doc Ryan is the highest-valued bull to sell between Nebraska-based pure-


bred cattle breeders in state history. Herbster purchased Doc Ryan at the T/D Angus Sale in North Platte, Nebraska, on Friday March 19, 2021.

In 2016, Herbster purchased a purebred Simmental bull, TJ High Calibre 556B, for \$400,000 from Apex Cattle Company, Dannebrog, Nebraska, and Hartman Cattle Company, Tecumseh, Nebraska. He is now the owner of the top two high-selling, Nebraska-bred major beef breed bulls that sold from a Nebraska beef breeder to a Nebraska beef breeder.

"Doc Ryan is the most exciting out cross calving ease bull we have found in a very long time, and we can't wait to inject those genetics into our program," said Herbster. "It's always a pleasure to do business with fellow Nebraskans like Trey and Dayna Wasserburger and Bill and Barb Rishel. My heart is in Nebraska, and I love supporting businesses in our great state."

Mr. Rishel is a long-time Nebraska Angus Breeder who started the herd of cows that produced Doc Ryan. He sold his entire operation—all the way down to the pitch forks—to a

MAZE BROTHERS THRILL WITH FIRST FEATURE FILM

Most filmmakers spend their entire careers working toward the dream of seeing their hard work creating a feature film end on a big screen, only to never see it come to fruition.

On Saturday, March 13, Falls City natives Brent and Derek Maze, along with a theater full of family, friends and fans, saw that dream become a reality.

La Flamme Rouge marked the directorial debut of the Maze Brothers and made it's world premiere at the 16th Annual Omaha Film Festival.

Brent Maze is no stranger to the Omaha Film Festival. In 2015 while a junior Film and New Media Major at the University of Nebraska's Johnny Carson School of Theatre and Film, Maze's "neon-noir suspense thriller," *Ambulance*, was an Official Selection of the Omaha Film Festival.

Ambulance was shot almost entirely at night, in the alley between 18th and 19th and Harlan and Stone Streets over a weekend in June 2014. The story

During the Community Medical Center Joint Communication meeting held on Monday, March 22, Grant Brueggemann of the Southeast District Health Department reported 205 new cases of COVID in the district in the past 30 days, resulting in a downward trend.

Brueggemann said 16.5 percent of the entire population of District One has now been vaccinated.

Linda Santo reported for City Administrator Gary Jorn that Falls City parks will be opening restrooms the first week of April and there will be no restrictions for Softball and Baseball, but

The following year Brent returned to Falls City, a senior at UNL, to hold a film fundraiser to fund his latest project, at the Falls City Country Club (now Classic Club 8).

Five of his short films were shown, including:

Infinite, where a series of visits to his psychiatrist, a young man finds his way to the roots of a mysterious recurring dream but discovers much more than he bargained for;

The Shed of Our Skin, an exhausted detective, turns to a colleague for information in an attempt to finally get one step ahead of a sociopath he has been hunting for years;

Identity of Another, this heavily stylized neo-noir short film, examines the frantic yet suspenseful aftermath of a young criminal's most recent hit. Through a turn of events, he is forced into impersonating the man he just

disposed of; *Ambulance* and, *Kale and Marco Witness a Murder*, in this short comedy, two young stoners accidentally become witnesses to a brutal murder. However, after being paid off by the killer with a briefcase full of cash, they have a difficult decision ahead of them.

Maze was looking for financial help for *Faces and Stones*; A man must insert himself into a cult organization for the woman he loves, which he had hoped to start shooting the following month.

Brothers Derek and Brent Maze, graduates of Falls City High School and the renowned Johnny Carson School of Theater and Film and College of Journalism and Mass Communications at UNL, went on to work mainly in the music video world, winning awards for their cinematography. Still, they decided they wanted to make a move into features.

"We were like, what film do we want to make? So we decided to turn this short into a feature," said Brent.

What had started as a short

50-25-15 Years Ago

50 Years Ago - March 31, 1970, to April 6, 1971

An audit of the Bank of Salem was completed, the bank was declared insolvent and its President, John Allee, Falls City, was charged with three counts of embezzlement involving theft of \$39,000. The State Banking Director declared that the bank should be liquidated in receivership. All accounts were insured up to \$20,000 each by the FDIC.

An initial layer of Gunit concrete began forming the floor and sides of the currently under construction Falls City Country Club Pool.

Army Capt. Charles R. "Chick" James, Jr., 25, was awarded the Bronze Star for meritorious service connected with military operations against hostile forces in Vietnam.

A-frame home that had been owned by the late Mrs. Georgia Roberts, Rulo, and an unoccupied house on the Madge Whitten farm south of Salem both burned down.

Visiting Auburn won the Tiger track team's home opener 82-50. Among the better performances by the home team was a long jump of 20-13 1/4 by Charlie Maze, Dan Werner's 2:10.5 half-mile, Brad Faller's quarter-mile in :56.0, and the Tigers 3 top finishers in the 440.

"Aristocats" was finishing its run at the Rivoli, followed by Barbra Streisand in "Hello Dolly!"

Breezy Hill Drive-In showed "True Grit" and "The Sons of Katie Elder" during their season-opening week.

A petition campaign to merge the Rulo school district with Falls City was meeting with success. Rulo had 73 pupils in eight grades.

Ray Shanks, Stella, was named a delegate to Cornhusker Boys State and Glenda Morehead, Shubert, was named a delegate to Girls State.

Among those named to the Galaxy Conference, All-Conference Basketball second team was Ray Shanks of Southeast and Rich Witt of Sacred Heart. Hiawatha won a golf dual with the Tigers at Falls City Country Club by a single stroke 146 to 147. Turning in the best round for Falls City was Chuck Smith with a 48.

500 budding musicians took part in a Galaxy Conference band clinic at Southeast Consolidated School.

Les Dodds retired from the *Journal* this week after having worked for 51 years in the newspaper business. His son, Ron, continues to work at the *Journal*, where he began working in high school.

Eleven FCHS Science Fair entries advanced to the Eastern Nebraska Science Fair. Winning top recognition was Tim Woods.

James Crooker, Humboldt, was the new Exalted Ruler of the Falls City Elks Lodge.

Carol Weinert won first place in the 8th-grade division and Douglas Young was third in the 6th-grade division of a Daughters of the American Revolution essay contest.

An Omaha truck driver was killed when the truck he was driving west on Highway 73 left the highway a half-mile east of Verdon, overturned in a pasture on the Dale Heineman farm and burst into flames.

County Attorney Henry F. Schepman was sending out letters to property owners with delinquent property taxes advising them of impending foreclosures.

A *Journal* photo showed Mrs. Jim Davidson demonstrating the *Journal*'s perforator machine to members of her Blue Bird group.

Vern Prater, Humboldt, was chosen to represent the Humboldt American Legion at Boys State.

Jess Willis of the Falls City Toastmasters was the winner of an Area II speech contest hosted by the local club.

The Peru State track meet attracted 9 boys teams in Class A and 27 in Class B. Girls participated for the first time, with 25 teams entered. Winning boys teams were Nebraska City in Class A and Highland in Class B. The winning girls team was Fremont-Mills.

In a singles handicap tournament for boys and girls in junior bowling leagues at Center Lanes, the top scores were in Major boys Tom Steinhauer, 1060; Junior Girls Kathy Hoy, 1,187; Junior Boys Jerry McKim, 1,241; In Prep Girls Kathy Schawang, 601; and in Prep Boys Gary Kratz, 605.

The City Council approved a contract for the resurfacing of E. 14th and W. 21st Streets.

The Legislature gave overwhelming first-round approval to funding for a new NU field house requested by Husker Coach Bob Devaney.

25 Years Ago - March 31, 1996, to April 5, 1996

UMB Card Center began operations in the lower level of First Federal Lincoln Bank building, Falls City.

The Falls City Police Department's dispatch area was reorganized to improve efficiency.

Highway 159 was under construction and in response to complaints about the safety of the detour east on 21 street and over the "Dustless" highway, County Commissioners had flashing lights put on stop ahead signs to warn motorists of changes.

An ordinance to merge the offices of city clerk/treasurer and to separate the position of city administrator produced a 4-4 tie vote of the city council and Mayor Bill Farmer cast a nay vote to break the tie.

Movies at River Twin Cinema included "All Dogs Go to Heaven 2", "Executive Decision," and "Ed."

Tiger golfers Pat McInister and Michael Hillyard combined to finish 4th in the two-man competition of a five-team invitational at Hiawatha.

A dramatization of the crucifixion of Christ entitled "Messiah Inquest" was presented at the Good News Assembly of God Church.

Representatives of the Army Corps of Engineers told those at a public meeting at Camp Rulo that "conditions pointed to high releases out of the (Missouri River) dams."

Steve Kottich was elected President of the Richardson Foundation.

The Falls City Volunteer Ambulance Squad member recognized in the *Journal* this week was Don Hogue.

The Game & Parks Commission announced plans to replace a dike and outlet structure at Verdon Lake State Recreation Area.

Eric Nelson, Falls City, was honored as a Chancellor's Scholar for maintaining a perfect 4.0-grade point average throughout his collegiate career.

Michal Scholz, FCHS, took first place in the high jump at the Nebraska City Invite, with a leap of 5-0 and Vicki Pethoud won the 300 meter low hurdles with a time of :52.6.

Winning a first for the FCHS boys at Nebraska City was jumper Ben Hullman by going 5-9.

Syd Merz won three of six gold medals captured by the First Place Lady Irish at the Nemaha Valley Invite, winning the 200 in :26.8 and the 400 in :63.7, and by teaming up with Katie McGinnis, Randee Sopoci, and Jamie Sopoci to run a 53 second 400.

The Sacred Heart boys finished second at Nemaha Valley. Brett Burenheide won both the discus and shotput, Eric Marx took first in the mile in 4:56.9, and Luke Taft and Zac Slominski tied for first in the pole vault, going 11-0.

15 Years Ago - March 31, 2006, to April 5, 2006

Nebraska Gov. Dave Heineman was rising in the polls when he made a campaign stop in Falls City in pursuit of the Republican nomination for Governor with Rep. Tom Osborne as his opponent.

Restoration of Candlelight Cabin was nearly complete when straight-line winds ripped off its new roof, damage that was repaired under city insurance.

The City Council voted to approve two ordinances that officially put EDGE in charge of city economic development.

Funds raised by the Richardson County Cancer Fund topped \$24,000.

The Census Bureau reported that Richardson County's population dipped from 9,531 in 2000 to 8,732 as of July 2005.

The Tiger golf team finished second, 7 strokes behind the winning team from Nebraska City at the Auburn Golf Invitational. Falls City's Mitch Liberty fired a 79 and then won a playoff to claim medalist honors.

Stella native Dave Niedfeldt, a farm broadcaster for KWBE, Beatrice, won a Dairy Council of Nebraska Leadership in Nutrition Communication award.

Mark Walker, Falls City, was the winner of \$500 in cash from KTNC Radio in its bingo-style "Radio" game.

Sheriff Hardesty and Deputy Merwin to discuss personnel matters and prevent needless injury to the reputation of an individual. Commissioner Sickel returned to the meeting at 10:15 a.m.

Commissioner Caverzagie made the motion to adopt Resolution 2020-2021-36, authorizing SENCA to make application for the acquisition of a new transit vehicle for the Richardson County Transit. Motion carried. (Resolution Book 25, Page 108)

The Board approved the purchase order totaling \$3,138.54 to install new flooring for the Emergency Management Agency as requested by Brian Kirkendall, EMA Director.

Caverzagie made motion to approve a change order in the amount of \$1,774.00 with General Excavating of Lincoln, NE, to remove the fuel storage tank at the Courthouse. The tank was larger than specified in the original bid and requiring more excavation and time. The motion carried.

Representatives from the City of Falls City, including Mayor Bindle; City Clerk, Gary Jorn; Chief of Police, Duane Armbruster; Councilman, Don Ferguson and Asst Police Chief, Jamie Baker, presented a proposal as an Interlocal Cooperative Agreement to be considered by the County Board regarding the 911 Emergency Dispatch Services with Richardson County and the City of Falls City. No action was taken.

The Board conducted interviews to fill the vacancy of the County Assessor position. Interviews were held with Kim Riggs of Falls City and Jodi Spencer of Cozad, NE. Commissioner Caverzagie made a motion to appoint Kim Riggs as the new County Assessor after the interviews were held.

Riggs was appointed and sworn in on the morning of March 24, 2021, by Cassandra R. Buethe, Clerk of the County Court, to fulfill the term of office that expires on January 4, 2023. Motion seconded by Karas.

Riggs will fulfill the term of former County Assessor Pam Vice, who passed away on February 18, 2021. Vice had served as County Assessor since May 1, 2012.

Commissioner Karas approved a sub-division for Lindon L and Sarah J. Volker in S6, T2, R13 and adopt Resolution 2020-2021-37. Motion carried. (Resolution Book 25, Page 109/)

Commissioner Caverzagie made a motion to allow the payment of all claims submitted. Motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:05 p.m. Motion carried.

The Board will meet again on Tuesday, March 30, 2021, at 9:00 a.m. in the Commissioner's Meeting Room, Courthouse, Falls City, NE. The agenda is kept current at the County Clerk's Office.



Nebraska to implement Family First Prevention Services Act

The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) is pleased to announce the federal approval of its Family First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA) plan. Implementing FFPSA will allow the state to focus on child welfare programming vital to prevention, while establishing and enhancing crucial partnerships with agencies and institutions in Nebraska and across the nation. DHHS will be working with agencies such as Chapin Hall at the University of Chicago, Nebraska Children and Families Foundation and more to analyze how to better assist children and families at risk of entering the foster care system.

This transformational law supports the establishment of evidence-based programming for children and families. The focus of FFPSA is on family preservation, safely reducing entry into the foster care system, reducing the re-entry rate into the child welfare system, and decreasing generational involvement of families in child welfare.

Historically, child welfare programs across the United States focused on treatment for children and families once the families entered the child welfare system, with limited attention to the use of best practices to prevent foster care placement. FFPSA provides added sustainability to programs that work to safely reduce out-of-home placements for children and increase family preservation.

Children and Family Services

With the implementation of FFPSA, the State will have even more tools to provide for the wellbeing of children and families in Nebraska. I am excited to see the results of more robust prevention services in Nebraska," Beasley said.

Nebraska is dedicated to implementing a full array of prevention services that effectively address the needs of children and families in the areas of mental health, substance use and parenting skills. To inform the development of a full continuum of prevention services and to ensure success in the implementation of FFPSA, the State has partnered with Chapin Hall to better understand the landscape of services in Nebraska, what programs are being provided, and what programs are needed and in what geographical regions of the State. This analysis will also identify prevention programming and the potential of expanding the CFS provider network. Additional partnerships include collaboration with internal and external stakeholders to better inform the needs of Nebraska families.

More information regarding the implementation of FFPSA in Nebraska will be provided in the future.



Early season weed control important for crops, pastures and lawns

The winter of 2021 was much more challenging than 2020, with record snowfalls and cold temperatures, especially in February. Spring is officially here, temperatures are warming up and weeds are beginning to grow. If fields were not sprayed last fall for control of winter annuals or cover crops planted, the recent rains last earlier this month will provide ideal growing conditions for weeds. Keep an eye out for weeds beginning to grow in your crop fields. Weed control will be extremely important this spring, especially where there were previous issues with marestail or other winter annuals. Cover crops, especially cereal rye has been an excellent strategy for suppression of marestail. It is important to control marestail early this spring, prior to the plant bolting (shooting a stem). It will really be challenging controlling marestail if it bolts and is glyphosate-resistant, which the majority of it is. Check the 2021 University of Nebraska Weed Management Guide for best herbicides to use for control with your weed problems. In pastures, if you were not able to control weeds last fall, check your pastures for musk thistle. As temperatures warm up, musk thistles will begin to grow and you will be able to spray your pastures. The early season treatment of musk thistles in particular is critical for effective control. Musk thistle is a noxious weed in Nebraska, meaning it is unlawful to let it grow on your property without attempting to

control it. The best time for controlling musk thistle is when it is just starting to grow, in the rosette stage. Once thistles start to bolt or shoot up a stem or stalk, it is much more difficult to control them. There are several herbicides that work well on musk thistle and other pasture weeds, such as: 2,4-D ester, 2,4-D ester plus Banvel, Grazon P & D, Ally, Transline, Redeem R&P and Overdrive. Another weed we have had issues with the past few years in southeast Nebraska is poison hemlock. I just saw some poison hemlock growing in the rosette stage this past week. I have not seen too much of it yet, but it is key to controlling this weed as it can cause livestock deaths. Finally some of us may have weeds in our lawns or around our yards. Most of these are just getting started to grow or have not yet germinated. You have time to control these weeds now and in the next few weeks for the warm-season weeds. that will be subject to change.

Santo stressed that it is important with nicer weather and people out and about gathering in groups, its important for people to protect themselves and others. Wear a mask, maintain six feet of distance and avoid crowds in poorly ventilated areas. Continue to follow health measures to keep everyone safe.

Santo also stated that CMC planned to give over 400 vaccinations last week.

If you have not signed up to receive the vaccine, you can at vaccinate.ne.gov/; <https://vaccinate.ne.gov/en-US/>

As of March 22, Nebraska is now in Phase 2, which includes the 50+ population. Those born in 1971 or before are now eligible for the vaccine.

On Friday, March 26, 2021, The Southeast District Health Department reported 764 confirmed cases in Richardson County, with 22 confirmed deaths, up from 758 cases and 22 deaths the week prior.

The District as a whole reported 3,777 confirmed cases and 58 deaths, up from 3,758 and 58 deaths the week prior. There were 235 cases, four deaths in Pawnee County, 754 confirmed cases, 12 deaths in Nemaha County; 643 confirmed cases, nine deaths in Johnson County; and 1,381 confirmed cases and 11 deaths in Otoe County.

Protect yourself from COVID-19 scams. These are signs of potential scams.

You are asked to pay out of pocket to get the vaccine. You are asked to pay to put your name on a vaccine waiting list or to get early access. Advertisements for vaccines through social media platforms, email, telephone calls, online, or from unsolicited/unknown sources. Marketers offering to sell or ship doses of the vaccine for payment. Protect yourself and don't give your personal information to unknown sources. If you think you've been the victim of a COVID-19 scam or fraud, report it to: 1-800-HHS-TIPS or tips.hhs.gov/; 1-800-medicare; 1-800-CALL-FBI.

Important information about vaccine appointments: What if I can't make it to my scheduled appointment for my COVID-19 vaccine, either the first or second dose?

Once an appointment is scheduled, a dose is dedicated to you for that day/time. It is important to contact the location that scheduled the appointment directly to notify and to try to reschedule, if feasible. Making this effort provides the facility an opportunity to fill your spot that day with another individual waiting to receive their first or second dose. By simply becoming a "no-show" for an appointment, you run the risk of forcing that organization to waste the dose from a multi-dose vial that cannot be used up in time.

If you've been fully vaccinated: You can gather indoors with fully vaccinated people without wearing a mask.

You can gather indoors with

unvaccinated people from one other household (for example, visiting with relatives who all live together) without masks, unless any of those people or anyone they live with has an increased risk for severe illness from COVID-19.

If you've been around someone who has COVID-19, you do not need to stay away from others or get tested unless you have symptoms.

However, if you live in a group setting (like a correctional or detention facility or group home) and are around someone who has COVID-19, you should still stay away from others for 14 days and get tested, even if you don't have symptoms.

What Hasn't Changed

For now, if you've been fully vaccinated: You should still take steps to protect yourself and others in many situations, like wearing a mask, staying at least 6 feet apart from others, and avoiding crowds and poorly ventilated spaces. Take these precautions whenever you are:

In public: Gathering with unvaccinated people from more than one other household

Visiting with an unvaccinated person who is at increased risk of severe illness or death from COVID-19 or who lives with a person at increased risk

You should still avoid medium or large-sized gatherings.

You should still delay domestic and international travel. If you do travel, you'll still need to follow CDC requirements and recommendations.

You should still watch out for symptoms of COVID-19, especially if you've been around someone who is sick. If you have symptoms of COVID-19, you should get tested and stay home and away from others.

You will still need to follow guidance at your workplace.

What We Know and What We're Still Learning: We know that COVID-19 vaccines are effective at preventing COVID-19 disease, especially severe illness and death.

We're still learning how effective the vaccines are against variants of the virus that causes COVID-19. Early data show the vaccines may work against some variants but could be less effective against others.

We know that other prevention steps help stop the spread of COVID-19, and that these steps are still important, even as vaccines are being distributed.

We're still learning how well COVID-19 vaccines keep people from spreading the disease.

Early data show that the vaccines may help keep people from spreading COVID-19, but we are learning more as more people get vaccinated.

We're still learning how long COVID-19 vaccines can protect people.

As we know more, CDC will continue to update our recommendations for both vaccinated and unvaccinated people.

Until we know more about those questions, everyone — even people who've had their vaccines — should continue taking basic prevention steps when recommended.

Stay safe when
working in the
yard this spring
and summer

A day spent working in the yard is an ideal way to pass the time on spring and summer afternoons. A pristine landscape can add value to a property and instill pride in homeowners who put a lot of thought and effort into their lawns and gardens.

A sun-soaked day can make it easy to overlook potential threats when working in a lawn or garden. But safety precautions are of the utmost necessity when working in the yard, where the risk for serious injury is considerable. For example, the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons reports that, in 2016, more than 90,000 patients, including nearly 5,000 children, were treated in hospital emergency rooms for lawn mower-related injuries.

Lawn- and garden-related injuries can be prevented without going to great lengths.

- Know your terrain before mowing. Knowing the terrain in your own yard can reduce the risk for accident or injury. This can be especially important when mowing the lawn with a riding mower. Adhere to manufacturers' recommendations regarding inclines to reduce tip-over accidents that can pin riders beneath the mower. Study hilly areas of the yard prior to mowing so you know which areas are safe to mow with a riding mower and which areas are best mowed with a walk-behind mower. For greater control when using a walk-behind mower on an incline, mow parallel to the slope.
 - Apply and reapply sunscreen. Sunburns may not require trips to the emergency room, but they can still be serious. In fact, the Skin Cancer Foundation notes that sunburn is a leading cause in the majority of cases of basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma and melanoma, which is the deadliest form of skin cancer. The SCF recommends applying sunscreen 30 minutes before going outside to allow the sunscreen to bond to your skin. Re-apply sunscreen at least every two hours, and more often if you're sweating excessively. The SCF recommends broad spectrum sunscreens, which protect the skin from both UVA and UVB rays. Though a product with a sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 15 is acceptable when walking the dog or driving to work, the SCF advises using a product with an SPF of 30 or higher when engaging in extended outdoor activities like gardening or mowing.

- Employ the buddy system. Use the buddy system when pruning tall trees or performing any tasks that require a ladder. The Orthopedic Institute of Pennsylvania reports that more than 164,000 people are injured each year falling off a ladder. Ask a significant other or neighbor to hold the ladder in place while you climb up to reduce your risk of falling. If cutting large branches, cut them piecemeal to reduce the risk of being injured by heavy falling branches.

- Inspect the property for insect hives. The OIP notes that the most common insect stings in spring come from bees, wasps and hornets. Homeowners who are not careful can inadvertently come across hives when doing spring cleanup, making them vulnerable to bites and stings. That can be very dangerous for anyone, and especially so for people with a history of allergic reactions to insect bites or stings. Inspect areas where you'll be working to make sure insects haven't put down roots in your property. If you discover any hives and are hesitant to remove them on your own, contact a local landscaping firm.

Lawn and garden accidents and injuries can be serious. Thankfully, accidents and injuries are easily prevented when homeowners take a few simple safety precautions while tending to their lawns and gardens.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. Source Water Assessment Availability:

The Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality (NDEQ) has completed the Source Water Assessment. Included in the assessment are a Wellhead Protection Area map, potential contaminant source inventory, and source water protection information. In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Sources of Drinking Water:

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and groundwater wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up

substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

The source of water used by City Of Falls City is ground water.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- * Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- * Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- * Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses.
- * Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.
- * Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking Water Health Notes:

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants who are particularly at risk from infections. Nebraska Association works to improve Broadband by closing the digital divide

The Nebraska Regional Officials Council (NROC) announces the launch of a statewide broadband mapping initiative. Every Nebraskan is encouraged to partake in the one-minute speed test from any internet-enabled device, including cell phones. Speed data will provide decision makers a better understanding of where internet accessibility is limited or not available, and where speeds are not meeting the needs of today's users.

The purpose of this initiative is to bridge the digital divide between urban and rural areas. The captured information will provide statistically sound data that can be used by communities, counties, and key stakeholders as they plan for broadband infrastructure expansion or enhancement projects. "Results from this study will give local and state officials a better understanding of where underserved and unserved Nebraska residents are," NROC's President CJ Poltack noted. "Furthermore, it will allow the state to align with Governor Rickett's legislative priority of improving broadband services for the entire state."

Individuals are encouraged to take the free test at <https://www.speedtestne.org>. Participation by everyone is essential and no personal information will be collected. Repeated speed tests by the same users are encouraged during the two-year initiative in order to better capture variations in internet speeds and collect more statistically valid data.

The COVID-19 pandemic has exposed the need for broadband accessibility with students' remote learning and employees working from home. NROC's initiative will explore how these demands are affecting current providers' speeds and find gaps in service.

"I would like to encourage Nebraskans to participate in this initiative," said Ed Toner, CIO for the State of Nebraska and Chair of the Rural Broadband Task Force. "Speed test data can help identify areas which lack broadband so strategies and funding to connect these areas can be identified."

Collected data will provide the most comprehensive, validated, real-time reporting of actual upload and download speeds recorded in the state. The study will be conducted by GEO Partners, LLC – an independent data collection firm with extensive expertise, and not affiliated with any internet service providers (ISPs).

This project is funded through a U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) CARES grant specifically to address recovery and resiliency efforts for all affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.
