JOAN ZOELLER PRESENTED 2021 HERITAGE HERO AWARD FROM HISTORY NEBRASKA

Friday, July 16, the Richardson County Historical Society Board of Directors hosted a reception at the Museum to thank its volunteers. Joan Zoeller was presented a 2021 Heritage Hero Award from History Nebraska, formerly the Nebraska State Historical Society.

Katherine Endacott, a History Nebraska Board of Trustee, presented her with a Certificate of Appreciation and pin. She read from the nomination letter submitted last November.

"Living on the NE-KS State Line near Preston, Joan is a fourth-generation resident of the county. She joined the Richardson County Historical Society in 1989. She holds a lifetime membership, has been a board member, served a term as its president, and has shown her love of history as a volunteer and financial supporter for decades. She and her husband, Kenneth, now deceased, worked during the move of museum artifacts into their permanent home in 2003 and

donated many restored items, including a tall wood-burning stove from a church. One day each week, she has served as a tour guide/docent. When the Museum was closed during 2020, she could be counted on to give tours to drop-in and appointment visitors. Many benefit from the knowledge of county history that she shares with enthusiasm. One afternoon each week during the closure, she and another volunteer, Jan Deckinger, worked in the three museum buildings cleaning, organizing, creating and revamping displays.

Many paintings and portraits were mounted on the upstairs walls, quilts displayed in their new room, showcases updated, and the 1920s basement kitchen has a new brighter look under Joan's guidance. In the Ag 1 Building, this farm wife worked on displays of feed sacks, tools, canning supplies, a rural school center, and many other artifacts. She envisions an improvement and makes it happen either by her own hands or by recruiting others to help. She repaired numerous antique books, atlases, and toys. She organized and indexed scrapbooks and repainted picture frames for the Museum at her farm home.

Joan has written several short historical books, including "The Farmstead Act in Richardson County 1934-1943" and a history of her church. She has given presentations to groups. Six of her eight ancestral lines that settled in the county were from the same village in Germany to which she and Kenneth once traveled for research. From that and other research, she has written four-family genealogical histories. Supporting her enthusiasm and contributions to Richardson County history are her son, Bruce, and his wife, Vicky, of Reserve, KS, and daughter, Susan, and her husband, Ross Walkup, of York, and their families."

Joan and other volunteers continue weekly working to preserve Richardson County's history.

DEBBIE PALMER LONGED FOR A SISTER, NOW SHE HAS THREE

It was Christmastime, 2020. Debbie Palmer of Falls City turned her computer on and opened her Ancestry.com account. She didn't know why. She had looked at it nearly every day for two years, and no message had ever come. But that day was different.

That day, Debbie got one of the best Christmas presents she had ever received.

Ancestry.com had found a familial match in Maui, Hawaii. After a lifetime of waiting, Deb had possibly located a member of her birth father's family.

"I was excited and nervous at the same time," Debbie said, during a recent interview. "I had known since age four that I was adopted. My adoptive parents, Bill and Mildred Prater, had been very open about it. Mom had told me that my birth mother had lived with her and my dad for the last month of her pregnancy, and had given birth to me in Falls City.

"My birth mother's name was not listed on my birth certificate, but Mom told me that her name was Carol (Burge) Nielsen. When I was in my late 20s, I searched for and found her. My parents were not only supportive, they got to know Carol again, and often invited her and her husband, Paul, to their home for dinner, even when I wasn't around!"

Debbie, too, developed relationships with Carol, Paul, and their four sons, all of whom were Debbie's half-brothers. She had always had a good relationship with her own brother, Randy Prater, too, so suddenly, she had five brothers!

However, she longed to know about her birth father's family. She knew that he had visited her in the hospital just days after her birth, and she knew that his name was Bernard Peterson. However, she had no idea what to do with the information.

In 2018, her daughter, Brynn O'Banion Crabb signed her up for Ancestry.com. Then, on that fateful day in 2020, the message finally came.

The familial DNA match linked Debbie to a sec-

ond cousin in Hawaii, so Brynn sent the woman a message. The lady didn't respond because she had deleted the Ancestry app. Debbie was so disappointed. Brynn didn't give up there, though. She searched the woman's Facebook page and found that she had a cousin in Omaha, named Linda Miller. Brynn gave the information to her mom, and left the ball in Debbie's court.

Deb stewed about it for days. She wasn't sure she wanted to risk the possible rejection. But she had so many questions! Was her father still alive? Did his family even know about her? And most

importantly, did he have any daughters? Debbie had longed for a sister her entire life, for someone who looked like her, for that close bond that only sisters knew.

Knowing the answers to those questions far outweighed her fear of rejection, so she finally made a phone call to Linda Miller.

"My name is Debbie Palmer," she said. "I don't want anything from you. But I

am the daughter of Bernard Peterson. Do you know him?"

The woman was silent for a moment.

"He was my favorite uncle," she said. Then, she threw the doors of her heart wide open, and welcomed Debbie in. The two chatted for hours. Linda told Debbie that Bernard was from Omaha, but had settled in California. He had worked as a carpenter and had raised four children—a son who had passed away at age 51, and three daughters, all of whom were alive and well.

Three daughters!?! Debbie had three half-sisters? Yes. She had three half-sisters—Ronda, Rickee, and Renee. Linda vowed to connect them all. Debbie hung up, nervous but excited.

Linda called back a few days later with the news for which Debbie had yearned her entire life. All three of her sisters wanted to meet her. The next thing Debbie knew, her sister Ronda had arranged a Facetime call.



THE BUTTERFLY EFFECT

My daughter recently brought home a monarch caterpillar. We cared for it in a container making sure it had a supply of fresh milkweed leaves and kept its cage clean. It seemed perfectly content to munch on leaves all day. After a few days it hung upside-down from the lid of the cage and we waited for it to form a chrysalis, and eventually convert to a butterfly.

We used the time lapse video capability of our cell phone to capture the transformation. Watching the video, the change seems easy, quick, and effortless. There does not appear to be any major effort or pain involved for the caterpillar. However, after researching the subject, we came to appreciate the significant process the caterpillar undergoes which is not apparent to the naked eye of the observer.

Unless we take time to learn about the butterfly's makeover, we may tend to minimize it as an un-complicated process. Literally everything about the caterpillar changes. Its old body is completely broken down for the new one to form. Enzymes are released to break down the caterpillar skin and hormones allow new body parts to be formed. To the spectator, it looks easy, to the caterpillar, it is a monumental task.

This got me thinking about how change is difficult for people, and how important it is for us to support each other as we attempt it. Many changes in life are painful and complicated, especially those we make to improve our health, or our physical, emotional, or spiritual wellbeing.

Breaking old habits and creating new, healthier behaviors involves a transformation. It requires that we learn new ways of thinking and practice positive self-talk which is sometimes uncomfortable and challenging work. Quitting smoking, walking every day, choosing different healthier foods, and avoiding junk food are changes that offer long-term benefits. The work may not seem worth it in the short-term. You may want to give up, especially when others do not seem to notice your struggles or understand how you are feeling inside. You may miss the way things were before you embarked upon your journey.

Look to the butterfly for encouragement to continue your transformation. Change may feel like a struggle, but when your wings emerge and you take flight thanks to your healthier habits, the change will be its own reward.

HIGHER OFFICE BECKONS? GOVERNOR SEEMS TO BE ACTING LIKE IT

The term-limited seated Governor has become a very vocal critic of the Biden Administration policies – to the point of releasing press statements in opposition to some of them.

Probably not unprecedented, but it's obvious that Republican Pete Ricketts has his eye on the prize, whatever that may be. There is no declaration of U.S. Senate aspirations. He tried that once and lost. Many thought he was expecting an appointment from the Trump Administration had there been a second term. That did not happen.

So, what is the prize? Rumors have been whispered that he wants the big show; he wants to be the next President of the United States. There is even talk that a campaign committee has been formed, though there is a lack of evidence to prove that, yet.

Well, if it is POTUS, who are we to deny those aspirations? The reality is, he is the governor of one of those mostly square states out west that most people can't find on an unmarked map, and many of us like it that way. In that regard, get in line somewhere behind Governor Kristi Noem of South Dakota, that mostly square state just to the north.

She's out there making visits to Iowa and Texas in an effort to test the waters and make friends. Her controversial anti-virus attitudes won national attention when she refused statewide shutdowns and mandatory masking during the pandemic. Nebraska's governor had the same attitude about imposing federal directed initiatives as the country battled the coronavirus.

While some hope that Trump stays on the sidelines in 2024, the candidates are lining up for what could be a crowded field. Florida Governor Ron DeSantis and Texas Governor Greg Abbott are likely contenders. They come from states that figure prominently in national politics. Then there's Mike Pence, Nikki Haley and Mike Pompeo. People with name recognition.

Noem jumped on defying pandemic restrictions early and found the fodder for building a national profile. Nebraska figured prominently in the coronavirus picture thanks mostly to the top, often-quoted – doctors at the University of Nebraska Medical Center in Omaha, which is well known for its infectious disease research and treatment. Science versus politics. That's a tough national sell.

So Nebraska's Governor has turned his attention-getting thoughts to things like Biden's cancellation of the Keystone Pipeline, which would have brought hundreds of jobs to Nebraska. But the biggie, by far, is the opposition to President Biden's plan to conserve 30 percent of the nation's land and wa-

ter by 2030. The Governor calls it a federal land grab and has held statewide townhall meetings to spread the word. Proponents say it is strictly voluntary and an attempt to improve the environment. Opponents say the Conservation Reserve Program already in place is enough.

Given that an attempt in the recently completed Legislature to enact voter ID legislation failed, there is a petition drive underway to place the issue on the next general election ballot. Senator Julie Slama, a Republican in the officially non-partisan Legislature, and the Nebraska Republican Party – and most

likely some of Ricketts' personal funding – are behind the measure.

So, what's next? There is an upcoming special session, maybe in September, for redistricting based on new census figures. This would be a good opportunity for the Governor to wield some behind-the-scenes power and grab a few headlines.

It all adds to the political intrigue.

On Penneys End-of-Month Clearance sale, you could purchase Jamaica Shorts anywhere from \$0.50 to \$2.22. (Excuse me while a Google Jamaica Shorts).

An advertisement ran that only read, "August 4. Just Keep Repeating This Date. More Later." It went hand in hand with a previous ad that read, "Watch for the Biggest news in over half a century. Morehead Auto Co." Come back to this column to see what the hype was about!

Los Angeles (AP)-John Wayne sued Paramount Pictures for \$1.7 million over the sale to television of "True Grit," which won the veteran actor his only Oscar. Wayne's suit contends that Paramount sold too cheaply, short-changing Wayne's residual share of the profits.

USDA grant for two police vehicles, the equipment that would go with them, a camera system, computer, software, a repeater for mobile and portable radios and a new dispatch console. The total amount is \$194,173.75. The grant is a 75/25 grant, with the city's responsibility coming to a total of \$48,544. Assistant Police Chief Stamper asked for a resolution that authorizes the Mayor and City Administrator to sign documents required for the grant. The Council approved.

Utility Superintendent Ray Luhring spoke to the Council about a contract between the city and USDI (Utility Safety and Design, Inc.) for design services and gas main and service line replacement for \$31,400. The Council approved.

Luhring also addressed the Council on a request to negotiate a contract with JEO Engineering for the proposed electrical distribution upgrade. The Board of Public Works asked Luhring to address the Council on the plan before asking for permission to negotiate a contract that can be brought back to the Council later for approval.

Luhring said they're looking at doing two main alleys up-town and undergrounding. "So it's probably about 15 to 20 years past is what they would call useful life and design life. We've had some issues up there with trucks hitting poles, different things, we've had some few voltage issues."

The project would be a long process. Two engineering firms are both included in the request for proposal. They would be working together; JEO Engineering asked that they be the lead and Olsen and Associates would subcontract them on a specific part of the project. Construction likely wouldn't start until 2023 by the end due to some available grants. Luhring said electrical grants are rarely available, but JBO made them aware of the grants, one being up to 75 percent.

Luke Keller was appointed as a police officer as recommended by Mayor Bindle. Police Chief Jamie Baker said he thought Keller was a good fit and the Police Department could benefit from his 13 years of experience.

City Administrator Gary Jorn told the Council that through the CARES Act, Falls City was able to get reimbursed for presumptive wages that amounted to about \$148,000 for public safety employees.

The city also received \$360,000 as the first payment from ARPA Funds American Recovery Act. The Council will discuss how the money is spent for premium pay for public safety employees such as police officers and dispatchers during the next Council meeting.

Modern technology finally connected Debbie to the missing links in her life. When the four women met on screen, it was like they had known each other their entire lives.

"I couldn't have asked for a more welcoming reception," Debbie said. "I learned that my father and his wife had moved from California to Missouri after he retired, and that he had died in 1994, of a massive heart attack."

"Ronda still lives in California, in the home in which the girls were raised. She has four kids and five grandchildren. Rickee lives in Maui, Hawaii. Her fiancé is a chef at a five-star restaurant and has been on Guy Fieri twice! Rickee has a daughter who is a surfer, too! Renee has two daughters, a son, and three grandchildren, and lives in Missouri."

The best news that came out of the Facetime call was that Rickee and Ronda had planned a trip to Missouri in May, 2021, to visit their mom and Renee. The two excitedly agreed to add a few days to their trip so they could meet their new-found sister in person. Renee said she would come, too. Debbie was ecstatic.

Their cousin Linda was also thrilled. She arranged a reunion at her house in mid-May, where Debbie and her husband, Bill, met her sisters,

and Linda's entire family. Linda's Dad, Phillip, was there, as well. He was Bernard Peterson's brother, which made him Debbie's uncle. He welcomed her with open arms, too.

On May 20th, all three of Debbie's sisters came to Falls City. The four had a photo session with professional photographer, Jessica Santo, at Joni Milam's house. A surprise party had also been planned by Debbie and Joni so that Deb's new-found sisters could meet her family and some of her closest friends.

"It was one of the best nights of my life," Debbie said. "My friends all loved my sisters, and vice versa." They stayed up until 2:30 a.m. chatting and getting to know each other.

Debbie and Bill are now hoping to visit Ronda in California, and Rickee in Hawaii. Meanwhile, all of the women talk on the phone several times a week.

"As soon as I met my sisters, I felt bonds with them that I had never felt before," Debbie said.

The feeling of longing that she had had her entire life is now gone. It has been replaced with love, acceptance, and wholeness. And a connection that took 63 years to realize and understand.

years. Harshbarger has served as Director of Transition Services, and Assessment Coordinator, Director of the Academic Resource Center and Athletics, Dean of Student Life, Vice President of Student Services and Enrollment Management, Director of Cooperative Education and Career Services, and Interim Athletics Director. He also taught business classes for many years.



After 25 years, he also recently retired as the Nebraska Phi Beta Lambda State Adviser, during which he represented Peru State and Nebraska on the National Board of Directors.

"I am delighted that Ted is stepping up to lead the Foundation," said Peru State President Michael Evans. "The Foundation and the College will benefit from his experience and his expertise, and I look forward to working with Ted to further strengthen Peru State's philanthropic support."

"Destructive" Severe Thunderstorm Warning to trigger Wireless Emergency Alerts on mobile phones

Starting August 2, the National Weather Service will better convey the severity and potential impacts from thunderstorm winds and hail by adding a "damage threat" tag to Severe Thunderstorm Warnings, similar to Tornado and Flash Flood Warnings.

The National Weather Service developed three categories of damage threat for Severe Thunderstorm Warnings. The categories, in order of highest to lowest damage threat, are destructive, considerable, and base. These tags and additional messaging are designed to promote immediate action, based on the threats. A Wireless Emergency Alert for a Severe Thunderstorm Warning

The criteria for a destructive damage threat is at least 2.75 inch diameter (baseball-sized) hail and/or 80 mph thunderstorm winds. Warnings with this tag will automatically activate a Wireless Emergency Alert

(WEA) on smartphones within the warned area.

The criteria for a considerable damage threat is at least 1.75 inch diameter (golf ball-sized) hail and/or 70 mph thunderstorm winds.

The criteria for a baseline or "base" severe thunderstorm warning remains unchanged, 1.00 inch (quarter-sized) hail and/or 58 mph thunderstorm winds. This will not activate a WEA. When no damage threat tag is present, damage is expected to be at the base level.

On average, only 10 percent of all severe thunderstorms reach the destructive category each year, nationwide.

The new destructive thunderstorm category conveys to the public urgent action is needed, a life-threatening event is occurring and may cause substantial damage to property. Storms categorized as destructive will trigger a WEA to your cell phone.



Casteel earns respect of coaches and players

Del Casteel, a former standout for Sacred Heart, had a busy June. Casteel, who graduated in May, was selected to play in the June 5 Nebraska Shrine Bowl and the June 21 Sertoma Eight-man All-Star game. All this while trying to squeeze in time playing for the American Legion Falls City Blue Storm Senior baseball team.

When asked whether or not his selection to the Shrine Bowl caught him off guard, Casteel, never lacking self-confidence, said that he just wanted to prove that he belonged on the same field as the kids from the larger schools.

"I'm not going to say that I was surprised because obviously, I thought that I was one of the best football players in the state. It was just awesome to have that thought validated by someone else," said Casteel.

Casteel, the Lincoln Journal Stars All-State Class D2 defensive captain, closed out his Irish career with 136 tackles and four sacks on defense while racking up 758 yards and 23 touchdowns on 132 carries for Coach Doug Goltz.

"Del was a special football player," said Goltz. "He had a great Sacred Heart career and was a varsity contributor from his freshman year on. He played with a lot of passion and it rubbed off on his teammates. I think the Shrine Bowl and the Sertoma 8-Man All-Star Game showed the kind of player and leader he is. In the Shrine Bowl, he started for the South defense,

but even more outstanding was the fact that he was selected as one of the South Shrine Bowl Captains. Being the player from the smallest school and being chosen captain says a lot about Del as a person. In the 8-Man game, he started on both offense and defense, which is a rarity. He played well and was named defensive MVP; what a way to finish off your high school football playing days."

Playing in the Shrine Bowl at Ron and Carol Cope Stadium on the campus of the University of Kearney on June 5, Casteel spent a week getting to know the players on his team and practicing. Casteel said the experience was like moving into college, settling into the dorms and meeting everyone for the first time.

"That's where I do really well, meeting people. I always introduce myself as Del with one L because two L's is like the computer, so people always remember me for that," said Casteel.

Within a couple of hours, he was off to his first practice, then back to the dorms to study the playbook and to hang out with his teammates.

Casteel said that making life-long friendships is what he will take away from the experience more than anything from the week.

"It's weird being from a smaller school and you hear about the kids from Class A like Cole Payton. Now I'm on the same team as them, playing with them, maybe not just as good,

but able to play with them," said Casteel.

As mention before, Casteel was named a captain of the South squad by the Shrine Bowl coaching staff.

"What more can you ask for," said Casteel.

The team didn't visit the hospital like in years past, but Casteel said the kids came to them.

"It was a humbling experience to be around the kids with their disabilities while we are out there running around playing football," said Casteel.

Casteel's defense did their job in the contest, holding the North team to only ten points; however, the South scored just three, losing the game 10-3.

The 8-Man All-Star Game took place at Lloyd Wilson Field at Hastings College on June 21.

Casteel said the weeklong training was a little more laid back. Del was chosen as a team captain for the game by his fellow players.

"You really know these guys. It was fun that way too because you had more to talk about," said Casteel.

Casteel was used on both sides of the ball, finishing the contest with six carries for 16 yards and making ten tackles on the defensive side of the ball. Casteel's East team got the win, 40-29, over the West squad. For his efforts, Casteel was named the South team defensive MVP.

When asked about what advice he would pass on to aspiring athletes, Casteel had this to say. "Work hard. It seems cliché, but starting in seventh grade, I was in the weight room. Have actual goals, what you want to do. If you're young, don't be afraid of upperclassmen, challenge them, and challenge them, but that's also in life, don't be scared. If you have that mindset, you're going to be a good player."

Agenda inconsistencies lead to discussion at Humboldt City Council meeting

During the July 20, 2021, Humboldt City Council Meeting City Treasurer Vicky Lynch reported that the State Auditor from the State Budget Department called and recommended the City apply for Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds established under the American Rescue Plan Act.

The City had not yet applied as they were led to believe they would have to prove a deficit, or they were severely affected and lost a lot of money and had to prove it.

The Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds provide substantial flexibility for each government to meet local needs—including support for households, small businesses, impacted industries, essential workers, and the communities hardest hit by the crisis. These funds can also be used to make necessary investments in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure.

The State Auditor said there were five different uses for the money and Humboldt should go for it. The total expected is \$71,680. The only way the City would be able to use it would be for water, sewer or broadband.

The money will come in two installments, \$35,840. There was no turnaround date given.

Lynch also reported on the City's liability insurance for volunteers helpers on city property. Anything approved by the city council, the volunteer would be covered according to the insurance company. If the Council hasn't approved it, the volunteer wouldn't be covered. A further discussion would be held next meeting.

A short discussion was had about the Richardson County Fair parking situation and how there could be an issue for emergency vehicles if an emergency arises. Fair parking will be discussed further at the next meeting.

There was a discussion on possible discounts to the 2022 pool passes due to the pool availability in 2021. The Humboldt Pool was closed nine days, open 32 days for a total of 41 days since June 5. Of the nine days it was closed, only three of those days were due to staff shortage. (As of July 20, 2021)

"Say a family of five buys an \$85 pool pass. They use it ten times; they're already well over the \$85 they spent. They only have to visit the pool 3.4 times in the whole season to get their money out of it," said Humboldt Pool Manager Misty Jamison.

The action was tabled indefinitely.

Councilmember Dustin White said he noticed some inconsistencies regarding the present agenda system during council meetings.

"We've seen days where one person can remove an agenda item if they wish or another person not allowed to have an agenda item removed. It becomes confusing and unclear as

to what's not allowed. I'd like to propose a change and set some clear defined rules for handling the city agenda for Humboldt."

City Clerk Darla Hulsebus said there was some agenda confusion this week and she reached out to the League of Municipalities as well as the Attorney General to find out what the right processes to follow and who could put things on and take things off the agenda.

"Nebraska has one thing, that this is a meeting of the governing body it is for you guys to discuss. It is for you guys to advocate for constituents. With that, there is a law in place that says if a citizen has a concern or wants to be put on the agenda for it to be reviewed, they are to come to the council member that is in their ward or their district to advocate for them and if the council member does see fit they then can request to put it on the agenda."

Hulsebus asked the League of Municipalities and Attorney General offices for examples to show the Council. She told them that some cities only allow the mayor to put things on the agenda, some only allow the council president and the mayor and some allow all the Council.

"I do think it's important for you all to sit down and decide who what, when, where and how because there is not a Nebraska statute that states who what when and how. It only says there is no reason a citizen or constituent can come in and be placed on the agenda because that is why Council is in place, to advocate for that individual or that group," said Hulsebus.

"Right now, it's not consistent. We need to have consistency in our city government. I know when I came on as a city councilwoman, I'm working for these people. I think inconsistently is going to kill the City if we're not careful," said Council Member Rhonda Dittmer.

"Only with proper questions and answers can we do what's best for our citizens. We have to communicate with them rather than removing items without any explanation or delayed explanation to them prior to the item being removed," said Council Member Dustin White. "There's nothing wrong in helping people succeed in their goals. If the City does not want to invest in an idea or cannot, we can still work with the people or organizations and point them in the direction they need to go."

The Council is scheduled to meet three times in August. On Tuesday, August 3, at 6:00 and Tuesday, August 17, at 6:00. The Council will also meet on Tuesday, August 10, 2021, at City Hall, 330 East Square, for a Special meeting workshop to discuss the budget for the fiscal year October 1, 2021, to September 30, 2022.

How do I know which COVID-19 vaccine information sources are accurate? Accurate vaccine information is critical and can help stop common myths and rumors.

It can be difficult to know which sources of information you can trust. Before considering vaccine information on the Internet, check that the information comes from a credible source and is updated on a regular basis. Learn more about finding credible vaccine information.

Can receiving a COVID-19 vaccine cause you to be magnetic?

Receiving a COVID-19 vaccine will not make you magnetic, including at the site of vaccination which is usually your arm. COVID-19 vaccines do not contain ingredients that can produce an electromagnetic field at the site of your injection. All COVID-19 vaccines are free from metals.

Do any of the COVID-19 vaccines authorized for use in the United States shed or release any of their components?

No. Vaccine shedding is the term used to describe the release or discharge of any of the vaccine components in or outside of the body. Vaccine shedding can only occur when a vaccine contains a weakened version of the virus. None of the vaccines authorized for use in the U.S. contain a live virus. mRNA and viral vector vaccines are the two types of currently authorized COVID-19 vaccines available.

Is it safe for me to get a COVID-19 vaccine if I would like to have a baby one day?

Yes. If you are trying to become pregnant now or want to get pregnant in the future, you may get a COVID-19 vaccine when one is available to you.

There is currently no evidence that COVID-19 vaccination causes any problems with pregnancy, including the development of the placenta. In addition, there is no evidence that female or male fertility problems are a side effect of any vaccine, including COVID-19 vaccines.

Will a COVID-19 vaccine alter my DNA?

No. COVID-19 vaccines do not change or interact with your DNA in any way. Both mRNA and viral vector COVID-19 vaccines deliver instructions (genetic material) to our cells to start building protection against the virus that causes COVID-19. However, the material never enters the nucleus of the cell, which is where our DNA is kept.

Will getting a COVID-19 vaccine cause me to test positive for COVID-19 on a viral test?

No. None of the authorized and recommended COVID-19 vaccines cause you to test positive

business within the Sheriff's Department and Jail. A report was approved for fees collected by the Sheriff's Office in June 2021 for \$5,429.02.

A motion was made to adopt Resolution 2021-2022-2 to approve a change to the approved number of allowed sheriff's deputies resolution as per NE §23-170401 which would allow a deputy to be classified as a lieutenant, motion carried.

Commissioner Rick Karas made a motion to approve the following salary increases for staff at the Law Enforcement Center with an effective date of July 1, 2021: a two percent salary increase for all positions and to approve an increase in salary if justified through job performance evaluations by the Sheriff and/or supervisory staff for the positions of Jail Supervisor up to a maximum hourly rate of \$18.50; Night Jail Supervisor up to a maximum hourly rate of \$18.00 and Jailer salary up to a maximum hourly rate of \$17.50. The motion carried.

Members from the Rural Water District #2 met with the Board to further inquire and request that an amount of the ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funds be allocated for the Rural Water District project that will place waterlines over 40 miles within the County to provide hookups to 70 households/sites. The project was scheduled to begin earlier, but due to COVID, it was pushed back.

The Board indicated that they would strongly consider allocating a portion of the funds to the project if and when the guidelines from the federal government for the allowable expenditures are received and reviewed to make final decisions in allocating these funds.

Commissioner Caverzagie will be contacting Dennis Greg at Masonry Construction, Inc. to review the damage and repairs

that are needed to the lamp post pedestals on the east and west entrances of the Courthouse. The pedestals were restored approximately four years ago. The quality has not held up. The Board will negotiate with the contractor to resolve the matter to correct the damages.

The Board conducted the quarterly jail inspection with Sheriff Hardesty and Chief Deputy Merwin and found the facility to be in good order.

A letter was received from Brian Kirkendall, EMA Director, notifying the Board of a vacancy in the EMA office, which was a part-time position. A request to advertise for the position and to change it to a full-time status position was made. The Board will review this request further at the next meeting.

Sickel made a motion to approve the sale of two iPhones that have been deemed to be surplus property with the Emergency Management Agency Department and which were advertised by Richardson County Emergency Management Agency for sale for a period of two weeks on Facebook and further sold to the highest bidder for \$550 and \$490 and which was remitted to the Richardson County Treasurer on June 28, 2021, motion carried.

A letter was received from FEMA regarding the recent changes to the National Flood Insurance Program and information and contacts for the County to seek while enacting the changes.

Caverzagie made a motion to authorize Chairman to sign the engagement letter with the Nebraska State Auditor to conduct the fiscal year-end audit on June 30, 2021, the motion carried.

The Board met again on Tuesday, July 27, 2021, at 9:00 a.m. in the Commissioner's Meeting Room, Courthouse, Falls City, NE. The agenda is kept current at the County Clerk's Office.
