FALLS CITY AUTO SUPPLY, 98 YEARS AND COUNTING

In February 2023, Falls City Auto Supply will celebrate a rather impressive achievement, 100 years of a family-owned business. Denny Heinzelman and sister Judy Dixon own the part store located at 1820 Stone Street in Falls City, Ne.

Denny's grandfather, Norman Heinzelman, opened the part store back in 1923, across the street from its current location. The Auto Supply moved into its current location in 1989.

When Norman passed away early in life, Denny's father Don and uncle Bob took the business over after getting out of college and the army. Keeping the family business going, Denny began work at the Auto Supply in 1972 after serving a stint in the military. Denny's son Bryan

and employee Bruce Stevicks have both been with the store for 30 years.

Heinzelman has seen quite a change in the parts industry over his 49 years at the store.

"Everybody and their dog is selling parts now; before, back in the forties, we had an ad in the paper that we were the only one in town the carried antifreeze. The grocery stores were just starting to carry antifreeze. Nobody sold anything like that back in the '40s and '50s. At one time, we were a champion spark plug dealer, a nation dealer. Other part stores in Nebraska were buying their plugs from

us. There were no Walmarts to go to back then."

When asked about the Internet changing business for the store, Heinzelman replied that he couldn't see any change.

Inventory has been the most significant change over the years for the store.

"We used to have two full racks of exhaust; now we have none," said Heinzelman. "Radiator hoses are the same way. When they made them aluminize the exhaust pipe, that's what changed that because it lasts longer."

THIBODEAU WITHDRAWS FROM HERBSTER CAMPAIGN

SELF-DIAGNOSIS CAN BE RASH

"Doc, what's this scaly rash on my arm? Do I have ringworm again?" A lot of the rashes I see in my dermatology clinic are red and scaly. In fact, what first drew me to dermatology as a profession was watching a dermatologist distinguish between seemingly similar red, scaly rashes all day. It intrigued me at the time, and I wanted to be just like her.

I can always tell when my patient is a farmer, because they usually treat any rash as ringworm before coming to see me. How does ringworm happen and why are farmers so familiar with it? Ringworm, first of all, is not a worm. It is actually caused by a fungus that infects our skin and causes a circular rash wherever the fungus came in contact with our skin. Without treatment, the circle will continue to expand and enlarge, forming concentric rings. The rash usually itches and is bothersome.


There are several families of fungus that can cause ringworm (tinea corporis in medical speak). They can be spread directly from other people, animals, or soil. The most severe infections typically happen when we get ringworm from animals. Growing up on a farm, I am very familiar with how much farmers interact with their livestock and pets. Farmers are accustomed to diagnosing ringworm on their animals and often will treat themselves if they see a similar rash. I'm pretty sure every farm family has had at least one member who has come down with this common infection at one time.

But all that is scaly, and circular is not ringworm. I remind my patients, especially farmers, that there are lots of different rashes that can look similar. It is not always in your best interest to try to self-diagnose and treat.

Nummular eczema is a type of eczema that forms red, scaly, circular patches on our skin. Granuloma annulare is another rash that forms raised rings on the skin. These are both treated differently than fungal infections and make up the most common rashes that are misdiagnosed as ringworm.

There are other, less common, rashes that can signify underlying medical conditions inside your body. Even though ringworm is a common, non-dangerous skin infection, if your rash doesn't improve with over-the-counter antifungals you should always check with your doctor.

WHERE HAVE ALL THE NEBRASKA STATE TROOPERS GONE?

A few weeks ago, I made my first post-pandemic road trip across Nebraska driving from Lincoln to Scottsbluff and then back to Lincoln a couple days later. It was great to see the crops growing, the traffic whizzing by and even the billboards beckoning me to stop and see what I had been missing all these months.

About that traffic whizzing by, have you ever asked yourself out loud "where's a cop when you need one?" It dawned on me; I had seen few, if any Nebraska State Troopers. They weren't in their usual spots in the medians or the on-ramps. When you travel statewide like I did for years, you tend to remember those spots.

So, where were the Troopers? Gone to Texas, 25 of them to help protect the border with Mexico in what has been variously described as a mutual aid request or an overblown case of political grandstanding.

When he announced the deployment, Governor Pete Ricketts said, "Nebraska is stepping up to help Texas respond to the ongoing crisis on their border with Mexico. The disastrous policies of the Biden-Harris Administration created an immigration crisis on the border. While the federal government has fallen short in its response, Nebraska is happy to step up to provide assistance to Texas as they work to protect their communities and keep people safe."

That sounds like political posturing. But Ricketts' spokesman Taylor Gage said the decision to send troopers to Texas was answering another state's request for assistance. "We were asked by a fellow State for help, and we want to help," he said. "This is similar to requests for assistance that we've received in Minnesota around the George Floyd verdict and in North Dakota during pipeline protests."

So, the troopers went to Del Rio, Texas, while the Patrol said it wouldn't impact operations at home. Spokesman Cody Thomas said the Patrol has adequate staffing for the deployment and no overtime was planned to cover the shifts of those who had gone to Texas.

If things died down on the home front during the deployment, they heated up again when the operation was completed, and it was learned that the cost to send the Nebraska Patrol Troopers to Texas was \$500,000. That's half a million dollars folks, and no one was quite sure who was going to pay for it.

After some finger pointing that Democrats in the Texas Legislature were going to hold up any reimbursement, the Nebraska State Patrol said it had the funds available to cover the cost. Those are taxpayer funds and you and I are footing the bill.

State Patrol Capt. Jason Scott, who led the Nebraska state troopers in Texas, joined State Patrol Superintendent Col. John Bolduc and Ricketts at a news conference

to describe a border that is being breached by an influx of illegal immigrants with resulting drug and human trafficking issues, including sex offenses against minors and child exploitation. They said many of the people fleeing across the border into Texas are in desperate need of water, food and shelter.

According to Bolduc, the deployed troopers assisted with 500 traffic stops and 25 commercial vehicle inspections, which led to several arrests. Meanwhile, in Nebraska, the state patrol made 500 fewer traffic stops during the time the troopers were gone.

As the dust settles, I must agree with the editorial boards of the

Lincoln and Omaha newspapers that have decried the whole thing saying spending Nebraska's money for a Texas project with no legislative approval is an outrage in itself. Equally as disturbing, in using the officers to support a headline-grabbing stunt by Texas Gov. Greg Abbott, Ricketts has politicized the patrol in an overreach of his authority.

Yes friends, we call that a "waste of taxpayers' money."

50 Years Ago: August 4, 1971 to August 10, 1971
Mrs. Clarence Nutter, north of town, received a big black eye, not from running into a door, but by a foul ball at the top of the fourth inning at a Kansas City Royals-Oakland A's baseball game.

Five Venezuelan boys of high school age came to the United States with Father William Kalin, a former assistant pastor at Sts. Peter & Paul Catholic Church and, planned to enter the Lincoln diocese in September.

Mary Lou Kriefels of Falls City, modeling a double-knit wool dress of camel hue and a double-breasted plaid coat with a gold brushed button, won the grand championship of the 4-H Style Revue at Prichard Auditorium.

E.J. Morehead, representing the Penney store building firm, was the one to snip the ribbon to open the doors to the renovated store.

Marrs Used Cars at 14th & Harlan sold a two-year-old used car, 1969 Plymouth, Full Power & Air for \$1,595 and a 1968 G.M.C. 2T Dump Truck for \$1,595.

25 Years Ago: August 4, 1996 to August 10, 1996

The Indian Cave Area Jaycees held a Mud Run day a mile west of Shubert on Highway 62. There were jeeps, trucks, ATV's 10-yard sloop in deep mud. Joey Sullwold of the Stella Fire Department operated the equipment for the vehicle contestants to do a little cleaning up.

A ribbon-cutting was held at the offices of Dr. Terry Malcolm, 1910 Chase Street, by the Falls City Area Chamber of Commerce.

Due to Highway 159 construction and the impossibility of re-routing Highway 73/Harlan Street traffic, the Cobblestone Parade route was to take place on Chase Street.

Betty's Day-Care advertised openings full-time starting August 12. (Does anybody else remember attending here and the boys eating dirt? Haha)

Burdeen Prater, the premier female golfer at the Falls City Country Club, added another honor to her list. She won the Senior Medalist title for the fifth time at the Nebraska Women's Amateur Golf Association tournament at Grand Island. Thus, making it her 24th title earned.

Ten thousand dollars from Peter Kiewit Foundation and \$10,000 from school projects and donations were enough to put up new playground equipment at Sacred Heart Schools.

Southeast Nebraska Consolidated School welcomed kids and teachers back to school. Meal prices ranged from \$0.90 to \$2.10.

A small blip was inserted randomly into the paper that read, "In Internet lingo, L.O.L. means 'laughing out loud,'" (I mean, what else could it mean L.O.L.)

Nemaha County was awarded a \$28,558 special initiative grant from the Nebraska Department of Health for "Nemaha County Fitness for a Lifetime Project." The project was to increase the percentage of people who regularly engage in light-to-moderate physical activity.

The Falls City Jaycees brought the Texas-based King Royal Bros. Circus to town with an old-fashioned "under the big top" three-ring wild animal circus.

Troy and Jaden L. Strauss' house at 902 W 19th St. caught fire due to an extension cord electrical failure. Damage was estimated at around \$30,000.

Dusty Jones, a two-event track state champion, tallied two more notable awards leading the Hiawatha Legion baseball team to a second-place state finish.

Between the August 4 and August 10 issues, there were 21 garage sales advertised in the *Falls City Journal*. This tells me two things: 1. Garage sale-ing was where it was at; 2. *It sure was a different time before Facebook. #LetsSupportEachOther*

FC Auto Supply, 98 years and counting

Buying power has made a big difference for the Auto Supply over the years. For years the part store was affiliated with Cornbelt Automotive. In 1997, the warehouse was bought out by AWDI (Automotive Warehouse Distributors Inc.) Being part of the buyer's group allows small part stores like Falls City Auto Supply to buy their products at a lower price and pass that on to their customers. Having stock delivered five days a week helps, as it allows the store to keep its inventory down.

Even after 49 years, Denny shows no signs of walking away.

"I just come in a couple of hours a day and let these guys run it; that's good enough for me. They can handle it all."

Over the years, Auto Supply has been approached many times about selling out or joining their buying group. Heinzelman was quick to say that's not going to happen.

"We're one of the few that's family-owned. We are independent; we don't belong to NAPA or any of those groups. There's not many of us left."

In August 2020, *After Market News Magazine* ran a story in the shop profile section about how Falls City Auto Supply has persevered over the years. In that article, Denny said that relationships are the backbone of his business. Even when a national chain opened in town, business remained steady.

"People have to fix their cars; we've never been to a point where we are struggling," said Heinzelman when asked about

the business climate over the years.

A loyal customer base makes all the difference when it comes to small businesses.

"It says we're ready to deal with the public and stick with them; it means a lot, I think. We try to stock what the customer wants; if they ask us to put a part in stock, we'll do it. That way, they don't have to wait a day next time. That's brought a lot of business to us," said Heinzelman.

Heinzelman had good things to say about his employees.

"These guys went to school; they are mechanics. I couldn't work this counter by myself. They know what they are doing."

When asked about the long-term plans for the part store, Heinzelman replied with a short but optimistic answer, "just keep going, I guess."

With 100 years of service to Falls City just around the corner, no specific plans are in place to celebrate.

"We're going to do something pretty big, I'm sure," said Heinzelman.

Small percentage of people fully vaccinated against COVID-19 will still develop COVID illness

COVID-19 vaccines are effective. However, a small percentage of people who are fully vaccinated will still get COVID-19 if they are exposed to the virus that causes it. These are called "vaccine breakthrough cases." This means that while people who have been vaccinated are much less likely to get sick, it will still happen in some cases. It's also possible that some fully vaccinated people might have infections, but not have symptoms (asymptomatic infections). Experts continue to study how common these cases are.

vaccination may make illness less severe in people who get vaccinated but still get sick. Despite this, some fully vaccinated people will still be hospitalized and die. However, fully vaccinated people are much less likely to be hospitalized or die than people with similar risk factors who are not vaccinated.

CDC is monitoring COVID-19 vaccine breakthrough cases for patterns

CDC is working with state and local health departments to investigate COVID-19 vaccine breakthrough cases. The goal is to identify any unusual patterns, such as trends in age or sex, the vaccines involved, underlying health conditions, or which of the SARS-CoV-2 variants made these people sick. To date, no unusual patterns have been detected in the data CDC has received.

COVID-19 vaccines are an essential tool to help protect people against COVID-19 illness, including against new variants

COVID-19 vaccines help protect people who are vaccinated from getting COVID-19 or getting severely ill from COVID-19, including reducing the risk of hospitalization and death. Studies show that fully vaccinated people can be less likely to spread the virus to others, even if they do get COVID-19. CDC recommends you get a COVID-19 vaccine as soon as one is available to you. Fully vaccinated people can resume activities that they did before the pandemic. Learn more about what you can do when you have been fully vaccinated. If you haven't been vaccinated yet, find a vaccine near you. Keep taking all precautions until you are fully vaccinated.

Large-scale clinical studies found that COVID-19 vaccination prevented most people from getting COVID-19. Research also provides growing evidence that mRNA COVID-19 vaccines (Pfizer-BioNTech, Moderna) offer similar protection in real-world conditions. While these vaccines are effective, no vaccine prevents illness 100 percent of the time. For any vaccine, there are breakthrough cases.

Other reasons why fully-vaccinated people might get COVID-19

It's possible a person could be infected just before or just after vaccination and still get sick. It typically takes about two weeks for the body to build protection after vaccination, so a person could get sick if the vaccine has not had enough time to provide protection.

New variants of the virus that causes COVID-19 illness are spreading in the United States. Current data suggest that COVID-19 vaccines authorized for use in the United States offer protection against most variants. However, some variants might cause illness in some people after they are fully vaccinated.

If you get COVID-19 after vaccination, your symptoms might be less severe

Buy Fresh Buy Local Nebraska and Nebraska Extension join others across the country in celebrating National Farmers' Market Week from Aug. 1-7, 2021 with the launch of a new tool to make it easy for Nebraskans to find nearby farmers' markets.

A new interactive map found online at gotogrow.org, allows Nebraskans to find details on farmers markets in communities all across the state. This website was developed from a USDA Farmers Market Promotion Program grant awarded to Nebraska Extension, in collaboration with Buy Fresh Buy Local Nebraska and the Center for Rural Affairs. A Spanish-language version website is available at vamo-sapoyar.org.

Your local Falls City Farmer's Market is held at 14th and Stone Street (South library parking lot, each Thursday and Saturday 4:00-6:00, May through September. To be included email Emily Thompson at 402-245-8479.

In the midst of a global pandemic, farmers markets — like all other small businesses — have innovated to stay open for the farmers and consumers that depend on them. Market managers have adapted rapidly to protect staff, customers and community. When conventional food supply chains had difficulties adapting at the start of the pandemic, farmers markets and local food systems clearly displayed the resiliency of short supply chains, and interest in local foods spiked nationwide. Now, farmers markets are headed into another year of building resilience in our communities and bringing people together.

"The COVID-19 crisis has highlighted that we need to shorten the food supply chain," said Terri Mazza, owner of Food 4 Hope, a farmers' market vendor near Beatrice. "When people buy at a farmers' market, they have a reliable source of food. They know where their food is coming from, and they know they are getting it fresh."

National Farmers Market Week is an annual celebration of farmers markets coordinated by the Farmers Market Coalition. This year's campaign is centered around the essential role that farmers markets play in our local food systems.

In 2020, Nebraska markets pivoted rapidly to ensure that markets would stay open to the public by increasing online sales, adding safety precautions into their operations and eliminating non-essential activities like music and kids' events. Those efforts, coupled with decreased attendance in 2020, have had a significant impact on Nebraska markets. Nationally, the pandemic strained farmers market organizations to keep markets open; 93 percent of markets reported added costs to operate while 74 percent reported decreased income.

In 2021 Nebraskans all over the state can support their farmers' markets by grabbing their shop-

ping bags and heading to the nearest market. Nebraska's 99 registered Farmers' Markets provide access to healthy, locally-produced food no matter where you are.

Markets increase their reach by accepting SNAP payments, as well as Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program checks. These and other initiatives ensure that more Nebraskans can benefit from local food. In 2021 the Kearney Area Farmers' Market became one of the few farmers' markets in the state to become authorized to accept SNAP payments from shoppers.

Created in 2019, the Nebraska Go to Grow/Vamos Apoyar project provides training, technical assistance and marketing to rural farmers' markets across the state, while also supporting local producers who rely on farmers' markets to sell their products. The Go to Grow/Vamos Apoyar team is also working with markets across Nebraska to increase access to Spanish speaking consumers, through translated signage and targeted outreach in local communities.

Farmers' markets are an essential part of our state. They are spaces where food access, economic opportunities, community pride and health come together every week of the market season. Find your market, and go to grow Nebraska farmers markets by visiting gotogrow.org or vamo-sapoyar.org



Blue Storm Seniors wrap up 2021 campaign

The Falls City Blue Storm Seniors finished their 2021 season with a final record of 7-15. The seniors hit a rough patch to end the year, dropping six of their last seven contests.

As a team for the year, Falls City batted .260 at the plate, finishing with 143 hits. The Seniors had 25, two-baggers, one triple and three home runs. Falls City batters scored 99 runs and had 82 RBIs. FC drew 83 walks and struck out 184 times.

Individually for Falls City, Kade Bredemeier batted a team-best .431. Jake Hoy was next at .333, Caden Simon hit .291 and Carson Bredemeier batted .254 for the season.

Kade Bredemeier led the squad with 28 hits; Hoy finished with 23, Caden Simon added 16 and Carson Bredemeier had 15. Kade Bredemeier added a team-high eight doubles and one triple. Simon led the Blue Storm with two home runs while Kade Bredemeier had one. Kade was also tops with 13 runs batted in. Stephen Acton added 12, Carson Bredemeier had 11 and Hoy and James Eickhoff each had eight.

Carson Bredemeier and Eickhoff each drew 14 base on balls while Acton added 13.

Falls City opponents scored

124 runs this year, with 99 of them being earned. Blue Storm pitchers struck out 139 batters and walked 79.

Carson Bredemeier led all throwers, accumulating 40 innings on the hill and finishing with a 3-4 record. Bredemeier allowed 50 hits and 28 runs (24 earned) while striking out 53 and walking 22. Bredemeier ended the year with a team-best 4.80 earned run average.

Next up for Falls City was James Eickhoff. Eickhoff threw 36 2/3 innings and finished the season with two wins and four losses. Eickhoff allowed 56 hits and 34 runs (32 earned) while walking 16 and striking out 27. Eickhoff finished the season with a 6.98 ERA.

Kade Bredemeier was next for the Seniors, pitching 30 innings and finishing with a 2-4 final record. Bredemeier finished with a 5.60 ERA, allowing 33 runs (21 earned) while walking 15 and striking out 27. Bredemeier allowed 45 hits over his 30 innings on the hill.

As a team, Falls City finished with a 5.82 ERA over 136 innings.

On the base paths, FC was successful on 85 of 94 stolen base attempts. Speedsters Jake Hoy and Kade Bredemeier led the way for the Blue Storm. Hoy was good on 20-22 at-

tempts and Bredemeier was safe on 19-21 tries.

Behind the plate, catcher Stephen Acton threw out five of 35 would-be base stealers and Kade Bredemeier gunned down two of 23 attempts.

Falls City was solid in the field as a team, committing only 31 errors in 539 chances for a .942 fielding percentage.

Peru State VB among NAIA top teams academically in AVCA

"Even though teams might not have played during their usual season or may not have competed at all during the past year, coaches still found ways to lead their players to academic excellence," said AVCA Executive Director Kathy DeBoer. "This is a testament to the important role volleyball coaches play in their players success both on and off the court."

The award, initiated in the 1992-93 academic year, honors volleyball teams that maintain a year-long grade-point average of 3.30 on a 4.0 scale or 4.10 on a 5.0 scale.

With fall practice starting in early August, the team knows what is ahead of them as they look to improve upon a 1-2 season. Due to the COVID-19 canceling a major part of their season last year, the football team is preparing to play all the games on the schedule this year.

The Bobcats will then be on the road for back-to-back weeks. On Oct. 23, the Bobcats will face William Penn in Oskaloosa, Iowa, at 3 p.m. Then, on Oct. 30, the 'Cats will be in Des Moines, Iowa, to face Grand View at 12 p.m. The Vikings finished fifth in the final poll last season.

The final home game of the year will be against Graceland (Iowa). Prior to the 12 p.m. game, the seniors and parents will be honored.

Health Alert issued for Kirkman's Cove Lake

The state has issued a health alert for Harmful Algal Blooms (HAB), also known as toxic blue-green algae, at Kirkman's Cove Lake in Richardson County. Iron Horse Trail Lake in Pawnee County is still on health alert.

Samples taken earlier at the lakes measure above the threshold of eight parts per billion (ppb) of total microcystin, which is a toxin released by certain strains of blue-green algae. Based on recommendations issued in 2019 by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the state of Nebraska adopted this limit after concluding that the new EPA threshold is based on the best scientific evidence available

and is protective of public health.

When a health alert is issued, signs are posted to advise the public to use caution, and designated swimming beaches are closed during the alert. Recreational boating and fishing are permitted, but the public is advised to use caution and avoid exposure to the water, particularly avoiding any activity that could lead to swallowing the water. Do not let pets get in the water or drink from the lake. People can still use the public areas for camping, picnics and other outdoor activities.

Weekly sampling has been conducted at 53 public lakes since the first week of May. The


