



Levies set for County Taxing Jurisdictions

The Richardson County Board of Equalization met at 8:45 a.m. on Tuesday, October 5, 2021 to finalize the 2021 tax levies. During that meeting Resolution 2021-2022-16 to finalize the 2021 tax levies for the taxing districts within Richardson County was adopted.

The City of Falls City Tax Rate for 2021 will be 1.980864 compared to the 2020 rate of 1.99613, a decrease of 0.015266 or .77 percent. Taxes on a property with a value of \$100,000 in 2021 will be \$1,980.86 compared to \$1,996.13 in 2020, a decrease of \$15.27 or .77 percent.

The Tax Rate for those with properties in School District 56 and the Rural Falls City Fire District will be 1.523972 for 2021 compared to 1.536491 for 2020, a decrease of 0.012519 or .82 percent. Property taxes on a property valued at \$100,000 will be \$1,523.97 in 2021 compared to \$1,536.49 in 2020, a decrease of \$12.52 to .82 percent.

The Village of Stella Tax Rate will be 1.607971 for 2021 compared to 1.66962 for 2020, a decrease of 0.061649, or 3.8 percent. Property taxes on a property with a value of \$100,000 will be \$1,607.97 for 2021, a decrease of \$61.65 or 3.8 percent.

For Stella Rural Fire District property owners in School Districts 70, the tax rate for 2021 will be 1.226478 compared to 1.273381 for 2020, a decrease of 0.046903 or 3.8 percent. Taxes on real estate with a value of \$100,000 will be \$1,226.48 in 2021, a decrease of 3.8 percent over 2020.

For the City of Humboldt property owners, the tax rate for 2021 will be 1.918888, compared to 1.971465 in 2020, (Please turn to Page 3)

Froeschl gives EDGE update to City Council and Buckminster encourages community to focus on Falls City as an entire community this Halloween

The Falls City, City Council met on Monday, October 4, 2021, for their regular meeting.

Mayor Bindle thanked the city employees for their work during the recent power outage and said they are the "backbone of our city."

City Clerk Kevin Cluskey gave an update where the City is with the ordinance that's being drafted by City Attorney Mike Dunn for the increase impacting utilities.

Cluskey said Dunn is working on getting a draft ordinance from the City of York, Nebraska, along with getting a draft of a mutual agreement and inner local governmental agreement with the City of York. They've been one of the more recent towns to do something like this, so the City is looking to see what they've done to be successful. Mike Dunn's also been looking at other places that have gone through similar actions. Mr. Dunn will have a better idea of everything in November.

Regarding the power outage, Cluskey thanked OPPD and their substation crew who were called out and who worked with the Falls City crews; he also thanked Brandt Kopf and the utility crew; Gary Ritchie and the street crew; Robert McHenry and the plant operators; Sandra Ferris and the city hall office staff and Ray Luhring.

"For his leadership during this time, standing around watching Ray work, I really took pride in the abilities in this city," said Cluskey.

He said a few things he wanted to discuss was the discussion of why there was a "temporary fix" and what happened with that. He stressed that there was not a temporary fix at the time Falls City was operating with power under its own power.

"We were generating our own power from our generators at that time; we were generating our own electricity. There was nothing about this power outage that was planned," said Cluskey. In the future, the City would (Please turn to Page 5)

The Board met again on Tuesday at the Courthouse. The agenda is kept current at the County Clerk's Office.



COMMITTEE WANTS TO TACKLE TAX REFORM IN AN ELECTION YEAR

A panel of Nebraska lawmakers wants to tackle changes to the state's tax system next year.

Normally I would pooh-pooh such an idea in an election year. But given that veteran lawmaker and Revenue Committee Chair Sen. Lou Ann Linehan of Elkhorn is leading the charge, it might stand a chance.

Likewise, she shepherded changes to the property tax system during the last regular session and has brought a world of experience back to her Elkhorn legislative district and shared it with her colleagues in Lincoln.

The Johnson native who grew up on a dairy farm that's still in the family managed Chuck Hagel's 1966 U.S. Senate campaign and became his chief of staff. After President George W. Bush was elected in 2000, she was appointed to serve as deputy assistant secretary for legislative affairs at the State Department under Colin Powell.

She rejoined the Bush Administration in 2007 and was assigned to Provincial Reconstruction Team Baghdad as part of President Bush's Iraq surge under the leadership of Ambassador Ryan Crocker and General David Petraeus.

I think she has the chops to fight whatever battles a special tax rewrite committee might face. Besides, she said it's time to "bring about meaningful change" in the state tax system.

Remember, it was that solution in 1967 that ultimately cost Republican Governor Norbert Tiemann a second term but saved state government by providing the necessary revenue streams to operate.

Nebraska currently ranks as the 14th highest property tax of the 50 states based on a percentage of the median income of \$59,730 in Nebraska. Sales tax is lower than 50 percent of the states at 5.5 percent before local options are added which take it up to 7.5 percent in some parts of the state.

Corporate income tax in Nebraska is 19th out of the 50 states while personal income tax at 6.84 percent is the highest in the country, according to the Tax Foundation, a national nonprofit.

Linehan said the current state tax policy is "not transparent, it's difficult to administer and comply with, and we're still left with a high tax burden." She admits that with state tax revenue coming in above projections, it may be more politically doable to simply cut some taxes.

Some early suggestions might include: lowering the top income tax rate for both individual and corpo-

rate taxpayers; exempting the first \$50,000 of income from taxes; completely eliminating income tax on Social Security benefits and setting new limits on local government spending.

Linehan's position would rule out proposals for broadening the sales tax base, no matter how the new revenue would be used.

An immediate challenge might come from Blueprint Nebraska, an economic development initiative, which has called for a major reduction in income taxes by applying the sales tax to a wider array of goods and services.

"The issue of tax modernization is indeed decades old. The battle lines have been drawn for many years now," said Bryan Slone, president of the Nebraska Chamber of Com-

merce and Industry. "But the urgency of tax modernization is probably more important today than it's ever been."

Linehan said she expects the Revenue Committee to start work on a 2021 tax plan in a few weeks, after the state forecasting board meets to revise its projection for state revenue. The board will meet at the end of October to update its forecast for the rest of the two-year budget period, which ends June 30, 2023.

Stay tuned. This could be an intriguing fight the likes of which most of us haven't seen since the late 60s.

Storant finished first in the race among nine teams, doing the distance in 10:21. The old record was 10:48, set by Nebraska City's ace distance runner, Bill Sell.

Mrs. M.L. Cheever, 9th and Reavis Street, observed her 90th birthday with a family gathering at her home.

Humboldt Resident, Clyde Brown, 51, disappeared and still had not been found. Somebody that answered to Mr. Brown purchased a round-trip bus ticket to Storm Lake, Ia. Sheriff Camblin said that the round-trip ticket indicated that the man had plans to return.

For the second straight weekend, the Sacred Heart Irish was held to a tie football action. Irish and Pawnee City battled to a 7-7 draw in the Southeast Border conference outing. Rich Witt caught a Joe Fleskoski pass but ran out of bounds on the Pawnee City five after a 50-yard gain, with twelve seconds. Bill Simon was the top tackler for the Irish, getting in on 13.

Mr. and Mrs. John (Jack) McKelvey of Falls City were selected as Parents of the Year at Peru State College.

The Falls City Tiger football team won three straight games to climb to .500 before their regular-season-ending mega game against unbeaten Auburn. The Tigers polished off Kansas City Northeast 44-20. They rolled up 331 yards on the ground, scoring 30 points in the first half. Brett Erickson, a 143-pound junior, played a reserve role but recovered a blocked punt for a TD and had a 37-yard TD run and a seven-yard scoring dash.

Southeast Consolidated students of the month of September were Anna Avery, Elizabeth James, Tim Standley and Mike McWilliams.

The TZ Tailgate Party at Lem's Northview Café raised \$1,592 to go to the Tom Zimmerman Scholarship Fund.

Falls City Foods leverages CDBG program to expand, create jobs

Funding from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program — combined with teamwork at the federal, state and local levels — has once again helped a Nebraska employer expand and create quality jobs.

Great West Pet Food Holding, Inc., dba Falls City Foods LLC, operates two sister companies in Nebraska that store, process and distribute raw ingredients for the pet food industry. Recently, Falls City Foods, in Falls City, was able to access funding in the form of a CDBG loan to support the purchase of new, more powerful freezer equipment. This effectively doubled its capacity to process meat and poultry for sale to national manufacturers, while creating the demand for an additional 10 full-time jobs.

The CDBG loan was administered to Falls City Foods by regional economic developer Southeast Nebraska Development District (SENDD), in collaboration with grant recipient the City of Falls City.

A federal program led by the Department of Housing and Urban Development, CDBG funding is awarded by the Nebraska Department of Economic Development to units of local government for assistance tackling projects that support economic vitality and quality of life.

Falls City Foods' success comes on the heels of a recent expansion by sister company York Cold Storage I LLC, located in York, Nebraska, which also utilized CDBG funding this year to purchase freezer equipment, with equally impressive results. For both firms, CDBG financing was a means to support a major investment in their company's future. But the results will stretch even further, generating an economic ripple effect throughout the region.

"We are proud to not only be growing and creating jobs, but to also be expanding our footprint on the local economy," said Doug Haycock, managing director for Great West Pet Food and both sister companies. "We source a lot of our raw ingredients from Nebraska producers, for example, which supports the local ag industry. We also have close relationships with local trucking companies, and utilize numerous in-state suppliers."

But the most direct economic impacts are likely to be felt by the low- to moderate-income (LMI) individuals and families slated to benefit from Falls City Foods' new full-time job offerings. As part of its loan agreement with SENDD, the company will create 10 new positions, primarily benefitting LMI persons.

But the ripple doesn't stop there. As Falls City Foods repays its required portion of the loan — half, after satisfying LMI job requirements — grant administrator SENDD, a non-profit economic development organization, will be able to reinvest those funds into other impactful projects in their service area.

"We at Southeast Nebraska Development District are extremely fortunate to work with companies around our 16-county region and witness firsthand the growth that can happen when partnerships and collaborations transpire within a project, such as the Falls City Foods expansion project," said SENDD Economic Development Specialist Kelly Gentrup. Now, with the new equipment up-and-running and the demand for pet food nearing historic levels, Haycock says Falls City Foods is growing faster than ever before. CDBG funding, he said — but even more so, Nebraska's business friendliness and welcoming communities — has played a big role in that success.

"We can't say enough about the economic development groups both locally and at the state level that have helped us pursue this expansion," he said. "With their support we have been able to accomplish everything we set out to do and more. We are honestly so excited to do business here in Nebraska, and really look forward to what's in store for the future."

like to investigate, potentially developing a more thorough communication plan on how they outreach to the community and how they interact with them during these times of crisis.

“But our utility crew worked as diligently and as safely as humanly possible to get the power back on as soon as we could,” said Cluskey. So again, I do want to thank all the workers involved.

He emphasized that the City won't let this pass by without improvement.

“We're going to take this as an opportunity to sit back and now we've kind of taken it all in review. What went well, some of our pain points, also how we can make improvements in the future. So that if this were to happen again, we'll be able to respond even better than we did this time,” said Cluskey.

The Council approved the adoption of the 2021 Flood Plain Map. The purpose of this is requirements for policy for participating in the National Flood Insurance Program by FEMA. The plan was adopted but wasn't enforceable until October 7, 2021.

Jessica Santo addressed to Council to request closure for Lane Street from 19th to 25th on October 31, 2021, for trick or treaters from 6:00-9:00 p.m.

The request was honored last year for the safety of the many families that trick or treat on Lane Street. Santo told the Council that turnout was good last year and city police came out to set up barricades at the beginning and the end of the night, which was not planned. The Council approved the request.

Councilmember Joe Buckminster expressed that he would like to encourage everyone in Falls City who is trick-or-treating to visit all areas of Falls City and not just Lane Street.

“I do want everybody to remember that we have a lot of members of the community that don't get trick or treaters. Over the years, the neighborhoods have slowly become more dim. Less front porch lights are on. A lot of people that I've talked to might only have one or two trick or treaters; some of them have quit celebrating Halloween for the fact that most of the kids go to Lane Street.”

Buckminster said he would like to encourage families in the community to go out and venture to those darker neighborhoods because the elderly population would love to see the kids out and about, but moving forward, he would like to see the focus on the community as a whole.

Lucas Froeschl of Falls City EDGE gave the Council an update for the third quarter of 2021.

NDOT has approved the permit to construct the 33rd street that would be contingent on council approval at the North Commercial Corridor. The 33rd St. project is on the City's 1 & 6 Year Street Plan.

New marketing signage has been installed at Champions Crossing that gives an idea of the layout. Dirt has been brought in to fill the east ditch and grass will be planted.

Froeschl toured the AMES building with a corporate asset management firm that will be trying to sell the building and

surrounding land.

“The EDGE Board of Directors believes that, that can be one of our best assets once that's available,” said Froeschl. The corporate asset management team from the East Coast said they'll probably try to divide it up into three spots, so there are 18 acres of the floodplain that they own. There's also the building with about five or five and a half acres and then another three and a half to four acres of buildable land that could be available for anyone seeking to move business here or build. The bones in the building are really good.”

It may be a few weeks before EDGE has permission to solicit the asset to potential prospects.

EDGE was invited as a representative to implement suggestions from the March 2021 Housing Study. They'll work to attract developers that may want to rehab or build housing.

Reports from EDGE's Feasibility Study show that development at the North Commercial Corridor could be an attractive location for specific commercial development markets.

With no further business, the Council adjourned and will meet again on October 18.

FC Schools warn TikTok challenges could result in suspension or criminal charges

Falls City administrators are aware of a current challenge being passed through different social media platforms that encourages students to engage in destructive behavior within the school. This challenge originated on TikTok and students have created videos of themselves participating in this elicit behavior. There is a new destructive challenge for each month of the school year.

Be assured that the Falls City Public School code of conduct has well defined consequences for engaging in these behaviors. Students who violate the code of conduct will not only receive a consequence within the school that can range from suspension to expulsion, they also will be referred to law enforcement for prosecution when the action violates the law. Most of the items in the challenge not only break school code but also break the law.

The school is asking parents to talk to their children and warn them of the serious consequences they face for such stunts. An email sent out by Falls City Public School stated, “It does not matter whether you're an accomplice or the actual person committing the crime. It is

He's been an active member of the community over the years as a member of the Falls City volunteer fire department, member of the city council, Lions Club, the volunteer ambulance board of directors, the Sons of American Legion, an Exalted Ruler at the Elks Lodge, just to name a few. Along with Midtown, McKim is a shareholder in the Vision Inn Motel. "My pipedream years ago was to build a motel if the opportunity ever presented itself," said McKim. The new motel, built on the site of the old Stephenson Motel, was opened in 2010. What does life hold next for Jerry? He had a quick one-word answer, "enjoyment." He hasn't ruled out travel, but mostly he's looking forward to having more time to enjoy attending his grandkid's events. Fishing, an old hobby, will probably come back into the mix as well. "I'm not much of a traveler, but I do plan on making some trips," said McKim. When asked about advice for the younger generation looking to open a business, McKim said "First off, you have to have a firm belief in yourself, you have to want it and you have to push it to make it work. Once staples of the repair industry, tune-ups and exhaust work have also dropped to almost nothing over the years. While the exhaust side of car repair has fallen by the wayside, the alignment and tire sales business have kept the employees of Midtown busy over the years. In 2000, McKim faced a tough decision, install a pipe bending machine or buy a front-end alignment machine. The choice was made to add the aligner and it has been busy ever since. "There are many customers over the years that have been loyal customers," said McKim. The Falls City softball team had its season come crashing down on Monday evening at the Auburn Sports Complex in Class C1 sub-district action. FC scored the final three runs in the opener to complete the come from behind 3-2 win over Weeping Water. In the final, Falls City surrendered 16 runs in the second inning as Auburn sent the Tigers home for the year with a 19-9 win.

In the opener, Weeping Water scored two runs right off the bat in the first inning, but the Tiger pitching and defense held them scoreless the rest of the way.

Poppe came up to the plate with an opportunity to send the Tigers into the next round and that's just what she did. A single scored Schulenberg and FC picked up the win in walk-off fashion, 3-2.

Falls City outhit Weeping Water 9-6. Kacy Brewer got the win, pitching all seven innings, allowing six hits and two runs. Poppe led the Tiger's offense, going 3-4 with the game-winning hit. Jones came through in the clutch as well, going 1-2 with a HR and two RBI.

In the final vs. Auburn, FC took a 3-0 lead after the first inning. Hannah Collier hit a one-out double and Jones promptly sent a pitch over the center-field fence to give FC a 2-0 advantage. Two

batters later, Brewer hit FC's second blast of the inning to make it 3-0.

Auburn unloaded on the Tiger pitching in the second, sending 21 batters to the plate in the inning. Three errors, two home runs, three doubles, seven singles and three walks later, FC trailed 16-3.

In the third, trailing 19-3, Poppe opened the inning with a solo HR. A base hit by Collier and another home run by Jones made it 19-6. A two-run single by Christina Gilkerson got FC closer at 19-8 after three innings.

The Tigers got one last run in the fourth when Brewer singled home Collier to make the final 19-9. Auburn outhit FC 17-12.

Poppe took the loss for FC, allowing 13 hits and 13 runs (5ER) over three innings. Collier was 3-3 at the plate with a double and three runs scored. Jones went 3-3 with two HRs and four RBI. Brewer was 3-3 with a HR and two RBI and Poppe was 1-3 with a HR and RBI.

FC's season comes to an end with a 15-13 final record.
