Prichard Aud. in need of American with Disabilities Act compliant upgrades

The Falls City City Council met for their regular meeting on Monday, November 1, 2021. City Administrator Kevin Cluskey reported that following the power outage last month, some residents were concerned with the communication and how the City interacted with the community to deliver information. One of the criticisms in the feedback was that Facebook was relied upon too much. Cluskey said they are looking into a way to post once on multiple sites and the city website. He also reported a discussion with Olsen on developing a plan for street maintenance on how to maintain a level of usable streets during maintenance.

A motion was approved to hire Mike Hempel as police officer. Hempel is from Omaha, where he was an officer for three years. He told the council he worked back and forth in policing. He said he had some connections in Falls City with family members and co-workers with baseball umpiring.

"I applied and it just seemed like a perfect fit," said Hempel. He will be taking a four-week refresher course before starting duty. While he was appointed during the meeting, he won't be

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Twenty Seasons

Resetting the Internal Clock

Daylight savings time has just ended and now everyone has had the chance to “fall back” to standard time. While many people enjoy that extra hour of sleep that comes each fall, 63 percent of Americans say that they would support the elimination of seasonal time changes and there are some health issues to consider. The American Academy of Sleep Medicine also supports this stance due to the sleep disruption that occurs related to this biannual change.

Our body has its own internal clock called the circadian rhythm which helps set our internal sleep-wakefulness cycle. This cycle is sensitive to light, especially daylight. It is responsible for the production of melatonin and serotonin in our brain. Melatonin helps synchronize our sleep-wake cycle to our environment. Unfortunately, bright lights and anything with a back lit screen – phone, television, tablet, or computer - suppresses your body’s production of melatonin and can adversely affect your sleep quality.

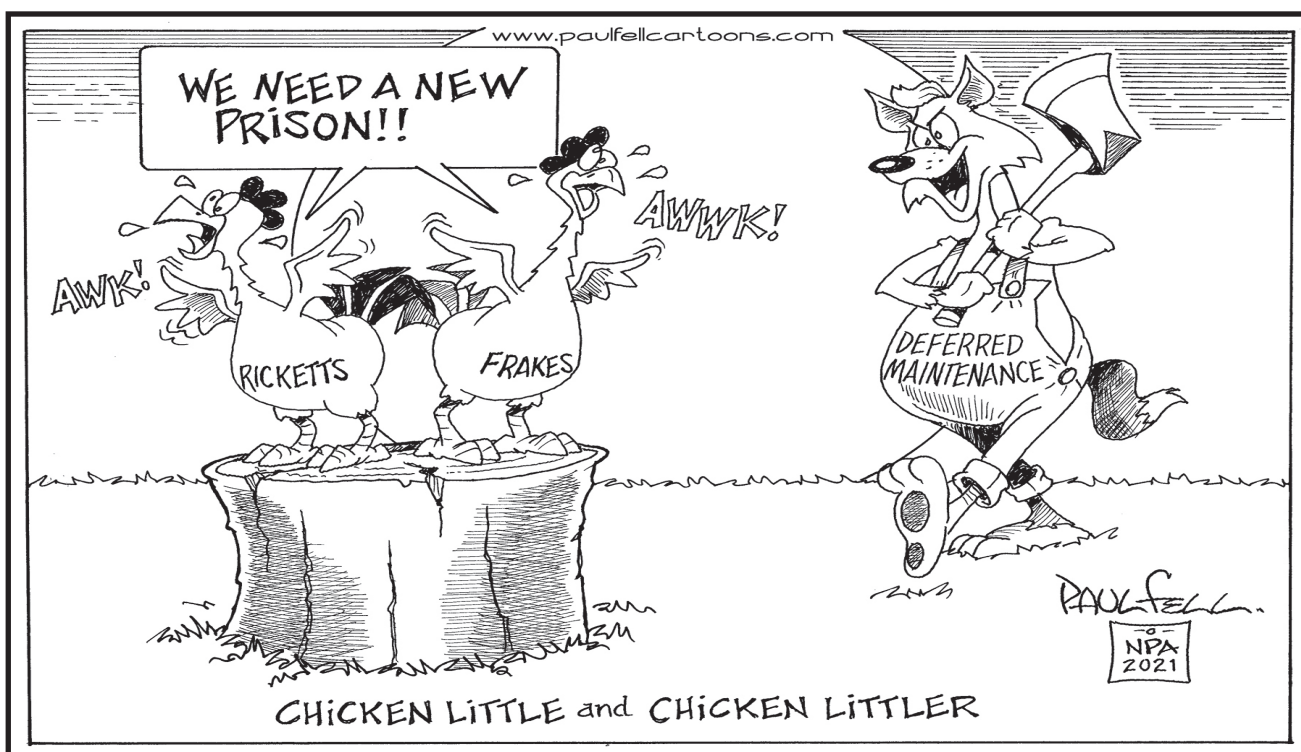
A study completed in 2020 by the National Institutes of Health found that 150,000 Americans experience negative health effects related to daylight savings time changes, mainly with the “spring forward” changes. The four most prominent health conditions with increased risks of occurring in the weeks following the time changes include the following: cardiovascular disease (including increased risk of heart attacks), increased risk of injuries, worsening of mental or behavioral disorders, and flares in immune related diseases.

What can you do to minimize your risk? Try to gradually prepare the body by slowly adjusting your sleep cycle before and after the time change to make the change less abrupt. One thing that will help is by slowly changing your bedtime in 15 to 30-minute increments each night until you get to your new desired sleep and wake times. In the hours leading up to bedtime, try to avoid bright lights and anything with a back lit screen.

Going outside in natural daylight, especially in the morning, can help reset your internal clock. Light exercise in the morning or afternoon can help lower stress hormones and promote better sleep later that evening. Try to keep a bedtime routine and work to get seven to eight hours of sleep each night. A consistent schedule for when you go to bed and when you get up is much easier on your body and its internal clock.

So, after you have changed your smoke detector batteries and reset all your clocks, remember to work on gently helping your body reset its own internal clock with healthy choices. This will help you transition to the new time schedule with ease. Your body will thank you.

PRISON’S PLUMBING PROBLEM SYMBOLIC OF A BROKEN SYSTEM

The Nebraska prison system has more than a plumbing problem.

There are also problems with parole, personnel and programs that are just as serious as leaking pipes.

I don’t want to gloss over the deferred maintenance problems with the 152-year-old penitentiary that has served the state well. Deferred maintenance is a problem in a number of old buildings on university and college campuses, especially in a culture that favors new and bright and shiny.

Incarcerated people and staff spent two days without running water while the pipes were fixed. The inspector general of the state’s correctional system, Doug Koebernick, said “They’re in a tough situation. This is not something you really plan for.”

The Department of Correctional Services summoned a plumbing service, notified those at the prison of a water outage and crews worked around the clock for two days to fix several leaky pipes said corrections department spokeswoman Laura Strimple. The department brought in bottled water and portable bathrooms.

Corrections Director Scott Frakes said he’s proud that the problem was handled. “I don’t have anywhere to send the 1,300 men that live there. So really, our repairs and ongoing maintenance, all are built around the fact that we’re housing 1,300 convicted felons.” He and Governor Pete Ricketts are pushing for a new prison rather than spending almost as much to upgrade the current penitentiary.

“Invest \$200 million in an old facility to get something that’s about 75% of what you want, invest \$230 million in a brand-new facility with a little bit more capacity. And it’s clean from the ground to the top. So, it’s pretty easy to run the numbers and see why it’s a much more cost-effective better value for the taxpayers,” Frakes said.

But some lawmakers have also been fighting for reform in who is incarcerated and for what crimes in the first place. Then there’s the on-going issue of staffing and a high turnover rate in personnel. That lack of personnel leads to an inability to offer the programs that are necessary for the incarcerated to complete before they are considered for parole. The lack of parole leads to overcrowding.

A new voice in the debate is Omaha Senator Terrell McKinney who replaced longtime watchdog and critic Ernie Chambers. He paid a surprise visit to the penitentiary during the water crisis.

He told Omaha TV station KETV that “a water main breaking doesn’t justify a new prison and not keeping up maintenance doesn’t either.” His suggestion, “invest in people and keep up the maintenance that you have money for.”

McKinney, who represents a district in North Omaha, has been a vocal advocate for the needs of imprisoned Nebraskans and broader criminal justice reform.

He’s part of a group of public officials from across state government that’s working with a nonprofit to analyze data and propose reforms.

The issue is more personal than political to him, he said, because he knows people inside. “It’s important to me because I’ve dealt with it since I was a kid,” McKinney said. “I visited my father in prison, and I have always had family and friends who’ve been in and out of the system.”

Frakes and Ricketts are pushing for a new \$230 million state prison designed to house about 1,600 inmates. They had wanted the Legislature’s Appropriations Committee to add \$100 million to the budget to get the ball rolling

on the project. Lawmakers agreed to \$15 million to study the situation.

During the recent special legislative session on redistricting, McKinney used his time on the floor to talk about overcrowding and understaffing in the prison system that has led to critical concerns for the safety of inmates and staff.

His bottom line, in which I concur, the current situation shows a lack of care and respect for those who are incarcerated. That needs to change.

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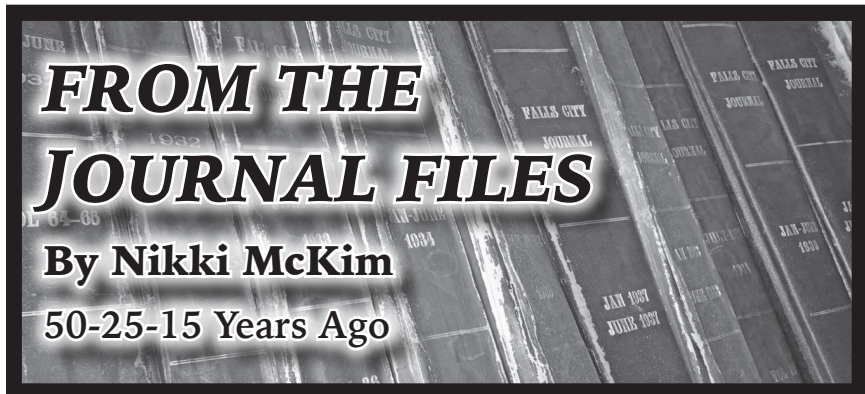
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50 years ago • November 10, 1971 - November 16, 1971

Jim Hill's opened a Hobby Craft Center in Seneca, KS. The Sacred Heart Irish, champions of the SE Border Conference, filled five berths on the league's All-Conference team. Bill Simon was chosen to fill two of the berths, backfield for both offense and defense; Steve Kottich was picked for the offensive line; John May was selected in the backfield and Mark May was chosen to the elite unit on the line. Humboldt and Southeast Consolidated each had two players selected, Tom Usher and Ray Snoko for Humboldt; and Jim Morris and Dough Anderson for Southeast.

Airman Vincent P. Riley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Riley, completed his air force basic training and was assigned to Sheppard AFB, TX.

A group of Falls City Veterans of World War I formed the "Optimist's club." With a less cheerful outlook, some other groups of World War I Veterans formed similar clubs, which they called the "Last Man" clubs. The Falls City group put some money in the kiddy, purchased a U.S. savings bond and the final survivor was to collect the loot.

The FC Irish FB team capped an undefeated season at Louisville by claiming a 26-12 victory over the hosts in the playoff game for the Galaxy conference championship. Herb Pokorny was the tackling leader with 14 tackles for the Irish.

President Richard Nixon announced an unknown serviceman killed in action in Vietnam might soon be buried at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. "We pray he will be the last," the president added. It was the 50th anniversary of the internment of the unknown, a soldier of World War I.

Special Agent James T. Burns of the Omaha office of the federal bureau of investigation was the principal speaker during the annual County Government Day.

Don Laney, superintendent of the Southeast Nebraska Telephone Company, was shot, but, luckily, the bullet was spent and he escaped with nothing more than a bruise on his arm. Sheriff L.D. Camblin was notified and combed the area looking for someone with a rifle near HWY 8, where Laney was standing near the phone company's storage shed. A search was done, but a bullet and person could not be located.

Master Chief Aviation Ordinance man Virgil L. Johnson a former resident of the Dawson Verdon area, was selected as the new master chief petty officer of the Atlantic fleet naval air force. He would be the principal advisor to Vice-Adm. Robert L. Townsend, commander of the fleet air force, on enlisted personal matters.

An estimated 1,500 were expected at Prichard auditorium for the annual Farmer-Merchant banquet.

Charlie Maze finished as the top offensive gainer for the Falls City Tigers FB team, Jim Mason was the leading tackler and Stan Kottich was second in both categories. Kottich and Maze were named representatives on the Twin Rivers All-Conference football team. The Tigers finished the season with three wins and six defeats, scoring 118 points while giving up 157.

Joe Heim, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ron Heim, won first place at the Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation convention when he sang a vocal solo.

Falls City Mercantile completed a 40x75 foot warehouse adding 3,000 square feet of storage. The addition had 800 square feet of dock space strictly for receiving incoming merchandise.

Debra Lee Hoover, 11, was awarded a President's scholarship to attend Nebraska Wesleyan. The scholarship was valued at \$2,000 (\$13,089 in 2021) for four years.

The DV girl's VB team survived the first day in the Peru State invitational with a two-set win over Columbus.

The Irish FB Team completed one of their most successful football campaigns, undefeated. The Irish finished 6-0-1. Rich Witt finished as the leading rusher for the Irish with 640 yards; Joe Fleskoski tossed the ball on offense 54 times.

25 years ago • November 10, 1996 - November 16, 1996

Ralph Huettner and Bob Steele were pictured leading a riderless black horse and boots turned backward in the stirrups in honor of World War II Veteran Henery Koenig, who had recently passed away. Koenig, for years, had ridden his horse in the Cobblestone Parade and Veterans Day parade.

The Irish FB team had a 24-14 quarterfinal victory in sub-freezing Shickley. The 11-0 Irish came in fast, getting three early touchdowns. QB Brandon Sells scored three touchdowns on three of their first four drives, running it from 26, 24 and 27 yards. He finished with a game-high 120 yards from 19 carries and 11 tackles.

For the third straight year, the Southeast Consolidated Mustang VB girls were headed to the state tournaments. Kim Behrends led the team with 418 kills and 166 blocks; Janelle Findlay had 274 kills and 83 blocks on the year.

The Dawson-Verdon Sunshine Club celebrated 80 years. The club, organized in 1916 with 20 members, had 11 members at the 80th celebration. President Carol Kean conducted the meeting.

Carol Bierman of the Richardson County canvassing board flipped the coin that landed on "heads," deciding the Third District county commissioner. Charlie Laux had called heads winning. Lou Glathar and Laux were tied at 736 votes.

Merle Veigel and Kevin Malone were the lucky winners who pooled their resources and bought the lucky ticket, randomly selected as the winner of the Ford F-150 pickup at the Farmer-Merchant Banquet. An estimated 1,400 attended the event.

Death row inmate Michael Ryan, who was convicted of first-degree murder in 1986, filed a second motion for post-conviction relief and was seeking a new trial.

The FC Tiger football team wrapped up their season at 5-4. Andy Armbruster was the leading offensive player leading the team in rushing, scoring and receiving. He scored 80 points, ten touchdowns rushing and two receiving. He had 688 yards from 136 carries. Defensively TC Tisdell was the leader finishing with a team-high of 80 tackles, 12 unassisted.

15 years ago • November 10, 2006 - November 16, 2006

A rash of burglaries hit Falls City. Assistant Police Chief Duane Armbruster was strongly urging citizens to call the FCPD if anyone noticed suspicious behavior.

Rod Vandenberg was elected mayor of Falls City when he defeated Hal Sutter by 133 votes, 916 to 783.

Falls City HS stand-out softball players Brittany Munoz and Hayley Milam were named to the Omaha World-Herald Class C First Team. FC had set a school record with 19 wins and was the first Tiger team to qualify for state. Munoz led FC in batting average, as well as slugging percentage. Milam was the team leader in steals.

The Veterans Memorial Park was dedicated at 7th and Harlan Street. Ken Coonce and Larry Whalen co-emceed.

The Falls City Sacred Heart Irish VB team celebrated their Class D2 championship after their four-game victory over Ewing. FCSH entered the tournament with a 17-11 record but hammered top-ranked and second-seeded Paxton in the opener, setting the tone for the weekend. Katelyn Wheeler was MVP of the tournament with 29-23 hitting, 22 kills, 14 blocks-12 of them aces, 21 digs, 22-22 serving with four aces.

FC Schools report four cases of COVID-19

Falls City Public Schools had four individuals test positive for COVID-19 on Thursday, November 4.

None of these cases are linked to each other through school and all of them are home isolating to prevent transmission of the virus. Three cases in North School and one in High School. Other illnesses are also circulating in the community and flu season is upon us.

Individuals should stay home when they have signs of illness and refer to their healthcare provider for care as there is not a direct health measure to follow.

Please take a moment to ask your child how they are feeling and respond to complaints as needed prior to sending them to school.

If an individual comes to school displaying or reporting symptoms such as fever of 100F or above, new cough, new onset of shortness of breath, or new loss of taste or smell; they will be sent home.

Prichard Auditorium in need of ADA compliant upgrades

sworn in until training is completed.

A request to move forward and accept bids to upgrade ADA requirements at Prichard Auditorium; parking, sidewalks and curbs.

Councilmember Derrick Leyden said Richardson County Clerk Mary Eickhoff reached out to him saying Prichard serves as a polling place for three different locations and an American's with Disabilities audit concluded that the Auditorium is not in compliance with ADA standards.

The main issue is the slope in front of the Auditorium. The recommendation is to flip back the parallel parking, put wheelchair/handicap spots in that location, and put diagonal parking across the street in front of Armbrusters along the south.

Parking wouldn't be lost, but the sidewalk to the street would need to be redone. Leyden said the sidewalks and approach to the Auditorium are in bad shape and may not handle another couple of years of being salted during the winter.

Leyden also suggested placing bollards that can be removed by the City when they need to plow snow. The cement at the entry in front of the Auditorium is being torn up when vehicles are being backed up to unload and load items during use when people don't use the loading dock.

The County Election Commission will be buying some Rubbermaid-like ramps to go over a lip as you approach the gymnasium floor and the City will be able to use them whenever needed to make that complaint.

Federal government funds through the county would help offset the upgrade costs; then, the City would cover the rest with reimbursement by Richardson County.

Jennifer Fisher requested a potbelly pig animal permit within city

limits. The Mayor opened a public hearing, nobody spoke on the matter besides Fisher.

Fisher said her pig was a miniature potbelly pig who doesn't go outside because he is litterbox trained. He has an area in the home. She told the council he should get between 75-100 pounds, depending on how much he's fed. The pig has seen a vet and gotten all of his shots.

Councilmember Amber Holle noted that she had received several emails from neighbors of Fisher with concerns who were opposing the situation.

"One of the things they were concerned about is property values just from having a pig in the neighborhood and I know we've previously approved one, but they did have a fence that was enclosed," said Holle. "Whereas I think you just have a chain-link fence, so they were worried about that. So they were just kind of concerned about how this was going to affect their peaceful neighborhood. So let me point out that there were several that were opposed to this."

Fisher said she wasn't planning on keeping the pig outdoors but in a full downstairs basement if it got bigger than she could handle.

The council voted four yeas, three nays and one absent. The motion carried.

Lucas Froeschl with Falls City EDGE requested that we change the North commercial corridor to a subdivision as a formality. EDGE owns the property and they're planning to sell lot two on the south and half of 33rd street platted there for a potential Street to the local CRA.

The permit from NDOT is currently on hold because the local city ordinance requires that this is a subdivision, so it needs to be subdivided and then NDOT should be able to re-send EDGE the permit. The motion carried.

Seeking Public Input Richardson County Needs Survey



Richardson County is seeking input from residents on how best to utilize the **\$1.5+ million ARPA funds**. Based on interim guidance from the U.S. Treasury funds can be used in the following main categories:

- Support public health expenditures, by, for example, funding COVID-19 mitigation efforts, medical expenses, behavioral healthcare, and certain public health and safety staff
- Address negative economic impacts caused by the public health emergency, including economic harms to workers, households, small businesses, impacted industries, and the public sector
- Replace lost public sector revenue, using this funding to provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the pandemic
- Provide premium pay for essential workers, offering additional support to those who have and will bear the greatest health risks because of their service in critical infrastructure sectors

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County residents encouraged to complete survey regarding use of \$1.5+ million in ARPA funds

The Richardson County Board of Commissioners met on Tuesday, November 2, 2021.

Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr. let the Commissioners know the engineering firm is working on completing the bid specifications for the asphalt projects to be done next year.

A notification was received from the State of Nebraska Board of Classifications and Standards approving the reclassification of a road from minimum maintenance to local classification as requested by the County in Resolution 2021-2022-14. The road begins at the southwest corner of Section 31, Township 2 North, Range 13 East running east for one half (1/2) mile or on 708 Road from 630 Avenue, running 1/2 mile east.

The Commissioners went into executive session to discuss possible litigation and protect the public interest with County Attorney Doug Merz, Deputy County Attorney Samantha Scheitel, Sheriff Hardesty and Roland Merwin, Chief Deputy Sheriff.

At the close of the executive session Austin Duerfeldt, ARPA Funds Administrator for Richardson County, met with the Board.

Duerfeldt told the Commissioners that the expense for the installation of the new water pipe and sewer pipe within the Courthouse would be eligible for funding through the ARPA funds. A discussion was also held regarding the possibility of continued legislation on the ARPA funds through H.R. 5735 introduced to Congress in the past week, which would offer more options for using the ARPA funds to benefit the County.

A news release will be put out requesting County residents to complete a survey regarding the use of the ARPA funds, which will be accessible online, on the Richardson County website www.co.richardson.ne.us or by obtaining a paper copy at the Richardson County Clerk's Office at the Courthouse, Room 205 in Falls City.

The surveys should be completed and returned by November 30.

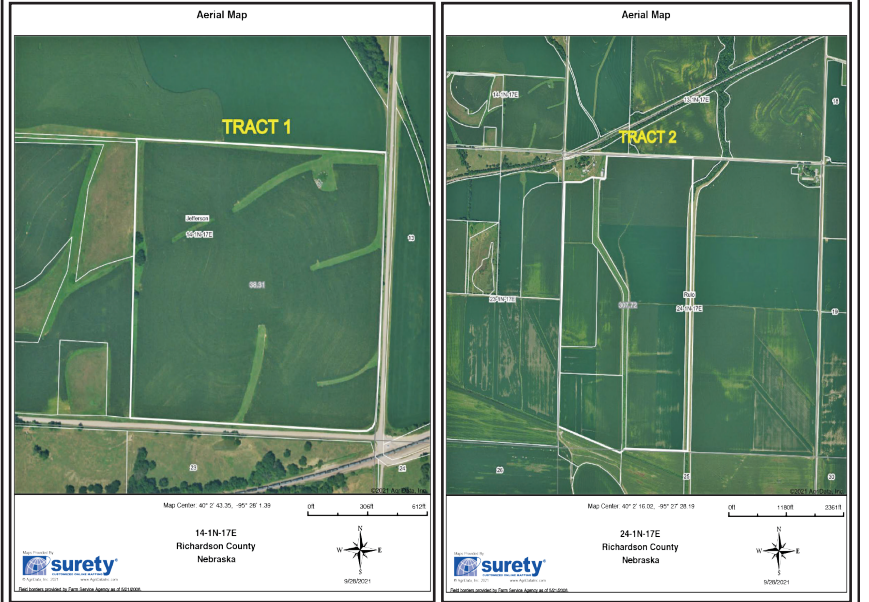
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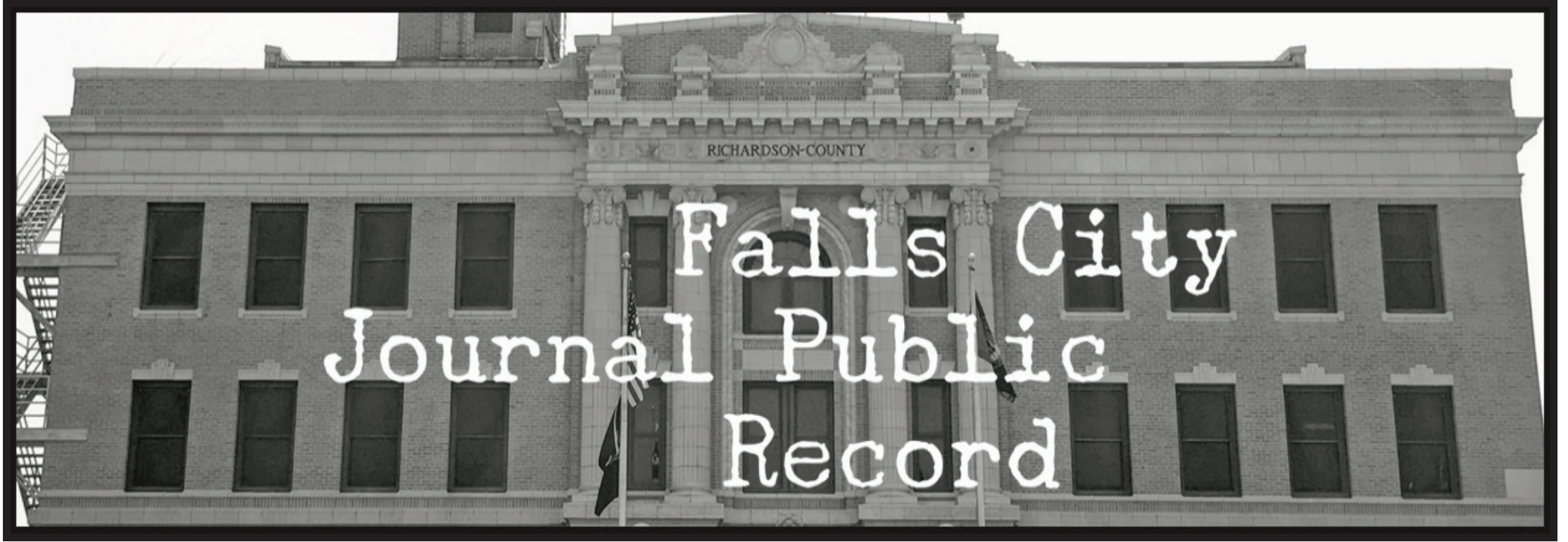

Gifford, count one, possess controlled substance, amended to attempt of a class four felony, plead guilty, found guilty; count two, possess controlled substance, amended to attempt of a class four felony, plea changed to guilty, found guilty; count three, possess or obtain legend drugs, plead not guilty, count dropped/dismissed; count four, possess or obtain legend drugs, plead not guilty, amended to count dropped/dismissed; count five, unlawful acts relating to drugs, plead not guilty, amended to count dropped/dismissed; count six, unlawful acts relating to drugs, plead not guilty, amended to count dropped/dismissed; count seven, possess marijuana one ounce or less-first offense, plead not guilty, amended to count dropped/dismissed; count eight, possess or use drug paraphernalia, plead not guilty, amended to count dropped/dismissed. Sentencing is scheduled for January 4, 2022.

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I'm sick of writing it and you're sick of reading it. Nebraska played well enough again to stay in the game but not quite good enough to win the contest. The Huskers have not had an easy go this season, playing four teams ranked in the top ten and rated as the 11th most challenging schedule in college football. The Big Red has lost all four of those contests against the highly-rated opponents by a total of 21 points. On Saturday, the nine-point loss to Ohio St. is the most significant margin of defeat in all four of those contests.

Ohio St. came into the game averaging over 47 points per game; the Blackshirts held them to 26; that's a win. The problem, as it has been most of the season, is the offense and special teams. The offense converted only 2-13 third-down opportunities and special teams missed two more field goals this week, one from 45 yards and another, a 31-yard chip shot. What is going on there? Nebraska has sent many kickers to the NFL over the years; why all of a sudden can we not recruit a kid who can make 30-40-yard field goals on the regular?

Then there is QB Adrian Martinez. He has missed wide-open targets all season, usually overthrowing them and Saturday was no different. I know Coach Frost recruited Martinez and Adrian has played through multiple injuries during his time, but enough is enough. Let's move on. Maybe not this year, we don't want to ruin a redshirt at this point, but Frost needs to make sure Martinez understands this won't be his team next season if he chooses to come back to the program.

The Big Red can't seem to catch a break, whether it's a blown call by the referees or a fumble by an opponent they can't seem to quite fall on. Some say it's bad luck; others say you make your own luck. Nebraska is as close as you can get to being a good team without being a very good team. Can you imagine where the Huskers would be right now without all of the special team's mistakes? Fielding punts inside the ten-yard line, punts that travel less than 15 yards, missed field goals, they all add up to losses.

I'm not sure what will happen at the end of the season as far as the coaching staff goes. Frost needs to get out of the way of his own arrogance and make some changes on the team and the staff if he wants to retain his coaching duties. My gut says he gets another year, partly because of what he's owed on his contract.

My predictions for the next two games are as follows, Nebraska beats both Wisconsin and Iowa. The Big Red go into Camp Randall Stadium on November 20 and silence the fans. I can't wait to hear the play-by-play analysts talk about 'how cool' the student section while listening to Jump Around between the third and fourth quarters. Nebraska 35-21.

It's going to be even better against Iowa. The Blackshirts will hold the Hawkeyes to single digits as the Big Red ends the season with a 17-9 win in Lincoln.

little gas left in their tank, winning set four 25-19 and then completing the comeback by winning the fifth set, 15-9. It was the second season in a row that the Irish sent HSF home from the NSAA state tourney with a loss.

In the first set, Sacred Heart led early at 2-1; however, that would be their only lead of the opener. Finding themselves in an unfamiliar position, the Irish battled all set, keeping it close throughout. With a 24-23, the Flyers sealed the first set with a kill, giving the Irish their first loss of a set at state, 25-23.

Trailing for the first time, it was time to see how the Irish would respond. The Flyers raced out to an early 11-7 lead, but the Irish tied things up a 4-0 run. With the score tied at 13, the Irish went on a 12-4 run to even the match up with a 25-17 win.

Set three again belonged to the Flyers. Sacred Heart held an early 4-1 lead, but HSF stormed back to tie the set at eight. The Flyers began to pull away and took a 2-1 lead with a 25-17 third-set win.

Facing elimination, the Irish showed some grit. Erison Vonderschmidt scored the first three points of the set for the Irish with kills. Olivia Eickhoff took over halfway through the set, securing five kills as the Irish held on for the 25-19 win.

In the winner-take-all fifth

set, the Irish never trailed. Vonderschmidt put the Irish up early, 3-1, with a kill that sent the ball into the stands. Kills by Taylor Frederick and Vonderschmidt put SH ahead 10-6. An ace block by Vonderschmidt and a kill by London Nachtigal put the Irish within one point of the title at 14-8.

Fittingly, the Irish won the title on a kill by Vonderschmidt, her 27th of the match.

"I'm just so proud of them altogether, all the way around," said Coach Emma Ebel. "It could have gone one of two

worked for. I just changed my mindset and it worked out."

In her first two seasons as coach, Ebel has won a state championship and finished third. What's next for the Irish?

"I don't know, hopefully, the same thing," said Ebel. "That's about all we can do. I just have to commemorate these girls and this team and my assistants. I came in with a lot of big ideas and a lot of changes and they all just absorbed it. We have a phenomenal support system and I have a phenomenal support system in my personal life that makes it possible for me to do this

job. These girls give me more than I can ask for, and so really, it's all for them."

Rachel Magdanz and Erison Vonderschmidt were named to the All-Tournament team by the *Journal Star*. Vonderschmidt had 58 kills and 15 blocks in three matches and Magdanz added 69 assists and 19 kills.

The Irish end their season with a 35-2 record.

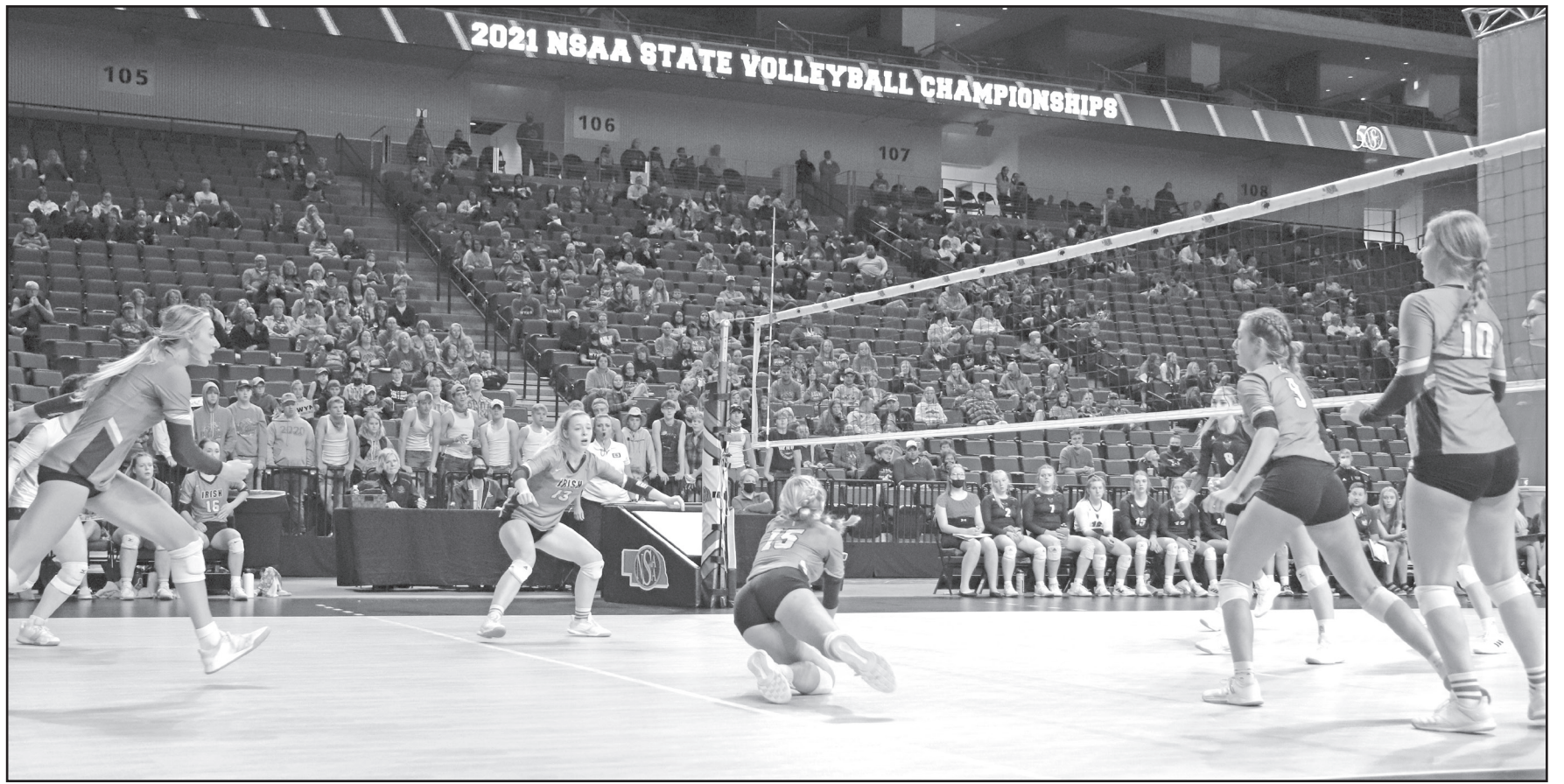

The Falls City Tiger volleyball wrapped up the 2021 campaign with a season-record number of wins, finishing at 24-7. FC had a season-best six-game winning streak from the end of August to early September. The Tigers also never lost more than two games in a row and that happened just one time. The Lady Tigers had their season end in the second round of sub-districts against the Fairbury Jeffs. A full house greeted the Tigers as they raced onto the court for the final time.

The Tigers got off to a fast start, winning their first five games of the season. FC placed second in three tournaments this fall, at the Southern Invitational, at the Johnson County Invite and at the Falls City Invitational. The Tiger JV team also had a successful season, wrapping up the year undefeated.

team with 204 kills. Reece McNeely was close behind with 180, RaeAnn Thompson finished with 162 and Chase Nolte added 156.

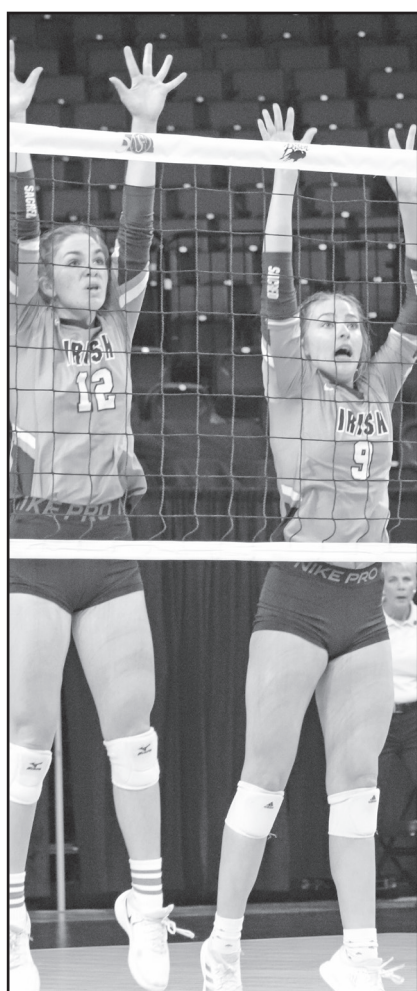
Ashleigh Kirkendall handled the bulk of the playmaking, finishing with 591 assists, which puts her close to 1,000 for her career.

Falls City fell to Fairbury in the sub-district final in three sets, 25-16, 25-18 and 25-16, seeing their magical season come to an end.

"When our season ended at home, during the sub-districts, we were all heartbroken. It was hard to see a season like this end, especially after accomplishing so much. This team will go down as one of the best volleyball teams to play at Falls City High School and I'm so honored to have coached these amazing girls," said Haines. "I want to say thank you to my three seniors. I started off as your freshman coach and you three worked so hard and were great leaders for our team. We wouldn't have had this success without you."

Falls City will have a few spots to fill next season, but will return five starters and hope to continue a new winning tradition for the Falls City Volleyball program.

Tomb of Unknown Soldier marks Centennial

High Honors Paid Soldier – Body of Dead War Hero Laid at Rest in Arlington Cemetery, Entire World Pays Tribute - *The Humboldt News*, Friday, November 18, 1921

"A plain soldier unknown but weighted with honor as perhaps no American before him because he died for the flag in France, was laid to rest in Arlington cemetery Armistice Day. The ceremony was the most impressive ever witnessed in this country.

Scrolled across the marble arch, which stands like a monument behind his tomb, runs this legend: "We here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain."

The highest officers of the army and navy walked beside his coffin to its last resting place and none but the hands of gallant comrades of the great war laid lands upon it. President Harding walked behind his bier to do him homage; former President Wilson made his first public appearance in months.

The entire ceremonies, coming on the eve of the great conference, seemed to pledge to the unknown that he had not died in vain. In a stirring funeral oration in the presence of the arms parley delegates President Harding called upon the nations of the world to make the unknown soldier's ceremonies the inauguration of a new understanding that will make future wars impossible."

The Tomb of the Unknown Soldier has served as the heart of Arlington National Cemetery for the past 100 years. Since November 11, 1921, the Tomb has been a final resting place for America's unidentified World War I service members and Unknowns from later wars were added in 1958 and 1984.

This historic monument is dedicated to the deceased United States service members whose remains have not been identified.

As a sacred memorial site and the grave of three unknown American service members, the Tomb connects visitors with the legacy of the United States armed forces throughout the nation's history.

When the Tomb was dedicated, Carl M. Lang who was said to be Nebraska's most decorated soldier at the time was selected by William Richie, Jr. State Commander of the American Legion, to represent the State of Nebraska at the burial services of the unknown soldier killed in France.

CDC and FDA authorize Pfizer-BioNTech's COVID-19 Vaccine for Children 5-11 Years old

On Tuesday, November 2, 2021, the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) of the Center of Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) issued a recommendation for the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine for children ages 5 through 11. The CDC announcement follows the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) authorization of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine for emergency use in children 5 through 11 years of age on October 29, 2021. This recommendation applies to all children of age 5 through 11, including those with underlying conditions and previous COVID infection.

The vaccine was found to be 90.7% effective against symptomatic COVID disease. ACIP voted unanimously for the vaccine and stated that the "safety and efficacy data were clear, and that benefits of the vaccine overwhelmingly outweigh the risks of COVID disease."

There are about 28 million children between the ages of 5 and 11 in the U.S. Nearly 2 million cases of COVID-19 have involved children in this age group since the start of the pandemic, and approximately 8,300 (0.4%) of these cases resulted in hospitalization.

Vaccine Administration: The Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine for children 5 through 11 years of age is administered as a two-dose series, 3 weeks apart, but at a lower dose (0.2 mL) than the dose used for individuals 12 years of age and older (0.3 mL).

COVID-19 vaccine dosage does not vary by patient weight but by age on the day of vaccination. If a child turns from 11 to 12 years of age in between their first and second dose and receives the pediatric Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine for their second dose, they do not need to repeat the dose.

Distribution of pediatric vaccinations across the country has already started, and some shipments are expected to arrive in Nebraska this week. Vaccines will be available at pediatric healthcare provider offices, pharmacies, Federally Qualified Health Centers, local health departments, and more.

Vaccine Effectiveness: Compared to adults, children are at a lower risk of becoming severely ill with COVID-19. However, they can be still infected with the virus. Getting your child vaccinated can help protect them against COVID-19.

Data obtained from State Health Information Exchange and Nebraska State Immunization Information System (NESIIS) show that Nebraskans who are not fully vaccinated are 10 times more likely to be hospitalized with COVID-19.

Dr. Matthew Donahue, Nebraska's Acting State Epidemiologist, comments, "Pediatric COVID-19 vaccinations are now available, and parents should be reassured that vaccinations are safe, that they work, and that they are the best way to protect ourselves and our children. We encourage Nebraskans to visit with their doctor about

the vaccine."

Parents are encouraged to discuss any questions they may have with their pediatrician, school nurse, or pharmacist to learn more about the vaccine and to make an informed decision about getting their children vaccinated.

Side Effects: The vaccine's safety was studied in approximately 3,100 children ages 5 through 11 who received the vaccine, and no serious side effects, including myocarditis, Bell's palsy, anaphylaxis, or death, were detected. Vaccine recipients were followed for safety for at least 2 months after the second dose.

Side effects occurred within two days of vaccination, were generally mild to moderate in severity, and included soreness at the site, headaches, muscle aches and low-grade fevers, fatigue, nausea, and decreased appetite, which are common in the adult population. More side effects were reported after the second dose than after the first dose. These side effects are normal signs that the body is building protection, and most of them should go away within a day or two.

Cases of myocarditis (inflammation of the heart muscle) and pericarditis (inflammation of tissue surrounding the heart) have been reported following vaccination of children ages 12 through 17 years of age. These reactions are rare; in one study, the risk of myocarditis after the second dose of Pfizer-BioNTech in the week following vaccination was around 54 cases per million doses administered to males ages 12-17 years. In general, people who developed these conditions following COVID-19 vaccination responded well to medical treatment and rest and recovered.

Serious side effects are rare, but may occur. Parents/caregivers may enroll their children in v-safe, a free, smartphone-based tool that uses text messaging and web surveys to provide personalized health check-ins. Through v-safe, parents can report how their child is feeling after being vaccinated.

Ongoing Safety Monitoring: Pfizer Inc. has updated its safety monitoring plan to include evaluation of myocarditis, pericarditis and other events of interest in children 5 through 11 years of age. In addition, the FDA and the CDC will continue to monitor COVID-19 vaccine safety and investigate potential safety problems.

Additionally, patients, caregivers, and vaccine providers are also asked to report adverse events after vaccination to the Vaccine Adverse Event Reporting System (VAERS), even if it is not clear that the vaccine caused the adverse event. CDC reviews all of the information and reports any serious adverse reactions.

The family prefers memorials be made to her church.




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

On Thursday, November 4, both varsity Rocket League teams competed in the NSES Division 3 Postseason Tournament. Both teams finished the regular season with a 10-3 re-

cord and were seeded #4 and #5 in a field of thirteen. After winning their first round matches, the two Falls City teams had to play each other in round two for a chance to go to the NSES Final Four State Tournament hosted by Concordia University in Seward, NE, on Saturday, November 20. FC 1 will face #1 Kearney Catholic (12-0) on Nov. 20. The other two teams will be David City 1 (12-0) vs David City 2 (11-1).

Falls City's Team 1 consisted of Peyton Brown, Ethan Boatright, and Eric Heinzelman, with Ryker McCullough as the Team 1 sub. Team 2 consisted of Kyler Frederick, Chase Simpson, Braxton Harmon, and Cayden Dunkhas and Chase Brown as the Team 2 subs.

This marks the second year in a row the FCPS ESports Program has qualified a team for the Fall Season State Tournament. Last year, the Overwatch team qualified and placed 4th at the state tournament.

The NSES is in its fourth year (second year for Falls City), and it continues to grow across the state, along with high school ESports across the county. Falls City was one of the first ten teams to join and this year there are almost fifty teams with schools from all parts of the state being represented. Falls City currently has around forty students in Grades 7-12 participating in their ESports Program throughout the year.

This Fall, FCPS graduate and Wayne State Freshmen, Jared Hawley, who captained last year's Overwatch team, earned the opportunity to compete and start on Wayne State's Collegiate Overwatch Team.

This winter, the NSES will be competing in Mario Kart on Nintendo Switch, and the FCPS ESports Program will also be competing in League of Legends matches against other Nebraska Schools, as well as preparing for the Spring Season when they compete in Smash Ultimate, Starcraft 2, and Smite.
