## City Council approves emergency repair of engine at FC Power Plant

During its Wed., Nov. 17 meeting, the City Council approved the final reading of an ordinance to declare a public emergency for the immediate repair of engine number five at the Falls City Power Plant, waiving the estimate of cost and advertising for bids.

The first and second reading

of the ordinance was suspended due to the emergent nature of the issue.

The ordinance declared A Public Emergency Pursuant To Neb. Rev. Stat. 17-568.01 For The Immediate Repair Of Engine #5 At The Falls City Power Plant, Waiving The Estimate Of Cost And Advertising For Bids And Authorizing The Mayor To Enter Into Such Contract Immediately Upon Passage And Posting Of This Emergency Ordinance As Provided By Neb. Rev. Stat. 17-613.

Ray Luhring explained why this was an emergent ordinance. He explained that with engine five being out of commission if Falls City was in a situation where the

## Sheriff continues discussion of dispatching services with County Commissioners

The regular meeting of the Richardson County Board of Commissioners was called to order by Vice-Chairman Caverzagie at 9:00 a.m. on Tuesday, November 16, 2021. Commissioner Sickel was absent.

The Board approved the minutes of the November 9, 2021 meeting, as well as the agenda as posted.

Sheriff Hardesty and Chief Deputy Roland Merwin discussed with the Board regarding the dispatching services being provided by Southeast Communications 911 Dispatch out of Beatrice. Sheriff Hardesty relayed to the Board some of the problems that have occurred with the dispatching services. The Board requested that Sheriff Hardesty begin and continue to attend the monthly Southeast Communications 911 Center Beatrice Advisory Committee meetings to relay to them his concerns with the dispatching problems that have been experienced so that they may be resolved.

A report submitted by Sheriff Hardesty for fees collected during October 2021 totaling \$5,192.18 was approved.

Mark Joy and Mark Novak representing Humboldt Shares, Inc., presented the quarterly report for the organization. Humboldt Shares, Inc. is planning to develop a microloan program, develop and update the website, improve social media contact and possibly install an outdoor sign on the north edge of Humboldt. Officers for the organization this year are Mark Novak, President;

There is no time like the present, right? Let's try it. Here are some things this Prairie Doc is feeling particularly thankful for this year:



The words of the Apostle Paul to the Thessalonians were simple and direct. "Give thanks in all circumstances." (1 Thess. 5:18 NIV)

They should give us pause as we celebrate Thanksgiving 2021, after 18 months of tension and division as some struggle to find reasons to be grateful. Mask or no mask. Vaccine or no vaccine. Go back to work. Wait for the next stimulus check. Is the pandemic over yet?

Marcus Aurelius, recognized as the last of Five Good

Emperors of Rome, boiled it down to the simplest terms. "What a precious privilege it is to be alive – to breathe, to think, to enjoy, to love." He was emperor from 161 to 180 A.D.



**50 Years Ago • November 24, 1971 to November 30, 1971**

The Friends of the Library received a \$500 grant from the Nebraska Arts Council and was midway through a campaign for matching funds, which would be used to purchase a painting done by John P. Falter.

Don Harmon was named president of the Reformers Car Club, Inc. Larry Chesnut was named vice-president and Tony Turner was named secretary-treasurer.

It was announced that a blast of the fire siren would announce the arrival and signal the opening of the merchant's window opening for the Christmas shopping season and the arrival of Santa Claus in Falls City the day after Thanksgiving by Navy Carrier.

Continental Care Centers Inc. planned to construct a 118-bed nursing center in Falls City. Construction was set to begin as soon as January 1, 1972. The new facility was set to be located just northwest of the proposed new National Guard Armory at the western outskirts of Falls City on land being purchased from Towle Realty.

A bequest of \$5,000 to Sts. Peter and Paul's Catholic Church was contained in the will of the late Mrs. Frances Buchholz.

Proposed changes were approved in the routing of US 73 at Verdon and Prichard Corner for swinging the highway just south of its location to bypass the south edge of Verdon and improve the curvature at Prichard Corner.

The Cornhuskers, Johnny Rodgers and Jerry Tagge beat the Oklahoma Sooners 35-31. Threatened with having their 20-game winning streak broken, the Cornhuskers went 74 yards for the winner, with Jeff Kinney covering 50 yards on seven carries and Rodgers making a diving catch of an 11-yard third-down Tagge pass at the OK 35.

Heavy snow was projected for the area.

The Falls City Tigers were looking to open their season against Syracuse in one of three straight home games. Tom Aitken Jr. assisted coach Lindquist; the freshman coach was Don Apley, while Dennis Walters and Louis Fritz coached Junior High.

The Sacred Heart Irish hoped to extend their good luck into the basketball season. Returning lettermen for the year were Ron Hill, Mike Hoy, John May, Bill Simon and Mike Marx. Coach Bill Jenkins was in his second year at the helm.

Thomas Bentley was awarded a Hyer scholarship at the School of the Ozarks at Point Lookout, MO.

The Associated Press reported that the cost of feeding a girl from infancy until 18 years old was \$8,300, while the cost of feeding a boy from infancy until 18 years old was \$8,900.

The Humboldt Cardinals saw eight lettermen returning to their 1971-1972 basketball squad. Of the lettermen, only three were seniors, Dave Farwell, Vann Prater and Tom Isher.

District Judge William F. Colwell authorized the sale of the bank building of the defunct Bank of Salem.

**25 Year Ago • November 24, 1996 to November 30, 1996**

Leah Harmon, a sophomore at Humboldt High School, won the district Veterans of Foreign Wars Voice of Democracy contest.

Squaw Creek saw over 430,000 snow geese and 50,000 ducks (mostly mallards) headed south. Hoards of deer and ten bald eagles were also stopped at the refuge.

Cody Beckner, Andy Dean, Shannon, Taylor and Chance Huppert and Angie Beckner and the Falls City Jaycees filled dozens of wrapped shoeboxes with gifts to be delivered before Christmas to children in need throughout the world.

Fourteen members of the Good News Assembly of God Church encouraged everyone to hear the stories of their mission trip to Haiti. Mid Bauer called it the "toughest job you'll ever love."

Crews were about to finish repairs from flood damage due to the 1992 floods. For over four years, the commissioners, road department and various county offices were working on completing the paperwork and repairs.

Brandon Sells, the junior quarterback, linebacker and punter for FCSH, he led his team to an 11-1 record and second straight Pioneer Conference Championship was named the Athlete of the Fall. Sells rushed for 811 yards from 132 attempts and was 52-106 passing for 1,036 yards, 13 TDs and six interceptions.

Janelle Findlay, a hitter for Southeast Consolidated, who led the team to a district championship and state tournament berth, was named Athlete of the Fall. She ended the season with 282 kills from 533 of 566, hitting with just 33 errors; she was 94 percent accurate hitting. Just under half the time, her attempts turned into kills.

Band and music teacher John Svoboda and seventh-grade teacher Marie Parsons were named to the middle school staff spotlight for the month.

Senior hitter for Dawson-Verdon, Stephanie Dunlap, led the DV volleyball team in hits, blocks and digs during their 9-18 fall season. Dunlap was 218-315, hitting with 82 aces, 70 blocks and 399 digs.

Cassie Gottula, Katie Hinrichs and Lisa Palmer were named Falls City Middle School students of the month.

**15 Years Ago • November 24, 2006 to November 30, 2006**

Verdon Volunteer Fire Department Chief Jim Cummins presented a plaque of appreciation to Glenn Lundy. Lundy was recognized for his role in establishing the Verdon Rural Fire Protection District and for 59 years of dedication and distinguished service to the Verdon Volunteer Fire Department.

Mike Simon finished runner-up for the second time in just seven opens as he watched his son Jake, the Thanksgiving Golf Open's all-time money winner, take the top prize for the second time. Jake Simon shot 38-35, 71- net 61, edging his old man (43-39, 75 - net 62).

In his 'Hanging' Out the Warsh' column, Bill Schock apologized to Brian Daake for his "lucky" purchase of the vehicle winning raffle ticket during the Chamber of Commerce Banquet. # City Council approves emergency repair of engine at FC Power Plant

13KV system or 138KV system separated from the other system, "we wouldn't have the capacity to generate and fulfill and get out and supply our 4160 circuits. So we need this engine repaired and we need to repair it quickly," said Luhning.

He said in case of emergency or catastrophe; they would be able to supply all citizens within the community. The internal engine oil pump sheared the shaft and when it did, it stopped getting oil to the bearings. The bearings got hot and then it suffered a crankshaft explosion.

The engine damaged was not the new engine; it was an engine from the early 1950s and with such antiquated and old controls, it doesn't have an alarm for these types of things or the ability to shut down for everything that happens.

A representative from Fairview Mechanical said it would take 40 days to get back up.

The Mayor is authorized to enter into a contract for repairs with Fairview Mechanical in the amount of \$313,796.20. The ordinance took effect immediately.

During the Mayor's report, Mayor Bindle congratulated the Falls City Sacred Heart volleyball team on their recent state championship.

City Administrator Kevin Cluskey told the Council he had been in contact with Grant Brueggemann at the Southeast District Health Department about the sharp rise in COVID cases in Richardson County over the past 14 days. So as a reminder to the community Cluskey encouraged everyone to take the proper precautions in public and vaccinate if that is what you choose to do.

Police Chief Jamie Baker requested the Council authorize the Falls City Police Department to add an additional officer position. Chief Baker said with the current staffing struggles all law enforcement agencies are experiencing, he believed adding this position would strengthen the department for the future and attract qualified applicants who are looking to work with the Falls City Police Department. The Council voted unanimously to approve the request.

Ray Luhning addressed the Council about the ongoing issue of relocating the 20-inch water main that comes from Rulo to Falls City. It's attached to the Burlington Northern Santa Fe railroad bridge west of Preston and the bridge needs to be replaced.

"Burlington Northern has requested that we get off of it and maintain that we stay off of it," said Luhning.

Approximately 3,200 feet of water main will have to be relocated at their request. After a discussion with Burlington Northern's Engineer, Chris Miller and Luhning were able to come to an agreement where the railroad would reimburse the city for 89 percent of the cost of the project. Luhning said it could be a million-dollar project.

"So even with this agreement that we got before if the entire thing went and it went clear to the end with both phases. Burlington Northern's share would be \$89,890. Falls City Utilities share would be \$11,110," said Luhning.

The Council accepted the recommendations of the Falls City Volunteer Fire Department and approved the appointments of Matt Beer as Fire Chief, Jon McQueen as First Assistant Chief, and Timothy Daniels as Second Assistant Chief. The recommendations were forwarded to the Council following the annual meeting of the Volunteers. Other officers of the Volunteers President, Brian Vice; Vice President, Bob Kirkendall; Secretary, Trevor Wisdom and Jon McQueen, Treasurer.


He was preceded in death by parents Henry and Frieda Fritz and six siblings.



# Nebraska needs good infrastructure and bipartisan solutions

Let's talk needs versus wants, particularly as it relates to two packages under consideration in Congress the \$1.2 trillion bipartisan infrastructure package and a \$1.75 trillion budget reconciliation bill. Infrastructure is a need. A big social spending and climate bill is a president's want.

Our communities, state and nation are still recovering from the economic and personal hits we took during the pandemic and in Nebraska, historic floods just prior. Now, we face record deficit spending, spiking inflation, a workforce crisis and supply shortages.

We need good roads. We need broadband for everyone in all corners of every state. We need clean water and fewer lead-contaminated pipes. We need to expand port capacity. We need safe, secure transportation systems to get both products to market and people to good jobs and back home to their families. Everyone knows our current federal funding system for infrastructure is not keeping up with our needs. This type of package is at least 10 years in the making.

In fact, our unquestionable need for good infrastructure drove lawmakers of both parties to work on a solution a bipartisan infrastructure package that a clear majority of all voters support, regardless of party.

Here's what bipartisan work delivers: A fully paid plan without raising taxes or growing the national debt. Direct investment in physical infrastructure, not new government programs. Jobs (at least 500,000 by some accounts). Greater energy independence and homeland security. Investment in physical structures

that hold long-term value and helps curb inflation. Nebraska, alone, would receive \$3 billion for roads, bridges, broadband, transit, electric grid, water and air travel improvements.

The budget reconciliation bill being negotiated by Democrats in the U.S. House of Representatives is a list of wants. Even in its pared back form at \$1.75 trillion, the package significantly grows social spending programs to include universal pre-K, extended childcare, earned income and Affordable Care Act credits, expanded Medicare, and more. Importantly, it would be all at the cost of a host of new tax burdens that diminish the competitiveness of U.S. businesses, particularly those operating overseas.

No question, these are certainly critical issues worth Congress's attention, but why not the bipartisan Congressional approach that delivered a measured, focused infrastructure plan that is proven to deliver results and is paid for within our means?

The NE Chamber supports the bipartisan infrastructure package. We question whether the budget reconciliation bill, with far from same level of bipartisan scrutiny and collaboration, truly reflects the needs of our nation.

Let's face our issues head on, but let's be judicious, work together and do it right. Let's do it without thrusting our nation into further debt, increasing the cost of doing business, hurting job growth, and increasing the cost of living overall especially when our families and our employees are finally seeing a path to recovery.


