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Three dead in head on collision on Hwy 75

On Wednesday, August 17, 2022, at approximately 3:08 p.m., the Richardson County Sheriff's Office was dispatched to a two-vehicle injury accident on US Highway 75, two miles north of the Kansas State line.

When deputies arrived on scene, they found two vehicles that had collided head-on. One vehicle, a Kia Forte with two occupants, was occupied by 82 year-old Dennis Podliska and 80 year-old Ramona Podliska of Lincoln, NE. The other vehicle, a Chevy Blazer with one occupant, was occupied by 74 year-old Patricia Tonar of Omaha, NE.

When law enforcement arrived on scene, all occupants were deceased.

The Richardson County Sheriff's Office, the Nebraska Department of Transportation, Nebraska State Patrol, Humboldt Fire and Rescue, Richardson County Emergency Management, Dawson Fire, Kansas Highway Patrol, Sabetha Fire and Rescue and some citizens assisted at the scene.

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CDC updates COVID-19 guidelines

CDC is streamlining its COVID-19 guidance to help people better understand their risk, how to protect themselves and others, what actions to take if exposed to COVID-19, and what actions to take if they are sick or test positive for the virus. COVID-19 continues to circulate globally, however, with so many tools available to us for reducing COVID-19 severity, there is significantly less risk of severe illness, hospitalization and death compared to earlier in the pandemic.

"We're in a stronger place today as a nation, with more tools—like vaccination, boosters, and treatments—to protect ourselves, and our communities, from severe illness from COVID-19," said Greta Massetti, PhD, MPH, MMWR author. "We also have a better understanding of how to protect people from being exposed to the virus, like wearing high-quality masks, testing, and improved ventilation. This guidance acknowledges that the pandemic is not over, but also helps us move to a point where COVID-19 no longer severely disrupts our daily lives."

In support of this update CDC is: Continuing to promote the importance of being up to date with vaccination to protect people against serious illness, hospitalization, and death. Protection provided by

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Twenty Seasons

Myths associated with urinary incontinence

As a practicing urologist who is double board certified in urology and female pelvic medicine and reconstructive surgery, I see a lot of patients with urinary incontinence. And while it is extremely common, many myths surround the topic. Sadly, even though more patients in the U.S. suffer from overactive bladder than diabetes, there is very little education surrounding incontinence and other pelvic floor disorders.

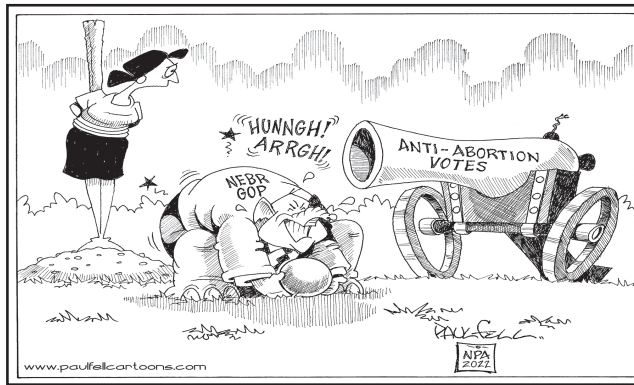
One common misconception I hear is "you have to drink eight glasses of water." Says who? Was it your doctor? Maybe. There are a few medical conditions where you need to drink extra water, kidney stones being one of them. However, the more you drink, the more you urinate. So, if you are having urinary issues, the first step is likely to cut back on fluids and simply drink when you are thirsty.

It is also important to note that some bladder medications can be dangerous. Anticholinergics are the most prescribed group of medications for urinary leakage with urgency and overactive bladder. Recent studies have shown an association between these drugs and dementia. If you take these drugs, you may be up to 50 percent more likely to get dementia. The risk increases with age and with longer medication use. The good news is there are newer, safer medications available, which are often covered by your insurance. Be sure to review your medication list with your doctor and confirm if the medications you are taking are right for you.

Additionally, not all bladder leakage is the same. There are several types, and they are treated differently. If you leak with activity, like coughing, laughing, sneezing or exercise, a simple office procedure or same day surgery may be appropriate. On the other hand, if you are making constant trips to the bathroom or having leakage with a strong urge to urinate, a medication, Botox injection or implantable bladder pacemaker may be the answer. Keeping a bladder diary of how much you drink, when you urinate, and what you are doing at the time of leakage can be a tool to help determine which type of leakage you have. Bladder diaries are free and available online or may be provided by your doctor.

Lastly, I wish more people knew that incontinence is not normal. It is not a part of aging that must be accepted, or a consequence of childbirth that cannot be helped. If you or someone you know suffers from urinary incontinence or other pelvic floor disorders, please talk to your urologist. There are many treatments available to help you improve your quality of life.

LAWMAKERS CAN'T MUSTER ENOUGH VOTES FOR A SPECIAL SESSION ON ABORTION

The Nebraska Legislature will not call a special session to amend the state's abortion laws. In the end, it wasn't about killing babies or giving women a choice. It was about numbers.

Yes, numbers. That cold, hard political fact that one side didn't have the 33 votes they would need — by the rules of the Legislature — to stop an expected filibuster that would delay passage of the bill.

Lawmakers failed to pass a so-called trigger bill during the last regular session that would have kicked in if the United States Supreme Court overturned *Roe v. Wade*. When the decision was made, speculation was strong that a special session might be called.

But Speaker of the Legislature Mike Hilgers subsequently sent Governor Pete Ricketts a letter stating that 30 state senators would vote for legislation that would have prohibited abortions starting at 12 weeks. Thirty-three votes were needed to overcome a filibuster and pass legislation. The state's current statute restricts abortion at and after 20 weeks.

Following his announcement several weeks ago that he wouldn't call a special session, Ricketts said "Nebraskans need to have more conversations on the value we place on human life so more meaningful protections can be passed in our state."

"Abortion bans aren't popular. Any time government tries to come between a patient and a doctor — Nebraskans know that's none of their business," said State Sen. Meghan Hunt of Omaha, a Democrat and vocal opponent of the measure.

Times have changed in the officially nonpartisan Nebraska Legislature. Thirty years ago, the first major anti-abortion legislation in Nebraska was offered and supported by Democrat senators: Bernice Labezd, Tim Hall and John Lindsay of Omaha and Cap Dierks of Ewing. All four were Catholic as well. But non-Catholic Nelson signed some of those measures into law.

So, if it wasn't political party, it was about religion? Not that I observed. Those early anti-abortion debates were passionate and issue focused. There may have been lines drawn, but they didn't lead to filibuster and floor fights.

That culture has changed on many issues in the modern Legislature. Given the number of filibusters during regular sessions in recent years, passions seem to run deeper. Or perhaps, senators are wearing their emotions on their sleeves. I'm sorry, but you don't have to go to every fight to which you are invited.

Terminology has changed. There is keen interest in the "woke" culture. Merriam Webster and others define "woke" as being increasingly used as a byword for social awareness.

It has also been used in pejorative terms for someone with left-leaning political thought. Thirty years ago, legislative observers were more interested in the awake culture, as in which senators were paying attention to the issue being debated.

Party politics has threatened the very nonpartisan nature of the Legislature. There are more Republicans than Democrats on the state's election roles. There are far more Republicans in the Legislature than Democrats. The Republican Party has poured money into legislative races. The governor has used his own money to defeat candidates, sometimes when two Republicans are running, favoring one over the other.

It's likely the issue will come up next session with a crop of new senators. Until then, term-limited Ricketts said he will continue to "affirm the rights of preborn babies and to support pregnant women, children, and families in need."

Senators like Hunt say they will continue their opposition. Assuredly, both sides will be counting how many votes they have.

What if we all realized the issue is a moral one, not mathematical or political. I happen to think that might make a big difference.

Falls City sophomore Mike Dunn was done for the season after dislocating his elbow and suffering a fracture near the elbow while making a tackle from his defensive end position at football practice.

Local authorities questioned a Crawford, Nebraska, woman in Scottsbluff. The woman lost her cool while complaining at the airport and remarked that she would like to blow up the airport. Authorities later released the woman, deciding her remarks were only issued in anger.

In Dawson news, Miss Peggy Harmon returned to Lincoln after spending the weekend with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Harmon. Jim McGinnis attended the Kansas City Royals baseball game against the Milwaukee Brewers. On Tuesday, Mrs. Larry Harmon and her boys were in Auburn and attended the parade and fair.

The slogan at Morehead Chevrolet-Oldsmobile-Cadillac was "Our salesmen will prove now is the hour to save. Salesmen Bill Faller and Frank Palmer were on hand to assist customers until 8:00 pm on evenings.

Governor J.J. Exon named Mrs. Jack Plasters of Stella to the governor's commission on the status of women. Mrs. Plasters was one of 15 Nebraska women appointed to new terms.

Center Lanes advertised for bowlers in the Men's League on Mondays and Tuesdays and the Ladies' afternoon League on Thursdays.

The White Cloud Saddle Club participated in the Holton Horse Show, with Bernice Adams placing third in the women's pleasure class and Luke Keller winning gold in "through the barrel." Keller also placed third in the barrels and fourth in the poles.

A Gallup poll reported that more Americans than ever, 44 percent of the public, believed only a woman and her physician should decide whether she have an abortion. Fifty-six percent of Catholics in the nationwide survey took the liberal stand on abortion despite their church's opposition. Seventy-three percent thought teenagers should have access to professional birth control information, services and counseling.

The Journal included a picture of six halfbacks for the Tiger football team: Dave Werner, Charlie Maze, Tom Hillyard, Martie Jones, Tom Weinert and Dave Cudney.

Mrs. Viva Noll, Miss Clara Stockton, Mrs. Hazel Gebhard and Mrs. Morgan Snider returned from a trip to the 59th National Convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliaries, held in Minneapolis.

Twenty-nine members and two guests of the Salem American Legion and Auxiliary met for a potluck dinner at the Salem Legion Hall. Richardson County Bank and Trust president John Morehead said 5,100 persons went through the building over the weekend during the open house.

The U.S. command announced that American troop strength in Vietnam dropped to 37,700 men. During the peak in April of 1969, 543,000 troops were stationed in Vietnam.

The annual Palmer reunion was held at Candlelight Cabin at Stanton Lake, with 66 persons in attendance. Corey Palmer, three weeks old, was the youngest in attendance, while Anthony Dannecker, 83, was the most senior.

Marshals for the Cobblestone Parade. In the City Administrators report, Anthony Nussbaum spoke about the budget planning that is currently in process, mentioning that it was time for new applications for Downtown Revitalization. Nussbaum said the pool is closed for the season, but the splash pad remains open. Repairs at the pool that were scheduled for the spring should commence this fall. The city is looking to hire a building inspector in October and they will probably review and revise permit fees that have gone unchanged since 2008. He also reported that the city did not receive a BRIC (building resilient infrastructure and communities) grant to help with the downtown electrical project and would be seeking other funding sources.

The Council held the first reading of Ordinance 2022-106. The ordinance amended Ordinance 2019-102, setting forth base cost for power production cost adjustments, to restate the current electrical rates, fees and charges and collections for electricity from and in the City of Falls City; repealing any prior ordinance in conflict therewith and ordering the publication of the ordinance in pamphlet form and provide for an effective date.

The Council then held the first reading of Ordinance 2022-107, amending Ordinance No. 2019-103, setting water rates, fees, charges and collections for water services from and in the City of Falls City; repealing any prior ordinances in conflict therewith and ordering the publication of the ordinance in pamphlet form to provide for an effective date.

A first reading was read on Ordinance No. 2022-108, amending Ordinance No. 2019-104, setting forth natural gas rates, fees, charges and collections for natural gas from and in the City of Falls City; repealing any prior ordinances in conflict therewith and ordering the publication of the ordinance in pamphlet form and provide for an effective date.

The Council held the first reading for Ordinance No. 2022-109, amending Ordinance No. 2019-105, setting forth sewer rates, fees, charges and collections for sewer services from and in the City of Falls City; repealing any prior ordinances in conflict therewith and ordering the publication of the ordinance in pamphlet form to provide for an effective date.

The Council also approved a request by Mercedes Kooser to rent Prichard Auditorium on October 22, 2022, for a wedding reception. Schillingbridge Winery will be in charge of catering the event.

The Council took action, approving the request by Community Medical Center to host the annual Cobblestone Fun Run/Walk and approved a resolution to transfer \$400,000 from the Capital Improvement Sinking Fund to the General Fund for the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 for operating cost deficit. Last year the Council moved \$320,000 into the General Fund for operating costs. The increase was to help cover some of the additional health costs, which amounted to about \$125,000 more in additional premiums from the previous year.

The final item was the discussion and action requesting an additional one percent of allowable growth for restricted funds for the 2022-2023 Fiscal Year Budget. This action does not raise the tax; the levy remains the same; it increases the tax base for potential use if needed. The Council approved the request 7-0 and with no other items on the agenda, the meeting adjourned.

CDC updates COVID-19 guidelines

 the current vaccine against symptomatic infection and transmission is less than that against severe disease and diminishes over time, especially against the currently circulating variants. For this reason, it is important to stay up to date, especially as new vaccines become available.

Updating its guidance for people who are not up to date on COVID-19 vaccines on what to do if exposed to someone with COVID-19. This is consistent with the existing guidance for people who are up to date on COVID-19 vaccines.

Recommending that instead of quarantining if you were exposed to COVID-19, you wear a high-quality mask for 10 days and get tested on day five (5).

Reiterating that regardless of vaccination status, you should isolate from others when you have COVID-19.

You should also isolate if you are sick and suspect that you have COVID-19 but do not yet have test results.

If your results are positive, follow CDC's full isolation recommendations.

If your results are negative, you can end your isolation.

Recommending that if you test positive for COVID-19, you stay home for at least five (5) days and isolate from others in your home. You are likely most infectious during these first five (5) days. Wear a high-quality mask when you must be around others at home and in public.

If after five (5) days you are fever-free for 24 hours without the use of medication, and your symptoms are improving, or you never had symptoms, you may end isolation after day five (5).

Regardless of when you end isolation, avoid being around

people who are more likely to get very sick from COVID-19 until at least day 11.

You should wear a high-quality mask through day 10.

Recommending that if you had moderate illness (if you experienced shortness of breath or had difficulty breathing) or severe illness (you were hospitalized) due to COVID-19 or you have a weakened immune system, you need to isolate through day 10.

Recommending that if you had severe illness or have a weakened immune system, consult your doctor before ending isolation. Ending isolation without a viral test may not be an option for you. If you are unsure if your symptoms are moderate or severe or if you have a weakened immune system, talk to a healthcare provider for further guidance.

Clarifying that after you have ended isolation, if your COVID-19 symptoms worsen, restart your isolation at day 0. Talk to a healthcare provider if you have questions about your symptoms or when to end isolation.

Recommending screening testing of asymptomatic people without known exposures will no longer be recommended in most community settings.

Emphasizing that physical distance is just one component of how to protect yourself and others. It is important to consider the risk in a particular setting, including local COVID-19 Community Levels and the important role of ventilation, when assessing the need to maintain physical distance.

Actions to take will continue to be informed by the COVID-19 Community Levels, launched in February. CDC will continue to focus efforts on preventing severe illness and post-COVID conditions, while ensuring ev-

eryone have the information and tools, they need to lower their risk.

This updated guidance is intended to apply to community settings. In the coming weeks CDC will work to align stand-alone guidance documents, such as those for healthcare settings, congregate settings and higher risk of transmission, and travel, with the update.

FCPD to participating in Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over initiative

The Falls City Police Department, along with other law enforcement agencies will be participating in the nationwide drunk driving enforcement effort. Drive Sober Or Get Pulled Over crackdown, August 19, 2022- September 5, 2022. This effort will be done using highly visible saturation patrols and the use of additional officers on the street. Officers will be taking extra efforts to remove impaired drivers from the roadways.

During the enforcement period, Additional officers will be working overtime to take a drunk/impaired drivers off the streets in an effort to keep the community safe. The overtime for the additional officers will be funded through a grant provided by the Nebraska Department of Transportation Highway Safety Office.

Remember, drive safely, report unsafe driving behaviors, and please buckle up every time.

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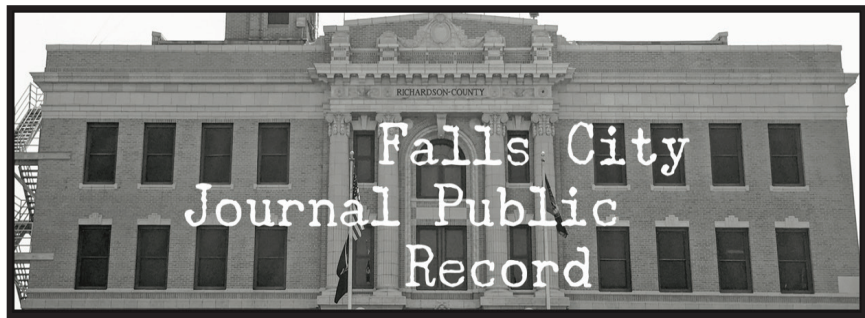

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With the college football season on the horizon, now is as good as time as ever to make my 2022 Nebraska football predictions public. For years, as any red-blooded Husker fan has, I drink the proverbial "Kool-Aid," but recent seasons have made me see through something other than the "red-tinted" glasses that most of us are used to seeing things through.

The Huskers open the 2022 campaign not only on the road, but out of the country. The Big Red fly to the Emerald Isle for the season-opening contest against the Northwestern Wildcats on Saturday, August 27, at Aviva Stadium in Dublin, Ireland. Last October, the Huskers throttled the Wildcats 56-7 in Lincoln, don't expect the same result this year. Nebraska will play well enough to win, don't expect such a wide margin of victory.

Game two features a home game against the North Dakota Fighting Hawks, a 5-6 team last fall. The Huskers can't look past North Dakota, not to be confused with North Dakota St., but will improve to 2-0.

The third game on the schedule is against Georgia Southern, a 3-9 team in 2021. Again, no game on the docket is a guaranteed win, but Nebraska will win its third game of the season.

Game four brings old Big Eight foe Oklahoma to town for the first time since a 10-3 Husker win in 2009. The Sooners open the season in the top ten of AP, entering the ratings at No. 9. Believe it or not, some poor soul gave the Big Red a vote; somewhat unheard of for a team coming on a 3-9 season. I wish I could call an upset here; my heart says Nebraska wins a nail-biter; my head tells me Oklahoma rolls to the win. Still, 3-1 at this point of the year is a good thing, right?

Game five should provide the Big Red with win No. 4. Last year, Indiana was 2-10, but they return 14 starters from 2021. I give the nod to the Huskers here but by single digits.

Here's where things get tricky; at 4-1, the season could go either way in a hurry. With back-to-back road contests for the first time this season, Nebraska will fall to 4-3 with losses to Rutgers and Purdue. The Scarlet Knights were 5-8 in 2021 under Coach Greg Schiano and the Boilermakers had a very successful year at 9-4.

Coach Frost will need to regroup his squad at this point of the season. Facing the possibility of another meltdown, not to mention losing his job, Frost will need to steer his team back in the right direction and fast.

After a bye week, Illinois comes to town and the Huskers, fresh off consecutive losses, will improve to 5-3 with a sound win over the Fighting Illini in Lincoln. Illinois defeated the Huskers 30-22 in Champaign last fall, but Nebraska will have too much at stake to drop a third straight contest.

November 5 brings the Minnesota Golden Gophers to town; that's right, Golden Gophers. What's a Golden Gopher anyway? Never mind, we don't have time to go down that path right now. With bowl eligibility on the line, Nebraska falls to Minnesota for the fourth straight year.

The schedule doesn't get any easier from here on out; Michigan and Wisconsin are both preseason top twenty teams and Iowa are just on the outside looking in, not to mention that the Hawkeyes have defeated the Big Red in seven straight contests.

Nebraska travels to Ann Arbor on November 12 to take on Jim Harbaugh and the Wolverines. Coming off a 12-2 season, Michigan should send Husker fans home with their fifth loss of the year, dropping NU to 5-5 with just two games left.

Here is where things get interesting. Facing a mass firing and another season without a postseason game, Nebraska beats a good Wisconsin squad for the first time since 2012 and moves to 6-5, finally becoming bowl eligible. Not only do the Huskers win, but they do so by double digits.

Will six wins be enough to save Coach Frost's job? I don't believe so. After halting an eight-game losing streak to the Badgers, Nebraska responds with a thumping of the Iowa Hawkeyes, moving to a pedestrian 7-5, enough to make everyone stop and think that Nebraska is back.

Of course, we know that we are not, in fact, back, but with solid wins over two programs that have owned the Big Red for much of the last decade, it's enough to let Husker fans breathe a sigh of relief. Who would have ever dreamt that 7-5 could feel so good?

With a bowl game on the horizon, Frost and Co. have extra practice time and not to mention the benefit of name recognition by playing in a bowl game. Granted, Nebraska won't be playing in a top-tier contest, but whichever site selects NU, they better be prepared. Husker fans haven't been able to travel in late December or early January for a long time; any bowl game should and will bring the Big Red faithful out in droves again. No predictions here on winning or losing the postseason contest; just getting to that point is a win for the program and its fans. With an 8-5 or 7-6 finish, Nebraska fans will have something to talk about heading into spring ball. The coffee drinkers, the donut eaters, the loyal fan and the pessimists will all have an opinion moving forward.

How close these predictions come will depend on how well the team can bond together. You can't just turn a team loose and expect them to play like they've been together for years. This team should get stronger as the season wears on. Every rep, every snap, every second this team works together; they will get better. Could Nebraska finish 8-5 or even 9-4? Absolutely. The question is, will they? It's easy to say we could be an eight-win team, just remember, we could quickly go the other way and be a four-win team. Won't it be fun to have these dialogues again? Go Big Red.

Some elected officials speak up for their deputy's

 how some people drive on it. The Roads Department, like most everyone else, is still having issues with getting items from factories. Some things are months out from being delivered, if not longer. Some items are coming sooner, so they don't know when to expect them.

Sheriff Hardesty presented to the Board the routine business at the Law Enforcement Center this past week.

A report was approved for Sheriff Hardesty for fees collected during the month of July 2022, totaling \$6,787.36.

A discussion was held regarding establishing salaries for the following positions: Deputy County Assessor, Deputy County Clerk, Deputy Register of Deeds, Deputy of Elections, Deputy County Clerk of District Court and Deputy County Treasurer.

Present for the discussion and to offer input were Pam Scott, Clerk of the District Court; Amanda Bartek-Ramsey, County Treasurer and Kim Riggs, County Assessor.

Pam Scott spoke and expressed concern on behalf of the elected officials present. She said it had been thrown around to lower the percentage of their deputies, which when the elected official salaries were set back in January and December, "we kept saying, keep the deputies at the same because without our deputies to take over our offices if we were gone if we're in a car accident, yeah. So you know, to make them feel appreciated for the work they do as anybody," said Scott. She wanted to know what the Commissioners were thinking of doing with their pay increase since it's usually included with the elected official's salary discussions at the beginning of the year.

Commissioner Sickel said the figures Mary Eickhoff had given them would give the deputies a 21 percent increase from the prior year if they stayed at 75 percent. The 75 percent figure has been in place since the late eighties.

Scott told the Commissioners that the increase is part of the elected official's pay and they knew that at the beginning of the year. She said the deputies were hired at 75 percent and should stay that way and nothing was said about the deputy's wages while discussing individual budgets.

A motion was made by Sickel to set the deputy's salary at 70 percent of the elected official's salary. The motion died for lack of a second. The Board will consider the information, do further research, and revisit this topic at next week's meeting.

Brian Kirkendall, E.M.A. Director, presented to the Board the idea of installing a covered area for the storage of the County Mobile Emergency Operations Trailer. The Board will consider the idea and review it with Kirkendall at a later meeting.

The Board met to review the FY2022-2023 request for the Veteran's Service Officer and Veterans Aid budgets with Mona Godemann, Veterans Service Officer.

Godemann told the Commissioners they work with all kinds of veterans.

"Last week, I had to have a video conference with an incarcerated veteran. I had another veteran that called me while he was laying in the hospital just had a heart attack, concerned about paying for his medical stuff while he's in the hospital, and I have to know that stuff," said Godemann.

She said most of our veterans rely on them for assistance.

"This is a great burden to bear and one we are most proud to bear to serve the veterans in our county. I know you can't compare every office in the county as the same and I definitely don't pretend to be great; it takes all around the county and we all have great responsibilities," said Godemann, but she pointed out that the Veterans office brings in millions of dollars, as of 2020 it was at seven million.

She said they have to know about Federal rules, regulations, statutes, veteran's claims, medical terminology and conditions, human anatomy, injuries, diseases, Social Security, Medicare, human psychology,

how to apply for grants, prepare written statements for clients, and so much more.

It was approved to enter into an agreement with Humboldt Shares, Inc. to provide funding of \$5,000/annually for the term of August 1, 2022 through July 3, 2025. (Resolution Book 26, Page 88)

A motion was approved to allow The Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) of the Department of Homeland Security (D.H.S.) under the authority of Title XXI of the Homeland Security Act (6 U.S.C. § 651 et seq., esp. 6 U.S.C. § 659) to conduct network and vulnerability scanning of Richardson County's publicly accessible networks and systems.

The motion was made by Caverzagie to adjourn the meeting at 11:45 a.m.
