FC residents asked to conserve water after water main break

On September 9, the City asked residents to perform voluntary water conservation measures for the next 10-14 days in an effort to conserve large water consumption within the city limits.

The effort comes on the heels of a water main break first reported on social media the day before.

According to a social media post by City Clerk Anthony Nussbaum, City crews worked late into the evening hours on September 8 to assess and repair the water main break at the Rulo Water Treatment Plant. There was a failure in connecting an air relief valve to the 20" water main that fills the city water tower.

Crews worked diligently to complete a temporary repair which allowed the system to get back into operation; however, the system cannot be run at total capacity until the permanent repair is completed. A new valve assembly is being built and will be available for installation in the next 5-10 days. This line typically pumps 1400 gallons/minute into the city water system, but it can only pump 900 gallons/minute due to limitations of the temporary repair. The water treatment plant crews are extending operational hours during this time to boost overnight water production to help offset the pumping reduction.

In addition, Falls City residents are asked to voluntarily conserve water where possible over the next 10-14 days until the final repairs can be completed.

Falls City Utility Dept. flushing fire hydrants

Falls City Utility personnel will be flushing fire hydrants throughout the city to flow test and remove any sediment built up in the water mains. This is scheduled to start on September 19, 2022.

Customers may experience a temporary brownish-red discoloration of their water during this flushing process. However, Ray Luhring of the Utility Department notes that this water discoloration does not pose any health threat and the water is safe to use.

Persons, who notice flushing in process in their area, are advised not to use water for a short while until the flushing is complete, so as to not pull discolored water into their service piping. For those who do experience discoloration of water, the Water Department reminds them not to wash white clothes during this time since the brownish-red minerals will stain white clothing.

"The Water Department apologizes for any inconvenience that this flushing process might cause for consumers. The process of flushing the system at the fire hydrants removes as much of the build-up as possible," stated Luhring. "If we do not flush the system periodically, excessive iron and manganese build up and could lead to long-term problems such as clogging of lines and water fixtures. Your patience is appreciated."

FC Volunteer Fire Dept. asks for public cooperation as they over cure fire hydrants

The Falls City Volunteer Fire Department has hired a company to sandblast and remove all paint from the fire hydrants



in town; once this is done, the hydrants will be painted red. When the paint has cured, the firefighters will paint the tops and color code them to determine their water flow before connecting to them.

The Fire Department plans to start this year on Monday, September 19 and begin on the south part of Falls City doing approximately 70 hydrants, including up to 15th Street. This will be about 1/3 of the hydrants.

The Fire Department asks that residents allow access to these hydrants around your homes and businesses and, if possible,

remove any flowers, grass, or weeds; this will aid us in this process to be completed.

"With over 207 fire hydrants in Falls City, we plan to complete this by the end of 2023, and we plan to do all fire hydrants except any new ones that have been installed in the past few years. We thank you for your continued support of the

Falls City Volunteer Fire Department and all area First Responders," stated Jon McQueen of the FC Fire Department.

Falls City resident Travis Hayes is featuring some interesting metal artwork at the Schoolhouse Art Gallery in Brownville.

Hayes learned how to weld on the job at the first factory he worked in soon after he turned

19. After nearly 13 years of experience, he has now turned that knowledge and skill into a hobby, art.

Inspired by his father, Keith, Travis grew up watching as his dad made small figurines in his woodshop during his free time.

"I remember as he'd spend hours in the evenings cutting and shaping pieces then painting and staining them to finish," stated Hayes. Saying he wasn't good at woodworking, he tried his hand with metal. "I've also always liked different little creatures, probably from having so many different pets growing up, so I thought that it would be something worth trying."

Around 2018 Hayes had his first piece of art at home as a hobby. "I didn't really know much at the time of what I was trying to do, but found it

both fun and challenging using welds to form the shapes and textures," stated Hayes. He said it took around two years of "tinkering," allowing long periods where it sat to the side, almost forgotten.



"It almost became more of a personal challenge as to what I could try to make than it was just a hobby."

Hayes started making pieces, some as gifts of whatever came to mind from various pieces of scrap metal. From his imagination, he's made a turtle, owl, queen honey bee, scorpion and a dragon.

"I've been trying different methods to make different textures for skin, scales and feathers," stated Hayes. "Recently, I've been trying different techniques to create a fur-like pattern to broaden the range of future pieces."

Hayes' art will be on display at the Schoolhouse Art Gallery, 427 Main Street in Brownville, NE, from now until Sunday, September 18. The Gallery is open Thursday through Sunday from 1:00 to 4:00.



STATE CORRECTIONS DIRECTOR STEPS DOWN, OVERCROWDING PROBLEM LINGERS

The Governor said his new Department of Corrections director was going to turn around Nebraska's troubled prison system.

Now, seven years later, Director Scott Frakes is stepping down, a few months before Governor Pete Ricketts leaves office. Did he turn the system around or did he just throw some money and bricks and iron at the problem?

I met Frakes shortly after he arrived in 2015. I liked the guy because we shared some values. I thought he might stand a chance at being the guy to champion true prison reform such as alternative sentencing and other ideas that have been tossed around by more progressive members of the Legislature's Judiciary Committee.

Finally, somebody was going to address the overcrowding problem, which has now left Nebraska in first place as the most overcrowded prison system in the country with 5,322 incarcerated people and facilities running at 158 percent of design capacity.

Nope. I misjudged that one. This guy with years of experience in the Washington state prison system, was just another "lock 'em up" law and order thinker. He danced only with the people who brought him to the party — the Republican Party. I suspect he did it to keep his \$255,000-a-year job.

Now, those same proud politicians are lauding him for correcting the sentence calculation issue, which had embarrassingly caused the department to release some inmates before their time. Trading pen and paper records managed by a couple people for computer-driven record keeping is apparently a big deal. To his credit, he did reform the state's use of solitary confinement for inmates.

Then came more problems. Deadly riots (including one on Mother's Day) at the Tecumseh State Prison in 2015 and 2017 left housing units scorched, four inmates dead and four more injured. Frakes also received criticism from state lawmakers for spending more than \$4,000 on foreign-made lethal injection drugs the state never received because the federal government declared them illegal and blocked their importation.

The Tecumseh incidents, the Covid pandemic and a total plumbing failure at the ancient Nebraska State Penitentiary in Lincoln left inmates on lockdown with restricted or no visitation for weeks on end during Frakes' tenure. Staffing problems simply exacerbated the situation as those who showed up were often forced to work double shifts.

But the director did as he was told and threw money at it. Significant salary increases were granted to employees to ease staffing shortages at state prisons in Lincoln and Tecumseh and to help the prison system better compete for workers in Nebraska's tight labor market. Despite hiring dozens of new workers, staffing emergencies — to permit longer work shifts and restrict inmate activities — remain.

Gary Young, a Lincoln attorney who represents the union for state corrections security employees, told the Nebraska Examiner he was always impressed with Frakes in how he dealt with a very difficult job. "I don't know anyone who had to confront more allegations from so many directions as he did," Young said. Here are a few infrastructure improvements during the Frakes' era:

A new women's housing unit was built at the Lincoln work release center; a 384-bed addition to the Reception and Treatment Center in Lincoln will house the state's most difficult inmates and those suffering from mental illnesses; initiation of a project for a new \$270 million 1,500-bed prison to replace the state penitentiary.

Ricketts lauded Frakes because the system's recidivism rate — the percentage of inmates who commit repeat crimes within three years — has fallen in the past three years to 29.8%, and staff turnover is projected to drop to 16% this year from a high of 30%.

But left by the wayside is a comprehensive yearlong study led by the Crime and Justice Institute for modest but meaningful reforms that could address prison problems. Some state senators said anything related to sentencing was off the

table. Nothing has been done about diversion programs, which can help communities address mental illness, substance abuse disorders and homelessness outside the criminal justice system. More emphasis needs to be placed on these alternatives, which are more cost-effective than mass incarceration.

It's a shame they were left on the plate, but it's doubtful that a new administration and new department heads will think any differently and chart a new course. That just doesn't happen in red states like Nebraska.

"And you thought 'Go Big Red' was a football term.



50 Years Ago, September 14, 1972 to September 20, 1972
Engineer James Seifried wound up 44 years as a railroad crewman for the Missouri Pacific Railroad. Seifried began his career in Falls City in 1928 as a coppersmith apprentice in the roundhouse. On March 9, 1945, he was promoted to engineer and that's the way he retired 27 years later.

Pope Paul VI barred women from even the smallest formal role in the ministry of the Roman Catholic Church. He also restated celibacy rules for deacons and priests.

Hank Schwartz, president of the Tiger Booster Club, presented athletic bags to the Falls City High School girls who earned track letters in the spring.

Ann-Margaret's acting career was in doubt after suffering a 22-foot fall from the scaffolding she was to enter at the Lake Tahoe Hotel and Casino. Margaret suffered five facial fractures, a broken jaw and a broken arm.

The new lighting at Jug Brown Stadium was installed. Six 85-foot light poles were installed around the field by a firm from Lincoln.

The Tiger football team exploded for 19-fourth quarter points to defeat Wyomere Southern for the first time in four years.

Craig Martinosky rambled 55-yards for the night's first score as DV walloped Barneston 32-8. Martinosky finished with 117 yards on 13 carries for the Jets. Tim Lyons added 63 yards on 11 carries and helped lead the Jet defense.

Spurred by dry, hot weather, the harvest was underway early in the Falls City area.

The USC Trojans were the top-rated team in the Associated Press College Football poll. The Huskers, 1-1, came in ranked ninth.

Janet Stanton served 12 points as the Southeast Consolidated Mustangs defeated Humboldt 15-12 and 15-5 in volleyball action.

The Falls City Toastmasters Club held its first meeting of the fall in the community room of the new Richardson County Bank. Cecil Reafs was the toastmaster for the meeting and Allan Clark had charge of table topics. Ames Ebel was a guest at the meeting.

Because of hot weather, Falls City Public Schools and Sacred Heart students were dismissed early.

Randy York at the Lincoln Journal Star had Sacred Heart rated as the top team in Class D football and Dawson-Verdon at tenth in his eight-man rankings. In the Omaha paper, Conde Sargent had SH ranked third and Humboldt was listed as the ninth-best Class D team.

Goldfish were a steal at Earl May, where if you bought one at regular price, the second was only 39 cents.

In Dawson news, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Marsh and grandsons Matt and Lyle Harmon visited the Morris Andrew home near Auburn. It was reported little "bawly baby Lyle" cried when it was time to head home.

25 Years Ago, September 14, 1997 to September 20, 1997

Two Maryville, Missouri, men were in custody in connection with area burglaries, including one at the Falls City Auto Center, just north on Highway 73. Joseph Pearl and Nathan Teschner were charged with stealing a \$60,000 Lexus and a safe from the business.

Linda Rasmussen was named the new manager of the Falls City Area Chamber of Commerce.

Cecil Faller and Harold Huebner of Falls City were honored by Hoegemeyer Hybrids for their 30 years of service as dealers.

Tracy Harmon, daughter of Melvin and Sherry Harmon, wed Doug Aberle.

Todd Godemann had a career game as the Tiger football team defeated Hiawatha 34-13. Godemann rushed for 96 yards and three TDs on 14 carries and passed for another 56 yards and a score.

The Irish football team took down Pawnee City 47-2 at Jug Brown Stadium. Aaron O'Grady rushed for 100 yards and three TDs on eight attempts to lead the Irish to the win.

Thirty-seven area youth completed the Hunter's Safety Course held at City Hall. Instructors included Jerry Clark, Keith Hayes, Duane Armbruster, Steve Goldsberry and Ralph Gilkerson.

Humboldt came up just short in a furious fourth-quarter comeback against Bern. The Cardinals scored 22 points in the final quarter but came short in a 30-22 loss. Zach Leech ran for 147 yards on nine carries and QB Quentin Bowen was 3-9 passing for 19 yards and a score.

The 75th annual Duerfeldt reunion was held at St. Peter's Lutheran Church, northeast of Falls City. In the absence of president Rachel Ploeger and Vice President Debra Thrash, the business meeting was conducted by Carol Hamilton.

The Auburn Bulldogs survived a tough fight from the Lady Tigers to defeat FC 13-15, 16-14 and 15-7 in volleyball action. Mollie Armbruster and Keller Andersen led the Tiger attack.

Nick Harling of First National Bank and Trust presented a check for \$250 to Jim Herling Jr., who rolled a 299 game at Falls City Lanes.

15 Years Ago, September 14, 2007 to September 20, 2007

Michelle Pineda was crowned as the Queen of the Richardson County Fair by State Senator Lavon Heidemann. Pineda, the daughter of David and Sarah Pineda of Humboldt, was active in National Honor Society, Mock Trial, Speech, Swing Choir, Volleyball, Drill Team, Flags Leadership and Mentoring and was the HTRS junior class Vice President.

Eagle Scout Quentin Fankhauser sang the National Anthem at the County Fair Coronation.

Dismal budget numbers prompted a city hiring 'freeze.' The Council voted 6-2 in favor of the freeze, essentially reducing force by attrition. If anyone retired or quit, their position would not be replaced. Exceptions would be made in some instances, such as department heads.

The HTRS football team defeated Sacred Heart 28-14 at Jug Brown Stadium. It was the first win over the Irish since Humboldt and Table Rock schools merged. Table Rock beat SH in 1995 and Humboldt took down the Irish last in 1988.

The Mustangs from Southeast fell to Bern, 40-14, falling to 0-4 for the season.

Clayton and Kathryn Hardenberger of Falls City celebrated their 40th wedding anniversary.

Peggy Kerns was honored as 'Woman of the Year' at the Richardson County Fair and the Humboldt Fall Festival.

tion as he exits Memorial Stadium one last time. Nebraska could have saved nearly \$8 million if they had waited until October 1; I guess Athletic Director Trev Alberts figured another loss wasn't worth the wait; pay him and get rid of him.

Last year I wrote about the 'Curse of Frank Solich.' This year I'm going to dive into the topic of 'Scott Frost's deal with the devil.' You might be asking yourself what does that entail?: well, let's get into that.

Let's begin in January 1993; Frost announced he would play for the Stanford Cardinal, choosing Bill Walsh over the Tom Osborne-led and two-time defending champion Huskers. Frost didn't want to compete with Tommie Frazier for the starting QB job, so he took what he thought was an easy way out and chose Stanford. After a mediocre freshman and sophomore season, Frost transferred to Nebraska in January 1995, having to sit out the season.

After being unable to cut in on the West Coast, Frost won the starting job in 1996 and defeated Michigan St. in the opener, 55-14 in two weeks the two-time defending national champion Huskers were shut out 19-0 on September 21, 1996, playing at Arizona St. The loss snapped a 26-game winning streak for the Big Red. Frost rushed ten times for negative seven yards and completed 6/20 passes for 66 yards, hardly big-time numbers from the QB from Wood River. Nebraska went on to trounce everyone else that season, that is, until they played Texas in the inaugural Big Twelve Championship game in St. Louis. Nebraska entered the game as a heavy favorite over the unranked Longhorns; they led with a 10-point defeat, ending any chance of a third consecutive title. Frost rushed for 47 yards on 18 attempts and completed 15/24 passes for 155 yards, again, pedestrian numbers.

The 97 season began with a thumping of Akron, followed by a more challenging than expected contest against UCF. The Big Red cruised under Frost until they ran into a tough Missouri team at Faurot Field in Columbia. The "Flea Kicker," as it has been called, saved any chance Nebraska had of competing for a national title. A forced pass to Shevin Wiggins somehow found its way into the hands of Matt Davison, keeping the Husker's hopes of a third title in four years alive, barely. Nebraska went undefeated the rest of the season, setting up a matchup of No. 2 vs. No. 3 in the Orange Bowl. The second-ranked Huskers easily defeated Peyton Manning's Tennessee Volunteers, 42-17. The day before, the top-ranked team in the nation, Michigan, beat No. 7 Washing State in the Rose Bowl 21-16 to finish 12-0. The Associated Press named Michigan their National Champ.

Who deserved the championship that season still remains a debate. Michigan, the undefeated and previously top-ranked team, did what they were supposed to do. They won the Rose Bowl and, by rights, should have been the champs. Nebraska, in turn, did everything it could, demolishing Tennessee to finish the season undefeated and deserving of a title. Here's where the curse comes into play. After the contest, Frost was interviewed by Michele Tafoya. Frost used this moment to sell his soul to obtain a share of the national championship.

"I'm so proud to have had the chance to play for Coach Osborne," said Frost. "I just want to say this about the national championship, if all the pollsters honestly think after watching the Rose Bowl and the Orange Bowl that Michigan can beat Nebraska, then go ahead and vote Michigan by all means. I don't think there is anybody out there with a clear conscience that can say Nebraska and especially Tom Osborne, the great man, doesn't a national championship, at least a share."

First, if Coach Osborne was so great, why did Frost leave Nebraska after high school to go to Stanford? Secondly, the moment Frost made a deal with the devil on national television, guilting members of the Coaches Poll into voting for Tom Osborne more so than Nebraska, he doomed himself and the Big Red for years to come. The football gods granted Frost's wish that night, but at what cost? Nebraska has not won another title since and Frost, well, he just got fired from a job at his alma mater after just 44 years on the job and a 16-31 record. Of the 47 games he coached, 27 were decided by one score and Nebraska lost 22 of those contests.

On that fateful night in Miami after the Orange Bowl, Frost traded years of potential success for a moment of glory. He secretly made a deal with the devil, promising he would never ask for another thing as long as he lived if the voters gave Nebraska part of the title. He used the fact that Coach Osborne had already announced his retirement to pull at the strings of the Coaches Poll voters to give Nebraska a title based on sentimentality. Heck, he may have promised to give up his firstborn; just saying. Was it worth it? Was a tainted title worth settling into mediocrity and now worse for the past two-plus decades?

Let's have a public offering in Lincoln. Bring everything related to the 97 championship season and get rid of it. Bury it, burn it, sink it, get rid of all traces of that season, whatever we need to do. Then and only then will we be able to move past the Frost era, not only from his coaching days but also his playing days. Frost has been welcomed back to the state twice; I don't see it happening a third time.

Council approves change order for Engine No. 5

should contact City Hall or write a letter of interest.

Anthony Nussbaum provided a City Administrators' Report to the Council. Nussbaum highlighted that Olsson has completed a street study and has begun drafting recommendations for a city review. The study was done to implement a maintenance plan for the streets. Estimates are nearly eight million dollars for city street upgrades.

Nussbaum also noted that work has begun on the 33rd Street project from Bill Schock Blvd. to Lane Street. Street crews have been performing maintenance around town, including a recent repair at 19th and Stone. During the repair, three empty fuel storage tanks were found in the ground. The tanks were removed and registered with the Nebraska Fire Marshal prior to repairing the street.

Kelly Gentrup from SENDD addressed the Council during a public hearing for the CDBG (community development block grant) Downtown Revitalization. Gentrup, an Economic Development Specialist with SENDD, noted the grant being pursued by Falls City is to cover commercial rehab and public facilities and improvements, including sidewalks, railings, etc. Falls City is seeking \$400,000 in CDBG Downtown Revitalization project grant funds for \$435,000. CDBG funds including \$25,000 for General Administration and \$10,000 for Construction Management. No one from the public was on hand to give input.

A resolution was passed 8-0 in favor of authorizing a chief elected official to sign an application for CDBG funds/SENDD.

Items three through six dealt with the second reading of ordinances restating Electrical, Water, Gas and Sewer rates, as the Board of Public Works recommended. All motions passed on 8-0 votes.

The seventh item on the agenda was the discussion and action on an MFO (Mutual Finance Organization) agreement update be-

tween the City, Fire Districts and Villages. The motion passed 8-0.

The Council approved 2022 Class C Liquor License applications for Sunmart, The Den, The Would Eye and Dollar Fresh. The Council also voted 8-0 in favor of allowing alcohol sales at a wrestling event to be held at Prichard Auditorium on February 25, 2023, by the Falls City Jaycees.

Item ten was the discussion and action to rent Prichard Auditorium and to allow alcohol to be served for a wedding reception on October 1, 2022, for the wedding reception of Cody Cochran and Emily Clark. The Council voted 8-0 in favor.

The Council voted 8-0 in favor of a request by Seth and Emily Vonderschmidt at West Sunset Drive to have a curb cut.

The Council heard from Utility Superintendent Ray Luhning on a revised job description. Luhning had previously announced his retirement effective December 31, 2023. The Board of Public Works requested the revised job description be approved by the Council so that they may begin searching for a replacement. The Board of Public Works hopes to fill the position by the end of this year or early next year to allow the new hire to work with Luhning for close to a year before his retirement. The Council accepted the description on an 8-0 vote.

Item 13 was the discussion and action to review a change order to contract with Farabee Mechanical Inc. to repair a damaged crankshaft of Engine No. 5, as the Board of Public Works recommended. Superintendent Luhning briefed the Council, reminding them that Engine No. 5 had suffered a catastrophic failure. The insurance company has approved the City to move forward with the project. Once the crankshaft arrived in Houston, it was determined that the job would entail more than initially thought. The shaft was bent more significantly than originally thought, adding additional labor charges to straighten the shaft. The Board

of Public Works recommended that the Council approve the change order for \$117,984 and authorize the Utility Superintendent to sign. The Council voted 8-0 in favor of the change order.

The final item on the agenda was the discussion of financing for the 2022 Electrical Distribution System Upgrade Project for approximately \$4,965,000. Superintendent Luhning noted his disappointment in the City not receiving a BRIC grant to help cover the project's cost.

"We are actually trying to figure out why," said Luhning, referring to not receiving the grant.

"We all thought we should have scored very well; JEO was disappointed; I was disappointed. So we're waiting for FEMA to get back to us to let us know where we scored."

Luhning also noted he asked for input on the deficiencies so the City could apply again and improve the application process.

The Board of Public Works has asked the Council to continue the project and discuss possible funding measures down the road.

With no action needed on the item, the meeting was closed at 6:22 p.m.

After a year 911 service in Beatrice still up for debate

A discussion was held regarding the issue with commercial traffic traveling on the hard-surfaced road south of Rulo. Darveau reported that a few spots had appeared that need to be addressed by the contractor, which they will be returning to redo a few areas of the road that weren't completed correctly.

Sheriff Hardesty gave an update on business at the Law Enforcement Center. He reported that he had a conversation with County Court staff regarding moving the County Court and offices to the third floor and utilizing the District Courtroom for both Courts. Hardesty said that with the metal detector and scanner, it would be helpful for people to go through and the courtroom size would hold the volume of people being seen for court.

An example was that on some afternoons, there could be as many as 29 people scheduled at 1:30 p.m. Many are scattered in the hallway and can be an issue for citizens who need to get to the probation, deeds or county clerk's office.

The vehicles approved for purchase at the August 23, 2022, meeting from Defender Supply, Argyle, TX, have fallen through as the vehicles are not currently available. He also reported that a transmission would be replaced in a patrol unit.

The staff for the jail is complete now with no vacancy positions and he also informed the Board that Deputy Josh Townsend has resigned and taken a new position with a county north of Blair, Nebraska and a new dispatcher has been hired.

The Sheriff also informed the Board that he attended a citizen gathering held on Saturday, August 27. Residents organized to answer questions and address concerns. He said that during the gathering, he was straightforward about the department having a job to do and they will do it.

"Petty" traffic stops were addressed.

"What I told them was, you consider it to be petty, me personally, I've had to tell seven different families that their loved ones weren't coming home because somebody crossed the line and other numerous other accidents where people drove off the shoulder or whatever," said Sheriff Hardesty.

He said he welcomed anybody there to come to the office to discuss any concerns they may have. He addressed the issue of some citizens thinking officers "sit on their businesses." The Sheriff said he could give a date and time, pull it up on GPS, and show that "we didn't."

"The main thing I wanted them to take from this is if you have an issue, let me know so I can address it or fix it," said Hardesty. "I wasn't there to change people's minds; I was there to let them understand our side of it and I told them there's nobody in Richardson County worth me losing my certificate for. It's ok until you don't make that stop. You can save somebody's life."

The Sheriff also reported that the Burlington Northern Railroad would host an event on Monday, September 12, starting at 10:00 a.m., Operation Life-saver, at the Grand Weaver Hotel.

The Board discussed with Sheriff Hardesty regarding the termination of the agreement with the City of Beatrice for the services of Enhanced 911 through the Southeast Nebraska 911 Center Beatrice.

The discussion was regarding a letter drafted to be sent to Beatrice.

Commissioner Caverzagie said he didn't know why this was being brought up now.

Hardesty said his opinion was that the City of Beatrice, Southeast Nebraska 911 Center is not doing anything different and the County had been in contact with them for over a year.

Caverzagie said it was brought up at the last meeting that they were not doing 911, but he didn't feel they [Beatrice] were given the opportunity.

Right now, the County is paying \$185,400, plus phone bills between \$1,000 and \$1,200 because of long-distance phone calls. Hardesty explained that the cheapest phone plan they could get was a three-cent per minute plan for long distance. Every call that comes into the 2470 number gets transferred to Beatrice, so it's always long distance.

There are also balking issues with the radios where they are not getting through. He explained the console issues to the Board and that the OCIO (Office of the Chief Information Officer) was contacted. The OCIO explained that it was an issue with Beatrice. It's not being fixed, so there are still hiccups with that, said Hardesty. He also said there are some of the same concerns as before.

The Sheriff's Department reported technical issues as soon as October 2021.

In June 2021, the Sheriff said one of the most significant selling points was the lagging time. He said by going with Southeast, there's no more calling Falls City PD. Today there are still lagging issues and the Sheriff's Department is the only place dispatching Beatrice. Rural fire departments informed Commissioners on November 23 that they would be dispatching with Falls City PD.

Hardesty explained at this meeting that the county is paying twice the amount of money the way he sees it. "Because we're paying the same amount of people that run jail doors, we would save \$197,000 a year in taxpayer dollars if we didn't have the contract with Beatrice."

Caverzagie said he was told that money would be saved by going with Beatrice.

Hardesty said he said they wouldn't have dispatchers, and they don't have dispatchers, but they still must have people run the jail doors and those people would answer phones. If they return to the way it was before, no staff will have to be added.

Hardesty said the Sheriff's Department would never be 911 unless it were combined with the Falls City Police Department, which at that point, both departments would bring their own dispatchers on Board.

"The cost is basically what it is; we still pay the same amount that we're paying an extra \$185,400 plus whatever the phone is on top of what our normal budget would be because we still have the same amount of employees because we still have to have

somebody work there every day every night to run jail doors answer the phone," said Hardesty. "Maybe that's what got misunderstood or mixed up, but we're actually just paying \$185,400 to them to dispatch us. We could do the exact same thing that's being done right now; we could do ourselves what we did before. When people call us, 911 comes in, it goes to Falls City, Falls City transfers the call to Beatrice, and then Beatrice sends us out. So when we were dispatching, 911 will go to Falls City, they would transfer the call to us, and then we would be dispatched."

Caverzagie asked why we switched.

Hardesty said he didn't know, "but the tower has been done for five to six months and nobody's putting their equipment on it or doing anything with it. They're not doing what they said they're going to do. Whether it's dispatching the entire County for 911 or even just dispatching us."

The Sheriff's Department would have had to build their own tower, get radio equipment, power supplies, CO-AX, pay electricians etc., whether joining

Alleged felon apprehended near Iron Horse Lake

When Law Enforcement arrived two men were located lying in the middle of the road in front of a wrecked vehicle. Ronald had plead guilty to a stabbing in Logan, Utah in 2020, as well as multiple other prior stabbings and assaults from Oregon, California, Nevada, and Utah. Nalepa became combative with EMS and Hospital staff during and after his initial transport. Once medically cleared Nalepa was transported to Omaha to await extradition to Utah for the original warrant.

Nalepa told Law Enforcement that he "really likes the Pawnee County area, and plans to move here once his prison term is up in Utah". He settled in the area to stay with friends while hiding from Law Enforcement.

Tigers down Mustangs for first win of season

The Concordia Mustang football team came to town on Friday night, hoping to improve to 2-1 for the season. The Mustangs were coming off a 38-17 loss to Class C1 contender Syracuse. FC, meanwhile, had hopes of ending a two-game losing streak to open the season, including a loss last week to Fairbury, 56-7. In front of a determined home crowd and raucous student section, the Tiger football team gave the fans exactly what they wanted.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Tigers put together their best offensive drive of the young season, covering 68-yards on nine plays to take a 7-0 lead. Running back Daniel Hollens was not to be denied as he scored from 18 yards out to give FC the score with 11:44 to play in the half.

Concordia moved the ball well on their second possession of the second quarter. Concordia got down to the 10-yard line, but the Tiger defense held. The Mustang kicker knocked the 28-yard attempt through the uprights and the Tigers led 7-3 with 3:09 to play in the half.

On the second play of the next drive, Concordia picked off a Blakely Sells pass attempt and returned it 31-yards for a pick-six, giving the Mustangs a 10-7 lead with 2:11 to go in the half.

FC narrowly avoided a disaster on the next drive. A fumble by Hollens gave the Mustangs the ball at the Tiger 11-yard line with 1:32 to go. On the drive's first play, Stephan Fields got his third sack of the half. After an incomplete pass and a penalty, the Mustangs lined up for another FG attempt, this time from 38-yards away. Fields came up big again, getting his paw on the ball, blocking the attempt, keeping the game tight at halftime, trailing 10-7.

On the third play of the second half, Sells intercepted the pass

from the Concordia QB, giving the Tigers the ball at Mustang 18. Four plays later, Sells went up the middle for a three-yard TD to put FC in front 13-10 with 9:27 to go in the third.

The score remained at 13-10 entering the final period. A turnover by FC on the opening drive of the fourth quarter could have taken the wind out of their sails; instead, four plays later, Dalton Helmick got an interception, setting the Tigers up at the Concordia 38 with 6:19 to go. On second down, Sells kept the ball right on an option play, getting down to the ten-yard line. Two plays later, Isaac Frederick scored from five yards out to put FC ahead 21-10 with 4:47 to play.

On the next drive, the Tiger defense got a sack from Jaxyn Strauss, followed by another interception by Sells, giving FC the ball at the Mustang 44. After a turnover on downs at the Concordia 24, Strauss sealed the win for the Tigers, stepping in front of a Mustang pass and taking it to paydirt for the pick six with :14 remaining, making the final 27-10.

"There was a lot of energy going in the fourth quarter," said Strauss. "I saw Robert (Gilker-son) in front of me; he tipped it; I got it and ran it back. I thought the last guy was going to catch me, but I fought through it into the end zone." Strauss had battled cramps the entire second half but returned to make the game-sealing play at the end.

Falls City finished the game with 153 yards rushing and 55 passing. The Mustangs ran for -53 yards and passed for 150. Sells completed 5-13 passes for 55 yards and an INT. Hollens rushed for 30 yards on 11 attempts and a score. Sells had 12 carries for 56 yards and a TD and Frederick powered through for 67 yards and a TD on 21 attempts. Frederick, Strauss, Wyatt

Oberberding, Kadyne Strecker and Hollens all had one reception. Defensively, the game ball goes to Stephan Fields. Fields finished with 12 tackles, seven solo, including six sacks and three tackles for loss, not to mention the block field goal attempt at the end of the first half. Sells finished with four tackles and two interceptions and Strauss added three tackles, two sacks and the pick-six at the end of the game.

Now 1-2, Falls City heads to Omaha this week to take on the Boys Town Cowboys.

Richard "Dick" Arington

Richard "Dick" Dean Arington, 91, of Humboldt, Nebraska was born on April 15, 1931 in Falls City, Nebraska to Hugh and Veronica (McCreery) Arington. His family lived in many different homes in Richardson County, Nebraska, Brown County Kansas and for a period of time on a ranch outside of Denver, Colorado. Dick graduated from Dawson Public School in 1949 and when the Korean war broke out, he joined the navy and did two tours of duty in Korea on the USS Point Cruz. After being discharged, Dick went back home to try his hand at farming, but between the hail and the drought, one year of that was enough. the call center or not. According to Lang, the \$180,000 annually would be for shared resources and dispatchers for "everyone but the city of Falls City" to go

through the call center.

When (now former) Beatrice Police Chief Bruce Lang presented the idea of joining the Southeast Nebraska 911 Center, he told the commissioners that other Southeast Nebraska counties were also on Board, but places such as Johnson County were "waiting to see how this goes."

As of today, Johnson County has not joined the SE NE 911 Center. Hardesty said he was fully intent on staying where they were until he saw it was on the agenda for the meeting and wanted to answer any questions the Board may have.

At the prior week's meeting Karas made a motion to submit a letter requesting termination of the agreement with SE NE Communications 911. The motion failed due to lack of a second.

CITY PLANS TO FLUSH FIRE HYDRANTS

Falls City Utility personnel will be flushing fire hydrants throughout the city starting in the next few weeks to flow test and remove any sediment built up in the water mains. This is scheduled to start on September 19, 2022.

Customers may experience a temporary brownish-red discoloration of their water during this flushing process. However, Ray Lahrung of the Utility Department notes that this water discoloration does not pose any health threat and the water is safe to use.

Persons, who notice flushing in process in their area, are advised not to use water for a short while until the flushing is complete, so as to not pull discolored water into their service piping. For those who do experience discoloration of water, the Water Department reminds them not to wash white clothes during this time since the brownish-red minerals will stain white clothing.

Lahrung commented: "The Water Department apologizes for any inconvenience that this flushing process might cause for consumers. The process of flushing the system at the fire hydrants removes as much of the build-up as possible. If we do not flush the system periodically, excessive iron and manganese build up and could lead to long-term problems such as clogging of lines and water fixtures. Your patience is appreciated."

ROAD AND BRIDGE DEPARTMENT

Highway Superintendent, Steve Darveau, Jr. updated the Board on the routine maintenance being done on County Roads and Bridges this past week. He presented a letter to the Board from an employee who has given his 2 weeks resignation. Mr. Darveau also reported that Constructors Inc. have completed the resurfacing of the road south of Rulo and the one-year warranty on the project was effective as of yesterday, August 29, 2022. Dwight Elliott requested to meet with the Board concerning the grading of county roads during the dry summer conditions and thought that it could be done less during these times. Mr. Darveau explained that the main traveled roads are maintained more often than some during the drier periods and that he would review the maintainer records with the operator in that area to re-evaluate the maintenance of the road.

Lady Irish searching for consistency

The Lady Irish volleyball team picked up its biggest win of the season on Tuesday evening when they hosted the fourth-ranked team in Class D-2, the Diller-Odell Griffins.

SH survived the opening set in a back-and-forth match, winning 30-28. The Irish raced out to a 5-0 lead to open the game, but the Griffins came storming back, taking an 8-7 lead. With the game tied at 28, the Irish scored the final two points of the set to get the win.

In set two, the Irish again led early, 3-0. Diller-Odell fought back, taking a nine-point lead at one point, 21-12. The Lady Irish fought back, getting within three at 20-23 before eventually falling 25-20.

To the surprise of no one, the third set was equally competitive. The most significant lead in the set by either team was three points, but Sacred Heart held on for the 25-22 win. The Griffins tied the match up in the next set, winning 25-23 to even things up at two. The Griffins led by six, 12-18, before the Irish mounted a comeback. The Lady Irish got as close at 19-21, but Diller-Odell held on to force a fifth and deciding match.

The final set wasn't as climactic as the first four as SH stormed to a 15-8 win, handing Diller-Odell just its second defeat of the year. The win bumped the Irish to 7-1 for the season.

Eickhoff had a team-high 16 kills, while Macy Keller finished with ten. Makinley Scholl had 21 digs and eight kills, while London Nachtigal finished with 20 digs, three blocks and nine kills. DeLanie Witt set her teammates up for 21 points while Jentry Lechtenberg added 17.

On Thursday evening, Sacred Heart traveled to Sidney, Iowa, to take on the 14-2 Cowboys. In a tight battle, SH fell in the opener 21-25 before rebounding to take the second set 25-19. The third and fourth sets were close, with Sidney

winning 25-23 and 26-24. The loss dropped the Lady Irish to 7-2 for the year.

Eickhoff led the Irish with 12 kills on 38 attempts. Nachtigal added nine kills and Keller and Makinley Scholl each had seven. Defensively, Nachtigal had three blocks, while Eickhoff and Jessica Wertenberger each had two. Lechtenberg finished with a team-high 18 assists, while Witt added 17.

On Saturday morning at the HTRS Invite, SH downed Southern in the opener 25-13 and 25-18. In the second round, SH survived a tough match against HTRS, winning 25-15, 29-31 and 25-10. In the championship on Saturday, Sacred Heart fell to the Johnson-Brock Eagles in straight sets, 25-21 and 27-25.

The Irish enter the MUDECAS Tourney this week with a 9-3 record, having dropped two matches last week. The Irish are the No. 1 seed in the "A" division this week in Beatrice and opened the tourney on Monday at 7:00 p.m. against Exeter-Milligan. With a win on Monday, SH would play at 7:00 p.m. Tuesday. A loss on Monday would mean a 4:00 p.m. contest on Tuesday. The championship will be played on Thursday, September 15, at the Truman Center on SCC's campus at 8:00 p.m. The third-place match will be at 2:00 p.m. at SCC.

Irish take care of business in Waco

On Friday, September 9, the Sacred Heart Irish football team traveled to Waco, Nebraska, for a contest against the undefeated Knights from Nebraska Lutheran. The Knights entered the matchup with wins over East Butler (51-2) and Silver Lake (70-50).

The two teams traded turnovers to open the game; SH picked off a Knight pass, then Nebraska Lutheran recovered an Evan Keithley fumble. Neither cost the other team points as the Irish defense forced a turnover on downs at their six-yard line after the fumble recovery.

SH methodically went down the field on the ensuing drive, with Keithley capping off the ten-play, 74-yard drive with an 18-yard TD run. After a Sam Dunn conversion run, SH led 8-0.

The Knights tied the game when QB Trey Richert found Jace Dressel for a six-yard TD pass, ending a 13-play, 60-yard drive.

After a 67-yard kick-off return by Keithley, the Irish punched it in on a three-yard pass from Dunn to Keithley to put SH back in the lead, 14-8, with 4:45 to go in the half.

The Knights were up for the challenge, needing just three plays to tie the contest for the second time. Trevor Hueske hauled in a 50-yard strike from Richert to tie things up at 14 with 4:17 still to go before the half.

Dunn engineered the Irish's third scoring drive, hitting Joe Simon for a 30-yard TD through the air to give the Irish a 20-14 advantage at intermission.

The Irish opened the third quarter with a 53-yard scoring run by Dunn to give SH a little breathing room at 26-14 with 10:34 to go in the third. A three-and-out by the Irish defense gave the ball right back to SH. However, the second fumble of the game by Keithley gave the Knights the ball deep in their territory at the 11-yard line. Nebraska Lutheran drove 69 yards in six plays to make it a one-possession game again at 26-20.

Again, the Irish offense answered, driving 65 yards for the score as Keithley hit pay dirt for

the third time to put SH in front 32-20 with 4:09 to play in the third.

On the next offensive drive for SH, Keithley turned the ball over right before crossing the goal line, causing a touchback for the Knights.

Nebraska Lutheran took advantage of the Irish mishap, driving 65-yards in six plays to make it 32-28 with 9:29 left on the clock.

The Irish took over from there, scoring the game's final 24 points to get the 56-28 win. Keithley added a pair of one-yard TD runs and Dunn snuck in from one yard out to secure the second win of the season for Sacred Heart.

"We really hurt ourselves with some bad turnovers. Three fumbles deep in their territory, including one that they recovered in the end zone that cost us points," said Coach Doug Goltz. "We never

punted but stopped ourselves four times with turnovers. I liked how we finished the game."

The Irish owned the ground attack, finishing with a 373-14 yard advantage. SH ended the game with 470 yards of total offense.

Dunn carried 11 times for 120 yards and two scores. Keithley added 32 totes for 228 yards and five TDs and Riley Nelson finished with four attempts for 25 yards. Dunn completed 7/11 passes for 97 yards, with Simon catching four of his passes for 86 yards and a TD.

Defensively, Nelson had 11 tackles, two for losses, to lead the Irish. Dunn finished with 11 stops, Keithley had nine and John Crouse added three sacks.

The Irish will host Diller-Odell on Friday, September 16, at Jug Brown Stadium.
