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Two-night Hot Air Balloon Festival pays off on Friday as storms move in Saturday

Falls City was transformed into a vibrant hub of color and excitement during its annual Hot Air Balloon Festival Friday night. This beloved event, eagerly anticipated by residents and visitors alike, couldn't have gone any better on Friday night with beautiful weather, gorgeous kites, balloons, bands and food.

The temperatures were warm, but a light breeze kept the evening nice for the hundreds of people who attended the annual event. Attendees arrived from all over the tri-state area looking for a good time and found one with everything going off beautifully Friday night.

Many have tried; few have succeeded in eliminating tax exemptions

By Paul Hammel, Retired Senior Reporter for Nebraska Examiner Many have tried, and few have succeeded in expanding the state's sales tax base by taxing things now exempt from taxation.

But that is where Gov. Jim Pillen is venturing in his pursuit of property tax relief.

His initial plan, which failed to win approval in the State Legislature this spring, would have imposed new taxes on a host of items that could be labeled "low-hanging fruit."

I mean who's going to get upset if we start imposing taxes on edibles infused with hemp, those slot machine-like "skill games," or pop and candy? How many folks will cry if we raise taxes on vaping products and cigarettes?

It reminded me of the old philosophy about taxation: "Don't tax you, don't tax me, tax that guy behind the tree."

But when it comes to eliminating tax breaks, you're going to face a gauntlet of lobbyists and special interests that worked hard to get a tax exemption in the first place. They don't want to give it up.

A decade ago, Gov. Dave Heineman proposed eliminating more than \$2 billion worth of sales tax exemptions to eliminate state income taxes, so we could be like neighboring Wyoming and South Dakota. No state income tax.

But at a public hearing on the idea, the line of lobbyists opposing the idea stretched into the hallway, and criticism of the proposal continued until midnight. The bill was eventually withdrawn.

This time around, Pillen is hoping to enlist taxpayers to rise up, and urge their state senators to ignore the phalanx of hired guns – the folks that wine and dine legislators, and organize their fundraisers - and rescind some exemptions.

The list of exemptions is over 100 items long, leaving about \$6.5 million of potential tax revenue uncollected, according to a recent story by Zach Wendling in the Nebraska Examiner.

The list is long, and includes such things as bull semen (used to artificially impregnate cows), biochips, repairs of cars and farm machinery, equipment used in manufacturing and data centers, groceries and (gulp) newspaper subscriptions.

There's a story behind every exemption – the biochip one was passed to help a Lincoln business grow and prevent it from moving out of state; bull semen is a business "input" for beef producers, as is equipment in factories and data centers; farm repairs were exempt to prevent "border bleed" of farmers buying parts from other states, where such parts were exempt.

Some exemptions seem to be a stretch. Why, for instance, is admission to a political event exempt, or a single-day ticket to visit the Henry Doorly Zoo in Omaha?

There's also some that are nearly untouchable, such as the tax breaks for churches and nonprofits, and the sales tax exemption on gro-

accountants would go away. For a long time, the influential, business-oriented Tax Foundation has called for updating state tax systems by taxing more services. It points out that people now spend more money on services (like car and home repairs, dry cleaning and haircuts) than on 'goods" like refrigerators and boats, so our current tax system is outdated and poorly focused.

But here's the kicker major tax changes in Nebraska typically happen in response to a crisis. Is the state in a "crisis" right now over property taxes?

Yes, we all complain about high property taxes in the Husker State, and our eyes bug out when we see our new, much higher, valuations on our homes and farm ground.

Property taxes, overall, have risen 53% over the past decade (which translates into about 5% a year), so no one's very happy about that.

But a crisis?

I don't see pitchforks in the street at this point. Sure, there's that petition drive for the EPIC Option tax, which would impose a consumption tax and eliminate nearly all other state taxes, but that has been labeled as a radical solution, and seems like a long-shot to make the ballot.

Meanwhile, the veterinarian governor is out doing town halls, pitching his

Best of luck. Getting 33 legislators to agree on any specific idea is a tall hill to climb (and Pillen says he wants a special session as early as July). Getting rid of state tax exemptions is like climbing Mount Everest.

INTERVENTION

It has been a few years since my children were babies! Having spent my youth as a babysitter and a career in pediatrics, I was pretty comfortable in watching the developmental of babies, toddlers and young children. (Teenagers are another story for another day!!) That isn't always the case for young parents who

may not have experience

with this age group.

Babies develop in a predictable somewhat fashion. As you think of a newborn, you might think of the poor neck control which changes drastically over the next few weeks to months. Perhaps you think about the cooing, babbling and words that may start in the 8-10 month time

As the parent, grandparent or care provider It is important to know the basic milestones so that you will be aware of a child who may have developmental delays and may need assistance. Early intervention is a system of services that helps babies and toddlers with developmental delays or disabilities. Early intervention focuses on helping eligible babies and toddlers learn the basic and brand-new skills that typically develop during the first three years of life, such as:

physical (reaching, rolling, crawling, and walking);

· cognitive (thinking, learning, solving problems):

communication (talking, listening, understanding);

· social/emotional (playing, feeling secure and

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happy); and

· self-help (eating, dressing).

The Grants for Infants and Families program (Part C) awards formula grants to the 50 states, District of Columbia. Puerto Rico, the Department of the Interior, and Outlying Areas to assist them in implementing statewide systems of coordinated, comprehensive, multidisciplinary, interagency programs and making early intervention services available to children with disabilities, aged birth through two, and their families. Under the program, states are responsible for ensuring that appropriate early intervention services are made available to all eligible birth-through-two-yearolds with disabilities and their families, including Indian children and families who reside on reservations geographically located in the state.

(Center for Disease Control- CDC- Early Intervention website)

To help monitor a child's developmental milestones, the CDC has put out a free development tracker app. The app offers photos and videos to guide you. This is an excellent way to follow your child's progress and intervene if needed. The earlier the intervention, the better for the child.

If you have concerns about your child's development, speak to your primary care provider who will help you with a referral for services.

How to build a better burger

Backyard barbecue season is starting to heat up. Although many people grill all year long, grilling season kicks into high gear in spring and summer.

Burgers will always be quintessential grilling fare. These tips can help anyone build a better burger.

Fat is key: For the most juicy, flavorful burger, you'll want a ratio of 80 percent meat to 20 percent fat. Some people like to eat lean, but with a burger, the fat will be necessary and it's better to select leaner meats for other dishes.

Don't overwork the meat: Handling the burger patties too much can lead to dense, tough burgers. Gently shape the burgers into round, 1-inch thick, flat discs. To prevent the burgers from rounding in the middle during cooking, press a dimple with your thumb in the center of the patty to help it cook evenly. It's a smart idea to weigh each patty to ensure uniformity of size and even cooking.

Don't add salt early on: Salt added to the ground meat before it's shaped can draw the liquid out of the meat, leaving a dry burger behind.

Avoid overcooking: Most health authorities recommend not leaving any pink meat in a burger made from ground meat. According to BBC Good Food, burgers can be cooked for 5 to 6 minutes on each side for medium and 8 to 9 minutes per side for well done.

Flip as desired: The cooking resource Serious Eats debunked the myth that burgers should only be flipped once. Flipping the burger repeatedly, as often as once every 15 seconds, encourages faster, more even internal cooking and can dramatically reduce cooking

Keep the patties separate: Let everyone build their own burgers, as keeping the cooked meat away from the burger buns for as long as possible will reduce the chances of the juices making the buns soggy. Soft, squishy buns tend to make for good burger eating, as they will not overwhelm the meat with too much crusty

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75 Years Ago, June 19, 1949 to June 25, 1949

With the government's help, rural America was lighting up at a record pace. About three-fourths of the country's farms now had electric service, up from the two-thirds a year earlier. Only 11 percent of the farms had electricity in 1934.

The citizens of Falls City were sweating it out as high temps reached 93 degrees, the high mark of the year at that point. One year earlier, the high on June 20 was 70 degrees. Mrs. William Rowland of Salem presented her husband with a new son on June 19 as a Father's Day present. The little boy, Everett Ray, was the couple's 12th child.

Sgt. First Class Roy Ramsey received an expert's rating with the carbine and Pfc. Rex Jones received a sharpshooter's rating with a pistol on an overnight trip to the Camp Ashland range.

A class of six boys and six girls took their first communion from Father Jerome Murray at Sts. Peter and Paul Catholic Church.

Hales Shows moved into City Park for a week-long carnival sponsored by the American Legion. Dr. L.V. Brennan, Legion commander, said the Legion would share in the revenue and that the post would donate a part of its share to finance the installation of lights on the City Park baseball field.

Defense Secretary Louis Johnson disclosed that he had authorized the Navy to refit two fleet carriers to handle atomic bombing planes at a cost of \$80,000,000.

Joe Sells of Rulo was recovering at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Hospital from injuries received in an explosion in a water well at the Paul Frederick filling station in Rulo. Sells was injured when he lit a piece of paper and dropped it into the well.

City officials had made arrangements with Skelly Oil Co. to use crude oil to surface unpaved streets in the city. The crude would be purchased from Skelly for \$1 per barrel. It was estimated that 11 barrels would be needed to cover one block, and with two coats needed, it would cost \$22 per block.

Sixteen adults and children attended a wiener roast given for members of the Pilot Sunday School class of the Evangelical United Brethren Church. Mrs. Donald Gilkerson, president, conducted the business session.

Contractors were moving in equipment for the big flood protection levee system which was to be built by the Army Engineers on the Nemaha bottoms south of Rulo.

With contributions for a light system at the City Park baseball fields reaching \$2,000, the committee signed a contract with Giant Manufacturing of Council Bluffs for the complete installation for \$6,610.50.

50 Years Ago, June 19, 1974 to June 25, 1974

Falls City's medical posture was enhanced with the announcement that Dr. Victor Arana had commenced a practice here and would be engaged in general surgery, gynecology and urology.

Walt Disney's "Robin Hood" was showing at the Rivoli Theater.

Lisa Prater, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William E. Prater of Humboldt, was selected to represent Nebraska at Girls Nation in Washington, D.C. Lisa attended Girls State in Lincoln and was one of two girls chosen to attend Girls Nation.

The state's recently passed no-smoking bill would go into effect on July 12. The bill prohibited smoking in certain public places, such as elevators, museums, libraries, hospi-

Gary Ramer's ground ball scored the winning run in the seventh inning as Shubert's A team down Johnson 5-4 in Pee Wee league play. Dave Gordon struck out 14 and allowed two hits, while Don Anderson added two singles and a double.

Mr. and Mrs. William Keeling, 1702 Crook Street, observed their golden wedding anniversary with a dinner held at Breezy Hill.

In Dawson news, Mr. and Mrs. Willie Fischer, Mr. and Mrs. Allen Fischer, Amy and David and Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Lundy had Father's Day dinner at Ken's Café in Sabetha. Falls City girls Cindy Noll and Ann O'Grady were robbed while on their way to Colorado. The pair were sitting in their car at a rest stop on I-70 in Kansas while two girls accompanying them were inside. A masked man appeared with a gun and demanded their money, which they gave him, and he then ran away. The duo called their parents from the Junction City police department before continuing to Colorado.

Tony Mount clubbed a home run and a triple and Chris Rader added a three-bagger as Bohrer Bros. defeated Ideal Cleaner 14-12 in Cookie League competition.


The fashion show will begin at 2 p.m., followed by testimony from Nebraska-based author Lori Gottula at 2:15 p.m. Gottula will be

those chains and pursue our best lives."


Gottula wrote her book in 2012 after going through the detox process because of an addiction to prescription painkillers due to a chronic back injury. She just recently found the courage to publish her work.


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ACCIDENT REPORTS

FCPS Superintendent's District Update

The Falls City Public Schools held its regular monthly board meeting on Monday, June 10, 2024. Here are the highlights of the meeting.

Legislative Update - The provisions of LB 71 become operative on July 19, 2024. This new law would allow children to remain in public pre-school until the mandatory kindergarten entrance age. As a result, eligible five-year-olds could now be accessing public pre-kindergarten, which could result in additional need and therefore additional costs. Relative to District 56 and the Parent-Child Center, the program capacity is currently near full with only 1 slot remaining for two days weekly. After consideration of the impact of LB 71, has been determined the district will actively research the provisions of 5-year-olds in preschool during the 2024-2025 school year. Implications to be considered include capacity space, full-day childcare needs, age grouping of 5-year-olds, preschool fees and financial considerations for increased staffing.

Additionally, this past legislative session, LB 1329 eased some of the statutory staff training requirements. In the past, some mandatory requirements were identified in the law for a set length of time. LB 1329 softened these mandates to "a reasonable amount as determined by each school board." This change in the law allows for more flexibility and local control. Boards have until the beginning of next school year to make this determination, and approved their resolution for District 56.

Transportation Report 2023-2024 - The school district's eight rural bus routes traveled 86,568 miles during the last school year, compared to 95,828 in 2022-2023. On average, the district's bus routes transported 232 students on a daily basis to and from school. The district's transportation program managed well in the 2023-2024 school year and the district is proud to have continued transportation services for the students in an efficient and healthy manner. District 56 is fortunate to have dedicated and experienced bus drivers, contributing to our stellar transportation safety record.

The District 56 Board of Education acted on several items before concluding the regular meeting.

1. Approved the final reading on Policy Reviews and Revisions: 1) 2116 Nondiscrimination; 2) 2117 Public Participation at Board Meetings; 3) 4222 Complaint Procedure; 4) 5309 Fiscal Management for Purchasing and Procurement Using Federal Funds; 5) 5312 Bidding for Construction, Remodeling, Repair or Related Projects Financed with Federal Funds; 6) 6320 Employee Leave Under the Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA).

- 2. Approved a five percent wage increase for classified employees for 2024-2025.
- 3. Approved a new PreK-5 School Guidance Curriculum Character Strong for 2024-2025.
- 4. Approved the substitute teacher daily rate of \$175 for 2024-2025.
- 5. Approved a resolution on faculty and staff training requirements for 2024-2025.

The next regular monthly Board of Education meeting is scheduled for July 8, 2024 at 7:00 P.M. in the Central Office in Falls City Middle School. Regular and special meeting agendas are kept in the Office of the Superintendent, Tim Heckenlively.



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
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The Quilted Truck: "Everyone that we've met is a piece, a functional beautiful piece of this town, and all together it's just this beautiful thing."

The inspiration for their mural came from the unique "quilted trucks" they had first seen in a friends photograph, but then observed around Falls City- vehicles patched together with different parts, each telling a story of resilience and unity.

The quilted truck said Andrew, "The metaphor of it is really beautiful. Like you love this thing, it's a sentimental thing. But also you want to keep the life of it going. So you find pieces and parts that work with it. And together, it makes it stronger and more functional. And I don't know, the quilted truck. It's like a metaphor for life. It's a metaphor for this place. But everyone that we've met is a piece, a functional, beautiful piece of this town. And all together. It's just this beautiful thing."

The pair took inspiration from the farming community, the sunset over the cornfields, the golden hour light and the people in town.

"It might seem like just moments being lived in ordinary life. But that's kind of it, right? I think that any chance we have to bring us back to the present moment and know that these times with community with people, that's all life is," said Sarah. "It was our goal to capture that. So when we saw that life being lived right outside our door at Stanton Lake, I was like, wow, this is just a beautiful moment of life in this place. And you guys have something really special. I feel like you guys have something really, really special that isn't found everywhere and that we haven't experienced it quite like this anywhere else. So we thank you all for being part of the fabric of this place."

It took countless hours, three weeks, and many, many layers of the 22 gallons of paint for the mural to take shape. As the pair worked, the community rallied behind them, offering their support and resources. From the paint purchased at Farm and City to the lift provided by Justin Brewer, every detail fell into place with local contribuspirit of Falls City shone through as er. various individuals added their touch by Alex Seeba to tuckpointing work by Brandon Schawang, stencil print-

ing from KawRes and vinyl matching from Merz Inc. Everyone added a special touch to the project.

"Falls City is a very unique thing. You may not realize this, but it's just really, really special," said Andrew. "The fact that you have everything that you'll need right here in town, and you're not part of a bigger metropolis. I don't know. We go to a lot of small towns, and there's not quite the same energy, lifeblood, or sustainability that we see in other places. And I will say throughout our process of painting this like we've never had, the rootin, for us kind of energy that we've had here."

Andrew thanked the town for being "a special place because not every place is like this place."

The pair said they would love to be part of the Falls City community again in the future for another mural.

The unveiling of the mural was a moment of pride and joy for everyone involved and those who had passed by daily to watch the progress. From the community doodle draw weeks ago, which set the reference points for the artists to create their work, to the ribbon cutting, this artwork, rich with symbolism and poetry, serves as a deep connection between art and communi-



An added safety platform, RapidSOS enhances the Next Generation 911 environment by providing caller location information to 911 centers even if a wireless carrier is unable to deliver a call. Among the suite of services offered through RapidSOS UNITE, are enhanced caller location information and single sign-on access.

"Many Nebraska PSAPs currently utilize RapidSOS," said PSC State 911 Director David Sankey. "Elevating all PSAPs to the company's UNITE modules, will provide even more tools to supplement caller location capabilities should a disruption in wireless service occur."

More than 80 percent of emergency calls today, are made by wireless devices. With the integration of RapidSOS UNITE, PSAPs will receive an added layer of support in providing emergency response.

"RapidSOS harnesses the power of technology and the data from our devices to connect communities directly to safety during an emergency," said Edward Parkinson, President of Public Sector at RapidSOS. "RapidSOS offers a separate and redundant pathway to 911 that connects citizens in need to 911, even during outages. We thank the State of Nebraska for putting its trust in RapidSOS. It is an honor to work with public safety in the state."
