Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr., updated the Board on road and bridge maintenance. The Board reviewed the condition of the roads and areas that need rock with Darveau. Correspondence was received from Vicki Jacobitz regarding some areas that need rock and to thank the County Road Department for the great job maintaining the roads.

A brief discussion was had regarding roads that need rock. Darveau said he feels the rock they buy has gotten progressively worse. He noted that equipment

The original committee consisted of: Kelly Carpenter, Sandra Hartman, Jo Schock, Tony Brunette and Peggy Davidson. Peggy then chose a volunteer from each small town

or village in the county. That first year they were able to help 13 people.

Over the years, the fund has assisted approximately 730 patients, with 17 individuals receiving support as of May 2024.

Under new leadership, the fund continues to adapt and evolve to meet the challenges of the times. Jackie Johnson stepped up as president from 2013 until 2019. Johnson was successful in her tenure with a favorite memory as President being the "Car Tour Museum" held in Lincoln at the car museum of Gary Koch. Beth Vonderschmidt, the current President took over in 2019. Vonderschmidt has steered the organization through turbulent waters, culminating in innovative approaches such as the move of the annual fundraiser to July for a more outdoor-friendly experience after COVID hit in 2020.

As the Richardson County Cancer Fund looks to the future, community involvement remains crucial. Residents are encouraged to reach out for support or explore ways to contribute, whether through donations, volunteer work, or attending the upcoming 'Party On The Patio' event. Latest trial balloon from Pillen on property taxes calls for state takeover of funding

Back in the day, a small, "trial balloon" would be sent aloft to discern wind speed and direction before a balloon carrying people was launched.

Folks were rightly concerned about rising into the heavens blindly, without knowing if a catastrophic whirlwind was aloft.

Right now, we're seeing plenty of trial balloons sent aloft by Gov. Jim Pillen to determine if a plan to dramatically reduce local property taxes might have a shot at success during his special session, scheduled to start July 25.

As we recall, one of his first trial balloons on this oft-debated issue was pretty quickly shot down - to hike state sales taxes by 2 cents (to a nationally high 7.5 cents). The idea was to shift the cost of local, K-12 education off local property taxes and onto state sales tax.

Now comes an equally innovative (and some would say "radical") trial balloon - shifting the entire cost of local education to the state, instead of relying, in large part, on local property taxes.

According to reporting by Martha Stoddard of the Omaha World-Herald, that would result in a 60% decrease in local property taxes by removing K-12 schools from the slate of things funded by property taxes (a list that now includes counties, cities, natural resources districts and the like).

Something, of course, would have to give at the state level to finance such a \$1.6 billion plus shift in taxes.

Pillen has offered some interesting trial balloons on that, such as a "two-tiered" sales tax system, in which some items, such as inputs for businesses and agriculture, would be taxed at a lower rate, presumably 2%, while other goods and services would be taxed at a high rate, maybe 5%.

One state senator, Dave Murman, a Glenvil farmer, told Stoddard that such a tax plan wouldn't be a "shift" but a "rebalancing," which is a pretty generous effort at putting lipstick on a pig.

But most Nebraskans know a tax increase when they see one, and if they're paying more sales taxes on a candy bar or a new car, that's a tax hike.

The latest trial balloon from our farmer/governor, the state takeover of funding local schools, comes with a lot of unanswered questions. Who, under that system, would decide a local school's budget?

It certainly would not be the locally elected school board - those folks that might just live down the street or road and know exactly the needs of your local school. So who would it be?

A state school board? The governor's office? Who would decide teacher salaries? Some panel in Lincoln? Or a board that meets in your local town? And what about school consolidation, a very touchy subject in rural areas? Might the state, when funds are tight and need to be cut (and we're overdue for one of those periods), tell local schools that "we only have so much money, so it's best if you merged with the school district next

door."

For years, the mantra at the State Capitol has been that Nebraska has too many local governments - too many counties, too many school districts. If only there were fewer counties and school districts, the thinking goes, things would be more efficient, and cost fewer dollars.

But efforts to force mergers, or give incentives to consolidate haven't gained much traction in the past.

Nebraskans like their local control. They like knowing whom to call if the streets didn't get cleared of snow or the muddy lane didn't get enough gravel - and like knowing they can vote that person out of office if they didn't get a response.

(A buddy recently remarked that "Nebraskans hate government but have 93 counties. How do you explain that?" See above.)

Pillen's latest trial balloon, to have the state fund local schools, would be a huge change.

It would also be a departure from how other recent governors have tried to chip away at the state's high property taxes, instead of taking a sledgehammer to make a big change in funding state and local government.

But Pillen is bringing the wood to this issue. He's promised a 40% reduction in local property taxes (really 20%, because there's been a 20% reduction already) and pledged to call special sessions until Christmas to get it done. The first session, he announced last week, will begin July 25 in Lincoln.

But talkin' and doin' are two different things, and getting enough senators - most assuredly 33 of the 49 - to agree on one plan, particularly a major change like state funding of local schools, seems like the longest of shots.

This governor seems very willing to launch trial balloons, but my guess is that he needs to keep launching.

URINARY LEAKAGE IN MEN AND WOMEN

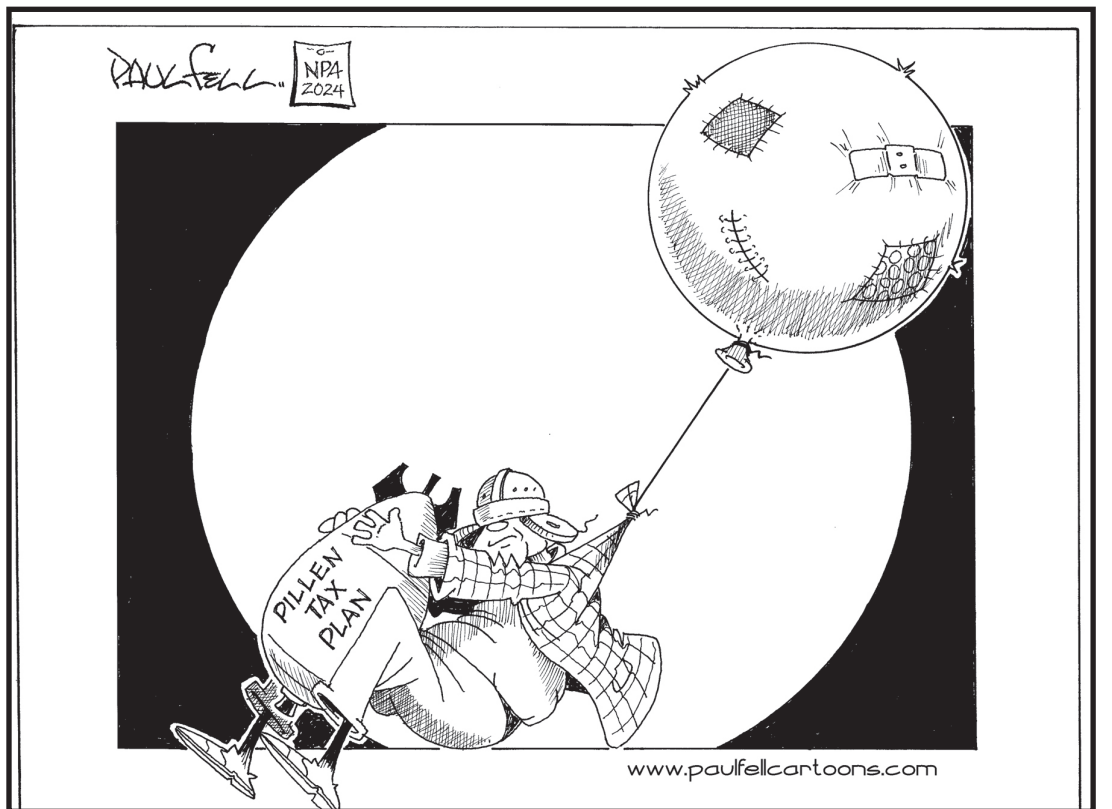
As husband and wife urologists, we talk a lot about the urinary tract and how it affects our patients.

In women, the most common urinary concern is incontinence, or the involuntary leakage of urine. There are several causes and many treatment options exist depending on the type.

The two main types of urinary leakage in women are urge urinary incontinence and stress urinary incontinence. For women with urge incontinence, treatment is aimed at improving quality of life disrupted by overactive bladder. Overactive bladder is characterized by urinary urgency, frequency, waking up at night to urinate, with or without urge urinary incontinence. The most important first steps a patient can take to reduce bother include limiting caffeine intake, minimizing fluid intake (unless you have kidney stones, you do NOT need to drink 8 glasses of water a day), and urinating on a schedule every two hours or so while awake. The next step in treatment is medication. Many medications are no longer used due to unfavorable side effects of dry mouth, constipation and even dementia. Newer medications are much safer and better tolerated. Be sure to ask your doctor if your bladder medication is associated with an increased risk of memory loss and dementia. If medications fail, "third line therapy" is available. This includes tibial nerve stimulation, Botox bladder injections and an outpatient procedure to place a neuromodulation device (think of this as a pacemaker for the bladder). Treatment duration with Botox can last up to 9-12 months and neuromodulation is typically effective for 10-15 years or more, at which point a battery will need to be replaced.

Men can also experience urge incontinence and treatments are similar as for women; however, some differences do exist which can relate to enlarged prostate.

The bottom line is, if you are suffering from urinary incontinence, many treat-



ment options exist and we encourage you to speak with your doctor about these issues.

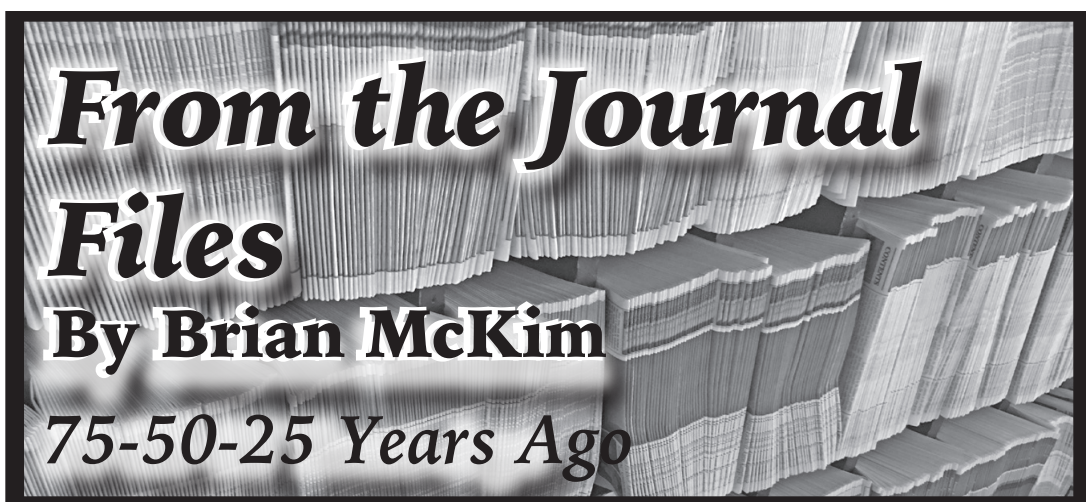

75 Years Ago, July 3, 1949 to July 9, 1949

The nation's observance of the Fourth of July and efforts to escape the worst heat wave in years cost 747 lives in the heaviest holiday carnage in history. Broken down, 312 died on highways, 250 drowned, 47 died from the heat, 17 in airplane accidents and 121 died violently in miscellaneous accidents.

A disappointing 1,800 spectators attended the American Legion-sponsored Fourth of July celebration at the airport. Pete Baileys' automobile daredevils from Atchison gave the crowd what they came for as the four drivers turned cars over, crashed them, drove through walls of ice and had head-on collisions.

The pool at Crystal Beach was closed until further notice for repair work. The pool's water could not be filtered because of defective filtering, acquiring an abundance of algae. The pool would need to be drained, scrubbed and refilled.

After two weeks of experimentation, Mayor Paul Zimmer and the city council went on record as being very much in favor of continuing the oiling of unpaved streets.

Close to 1,000 people attended the first night baseball game at City Park. Unfortunately, Falls City fell to Humboldt 4-5 in the contest. Sterling and Walter Kottich each had two hits for the Falls City club. Proceeds from the game, \$138.68, were donated to the Light Fund, taking the total raised to \$3,041.50, with approximately another \$2,500 remaining to be raised.

The third annual 4-State Roundup World's Championship Rodeo took place in Fairfax with \$3,750 in an added purse.

Mix Master Market at 1703 Stone, Bullock's Market at 1301 Stone, Marsh's Market in Verdon, Nelson's Market at 1319 Fulton, Harper's Market at 822 Stone and Westside Market at 310 West 21st all advertise low prices on their products every day.

Robert W. Deeds, a suspect in the Elks Club robbery in which two thieves made off with nearly \$1,500 in December of 1946, was sentenced to the Nebraska Penitentiary for six years.

In recognition of the vastly improved Humboldt baseball park, a dedication program was arranged for their contest against Odell. The lighting system had been enhanced by 18,000 watts and new bleachers had been constructed.

The J.C. Penney Company selected Guy R. Lockard, manager of the Penney store in Falls City, as the group leader for seven stores in the area. The stores included Falls City, Nebraska City, Holton, Horton, Seneca, Leavenworth and Atchison.

Richard D. Slagle, a former Falls Cityan, resigned as the Wayne County Public Power District manager to take a position with the Nebraska Public Power System in its new steam power plant in Bellevue.

50 Years Ago, July 3, 1974 to July 9, 1974

According to the latest production numbers, the United States dropped from No. 1 in world crude oil production to No. 2 and could fall as far as No. 3. Saudi Arabia moved into the top spot, with the Soviet Union moving close to second.

Reports for the first five months of the year in Nebraska showed 1,118 abortions had been performed between January and May.

Ray Joy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Joy, observed his third birthday with a cook-out held in his honor. Ice cream and birthday cake were served later in the evening. A large crowd attended the spectacular fireworks display at the city park in Humboldt. The display was followed by a pork barbecue, which also drew a large crowd.

Subby and Blanche Lombardo won the Fourth of July Couple Golf Tournament at the Country Club with a net of 129. Sixty-eight golfers participated in the event.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Weber of Staten Island, NY, announced the engagement of their daughter, Mary, to Jeffery Barker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Barker of Shubert.

Seven Falls City High School students completed a four-week course in project construction under the instruction of Vocational Agricultural Instructor Norman Fritz. The youth, Darwin Godemann, Jerry Feek, Carl Messner, Roger Lampe, Mike Gerweck, Steve Davis and Jim Cook, received five hours of credit for 75 hours of class time.

Carol Rogers, the wife of Elmer Rogers, was pictured on the front page of the Journal with many of the 700 owl figurines she collected.

Forty-six Richardson County 4-H Club members enrolled for a three-day camp at Tarkio, Missouri, from July 8 to 10.

Merlin Potts of Leonardville, Kansas, was crowned the champion of the Four-State Horseshoe Tournament for the third consecutive year.

Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Noll announced their daughter's engagement and approaching marriage, Miss Cynthia, to Richard Santo, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Santo.

Falls City High School hired Fred Weaver, son of Mr. and Mrs. Phil Weaver, to handle the additional enrollment in industrial education classes.

Six new members were initiated into the B.P.O. Does Drove 56 when 46 members attended the regular meeting at the Elks Lodge. Those initiated included Mrs. Wesley Gatz, Mrs. Fred Hansen, Miss Norma Hansen, Mrs. Charles Mez, Mrs. Wayne Gatz and Mrs. Larry D. Gatz.

25 Years Ago, July 3, 1999 to July 9, 1999

Excellent progress was being made on the new water line to Salem. Rieschick Drilling, the main contractor, was scheduled to work for the next six weeks with the goal of completing the project by September 1.

The City Council took no action on a request to prohibit the discharge of fireworks within city limits. A member of the public questioned if her request was not possible, would the council be open to limiting the use of fireworks from a time such as 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.?

Ryan and Holly Rieschick were the parents of a daughter born at Falls City Community Medical Center. Meg Alexandra was born 7 pounds and was 19 1/2 inches long.

Gerald Fritz, representing the Vietnam Veterans of America, Chapter 455, presented Marshall Maddox with a check for \$300. Maddox was spearheading the drive to establish the Richardson County Military Museum in the Courthouse.

may have gotten heavier and that there are larger trucks and semis on the roads, which crushes the rock more easily.

The Roads Department is also short staffed, but reminded the Board that other counties are having the same issues with their country roads.

Darveau presented to the Board 18 specific areas of brush complaints, which will also be provided to the County Attorney for action, with notices to be sent to the landowners.

The Board also agreed that a notice should be put in the county newspapers regarding the responsibility of landowners to mow the roadsides in July and September and to remove brush along the county road right-of-way. (See page 15)

Brian Kirkendall, EMA Director, reviewed the potential flooding along the Missouri River with the Board in the next few days.

At the time of the meeting on Wednesday, June 26, the Missouri River at Rulo was running at 19.2 feet.

Gavins Point Dam at the border of Nebraska and South Dakota is releasing 24,000 cubic feet of water per second. According to the US Army Corps of Engineers, as of June 28, Gavins Point had dropped the release it to 13,000 cubic feet per second.

Kirkendall explained that minor flood stage is 17 feet; moderate is 21 feet and major is 26 feet. In 2011 the river had significant flooding hitting 27.2 feet. In 2019 the Missouri River reached 28.1 feet.

The river was at 22.3 feet at 1:00 a.m. on Sunday, June 30. The prediction is that the river will crest at 23.8 feet on June 30 at 1:00 a.m. and return to 16 feet on July 2 at 1:00 p.m. This was discussed before the rain we received on Monday. Kirkendall also reported that the Governor has declared an emergency for the counties along the Missouri River and that this action will free up resources to assist with the flood damage.

Sheriff Hardesty updated the Board on the routine business within the Law Enforcement Center the past week. He reported that there were 23 inmates in the Jail the morning of the meeting. He also reported that he assisted Pawnee County with two search warrants this past week.

A discussion was held on the repairs that need to be made to the padded cell in the Jail, which an inmate damaged back in April, and that the County is still waiting on a response to the messages left with representatives from the NE Jail Standards as to approval of this major repair which is accordance with the NE Jail Standards regulations.

John Day, Executive Director of Blue Valley Behavioral Health, presented to the Board a brief report on the services they provide here in Richardson County and asked for continued support in funding of \$8,000 for the next fiscal year.

The Board relayed to

Day that the County needs to have a contract in place for this funding to be in compliance with auditing standards. County Attorney Samantha Scheitel was in attendance for this meeting and indicated that she would draft a contract and forward it to Day for Blue Valley's review.

Scott Miller of Miller Farrell Insurance Agency reviewed with the Board the bid that was submitted for the County's insurance coverage for July 1, 2024, through June 30, 2025. Different options for property coverage for the Courthouse were obtained by Miller Farrell and were presented to the Board for consideration in addition to the coverage that was submitted with the bid on June 5.

A motion was made to approve and award the bid received at the June 5, 2024, meeting from Miller Farrell Insurance Agency for the county insurance's coverage package with the alternate bid of property coverage that was presented to the Board today labeled as "option #4" for the property coverage for the Courthouse making the total amount of premium at \$320,180 for the year, the motion carried.

The Annual Report of the Southeast Nebraska Development District was submitted to the Board for review. Also included was the membership packet and the request for FY24-25 dues in the amount of \$4,192.00.

A motion was made by Karas to approve the applications for the additions to the facility of the Quad County Golf Association

Kirkman's Lakeview Golf Course: An addition of indoor area 35' X 40' and an addition of indoor storage area 24' X 12'. The motion carried.

Resolution 2023-2024-46 to approve the use of the unencumbered funds remaining within the Miscellaneous Budget of the General Fund to cover the expenses overspent in the Surveyor, Humboldt Law Enf Agreement, Communications Dispatch and Dist Court Child Support budgets in the General Fund was adopted.

A recommendation from the NE Association of County Officials was received regarding the printing of the notices to be sent to all tax parcels of a joint public hearing if required, with them recommending that CSG International print the counties.

A motion was made to approve CSG print company as recommended by NACO for the notices of the joint public hearing if required, the motion carried.

A Sub-division for Karen D. Ramsey, Trustee of the Ramsey Living Trust located in S7, T2, R15 will be considered at a later meeting.

Funds were received for the Opioid settlement from Janssen (#4) in the amount of \$3,700.62.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:55 a.m. The Board will meet again on Wednesday, July 3, 2024, at 9:00 a.m. for the regular weekly meeting in the Commissioner's Meeting Room, Courthouse, Falls City. The agenda is kept current at the County Clerk's Office.

NHTSA reminds drivers that buzzed driving is drunk driving

As the nation celebrates Independence Day, the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) Region 7, which includes Arkansas, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, and Nebraska, reminds all drivers that Buzzed Driving Is Drunk Driving. In 2022, a person was killed every 39 minutes in a drunk-driving crash on our nation's roads, even though it is illegal to drive while impaired by alcohol.

Every year, the Fourth of July holiday stands out as one of the deadliest times on our nation's roads. From 2018 to 2022, there were 2,228 traffic crash fatalities during the holiday, 1,414 of whom were the driver. Thirty-nine percent (545) of those drivers were drunk. Of the 1,414 drivers killed, the 21-34 age group had the highest percentage (50 percent) of drunk drivers.

"If you decide to celebrate Independence Day by drinking, it is your duty to not get behind the wheel. Even one drink is too many to drive safely. Making celebration arrangements with friends and family for the Fourth of July festivities is common. In the same vein, it's crucial to plan for a sober ride home and completely rule out drinking and driving," said Regional

Administrator Susan DeCourcy. "We're partnering with local law enforcement to remind drivers that Buzzed Driving Is Drunk Driving. Celebrating our nation's independence responsibly is vital to prevent endangering the relatives or friends of others."

Drivers should be safe during this Independence Day holiday by being proactive if they intend to drink. They shouldn't wait until after drinking to plan how to get somewhere, because impairment clouds a person's judgment. Drivers should secure a designated sober driver or call a taxi or rideshare for a sober ride home.

If a driver thinks they might be impaired, they should give their keys to a sober driver so that person can get them home safely. When a friend has been drinking and is considering driving, friends should be assertive — take away the keys and help them get a sober ride home. If you spot a drunk driver while driving, contact local law enforcement as soon as it's safe to do so.

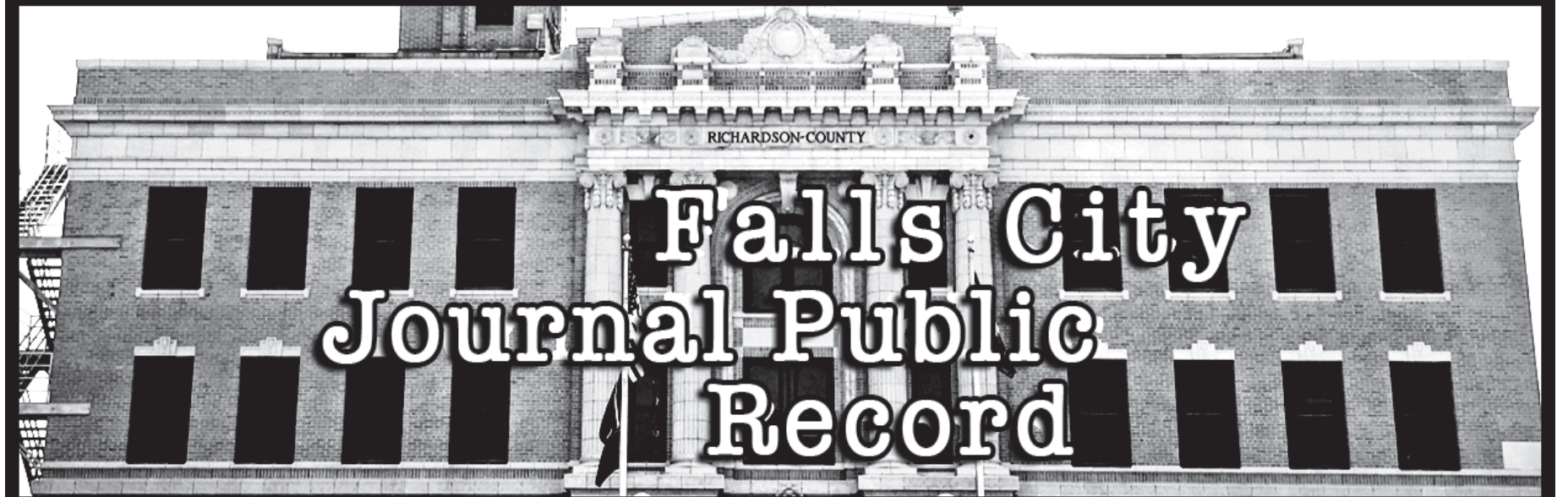

The visitors added three runs in the second, pushing their lead to 5-1.

Again, FC battled back. Elijah Leyden worked a walk to open the second inning. Baxter reached on an error, driving in Leyden to make it 2-5. An RBI single by Elin Vonderschmidt made it 3-5 and a groundout by Huppert closed the gap to 4-5.

Baxter settled in on the mound, allowing just one run on the third, as FC kept things close.

The Juniors came out swinging in the bottom half of the inning, scoring four times to take the lead, 8-6. Noah Howard got things started with a single up the middle. Kacen Davis stroked a double to left to drive Howard home to make it 5-6. Next up, Callen Furnas singled to left to score Davis and tie the game at six. Baxter followed with an RBI double and Vonderschmidt drove in the final run on a groundout to put FC in the driver's seat with an 8-6 lead.

Baxter and Mason Collier combined to throw three innings of scoreless ball as FC improved to 4-14 with the win.

"We've dealt with traumatic brain injury, we've dealt with cancer, we've dealt with mental health issues, substance abuse, physical activity and heart health," said Larsen. "These are the things we've been focused on."

CEO Larsen added that Richardson County has been above average and in the top quartile nationally since the inception of the annual fundraiser.

"This progress has come even though we still struggle in the ratings with things like smoking, obesity, inactivity, lower wages and needing more health professionals. We are used to doing more with less," said Larsen.

Larsen thanked the doctors, staff, community members, and leaders for

the improvements. He also called attention to the fundraiser, which "helps publicize what we are trying to do and what we are trying to build."

Larsen acknowledged the incredible accomplishments of the "legends" in attendance, but he didn't stop there.

"In our own way, I like to think that we are doing something amazing," said Larsen. "Maybe nobody will ever celebrate it, but we're working to make a difference in our community, and I thank everyone for being a part of that."

Johnson then emceed a question-and-answer session with the four athletes in attendance: Ricky C. Simmons, Tommie Frazier, Mike Rozier and Johnson. Two additional legends would join the group for the golf tour-

namment the following day. The pair making an appearance on Friday included Eric Crouch and Johnny Rodgers.

Unfortunately, Mother Nature didn't get the memo, as early morning storms on Friday caused the postponement of the golf tourney. Still, Crouch and Rodgers made the trip to southeast Nebraska, making it the first time that all three Husker Heisman Trophy winners were together in Falls City.

The discouraging news came early Friday morning, but there was hope. The tournament would be postponed to Saturday, minus four of the original six "legends." Mike Rozier and Ricky C. Simmons agreed to spend the day in Falls City and play in the tourney on Saturday. With great luck and even better weather, 14 of the original 19 teams that signed up for the event teed off at the Falls City Golf Course on Saturday morning with a 9:00 shotgun start. The 56 players enjoyed a mostly cloudy and breezy day, with highs hovering in the low 80s.

The event was billed as the final one a year ago, but Simmons said he felt he had something to do with it.

"I take a little bit of credit for this event being put on. Last year, when I came here, they said it was the last time. I was bargaining for another year, so I give myself credit," said Simmons with a chuckle.

After organizing the event 13 times, Santo was asked what the most rewarding aspect of it was. After a pause, Santo said the impact and ability to have the celebrities in Falls City has been significant.

"As a state of Husker fans, what Coach Reed has brought to Falls City

is incredible; no one will ever match this," said Santo. "But, then again, the hospital. You know what quality of life is as you get older, and healthcare and wellness are so important. So, everything that we can do to keep our hospital award-winning, top-quality, and provide healthcare for our community. The stability of healthcare in our community is vital."

Coach Reed has been happy to support the community in Falls City in any way he can.

"Dwayne Harris called me yesterday, before everybody got here, upset that I didn't invite him," said Coach Reed. "So, I told him this was probably the last one we're gonna do; I said that to Tommie (Frazier), they

were together. He yelled, 'You got one more to do.'"

According to Santo, the event has far exceeded expectations. They have watched it go from an idea to something elite for the area.

"As long as we can do it, but our years are numbered," said Santo.

Santo wanted to emphasize to the community how special the event was.

"I want people to understand the importance of what we're trying to install. The health, the hospital, the creation of kids understanding our legacy of Husker football and volunteer," said Santo. "I hope we can cultivate our younger generation to be stewards of giving, volunteerism, and care for our community."

Items to include in a disaster supplies kit

Previous natural disasters have shown everyone how unpredictable the fallout from storms and other weather events can be. For example, drone footage of areas ravaged by hurricanes or tornados often shows a few seemingly untouched homes in a sea of properties that were leveled or damaged beyond repair. Such footage shows how much damage natural disasters can do and underscores the importance of preparation to surviving potentially deadly storms. In recognition of that importance, the American Red

Cross advises everyone to prepare a disaster supplies kit that they can utilize should they need to evacuate their homes. The Red Cross recommends including the following items in the kit and storing them in an easy-to-carry container, such as a backpack or duffel bag.

- **Water:** Include one gallon of water per person per day and store it in sealed, unbreakable containers. Date each container and replace it every six months.

- **Food:** Maintain a supply of nonperishable packaged or canned food. Store

a non-electric can opener with the food.

- **Clothing:** Include a change of clothing as well as rain gear and sturdy shoes.

- **Sleeping essentials:** Pack a blanket or sleeping bag for each member of the family.

- **First aid kit and prescription medications:** If necessary, individuals can speak with their physicians in advance of their region's storm season to request their prescriptions are updated so they can more easily get their medicine should they run out while they are away from home.

- **Eyeglasses:** Pack an extra pair of eyeglasses should an existing pair be lost or broken while away from home.

- **Battery-powered electronics:** Pack a battery-powered radio and flashlight and plenty of extra batteries as well.

- **Extra set of car keys**

- **Medical lists:** Include a list of family physicians for each individual in the supply kit. In addition, document the style and serial number of medical devices such as pacemakers.

Disaster supplies kits can help individuals and their families safely navigate the initial aftermath of potentially deadly storms.

REMINDER TO LANDOWNERS

Pursuant to NE Revised State Statutes 39-1811

Roadsides must be mowed at least twice per year.

It shall be the duty of the landowners in this state to mow all weeds that can be mowed with the ordinary farm mower to the middle of all public roads and drainage ditches running along their lands at **least twice each year**, namely, **sometime in July** for the first time **and sometime in September** for the second time.

Pursuant to NE Revised State Statutes 39-1812

Hedges and trees; trimming; duties of landowners

Each landowner in this state upon whose land there is standing or growing any osage orange, willow or locust hedge fence, trees, or undergrowth, bordering the public roads, when such fence, trees, or undergrowth become a public nuisance to travel on the roads, or obstruct the view at or near railroad crossings, crossroads or abrupt turns in the road, shall keep the same trimmed not less than once a year by cutting back to within four feet of the ground, excepting trees, which shall be trimmed from the ground up eight feet, and the trimmings so cut shall be burned or removed from the road right-of-way within ten days after each cutting.

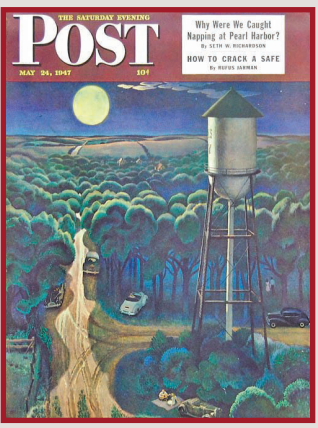
