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

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"Every dollar, every nickel counts in higher education"

Dr. Jeffrey P. Gold, President of the University of Nebraska system, made a pit stop in Falls City on Monday morning, July 29. This was his second stop on the first day of a five-day tour across the state. President Gold met with community leaders at the Chamber office to discuss partnerships and his vision for the future. Gold's tour began in Nebraska City on Monday morning and concluded with a stop in Scottsbluff on Friday.

"This trip is dedicated to listening and learning from Nebraskans in every corner of our state about how we can work together to create a strong future," Dr. Gold said. "I'm excited to travel across our 500-mile campus to learn more about the University of Nebraska's statewide impact and hear from community members about our opportunities to build upon our long history, strengthen our partnerships, and collectively continue to change lives, build the workforce and keep Nebraska competitive and growing."

Gold, a product of the New York Public School system, a heart surgeon and a longtime college administrator, assumed the role of President for the Nebraska College System on July 1, 2024. Gold met his wife, Robin, in medical school and has been married for nearly 50 years.

"The best decision of my life was when I proposed to Robin," said Gold. "The second-best decision by the way, I've told people, was coming to Nebraska ten years ago."

President Gold defined a professional as someone who possesses unique skills and knowledge, is self-critical and puts others above self. He firmly stated that higher education needs to be focused on the same three criteria.

"I firmly believe that higher education, the research science that we do, the community engagement that we do and economic development that we do has to be focused on the same basic premises of superior knowledge and skill, being self-critical of what we do well and what we need to do better and to be the ultimate consummate professional and put others above self," said Gold. "If we truly want to bring the best out of our students, faculty and staff, we need to treat them like family members."

Gold noted that higher education is expensive, and the university system is not immune to inflation and rising costs.

"Having grown up in the circumstances that I did and having realized that every dollar, every nickel counts in higher education," said Gold. "We have to be super careful that we steward those dollars



Summertime, and the living isn't so easy at the State Capitol

College students have left, state lawmakers have gone home, the weather gets hot, the backyard tomatoes get ripe, and the biggest debate around town is whether this is the year the Huskers become relevant again in foot-

Optimism always abounds in the pre-season, before the first kickoff.

But not sure the same optimism accompanies the special session Gov. Jim Pillen has convened to address the state's traditionally high property taxes.

Every year, state senators tackle a variety of ideas to cut property taxes, and every year they chip away at the problem – a new tax refund here, a bigger tax credit there.

There's been incremental changes in recent years. About \$1 billion in reductions have been accomplished by shifting community colleges off the property tax rolls, and increasing the tax credits we get from what we pay to support local schools.

(The most recent tax bill we paid on a small farm in northeast Nebraska, for instance, actually went down slightly, though some senators complain what's been done has only slowed the increase in property taxes in their districts.)

The reason there's been only incremental changes in property taxes is that it's really hard to enact sweeping changes, like Pillen is proposing.

He wants to shift the load off of local property taxes and onto state sales and income taxes. And when you're shifting the load from one group of taxpayers to another, that gets a squadron of special interests and lobbyists all stirred up.

"Don't tax me, tax that man behind the tree" is the old saying, and already organizations representing the state's farmers and business groups have objected to portions of Pillen's tax plan, which calls for imposing a new 2-cent sales tax on ag and business equipment.


That new tax, they argue, would hurt farmers and companies.

Of course, anyone facing a new or increased tax can raise similar arguments.

For instance, raising taxes on vaping and smoking hurts low-income people, some argue, because they are the predominant customers for those products. Raising taxes on candy and pop will force people to buy those things in another state and will be a burden on retailers to discern what qualifies as "candy" and what doesn't. Requiring auto repair shops and home remodelers to collect sales tax will force more under-the-table transactions, to avoid the tax.

There's also pushback to Pillen's plan because it would be a huge erosion in local control of K-12 education, shifting decisions to Lincoln and away from the local school board.

You gotta give Pillen credit for proposing a plan. But what he's seeking is a big gulp, not a small, incremental improvement, like those that have won passage in recent years.



For instance, why doesn't Nebraska legalize online sports betting and get some tax revenue from that? The expected haul would be \$100 million a year, which isn't insignificant.

Why not increase the tax on cigarettes? It's a bad habit that is bad for your health, and Nebraska hasn't increased taxes on cigarettes for 21 years. A tax increase might force some people to quit smoking and others to not pick up the habit, which are both good things.

Pillen argued, in a recent column, that Nebraska faces a "crisis" in property taxes. They are "out of whack," he says. It's forcing people out of their homes, he claims, and makes young people move out of state.

We all gripe about property taxes, but I'd like to see some proof of those claims. Most studies indicate that young people move out of state for better jobs and to live in places with amenities they can't get in Nebraska, such as pro sports, ski resorts, Broadway shows and sandy beaches.

And the state offers a pretty generous property tax break, via the homestead tax exemption program, for low-income folks, and veterans and handicapped homeowners who qualify. It helps keep people in their home. If it isn't working well enough, it should be expanded.

This all suggests that there's plenty of tweaks to the state's tax system that would reduce property taxes - tweaks that historically have been easier to pass than huge changes like Pillen is proposing.

Our governor has maintained that he won't settle for something less. But past history suggests he should be ready to settle for more

modest changes.

Pain in your mouth is difficult to ignore, especially when it affects everyday activities like speaking, eating, or sleeping. Here are some of the most common reasons to visit your dentist.

The first sign to visit your dentist is a persistent toothache. Sometimes our teeth can hurt temporarily due to things like teeth whitening or sinus issues. However, if a toothache does not go away, or goes away and then comes back, this is a good sign to visit your dentist to identify the source of pain.

Pain or soreness in your jaw (especially when that pain is accompanied by a headache) can point to bruxism, which is the repeated clenching or grinding of your teeth. Treating bruxism is often as simple as prescribing a custom fit mouth guard which separates your teeth, hence preventing any clenching or grinding. Severe bruxism can wear down or break teeth, which may need to be fixed by your dentist.

If you are experiencing any swelling in your gums or jaw, this is a good indicator of an infection in your mouth. An abscessed tooth is also a signal of an infection. Treatment ranges from draining the abscess, a root canal, or even pulling the tooth. Antibiotics can sometimes take care of an infection in your mouth, but leaving a tooth abscess untreated can lead to serious, even life-threatening, complications.

Gums that are red, swollen, and bleed every time you brush or floss your teeth could signal periodontal disease. This is an infection in the tissues that hold your teeth in place. If left untreated, periodontal disease can lead to bone loss around the teeth and eventually lead to tooth loss.

If you crack or chip a tooth,

you should also see your dentist as soon as possible even if the tooth does not hurt. A crack or chip in the tooth can spread over time and may further worsen the condition of the tooth. The sooner the crack or chip is addressed by a dentist, chances are far better of a successful tooth repair and an increase in the

longevity of the tooth.

If a permanent tooth has been knocked out, immediate dental attention is strongly encouraged. If a tooth is knocked out, in many cases the damaged nerves and blood vessels cannot be saved. A tooth should not move in a healthy mouth, so any signs of movement such as a wiggly tooth usually have an underlying cause that should be assessed by a dental professional.

Finally, any bumps or sores in your mouth that don't clear up in a few weeks should be checked by your dentist. Some bumps or sores, like canker sores, should clear up on their own. Other persistent or painful sores could be a sign of oral cancer and should be checked by your dentist as soon as possible.

In conclusion, we strongly encourage patients to schedule an appointment with their dentist with any dental related questions or concerns. The best way to catch any dental issues early on is to visit your dentist on a regular basis for preventive dental cleanings and checkups. Regularly

scheduled dental appointments and diligent home care are the best ways to keep your smile healthy.

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
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75 Years Ago, August 7, 1949 to August 13, 1949

Charles B. Laux, 45, of Verdon and his daughter, 13-year-old Marcile, were killed when a truckload of hogs weighing 16 tons crashed into the rear of their newly purchased automobile. A pregnant Mrs. Laux and her four badly injured children were being treated at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Hospital in Falls City.

About 200 Richardson County 4-H Club boys and girls put their prized livestock through the paces at the annual Falls City 4-H show. The livestock club brought approximately 80 head of fancy beef calves and dairy animals, and about 50 head of choice hogs were brought into the competition.

The sizzling Falls City VFW baseball team was looking for its eighth consecutive win when they hosted the Rock Port Cardinals at City Park. Manager Larry Martin would send St. Joseph pitcher Don Musser to the mound.

When Arthur Augustad of Alameda, California, told his wife her veal dressing tasted so bad he'd "like to shampoo her with it," she responded by stabbing him in his chest and arm

The state of Nebraska celebrated legalizing beer 16 years ago in August. In those 16 years, national crime had dipped by 7%, and highway fatalities had been cut in half.

In a game sparked by timely hitting from Leon Goldsberry, Humboldt defeated Plymouth 8-3. Goldsberry, Humboldt's first baseman, had four hits in the contest, including three triples.

Catholic Daughters of America members met at City Park for a picnic supper. Thirty-five members were in attendance, including Miss Mary Thiltges of Sidney, NE, a charter member of the organization.

Rodeo, was selected as runner-up of the Burwell Rodeo. The Kansas City Royals were 58-53 and 6 ½ games behind Oakland in the pennant race

for the American League West division. Mr. and Mrs. Donald Herbster were surprised with an open house to celebrate their 25th

wedding anniversary. More than 170 called at their farmhouse northwest of Falls City. Nearly 2,000 persons attended the Tri-States Championship tractor pull at the Riding

Roy Rieger, 18, and Loren Wissmann, 17, were selected to sing with the National FFA Chorus at the Future Farmers of America national convention in Kansas City.

Comedian George Burns was moved from the intensive care unit at Cedars of Lebanon

and we make sure they have the absolute highest impact that they can possibly have."

Dr. Gold expressed his desire to travel the state and listen to each person, either directly or through the website.

"What can we do for communities?" your asked Gold. "What can we do better, or what can we stop doing?'

President Gold opened the floor for any questions from those in attendance. Questions ranged from getting kids to return to communities after college to the importance of a traditional college experience with students on campus. They even touched on the future of sports and NIL (Name, Image and Likeness).

In fielding a question about the football team, Gold expressed optimism entering Coach Rhule's second season.

"We are going to compete, and we are going to win," said Gold. "I'm actually pretty optimistic about the football season this year. Getting both men's and women's roundball to the brackets last year was a step forward, and both of the coaches are pretty darn optimistic about the future. 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



We are on the countdown to my favorite time of year. By the time this column hits the press, we will be just over three weeks away from the start of the 2024 Nebraska football season. The Big Red will be venturing into year two under the Matt Rhule regime, and fans can expect to see the Huskers take a meaningful jump in the standings. In his first season in Lincoln, Rhule led the Big Red to a 5-7 record, just missing a chance at the postseason. Nebraska rolled into the final month of 2023, needing one win in the final four contests to secure a trip to a bowl game. Instead, the Huskers lost all four games by a combined 16 points and ended the year disappointed.

Rhule and the staff have addressed many areas that caused trouble last fall. The offensive line should be improved, the running back room should be full and healthy, the wide receivers should have more depth, and Dylan Raiola at quarterback should be the icing on the cake.

This is the time of year when all fans are full of hope. Could this be Nebraska's year to climb back out of obscurity and assume the position they held for decades, back in the top 25 polls? With the addition of depth and returning leadership, barring some crazy circumstances, I don't foresee the team taking a step backward.

Let's roll out the predictions for 2024.

UTEP comes to Lincoln and should be a heavy underdog. Under new signal caller Raiola, the Huskers open the season with a trouncing of the Miners and move to 1-0.

Week two is tricky. Colorado steps into Memorial Stadium with a swagger that belongs to teams such as Georgia, Alabama, Clemson, or Ohio St. The Buffs easily handled the Big Red in Boulder last fall but melted down the rest of the season and finished a pedestrian 4-8. The outcome will be different this time around. Behind a raucous crowd and a 6:30 p.m. kickoff, Nebraska will add to Coach Prime's demise and improve to 2-0.

Week three involves Missouri Valley foe Northern Iowa. Coming off a 6-5 campaign in 2023, the Panthers will not put up a fight as NU moves to a perfect 3-0.

September 20 begins conference season, and Nebraska will host Illinois, a team the Big Red defeated 20-7 in Champaign last fall. Look for a similar outcome as Coach Rhule's team cruises to a 4-0 start.

Many pundits have the Big Red starting 7-0. That would be great; I don't see it happening. In their first contest outside the friendly confines of Memorial Stadium, Nebraska loses for the first time, falling in a close game to Purdue, 17-21.

Don't fret, Husker fans. The Big Red will rebound with wins over Rutgers and Indiana, move to a respectable 6-1 record, and become bowl-eligible by mid-October.

October 26 involves a trip to Ohio St.; there is not much good to say here. Nebraska will hold its own but ultimately fall to the Buckeyes.

The following two weeks involve newcomers to the conference. First, Nebraska will host UCLA. A win over the Bruins would see the Huskers climb to 7-2 and earn a spot in the top



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25. The following week, a loss at USC would drop the Big Red to 7-3 and back out of the polls.

Here's where I am going to get a little bold. I've been hard on the Big Red for years, especially during the tumultuous Scott Frost years, but I feel optimistic heading into fall camp.

Look for Nebraska to pull off back-to-back wins against Wisconsin and Iowa and finish the regular season with a 9-3 mark. I can hear the snickers now, but wait and see what this team can do if they can avoid the injury bug. The last ninewin season for the Big Red came in 2016 when Coach Mike Riley led the Huskers to a 9-4 mark and a loss in the Music City Bowl, the last time the Huskers earned a bowl trip. Since that high mark, Nebraska has gone 28-52 and hasn't finished higher than fourth in the West side of the conference.

The Big Red is back, baby. A 9-3 mark may seem a little high, but seven to eight wins are nearly a guarantee. I don't see a season in which Nebraska is any worse than 7-5, so let's shoot higher and hope for nine. A favorable schedule avoiding Oregon, Michigan and Penn St. doesn't hurt Nebraska's chances either. Go Big Red





Watch out for these pests

Pillbug: Earlier in the season, pillbug (known as Roly Polys) damage in soybean fields was noticed in eastern NE. They are common in no-till irrigated fields. Pillbugs like moisture and cover, and do not like to be exposed to direct heat and sunlight. Once soybeans emerge, these bugs clip the cotyledons off at the hypocotyl (the part of the stem just below the cotyledonary node) which eventually kills the plant. As the temperature rises and conditions become drier, pillbugs will be less active in the field. If damage happens often, replanting sections of the field should be considered. Managing pillbugs is challenging. Results from foliar applications have been mixed, and cultural practices such as strip tillage, burning crop residue may be beneficial, but may not align with our current agricultural methods.

Japanese beetle: A pest that generally isn't an issue in southeast Nebraska is the Japanese Beetle. We are seeing more and more of these beetles in the area each year, but to date they have not caused economic damage to corn or soybeans. Japanese beetles can contribute to defoliation in soybeans, where they skeletonize the leaves, leaving only the leaf veins.

vegetative stage or 20% in the reproductive stage, soybeans should be treated with an insecticide. Here is a link to a chart from Neb-Guide G2259 that explains how to estimate insect defoliation in soybeans: https:// i0.wp.com/cropwatch.unl. edu/2017-CW-News/2017images/insect-management/ soybean-defoliation-guide. png?ssl=1. In corn, the adult feed on leaves, tassels, silk, and pollen. The leaf feeding is not economically important, but the main concern is silk clipping which may cause reduced pollination. There are several types of insecticide that are effective in controlling this pest, but you may need to spray multiple times. Insecticides available to control Japanese beetles are listed in 2024 Weed Guide.

Soybean Gall Midge: Soybean gall midge (SGM) has been a major problem in eastern NE for some time. Entomologist Dr. Justin Mc-Mechan and his team are evaluating the impact of soybean gall midge at ten sites across eastern NE. They have already reported adult emergence in Saunders, Lancaster, and Otoe Counties. The adult gall midge overwinters in the previous year's soybean field and subsequently flies to the adiacent field to lay eggs on young soybean plants. That

If they defoliate 30% in the is why it is crucial to scout field borders for early detection of soybean gall midge especially where a history of issues with gall midge injury has occurred. Once the egg hatches, young larvae start feeding on soybean plants. This results in dark brown or black discoloration at the base of the plant below the cotyledonary nodes and plant becomes prone to breaking off at the base. As the larval population increases, discoloration spreads around the stem. Peeling back the outer layer of the stem reveals orange or white larvae. Larvae can be observed as early as the V2 stage (2nd leaf stage) of soybeans. Managing soybean gall midge has been difficult. Foliar sprays have shown some response but are inconsistent between locations and years. No specific foliar-applied product tested to date has provided consistent control. Research suggests that growers can consider using a combination product

Soybean Stem Borer Another pest that has been around for a few years is the soybean stem borer. If you do identify stem borer in your soybeans, try to harvest these early as possible, due to lodging of the infected soybean plants. If you have a field that has soybean stem borer or know of a field that has this pest near your field, you may want to consider not planting soybeans in that field for a while. Longer season soybean varieties which mature later also are suggested because they have a longer time to harvest before they lodge compared to short-season varieties that have shown to have more harvest losses due to lodging. Finally, if you have a problem with soybean stem borer, you may want to consider planting sunflowers as the soybean stem borer prefers sunflowers to soybeans.

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Wood vibrations: A six-string made from Memorial Stadium? Nebraska guitar maker gives new life to historic timber

Phil Whitmarsh starts a lot of conversations with an offbeat question: Have you ever played a 500-year-old guitar?

Eventually, he'll hand you Mary Kate. The instrument resembles a Fender Telecaster, the six-string synonymous with Americana twang and favored by artists like Bruce Spring-

Mary Kate looks and plays like a Telecaster, but the sound is different.

It's the wood, says Whitmarsh. That wood once helped hold up the old Woolworth warehouse in Omaha's historic Old Mar-

In a few short years, Whitmarsh has crafted a curiosity into a small business, Old Market Guitarworks, creating quality instruments out of old wood from places like Memorial Stadium and an American battleship. In doing so, he has joined a growing movement of environmentally minded makers creating art out of recycled material.

Whitmarsh lives in Lincoln and built a career consulting nonprofits before starting a publishing business. He began crafting guitars during the pandemic after learning about a luthier in New York City turning wood reclaimed from historic buildings into one-of-a-kind instruments.

"That really intrigued me," he said. "I always wanted to build my own guitar."

He started poking around and found someone selling wood from the Woolworth building. He bought 10 beams, not knowing how much would be usable.

The southern yellow pine – harvested when it was already 350 years old – traveled up the Missouri River in the late 1800s. In 1887. the beams became part of one of Omaha's then-biggest buildings, a five-story warehouse that housed an

the years before being renovated into lofts. James M. Woolworth, one of Omaha's first tycoons, spent \$125,000 on its construction – millions of dollars today.

Whitmarsh had the materials and a workshop in the Nebraska Innovation Studio, but he needed a guitarist to showcase his work. He recruited his high school friend Benjamin Kushner.

A pillar of the Lincoln music community, Kushner played guitar in local stalwarts such as the Mezcal Brothers and Josh Hoyer and Soul Colossal. He died earlier this year from cancer. He was 59.

"He's one of those guys that you kind of always wish you were like," Whitmarsh said. "He was just the nicest guy, and he could play anything and he could play any genre of music."

Kushner had a penchant for Telecasters, so it made sense to start there. Whitmarsh got to work, crafting a prototype for his friend to

"He said, 'wow, we're something. This sounds really good,"" Whitmarsh recalled.

Whitmarsh was hooked. He developed a "radar" for reclaimed wood and discovered that wood from the USS Texas, a battleship that played a role in the D-Day invasion, was available. He received enough to build two guitars and a bass. One guitar built from that wood and signed by country star Sam Hunt (whose grandfather served on the battleship) sold for \$7,000 during a recent auction.

Whitmarsh is relentless when it comes to getting his instruments in the hands of touring artists, primarily at Lincoln's Zoo Bar. Most are happy to take the guitars for a spin during soundcheck or during their set.

Shawn "Lil Slim" Holt, son of Chicago blues leg-

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array of companies over end Magic Slim and an accomplished blues guitarist, praised the instruments' warm sound and playabil-

> "They were built extremely well," Holt said. "As far as the historic wood that was used to make them, it makes it more exciting to play."

Plucking heartstrings

Whitmarsh's father, an architect, instilled a love for artisanship in his son, as well as respect for the materials. His parents weren't hippies, he said, but they were outdoorsy, ecologically minded people. They believed in something they called energy transfer.

"Imagine every heartbeat, every breath around that wood goes into that wood, just like the vibrations from all that equipment ... Imagine hitting a string or a chord and knowing with all certainty that you're giving them new breath, you're giving them new heartbeats, you're putting that energy out into the world with your creativi-

That's what Whitmarsh told representatives from Snap-on, a Wisconmanufacturer, sin-based during their visit to the Innovation Studio. The Snap-on officials then offered him wood from the company's oldest factory, which he used to build three guitars and an ampli-

"This is something that has lived another life," Whitmarsh said. "I've kept it out of a dump."

In 2018, 12 million tons of wood went to a landfill, according to the Environmental Protection Agency. Only 3 million tons were recycled. But that number is going up – in 1990, only 130,000 tons found another lease on life.

Other craftsmen at the Innovation Studio - a community makerspace housed on the University of Nebraska-Lincoln Innovation Campus – use reclaimed wood in their work. But Whitmarsh's approach is novel, said Innovation Studio Director David Martin.

"People have used everything from old barn wood to reclaimed gym floors to discarded skateboard decks," Martin said. "What Phil does is somewhat unique in that the history of the wood is so important to the guitars he creates."

'Wood with a story'

When Whitmarsh first cut into old bleachers from Memorial Stadium, he said years of Runza sandwiches and Valentino's pizza had left their olfactory imprint. Breaking the seal unleashed decades of Husker memories encased in pine.

Whitmarsh saw the old bleachers for sale online and thought he might as well ask the university if they had more sitting around. He learned there was a warehouse full of wood - Alaskan white pine, "one of the best sounding, densest woods" that exists.

He's made three bodies from the bleacher wood so far. Once he has a finished guitar, he'll give it to the Husker athletics department – a gift that Whitmarsh hopes will amp up awareness of his budding business.

Recently, Whitmarsh obtained material that's not just part of Nebraska history, but the nation's. This wood came from the clinic built in Walthill by the nation's first Native American physician, Susan La Flesche Picotte of the Omaha Tribe. The clinic, built in 1913, is in the midst of a renovation. Whitmarsh contacted local leaders about taking some of the landfill-bound wood for repurposing.

Those working to preserve La Flesche Picotte's legacy saw the potential in encouraging Nebraska artists to celebrate her work and ongoing impact in Indigenous communities.

"Mr. Whitmarsh's talents will undoubtedly spur interest in our project from people who admire his work – another way to open dialogue to tell the secretary of the Picotte Center Board of Directors.

He has visions of a future working with national historic brands to tell their stories through instruments, but for now he's happy to work with what's

available.

"One of the things I pledge to do for myself ... is that I want to find wood with a story," he said. "It comes back to not wanting to be a cookie cutter thing. story," said Nancy Gillis, I want people to be able to play a guitar and for it to have meaning for them."
