Amendment regarding the exhibition of fireworks passed

The Falls City Council met on Monday, August 6, 2024, at City Hall for its regularly scheduled meeting. All councilpersons were present.

In the City Administrator report, Anthony Nussbaum stated that the water main repair on South Harlan Street was still in progress and would require a complete block replacement. The line will be moved from under the street to the west into the right-of-way. Nussbaum also informed the Council that the City was denied the CDS (Community Direct Spending) submittal. The City had requested one million dollars for a water main project and the second phase of the sewer rehab.

A \$25,000 grant for Stanton Park's tree pruning project was approved. The Park has over 140 trees, and the project cost is estimated at \$30,000.

Under old business, the Council voted to amend the City Code 6-317 by implementing time limits for the discharge of fireworks. The amendment will allow the sale of fireworks to coincide with state statute and the exhibition of fireworks from 10 a.m. to 11 p.m. except July 3, 4 and 5, which will be extended to 10 a.m. to midnight.

The motion to amend the City Code passed on an 8-0 vote.

The second item under old business authorizes replatting two tracts totaling approximately .10 acres of land to realign the right-of-way along 33rd Street and Parcel 740170745 for \$1,500 to Packrat Storage, Inc. The Council voted 8-0 to approve the sale of the property.

A public hearing was held at 6:23 to consider a conditional use permit for firearm and ammunition sales at 2404 Harlan Street. Without input from the public, the hearing was closed at 6:24.

The Council approved the conditional permit for firearm and ammunition sales at 2404 Harlan Street, as recommended by the Planning Commission. Previously, the Council approved a zoning text amendment allowing conditional uses for residential and commercial flex.

The Council approved the Falls City Elks Club for a special designated liquor license for an outdoor beer garden at 1417 Stone Street on August 23, 2024, during Cobblestone.

The Council also heard from CMC CEO Ryan Larsen about the Community Medical Center's donation of parcel 740170991.

"For us, this would be a bit of a cleanup, to be honest," said Larsen. "We thought we included that with the Wilderness Falls land (Please turn to Page 9)

Commissioners begin budget discussions

The regular meeting of the Richardson County Board of Commissioners was called to order by Chairman Caverzagie at 9:00 a.m. on Wednesday, August 7, 2024. Roll call was answered by Karas and Caverzagie. Commissioner Sickel was absent.

Mona Godemann, Veterans Service Officer and Odis Fields, Assistant Veterans Service Officer met with the Board to review the proposed FY24-25 budget for the department.

The commissioners haven't set a percentage for wages yet because they are waiting to see what the Governor and Legislature are going to do because they may give some directives.

Bethany Godemann, County Court Clerk Magistrate met with the Board to review the FY24-25 budget for the County Court office.

Brian Kirkendall, EMA Director and Noxious Weed Control Superintendent met with the Board to review the FY24-25 budget requests for Emergency Management.

Kirkendall said his administrative assistant salary is 35 percent below all the other administrative assistants in the courthouse so he requested salary increases due to his office being so far below the other clerical offices in the courthouse. Even with the request Kirkendall said they will be two percent behind other offices.

Commissioner Caverzagie told Kirkendall that like the other offices they would have to wait to see what Legislature would be doing because that would have an effect on what could be done.

Missing Auburn man located deceased in Missouri River

According to a press release sent to the Journal from the Office of the Nemaha County Sheriff, on the morning of August 7, 2024, a vehicle was recovered from the Missouri River just south of the Brownville boat dock. Investigation by Nemaha County Deputies led them to the area and with specialized assistance from the Missouri Highway Patrol and Nebraska Game and Parks Commission pinpointed the location resulting in the recovery of the vehicle. The remains of Alex Mayfield, 43 of Auburn were located within the vehicle.

Mayfield was reported on August 1, 2024 to have gone missing on July 31, 2024.

An autopsy has been ordered. Foul play does not appear to be involved.

Recovery efforts were with the assistance of Western Contracting and Benefiel Towing.

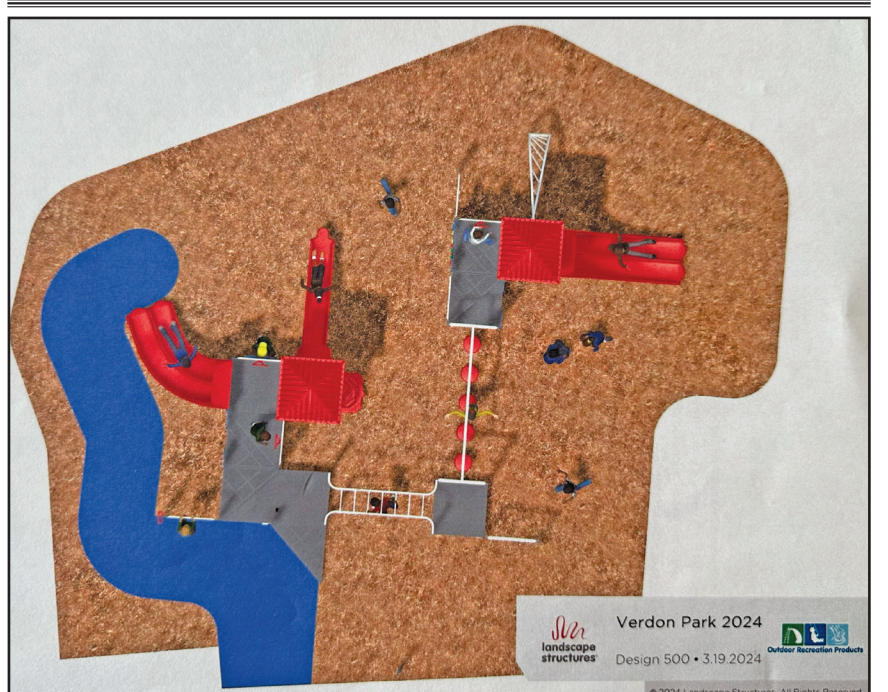


Wilderness Falls III to hold Ribbon Cutting

The new homes allow our Nebraska seniors to age in place and be able to stay in Nebraska.



Verdon almost at it's goal to build inclusive playground

It's been nearly four years since a dedicated group of citizens in Verdon recognized the need for an inclusive playground that caters to all children. Since then, a small but passionate team of residents has tirelessly worked to raise funds and make their vision a reality, ensuring that every child in their community and those around it can play and enjoy the space without limitations.

The journey began when residents organized a variety of fundraisers, from fish fry's to murder mysteries to silent auctions, all with the goal of purchasing specialized playground equipment. However, the path has not been without its challenges. After learning that the desired equipment had been discontinued, the community was left to find substitutes—resulting in a significant price increase that added thousands to their original budget.

They thought we could handle the installation work with volunteers, but the reality is that there's a lot more involved.

"It's so expensive," said a Verdon resident.

Some of the other projects they're doing with the park are all volunteer-led. They include with the new playground equipment a mud kitchen, sunshade, and tetherball area.

Verdon's existing park currently includes a tall slide that limits access for some children. Residents are eager to create a safe and fun environment where children of all abilities can play together.

"We wanted to do something for everyone, not just limited to certain kids. We have a child that loves slides, and our goal was to do this," a Verdon resident told the Journal last year.

In addition to the equipment challenges, the village has faced obstacles in securing grants. Many available grants require matching funds of up to a quarter of a million dollars, which is beyond their current fundraising capabilities.

"We just needed and wanted to do this for the kids. We're going to keep going so everybody can

All things Nebraska And now for something completely different...

As we all know, state legislators have been called back to Lincoln for a special session this summer to tackle the state's high property taxes.

As has been written here before, good luck with that.

It's easy to gripe about property taxes being too high; much more difficult to lower them without shifting the tax load onto someone else.

But we need to talk about something that we also all gripe about - gasoline prices.

I'm one of those guys who scans the countryside for the cheapest gas possible. I'll risk running my tank to empty if I know I can save a couple of cents per gallon in the next town.

This is a game I know others play, like my uncle-via-marriage Larry out in Osceola, and my distant cousin Jerry up in Wakefield.

They each have done the calculus, and each had some advice on where to find the cheapest tank of gas (Larry suggested a Cenex store out in Yutan; Jerry the stations on the Winnebago Reservation).

This game of "finding the lowest-priced petrol" is almost as popular as the contest over "who should be the quarterback for the Huskers?" (I feel sorry for the starter, who, after throwing one interception or fumbling once, will be the target of a deluge of second guessing.)

Anyway, I live in Lincoln, which, according to my extensive research, has gas that is always at least 15 cents a gallon more expensive than in Omaha.

Why that is the case is beyond me. But if I'm driving to Omaha and need gas, I'll wait to fill up until I get to River City because I know it will be cheaper.

Come on, 15 cents a gallon adds up when you're filling a 17-gallon tank on a gas-guzzling pickup!

I know, I know, there is an "app" for this. Something called "Gas Buddy" will tell you where the cheapest gas is in your neighborhood. AAA has some fuel finder map that guides you to the least-expensive fill up.

But that's cheating for some old-school dude like me. It's much more fun to just scan the road-sides and drive alternative routes to seek out the best deals.

It was on one of those drives of cheap-gas discovery that I came upon that station in Yutan, which is just west of Omaha. I could not believe that they were advertising unleaded, 10%

ethanol for \$2.99 a gallon earlier this summer, when everyone else was at \$3.29 or higher.

Harp music played in my head as I pulled in and discovered that this wasn't Saunders County, it was cheap gas heaven. The owner, the clerk told me, just liked to give people a break. The harp music swelled.

Ditto for another Cenex station along Highway 77 just south of the railroad viaduct in Fremont. It was \$2.99 just the other day, 20 cents a gallon cheaper than other outlets just down the road (and 30 cents cheaper than in my neighborhood of Lincoln).

Of course this game really gets interesting if you travel across the state on Interstate 80. There's a truck stop at the Wood River Exit that is always cheaper. And, on a recent trip to Fort Robinson, there was a station at the Sidney Exit, within eyesight of Cabela's, that was \$2.84 a gallon!

I could not believe my good luck, because once we got off I-80, we were paying 20-25 cents more for petrol.

Anyone can play this challenging game as they drive down the state's highways. It's much more entertaining than counting windmills like we used to do as kids.

Why this hasn't risen to an Olympic sport is beyond me.

LIVED EXPERIENCES

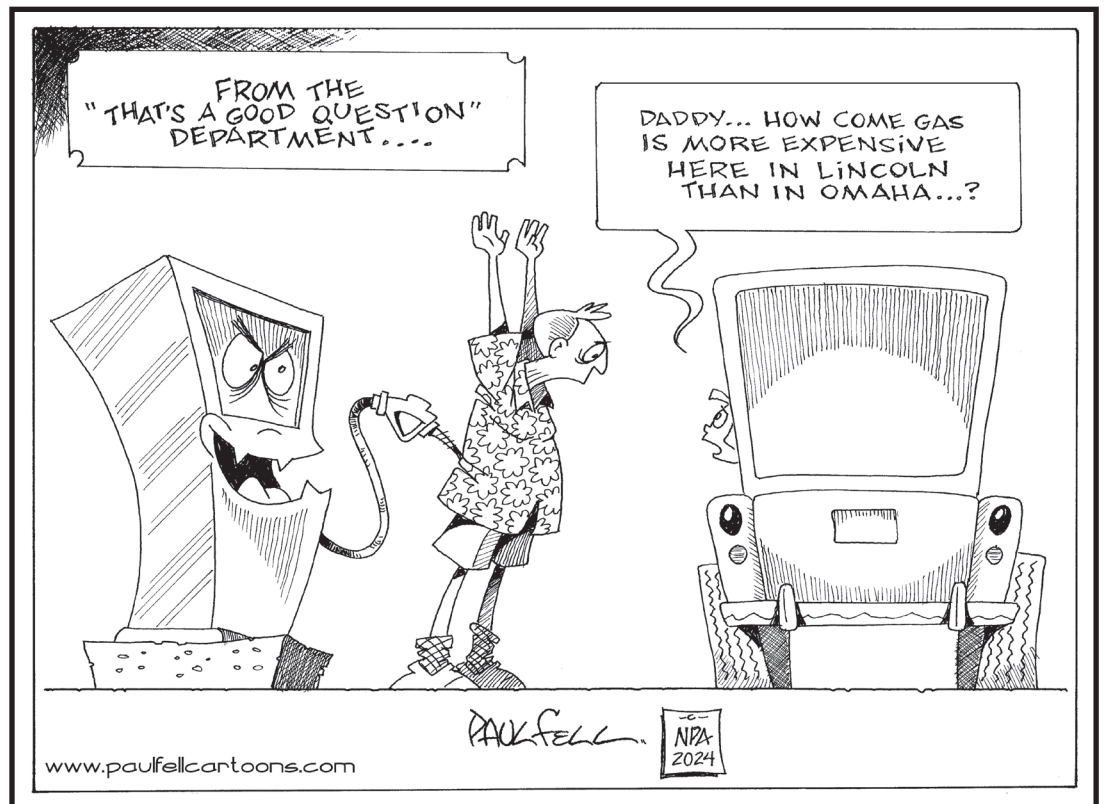

Everyone we know, meet, or pass in the grocery store has their own set of personal life experiences that are unique from our own. We all come from different places, have our own set of genetics, and have different parents or families, which is part of what makes us unique from each other. We can even have different experiences than our siblings who grow up in the same home as us.

Our experiences are part of what help us learn, create adaptations to the world around us, and how we continue to grow into who we want to be. The number one goal of our body and brain is to maintain safety and security within our environment. From the moment we are born, our brain seeks for our basic needs to be met, whether it is connection, sleep, or food. As we grow, these needs becomes more complex as our abilities and understanding of the world grow with us.

During our most informative early years, our brain and body are developing rapidly to learn how to maintain safety and connection in the world around us. The experiences that we have during these impactful times set the stage for how we begin to create adaptations, responses, and our view of ourselves.

Our lived experiences can be either positive or negative, and sometimes they can even be traumatic. Everyone creates their own set of responses to experiences and threats in their environment through these lived experiences, and the most common responses are fight, flight, freeze and fawn. The prefrontal cortex of our brain is where we maintain our ability to reason, make good decisions, and take in information around us. When our body experiences a threat to our safety within our environment, our prefrontal cortex may go "offline" and our amygdala takes over, which is the portion of our brain that controls our emotions. Our amygdala signals for our response to keep ourselves safe from the threat to take control.



If our response is fight, we might have anger outbursts, become aggressive, be impulsive, or have explosive behaviors. If our response is flight, we might become, anxious, experience panic attacks, throw ourselves into our work, and tend to be perfectionists, or become over analytical. If our response is freeze, we may have depressive tendencies, disassociate, feel indecisive, feel numb, space out or isolate from others. If we have a fawn response, we may people please, be co-dependent, have a lack of identity and boundaries with others, avoid conflict, or have an inability to say no. You can experience on or all of these responses during any given event.

These responses are natural adaptations that may be our brain's way of keeping us safe in situations or environments that feel threatening. While these responses may be a natural way for our brain to maintain safety, we can also work to re-wire our responses through coping skills and awareness of how our experiences have affected us.

It starts with an awareness that we, and others around us, have had lived experiences that have created these responses. When we are aware of this, we have the ability to process, understand, and create positive mechanisms to heal from our traumatic experiences.

75-50-25 Years Ago

75 Years Ago, August 14, 1949 to August 20, 1949

Father A. Bernacek, a displaced person from Czechoslovakia who had been serving as chaplain at Our Lady of Perpetual Help Hospital, left for Belleville, Illinois, where he expected to join the Oblate Fathers and order of missionary priests. Father Bernacek came here in November after leaving Czechoslovakia as a fugitive shortly after the Communist coup in the country.

Fifty-five survivors were pulled from the Atlantic Ocean near Galway, Ireland after an American four-engine airliner crashed five miles off the coast of Ireland with 58 persons on board.

Sidney, Iowa, was hosting its 26th annual rodeo from August 16-20, with two performances daily.

The Zorn Ceramic Studio at 1413 Harlan Street hosted an open house on Tuesday, August 16. Floyd and Agnes Zorn owned the studio, which was modernly equipped and air-conditioned for comfort.

The 21st annual Bauer reunion occurred at City Park with 104 relatives and guests in attendance. After a basket dinner, Mrs. Eliza Gebhard was named president and Mrs. Erwin Zentner was named secretary.

Coaches Jack McIntire and Bob Henderson left for Lincoln, where they attended the fifth annual Nebraska Coaching School. The school was under the joint leadership of the Nebraska High School Activities Association and the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University.

Jimmy McFarland of Barada was one of 56 applicants selected after taking the merit system exam conducted by the Nebraska Safety Patrol for training at Camp Ashland. The five-week training camp was for new troopers.

Margaret Mitchell, famous author of "Gone with the Wind," died five days after she was struck by an automobile in Atlanta, Georgia.

A pair of seventh-inning home runs erased a 6-7 deficit and gave the Pioneer Seed Corn softball team an 8-7 win over Omaha's 7-Up girls. A crowd of 550 at City Park watched as Chuck Greenwald and Kenny Wittrock swung for the fences to give the locals the win.

Alvin Bahr, Falls City, advertised Martin Steel-Bilt High Round Corn Cribs. The cribs were designed to increase corn profits by reducing moisture content quickly and eliminating spoilage.

A one-story house on about 70 acres with three bedrooms, a full basement, three three-stall garage and furnace heat, was listed for sale for \$12,500 by the Johnson Realty Company.

The Humboldt Cardinals caused a commotion in the Kansas-Nebraska baseball league by defeating the Seneca Merchants 6-5. "Big" Ed Harshbarger gave up nine hits and struck out 12 in the Redbirds win.

Jug Brown, Chamber of Commerce secretary and president of the Falls City Recreation Association, announced that the Crystal Beach Swimming pool would close for the season on August 21. The pool would normally stay open until Labor Day, but because the water needed to be changed and attendance was down due to measures taken by families against polio, Mr. Brown decided on an earlier date.

Fred W. Meinzer, Falls City rural mail carrier, was elected president of the City Bowling Association at a meeting at Roark's Recreation.

Henry Hartman and Floyd Sumner leased the Ebel Seed Company from Louis Ebel. The Ebel Seed Company bought and sold farm seed and operated a seed processing unit and a hatchery department.

50 Years Ago, August 14, 1974 to August 20, 1974

Approximately 250 men attended the annual steak cookout of the Richardson County Feeder and Breeders Association at Verdon Lake.

Breezy Hill Drive-In Theater was showing "McQ," starring John Wayne, and "The Last of Sheila," starring James Coburn.

Earl T. Luff, Chairman of the Board of the Lincoln Steel Corporation, announced that the corporation had purchased portions of the Commodore Corp. complex and would begin operation in Falls City on September 1.

Eugene Dorste, northwest of Rulo, suffered a badly mangled hand and forearm when he got caught in the mechanism of a self-unloading silage wagon at his farm. Glenn Hartman and Jim Inglis freed Mr. Dorste.

The Vets Club advertised a hot-spiced shrimp dinner and a "jam session" featuring Pee Wee Erwin, Trumpet, and The Gang.

Mark Kreifels and Ralph Peck were pictured fitting logs into place for a new log house on Highway 159, east of Falls City. The two-bedroom home belonged to Mr. and Mrs. Jay Cromer, and logs for the project came from Montana.

Rep. Charles Thone announced an additional federal loan of \$50,000 to Rural Water District No. 1 in the west end of Richardson County. The district had previously secured \$755,000 in financing from the U.S. Farmers Home Administration.

Nearly 120 people attended the Shubert alumni dinner held at the Elks Club. Shubert's Tom Fisher chaired the meeting, and Mrs. Jim Joy was secretary/treasurer.

Don and Dennis Heinzelman, shooting a 43 and a net of 34, won the mother, father, son or daughter golf tournament at the Country Club.

The sixth annual Rulo Rodeo, at the Sells rodeo grounds on the east edge of Rulo, began its three-day run. The rodeo, approved by the United Rodeo Association, featured bull riding, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, bareback riding and more.

25 Years Ago, August 14, 1999 to August 20, 1999

David Schuetz won the Winchester 30-30 collector's rifle raffled off by the Falls City Area Jaycees to raise funds for the Millennium Celebration at Prichard Auditorium.

Jim Volz of Humboldt High School was one of 220 Nebraska high school students who participated in the fifth Masonic All-Star Band.

Bill Simon won his tenth Falls City Country Men's Championship by shooting a 143-scratch total. Simon won every Club Championship in the 90s except in 1993. Ed Hartman was the net champ, three strokes ahead of Simon and Denny Heinzelman was third.

The Falls City Jaycees drew over 3,500 spectators to its 17th annual demolition derby, which featured 50 full-size cars and 20 compacts.

A Reserve, Ks, landmark was destroyed by fire after an electrical storm moved through the area and a lightning bolt struck the steeple of the old Vincent Chapel Methodist Church. Congressman Doug Bereuter and Senator Chuck Hagel announced that the Falls City Airport Authority would receive a \$593,000 grant for improvements to Brenner Field.

Pat McInteer, son of Dr. Pat and Margaret McInteer, was awarded a \$1,000 Holling Memorial Scholarship at the University of Nebraska College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources.

Falls City Volunteer Fireman's Cobblestone Fishing Contest winners included Brittany Butrick, Brett Stickler, Trevor Harling, Cody Jorn, Chase Thompson, Jacob Babb, Jeremy Butrick, Josh Butrick, Richard Strecker, Brett McKim Derik Lape and Derek Jorn.

Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over

From August 16 through September 2, which includes the Labor Day holiday weekend, the U.S. Department of Transportation’s National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) will be working alongside Richardson County Sheriff’s Office for the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over high-visibility enforcement campaign. The goal is to deter impaired driving and prevent the tragedies seen in previous Labor Day weekends from happening again.

During the 2022 Labor Day holiday (6 p.m. September 2-5:59 a.m. September 6), there were 490 crash fatalities nationwide. Of these 490 traffic crash fatalities, 39% (190) involved a drunk driver, and a quarter (25%) involved drivers who were driving with a BAC almost twice the legal limit (.15+ BAC). Among drivers between the ages of 18 and 34 who were killed in crashes over the Labor Day holiday in 2022, 47% of those drivers were drunk, with BACs of .08 or higher.

“We want our community members to understand that it’s our first priority to keep people safe, so we’re asking everyone to plan ahead if they know they’ll be out drinking,” said Richardson County Sheriff’s Office. “The Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign is an awareness effort to get the message out that drunk driving is illegal and it takes lives. Let’s make this a partnership between law enforcement and drivers: Help us protect the community and put an end to this senseless behavior.”

Drivers should be safe during this Labor Day holiday by planning ahead if they intend to drink. They shouldn’t wait until after drinking to plan how to get home. Impairment clouds a person’s judgment. Drivers should secure a designated sober driver or call a taxi or rideshare for a sober ride home.

If a driver finds they are unable to drive, they should give their keys to a sober driver so that person can get them home safely. When a friend has been drinking and is considering driving, friends should be proactive — take away the keys and help them get a sober ride home. If anyone spots a drunk driver, contact the Richardson County Sheriff’s Office.

“For more than a year, the PSC grain department has works to bring this grain dealer into compliance,” said Commission Chair Dan Watermeier. “At this time, the company has chosen not to renew its license and therefore cannot do business as a grain dealer in our state.”

By choosing not to renew, NORAG, LLC, is no longer a licensed grain dealer in Nebraska and cannot do business as such.

Commissioner Watermeier said, “We want to make sure producers are aware of this development as harvest season gets underway.”

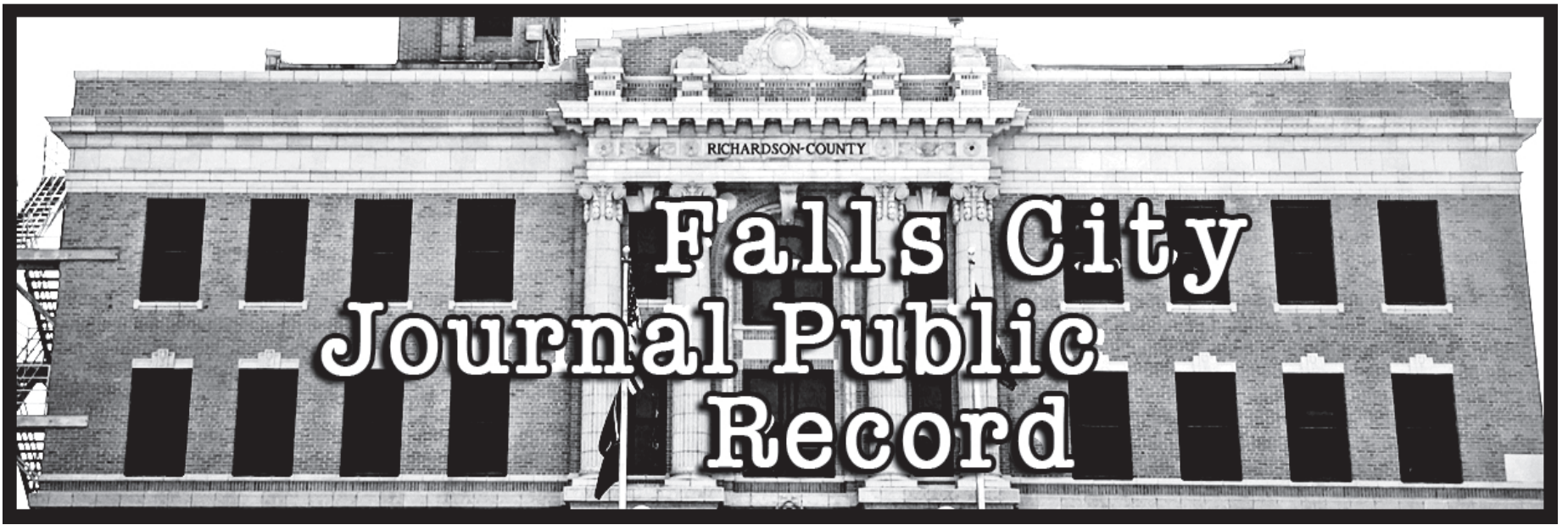

Last weekend, my father-in-law and I, along with 3,500 dedicated fans, made a pilgrimage to Memorial Stadium for the first Big Red Preview presented by the 1890 Initiative. Despite the scorching 96-degree weather, we were all eager to catch a glimpse into what the Huskers may look like this fall. The gates opened at 5:30 p.m., and practice began an hour later. Twenty-five dollars secured a general admission seat on the stadium's west side for the 2 1/2 hour practice. All proceeds of the ticket sales went to 1890 to support athletes through NIL.

As we took our seats, a line at the fence along the field had already begun to form. Soon, Coach Rhule came out and signed autographs and took pictures with fans for nearly an hour before practice started. I challenge you to show me another head coach at Nebraska willing to do such a thing. In recent memory, none come to mind, not even Tom Osborne.

Something else that stood out was the precision with which the practice was run, especially for how early in the year it was. There was no lallygagging, no breaks, no hiccups, just the players and coaches running from one drill to the next.

Takeaways from the night included a perfectly thrown ball on the first play of 11-on-11 drills from freshman QB Dylan Raiola to tight end Thomas Fidone in the left flat. A few plays later, the freshman phenom found transfer wide receiver Jahmal Banks on a fade route for a touchdown. Banks, a senior who spent four years at Wake Forest, will be a key addition for the Bid Red quarterbacks.

As somewhat of a surprise, Ainsworth native Carter Nelson got some time with the second team, hauling in a nice ten-yard pass before the drive ended with a Heinrich Haarberg interception. Throughout the night, the true freshman saw extensive time at wide receiver with the No. 2 offense.

If I learned anything from that night, it's that we are in good hands at the QB position this fall. Raiola will lead the Big Red onto the field when the season begins. Dylan possesses those intangibles that are hard to describe; he just looks the part. Daniel Kaelin and transfer Jalyn Gramstad will provide adequate backup roles for the coaching staff. Kaelin may be the best true passer on the team. His reads were good, his passes were crisp, and his throws were on target. Gramstad could turn out to be a steal. He was the NAIA Player of the Year last fall at Northwestern College in Iowa, throwing for 3,681 yards and 35 touchdowns.

While I don't support pay-for-play, it has become the norm in college football;

we may as well support it because it isn't going anywhere anytime soon. If Athletic Director Troy Dannen wants the teams to compete, Nebraska will have to pony up and double the amount of money they are currently spending. That doesn't mean we have to throw it at everyone, but four and five-star athletes demand to be paid. We can all agree that if we want to be relevant, we need those athletes on the team. If the University hosts similar events for volleyball or basketball, I would encourage the fans to support their efforts to raise money. The season is creeping up on us; let's hope for an injury-free and successful season. Go Big Red.

(Continued from Page 1) that we sold them.” Larsen advised the board that he could communicate with the Wilderness Falls Group and see if they would be interested in taking the property. “This really should have been included with them to begin with,” said Larsen. After a discussion, it was decided to table the matter. A discussion and action for a grievance hearing for IBEW Local 1536 Grievance 2024-01 regarding employee attendance and utilization policies adopted on June 10, 2024. Dale Campbell, representing IBEW 1536, addressed the Council and voiced his concerns with the policies adopted in June. “The union feels that this whole policy is changing our work rules and work conditions, and that goes against article 42 in our labor agreement,” said Campbell. According to Campbell,

the union feels that any employee handbook change should be union-approved. Councilperson Leyden stressed his support of the union but took issue with the grievance. Leyden stated that after discussing the policy changes and hearing no problems with the union, the Council viewed it as adequate and proceeded with the changes. “Honestly, I don’t know what we put in there that is harmful to you,” said Leyden. Campbell responded that the issue wasn’t the working conditions but the failure to abide by the labor agreement. “As I read through the grievance policy, and its 30 days to bring it to the Council,” said Leyden. “And it’s June 10, and I’m like, okay, they’re mad that we’re not following “X” rule, but then they want to go past the grievance period. Do two wrongs make a right?”

Leyden expressed that he wished the union representatives would have spoken up at the meeting on the night in question. “We can’t go back in the past, but gosh, I wish you would have spoken up, and we could have tabled it and said, let’s go back and get our ducks in a row so we’re not sitting here in a grievance. Nobody likes grievances,” said Leyden. “You guys don’t like grievances; it takes your guys’ time up. You had to maybe spend money with the union, or your dues are going to something that you don’t want it to. Likewise, we have Mike Dunn here, plus the other attorney we’ve dealt with; the City’s incurring costs, and it’s losing everybody money, taxpayer money. I wish it wouldn’t have come to this.” City Administrator Nussbaum stated that he believed the policies implemented were reasonable and didn’t cause undue hardship to the employees. City Attorney Mike Dunn told the Council they had three alternatives. First, they can deny the grievance based on time (over 30 days); second, they can deny it due to the policy reading; and third, they can accept the grievance. At 6:52 p.m., the Council went into a closed session to discuss the matter further. At 7:05, the meeting returned to an open session. At that time, a motion was made to deny the grievance based on the timeline/deadline of 30 days for submittal to the Council. The Council voted 8-0 in favor of denying the claim. With no other items on the agenda, the meeting was closed at 7:06 p.m.

Cynthia “Cindi” Reynolds

Cynthia “Cyndi” Ann (Weaver) Reynolds (76) passed away on Thursday, August 8, 2024. Cyndi was born on August 30, 1947 in Stillwater, Oklahoma to Virginia Eileen (Kirkpatrick) and James Elbert Weaver.



After graduating from McClain Senior High School in Tulsa, OK in 1965, she entered into the United States Air Force. She was the first female to enlist in the Air Force in Oklahoma in 1966. While attending basic training in San Antonio, TX, she met her future husband, James “Jimmy” Donald Reynolds. They were married on November 19, 1966 at Randolph Air Force Base. They had two children, Sheila Marie and James Harold. Cyndi first moved to Hiawatha in 1967 before moving to Illinois and then returning to Hiawatha permanently in 1978.

Cyndi is most recognized in the community for her long career in law enforcement. She joined the Hiawatha Police Department Reserves in 1979 and became a full-time dispatcher for the P.D. in 1980. In 1981, she moved to a full-time patrol officer position. Keeping in the tradition of defying tradition, she was the first female police officer sworn in in Northeast Kansas. She served in that role until November 1987. From 1988-1990, she took a break from law enforcement and was employed at Tice Health Mart as a pharmacy tech. She decided that once she could decipher the doctor’s handwriting on prescriptions without any difficulty, it might be time to make a change. In May 1990, she began working at Brown County Sheriff’s Department as a dispatcher. While there, she served as the

Communications Sergeant from 1992-2007. Much to many officers’ dismay, she finished out her career on midnight shift (it rarely seemed to be quiet when 735 was dispatching). She retired from Brown County S.O. on August 1, 2012. Following retirement, she worked at both the Kickapoo Tribe and Sabetha P.D. part time. Cyndi was also a member of the very first crew of Brown County Squad 48 as well as served as a first responder for Town and Country Ambulance.

She loved watching the Kansas City Chiefs, Kansas City Royals, and Kansas State Wildcats, spending time with her great grand “babies” and visiting the farm to check on the goats.

She was preceded in death by her parents, husband, and daughter Sheila. She is survived by son James (Cindy) Reynolds of Falls City, NE; granddaughter Ashleigh (Adam) Eickhoff of Falls City, NE; granddaughter Samantha Reynolds of Falls City, NE; grandson David Reynolds of Falls City, NE; and great-grandchildren Hudson, Harlow, Malakai, Harrison, and Charlotte.
