Highway Superintendent, Steve Darveau, Jr. gave the Commissioners updates on road and bridge maintenance recently done.

A motion was made and approved by Sickel to adopt Resolution 2024-2025-11 to authorize the Chairman to sign the agreement with Nebraska Department of Transportation for funding of project BRO-7074(27) Falls City NW located on 710 Road between

On a gorgeous night in Humboldt emcee Curtis Maschman vacated his throne to make way for this years king.

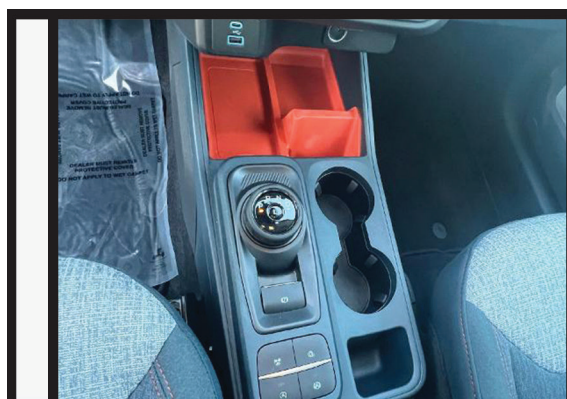

All things Nebraska Immigration is a hot topic in this election year, but stats and officials say it's been good for Nebraska

A few years back, a lucky tip came my way about an impending immigration raid in O'Neill.

I don't recall a lot of details about what was expected to happen, but the tip was "you'd better be there tomorrow morning."

As I drove up Highway 281 toward the north-central Nebraska town, I settled in behind what seemed like an endless line of SUVs with blackened windows also driving northward.

It turned out they were mostly agents with the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) who were headed to O'Neill to deliver arrest warrants. They were targeting 17 people alleged to have recruited undocumented workers, given them identification documents, and then arranged for them to work at local feedlots, hog-confinement facilities, a tomato greenhouse and a potato processing plant.

The 2018 raid also resulted in 133 foreign-born workers at various businesses in the O'Neill area, as well as in Minnesota and Las Vegas, being detained.

But a funny thing happened after the raid.

Dozens of townspeople held a rally in O'Neill to support the workers, calling them friends, hard workers, fellow church members and part of the community of 3,600. They urged the federal government to release them so they could be reunited with their children and families, and get back to work.

The chatter on social media, of course, was less sympathetic. But the more public face of O'Neill was that good people, who just wanted to work and raise their family in a safe place, had become victims of an illegal scheme between a few employers and a local restaurant/grocery store owner who was lining up workers.

Fast forward to today, and immigration has emerged as a major issue in the 2024 elections, complete with video of more and more migrants seeking refuge, and jobs, in the United States.

What should we make of it?

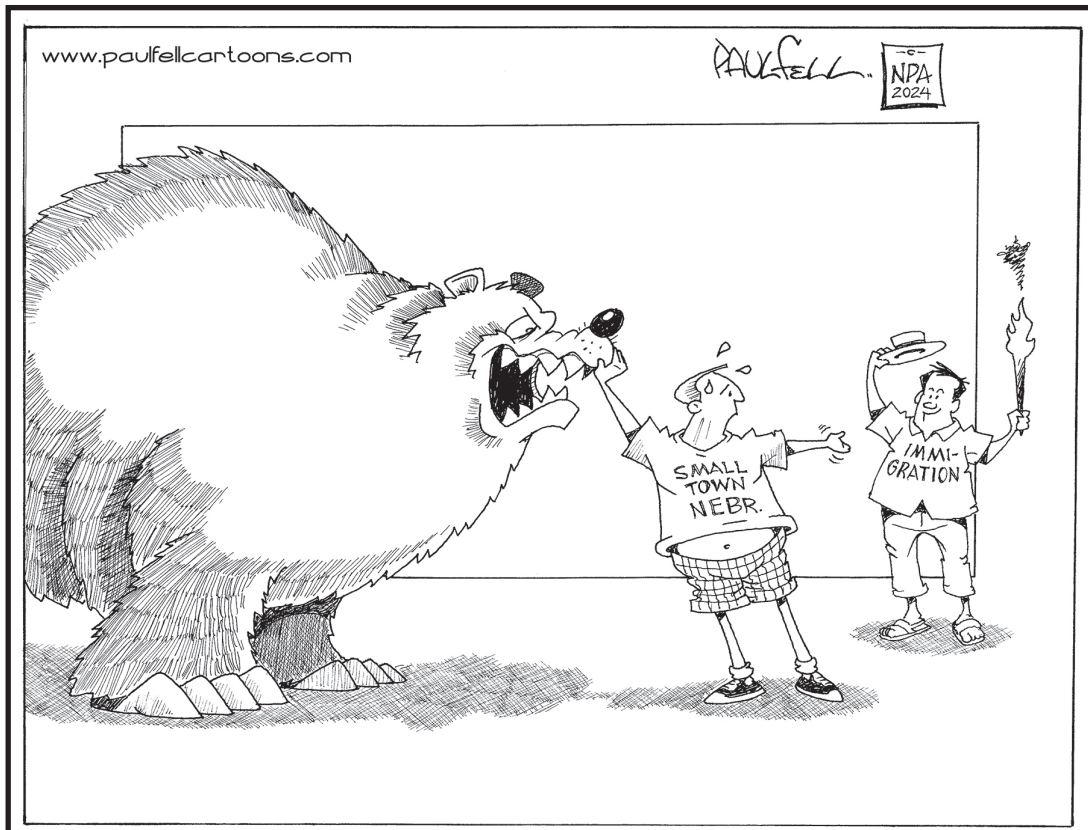
One thing's for certain: immigrants, with only some exceptions, have been good for our state.

The growth in foreign-born residents is one of the main reasons Nebraska's overall population has risen in recent years, and has reversed population declines in some rural communities.

Wakefield, in northeast Nebraska, grew from about 1,100 residents in 1990 to more than 1,500 now due to an influx of immigrants, according to recent reporting by the Flatwater Free Press.

Between 2010 and 2020, 21 counties outside the Omaha and Lincoln areas grew in population, the new site reported, with most increases due to new residents of color.

It is "glaringly apparent," according to a consultant hired



by the Nebraska Chamber of Commerce Foundation, that Nebraska cannot solve its workforce shortage without more immigrants taking those positions, according to a story by the Nebraska Examiner.

The consultant's report led to a summit by the Chamber to work on how to attract more immigrants to address the labor shortage, which totals an estimated 50,000 to 80,000 unfilled jobs across the state.

And immigrants and refugees work. Foreign-born Huskers had a higher participation rate in the labor force — about 73% compared to 69% for U.S.-born Huskers, the Examiner reported last year, based on census data. And, data showed that they were more likely to fill low-wage service and production jobs, the ones that are hardest to fill.

Overall, immigrants and refugees contribute about 8% of the state's total economic output. That's not insignificant. I know there are a lot of opinions — pro and con — about immigration and what Congress needs to do to address the crush of those seeking to enter the U.S.

A buddy of mine who used to live in Phoenix told me I'd think differently about immigrants if you lived near the border in Arizona.

Maybe, but it's pretty clear that in Nebraska, immigration, and hard-working residents from other countries, have been an asset.

75-50-25 Years Ago

75 Years Ago, September 18, 1949 to September 24, 1949

Drilling began at the well drilled for John Peters and his associates on the Fred Merz estate farm south of Barada. Stout and Hahn of Falls City were drilling the well.

August Strecker, ten years old, had to wear a brace on his neck for nearly six months as a result of a severe injury inflicted by a playmate on the school grounds at Williamsville (No. 23) School, northeast of Falls City. Three vertebrae were crushed and locked together when another youth climbed on his back and yanked his head during a recess tussle.

Fred W. Meinzer of Falls City was named third vice president, and Charles Marburger of Humboldt was named on the board of directors of the Southeastern Nebraska Volunteer Firemen's Association.

Behind the pitching of Neal Swaley, the Falls City Knights of Columbus won the state title at David City. Pete Schawang managed the outfit, and the locals playing included Ed Murphy, Neal Weddle, Glen Witt, Bill Hoy, Dick Harmon, Jim Bennett, John Hoban, Elmer Kohmetscher, Jim Tiehen and Father Irvin Weber.

Two Falls City residents, Ed Bauer and W.F. Kentopp, topped the field in the Lincoln Gun Club's shoot, with each breaking 98 out of 100 targets.

In a significant Little Ten Conference circuit upset, Dawson scored late to edge Shubert, 13-12, in six-man football action. Chuck Higgins scored on a three-yard run with 1:30 to play to give Dawson the win.

An ad announcing the opening of Bennetts' Ice Cream Store, featuring Fairmont Ice Cream, Malts, Sundaes and Cones, appeared in the Journal. The shop was located at the former site of the Furniture Hospital at 311 East 15th Street.

John Ogle, 73, a farmer living four miles southwest of Dawson, was recovering from injuries he received when he butted heads with an angry Shorthorn bull that was being unloaded on his property.

Marion Boatman tuned in his television at his home at 614 West 21st Street and got satisfactory reception from both Omaha and Kansas City. The event marked the first time TV reception had been obtained in a home installation in Falls City. Boatman had built his own 60-foot steel TV tower.

Halfback Harold McKee scooted around his left end for a 12-yard score with forty-five seconds remaining to give Verdon a 25-18 triumph over Bratton Union.

An estimated 30,000 fans were expected in Lincoln to watch the University of Nebraska football team take on South Dakota in the season-opener at Memorial Stadium.

Amos Yoder, a local representative for the Texas Oil Company, announced that the Texaco station at 20th and Stone Street would be replaced with a new, modern station modeled after the Gates Texaco Station at 14th and Harlan.

Raymond Darveau of Rulo was appointed to the U.S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland.

50 Years Ago, September 18, 1974 to September 25, 1974

According to fair manager Henry Brandt, the 1974 Nebraska State Fair was an attendance record-breaker. An estimated 577,500 people attended the fair, up 34,500 from the 1973.

Palmyra wasted no time in their football contest against Sacred Heart. On the first play from scrimmage, the Panthers ran 41 yards for a touchdown, racing to a 30-8 win over the Irish.

The Supreme Court suggested that Richard Nixon, although pardoned by President Ford, could still be tried and even convicted in the Watergate case but could never be punished.

At the annual meeting of Community Hospital's bondholders, it was revealed that the board of trustees had applied for both a grant and a loan for a new \$886,000 addition.

Chamber President Max Rathman named two new members to the Chamber Board. Rob Vandeberg was named to fill a two-year term, and Francis Seid was named to replace the vacancy created by Vince Langan's death.

Alvin Strasil and his son Tom were working on a one-ton bolt for the Cooper Nuclear Station in Brownville. The 33-foot-long and four-inch-diameter bolt was used on the plant's intake structure.

Rep. Charles Thone in Washington announced a \$2,000 federal grant to improve a park in Dawson. The grant would be matched with a \$1,000 state and \$1,000 local fund.

The Falls City Elks Lodge hosted Grand Exalted Ruler Gerald Strohm of Fresno, California. Mr. and Mrs. Strohm visited lodges in Omaha, Beatrice, Lincoln, Fairbury, Falls City and Nebraska City.

The front page featured a photo of the Buchholz No. 1 oil well, the first oil-producing well in Nebraska, located on Highway 8 west of Falls City. The well began producing oil on May 29, 1949 and averaged 169 1/2 barrels per day for the first 60 days to qualify for a \$15,000 bonus.

Gail Harmon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Harmon of Dawson, was a homecoming queen candidate at Peru State College.

Chief Peter C. Sturner of the Humboldt police department received certification as a law enforcement officer in Nebraska.

25 Years Ago, September 18, 1999 to September 24, 1999

Gov. Mike Johanns appointed Daniel E. Bryan to the 1st Judicial District judgeship.

The 1999 Memory Walk for Alzheimer's Disease research involved 58 participants. The walk took place from Falls City Care Center to the Mini Park and back.

Falls City High School graduates Lindsay Zimmerman, Brian Elliott and Ted Younker were named the Tom Zimmerman Memorial Scholarship recipients.

The Dawson-Verdon Jets ended a 34-game drought by defeating the Iowa School for the Deaf, 60-40. The win was the first in nearly five seasons for the Jets. The game produced 887 yards of total offense and 404 yards on returns. Senior John Wintz carried the ball 13 times for 111 yards to lead the Jets.

Nate O'Grady scored six touchdowns as Sacred Heart manhandled Humboldt-Table Rock 53-18 at Power Field. O'Grady finished the contest with 162 rushing yards on 22 attempts.

Junior QB Kris Glathar was named the Journal Athlete of the Week. Glathar ac-

counted for 28 points, throwing for two scores and two PATs. He finished 6-10 passing for 112 yards and rushed for 93 more.

Falls City High School graduate Michael Hilliard, a freshman golfer for SCC in Beatrice, won the McCook Invite with rounds of 76 and 77.

650 and 651 Avenue or between S21 and 28, T2, R16.

Kristen Morehead from the Law Enforcement Center requested authorization to purchase candy and have available for community events that they participate in. The County Board members indicated that this type of purchase is specifically not provided for within Nebraska State Statutes. Board members then offered to each make a personal donation for this cause.

At 10:00 a.m. Chairman Caverzagie presented the proof of publication for the sale of real estate.

A motion was made and approved to accept a bid of \$500 from Doug Sailors with the understanding that the equipment within the shed, radio equipment and generator and propane tank will be removed from the site by the County.

A motion was made by Sickel to approve the FY24-25 as presented at the public hearing held Tuesday, September 10, 2024, at 6:30 p.m. and to adopt Resolution 2024-2025-12. The motion carried.

The Board went into an executive session at 10:30 a.m. with EMA Director, Brian Kirkendall and County Clerk Eickhoff for the protection of the public interest.

The executive session closed at 10:50 a.m. and returned to the regular meeting agenda.

Jared Reimers, District Coordinator for Third District U.S. Congressman, Adrian Smith updated the Board on the current

federal legislation being considered and the activity that Congressman Smith is involved with. Reimers reported that there are now three offices in the District including a new location in Nebraska City located in the Premier Bank building.

Correspondence was received by Commissioner Karas from the Pennsylvania Colony Historical Society of Nebraska regarding requests for funding from the Richardson County Visitors Committee and Richardson County.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:39 a.m. The Board will meet again on Wednesday, September 18, 2024, at 9:00 a.m. for the regular weekly meeting in the Commissioner's Meeting Room, Courthouse, Falls City. The agenda is kept current at the County Clerk's Office.

The meeting for the public budget hearing of the Richardson County Board of Commissioners was called to order by Chairman Caverzagie at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, September 10, 2024. 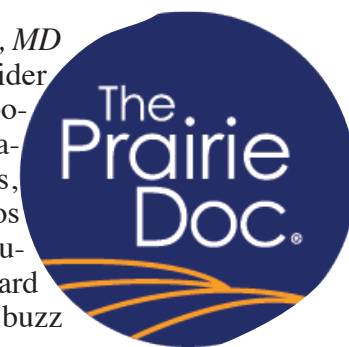

It is miraculous to consider how much access and exposure we have to information through our computers, phones, televisions, radios and newspapers. Unfortunately, we need to be on guard because too much of this buzz can be false information.



Marketing (sales) can be good and important as it moves commerce, and I'm not saying industry doesn't sponsor credible scientific research. However, marketing can be harmful when selling a weight-loss program that gives false hope, when peddling virility pills that are ineffective or when pushing an outrageously expensive drug that should be used only after first-line medicines are tried. Advertisements can and should be based on truth, but my cynical side sees the words "truth in advertising" as an oxymoron, like "seriously funny," "awfully good" or "found missing." Indeed, marketing motives can be as different from evidence-based science as corn syrup is to leafy green vegetables.

Before sharing or relying on information found online ask yourself the following things:

1. What is the purpose of this website/and or advertising and who owns it?
2. Who wrote the information, is supplying the information and reviewed it?
3. When was the information written and updated?
4. Does this website or ad offer quick and easy solutions and/or miracle cures for your health problems?

It has been our desire and goal at Healing Words Foundation to find and help spread health information that is not influenced by marketing or sales. What is known today as Prairie Doc® media started in the 1980s with newspaper articles, expanding in the 1990s with a local talk AM-radio show, in 2003 with a television show. We feel blessed to have such wonderful talents and gifts allowing us to bring our unbiased and credible public health information to the people.

The mission statement of the Healing Words Foundation and all Prairie Doc® programming is enhancing health and diminishing suffering by communicating useful information, based on honest science, provided in a respectful and compassionate manner.

Titans fall to Dragons

On Thursday, the HTRS football team ran into a determined Deshler team, falling to the Dragons 18-56 at Deshler High School. The loss dropped HTRS to 1-2 for the season, while the Dragons improved to 1-2 with the 38-point win.

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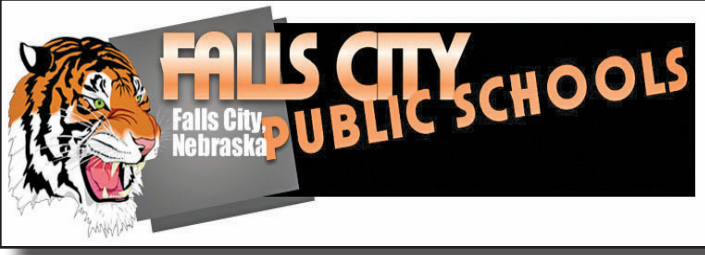

FCPS Superintendent's District Update

The Falls City Public Schools held its regular monthly board meeting on Monday, September 9, 2024. Here are the highlights of the meeting.

School District 56 Budget and Property Tax Request Hearings for fiscal year 2024-2025 were held on September 9th at the Central Office in Falls City Middle School. The General Fund budget decreased over the 2023-2024 budget by approximately (1%). The Special Building Fund Budget decreased over the 2023 budget by (14%). The change in the 2024-2025 overall operating budget compared to the 2023-2024 is a decrease of (1%). The school district budget approved for 2024-2025 includes General Fund, \$17,394,894; Depreciation Fund, \$280,679; Employee Benefit Fund, \$120,000; Activities Fund, \$650,000; School Nutrition Fund, \$765,000; Special Building Fund, \$1,888,250; Student Fee Fund, \$14,095;

The 2024-2025 property tax request is proposed to be set at: General Fund, \$8,088,828; Special Building Fund \$404,040. The total assessed value of property differs from last year's total assessed value by an increase of 9.52%. FCPS proposes to adopt a property tax request that will cause its tax rate to be 0.704289 per \$100 of assessed value. The proposed property tax request is a (12%) decrease over 2023. Based on the proposed property tax request and changes in other revenue, the total operating budget of Falls City Public Schools will decrease over last year's budget by (one percent). The Property Tax Request is within allowable growth percentage. The School District is not required to complete postcard notification requirements, or participate in the joint public hearing.

Student Enrollment - Enrollment figures as of September 10, 2024 show 808 students in pre-kindergarten through 12th grade. The largest class is the 8th grade class with 69 students, and the smallest class is 6th grade class with 47 students.

Strategic Plan Update - The annual board planning workshop will be held at 6PM Wednesday, September 25 at the Falls City Middle School. The Board of Education and administration will collaborate and plan for the future direction of the school district and the factors which may/will support and challenge the school district in moving to the next level of effectiveness. This process allows the Board of Education and administrative team to effectively identify specific goals and initiatives to address.

The District 56 Board of Education acted on several items before concluding the regular meeting.

1. Approved the Final Reading on Policy Reviews and Revisions: 1) 2211 Conflict of Interest; 2) 4260 Internet Access; 3) 4261 Technology Protection Measure and Internet Safety; 4) 7410 Pregnant and Parenting Students.
2. Approved the Budget of Disbursements, Receipts, and Transfers for 2024-2025
3. Approved the Property Tax Request Resolution for 2024-2025
4. No action taken on the Determination of Early Separation applications for 2024-2025.
5. Recognized the FCEA as Exclusive Bargaining Agent for Non-Supervisory Certificated Teaching Staff for 2026-2027 Contract Year.

The next regular monthly Board of Education meeting is scheduled for October 14 at 7:00 P.M. in the Central Office in Falls City Middle School. Regular and special meeting agendas are kept in the Office of the Superintendent, Tim Heckenlively.

Suicide prevention campaign hopes to raise awareness and reduce suicide in Nebraska

Men in rural areas have a suicide rate nearly twice the state average

September is National Suicide Prevention Month—a time to acknowledge the lives lost to suicide, those who have struggled with suicidal thoughts, and the loved ones of those who have died by suicide. It is also a time to raise awareness about suicide prevention by emphasizing a message of hope.

Since July 2022, 988 has been the national lifeline for mental health support and suicide prevention. The hotline is a source of immediate and free help for anyone experiencing issues involving mental health or substance use, even if it is a non-emergent situation. 988 provides skilled, compassionate support from counselors who are trained in crisis response. They provide confidential support to anyone who reaches out to the lifeline, regardless of circumstance.

The first annual 988 Day was on September 8. The purpose of 988 Day is to raise awareness of 988's impact on mental health support across the nation while promoting the 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline. This year the key message was: "No Judgement. Just Help."

In addition to celebrating the first annual 988 Day, the University of Nebraska Public Policy Center (NUPPC) is helping to lead the Nebraska Comprehensive Suicide Prevention Project, a statewide initiative focused on suicide prevention and 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline awareness with an emphasis on suicide prevention in men. The NUPPC, in cooperation with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), launched a focused media campaign this month.

The NUPPC is working with media outlets to implement a collaborative

campaign to better inform and engage Nebraskans about suicide prevention resources and help combat harmful social expectations of men.

In partnership with the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), an analysis of data from the National Violent Death Reporting System (NVDRS) revealed that Nebraska men between the ages of 25-64 have a suicide rate nearly twice the state average, and at a significantly higher rate than either women or younger men. Moreover, rural men die by suicide at a rate of nearly 2.5 times more than their urban counterparts. There is currently a gap in suicide prevention activities focused on men in rural areas. Therefore, this demographic is the primary focus of the project.

"This is a unique and vital opportunity for Nebraska to bring attention to an important issue that affects us all. Having grown up in rural Central Nebraska and having lost friends from all walks of life who fall within our project's focus, this project's mission holds a deeply personal significance for me," said Quinn Lewandowski, Program Manager for the project.

Some risk factors for suicide for men in this age group include mental illness, substance use, lack of access to behavioral health services, social isolation, and access to lethal means. Cultural expectations of masculinity and a stigma against asking for help can also contribute to suicide risk.

The Nebraska Comprehensive Suicide Prevention Project has four key strategies for creative, evidence-informed approaches to suicide prevention in men: strengthen access and delivery of suicide care,

create protective environments/communities, identify and support people at risk, and lessen harm and prevent future risk.

Each strategy will be accompanied by a specific approach that will be adaptable to individual Nebraska communities. Nebraska's Behavioral Health Regions will receive funding through mini-grants from the Nebraska State Suicide Prevention Coalition, aimed at fostering lasting collaborative partnerships and implementing these strategies locally.

In the face of hardship, Nebraskans are known for their resilience and willingness to help one another through difficult times. Building on this core foundation of what it means to be a Nebraskan, the campaign hopes to encourage men to show a different kind of strength; the strength to ask for help when they are struggling. 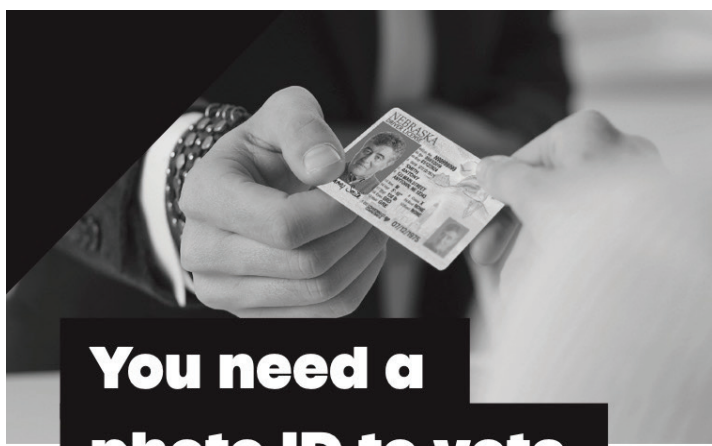

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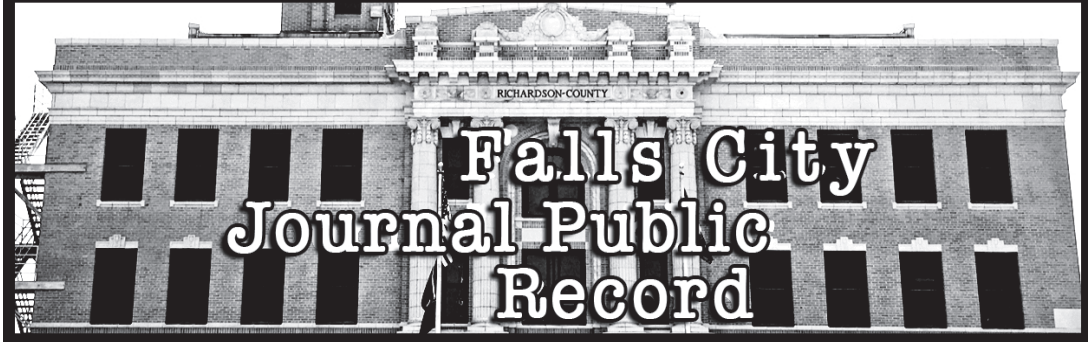

Big second half propels Tigers to homecoming win

With the score tied at 7-7 at intermission, Falls City outscored Conestoga 21-0 in the final two periods to earn a 28-7 homecoming win in front of a raucous Tiger crowd.

FC is off to its best start since beginning the season 3-0 in 2019.

Defense ruled supreme for both teams in the initial 24 minutes of action. A muffed punt return by the Tigers set the Cougars up with the ball at the FC 30. Four plays later, the Cougars spread the Tiger defense out, and the quarterback ran up the middle for a nine-yard score with 3:37 on the clock in the first half.

On the ensuing kickoff, Falls City's Isaac Frederick ran 86 yards for an apparent TD, only to have it negated by a holding penalty.

Three plays later, Frederick hit paydirt. After taking the handoff to the left, Isaac cut across the grain, made multiple defenders miss, and scooted 69 yards for the score. The PAT kick by Jaxten Jorgensen made it 7-7 with 2:19 on the clock in the first half.

The orange and black came out of halftime and forced a quick Cougar punt. QB Blakely Sells dropped back six plays later, and when no one was open, he scrambled for the 20-yard TD. The PAT kick by Jorgensen made it 14-7 with 7:56 to go in the third.

FC was back at it on offense on the following drive. A long, eight-play, 66-yard drive ended with a 30-yard TD pass from Sells to Orion Cattrell to put FC in the lead 21-7 with 1:20 to go in the third. The play came on a 4th and 11 call as Sells found a wide-open Cattrell for the score.

A sack and fumble recovery by Derek Helmick put FC inside the Conestoga 15. Two plays later, Frederick had his second touchdown of the night. The 19-yard scamper up the middle made it 28-7 with 9:06 on the clock. It proved to be the final points of the contest.

The Tiger defense put up another stellar effort, allowing just 119 yards on the ground and 50 through the air. Meanwhile, the Bengal offense kept doing what it's been

doing all season. FC finished with 213 ground yards and 145 passing yards for 358 total yards of offense.

Frederick continued his assault on defenses, rushing for a game-high 189 yards and two scores on 23 carries. Sells completed 9 of his 21 pass attempts for 145 yards and a score. Four receivers caught passes from Sells on Friday night. Frederick had three catches for 30 yards, Jacoby Bangert hauled in two passes for 44 yards, Gavin Bauer snagged two balls for 39 yards, and Cattrell had two grabs for 32 yards and a TD.

On defense, Sells led the group with nine stops, two for losses, while Bauer added eight tackles, two for losses. Tegan Alexander added seven stops with one for a loss, and Cade Caudle had five stops with a sack. Frederick had an interception and returned it 52 yards, and Cattrell also added a first-quarter pick.

Coach Jack Bangert and crew will now get ready to host the 2-1 Omaha Concordia Mustangs.

Lady Tigers finish week on a high note

The Lady Tiger volleyball team took East Atchison to the limit on Monday night, eventually falling to the Wolves in five sets, 25-27, 25-16, 19-25, 25-16 and 13-15.

The Tigers led 25-24 in the first set before the home team stormed back for three consecutive points to get the win. The Tigers controlled the second and fourth set and came up just short in the fifth and final set.

Falls City ended the match with a .077 hitting percentage, converting 39 of 183 kill attempts with 25 errors. For the second consecutive season, the Sacred Heart football team has begun the year with three straight losses after falling on the road to Johnson County Central 14-48 in Tecumseh. The game couldn't have gotten off to a better start on Friday night for Coach Goltz and the Irish. Just seconds into the contest, running back Rob Froeschl had his longest run of the season, scoring on a 65-yard romp to put the Irish in front just one play into the game. The two-point conversion run by Elijah Canonico made it 8-0 just 13 seconds into the game.

Unfortunately, JCC scored the following 48 points, defeating the Irish by 34 points.

JCC used a ball control drive on the ensuing possession, driving 56 yards in 12 plays to get within two points at 8-6. The Dragons jumped all over the Tiger pitching early, plating 15 runs before FC could secure three outs. The 15 runs proved more than enough as the Lady Tigers fell 15-0 in three innings. Falls City was out-hit 8-1 and committed five errors in the field.

Jazzy Strecker pitched one inning, allowing seven hits and 15 runs. Of those 15 runs, only three were earned. Delaney Godemann came on in relief, surrendering one hit in one inning of work.

The 15 runs in the first inning came courtesy of four singles, three hit by pitches, three errors, three walks, two doubles and a home run.

FC put a pair of runners on base in the top of the second but failed to push anyone across the plate. Malori Kuker reached base after getting plunked by the Dragon pitcher. A passed ball moved Kuker to second, and a four-pitch walk by Kaydence Rego put two runners on with two outs. However, a three-pitch strikeout ended the Tiger's best chance of putting a run on the board.

In the top of the third, Reagan McNealy opened things up with a single to left field. Unfortunately, a strikeout and double play ended the game, with FC coming up short, 0-15.

The Lady Tigers finished with three base runners on

Tuesday. McNealy had the only hit of the game for FC. Rego drew a walk, and Kuker was hit by a pitch.

On Saturday, FC hosted the 2024 Falls City Softball Tournament. The Lady Tigers finished the tourney at 0-3, falling to 1-16 for the year.

In the opener at Hartman Field, Falls City fell to Wilber-Clatonia 6-18. The Wolverines scored five first-inning runs as they moved on to the second round with the win. FC plated a pair of runs in the bottom half of the first. A one-out single by Godemann drove in Strecker and Schulenberg to make it 2-5. A sac fly by Bristol Titus made it 3-5 after one. With the Tigers behind 9-0 in the third, Taytum Maddox tripled to center and came home on a single by Strecker. A double by Liberty put runners

at second and third with one out, but base running troubles by FC let Southern off the hook with just the one run crossing the plate. Southern added two more runs in the fourth to make the final score 1-11. Liberty went 2-2 at the plate with a double, while Titus and Maddox each tripled. Godemann took the loss, allowing two hits and six runs without recording an out.

In the seventh-place contest, Falls City fell to Freeman 3-11.

FC opened the contest with singles by Strecker and Schulenberg. An error loaded the bases and a single by Godemann drove in two runs. Freeman added a single run in the first and four more in the second to take a 2-5 lead. The Lady Tigers were down 2-7 in the fourth but tried to rally. Titus drew a walk to lead-off, but back-to-back outs curbed the excitement. However, a single by Strecker and Schulenberg drove in a run, cutting the score to 3-7. Unfortunately, it was the game's last run for FC as they fell 3-11 to the Falcons. Strecker, Schulenberg and Godemann all went 2-3 at the plate to lead the offense. Strecker surrendered five hits and five runs in one inning to take the loss.

FC enters the season's home stretch with just two weeks remaining on the regular-season schedule. The Tigers played in a triangular at Platteview on Tuesday and will be at Fairbury the following Tuesday.

ond match against Southern, HTRS finished with 25 kills on 61 attempts. Glathar and Bstandig each had eight kills, while Vrtiska added seven. Glathar set her teammates up for 11 points.

In the finals versus Sacred Heart, the Lady Titans finished with 18 kills on 61 attempts with 15 errors for a .049 hitting percentage. Bstandig had six kills and Vrtiska added five. Glathar added seven assists for the Titans.

The loss dropped HTRS below .500 at 5-6. HTRS will be the No. 3 seed in the "B" division at the MUDECAS Volleyball Tournament in Beatrice this week. The Lady Titans played Sterling in the first round and, with a win, could get a rematch against the Irish on Tuesday.

This will eventually eliminate NPPD to no longer maintain sirens located in the 10-mile radius of Cooper Nuclear Station which impacts Shubert and the Indian Cave State Park.
