The Richardson County Clerk's Office is preparing for the November 5, 2024 General Election. Persons wanting to vote in the election are urged to check their voter registration status to make certain they are registered at the correct address to cast their ballot. Voters may check their registration at https://www.votercheck. necvr.ne.gov or by contacting the Richardson County Clerk's Office at 402-245-2911.

Voter registration is taken at the Office of the Richardson County Clerk during regular business hours until Friday, October 25 at 6:00 p.m. Voters can also register at http://ne.gov/go/NEreg2vote. The deadline for any voter registration form other than in person is Friday, October 18.

Early voting will begin in the Office of the Richardson County Clerk on Monday, October 7 during regular business hours 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Early voting applications are also available to request that your ballot be mailed to you if you are unable to vote at your regular polling place on Election Day.

October 25 is the last day to request a ballot to be mailed to voters and an application form can be found in today's edition or on the Richardson County website www.richardsoncountyne.gov.

All-Mail voting precincts are: Arago/Barada, Salem, East Muddy and Grant/Nemaha.

# Home to be constructed at 1612 Fulton Street through Rural Workforce Housing Fund

The Falls City Council met on Monday, September 16, 2024, at City Hall for its regularly scheduled meeting. Councilpersons Leyden and Fouraker were absent from the meeting. City Administrator Anthony Nussbaum noted to the Council that the City was still awaiting insurance renewal numbers. The budget for the City's insurance cannot be finalized until all the numbers have been received. A special meeting will be scheduled for September 23 to finalize the insurance. Once in place, a budget hearing will be scheduled for September 30.

A final reading of Ordinance 2024-100 to amend Section 6-317 Offenses; Discharge of Fireworks and Fireworks was held. A motion by Councilperson Ferguson was made and seconded by Councilperson Wisdom. The motion passed on a 6-0 vote.

A public hearing was held to consider an application to the USDA Rural Development for assistance to purchase router equipment and a firewall for \$12,361.

Police Chief Jamie Baker addressed the Council, stating this would be an update for the firewall and router and include a battery backup.

"Our license is up for renewal," said Baker. "So, we looked through, with the IT Support, looked through what we actually need, and this meets the needs for the PSAP for the redundancy and battery backup."

The upgrade was a recommendation based on an audit of the PSAP system.

"They did a threat assessment, and they went through our facility (Please turn to Page 3)

# Commissioners set County Tax Levy

The regular meeting of the Richardson County Board of Commissioners was called to order by Chairman Caverzagie at 9:00 a.m. on Wednesday, September 18, 2024. Roll call was answered by Karas, Sickel and Caverzagie.

Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr. gave updates on the road and bridge maintenance being done. A brief report was given on the information that was discussed and presented at the SE District meeting of the NE Assoc of County Officials held on Thursday, September 12. The proposed projects for the State BRO bridge construction program were also reviewed.

Sheriff Hardesty met with the Commissioners to discuss the Law Enforcement Center. He reported that there were currently 14 inmates being held. He also reported on the activity during the Richardson County Fair.

At 10:00 a.m. Chairman Caverzagie presented the proof of publication for a public hearing to receive support, opposition, criticism, suggestions or observations of taxpayers relating to setting the final tax request at a different amount than the prior year's tax request.

No one from the public was present to comment.

Chairman Caverzagie closed the public hearing at 10:07 a.m. Resolution 2024-2025-13 was adopted to set the 2024 tax levy for

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All things Nebraska These days, you need to overcome a legal 'full-court press' to get citizen-led initiatives on the statewide ballot

By Paul Hammel, Retired Senior Reporter for Nebraska Examiner Back in the day, our high school basketball team used to employ a full-court press when we'd fallen behind.

It was mostly a desperation measure toward the end of a game, a frantic effort in hopes that we could suddenly trip up our opponent, and turn a defeat into a victory.

Well, just recently in Nebraska, we were able to see a political full-court press in action, and such all-out strategy seems to have become the norm when it comes to citizen-led ballot initiatives.

Ballot initiatives allow the "second house" of Nebraska state government – voting citizens – to adopt proposed state laws or constitutional amendments. We're the only state in the nation with a one-house Unicameral Legislature – the "first house" – so citizens, via the ballot box, become the "second house" to decide state policy.

Some important laws have been passed at the ballot box, including the 2022 decisions to raise the state's minimum wage and require a photo ID to vote – both things that the "first house," the Unicameral, declined to pass.

This year, we have a ballot initiative-palooza as six measures qualified for the ballot via petition drives.

But whoa, wait a minute, it doesn't appear good enough, anymore, for groups to spend millions of dollars and months of work to gather more than a 100,000 signatures of registered voters to qualify for the ballot. No, nowadays we have to have a court decide if the language complies with state

Groups opposing ballot initiatives employ this political full-court press after they see public support for a political campaign that has gathered enough signatures. If they can't win at the ballot box, maybe they can win in court.

We saw this play out on two successive days recently when the Nebraska Supreme Court took oral arguments on efforts to disqualify two initiatives on abortion and another on private school vouchers.


(Don't forget - That school voucher challenge came after the State Legislature, in an unprecedented full-court press maneuver, voted this spring to rescind a voucher law passed a year ago, thus rendering null and void a successful petition drive that was going to force a public vote on that 2023 "Opportunity Scholarship" law. So opponents of using public funds for private education mounted a second, successful initiative petition drive.)

Thankfully, justice prevailed with the Supreme Court, which ruled just a couple of days after hearing arguments that the abortion and school voucher matters should be placed on the November ballot.

'We have repeatedly said that the right of initiative is precious to the people and one which the courts are zealous to preserve to the fullest tenable measure of spirit as well as letter," wrote Supreme Court Judge Lindsey Miller-Lerman. Whew.

The court, in a concurring opinion written by Chief Justice Mike Heavican and Miller-Lerman, also shut the door on any reconsideration by Secretary of State Bob Evnen to reverse his decision to approve the language of the school voucher petition. The judges wrote that they saw no legal

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way to do that (Evnen, after approving the language, had expressed a desire to reverse course, though in the end, followed the court's opinion).

The full-court pressing is far from over.

Opponents of legalizing medical cannabis to treat maladies like uncontrollable seizures and post-traumatic stress disorder filed a last-minute legal challenge. It's too late to remove the marijuana issue from the ballot this year - remember, a technicality knocked it off the ballot in 2020 – but if the legal challenge is successful, it would block counting the votes cast in November.

There's also a possibility that legal challenges could be filed if the school voucher referendum is successful.

This, sadly, is the way of the world now. Decisions are appealed, even on the football field, and it takes 33 votes to pass a bill in the State Legislature that has any kind of controversy, rather than a simple majority of the 49 senators.

But it seems particularly sad that a right given citizens in the State Constitution – to adopt laws or change the constitution – now has so many more hurdles to jump.



## 75 Years Ago, September 25, 1949 to October 1, 1949

Herman Bissegger of Falls City was elected president of the Falls City Rural Fire District Association at the annual meeting of the group, succeeding Dean Arnold. Miss Dorothy Hardenberger of Falls City suffered a compression fracture of the 12th vertebra when the car she was riding in ran into a ditch after the lights of an approaching vehicle blinded the driver.

The Honey Creek community council met at the Honey Creek School. The officers for the year were William Stevens, Jr., president; Ralph Whitney, vice president; Mrs. Byron Miller, secretary-treasurer; and Mrs. Clifford Halbert, news reporter.

William Watsek of Stella found one of his heifers dead in a pasture. It was believed that a careless hunter had shot the animal. The cow was estimated to be worth \$175. Two local Scout leaders attended the Region 8 roundtable for the Boy Scouts of America in Lincoln. Those attending included Dean Arnold, chairman of Cub Pack 391 and Eldon Fryer, Scoutmaster of Boy Scout Troop No. 391.

The Oil City Theater was showing "Earthquake," starring Clark Gable, Spencer Tracy, and Jeanette MacDonald.

Sixty couples attended the potluck supper at the American Legion Hall. The committee in charge included Mrs. K. E. Wier, Mrs. John Honea, Mrs. Bert King, Jr., and Mrs. A. Robertson.

John Lichty was chosen as president of the local F.F.A. Chapter. Don Kirkendall was selected as vice president, Milford Kirkendall was secretary, and Alvin Pratt was named sentinel.

Fifty-one new polio cases were reported in the state during the previous week, bringing the year's total to 452, down from 479 in the prior year.

Mitchell-Windle Motor Co., located at 116 East 18th Street, announced scientific wheel alignment for \$9.50, which included front camber, caster and toe-in adjustment, wheel balance and brake inspection.

Jim Waddle, a former Tiger three-sport athlete, was in the starting lineup at half-back for the Peru Teachers College.

Beaty's Market at 701 Morton Street had Golden Crust Bread for 10 cents per loaf and petite, lean pork chops for 57 cents per pound.

Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Nemechek, Jr., and Ernest Blecha, who lived in the Humboldt area, joined the flying saucers club, reporting that they saw a saucer-shaped object traveling high in the air.

Wirsell Witler picked up a rare 7-10 split in league play at Roark's Recreation. Local bowlers said it was the first time in their memory that the unusual pickup had been made in league play.

A new periodical, "The Spotlight," appeared in Falls City. The monthly publication from Sacred Heart high school students was led by business managers Gene Frehse and Bernard Gerweck.

## 50 Years Ago, September 25, 1974 to October 1, 1974

M.O. Armbruster was named a member of the Nebraska Diplomats and was initiated at the seventh annual banquet in Lincoln. The Diplomats was a volunteer organization of civic and business leader from across the state who worked with the Department of Economic Development in its programs.

Flying L was expected to start production at the former Commodore Complex around November 1. Earl Luff was the chairman of the board of Lincoln Steel Company, and Marlen Luff was named the manager of Flying L in Falls City. Mr. Luff said the 1975 payroll would be near \$350,000.

Al Kaline became the 12th player in Major League history to eclipse the 3,000-hit mark. The 39-year-old Detroit Tiger did so in front of just 12,000 fans.

To celebrate Jennifer Cromer's first birthday, her parents held a party at their home with 24 guests in attendance.

Seid Auto Company invited everyone to a public showing on Friday, September 27, at 1902 Stone Street. The public was invited to see the new 1975 Cadillac Sedan DeVille, the 1975 Oldsmobile 98 Regency and the 1975 Chevrolet Caprice Classic

Mrs. Mary Buchanan celebrated her 81st birthday at the home of her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Schulenberg, with whom she was making her home.

Art Tauchen became one of approximately 150 people in the United States to have climbed all of Colorado's 53 mountains over 14,000 feet high. Art climbed his first Colorado mountain in 1969.

The car used in the movie "Bonnie and Clyde" and Joseph Stalin's Russian \$87,000 limousine were on display for one day only on Stone Street. The exhibit was free, but donations could be made to benefit the Heart Fund.

The Monday special at the Dairy Dip at 14th and Lane Street included a beefburger for just 46 cents.

The sale of Simanton & Pence greenhouse and flower shop to Mr. and Mrs. Bill Milam of Auburn was announced. The Milam family had been in the greenhouse business since 1900.

Harmon's OK Tire Store at 1903 Harlan St. celebrated its 35th anniversary.

# 25 Years Ago, September 25, 1999 to October 1, 1999 dney and Cody Merz were named the Falls City High School H

Jordan Cudney and Cody Merz were named the Falls City High School Homecoming King and Queen at halftime of the Tiger's loss to Ashland-Greenwood. Other candidates included Katie Parsons, Trisha Nussbaum, Pete Carter and Jeff Druba. Jared and Merci Kirkendall were the parents of a son, Emmet John, who was born at Community Medical Center in Falls City. Emmet was welcomed home by three-year-old brother Zavan.

A two-point conversion run by Anders Erickson was wiped off the scoreboard as Falls City fell, 18-20, to Ashland-Greenwood at homecoming. The failed attempt occurred with less than two minutes to play and robbed FC of an opportunity to send the game into overtime.

A week removed from ending a 34-game winning streak, the Dawson-Verdon football team fell to the Class D1 No. 9 Sterling Jets 66-18 in Dawson. Sterling rolled up 609 yards of offense, 520 of which came on the ground, while D-V was held to 270 yards of total offense.

Hullman's Ford ran a fall special that offered customers a complimentary brake inspection.

The Dawson-Verdon junior high volleyball "A" team defeated FC 15-9 and 15-7. Eve deKoning and Bridget Huppert scored nine points.

The St. Jude Bike-a-thon held at Jug Brown Stadium drew 21 riders and raised over \$1,200 for the cause.

The Oasis Lounge at 1915 Stone Street touted 50-cent hot dogs, 50-cent beer, \$3 pitchers and the "biggest TV in town" for the October 2 Husker football game against Oklahoma St.

Family Night deals at Pizza Hut in Falls City included a large, two-topping specialty pizza, a large order of breadsticks and four soft drinks for just \$16.99.

Clint Martinosky had a 72-yard TD run and an 80-yard kick return for a score, but it wasn't enough as the Tiger middle school football team fell to Atchison Catholic, 30-20.

(Continued from Page 1) and how we are designed, and this was one of the suggestions to do," said Baker.

City Administrator Nussbaum informed the Council that the City will apply for a USDA grant to cover the costs; however, if they don't receive the grant, the City plans on budgeting for it either way.

Clint Simmons, the eastern territory agent for LARM (League of Risk Management), presented to the Council on the Risk Management Pool.

Simmons advised the Council that LARM is the insurance pool for municipalities in Nebraska.

"We insure approximately 220 communities through the state of Nebraska," said Simmons.

Simmons said LARM provided quotes on the city/municipality side, not the public works side. The coverage would include general liability, auto, contractors' equipment, inland law enforcement, and workers' compensation.

Simmons recommended that the City remain with Cincinnati Insurance to insure the public works side. Cincinnati Insurance insures the power generation, sewer, wastewater treatment plant and water treatment facility.

LARM also offers continuing education for law enforcement at no cost through an online program.

Simmons noted that the municipality can sign on for one, two or three years.

"If you went one year with us, we will give you a two percent discount," said Simmons. "If you go two years, you get a four percent discount on that premium, and then the final three-year proposal would give you a five percent discount."

The Council voted 6-0 in favor of a resolution to accept and confirm infrastructure improvements for the Wilderness Falls III Development for Public Maintenance and Operation by the City of Falls City. The resolution is the acceptance of documents for constructing streets at

Wilderness Falls III.

Falls City had entered into a commitment with Excel Development to cover half of the cost of the public improvements. The total cost of the project was \$472,222.70, of which Falls City owes \$236,111.35.

The Council also authorized a Developer Loan Application to the Southeast Nebraska Affordable Housing Council to construct a house at 1612 Fulton Street through the Rural Workforce Housing Fund as recommended by the Housing Board.

The Rural Workforce Housing Fund currently has over \$500,000 in it.

"The city gave \$200,000 to match \$200,000," said Froeschl. "So, effectively \$400,000 for sure for the city and then there is 1/3 of \$400,000 more that we could potentially have access to, so \$533,000 may-be."

Three options were presented to the Housing Board. The Board recommended option three, a four-bedroom, two-bath-room home with SENDD Contracting for \$317,900.

Other options included a two-bedroom, one-bath-room house with an unfinished basement through SENDD for \$282,000 or the construction of the same house through Jackson Construction for \$318,745.

Option one is the most economical choice, option two uses a local contractor and option three provides a larger home for a price near the sale cap.

According to Rural Workforce Housing guidelines, the sale price for the unit cannot exceed \$325,000.

Nussbaum stated that the Board wanted to stay local with the contractor, but due to price differences, it was decided to move forward with SENDD Contracting on the four-bedroom, two-bath.

Lucas Froeschl, EDGE Director, advised the Council that the Housing Board directed the use of local contractors as much as possible. According to Froeschl, SENDD Con-

tracting is a subsidiary of SENDD, of which FC is a member.

"SENDD wanted me to reassure you that they consider themselves local to help you guys go after these projects," said Froeschl. "They will open up this bid for everyone so that local sub-contractors could bid on it as well."

Froeschl states, "We have to be good stewards of this money so that we can sell it for what we build it for so that we can go to the next one, and hopefully we can do that with as many local subcontractors as possible."

The Landbank strategically targeted the area between 9th Street to 21st Street and from downtown to the schools.

"They thought the best way to use this fund was to build something new in that target neighborhood and try to revitalize the interior neighborhoods of our community," said Froeschl.


The house will have two bedrooms, a bathroom, and a two-car garage upstairs, and two bedrooms, a bathroom, and a recreation room downstairs.



# When should I ask about lung cancer screening?

Lung cancer is the second most common cancer (not counting skin cancer) in both men and women, only behind prostate in men and breast in women. Although it is the second most common, it remains the

leading cause of cancer death

in America. Approximately 1 in 5 cancer deaths a year are attributed to lung cancer. More Americans die every year of Lung cancer than colon, prostate and breast cancer combined. Lung cancer is considered a silent killer and is often diagnosed at a late stage, when treatment options are limited and survival rates are low. The greatest advancement in the care of lung cancer occurred in the early 2000s after the national lung cancer screening trial, which cemented the knowledge that early detection of lung cancer with low dose CT scans saves lives. Early detection through screening is crucial in improving outcomes for individuals at high risk of developing lung cancer.

Early stage lung cancer, when survivability is more favorable, is usually asymptomatic. In the early 2000s during the national lung cancer screening trial, this trial showed that in high risk individuals who obtained yearly CT scans improved their overall survivability due to the increased detection of earlier, more treatable stages of lung cancer. This trial showed that yearly low-dose computed tomography (CT) scan was the first radiographic test that consistently allowed early detection of lung cancer in high risk individuals. This early detection ultimately increased survivability due to earlier intervention of lung cancer at an earlier stage, prior to the lung cancer spreading to other places in the body.

Who is considered high risk and is eligible for lung cancer screening? Currently, the US Preventive Services Task Force recommends annual lung cancer screening with low-dose CT scan for any individual who is a current or previous smoker (who stopped smoking within the last 15 years) between the age of 50 to 80, and has a 20 pack year of smoking. A pack-year is calculated by multiplying the number of packs of cigarettes smoked per day by the number of years smoked. So if an individual smokes two packs of cigarettes a day, every year that individual has accumulated two pack years of smoking. Individuals who fall into this high-risk category should discuss lung cancer screening with a yearly low dose CT scan with their healthcare provider

Early detection through screening allows detection of lung cancer at an earlier stage and survivability of lung cancer is drastically higher when intervention occurs at an earlier stage. Studies have shown that individuals diagnosed with lung cancer at an earlier stage have a much higher chance of survival compared to those diagnosed at a later stage. Secondly, lung cancer screening with CT scan allows for detection of asymptomatic lung nodules or growths in the lungs that cannot be seen with chest X-ray. Finding these nodules early can allow for monitoring or treatment with surgery or radiation before they become more advanced and treatment options become more limited.

Lung cancer screening utilizes low-dose CT scans to take detailed images of the lungs and surrounding structures inside of the chest. These images can detect small lung nodules or abnormalities that may be early signs of lung cancer. If a suspicious nodule is found, a referral to a thoracic surgeon should occur where further testing such as a PET scan or biopsy may be recommended to determine if it is cancerous. It is important to note that not all nodules detected through screening are cancerous, and additional testing or monitoring with serial images may be needed to determine the nature of the nodule.

Lung cancer screening is an important tool in the fight against lung cancer, especially for individuals at high risk. Early detection through screening leads to earlier intervention and this increases the odds of survivability. If you or someone you know are a current or former smoker, it is important to discuss screening with low dose CT scan with your healthcare provider. Remember, early detection saves lives.

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# Humboldt Council discusses nursing home, tree ordinances and department advisor positions

street or to the heights otherwise specified by the City Council. (B) Whenever the branches or limbs of any tree extend over streets or sidewalks contrary to such provisions so as to interfere with the lighting of the street from street lights or with the convenience of the public using the street or sidewalk, the city may proceed against the owner or occupant of the property abutting or adjacent to the street or sidewalk as provided in § 94.16 (Prior Code, § 95.013) (Ord. 479, passed 2-7-

On August 26, Mayor Jan Wilhelm posted on the City of Humboldt Facebook Page about the situation stating that "recently many letters were sent out about the Cities (sic) Tree Ordinance." She said she was grateful to the *Humboldt Stan*dard for publishing City Ordinances to bring more awareness to the community. "I felt this was one way everyone would learn the towns laws." She said a Sheriff's Deputy chose this ordinance and took it upon himself to do a survey "in which he covered the entire town so to be fair to everyone. Our Richardson County Sheriff is now handling our Ordinances as this is included in their contract, in which they do a awesome job protecting us, and now making sure our ordinances are also being followed." Wilhelm said she also received a letter and didn't know when the officers went out to do their surveys. She stressed that an ordinance is a law and there is time to get this done. "I will ask officer Atkin (sic) what ordinance he plans to do a survey on next time. So you all are able to get a heads up!!" Wilhelm also stated that officers would be kind enough to show citizens what tree branches need to be trimmed if someone didn't understand. "I'm very sorry for all our inconvenience but we are strong Humboldt Citizens this is another step in improving our town. The council, clerk, have nothing to do with this. If you want to blame anyone please blame me. I will try hard to find out what ordinance survey will be next. But I will not know when it will happen."

City Clerk Darla Hulsebus said that she has some information citizens could have and there are fliers on bulletin boards around town that citizens can find for such services.

The Mayor also informed everyone that there was a fire at the burn pile the night before. She said she posted to Facebook (in a post that we couldn't find) that the brush be separated from the burned part to the green part, not put anything where everything was burned, and to please put it on a green part so there isn't another fire started.

The minutes of the prior meeting, held on September 3, 2024, were approved. During that meeting, Richard Davis was appointed to Ward II as a Council member and took the oath of office.

Ordinance 678 to establish Compensation for Clerk/Treasurer, Deputy Clerk, Maintenance Supervisor, and Maintenance Technician I and II; Fire Department Chief, Assistant Chief, Steward and Secretary; Rescue; Paramedic; Librarian; Assistant Librarian; Lifeguards; temporary, part time, seasonal or other help; Mayor and City Council was approved and adopted.

The Council accepted the resignation of Nursing Home Board member Carolyn Blecha, and Brenda Davis was appointed to fill the vacated position.

A grass edger purchase was approved for the maximum amount of \$750.

A motion was made to authorize the Nursing Home Board to cash the State Bank of Table Rock CD for \$67,904.96,

if and when necessary, to cover operational costs. Nolte and Douglas voted in favor, with Oehm, Douglas, and Davis voting against, and the motion failed.

Council member Douglas reported that Midwest Armor Coating had started crack-sealing the city streets.

The public budget meeting minutes for September 9, 2024, were approved. During that meeting the City of Humboldt resolved that the 2024-2025 property tax request be set at: General Fund \$82,395.65 and the Bond Fund was set at \$90,279.00.

The total assessed property value differs from last year's total assessed value by 3.98 percent. The tax rate which would levy the same amount of property taxes as last year, when multiplied by the new total assess value of property would be 0.558365 per \$100 of assessed value.

The City of Humboldt proposed to adopt a property tax request that will cause its tax rate to be 0.573029 per \$100 of assessed value. Based on the proposed property tax request and changes in other revenue, the total operating budget of the City Humboldt will increase (or decrease) last year's budget by -29.92 percent. A copy of this resolution be certified and forwarded to the County Clerk on or before October 15, 2024.

The Council discussed and approved a one percent increase in Restricted Funds Authority for more flexibility.

Deb Lewis gave the Council an update on Colonial Acres Nursing Home.

The nursing home has now paid its over 90-day payables. From donations, she said, "We gave them \$34,100." Lewis said there was about \$50,000 more committed that hadn't been received yet and about \$3,000 in donations. The nursing home made payroll last week and will be able to make payroll next time, according to Lewis. They are hoping to get another resident to bring the total up to 29.

Dallas Waggoner from PeopleService gave the August update.

He wanted to remind the City of the October 16 deadline for completing the lead service line inventory and getting it to Darla at the City office as soon as possible.

Following the boil order, all samples came back within the acceptable range or within zero, depending on the sampling

They are still actively involved with water chlorination at the nursing home. Waggoner said that despite the wastewater plant being old, it's trending in the right direction. He said that as far as operations at the wastewater plant, they have gathered quotes, and things are being discussed on how to move forward with that.

Regarding compliance, "we are able to get our E coli back into compliance here, so that's good news."

The Council elected Kendra Douglas, Council President.

Department Advisors were appointed. Richard Davis will work on water and sewer and the nursing home; Dale Oehm will work on streets; Kendra Douglas will work on parks; and Jaymie will work on economic development and the pool.

A homecoming parade for HTRS was approved to be held on the City Square on September 18.

A request for a contract extension with DED for the City Auditorium project until December 31, 2024, was approved.

A review for approval for Auditorium Annual Fire Sprinkler Inspections with NIFCO Mechanical Systems for \$250 annually was approved.

The Council adjourned and will meet again on October 1 at 6:00 p.m.




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# Tiger softball team continues to battle as season winds down

- 3. Customize your kit to meet your household's specif-

ic needs. If you have young children, don't forget formula and diapers. If you have pets, include leashes, carriers, food, bowls, litter and a litterbox.

4. Make a plan to reconnect with loved ones if you are separated or if the phone or internet is down. Write down important phone numbers on a contact card and carry it with you.

5. Finally, download the free Red Cross Emergency app for real-time weather alerts and expert advice in both English and Spanish. And don't forget to sign up for free emergency alerts from your local government to get critical information during local emergen-

Extreme weather is increasing in frequency and intensity. Already this year, Nebraska has experienced multiple tornado outbreaks, severe flooding, wildfires and power outages. Plus, 2024 is on track to be the hottest year on record according to experts. With the changing seasons comes cooler temperatures, but that brings increased home fires.




For the seventh-grade girls' team, Alaina Jackson ran a 16:40.74 for sixth place.



# **Cleaning Up Nuisance Housing**

A housing study was completed in 2021 and the Housing Study Committee implemented a 3-year plan to address dilapidated housing in Falls City: 1) Hire a Code Enforcement Officer, 2) Implement a Vacant Housing Ordinance, and 3) Create a Land Bank. This effort is designed to address a few of the glaring

> results from the 2021 housing study and we are seeing progress. Since November 2022, 27 nuisance properties have been demolished with 9 more on the list. Those with nuisance properties are encouraged to keep them up to code or contact EDGE for other solutions.
