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

Judges: How it works-In Nebraska, judges are appointed by the governor, who selects an appointee from a short list of nominees put forward by a nine-member bipartisan commission. After at least three years on the bench, each judge must go before voters, who decide whether to retain that judge or remove them from office. If retained, the judge must go up for a retention vote every six years after that initial vote.

What do different judges do?

County Court: County court is the lowest court and has 59 judges across 12 districts. The judges rule on civil cases — such as housing issues or injuries — with less than \$57,000 at stake, small claims worth less than \$3,900 and misdemeanor cases such as traffic violations. People with disputes regarding guardianship, conservatorship or adoption will also present their case to the court, and judges hear cases regarding issues with property ownership and a deceased person's will.

County signs emergency declaration

Richardson County Board of Commissioners met at the Richardson County Courthouse on Wednesday morning, October 9, 2024. Commissioners Sickel and Karas were present, and Caverzagie was absent.

Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr., updated the Board on the routine road and bridge maintenance being done in the county. Darveau reported that his staff was beginning the installation of new posts and stop signs purchased through the Nebraska Department of Transportation Statewide Stop Sign Program.

Darveau said he plans to have a crew install signs on the west end of the county and another on the east end.

"It's going to take a while," said Darveau. "We have 488 signs to put up."

Darveau wanted to remind the public that shooting at or defacing signs is a crime. Darveau also mentioned that he has had no luck growing grass where the county has reseeded after completing dirt work.

"I've had zero luck getting grass to grow. I've been looking at a hydroseeder," said Darveau. "I'm going to get some prices on a hydroseeder. We've seeded some placed three and four times."

Darveau stated that he has researched trying to figure out the best possible solution.

"We are not getting the growth. If you are going to spend five or six thousand a year on seed, you are going to want it to start growing," said Darveau.

Falls City Foods, LLC receives loan forgiveness of \$155,250.00

The Falls City Council met at City Hall on Monday, October 7, 2024, for its regularly scheduled meeting. Councilperson Ractliffe was absent from the meeting.

The Council voted 7-0 for a resolution for the loan forgiveness of \$155,250 to Falls City Foods, LLC, for the Community Development Block Grant Economic Development Contract #20ED001. The City of Falls City received a CDBG-ED grant from the Nebraska Department of Economic Development, and the funds were conditionally granted to SEND, INC. to provide a loan to Falls City Foods, LLC for the purchase of equipment needed for an expansion project. It was noted that Falls City Foods had met the National Objective of creating ten full-time equivalent positions and maintaining the 20 full-time equivalent positions. Falls City received a Certificate of Completion from the Department of Economic Development to certify that the requirements were met and that the City could forgive half of the original load amount.

City Administrator Anthony Nussbaum noted the City did not fund the project.

"We were the pass-through entity for that," said Nussbaum.

The Council passed a resolution to purchase the property at 1612 Fulton Street for the Rural Workforce Housing Fund Project. The resolution transfers the title from the Land Bank to the City. The City will pay the Land Bank \$6,532.68 for the lot and will be reimbursed once the house is sold.

The Council voted to authorize the destruction of City records in accordance with the records retention schedule.

A resolution to abate 906 Stone Street passed on a 7-0 vote. Once the abatement is completed, the property will be donated to the Land Bank.

All things Nebraska Problem gambling took down one of the greatest baseball players ever

By Paul Hammel, Retired Senior Reporter for Nebraska Examiner Was driving home from a fishing trip the other day when I heard the news -Pete Rose, probably the best hitter in the history of baseball, had died.

When I played in high school, I used a "Pete Rose" Louisville Slugger bat. It was as thick as a telephone pole, and almost as heavy.

But I was like a lot of people – we loved the way Rose played the game. Allout. Sliding head-first into the bases. Knocking down catchers in plays at home plate. And best of all, slamming hit after hit, and sprinting for an extra base. So I was hoping for some magic with the bat.

But Rose, as we all learned eventually, had a dark side. He was addicted to gambling.

So addicted that he couldn't give it up despite urging from friends. So addicted that he bet on his own team when he was a manager of his Cincinnati Reds. So addicted that he couldn't admit he had a problem until years later.

It cost him dearly – he was banned for life from baseball and barred from being admitted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown. Think of it: the best hitter in the history of the game can't be honored, officially, for his accomplishments.

Gambling, like a lot of other addictions, can be a powerful habit. It's sometimes not the winning that is addictive, professionals have told me, but it's the coming close to winning. So if you had a near miss, you bet again, because you were so close and next time you're going to punch your ticket.

I've seen this first-hand with a couple of high school buddies. They lost bets on the Saturday college football games, then lost on the Sunday pro games. Then it's time to "double down" on the Monday Night game of the week in hopes of recouping their losses.

It's a horrible addiction that pretty much destroyed the lives of my friends. One was so pathetically in debt that he asked a grieving husband, at the funeral of his wife, if he could lend him some money. I've got an old shotgun from the other buddy, who had to sell off his hunting guns to earn some cash because he was so far in the hole.

Problem gambling has been on the rise recently in Nebraska as new gambling casinos have opened, as socalled "skill games" have become common in convenience stores and bars, and as it gets easier and easier to place a bet on sports events with your cell phone.

Justin Antons, a licensed counselor who works for the Nebraska Commission on Problem Gambling, said that the problem gambling hotline operated by the Commission now gets eight to 15 calls a month for help, three to four times more than just a few years ago.

Both of my buddies were star athletes in high school, and seemingly had great things ahead of them. But Antons said that some people who played sports started betting on the games because they were passionate about athletics and wanted to stay involved, or, because they were good at sports, and believe they'll be good at betting, too.

Now I know buddies who bet socially, a few bucks a week, on the Huskers and



the like.

They do it for fun and don't overdo it. And there are plenty of people who go to the casino with a set budget - I'll bet this much until it's gone - and leave without draining their bank accounts.

It's like alcohol and even drugs. Some people can handle it, can moderate their use, and never have a prob-

But with other people, it's like pouring gas on a fire – they can never get enough, they can never give it up, no matter how hard they try.

So, when Pete Rose died, the sports pundits all praised his on-field accomplishments, and his fierce drive to excel. But his legacy is something else, how his gambling consumed his life, and left him an outcast to a game he mastered like no other.

By the way, counseling for problem gamblers is free via the state's Commission on Problem Gambling. Their toll-free number is 1-833-238-6837.



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
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75 Years Ago, October 16, 1949 to October 22, 1949

A three-quarter-ton delivery truck owned by Falls City Mercantile, Co., was badly damaged by a fire while parked in the company garage. The blaze gutted the inside of the truck's cab and caused considerable damage to the wiring in the motor.

Excavations for the footing for an extension to the James Oil Company station at 15th and Harlan Streets had been started. The addition, which was approximately 28 by 40 feet on the west side of the present structure, would serve as a warehouse for merchandise

A lost book of Bible literature, revealing details of Noah's early life for the first time, was found in an ancient cave in the Holy Land.

City officials moved to sell 12 city-owned lots at 18th and Barada St. The property, which had been given to the city in 1942 by the Horse Show Committee, was currently being used as a free parking lot.

Coach Jack McIntire's Tiger football team entered its contest against Nebraska City with an all-time mark of 20 wins, three ties and three losses.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry J. Scheitel, Sr., who lived northeast of Falls City, celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary.

An anniversary sale at the Penney Co. in Falls City boasted men's dress shirts for \$1.75 and Chenille Robes for \$3.33. The birthday marked the company's 47th year in business and 33rd year in Falls City.

Montgomery Ward in Falls City advertised a two-gallon can of oil for \$1.44 and a sturdy, streamline Hawthorne "50" bicycle for \$31.88.

John Akers of Stella was named president of the Richardson County Council of Churches and Christian Education at the annual convention held at the Presbyterian Church in Falls City.

Lauren Bacall, the husky-voiced actress wife of Humphrey Bogart, was suspended by Warner Brothers Studio because she refused to appear for rehearsal when the studio whistled.

Officers of the Falls City High School sophomore class were chosen. Charles Kottich was named president, Jerry Downey was vice president, and Milford Kirkendall was named secretary and treasurer.

Falls City Hardware, 1609 Stone Street, celebrated its first anniversary with a full-page ad full of specials for its customers.

According to a United Press survey, 78 persons had been killed in hunting accidents in the United States since September 1.

The American Legion Auxiliary met at the Legion Hall with 33 members and 10 officers present.

Sacred Heart defeated Dawson 48-24 and clinched the Little Ten six-man championship on its home field. Rich Harpenau and Chico Marx each scored three touchdowns for Coach Jug Brown's Irish.

50 Years Ago, October 16, 1974 to October 22, 1974

The Metro Paving Company was blacktopping the City parking lot in the 1700 block of Chase Street and the parking lot at the Pee Wee baseball diamond. A six-inch rock base was rolled and primed, and 2 ½ inches of asphalt would cover it.

In the Men's League bowling at Center Lanes, Don Koso had the High 10, rolling a 187, 211, and 171 for a 569 series.

Charlie Finley, owner of the Oakland A's baseball team, was being sued by fans because they feared he was trying to move the A's to Seattle. The suit stated that Finely was failing to adequately promote the A's in Oakland, forcing down attendance and strengthening his case for a shift.

As part of its Homecoming Specials, Crosstown Café offered a 9-oz. sirloin, a choice of potato, salad, bread and butter, tea or coffee and ice cream for \$4.00.

Roy Rieschick received word that he had passed the National Water Well Associa-

tion's Certification exam.

Construction work on the park along the "Little Rhine" creek in the southeast part of town was underway. The park board was to develop the city-owned property between 10th and 12th Streets and Morton and Wilson. The board was hoping for Federal Funding to help fund the project.

The Humboldt junior high football team moved to 5-0 with a 36-0 win over Johnson-Brock. Royce Drake, Kevin Herr and Rock Herr scored touchdowns to lead the Cardinals to the win.

Lincoln lost out in its bid to host the 1976 Summer Olympics swimming trials to Long Beach, California.

Five chartered buses left Falls City at 9:00 a.m. for the Nebraska-Kansas game in

Lawrence. The Falls City Elks Lodge sponsored the trip. "Zardoz," a science fiction film starring Sean Connery, was being shown at the Rivoli

Theater.
Falls City's homecoming King and Queen were Don Sailors and Pam Younker, while

Dawson-Verdon royalty included Jeff Lyons and Ann Ramsey.

Ronald J. Hill, 20, and Ann Renee Saal, 20, applied in county court for a marriage license.

Karen Hutfles and Hank Prater were named King and Queen at Sacred Heart's home-

coming contest.

Robert Busby of Warrensburg, Missouri, won the Tri-States Marathon in record time, traversing the 26.2-mile course in two hours, 21 minutes and 36 seconds. Busby, who

led the field of 100 starters, broke the record by nearly five minutes.

The Board approved using 1506 Stone Street for the Sunday Funday Event. Several organizations from the community will paint City picnic tables for use at a park. Recently, 24 picnic tables were rebuilt for use at Grandview and Dallas Jones Memorial Park.

The Council approved closing Lane Street from 19th to 26th Streets on Halloween from 5:00 to 9:00 p.m.

Authorization was also given to execute an engineering contract for the Phase 9 Natural Gas Improvements Project, totaling \$37,300.00.

Officially called the 2025 Contractor Project, it will include a project from North 25th to 28th Streets between Hiland and Barada.

"This project is scoped within the submittal that we have for the PHMSA Grant," said Nussbaum.

The Council heard from a citizen who had complaints about properties, traffic, parking lots and dogs in his neighborhood.

Ron Kelley, 1617 Fulton Street, addressed his concerns with the Council and Police Chief Jamie Baker.

Specifically, Kelley wanted the Board to be aware of high school kids screeching tires, doing donuts in the parking lot, shouting profanities at him as they drive by, and blasting air horns. Kelley asserted that the problems sometimes go on until 2:30 a.m.

"It's the same ones over and over and over," said Kelley.

According to Chief Baker, the next step would be for Kelley to sign a complaint against the individuals.

"Ron and I have had this discussion," said Baker. "He just chooses not to at this time because it's a kid, and he's trying to appease it."

Councilperson Leyden advised Kelley to speak with the high school administration and try to resolve the parking lot issue.

"I don't know the school policies, but as far as the crowds and traffic, yes, it is all hours of the night and at both schools," said Councilperson Joe Buckminster.

With no further items on the agenda, the meeting was closed at 6:30 p.m.

Darveau also informed the Board that he has crews working on cleaning out ditches around the county.

EMA Director Brian Kirkendall presented to the Commissioners an emergency declaration for a high-water event on June 19, 2024, that damaged public and private property, disrupted utility service and endangered the health and safety of the citizens of the county within the disaster area.

Kirkendall explained that the declaration pertained to the railroad bridge east of Falls City, which crosses the Nemaha River.

"They're redoing that bridge; while they were redoing it, the high water we had on June 19 piled up so much brush that it washed under and around and washed the bank out," said Kirkendall. "Washed the water line out that they just had put in. To put the new railroad bridge in, they moved the water line. It's going to cost them (the city) \$1,500,000.00 to move it."

According to Kirkendall, FEMA had declared the period in which the flooding happened a disaster.

"All we are signing this for is to cover the city; we're not filing any claims," said Kirkendall. "The city is doing this; I'm helping them with it."

Karas made a motion to approve the declaration. Sickel seconded the motion, and it was passed.

Sickel made a motion to accept the Cost Allocation Plan for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, which was prepared by Maximus. Karas seconded the motion, and it carried.

Karas also read a correspondence from Stan and Joan Stalder from Humboldt which included a donation of \$200 from Stan Stalder of Humboldt for the Sheriff's Department for the purchase of candy and other items for distribution to the youth during events which the Sheriff Department participates in. Stalder passed away before receiving a thank you for his generous donation.

Sickel made a motion to pay the claims, Karas seconded the motion and it carried.

With no further items on the agenda, the meeting was closed at 10:00 a.m.





The Home Front News told of the many 4-H accomplishments of their children at recent fairs and State Fair---504 awards.



Additionally, they hold the preliminary hearing in felony cases. County courts also serve as juvenile courts, except in Sarpy, Lancaster and Douglas counties, which have their own separate juvenile courts.

District Court-The district courts are a level higher than the county courts. The 58 judges across 12 districts will hear felony cases, domestic relations cases and civil cases with more than \$57,000 at stake. Additionally, they serve as an appellate court for appeals in most county court cases

There are 13 judges up for retention across five districts.

Workers' Compensation Court- These judges hear cases from across the state pertaining to health concerns caused by someone's workplace. One is up for retention.

State Board of Education: Richardson and Pawnee Counties are in District 5. Kirk Penner represents counties including Richardson and Pawnee and isn't up for reelection until 2027.

This information is about District 2 which includes Nemaha, Otoe and Johnson Counties.

The State Board of Education oversees education standards and forms policy, which must then be approved by the governor. For instance, the board passed the Computer Science and Technology Act and updated the respective curriculum earlier this year. It also narrowly rejected a proposal that sought to prohibit books with content deemed sexually explicit in school libraries.

What does a board member do?: Members oversee statewide assessments,

share their opinion regarding education-related legislation and approve a variety of academic programs for niche student groups, like programs for handicapped children and veteran education programs. They also submit the Department of Education's budget to the Unicameral and governor.

Each member represents one of the eight geographic districts spanning the state. The board is officially nonpartisan, meaning party affiliation does not appear next to candidates' names on the ballot. The board, which meets monthly, is responsible for selecting and hiring the education commissioner, who serves as the administrative leader of the Department of Education

What's the big deal?: None of the incumbents are running for reelection after a term filled with contentious debates. The 2022 election added three conservative voices to the board. In the four races on this year's ballot, three have the option to have a Democrat representative — meaning the board will either be split politically or tilt toward conservatives.

Board meetings became a political battle ground in 2021 when a proposal to update health education standards sparked controversy for its stance on teaching "characteristics relating to identity, sexuality, and healthy relationships" in kindergarten and into high school, according to Nebraska Public Media.

Aside from politically divisive issues, school districts are suffering from rising student absenteeism and a teacher shortage. The department of education reported that 22 percent of students were chronically absent — or missing school about 10

percent of the time — in the 2022-23 school year. The department also said there were 362 teacher vacancies in 2023-24, up from 208 vacant positions in 2022-23.

Democrat Maggie Douglas and Republican Linda Vermooten are running for a seat that could maintain the split political makeup of the State Board of Education or tilt it in favor of conservatives.

Douglas, of Bellevue, is a mental health counselor and former teacher. Growing up, she attended Scottsbluff Public Schools. She now holds a bachelor's degree in elementary education, two master's degrees in education and a master's degree in clinical mental health counseling. She worked for 15 years in both public and parochial schools and she also was an adjunct math instructor at Metro Community College. She told the Flatwater Free Press she wants voters to know that she has invested in Nebraska's public schools and is running for office because she cares about students and teach-

Vermooten, also of Bellevue, has 25 years of experience in the mental health field and has served as a professor and department chair of Grace University's master's program in clinical mental health. Additionally, she taught English as a second language in Lincoln, according to her campaign website. She told the Flatwater Free Press she is running to "elevate the level of education" for Nebraska students and wants voters to know she will bring a unique perspective to the board. She believes in transparency, accountability and collaboration and wants to develop solutions that work for all students.

The new board member

will replace Lisa Fricke. Fricke voted against the effort to ban books some say are sexually explicit in schools, saying it's a local issue, according to the Nebraska Examiner. Fricke also made the motion to postpone the 2021 proposal to teach information regarding sexuality, identity and healthy relationships in the K-12 curriculum and said "now is not the time to continue the process."

In the primary: Vermooten received 45 percent of the vote, Douglas received 35 percent and a third candidate – a Democrat – received the remaining 20 percent. If Vermooten wins, the seat would flip from a Democratic representative to a Republican.


On the issues: The candidates had differing opinions on issues that have become flashpoints on the board. Douglas strongly disagreed that the state board should have a hand in banning books deemed explicit, saying that should be handled at the local level. On the other hand, Vermooten said the board should have a hand in banning books it deems explicit.

They also disagreed when it came to diversity and inclusion efforts. Douglas said she strongly supports "diversity and inclusivity efforts in our schools" and Vermooten said she opposes what she called reverse racial discrimination.

Douglas' top priorities are to build relationships between the state board and District 2's schools and to recruit and retain teachers. Vermooten said her top three priorities are proficiency addressing rates, the teacher shortage and increasing vocational opportunities for students. The Nebraska State Education Association endorsed Douglas, and the Nebraska Republican Party endorsed Vermooten.



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

PSC NUSF-92 program supports cell tower construction

The Nebraska Public Service Commission (PSC) has approved nearly \$5.5 million in funding (NUSF-92.64) for the construction of 10 cellular towers through the Nebraska Universal Service Fund (NUSF) Dedicated Wireless Fund Program.

"Utilizing the Nebraska Universal Service Fund for the support and buildout of cell towers has proven to be yet another avenue the Commission employs to help improve communication to unserved and underserved areas," said Commission Chair Dan Watermeier.

UScellular will receive \$5,493,500 in grant funding support to build 10 tower sites near the communities of Bancroft, Bradshaw, Clearwater, Garland, Glenvil, Orleans, Page, Plymouth, Rising City and Sterling. UScellular has committed to completing construction of the towers within 24 months of approval of the fund-

The PSC allocated just over seven million dollars in Wireless Fund Program Support for the 2024 funding year. The remaining dedicated support allocated but not awarded will be rolled into the next wireless fund grant cycle.



Every Husker Fan has a Story

The current population of Nebraska, 1,961,504 people. It's a small population base compared to most states. Yet, several in the state have a common story to tell. They can point to a moment in time and tell you exactly when it happened. And the story doesn't just occur inside the borders of Nebraska, it happens outside the state as well. It has happened to hundreds, thousands - perhaps an uncountable number. The moment – when a Cornhusker fan is born.

I use the word born, because most aren't born fans. It's something that happens to them. They grow up aware of its existence and feel its presence but don't fully understand it. Like a long-lost family member they never knew, they hear stories from their parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles and cousins. They watch and see the happiness on their faces as they listen to the stories, hearing names they've never heard. The story tellers laugh, cry, talk of the bad times, the good times, and of better days ahead. The listeners hear the emotion in the words spoken. And because of all they have heard, they feel something even before their own

The moment for me came as an 11-year-old boy while my dad and grandpa listened to Lyle Bremser call a game on the radio. The year, 1971. It was a clear, crisp fall day, the sun shining. My dad, who was a mechanic at the time, was working on a farmer's tractor in our shop. Parked outside the shop, the game was on the radio of my dad's pickup, the windows rolled down and the volume turned up. My grandpa sat on an old wooden chair outside the door so he could hear better. My dad stepped out of the door and asked my grandpa the score as he wiped the grease from his hands with a red rag. I stopped playing to watch, and I could see something in their faces. It got my attention. Seeing they were listening to the radio with such interest, I decided I should listen to what Bremser had to say.

I crawled up into the back of my dad's truck. He had a set of old tires in the back, and I sat down in the middle of one and leaned back as if in a tube floating down a lazy river. I closed my eyes and let the sun, warm and comforting, shine on my face as I listened. It was the first game of the season against Oregon. As I sat with my eyes closed, I could see running back Jeff Kinney in his bright red and white uniform ripping through the Oregon defenders. I could hear the Memorial Stadium crowd as they cheered, and I could feel the excitement in Bremser's voice as he called the game. Nebraska won that day 34-7 and my world changed. I was hooked.

I had dreamed of what the team looked like listening to the radio. But seeing them on my grandparents' television with the volume turned down and listening to Bremser was a new level. To watch, in color, to see Kinney in his tear away jersey romp down the field against Oklahoma in the Game of the Century, was truly life changing. Afterwards, I took my football out in the yard and became Jeff Kinney. Throwing the ball into the air, catching it and running through Oklahoma

The last game of the '71 season, I snuck my transistor radio to bed so I could listen to the Hawaii game. With the time difference, I wasn't allowed to stay up that late, but having a radio and knowing the game was on, not listening was unthinkable. The '71 season was special, as Dad would buy a new colored television for Christmas so we could watch the Cornhuskers play Alabama in the Orange Bowl on New Years.

The 1971 season was the beginning of my story, and a dream was born. But within a year, my dream would be shattered.

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Students compete at Southeast area Land Judging

A total of 332 students and adults participated in the 2024 Southeast Area Land Judging competition held on Wednesday, October 2, 2024 in Johnson County, Nebraska. The farm of Arlen (Kathie) and Andy (Amber) Grotrian of Johnson generously hosted the event. Participants from a record eighteen schools were brought together to test their skills in soil and land evaluation. The competition, designed to promote sustainable agriculture and expose youth to potential career opportunities, continues to grow in size and importance.

The land judging competition challenges students to gain a better understanding of soil structure and land evaluation. Students learn to recognize physical features of soil, determine land capability for crop production, and evaluate management practices needed for proper stewardship. "Soils are the foundation of agriculture in Nebraska" said Mike Burgert, District Conservationist with the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) serving the Nemaha NRD.

The event was a collaborative effort between the USDA NRCS, Nemaha NRD, and Nebraska's Association of Resources Districts (NARD). Mark Willoughby, retired NRCS soil scientist volunteered his time for the ninth consecutive year as contest foreman. Landowners like the Grotrian family continue to play a crucial role in supporting the educational goals of the competition by offering their land as judging sites.

During the contest, participants had 20 minutes to judge each of the four distinct locations. A notable update this year was the continued use of scantron technology to streamline the scoring process.

"We typically see around fourteen schools participate," said Ashley Rippe, Nemaha NRD Information and Education Coordinator. "But this year, with a record eighteen schools participating, we were able to qualify an additional school for the State competition on October 16, 2024. It is very exciting to see the growth!" 

Syracuse recovered an onside kick on the ensuing kickoff, giving them the ball at the FC 43.

Three plays later, Mason Lintz scored on a 29-yard run, which saw the running back cut against the grain for the score. The PAT pass from Schroeder to Lintz made it 16-0 at the 5:29 mark in the first.

A good kick return by Orion Cattrell put FC at Rocket 49 to begin the drive. However, the drive bogged down, forcing a Tiger punt.

The Rockets drove to midfield, but Preston Buckminster pounced on a fumble, setting the Tigers up with plus field position at the Rocket 48.

On the next play, FC tossed an interception, giving Syracuse the ball right back. Two plays later, Syracuse scored on a toss sweep to the left, and Lintz raced into the endzone untouched for the 32-yard score. The PAT was no good as Syracuse led 22-0 with fifty-eight seconds remaining in the quarter.

The Rockets added scoring drives of 72 and 73 yards in the second quarter and led 35-0 at intermission.

Syracuse opened the third with a five-play scoring drive, taking a 41-0 lead with 9:06 to play in the quarter. On fourth and two at the FC 46, Cy Petersen ran the ball up the middle for the score.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, Tieran Cox scored on a 54-yard run to make it 48-0.

A bright spot for FC, Jaxten Jorgensen sprinted down the right sideline for an 83-yard TD on the following kickoff. The Jorgensen PAT kick made it 48-7 with 11:33 to play in the game.

Syracuse ate over five minutes of game time on

the next drive, ending with a 21-yard TD run by Logan Jazbec to make it 52-7 with 6:12 to play.



(1) The Legislature finds that: (a) Funds appropriated for the education of students in kindergarten through twelfth grade are for a fundamental public purpose of state government and constitute an ordinary expense of state government; (b) Enabling the greatest number of parents and legal guardians to choose among quality educational opportunities for children will improve the quality of education available to all children; (c) Privately operated elementary and secondary schools <u>in Nebraska satisfy the state's</u> requirements for legal operation and provide quality educational opportunities for children; (d) Parents and legal guardians of limited means are less able to choose among quality educational opportunities for their children; and (e) Making it possible for more parents and legal guardians to be able to choose privately operated schools benefits Nebraska parents and taxpayers. (2) For purposes of this section: (a) Education scholarship means a financial grant-in-aid to be used to pay all or part of the cost to educate an eligible student attending a qualified school; (b) Eligible student means a resident of Nebraska who: (i) Is receiving an education scholarship for the first time and is (A) entering kindergarten or ninth grade in a qualified school or the first grade level offered by the qualified school, (B) transferring from a public school at which the student was enrolled for at least one semester immediately preceding the first semester for which the student receives an education scholarship to a qualified school and is entering any of grades kindergarten through twelve, or (C) a member of an active duty or reserve military family transferring into Nebraska from another state or another country and is entering any of grades kindergarten through twelve in a qualified school; (ii) Has previously received an education scholarship under this section and is continuing education at a qualified school until such student graduates from high school or reaches twenty-one years of age, whichever comes first; (iii) Has previously received an education scholarship under the Opportunity Scholarships Act, as such act existed prior to its repeal by this legislative bill, and is continuing education at a qualified school until such student graduates from high school or reaches twenty-one years of age, whichever comes first; (iv) Is the sibling of a student who is receiving an education scholarship and resides in the same household as such student; or (v) Is currently enrolled in a qualified school and is a member of a family whose household income is no more than two hundred thirteen percent of the federal poverty level; and (c) Qualified school means any nongovernmental, privately operated elementary or secondary school located in this state that (i) is operated not for profit, (ii) complies with the antidiscrimination provisions of 42 U.S.C. 1981, as such section existed on January 1, 2024, (iii) complies with all health and life safety laws or codes that apply to <u>privately operated schools, and</u> (iv) fulfills the applicable accreditation or approval requirements established by the State Board of Education pursuant to section 79-318. (3) The State Treasurer shall establish a program to provide education scholarships to eligible students to pay the costs associated with attending a qualified school. Under such program, the State Treasurer shall: (a) Establish a priority system for awarding education scholarships under the program. Such priority system shall: (i) Give first priority to: (A) Eligible students who received an education scholarship under this section or under the Opportunity Scholarships Act, as such act existed prior to its repeal by this legislative bill, during the previous school year; and (B) The sibling of a student who is receiving an education scholarship, so long as the sibling resides in the same household as such student; (ii) Give second priority to: (A) Eligible students whose household income levels do not exceed one hundred eighty-five percent of the federal poverty level; (B) Eligible students whose application for the enrollment option program established in section 79-234 has been denied; (C) Eligible students who have an individualized education program; (D) Eligible students who are experiencing bullying, harassment, hazing, assault, battery, kidnapping, robbery, sexual offenses,

Section 1. Act, how cited; declaration of purpose. (1) Sections 1 to 11 of this act shall be known and may be cited as the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act. (2) The purpose of the act is to provide eligible employees in Nebraska the right to earn paid sick time for personal or family health needs and provide certain provisions naturally and necessarily related to that purpose.

Healthy Families and Workplaces

Act: (1) Department means the

Sec. 2. Terms, defined.
For purposes of the Nebraska

Department of Labor; (2) Employ means to permit to work; (3)(a) Employee means any individual employed by an employer, but does not include an individual who works in Nebraska for fewer than eighty hours in a calendar year. (b) Employee does not include an "employee" as defined by 45 U.S.C. 351(d) who is subject to the federal Railroad Unemployment Insurance Act, 45 U.S.C. 351 et seq.; (4)(a) Employer means any individual, partnership, limited <u>liability company, association, cor-</u> poration, business trust, legal representative, or organized group of persons who employs one or more employees. (b) Employer does not include the United States or the State of Nebraska or its agencies, departments, or political subdivisions; (5) Family member means: (a) Any of the following, regardless of age: A biological, adopted, or foster child, a stepchild, a legal ward, or a child to whom the employee stands in loco parentis; (b) A biological, foster, step, or adoptive parent or a legal guardian of an employee or an employee's spouse; (c) A person who stood in loco parentis to the employee or the employee's spouse when the employee or employee's spouse was a minor child; (d) A person to whom the employee is legally married under the laws of any state; (e) A grandparent, grandchild, or sibling, whether of a biological, foster, adoptive, or step relationship, of the employee or the employee's spouse; or (f) Any other individual related by blood to the employee or whose close association with the employee is the equivalent of a family relationship; (6) Health care professional means any person licensed under any federal or state law to provide medical or emergency services; (7) Paid sick time means time that is compensated at the same hourly rate and with the same benefits, including health care benefits, as the employee typically earns during hours worked and that is provided by an employer to an employee for the purposes described in section 4 of this act, and in no case shall the amount of this hourly rate be less than that provided under section 48-1203; (8) Public health emergency means a declaration or proclamation related to a public health threat, risk, disaster, or emergency that is made or issued by a federal, state, or local official with the authority to make or issue such a declara-

tion or proclamation; (9) Retaliatory personnel action means a denial of any right guaranteed under the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act and any threat, discharge, suspension, demotion, reduction of hours or pay, or other adverse action against an employee for exercising or attempting to exercise any right guaranteed in the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act; (10)(a) Small business means an employer with fewer than twenty employees during a given week, including full-time, part-time, or temporary employees. (b) Small business does not include an employer that maintained twenty or more employees on its payroll in each of twenty or more calendar weeks in the current or preceding calendar year; and

(11) Year means a regular and consecutive twelve-month period as determined by the employer.

Sec. 3. Accrual and carryover of paid sick time; paid sick time following transfer or return after separation from employment.

(1) All employees shall accrue a minimum of one hour of paid sick time for every thirty hours worked. Unless the employer selects a higher limit, this section does not entitle an employee to earn or use more than:

(a) Forty hours of paid sick time in a year for an employee of a small business; or

(b) Fifty-six hours of paid sick time in a year for an employee of an employer that is not a small business. (2) Employees who are exempt from overtime requirements under 29 U.S.C. 213(a)(1) of the federal Fair Labor Standards Act, 29 U.S.C. 201 et seq., shall be assumed to work forty hours in each workweek for purposes of paid sick time accrual unless their typical workweek is less than forty hours, in which case paid sick time accrues based upon that typical workweek. (3) Paid sick time as provided in this section shall begin to accrue at the commencement of employment or October 1, 2025, whichever is later. An employee shall be entitled to use paid sick time as it is accrued. An employer may provide all paid sick time that an employee is expected to accrue in a year at the beginning of the year. (4) Accrued paid sick time shall be carried over to the following year. A small business is not required to permit an employee to use more than forty hours of paid sick time per year, and other employers are not required to permit an employee to use more than fifty-six hours of paid sick time per year. Alternatively, in lieu of carryover of unused paid sick time provided pursuant to this section from one year to the next, an employer may pay an employee for unused paid sick time provided pursuant to this section at the end of a year and provide the employee with an amount of paid sick time that meets or exceeds the requirements of subsections (1) and (3) of this section that is available for the employee's immediate use at the beginning of the subsequent year. (5) Any employer with a paid leave policy, such as a paid time off policy, who makes available an amount of paid leave sufficient to meet the requirements of the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act that may be used for the same purposes and under the same conditions as paid sick time under the act is not required to provide additional paid sick time under the act. (6) At its discretion, an employer may loan paid sick time to an employee in advance of accrual by such employee.

(7) If an employee is transferred to a separate division, entity, or location, but remains employed by the same employer, the employee is entitled to all paid sick time accrued at the prior division, entity, or location and is entitled to use all paid sick time as provided in the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act. When there <u>is a separation from employment</u> and the employee is rehired within twelve months of separation by the same employer, previously accrued paid sick time that had not been used shall be reinstated. The employee shall be entitled to use accrued paid sick time and accrue additional paid sick time at the recommencement of employment.

employee notice and documentation; multiemployer paid sick time fund, plan, or program. (1) Paid sick time shall be provided to an employee by an employer for: (a) An employee's mental or physical illness, injury, or health condition; an employee's need for medical diagnosis, care, or treatment of a mental or physical illness, injury, or health condition; or an employee's need for preventive medical care; (b) Care of a family member with a mental or physical illness, injury, or health condition; care of a family member who needs medical diagnosis, care, or treatment of a mental or physical illness, injury, or health condition; care of a family member who needs preventive medical care; or in the case of a child, to attend a meeting necessitated by the child's mental or physical illness, injury, or health condition, at a school or place where the child is receiving care; or (c) Closure of the employee's place of business by order of a public official due to a public health emergency; an employee's need to care for a child whose school or place of care has been closed by order of a public official due to a public health emergency; or an employee's need to selfisolate or care for the employee or a family member when it has been determined by the health authorities having jurisdiction or by a health care professional that the employee's or family member's presence in the community may jeopardize the health of others because of exposure to a communicable disease, whether or not the employee or family member has actually contracted the communicable disease. (2) Paid sick time under this section shall be provided upon the oral request of an employee. When possible, the request shall include the expected duration of the absence. (3) An employer that requires notice of the need to use paid sick time in accordance with this section shall provide a written policy that contains reasonable procedures for employees to provide notice. An

employer that has not provided to the employee a copy of such written policy shall not deny paid sick time to the employee based on noncompliance with such a policy. (4) An employer shall not require, as a condition of an employee's taking paid sick time under this section, that the employee search for or find a replacement worker to cover the hours during which the employee is using paid sick time. (5) Paid sick time under this section may be used in the smaller of hourly increments or the smallest increment that the employer's payroll system uses to account for absences or use of other time. (6) For use of paid sick time for more than three consecutive work days, an employer may require reasonable documentation that the paid sick time has been used for a purpose covered by subsection (1) of this section. Reasonable documentation shall include (a) documentation signed by a health care professional indicating that paid sick time is or was necessary or (b) if the employee or a family member did not receive services from a health care professional, or if documentation cannot be obtained from a health care professional in reasonable time or without added expense, a written statement from the employee indicating that the employee is taking or took paid sick time for a qualifying purpose covered by subsection (1) of this section. (7) An employer signatory to a multiemplover collective-bargaining agreement may fulfill its obligations under the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act by making contributions to a multiemployer paid sick time fund, plan, or program based on the hours each employee accrues pursuant to the act while working under the multiemployer collective-bargaining agreement, if the fund, plan, or program enables employees to collect paid sick time from the fund, plan, or program based on hours they have worked under the multiemployer collective-bargaining agreement and for the purposes specified under the act. Employees who work under a multiemployer collective-bargaining agreement into which their employers make contributions as provided in this subsection may collect from the paid sick time fund, plan, or program based on hours they have worked under the multiemployer collective-bargaining agreement and for the purposes specified under the act.

Sec. 5. Exercise of rights protected: retaliatory personnel action prohibited. (1) It shall be unlawful for an employer or any other person to interfere with, restrain, or deny the exercise of, or the attempt to exercise, any right protected under the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act.(2) An employer shall not take retaliatory personnel action against an employee or former employee because the person has exercised or attempted to exercise rights protected under the act. Sec. 6. Notice and posting. (1) Employers shall give employees written notice of the following at the commencement of employment or by September 15, 2025, whichever is later: That beginning October 1, 2025, employees are entitled to paid sick time; the amount of paid sick time; the terms of its use guaranteed under the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act; that retaliatory personnel action against employees who request or use paid sick time is prohibited; that each employee has the right to file a suit or complaint if paid sick time as required by the act is denied by the employer or the employee is subjected to retaliatory personnel action for requesting or taking paid sick time; and the contact information for the department where questions about rights and responsibilities under the act can be answered. (2) The notices required in subsection (1) of this section shall be provided in: (a) English; and (b) Any language that is the first language spoken by at least five percent of the employer's workforce if the department has provided a model notice in such language. (3) The amount of paid sick time available to the employee, the amount of paid sick time taken by the employee to date in the year, and the amount of pay the employee has received as paid sick time shall be recorded in, or on an attachment to, the employee's regular paycheck. (4) Employers shall display a poster that contains the information required in subsection (1) of this

section in a conspicuous and accessible place in each establishment where such employees are employed. If an employer does not maintain a physical workplace or an employee teleworks or performs work through a web-based or app-based platform, the employer shall provide notice of such information via electronic communication or a conspicuous posting in the webbased or app-based platform. The poster displayed shall be in: (a) English; and (b) Any language that is the first language spoken by at least five percent of the employer's workforce if the department has provided posters in such language.

(5) The department shall create and make available to employers, in all languages spoken by at least five percent of Nebraska's workforce and any language deemed appropriate by the department, model notices and posters that contain the information required under subsection (1) of this section and for employers' use in complying with subsections (1) and (4) of this section.

Sec. 7. Department of Labor; enforcement and implementation powers; rules and regulations. (1) The department shall be responsible for implementation and enforcement of the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act. The department may adopt and promulgate rules and regulations as necessary to carry out the act. (2) The Commissioner of Labor may subpoena records and witnesses related to the enforcement of the act. The commissioner or his or her agent may inspect all related records and gather testimony on any matter relative to the enforcement of the act when the information sought is relevant to a lawful investigative purpose and is reasonable in scope.

Sec. 8. Enforcement. (1) The Commissioner of Labor shall issue a citation to an employer when an investigation reveals that the employer may have violated the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act. (2) When a citation is issued, the commissioner shall notify the employer of the proposed administrative penalty, if any, by certified mail, by any other manner of delivery by which the United States Postal Service can verify delivery, or by any method of service recognized under Chapter 25, article 5. The administrative penalty shall not be more than five hundred dollars in the case of a first violation and not more than five thousand dollars in the case of a second or subsequent violation. (3) The employer has fifteen working days after the date of the citation or penalty to contest such citation or penalty. Notice of contest shall be sent to the commissioner who shall provide a hearing in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act. (4) Any employer who has an unpaid citation for a violation of the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act shall be barred from contracting with the state or any political subdivision until such citation is paid. If a citation has been contested as described in subsection (3) of this section, it shall not be considered an unpaid citation under this subsection until after such contest has been resolved. (5) Citations issued under this section and the names of employers who have been issued <u>a citation shall be made available</u> to the public upon request, except that this subsection shall not apply to any citations that are being contested as described in subsection (3) of this section.

(6) An employee having a claim for a violation of the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act may institute suit for legal and equitable relief in the proper court. In any action brought to enforce the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act, the court shall have jurisdiction to grant such legal or equitable relief as the court deems appropriate to effectuate the purposes of the act. If an employee establishes a claim and secures judgment on the claim, such employee shall also be entitled to recover the full amount of the judgment and all costs of such suit, including reasonable attorney's fees.

(7) If an employee institutes suit against an employer under subsection (6) of this section, any citation that is issued against an employer under subsection (1) of this section and that relates directly to the facts in dispute shall be admitted into evidence unless specifically excluded by the court. If a citation has been contested as described in subsection (3) of this section, it shall not be admitted into evidence under this subsection until such contest

has been resolved. (8) A civil action brought under this section shall be commenced no later than four calendar years after the cause of action accrues.

Sec. 9. Confidentiality and nondisclosure. (1) Unless otherwise required by law, an employer shall not require disclosure of the details of an employee's or an employee's family member's health information as a condition of providing paid sick time under the Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act. (2) Unless otherwise required by law, any health information possessed by an employer regarding an employee or employee's family member shall: (a) Be maintained on a separate form and in a separate file from other personnel information; (b) Be treated as confidential medical records; and (c) Not be disclosed except to the affected employee or with the express permission of the affected employee.

Sec. 10. No effect on more generous paid sick time policies or laws; nonwaiver of rights and remedies. (1) The Nebraska Healthy Families and Workplaces Act provides minimum requirements pertaining to paid sick time, and nothing in the act shall be construed to: (a) Prohibit an employer from the adoption or retention of a paid sick time policy more generous than the one required by the act; (b) Diminish the obligation of an employer to comply with any contract, collective-bargaining agreement, employment benefit

or other agreement providing more generous paid sick time to an employee than required by the act; (c) Diminish the rights of public employees regarding paid sick time or use of paid sick time as provided in state or local law; or (d) Preempt, limit, or otherwise affect the applicability of any other law, regulation, requirement, policy, or standard that provides for a greater amount, accrual, or use by employees of paid sick time or that extends other protections to employees. Be it enacted by the People of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. Sections 1 to 3 of this act shall be known and may be cited as the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Patient Protection Act.

Sec. 2. For purposes of the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Patient Protection Act: (1)(a) Allowable amount of cannabis means up to five ounces of cannabis.

(b) Allowable amount of cannabis does not include the weight of any other ingredient combined with cannabis as part of topical or oral administrations, food, drink, or other preparations; (2)(a) Cannabis means all parts of the plant of the genus cannabis whether growing or not, the seeds thereof, the resin extracted from any part of the plant, and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the plant, its seeds, or its resin. (b) Cannabis includes marijuana, hashish, and concentrated cannabis. affidavit;

(b) In the case of a qualified pa-

tient who is younger than eigh-

teen years of age or a qualified patient under the protection of a legal guardian: (i) The legal guardian or parent with authority to make health care decisions of the qualified patient; or (ii) A person designated in a sworn affidavit by the legal guardian or parent with authority to make health care decisions; or (c) A health care facility as defined in section 71-413 or a home health agency as defined in section 71-417, if the facility or agency has been designated by a qualified patient or the legal guardian or parent with authority to make health care decisions of a qualified patient in a sworn affidavit and if the facility or agency has agreed in writing to serve as a caregiver for the qualified patient; (5) Health care practitioner means a physician, an osteopathic physician, a physician assistant, or a nurse practitioner licensed under the Uniform Credentialing Act or who is licensed in any state and practicing in compliance with the Uniform Credentialing Act; (6) Oualified patient means: (a) An <u>individual eighteen years of age or</u> older with a written recommendation from a health care practitioner; or (b) An individual vounger than eighteen years of age with a written recommendation from a health care practitioner and with the written permission of a legal guardian or parent with authority to make health care decisions for the individual; and (7) Written <u>recommendation means a valid</u> signed and dated declaration from a health care practitioner stating that, in the health care practitioner's professional judgment, the potential benefits of cannabis outweigh the potential harms for the alleviation of a patient's medical condition, its symptoms, or side effects of the condition's treatment. (a) A qualified patient to use, possess, and acquire an allowable amount of cannabis and cannabis accessories for the alleviation of a medical condition, its symptoms, or side effects of the condition's

treatment; or (b) A caregiver to assist a qualified patient with the activities set forth in subdivision (1)(a) of this section by possessing and acquiring an allowable amount of cannabis and cannabis accessories on behalf of the qualified patient and delivering an allowable amount of cannabis and cannabis accessories to the qualified patient. (2) Conduct protected by this section shall not be subject to the Uniform Controlled Substances Act.

Section 1. Sections 1 to 6 of this act shall be known and may be cited as the Nebraska Medical

Cannabis Regulation Act. **Sec. 2.** For purposes of the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Regulation Act: (1)(a) Cannabis means all parts of the plant of the genus cannabis whether growing or not, the seeds thereof, the resin extracted from any part of the plant, and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the plant, its seeds, or its resin. (b) Cannabis includes marijuana, hashish, and concentrated cannabis. (c) Cannabis does not include hemp, as defined in Section 2-503(13) of the Nebraska Hemp Farming Act, nor does it include the mature stalks of the plant, fiber produced from such stalks, oil or cake made from the seeds of the plant, the sterilized seed of the plant which is incapable of germination, or cannabidiol contained in a drug product approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration; (2) Cannabis accessories means any equipment, products, or materials of any kind that are used, intended for use, or designed for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, composting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, vaporizing, or containing cannabis, or for ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing cannabis into the human body; (3) Cannabis for medical purposes means cannabis, cannabis products, and cannabis accessories intended for qualified patients pursuant to any law enacted contemporaneously with the adoption of the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Regulation Act or at any time thereafter and which makes penalties inapplicable to the use of cannabis by qualified patients for the alleviation of a medical condition, its symptoms, or side effects of the condition's treatment; (4) Cannabis products means products that are comprised of cannabis, cannabis concentrate, or cannabis extract, and other ingredients, and that are intended for use or consumption, such as, but not limited to, edible products, ointments, and tinctures; (5) Commission means the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Commission; (6) Registered cannabis establishment means a private entity registered pursuant to the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Regulation Act that possesses, manufactures, distributes, delivers, or dispenses cannabis for medical purposes; and (7) Registration means a registration granted by the commission to a private entity that processes, manufactures, distributes, delivers, or dispenses cannabis for medical purposes.

Sec. 3. (1) Subject to the requirements of the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Regulation Act, it shall not be an offense under state law for a registered cannabis establishment, its employees, and its agents to possess, manufacture, distribute, deliver, and dispense cannabis for medical purposes, provided such conduct complies with applicable rules and regulations adopted and promulgated by the Commission pursuant to the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Regulation Act. (2) Conduct protected by this section shall not be subject to the Uniform Controlled <u>Substances Act.</u>

Sec. 4. (1) For purposes of providing the necessary registration and regulation of persons that possess, manufacture, distribute, deliver, and dispense cannabis for medical purposes pursuant the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Regulation Act, the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Commission is created. (2) The commission shall consist of no fewer than three and no more than five members.

(3) The three members of the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission shall be ex officio members of the commission, serving terms and receiving appointment in the same manner as provided in section 53-105. (4) The Governor may appoint two additional members, subject to confirmation by a majority of the members elected to the Legislature, to serve with the members of the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission as members of the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Commission. The members appointed pursuant to this subsection shall serve six-year terms. (5) The Governor may reappoint members of the commission, subject to approval by a majority of the members elected to the Legislature.

Sec. 5. The power to regulate all phases of the control of the possession, manufacture, distribution, delivery, and dispensing of cannabis for medical purposes by registered cannabis establishments in the state pursuant to the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Regulation Act is vested exclusively in the commission.

Sec. 6. The commission shall: (1) No later than July 1, 2025, establish criteria to accept or deny applications for registrations, including adopting, promulgating, and enforcing reasonable rules, regulations, and eligibility standards for such registrations; (2) No later than October 1, 2025, begin granting registrations to applicants that meet eligibility standards and other requirements established by the commission;

(3) Grant, deny, revoke, and suspend registrations based upon reasonable criteria and procedures established by the commission: (4) Have the authority to adopt, promulgate, and enforce distinct sets of rules and regulations for different categories of registered cannabis establishments: (5) Administer oaths or affirmations as necessary to carry out the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Regulation Act; (6) Issue subpoenas for the attendance of witnesses or the production of any records, books, memoranda, documents, or other papers or things at or prior to any hearing as is necessary to enable the commission to effectively discharge its duties;

(7) Inspect the operation of any registered cannabis establishment for the purpose of verifying compliance with rules and regulations adopted and promulgated by the commission; (8) Have the authority to impose, subject to judicial review under the Administrative Procedure Act, administrative fines for each violation of any rules and regulations adopted and promulgated pursuant to the Nebraska Medical Cannabis Regulation Act; (9) Collect admin-

It's time to Winterize!! Why have to Winterize!!

How to prepare your car for winter

Summer and fall can stake their claim as road trip season, and even devoted drivers may admit that winter is generally a less desirable time to take to the open road. The elements factor heavily into that reputation, as fewer hours of daylight, snow and ice are just some of the variables that can make it less enjoyable, and potentially more dangerous, to drive in winter.

In anticipation of adverse driving conditions, vehicle owners can take various steps to prepare their cars and trucks for winter.

· Upgrade your wiper blades. Perhaps nothing is compromised more than visibility when driving in winter compared to other times of year. Snow makes it hard to see when driving, but fewer hours of daylight also can affect visibility. In fact, the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety reports that approximately half of all fatal crashes occur between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m., even though the number of drivers on the road during those hours is considerably lower than it is during the daytime. The difficulty of driving at night is even more significant when wiper blades are not up to the task of keeping rain and snow off drivers' windshields. Prior to winter, inspect wiper blades and upgrade them, if necessary. Streaks left on a windshield are a tell-tale sign that blades need to be replaced.

· Purchase winter tires. Winter tires may not be necessary in regions with relatively mild winters. However, drivers accustomed to winters marked by heavy snowfall and/or icy roads should consider replacing their existing tires with winter tires. Many newer vehicles are now equipped with all-season tires, which the tire experts at Bridgestone note provide great performance but are not designed to handle extreme winter conditions like snow and ice. Winter tires are specially designed to handle such conditions, making them a worthy investment for drivers who live in regions where it's not unusual to encounter snow and ice throughout the winter.

· Study up on your engine oil. Some vehicle manufacturers recommend different grades of oil depending on the range of temperatures a car or truck will be driven in. The owner's manual will likely indicate if the manufacturer recommends using a different type of engine oil in especially cold temperatures. Even if the manual does not include such a suggestion, drivers can seek the advice of a local mechanic.

· Schedule a pre-winter tuneup. Even if a vehicle is not due for a tuneup, it can be wise to have it looked over by a local mechanic before the arrival of harsh winter weather. A mechanic can check the radiator, hoses and other components that could be affected by especially cold weather in the months to come. If any issues are found, address them immediately. After all, it's better to be proactive than leave yourself vulnerable to breakdowns or other issues once the mercury drops.

As fall gives way to winter, drivers can take steps to keep their cars running strong and safe in the months ahead.

The benefits of energy-efficient homes

Consumer efforts to be more eco-conscious are more and more noticeable. For proof of that, one need look no further than the increase in vehicle charging stations. Such stations are more accessible than ever and illustrate that consumer preference is increasingly leaning toward products that leave as small a carbon footprint as possible.

Another indicator of a growing interest in eco-friendly products is the popularity in energy-efficient homes. In fact, a recent survey from the National Association of Home Builders found that energy-efficient features are among the most sought-after "must-haves" among homebuyers. Among those surveyed, 83 percent desired Energy Star-rated windows, 81 percent wanted Energy Star-rated appliances and 80 percent preferred energy-efficient lighting.

Energy-efficient appliances can help homeowners overcome that spike, as the U.S. Department of Energy indicates upgrading to such products can help homeowners reduce their energy costs by as much as 30 percent.

· Improve resale value: As the NAHB survey indicates, modern homebuyers want energy-efficient homes. They're also willing to pay more for such homes. Research from the mortgage lender Freddie Mac found that homes with energy-efficient ratings sold for nearly 3 percent more on average than homes without such ratings.

· Live healthier: The benefits of energy-efficient homes aren't just economic, though health-related benefits certainly produce an economic incentive as well. According to the American Council for an Energy-Efficient Economy, insulation and air sealing protect individuals from heat waves and other ripple effects of climate change. The ACEEE notes that weatherization can improve indoor air quality and comfort, a notable benefit for asthma sufferers and seniors. In fact, the ACEEE estimates that integrating energy efficiency programs in homes could reduce seniors' risk for falls in their homes, potentially saving \$2 billion in fall-related health care costs over the next decade, and improve asthma outcomes, which could reduce health care costs by as much as half a billion dollars.

How to prepare for winter storms

Winter arrives with fanfare as Christmas, Chanukah and New Year's Eve all take place within days of the first day of the season. Parties and shopping may distract people from the weather around them, but after resolutions are made and the decorations are packed away, it's not long before it's time to confront winter's wrath.

Storms are commonplace in January and February in many parts of the world, and even March storms are not unheard of. Knowing how to prepare for storms can keep people safer and prevent home damage. If a storm is forecasted, follow these guidelines.

- · Charge a mobile phone and other electronic devices to full battery in advance of the storm in case power goes out.
- · Stock the home with extra batteries for flashlights and battery-powered devices, such as a portable radio.
- · Invest in a car charger to charge devices if the power is out for some time.
- · Keep a supply of canned or boxed nonperishable items, as well as convenience foods that do not need to be cooked, like granola bars.
- · Periodically check to ensure that the first aid kit is stocked with items that have not expired.
- · Refill medications so that they are on hand in the event weather makes it challenging to get to the store.
- · Keep emergency supplies of bottled water. If you forget this, fill the bathtub up with fresh water. Extra water will be needed for toilet flushing if yours is a septic system.
- · Have warm blankets on hand and sleeping bags for each person in the home.
- · Unplug all electronic devices if the power goes out to protect against a surge and damage when the power is restored.
- · Exercise caution when burning candles, opting for flashlights and lanterns instead.
- · If it's very cold outside, move refrigerated and frozen items outdoors so they do not spoil in an unpowered refrigerator.
- Do not use gas stoves, charcoal grills or other open-flame heat sources for warmth indoors. Carbon monoxide gas can build up inside and prove deadly.
- · Follow the manufacturer's instructions when using a backup generator for power.
- Stock up on gasoline for vehicles and to power
- gas-driven generators.

 · Use power company websites and apps to report
- outages and stay apprised of restoration status.

 · Be cautious of downed power lines in the area when
- driving or walking.
