Annual Hot Air Balloon Festival makes Falls City shine

Even when the winds don't cooperate, Falls City still shows her magic.

This past weekend, the annual Hot Air Balloon Festival returned to Brenner Field with all the joy and heart that has made it one of southeast Nebraska's most beautiful traditions. The two-day event, held June 13 and 14, combined balloon activity, music, food vendors, family attractions and fireworks drawing visitors from across the region and beyond to experience one of Falls City's largest annual celebrations.

Friday night's weather proved nearly perfect for ballooning. Though it was warm and humid, the wind was calm which has become a rare gift around here and balloon pilots were cleared for launch. Balloons lifted to applause and cheers. Many smiling families lined the grass to capture the moment, taking photos as little ones pointed in glee at the balloons as they floated overhead. Children sat on their parents' shoulders to get a better view, their faces lit with wonder. "Wow, this is really something," said one out of town father, holding his youngest daughter surrounded by his family.

Children bounced around between face painting, dancing and bounce slides as festivities continued with live music by The Traynr Band, filling the air while food trucks served barbecue, Cajun food, pizza, doughnuts, kettle corn, lemonade and more.

Although a scheduled mega kite show was canceled due to lack of wind, the calm conditions made for a smooth and peaceful evening for the balloons.

CMC's Golf "Fore" Good Heath enters 14th year

The annual CMC Charity Golf Tournament and Meet and Greet is just around the corner. The event will begin on Thursday, June 26, with a meet and greet and meal at the Falls City Golf Course. The meal on Thursday will be provided by the Country Cabin Food Truck. Friday, the action begins at 9:00 a.m. with an 18-hole scramble featuring the celebrities. All proceeds from the event will be used for the CMC Community Kids Daycare Center.

The celebrity guest list this year includes Johnny Rodgers, Clester Johnson, Tony Veland, Mike Garrett, Tommie Frazier, Mike Rozier, Dwayne Harris and Rick Upchurch.

The meet and greet on Thursday is open to the public, with tickets available for purchase for \$25. The event is an excellent chance for Husker fans to "mingle" with greats from the Big Red's past

Johnny "The Jet" Rodgers, the 1972 Heisman Trophy Winner and member of the 1970-71 National Championship teams, has been a fixture at the event over the years. Rodgers is fondly remembered in Husker lore for his 72-yard punt return for a touchdown against Oklahoma in the 1971 "Game of the Century." "The Jet" set the standard at Nebraska, ending his career with an NCAA all-purpose record of 5,586 yards. In the

1973 Orange Bowl against Notre Dame, Rodgers ran for three scores, tossed a 54-yard TD and hauled in a 50-yard TD through the air, leading the Big Red to a 40-6 rout. The Jet Award, begun in 2011, is awarded to the top return specialist in college football.

Another yearly contributor has been Clester Johnson. Johnson was also a two-time National Champion at Nebraska (1994, 1995). In his four seasons in Lincoln, Johnson caught 34 passes for 556 yards. (Editor's note- Clester played at a time when throwing the ball was an afterthought.)

Mike Garrett is making his second trip to Falls City for the event. The 1965 Heisman Trophy winner was the first of five running backs from the USC Trojans to win the coveted award. Garrett, a former Kansas City Chief, participated in the 2023 event. Garrett left the University of Southern California with 4,500 all-purpose yards and 30 touchdowns. After his playing days, he assumed the role of Athletic Director at his alma mater from 1993-2010. In 2023, Garrett told The Journal that he met Coach William Reed at the Jet Award Show and instantly hit it off. "He mentioned the Community Medical Center, and I said yes, let's do that," said Garrett. "We are all here to help each other and do the right thing."

Tony Veland is another two-time National

Council passes third reading of Ordinance 2025-100

The City Council met on Monday, June 9, 2025, at City Hall for a special meeting after the previous meeting could not be held due to a lack of a quorum. Councilperson Buckminster was absent from roll call. In the Mayor's report, Mayor Harkendorff acknowledged that Council person Shawn Fouraker had submitted and rescinded a letter of resignation. He also stated that the Council would hold a special meeting on June 23, 2025, at 6:00 p.m. The special meeting is for a hearing that was scheduled for June 2, 2025, for a conditional permit for firearms and ammunition sales at 1801 Stone Street for Isaac Knight. Without a quorum present, the public hearing didn't take place and now had to be republished.

The claims for June 3, 2025, were approved. Council person Ruiz asked if there were any updates on RS Electric's progress on what had been done since they started. City Administrator Nussbaum replied that while he didn't have any specific work items, he could get a list from Public Works Director Trevor Campbell.

In the Treasurer's report, Nussbaum advised the Board that the

With no public opposition, Board passes a \$256,518.12 budget amendment

The Richardson County Board of Commissioners met on Wednesday, June 11, 2025, at the courthouse. Commissioners Karas, Caverzagie and Campbell answered the roll call.

Emergency Management Director Brian Kirkendall met with the Board to discuss Resolution 2024-2025-41, the Richardson County LEOP (Local Emergency Operations Plan). Kirkendall explained that the plan requires updating every five years.

"We've had to pull it out once or twice," said Kirkendall. "Not very often."

The last time the plan was needed was during the pandemic in 2020.

The resolution passed.

Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau Jr., met with the Commissioners, telling them that the new blades on the road graders were working exceptionally well. Darveau and Commissioner Campbell also discussed poten-

Senator Bob Hallstrom Weekly Newsletter

Even though we have just completed the 2025 Legislative Session, we have already started to prepare for the upcoming session. I have several bills that will carry over to the next legislative session, including:

LR13CA - Proposed Constitutional Amendment to prohibit the levying of an inheritance tax



LB 79--Provide for dismissal of certain civil actions involving commercial motor vehicles

LB 455--Provide for confidentiality of certain injury reports under the Nebraska Workers' Compensation Act

LB 575—Require increases in property valuations to be offset by a corresponding decrease in tax levies. Increased levies would require a supermajority vote of the local board

PROPERTY VALUATIONS

One of the most pressing issues I hear the most about is the issue of rising property taxes. Most Nebraskans by now have likely received notice of valuation changes. Please note that higher valuations do not automatically result in increased property taxes.

Property taxes are calculated by multiplying valuations by the tax levies set by local governmental entities. These entities determine their levies within limits set by the Legislature. Community colleges no longer levy property taxes for general operations.

Public schools are primarily funded by local property taxes and state aid. The TEEOSA formula for state aid has not been adjusted, causing property owners to bear an increasing share of education costs. I and other senators have proposed and will continue to propose legislation to address this.

Property tax levels are determined by elected officials' decisions, and those elected officials must have the political will to stand with taxpayers over the wants of special interests. I remain committed to ensuring the state contributes its fair share to K-12 education and eliminating unfunded mandates imposed upon local political subdivisions.

I welcome your input on issues of interest and importance to you. All things Nebraska State lawmakers opt for income tax cuts over property tax relief

By Paul Hammel, Retired Senior Reporter for Nebraska Examiner State lawmakers went home recently, ending a 90-day session marked by reductions in spending and borrowing from cash reserves to close a projected budget gap that once topped \$400 million.

Hard to believe that just a couple of years ago, the state was sitting on a huge surplus of cash. It was enough to set legislators dreaming big dreams, like digging a massive lake between Omaha and Lincoln and financing new marinas and other tourism ameni-

But that was then and this is now, and the **STARWARS** initiative (standing for "Statewide Tourism and Recreational Water Access and Resource Sustainability") never left the launching pad for the most part.

When money is short, not a lot of new state spending is going to get approved. That's been the history of dealing with budget shortfalls down in Lincoln, and that's how we deal with it in our own lives - when cash is short, we don't buy new cars or go out for prime rib.

This wasn't a great year for fans of property tax re-

Efforts by Gov. Jim Pillen and State Sen. Tom Brandt to impose new taxes on previously tax-exempt sales didn't advance (just like they didn't make it to the finish line last summer at that totally forgettable special session).

Shifting taxes off of property and onto sales of candy, soda pop and services like golf lessons and tattoos is complicated, but it's a proven way to provide property tax relief. Such a tax shift comes with some negative consequences, but I gotta believe that with some compromises and some salesmanship it could happen.


Instead, state lawmakers opted to proceed with the massive income tax cut they passed only two years ago, much to the disappointment of the state's farm groups who want property tax help.

Gotta say, when election time comes around, politicians are universally calling for property tax relief, not income tax cuts.

However, the state's business community has been pleading for income tax cuts for years, and in 2023 got a Big Whopper - passage of a bill to gradually reduce the state's top personal income tax rate and the corporate income tax rate from 6.84% to 3.99% by the 2027 tax year.

The argument for cutting income taxes has always been "we have to remain competitive" with our neighboring states, like Iowa, which is dropping to 3.8%. Wealthy Nebraskans, we're told over and over, move away to states with little or no state income taxes (though research shows there are other reasons for moving, such as being closer to family and for better weather or nicer, mountain views. Think Jackson Hole or Tucson).

Brandt had a reasonable - and simpler - way for the state to dig out of its



budget hole, which was to drop the income tax rates to 4.99% instead. Later, he said, when the state has the money, further cuts could be considered.

Seemed reasonable to me. When you're flush with cash it's time to give tax breaks, not when you're fishing around state cash funds - the literal cookie jars of state government - to make the budget bal-

To be sure, the state is still devoting \$750 million this fiscal year in tax credits to reduce our property tax bills. But as former State Sen. Steve Erdman always pointed out, that kind of money just slows the ever increasing property tax bills.

It takes hard work and compromise to get comprehensive property tax relief bills passed.

Pillen and the Gang of 49 have seven months until the next session to figure that out.



75 Years Ago, June 18, 1950 to June 24, 1950

Thirty-five people from Fremont, Dunbar, Nemaha, and Talmage attended a Charter Day Picnic at the 11th and Fulton Street Park to mark the Falls City Amateur Radio Club being presented with a charter by the American Amateur Radio League.

Reinhard C. Herbster, 54, a Richardson County farmer, succumbed to injuries after falling from a pickup truck he was riding in and striking his head on the concrete.

It was reported in Hollywood that actress Judy Garland had attempted suicide by attempting to slash her throat with a broken drinking glass. Garland had been suspended two days prior by MGM Studio for "good and sufficient cause." Mrs. Garland had failed to appear for rehearsal for scenes in the movie, "Royal Weddings."

The City government agreed to lease the north 100 feet of the parking lot at 18th and Barada Street to Sam Jackson of Kansas City. Jackson planned to install a miniature golf course, an archery range and a pony ride in the area. In exchange for the area, the City would receive a portion of the receipts.

"Three Came Home," featuring Claudette Colbert, played at the Rivoli Theater. About 125 people attended the Father's Day banquet at the V.F. W. Club room. Kay Kirk presented a ballet dance accompanied by Mrs. Lloyd Hahn.

More than 100 people turned out for a wheat and fertilizer discussion at the extension service's wheat test plot on the Wesley Heim farm at Dawson Corner.

Yankee slugger Joe DiMaggio collected the 200th hit of his career in an 8-2 win over

Billy Dykes, a seaman in the U.S. Navy, was serving aboard the heavy cruiser USS St. Paul.

Jim Dean's Men's Wear, on the third floor of the First National Bank Building, advertised summer slacks from \$6.50 to \$12.50, all colors and sizes available.

Ground beef was 52 cents per pound, and pork roast was 35 cents per pound at Safeway in Falls City.

Oil drawn from the ground on his farm paid Ben Fehr of Falls City \$4,843.49 since the first of the year, according to an annual report.

Approximately 200 local swimmers were present when the Crystal Beach pool opened. Neal Weddle managed the pool.

Truman M. Sailors of Shubert filed for the Republican nomination for County sheriff. Sailors was a veteran of WWII and was the third man to file for the position.

City Editor of the Falls City Journal, James S. Ramsey, turned in his resignation after 23 years with the paper. Mr. and Mrs. Ramsey and their three sons were forced to leave Falls City due to an asthmatic condition of their youngest son. 50 Years Ago, June 18, 1975 to June 24, 1975

The young Saudi Arabian prince found guilty of assassinating King Faisal last

March was beheaded with a golden sword before thousands of Saudi Arabians in the desert capital.

Dave Remmers of Sabetha had three hits, including a home run and five RBI, as his team defeated the Falls City Legion team 6-5 at City Park.

The Sabetha Lions Club sponsored speed boat races at Sabetha Lake. Thirty teams would run 24 heats of high-speed racing.

The General Accounting Office issued a report encouraging the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office's on the Great Plains to make more of their cost-sharing funds available for windbreaks. The report stated many windbreaks, particularly those planted in the 1930s and 1940s, had been removed, causing concern that continued removals would lead to increased soil erosion.

Ray Koopman was installed as the new president of the Lions Club in Falls City, replacing outgoing president Don Campbell.

Dennis Crawford was named the new head basketball coach for Falls City High School, replacing Larry Ribble. In 11 years prior, Crawford had guided his teams to 110 wins and 102 losses.

Jason McNeely was named the winner in the Mr. Falls City Muscle Contest at the Fun-O-Rama celebration. Stephen Dorste finished second, and Bobby Olberding was

Pawnee City defeated the Dawson-Verdon Pee Wee baseball team 28-0. Pawnee City pitcher Jeff Johnson faced ten batters, striking out seven with no walks and no hits. DV won the reserve game 9-4. Ronnie Blanton, Danny Cochran and Mike Pagnano all singled for DV.

25 Years Ago, June 18, 2000 to June 24, 2000

The Library Building Committee developed a list of deficiencies in the current building, which was 99 years old. The list includes space issues, as the current building was three stories, the library did not own the outside west wall, fire safety concerns due to the lack of a sprinkler system, electrical issues, inadequate lighting, a lack of an air system and elevator, and the roof issues among other issues.

After lengthy discussions at the City Council meeting, the council voted to authorize Fire Chief Jim Hall to place a ban on the discharge of fireworks during the Fourth of July period due to the existing drought.

American Legion Auxiliary Unit 102 met with 18 members and a guest present. Charlene Scheutz conducted the meeting.

"Road Trip" and "Titan A.E." were shown at the River Twin Cinema in Falls City. The 13th Annual Chief White Cloud Rodeo was taking place at the Iowa Tribal Complex, with a firework show taking place after the rodeo on July 4.

Dennis Pyle, who lived six miles north of Hiawatha, filed for the office of 49th District Kansas State Representative.

A 3-bedroom house with central air and heat and a small garage was listed for rent for \$350 per month plus a deposit.

Mutt and Jeff advertised mini burritos for \$1.25, cheddar peppers for \$1.25, and five cheese bars for \$4.00.

University of Creighton star Ryan Sears and the University of Nebraska center Kimani Ffriend were on hand to help with the Pro-Tech Basketball camp held at the Falls City Middle School. The Falls City Jaycees invited former members and their spouses to a buffet dinner

and reception in honor of the organization's 60th anniversary.

Mr. and Mrs. John Eickhoff announced the engagement of their daughter, Honor Elizabeth, to Troy Oscar Nelson of Broken Bow. Jeff Druba smacked a home run to give FC a 5-3 win over Tecumseh in Legion Ju-

(Continued from Page 1) tial road repairs near the mouth of the Nemaha River. Darveau explained that the repairs have been put on hold while they await a grant.

"The last I talked to the grant writer Jason was that the Federal Government had still not opened everything back up," said Darveau regarding the government freeze.

Darveau recommended a temporary fix while they await word on the grant. recommended Darveau milling the area and refilling it with a hot mix for the time being.

Darveau also advised the Board that semi-truck traffic coming from Missouri and driving on the road to St. Joseph, Atchison, or White Cloud is causing road damage. The Superintendent stated that the road is marked for local traffic only.

He said that if the trucks begin or end in the County, they can use the road; otherwise, they cannot.

Mayor Jan Wilhelm of Humboldt addressed the Board and Darveau, asking about how county roads are handled. She advised the Board that she was questioning what Humboldt's role is for upkeeping gravel roads within city limits.

Darveau explained that the contract between the County and the City of Humboldt was eliminated years ago and that the County would not be re-entering into an agreement to maintain the gravel roads. He explained that Humboldt receives funds just like the County and that it was unfair for the County to pay to repair roads for Humboldt but not for Rulo or Stella.

Darveau suggested to Mayor Wilhelm that the city consider purchasing a road groom like the County has.

At 9:30 a.m., the Board opened sealed bids for brome grass mowing. Only one bid was received, which came from Frederick Brothers for \$25. The bid was accepted.

Sheriff Hardesty updated the Commissioners on business at the Law Enforcement Center. Hardesty advised the Board that the jail was currently housing 12 inmates. The

Sheriff reported that 48 individuals were booked into the jail in May, with seven of those being outof-county holds. Sheriff's Department was responsible for 39 of the arrests. He also reported the new ERV (Energy Recovery Ventilator) Unit had been installed at the Law Enforcement Center and that it "has made a significant difference."

The Board also reviewed wage increases that the Sheriff is requesting for staff at the Law Enforcement Center.

Craig Coonce of Rulo requested approval from the Board to establish a cemetery plot on a parcel of land he owns in Rulo. The section of land is located in Rulo at Block 38. lost 3, 4, 7, and 8 in the Rulo Bedard Addition. The Board members requested that Coonce submit a formal request to the County Board, including the name of the person he spoke with at the State of Nebraska, so they and the County Attorney can review the matter.

At 10:15, a public hearing was held relating to a proposed amendment of the 2024-2025 budget for \$256,518.12. The additional money is needed to meet the expenses incurred in the Capital Acquisitions Budget within the General Fund for the electrical improvements at the Law Enforcement Center through a NACO lease purchase. At 10:18, a motion was made to accept the revised budget; the motion passed.

At 10:20 a.m., the Board entered into a closed meeting with Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau Jr. and County Attorney Samantha Scheitel to discuss personnel matters and for the prevention of needless injury to the reputation of an individual(s). The closed meeting ended at 11:16 a.m.





Superintendent's District Update

By Tim Heckenlively

The Falls City Public Schools Board of Education held the regular board meeting on Monday, June 9, 2025. Here are the highlights of the meeting.

Transportation Update - Changes Ahead for School Vans Falls City Public Schools is preparing for upcoming changes in transportation regulations that could impact how the district gets students to and from school and activities. Currently, the district uses a few 11-passenger vans, but new state and federal safety rules will eventually phase those out. While the school is still waiting for an exact timeline (possibly as early as this July), we know that future student travel will likely shift toward small buses or minivans instead of large vans. Transportation Director Tyler Bek says the district is ahead of the curve on most of the new requirements. "We're already doing a lot of what's expected, but the biggest change is around the vans," he shared. "We'll be looking at our options, including possibly adding another minivan to help cover trips with fewer riders."

Statistically, the eight rural bus routes traveled 91,318 miles during the last school year, compared to 86,568 in 2023-2024. On average, the district's bus routes were scheduled to transport approximately 370 potential students on a daily basis to and from school. The district's transportation program managed well in the 2024-2025 school year and the district is proud to have continued transportation services for the students in an efficient and healthy manner. District 56 is fortunate to have dedicated and experienced bus drivers, contributing to our stellar transportation safety record.

The district is also exploring new grants to help offset vehicle replacement costs and is actively working to keep driver staffing strong heading into the new year.

Nebraska Legislature Passes Key Education Bills During 2025 Session - The Nebraska Legislature adjourned sine die on June 2, 2025, concluding its session with the passage of several bills directly impacting public education across the state. Key legislation includes:

- LB 140 Requires school districts to adopt policies governing student use of electronic communication de-
- LB 241 Grants schools immunity from liability in the event of cybersecurity incidents.
- LB 303 Establishes the School Financing Review Commission to study and recommend improvements to school funding.
- LB 306 Updates various education statutes, including school admissions, scholarship programs, and introduces a new database for school financial information and foreign funding disclosures.
- LB 390 Requires school boards to develop policies allowing parents and guardians access to certain school library information.
- LB 645 Modifies provisions related to the School Retirement Fund.
- LB 647 An omnibus tax and finance bill that includes changes to property tax request authority, budget limits, and Nebraska's education savings plan.

School Improvement & Strategic Plan Update: Onboarding for new faculty in 2025-2026 has been planned to provide initial orientation and mentoring activities. The mentoring is a combined local and ESU 4 effort to enhance the success of new faculty joining FCPS in the fall. Sixpence Board of Trustees has approved District 56's continuation grant request for the 2025-2026 fiscal year of \$425,856. This is a temporary reduction of \$129,051 due to a delay in the Child Care and Development Fund payment, administered by the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services. Should further funding be received, Sixpence will issue an amended award to the district.

The District 56 Board of Education acted on several

items before concluding the regular meeting.

1. Approved the Final Readings on Policy Reviews and Revisions: 1) 4263 Records Management and Retention; 2) 7114 Student Records; 3) 7123 Foreign Exchange Students; 4) 7132 Routine Directory Information.

- 2. Approved the Substitute Teacher daily rate for 2025-2026to be set at a daily rate of \$175.
- 3. Approved the Falls City High School Track Resurfacing Project for a Contract price of \$168,851.

The next regular monthly Board of Education meeting is scheduled for July 14, 2025 at 7:00 P.M. in the Central Office in FC Middle School. Regular and special meeting agendas are kept in the Office of the Superintendent.

Former Mound City All-Stater and cur- compete on any level. rent Omaha Mavs guard Tony Osburn made a stop in Falls City on Saturday, June 7, 2025, to host a youth basketball camp at the Roh Activity Center at Sacred Heart. Osburn finished his prep career with 3,080 points, ranking fourth alltime in the state of Missouri. In his senior season, he averaged 35.5 ppg at Mound City, making 130 three-point attempts. Osburn was a four-time All-State selection and was the Missouri Boy's Player of the Year in his sophomore, junior and senior seasons.


In his junior year of college, he helped lead the Mavs to the NCAA Basketball Tourney last season, marking the first time the Mavs had made it to the round of 64. His team won the Summit League regular season and tourney title and earned an automatic bid to the NCAA Tourney. The Mavs fell in the first round to number two seed St. John's, 83-53. Osburn scored nine points in 30 minutes of action against the perennial powerhouse, which was led by Hall-of-Fame Coach

Osburn and his mother, Sarah, held a One-Day Shooting Camp at Sacred Heart, focusing on high school athletes in the morning and junior high in the afternoon. Sarah played high school ball at Rock Port and then in college at Peru St.

His mom described Tony as "selfmade," stating his athleticism did not get him where he is today. Instead, countless hours of being in a gym, all alone, working on his craft, is what led him to where he is today.

"I spent a lot of time in the gym," said Tony. "I love being here, and I'm really glad to see kids that want to be in here. My mom used to say you could be doing a lot worse things than playing basket-

Osburn told the group that some of the things they would work on may be uncomfortable, and many wouldn't be able to do some of the drills. "But, if you keep trying to continually do it on your own, you will noticeably get better. The stuff that makes you uncomfortable is the stuff Rick Pitino, proving yet again he can that is going to make you better."

When Google's AI gets involved: implications for you, your community and your business

This week, my family has been buzzing with excitement for our first trip to the College World Series in Omaha.

With our new home-state Huskers out, we threw our support behind our previous home state team, the LSU Tigers, hoping they'd be playing in the game for which we had tickets.

Early one morning before I had finished my first coffee, my wife, surprised at our luck, told me she saw online that LSU would indeed be in that game. Eager to confirm and view the bracket, I went straight to trusted sources --newspaper media and the NCAA website -- to check the schedule.

But LSU wasn't in the game we are attending. In fact, they were on the opposite side of the bracket. So, where did she get the information?

She pointed to the top result on Google's AI Overview, which had pulled in outdated information — last year's, in fact. And that's when the letdown set in.

This isn't the first time I've seen this happen. It's why I'll glance at Google's AI summary, but then scroll down to check the actual links. Often, what it gives you looks confident, but it's just plain wrong.

AI Can Be Helpful—But Not Infallible

Let me be clear: I'm not anti-AI.

In fact, I'm using AI right now to help research and draft this column. It's a powerful tool when used wisely. But tools should help us, not replace diligence and accuracy. What happened with the bracket is a small mistake, sure — but it's emblematic of a bigger issue.

Google's AI Overview has been caught serving up a range of misleading, incorrect, and sometimes dangerous content. From telling people to add glue to pizza to citing completely incorrect medical and historical facts, AI "hallucinations" have become a recurring problem.

A study by the Tow Center for Digital Journalism found that in complex queries, AI search tools gave wrong answers 60% of the time. Even Google itself admitted to a 1.8% hallucination rate in internal testing — but at scale, that's millions of mistakes a day.

What's Worse: It's Hurting the People Who Get It Right

The more frustrating part? AI is feeding off journalism, then undercutting it. According to a Wall Street Journal report, Google's AI Overview scrapes and synthesizes information largely from traditional news publishers—without driving traffic back to those original sources.

That lack of traffic has real-world consequences.

Business Insider's web traffic, for example, dropped 55% from April 2022 to April 2025. Other publishers have reported double-digit declines in search traffic after AI Overviews were implemented, often leading to lavoffs and restructuring. This isn't just a glitch — it's a system that takes content without compensation and returns less to those who created it.

The News Media Alliance has accused Google of outright content theft, claiming it "copies and monetizes the content of others without paying" and that its AI deprives newsrooms of both visibility and value.

For Communities, the Impacts Are Even More Dire

This matters deeply to me because I'm a fierce advocate for community journalism—not to be confused with the polarizing, sometimes toxic circus of cable news. Newspapers, especially local ones, are embedded in towns and cities in ways no AI will ever replicate.

Studies have shown that when a community loses its newspaper, taxes go up, government spending increases, corruption becomes more likely, and schools and health outcomes suffer. That's not conjecture. That's data from multiple studies and policy reviews.

Newspapers represent only about 25% of local media outlets, yet they generate nearly 50% of original reporting and 60% of all local news.. The rest of the news ecosystem— TV, radio, and social media—often just repackages or amplifies what newspapers produce.

So when AI Overview steals a newspaper's work to provide a free summary at the top of the search page, it's not just bad for journalists—it's bad for your town.

Businesses Aren't Immune Either

The implications stretch into the business world as well. In a recent presentation by industry analyst Gordon Borrell of Borrelll Associates, the uncertainty around AI search was called one of the biggest unknowns in digital advertising. With AI Overviews summarizing search queries, fewer users are clicking through to websites—meaning all that hard work put into SEO/SEM may never be seen.

Yes, organic content might help a business get mentioned in the summary. But that summary still pushes the link down the page, and it's unclear how many people actually click past it.

Paid search listings may become even more expensive and competitive as businesses try to reclaim lost ground. AI isn't just changing search—it's rewriting the rules of discoverability and digital strategy.

What Can You Do?

Be skeptical. Use AI as a guide—but always scroll down. Check the actual sources, especially for anything timely or

Support your local newspaper. Subscribe. Advertise. Share their work. Journalism is worth paying for. And if you don't? You'll still pay—just with poorer information and worse outcomes.

Advocate for transparency. AI shouldn't be allowed to eat the lunch of those who actually cook it.

This isn't about trying to avoid AI. It's about accuracy. It's about fairness. And it's about the kind of informed society we all want to live in.

Because at the end of the day, when AI gets it wrong, the consequences don't just stay online. They show up in your life, in your town, and even in your seat at a baseball game.

The Council heard the third reading of Ordinance 2025-100, authorizing and providing for the issuance of combined utility revenue bonds in an aggregate principal amount of not to exceed \$20 million for the purpose of paying the costs of improvements to the electric system.

The bond requires a 1.25 debt coverage. According to go with steel structo an affordability and tures? Do you want to sustainability report from the City, the utilities' net profit must have at least that level of debt coverage. Beginning in 2029 and assuming no growth in utility profits, Falls City will need to generate an additional \$658,000 in revenue to reach the 1.25 mark.

"So, you get a four percent rate increase that went into effect on October 1, 2024, which was through the last rate study," said Nussbaum. "We got some additional dollars coming into the City."

He also stated that electric capacity sales will account for nearly \$180,000 this year, and then for the next four and a half years, the City will bring in about \$550,000 each year. "That right there covers a good majority of that \$658,000," said Nussbaum.

Passing the ordinance allows Falls City to receive a \$15 million check from NDED (Nebraska Department of Economic Development), which was granted through LB977 in the Legislature. "We can park that, invest that, just basically you have \$15 million sit in the bank, and you put four percent on it, that's \$600,000 annually coming in."

He explained that the money would not be spent immediately, allowing it to earn interest for possibly three or four years.



• I-80 from Hwy 50 (MM 440) to Q Street (MM 444). Traffic can be backed up in this area. Plan for delays and prepare to zipper merge when necessary. This speed limit is 55 miles per hour in this construction zone.

• I-80 from the Pleasant Dale interchange (MM 388) to NW 48th Street interchange (MM 395) in Lincoln. The speed limit is 65 miles per hour in this construction zone.

Annual Hot Air Balloon Festival makes FC shine

After the launch, three balloons gave a coordinated glow after sunset, burners firing in rhythmic bursts to illuminate the night. and the event closed with an extended fireworks display.

Saturday saw wind and unstable conditions. Balloon flights were canceled after close monitoring.

"As the Balloonmeister or lead man for the balloon pilots, there's more to it than just one thing," Brian Carlson explained. "Wind is one big component. A couple times wind was five mph, usually it was six to seven mph and sometimes nine to 10 mph." (The safest launch and landings balloons need is winds of eight miles per hour or less) Winds 100 feet and higher were 10 to 13 mph." Calrson also said that there was the factor for storms chances with low pressure in control in the region meaning sinking air that can easily break those faster winds anytime. He said landing at 10 miles per hour+ "we'd most likely land in a farmer's planted field. So no, we didn't fly and I'm sorry we couldn't, but we won't sacrifice safety when Mother Nature isn't on our side."

Amber Holle, director of Falls City Chamber & Main Street, confirmed. "Due to the wind speeds and convection activity in the area the sky provided unstable air conditions, and the high potential for pop up thunderstorms, so flight was canceled out of safety for our pilots and passengers."

Despite grounded balloons, the crowd was treated to Saturday's musical lineup of Mudbone and Honeytown. Meanwhile, families explored food trucks offering local favorites alongside beer and wine options.

That evening, pilots held a static glow with 10 balloons on the field. For more than 30 minutes, burners flickered in unison, drawing families close. Parents knelt with children, all

snapping photos, talking with pilots and collecting balloon trading cards baseball style keepsakes featuring balloon and pilot details.

"The glow they put on for the crowd was truly amazing," Holle said. "Minus the balloons not taking off Saturday night, the weekend was fantastic."

The festival drew strongly from out of town. Holle said about 80 percent of attendees were visitors from out of town. "Several I spoke with were visiting Nebraska for the first time and had nothing but positive comments of our town, event and community members," she said.

Though slightly smaller than expected, turnout included families and balloon enthusiasts alike. The event organized by Falls City Chamber & Main Street and powered by local volunteers, businesses and civic groups showcased the pride and hospitality of the community.

Local volunteers kept things running smoothly. It was easy to spot Falls City business owners and employees, teachers, and residents standing in the direct sun doing a myriad of jobs. Some directed traffic, some took tickets, sold shirts or some walked the grounds answering questions, picking up trash and lending a hand where needed. Months of preparation went into this festival from coordinating pilots and vendors to staging entertainment and logistics. It's an effort powered by personal investment and Falls City pride.

This year proved that the magic of the balloon festival isn't just in flight. It's in families gathering beneath the balloons; in conversations between strangers; in children and adults dancing alone to music that moves them and in seeing your town through someone else's eyes.

The balloons didn't fly both nights. But the heart of Falls City did and it soared.












