## Medicaid and Medicare cuts have rural leaders worried about impact

Photo (right) Ben Steffen speaking at Humboldt Town Hall, submitted Healthcare providers and community leaders across Southeast Nebraska voiced concerns about the effects of a new federal law that will reduce Medicaid funding.

The legislation, referred to by President Donald Trump as his "big, beautiful bill," passed the House 218-214 and the Senate 51-50, with Vice President J.D. Vance casting the deciding vote.

This bill continues the tax cuts that began in 2017, but it also includes significant changes to the Medicaid program. It tightens eligibility requirements, adds work requirements for people aged 19 to 64, and reduces federal funding for states.

Local facilities relying heavily on Medicaid, like Colonial Acres in Humboldt, Falls City Care Center, and Good Samaritan Society in Auburn, could face serious challenges. According to LeadingAge Nebraska, around 60 percent of residents in Nebraska nursing homes depend on Medicaid for their care.

At a town hall meeting in



Humboldt on June 25, attended by over 70 residents, Ben Steffen discussed the risks to local care facilities. He noted that since 2020, Nebraska has lost 19 skilled care nursing home facilities and 15 of the 19 have been lost from rural communities. Pawnee and Johnson Counties now have no nursing home beds at all.

Steffen said, "If the cuts go through, the choice won't be whether we like our local nursing home, it'll be whether we still have one at all."

Richardson County has a large elderly population, with 24 percent of residents aged 65 and older, according to LeadingAge Nebraska. By 2030, Nebraska is expected to have a 63 percent increase in residents aged 75 or

town was considered unserved, so the Tribe decided to build partnerships to change that.


With services provided by Grey Snow Communications, a broadband engineering and construction company wholly owned by the Iowa Tribe, managing the efforts, \$1.3 million in grant funding was secured to bring high-speed fiber-optic internet to 158 homes and two institutions in White Cloud, including Tribal housing. This new system provides speeds of up to 10 Gbps, which is nearly 400 times faster than what was previously available in the area.

David Tam, CEO of Grey Snow Communications, said, "This fiber construction project placed 45,000 feet of fiber on telephone poles and in the ground. We are pleased that we could serve the

After that screening, we attended a presentation inside the Hollywood Roosevelt by Karie Bible titled "Final Resting Places of Hollywood Legends." I took that time to grab a Coke and sprawl out on the floor of the Blossom Room of the Roosevelt. Filthy, yes. But, I love to sit back and tell myself to take it all in. The history of that room is so overwhelming. Sunrise won an Academy Award in that room during the first Oscars ceremony. How cool is that? ## All things Nebraska Big, beautiful bill would deal bad news for rural hospitals and

## Medicaid recipients

By Paul Hammel, Retired Senior Reporter for Nebraska Examiner There's some good news and plenty of bad news for Nebraska's rural hospitals.

Just recently, state officials cheered the announcement that the federal government had approved the state's application to join a program, already involving 44 other states, that would provide an additional \$1 billion to the state's hospitals and nursing facilities.

But, at the same time, there's concern that President Trump's "Big Beautiful Bill" will severely cut the federal funding for Medicaid, which is a major revenue source for hospitals.

Times were already tough enough for rural hospitals, which not only provide life-saving medical care but are major employers in rural communities.

More than half of the state's rural, independent critical access hospitals were operating at a loss, according to the Nebraska Hospital Association. In recent years, more than one in five rural hospitals have cut back services due to financial struggles - services like delivering babies and treating mental illnesses. There are predictions that six rural hospitals will close if the proposed Medicaid cuts are approved.

Medicaid - health care for the disabled and low-income individuals that is iointly funded by the feds and the state (Medicare is health insurance for the elderly) – pays for 26% of all emergency room visits to rural hospitals and 44% of the bills for minor children, according to the Hospital Association. Almost half of all Medicaid recipients in Nebraska live in rural areas.

In short, it's a big deal for hospitals in our rural communities.


And the bad news is that the proposed beautiful bill would make a sizable cut in federal subsidies for Medic-

How sizable? The bill advanced by the House of Representatives would cut \$88 billion a year, or about 31% of what Nebraska spends per resident on Medicaid, according to the Kaiser Family Foundation, which tracks health care issues. That group says that there are 97,000 children on Medicaid in Nebraska, 44,000 adults and 13,000 seniors and those with disabilities. One in three children in our state under the age of 6 are covered by Medicaid.

The version of the bill being advanced by the U.S. Senate makes even deeper cuts, nearly \$160 billion more over 10 years. So the total cuts would top \$1 trillion over 10 years.

When federal reimbursements go down, the state could pick up the difference. But it's estimated that Nebraska would have to spend \$1.3 billion over the next eight years to make that difference up. More than 100,000 Nebraskans could lose Medicaid coverage, according to the Nebraska Rural Health Association.

Nebraska, as we saw in the last legislative session, is scraping the cookie jars to fund state government, so state funding seems unlikely. And our U.S. Senators and



Representatives seems to be fully on board with the big bill.

Both the House and Senate bill have new work requirements to qualify for Medicaid. But that kind of ignores the fact that most people on Medicaid are already working - nearly two-thirds of recipients ages 19-64 already work. And many of those not working cannot due to caretaker responsibilities or disabilities.

A nurse from the Webster County Hospital in Red Cloud gave a sobering prediction at a recent news conference covered by the Lincoln Journal-Star.

The nurse said the small hospital is already operating at a loss and would likely close if the big bill includes the deep cuts in Medicaid.

And what if you had a heart attack in the home of Willa Cather? Instead of a five-minute ride to the hospital, it would mean a 40-minute ride north to Hastings.

Think about that.

#### 75 Years Ago, July 9, 1950 to July 15, 1950

Soaking rains fell over the area over the weekend, bringing the two-day total for Falls City to 2.43 inches according to reporter Miss Kate Kloepfel.

Falls City stores were busy due to the impact of the Korean War. Citizens purchased overalls, four-buckle overshoes, sheets, food, tires and other items that were in demand as shortage worries loomed.

A Sunday afternoon auto racing program was held at the Auburn fairgrounds. The races over the half-mile track featured stock cars, which were rising in popularity.

A daughter, Laurie Ann, was born to Mr. and Mrs. Bill Schock of 2109 Harlan Street. Jimmie Sefried, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Sefried, left for Frankfurt, KY and East St. Louis and Mt. Vernon, Illinois, to visit relatives and friends.

Selective Service headquarters ordered its 54 state and territorial directors to draft "as soon as possible" 20,000 men requested by the army.

The city's new \$275,000 diesel generator unit was given its first test run. The new engine was rated at 2,800 horsepower and could be converted to permit the burning of natural gas when the supply was available. It was the No. 5 engine on the Falls City municipal power line. With the new unit, the generators were capable of producing over 5,000 kilowatts of power.

Slugger Ted Williams suffered a fractured left arm in the All-Star baseball game and would be sidelined for the remainder of the season, according to the Boston Red Sox. Sam Philpot was named the Horseplay Days parade chairman; Charles Chaney, Jr., the free rides chairman and Dr. R.P. Hoban the free acts chairman.

Jake LeMotta whipped Tiberio Mitri in 15 rounds of action at Madison Square Garden in New York.

The Electric Tire Shop, located at 18th and Harlan Street, was undergoing extensive remodeling, according to owner Charles Heineman.

Smoke and fumes from a trash fire in the rear of the Rivoli Theater prompted theatergoers to rush for the exits. Once it was determined that the fumes were sucked into the building through a big air intake fan the crowd returned to its seats.

More electric power and a more dependable supply for Richardson County were envisioned as a result of energizing a new 75-mile power line through Beatrice, with Humboldt as an eventual goal. The new line cost \$1,000,000 and ran from Kramer Junction through Beatrice and eventually to Humboldt.

Gibson's was having a super sale at its store in Falls City. A Huffy 10-speed bike was on sale for \$69.88, Daisy Model 1894 BB rifles were \$18.88, and Kool-Aid packets were six for 47 cents.

Tom Burton and Lonnie Ludwig, two of six ag students of Norm Fritz, were pictured working on shop projects. The group also included Bruce Vogele, Darwin Godemann, Harry Kirkendall and Bob Kirkendall.

The marriage of Cher and Gregg Allman ended in divorce after only nine days. Cher

stated, "Gregg and I made a mistake."

President of the Chamber of Commerce Richard Halbert appointed a "task force" to determine the role the Chamber should play in assisting the Community Hospital with its expansion program.

Patty Kiekhaefer of Falls City defeated Nancy Albert of Atchison in a two-hole sudden-death playoff to win the championship of the annual Women's Invitational Golf Tourney at the Country Club.

Don Weddle clubbed a grand slam, but it wasn't enough, as his Sheets Pharmacy team fell to Krumme Lumber 16-6 in Pee Wee league action.

The Saturday Night Special at Hotel Stephensen was fried chicken for \$1.75, while the Friday Special at Dairy Dip was fish and chips for 88 cents.

A son, Jason Lee, was born to Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Becker of Omaha, Maternal

grandparents included Mr. and Mrs. Richard Schulenberg.

Sher'ree Hihath and Gary Frye were joined in marriage at the First United Methodist Church in Falls City by the Rev. Richard W. Dinsdale.

After being woken up by son Derrick at 2:00 a.m., Mrs. Ed Hall noticed what looked like a fire at the State Bank of Stella. She woke her husband, who got dressed and ran to get the fire truck. The commotion scared away the would-be burglars who were in the process of cutting open the bank's safe with an acetylene torch.

#### 25 Years Ago, July 9, 2000 to July 15, 2000

Carl Liberty, with the assistance of Tyler Bek, Jerry Jones, Kenny and Frank Killingsworth, and Tim Fischer, designed and built the largest high-voltage transmission cable pulling machine in the United States. The device was constructed in Falls City and was capable of 100,000 pounds of line pull, allowing it to pull up to 5,000 feet of cable at a time. The machine, built for W.A. Chester L.L.C., had a \$200,000 price tag and could feasibly be on the job for the next 40 years.

The fund drive for the Richardson County Military History Museum in the Courthouse reached \$15,058.58. The final goal was \$22,000.

The Table Rock-Steinauer board of education voted 4-2 to pursue unification with the Humboldt Public School. The unification was the first step towards a merger into a single school district, a move that could take up to seven years.

# Medicaid and Medicare cuts have rural leaders worried about impact

older, according to demographic data provided by LeadingAge Nebraska.

Nemaha County Hospital CEO Marty Fattig told attendees at the Humboldt meeting that 44 percent of rural Nebraska hospitals are already operating at a loss. He warned that further Medicaid cuts could lead to hospitals closing or significantly reducing services. Fattig called the consequences of planned cuts "frightening."

Healthcare advocates throughout Nebraska expressed similar worries during a virtual press conference on June 30. The press conference was organized by the advocacy group United Today Stronger Tomorrow.

Tyler Sherman from Webster County Community Hospital warned, "Rural hospitals already working at a revenue loss likely will be closed within 24 months."

He said Webster County Community Hospital would likely shut its doors within two to three years, turning five-minute drives for emergency care into 45-minute ambulance rides.

Abby Klene from the Nebraska Nurses Association stated that over 100,000 Nebraskans could lose Medicaid coverage due to the proposed cuts.

"These cuts mean fewer resources for hospitals, nursing homes and clinics," Klene said. "They also lead to an increased workload for nurses, increased patient acuity and possibly uncompensated care, all of which jeopardize patient safety."

Mary Ann Borgeson from the Douglas County Board of Commissioners explained that Medicaid is essential for local budgets, noting that over 70 percent of Douglas County's health center revenue comes from Medicaid. "If that revenue goes away, counties become the payer of last resort," Borgeson said. "And our only other revenue source is property taxes."

John Hansen from the Nebraska Farmers Union highlighted another concern, stating health insurance premiums on the ACE Exchange could rise significantly as Congress ends expiring tax credits.

Dr. Jud Hansen from the Nebraska Rural Health Association said many rural hospitals are already struggling. He estimated Nebraska hospitals would need an extra \$210 million annually to stay open. The proposed federal relief, he said, isn't enough.

Community Hospital in McCook recently announced the upcoming closure of Curtis Medical Center due to anticipated federal Medicaid cuts. Troy Bruntz, CEO of Community Hospital,

stated these financial challenges made continuing operations impossible.

Advocates for individuals with disabilities also raised concerns. Elena Shriver, executive director of the Nebraska Association of Service Providers, said Medicaid makes up 99 percent of their funding. Severe cuts could lead to service shutdowns, pushing care back into institutions, which is much more expensive

Edison McDonald from National Disability Action explained how new, strict work requirements for Medicaid recipients ages 19-64 could harm vulnerable individuals. He said the policy could create a "benefits sandwich trap," where working slightly more could lead someone to lose vital healthcare coverage.

Phil Gray from The Arc of Nebraska stated that over half the services for people with developmental disabilities rely on Medicaid and significant cuts would threaten their existence.

Sarah Marsh described the cuts as "an extreme and monumental threat" to healthcare access, noting nearly half of Nebraska's 340,000 Medicaid recipients are children.

Rebecca Firestone from OpenSky Policy Institute explained during the town hall in Humboldt and during the virtual press conference that there are planned cuts to Medicaid and SNAP (formerly known as Food Stamps) to cover part of the cost of tax cuts. Under the United States House version of those tax cuts, Nebraskans making less than \$ 30,000 per year would receive \$170 in benefits, while those making over \$722,000 per year would get \$103,000 in tax cut benefits. Firestone further explained that the loss of Medicaid funds in the state budget would deepen an expected state deficit and threaten funding for other priorities, including education.

Supporters of the bill argue it fulfills national priorities by reducing spending and deficits. Critics, however, predict it will result in higher local taxes, increased healthcare costs, and decreased access to care, especially in rural areas.

As rural healthcare providers in Southeast Nebraska prepare for these changes, many community members remain concerned about the future. Local facilities currently remain open but face uncertain futures.

During the Humboldt Town Hall, responding to a question from Ben Steffen, virtually every audience member raised a hand in agreement that it is essential to keep our nursing homes, hospitals, and healthcare services thriving.

Attendees were encouraged to contact their elected officials to stay informed and involved.
