Full house for Commissioners discussion on floodplain management ordinance

The Richardson County Commissioners gathered on Wednesday morning at the Courthouse for their regularly scheduled meeting. All Commissioners answered the roll call.

The meeting got slightly contentious when Missy Campbell approached the Board to discuss the adoption and enactment of the zoning overlay district floodplain management ordinance. The Board approved the ordinance/resolution on September 14, 2021, and it took effect on October 7, 2021.

In her remarks, Campbell asserted that Richardson County Emergency Management Director Brian Kirkendall had been aware that changes were on the horizon long before the resolution was approved.

Campbell said they were warned by Kirkendall in 2019 that the law was changing and that if they wanted to build on the lots they had purchased, they needed to get started. He was not able to elaborate, but the law was about to change.

Campbell stated that the County was notified by certified mail and by email on six occasions from April 7 to September 30, 2021, by FEMA and the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources, with reminders of the upcoming deadlines and the County's requirements to carry out the resolution.

Campbell said the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources, "Invited and recommended the chair of the commissioners, the clerk and the mayor to take advantage of two different virtual workshops to assist the County in understanding the process of creating, reviewing and adopting this ordinance," said Campbell. She stated no one took advantage of the offerings.

Campbell mentioned that once the ordinance was adopted, nothing was done to notify the landowners who were affected by the resolution. She claimed the property owners were unaware of any such ordinance until this spring.

The residents also missed out on a 90-day appeal window to dispute the new floodway/floodplain maps because they were never notified of the changes.

Jeremy Ingraham had recently purchased property at Lewis and Clark Estates south of Rulo and was working to obtain a floodelevation certificate to build on the lots he had purchased. Ingraham was told he could have renovated the property in question, but since it had been torn down, nothing could be done.

"Only after Jeremy Ingraham met with the County Commissioners regarding this issue on April 16, 2025, did the County attempt to notify the landowners affected," said Campbell. "Those letters, dated May 28, 2025, were sent through regular mail, not certified."

Campbell stated that many of the property owners in question (Please turn to Page 8)

This cozy porch farmstand offers homemade sourdough baked goods, jams, syrups and other sweet treats, and natural bath andbody products, all crafted with care from items grown on the Rumbaugh Farm at 3113 McLean Street.

For owner Megan Rumbaugh, MR Farm Fresh is more than a business, it's a reflection of her lifelong love for farming, health, and community. She grew up on a small farm outside Nebraska City, where her parents raised rabbits and ran a creative campaign encouraging people to "Kick the Habit, Eat Domestic Rabbit." That mix of entrepreneurship and country living planted early

Everything seemed to be going the Huskers' way on Saturday night, until it didn't. The Big Red faithful followed instructions and blacked out the stadium. The University changed the coloring in the end zones and at midfield to black. The team wore black uniforms. Heck, even the tunnel walk music was changed to AC/DC's Back in Black for the night.

USC won the coin toss, but the Blackshirts turned the vaunted Southern Cal offense away. On the ensuing Husker drive, Dylan Raiola and Company marched 75 yards in 14 plays, ending with a seven-yard TD pass to Nyziah Hunter to put the Huskers in front 7-0.

All was well in Husker Nation.

The Trojans were held to field goals as the half went on. With less than two minutes to play in the half, Nebraska finished its second 75-yard drive with a 10yard TD run by Emmett Johnson. The Big Red rode into halftime with a 14-6 lead.

Again, all was well in Husker Nation; until it wasn't. An interception by Andrew Marshall gave the Huskers the ball in plus field position and a chance to deliver the knockout punch. Well, the punch was delivered. Remarkably, it hadn't happened earlier in the year. Raiola was sacked, stripped of the ball, and injured his ankle. Nebraska has tempted fate all season with the offensive line's struggles. Just like that, our five-star quarterback limped off the field, not to return. For those of you who have called for TJ Lateef to see more action, I hope this satisfies your curiosity. He was ill-equipped to lead the Huskers down the field, even with a greatly successful running game by Emmett Johnson. Johnson finished his night with 29 carries for 165 yards and eclipsed the 1000-yard mark for the year. Lateef will be a solid leader on the field someday, just not quite yet.

Southern Cal outscored Nebraska 15-3 in the second half to secure the win, extending the Big Red's losing streak to 29 games against ranked foes dating back to 2016.

I hope the loss doesn't set off a chain of events leading to another November losing streak. However, that is exactly what I'm afraid will happen, especially now that we are without Raiola's services for the remainder of the season after it was announced that he had fractured his fibula on that play in the early part of the third period.

I can't blame everything on the players. The coaching staff also made many poor decisions, especially in the second half: wasted time-outs, poor offensive play calls, and poor clock management. The list can go on and on.

On a night where the crowd showed up, causing multiple false starts for USC, and where the Blackshirts held the nation-leading passing offense to 135 yards through the air, it still wasn't enough to break through and put Nebraska back on the stage with the big boys. Maybe we don't belong there. Maybe we will never be back there. We aren't getting there this

I won't give up yet, but I'm not holding my breath

'Where's the beef?' Right here with Nebraska cattle producers

Nebraska is cattle country. We used to be known as "The Beef State" - a nickname I always liked.

But recently, cattle producers have raised a beef with the president over his ideas to reduce the cost of beef at the grocery store.

Every media has covered the cattle kerfuffle: President Trump proposed to quadruple beef imports from Argentina, so that record-high prices in our country might come down. (He also sent a \$40 billion bailout to the struggling South American country – a country that is selling soybeans to China, soybeans that used to be purchased from U.S. farmers. "Make Argentina Great Again" hats went on sale. And Brazil sold all of its soybean crop to China. But that's another story for another day.)

The president also said that the tariffs that he's imposed on beef imports have helped livestock pro-

That analysis and his proclamation to buy more beef from Argentina brought a sharp response from farm groups that typically support Trump. It was a complete about-face from his oft-repeated mantra of "America First," which is about increasing sales and production of U.S. products by imposing stiff tariffs on other countries.

The National Cattlemen's Beef Association said that the president's comments "undercut" America's beef producers and threatened their livelihoods.

Another group, Farm Action, called Trump's actions "a betrayal" of ranches and farmers. And the president of the Nebraska Farm Bureau and incoming head of the Nebraska Cattlemen both said the ideas were wrong headed. U.S. Rep. Don Bacon,

who has criticized Trump's tariff policies, told the Omaha World-Herald that his analysis of high beef prices was a "bit of false reality."

Even U.S. Sen. Deb Fischer, whose criticisms of the president are as rare as a five-legged horse, called on Trump to rethink his position.

Another consistent Trump supporter, U.S. Rep. Adrian Smith said that he was encouraged that talks were underway with China to get them to resume purchases of U.S. products. Well, duh, let's hope so.

Now, I haven't slept in a Holiday Inn recently, but I do have some crude understanding of how beef markets work. And beef prices are high now because there's fewer cattle out there to meet demand. It's the old supply and demand system.

Beef prices are very cyclical, and when there's too many cattle out there - as happened a couple of years ago - prices are low, and ranchers tend to reduce their herds. But when there's fewer cattle out there to turn into steaks and hamburgers, prices go up, as they are now.

Tariffs, all the farm groups pointed out, don't have much to do with that. (And some economists told the Associated Press that boosting beef imports from Argentina -- because they're only a fraction of

do much to lower prices.) High prices for cattle are one of the few bright spots out in farm and ranch country right now. Producers are finally making some money, after some lean years.


Meanwhile, prices for corn and soybeans are, shall we say, in the toilet, in part because countries that used to buy our crops, like China, aren't buying now because of Trump's new tariffs.

This is a hard topic to write about, because by the time you read this, there might be some completely different news about tariffs and trade for American beef and grain. Maybe.

That seems to be the nature of news these days. It's helter-skelter – peace in Gaza then fighting resumes, purported drug boats blown up in the Caribbean, and threats, made and withdrawn, about sending the National Guard into American cities.

But the president, if he wants to retain his typically strong support from ranchers and farmers, better sit down, have a burger, and rethink and reverse what he's pondering about beef and trade.

Gloria Swanson and William Holden, co-stars in the film "Sunset Boulevard, were named best actress and actor of the year in the 1950 poll of The Film Daily.

Dr. W.D. Ketter obtained a building permit from the city council to erect a one-story medical building at 214 East 16th Street.

Mrs. Carl Meyer, former owner of the City Cab Company, obtained a building permit to construct a showroom on the filling station property at 1302 Stone Street. The Kaiser-Frazer Motor Sales Company, which rented the property, would use the space.

Sacred Heart High School presented "Feudin" in the Tiehen gymnasium. Miss Rita Mae Rawley played the part of a successful Ozark radio announcer, while Charles Hall assumed the role of the attractive young heroine.

Otto Kotouc, a prominent Humboldt banker, defeated Harold Prichard, a Falls City law student, in the race for the legislature in the First Nebraska District. Kotouc totaled 6,087 votes compared to 4,419 for Prichard.

Ed Poteet defeated Sam Oberst in the race for the First District County Commissioner position. Poteet held a 2,185 to 802 final edge.

Former Richardson County resident Richard Peck won the race for county attorney in Cass County. Peck was a 1935 graduate of Falls City High School.

Miss Clara Tanner and Mrs. Ira Inks hosted 23 members of the Past Matrons Club of the Order of the Eastern Star. Mrs. Lee Dillaspy, president, conducted the meeting.

The Y School, District 91, located two miles south of Rulo, was the only rural school, other than a consolidated one, in Richardson County to boast running water for drinking purposes. There were 11 children in the Y School, which was taught by Mrs. William

The Bobby Grunds Trotters appeared at Prichard Auditorium to play the Terrible Swedes in action on the basketball court. Adult tickets were \$1, while kids were 50 cents and could be purchased at Rex Riesland's Drug Store.

Armbruster's Used Cars advertised a 1940 Chevrolet Coach for \$395, a 1934 Buick Sedan for \$65 and a 1932 Ford Pickup for \$65.

Eighty children and 20 adults attended a Halloween party at the Community Hall in

Verdon. The new \$260,000 diesel-electric generating unit at the Falls City Municipal Water and Light Plant was able to meet the entire electric load of the city on natural gas. The engine

developed 1,500 kilowatts, which was all that was required for the morning's energy needs. The Falls City Tigers ended the season with a 21-18 win over the Fairbury Jeffs in below-freezing temperatures in Falls City. Wayne Nanomantube scored with 48 seconds remaining to boost the Tigers to the win.

Hiawatha disposed of Troy, 26-6, in action on the gridiron. Gary Snodgrass scored the first TD of the game, while Dayton Lewis added two scores. Jean Legler closed out the Hiawatha scoring with a one-yard QB sneak.

50 Years Ago, October 5, 1975 to October 11, 1975

The Southeast Consolidated Mustang Marching Band received a Division 1 Outstanding Rating at the Nebraska State Marching Band Festival in Lincoln. Posing with their trophy were Loretta Johnson, Jackie Baker, Sally Bright, Randy Pryor and Larry Boatman.

The National Flood Insurers Association in Arlington, Virginia, added the unincorporated areas of Richardson County to the list of those eligible for flood insurance.

Al Montgomery announced that he was opening a modern barber shop at 1020 McLean

Hiawatha recorded its third straight win, defeating Horton 34-0. Kevin Knudson scored once and passed for another. Also scoring were Mark Kloepper, Clayton Carnahan and

Doyle Bossee. Stan Bachman booted four conversions in the win. Officers were elected at a meeting of the Shubert Community Library Board. Those named were Mrs. Harold Rieschick as president, Mrs. Ron Shubert as vice-president and

Mrs. Max Shafer as secretary. Melvin Halkins, an instrument technician for the Nebraska Public Power District, was in critical condition with first and second-degree burns after a faulty valve caused a small

The Rulo Area Jaycees were chartered by the Humboldt Jaycees when they met in the party room at Ye Ole Tyme Saloon in Rulo. There were 22 charter members and five associates. Philip Bletscher was elected president, and Francis Nolte was elected vice president.

Two businesses in Humboldt were robbed overnight. Thieves broke the glass in the front door at Joe's Pharmacy, and the Kean and Albin Chevrolet Agency was also broken into.

The nation's unemployment rate rose from 8.3 to 8.6 percent in October, according to a government report. Dawson-Verdon captured the Class D District volleyball crown by defeating Adams 15-8

and 16-14.

Sacred Heart coach Bill Jenkins announced that Matt Froeschl was voted the team's most valuable player and Tom Harmon was named the most dedicated.

Approximately 116 Cornhusker fans left in three buses from the Elks Club bound for the Nebraska-Kansas State football game in Manhattan.

Three Richardson County students were among the 200 named to the Southeast Community College Milford Campus honor roll. The list included Phillip Fischer, Ernest Kreutzer and Andrew Leatherman.

First National Bank Chairman Gus Scholz announced that the bank's remodeling program was totally complete. The bank's total space was more than doubled with the remod-

With 6,825 voters registered in the county, County Clerk Mary Eickhoff predicted that approximately 65 percent would vote in the general election. Eickhoff also stated her office had issued 544 absentee ballots, the largest in recent history. The 2000 election carried a price tag of \$19,000 and involved 180 election workers.

City Economic Development Coordinator Tracy Brantner was presented with the REAP Friend of the Year Award.



Joe Stalder of Humboldt receives stipend for research project at Nebraska

Joe Stalder of Humboldt is among 160 Husker undergraduates who have been awarded stipends by the University of Nebraska-Lincoln to participate in research with a faculty mentor during the fall and spring semesters.

Stalder, a senior majoring in geology, will participate in the project "Description and Occurrence of a New Fossil Diatom and its Potential as a Miocene Paleoclimatic Proxy" as part of Nebraska's Undergraduate Creative Activities and Research Experiences Program, which supports undergraduates to work with faculty mentors in research or creative activities. Students receive stipends of \$3,600 to engage in intensive research or creative activity for 10 hours per week. Since the start of 2025, local Red Cross volunteers responded to help over 1,000 people in Nebraska affected by nearly 300 home fires, which account for most of the about 65,000 disasters that the Red Cross responds to annually across the coun-

Smoke Alarms When turning your clocks this weekend, test your smoke alarms and replace the batteries if needed. Visit redcross.org/ fire for more information, including an escape plan to create and practice with your family, or download the free Red Cross Emergency app by searching "American Red Cross" in app stores.

- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home, including inside and outside bedrooms and sleeping areas.
- Replace smoke alarms that are 10 years or older. Components such as sensors can become less sensitive over time. Follow your alarm's manufacturer instructions.
- Practice your two-minute

home fire escape plan. Make sure everyone in your household can get out in less than two minutes — the amount of time you may have to escape a burning home before it's too late.





Tigers fall in subdistrict opener

The Falls City Lady Tigers saw their season come to a close on Monday night at Omaha Concordia High School in the Class C1-1 volleyball subdistrict. The fifth-seeded Tigers fell to fourth-seeded Fort Calhoun in four sets, 20-25, 25-20, 21-25 and 8-25.

Falls City may have lost in the first round of the postseason, but the players and coaches exited the floor with their heads held high after a successful 2025 season. The Tigers ended the year at 15-15, having won six of their final nine con-

On Monday evening, FC took an early lead in the first set as Hallie Young served Falls City to a 2-0 advantage. The set was back and forth, but the Tigers found themselves still very much in it late at 18-21. Hitting errors by the Tigers gave Fort Calhoun the final two points of the set as FC fell 20-25.

The second set ended better than it started for Falls City. The Tigers found themselves down 2-8 in the early going before a kill by Bella Johansen gave FC life. With the match tied at 1-1, Falls City was ready to do battle with the Pioneers. The set was even early, but an ace by Johansen put the Tigers in front 9-6. The Tigers stayed in front with kills from Carlea Young 8, Gossman 9, Jo-Dunkhas, Alexander and Johansen. With a two-point lead, kills by Gossman and

Buckminster forced Fort Calhoun to take a timeout as they trailed 17-13. Out of the break, the Pioneers rattled off five consecutive points to put FC down 17-18. Again, the fight was on. (Continued from Page 7) that period, Sacred Heart enjoyed eight state titles and an 87-game winning streak.

Times have changed over the years, but expectations haven't. According to Hall-of-Fame Head Coach Doug Goltz, the Irish goals are the same as they have been every season: to make the postseason.

"Three years in a row of coming up one game short of the playoffs is disappointing," said Goltz. "We needed to win the OT game versus Weeping Water. We blew the opportunity."

Coach Goltz shouldered part of the blame for the overtime loss in week four.

"I regret my play calling in OT," said Goltz. "Defensively, we didn't get many stops versus Weeping Water. Highest scoring game I've ever been part of."

The game Coach Goltz is referring to was a 64-72 setback at Jug Brown Stadium on Friday, September 19, 2025. As high scoring as the affair was, its total of 136 points was nowhere close to the 8-man record of 176 points that Bancroft-Rosalie and Allen combined to score in 2014. Sacred Heart ended the

season with wins over HTRS (41-14) in week five and Cedar Bluffs (54-18) in the season finale.

The Irish were outscored this fall 375-245. The second quarter seemed to be the Irish's nemesis, as they were outscored 111-71 in the 12-minute span before

Sacred Heart struggled in the ground game this fall, ending the season with 885 rushing yards, while the defense allowed 2,274 yards.

Through the air, SH accumulated 1,572 yards and allowed 1,022.

The Irish only lost three fumbles all season on offense and committed just 31 penalties for 261 yards. The Irish were outgained in total offense, 3,296 to 2,457.

"Our defense had been poor these past four years," said Goltz. "We need to be better tacklers, and more than anything, we need to be more physical. That's probably what has hurt the most is the lack of kids that want to play physical football. Football games are often won by the team that hits the hardest the longest. That hasn't been us."

Individual rushing totals included team leader Elijah Canonico with 72 attempts for 287 yards and seven scores. Kayden Groth was next with 26 attempts for 155 yards and three scores; Brenden Lemerond ran for 133 yards on 60 carries with one touchdown, and Noah Howard ran the ball 27 times for 125 yards and one score.

Through the air, Lemerond completed 110/181 pass attempts (61%) for 1,329 yards, 19 touchdowns and six interceptions. Cole Taft completed 12/23 passes for 145 yards, one score, and four interceptions, while Hayden Clow went 5/10 for 98 yards.

Ten separate players caught passes this season, with Taft leading the way with 50 grabs for 525 yards and six touchdowns. Kyler Sipple was next with 27 catches for 349 yards and three touchdowns, Groth caught 19 passes for 165 yards and two scores, and Howard snagged 17 passes for 319 yards and seven scores.

Cooper Knobbe handled the punting duties this season for Sacred Heart, finishing with 18 punts for 602 yards for an average of 33.4 yards per kick, while JJ Lancaster kicked off 42 times for an average of 46 yards per kick.

Defensively, Canonico paved the way with 90 total stops. Groth added 69 tackles, including seven for losses, and Charlie Rottinghaus finished with 55 tackles, including two sacks. Lemerond added 44 stops, Sipple finished with 33, and Toby Baxter had 37 tackles, including ten for

The season may not have progressed the way the Irish had hoped, but winning the final game on the schedule put a nice touch on the season.

"It was nice winning our last game at Cedar Bluffs," said Goltz. "Good way for the season to end and for our seniors' last football game."

Next season will be interesting with the new NSAA classification system. According to Goltz, Sacred Heart will be eligible for six-man football due to enrollment, but he anticipates staying in 8-man. The Irish

will fall in the new Class D3 classification.

"I'm not sure how 8-man having three classes will work out yet," stated Goltz. "Until schools declare if they will play 11, 8 or 6, it is hard to know who will be in the three classes and who our district opponents will be. There will be few D3 teams in southeast Nebraska."

Goltz went on to say that many of the teams Sacred

Heart plays, will be or have already opted to play 6-man football.

The new system does allow 8-man teams to play a nine-game schedule, but only 16 teams will make the postseason.

"It will be a little tougher to qualify, but all of us will get to play nine games rather than only eight," said Goltz. "It will be interesting to see how it all shakes out."

notice. She went on to state that the County sent letters and copies of the ordinance to banks, insurance companies, attorneys, and land title companies within Richardson County on June 11, 2025, and that on June 16, it was filed with the register of deeds.

Campbell told Commissioners that the resolution will negatively affect the value of properties within the floodway.

"Since the County agreed to adopt this new ordinance in 2021, six more parcels of land in the Lewis and Clark Estates have been purchased for a total of \$655,000 additional dollars without any knowledge of the ordinance or restrictions," stated Campbell.

She advised the Commissioners that the purchases were made with the intent to build on the lots, which is illegal according to the ordinance.

"If landowners had been notified in a proper time frame, we would made different have choices in the purchases and investments of these properties," said Camp-

Campbell asked the County to appeal the ordinance to avoid any further action by the property owners.

Commissioner Caverzagie said he felt like the fault lay with the state and the Federal Government for not notifying the public of the changes.

"We were told we had to adopt it so people who lived in the floodplain could get flood insurance," said Caverzagie.

Campbell stated that, under the statutes, it falls to the County to notify residents through the EMA Director.

Campbell said that if the County had, at a minimum, notified the register of deeds, it would have prevented the sale of six properties at Lewis and Clark Estates. She also questioned whether the ordinance was officially adopted, given that no notifications were sent.

Campbell stated that those living at Lewis and Clark want the ordinance to go away.

County Attorney Samantha Scheitel replied that for that to happen, the County would be dropped from the Federal Flood Insurance Program, "And that would affect funding for any natural disaster for the County," said Scheitel. "That's the only way to get rid of it, absent our state legislators changing the law."

"All we wanted was the same due diligence that you guys received from the state and FEMA," said Missy Campbell. "You were contacted multiple times, given workshops to take advantage of, you had all the opportunities to ask any questions you wanted on how you want to implement this, how to understand it. We have not been given any of that. Nothing."

Commissioner Karas spoke up, stating the County needs to someone from the state to come down and answer any questions the residents have regarding the ordinance.

"I still think we put something together and get somebody from the state so these people can get answers and so we know," said Karas.

In other action, Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau Jr. met with the Board and discussed road and bridge maintenance.

Sheriff Rick Hardesty met with the Board and reported that the jail was currently housing 11 inmates. Hardesty also advised the Commissioners that the Department was seeking a grant for new vests for deputies.

Caverzagie made a motion to approve the purchase of 13 new weapons and holsters and allow the trade-in of the current handguns for a total of \$7,390.20 from GT Distributors of Pflugerville, TX. The motion passed.

Karas made a motion to approve the appointment of Dexter Holliday as Chief Deputy for the Sheriff Department, effective November 3, 2025. The motion passed.

Katelin Gilsersleeve, Family and Community Partnership Coordinator, and Shannon DePrey, Family Service Advocate at SE NE Community Action Partners, Inc., presented an annual report on the Head Start Program in Richardson County. The Falls City SENCA Outreach Office also supplied a report for October 2025 to September 2025.

A subdivision resolution for Janet Warrick McMullen, Trustee of the Janet McMullen Trust, located in S16, T3, R15, was passed.

A motion to adopt Resolution 2025-2026-13 to transfer \$238,841.22 from the Federal Forfeiture Fund and to close the fund was made by Campbell and passed. Caverzagie made a motion to adopt Resolution 2025-2026-14 to transfer \$250,000 from the Inheritance Tax Fund to the General Fund, as per the FY 25 26 budget. The motion passed.

Claims were and the meeting was adjourned at 11:20 a.m.

Theft suspects arrested after pursuit from KS through Richardson

Two Omaha men were arrested Friday evening after a vehicle pursuit that began in Jackson County, Kansas and ended just south of Auburn, according to Jackson County Sheriff Tim Morse.

County ends south of Auburn

Morse said the Sheriff's Office received a report around 6 p.m. of two men stealing a large quantity of merchandise from the Holton, KS Walmart. The suspects allegedly exited through an emergency door with two shopping carts of merchandise and loaded the items into a car. Holton Police responded to the store, gathered suspect information and began the investigation. Sheriff's deputies searched for the vehicle and located it in northern Jackson County. When a deputy attempted a traffic stop, the vehicle fled north on U.S. Highway 75. Brown County deputies and the Kansas Highway Patrol joined the pursuit.

The chase continued into Nebraska where Richardson County deputies attempted to stop the vehicle with tire deflation devices. Nemaha County deputies also joined the pursuit. The pursuit ended at the south edge of Auburn near the vet clinic when the suspect vehicle sideswiped a southbound vehicle. Emergency crews responded to the scene. A large police presence was spotted and traffic was backed up for a short time. More than \$3,400 in stolen merchandise was recovered from the vehicle.

Deputies took the driver, 51-year-old John Newberry III of Omaha, and passenger, 30-year-old Thomas Carodine of Omaha, into custody. Carodine had an active warrant out of Sarpy County, Nebraska.

Both men are being held on local charges in Nebraska. Morse said the Jackson County Sheriff's Office will file for warrants to extradite the suspects back to Kansas.






