Commissioners attend NACO meetings

Richardson County Commissioners did not hold their regularly meeting on Wednesday, Dec. 17 because members were attending the Nebraska Association of County Officials annual conference in Kearney.

Attending the statewide event allows county officials to participate in policy sessions and workshops relevant to county governance and administration.

One- and six-year street improvements discussed during City Council meeting

The City Council met on Monday evening at City Hall, with cilperson Fouraker moved to table the approval of the minutes Councilperson Buckminster absent.

Chief Jamie Baker advised the Council that his department had received the new 2026 patrol unit and that it was currently being outfitted. He also stated that the Police Department was in discussions with CHI Health regarding the Comeback ERA program.

"It's supposed to help eradicate abuse, substance abuse, and mental health," said Baker. The project is paid for through grants and utilizes plainclothes officers in connection with support specialists to identify those in need of assistance.

In routine business, the agenda was approved; however, Coun-

'Cornhusker Clink' doesn't help state's image

No matter your opinion of immigrants, I think we can agree on one thing having a federal detention center in Nebraska is not a good look for our state.

The opening of the "Cornhusker Clink" illustrates that Nebraska is in full-throated agreement with the roundup and deportation of those who came to our country in search of a better life but in violation of immigration rules.

There's growing opposition to the sometimes brutal roundups organized by mask-wearing agents of the Trump Administration.

According to the latest Pew Research Center polling, 53% of those polled believe Trump is "doing too much" to enforce immigration rules. That's quite an increase from March when polling showed only 44% felt the raids were excessive.

Immigrants play an important role in our state and in our communities. They fill tough jobs that not everyone wants to fill in a state that has struggled with labor shortages. We're talking jobs like roofer, road construction and concrete worker, housekeeper, cook and (maybe most important) meat packer.

Overall, about 7.7% of Nebraska residents are foreign born (about four times the number in 1990), with immigrants making up 9.4% of the state's workforce, according to the American Immigrant Council.

That 9.4% figure is about double the national figure. But I doubt it's that high now. I know buddies who've had co-workers suddenly "self-deport" and have watched as their roofing crew stopped coming to work out of fear of being detained.

Like I've said before, the vast, vast majority of immigrants are law-abiding and just want what our ancestors wanted - a safe place to raise a family and the opportunity to work and get ahead.

Right now, there isn't an easy pathway to citizenship for such people, and there's questions about whether we're screening out criminals.

The Republicans, who now control the government, have a chance to fix that, and provide a process that allows those who want to work and play by the rules to become citizens. Ronald Reagan did that when he was president, why can't that happen now, thus keeping people in jobs and in communities in our state?

But our national policy appears to be "round 'em up and deport."

We have also eliminated some formerly legal pathways for immigration, such as those that welcomed Afghans – including many who helped the U.S. soldiers during the war there and granted them temporary asylum.

We were told that this roundup of immigrants was to go after the "worst of the worst," like rapists and murderers. But a recent look by the libertarian Cato Institute found that 73% of those booked into ICE custody had no criminal convictions, and only 8% had violent criminal records.

It's estimated that undocumented immigrants paid an estimated \$96.7 billion in taxes during 2022. including more than \$32 billion in federal taxes for Social Security and Medicare - programs for which they are ineligible. That's according to the left-leaning Institute on Taxation and Economic Policy.

So immigrants are a key cog in Nebraska's economy. They've also been a major driver in population growth in our state, where the population passed the 2 million mark last year.

But instead of welcoming and encouraging such immigrantion, our state has joined an unpopular national effort to deport them by converting a prison work camp near McCook into a federal detention facility that now holds 100-150 immigrants awaiting deportation hearings.

A handful of state senators got a look at the Cornhusker Clink recently, and came away saying it appeared clean and orderly. But now Nebraska has the notoriety of being the home of such a facility.

You gotta think there are smarter - and less expensive – solutions than spending billions to hire squads of new ICE agents, establish more detention camps and deport migrants.

75 Years Ago, December 24, 1950 to December 30, 1950

According to a report out of Washington D.C., nearly half of the nation's families owned cars and roughly four percent owned more than one.

Bill Dykes of Falls City was involved in the historic evacuation at Hungnam, Korea. He remarked in a letter that he "Haven't been doing much the past week except laying off in the harbor of Hungnam with about 30 other ships."

The Rev. Irvin F. Weber, assistant pastor of SS. Peter and Pul's Catholic Church, escaped injury when his car went out of control near the Country Club and rolled over three times. Father Weber was leaving the 8:00 service in Falls City and heading for the 9:00 service in Salem.

Coach Art Clements and the Dawson Lions were 6-0 and on top of the Big Eight Conference. Verdon, 5-1, was in second place, while Honey Creek was third at 4-2.

County Treasurer V.H. Shier was preparing to turn in his keys after 30 years in the office. Shier recalled there being less than 600 automobiles in the entire county on May 22, 1919, when he began as a bookkeeper for O.O. Marsch, the County Treasurer at the time. That number of automobiles grew to 5,800 by the time he retired.

The New York Film critics named "All about Eve," as the best American movie of 1950 and Bette Davis as the best actress. The critics also picked Gregory Peck as the top actor and Joseph L. Mankiewicz as the best director. "Sunset Boulevard" and "Asphalt Jungle" took second and third spots in the top movie category.

IGA Food Stores in Falls City advertised six bottles of Copca-Cola or 7-up for 25 cents, plus a deposit.

Last minute auto production made 1950 the best year in the automobile industry with over eight million vehicles in production.

Betty Hutton and Fred Astaire starred in "Let's Dance" at the Rivoli Theater.

Most dealers in the Falls City area went to six cents per bottle of Coke.

Northwest Missouri had its second major fire in recent weeks when a fire destroyed the Merrigan Super Market in Fortescue with an estimated loss of \$75,000.

Bethel I. Richardson of Verdon was fined \$15 and costs when he was ticketed for carrying a 4,300-pound overload of corn.

Sam Snead was named the top golfer of 1950, while Phil Rizutto of the Yankees was chosen as the top baseball player.

In the Business Girls' Bowling Lague, Bessie Zinn was the High 10 and High 30, while Bill Hoy rolled the High 10 in the Parish League and Dan Bacocos had the High 30.

Actor Henry Fonda wed Susan Blanchard at the Oacar Hammerstein home.

50 Years Ago, December 24, 1975 to December 30, 1975

Johnny Rodgers, the former Nebraska Heisman Trophy winner, was named to the Canadian Football League All-Star team. Rodgers' coach Marv Levy threw him into several positions on offense throughout the CFL season. It marked the third consecutive season he received the postseason accolades.

Merz Farm Equipment advertised a Ski Whiz 404 snowmobile on sale for \$1,075,

marked down from \$1,375.

Construction work had begun on the Squaw Creek Plaza Truck Stop, which would be located on Interstate 29 in Holt County. The project, carried out by Knapp Bros, carried an approximate \$500,000 price tag.

A sign just north of the Preston corner on Highway 159 informed motorists that they were traveling on the first dustless county highway. The hard-surfaced road stretched five miles north. County commissioner indicated that more county roads would be hard surfaced as Federal Revenue-Sharing money was made available.

Paul Gilkerson was pictured next to a Falls City Fire Department Truck. Gilkerson was retiring after 21 years on the job. Bob Martin succeeded Gilkerson as one of three paid city firemen.

Bill Bruhn became the most prolific scorer in Richardson County history with a 39-point effort against Table Rock. Bruhn's total of 1,438 passed Charlie Heim who finished his career with 1,416.

A coal pile of more than 760,000 tons was pictured at the Omaha Public Power District Plant in North Omaha. The low sulfur coal was valued at more than \$10 million. A thunderous explosion from a bomb place in a locker at LaGuardia Airport in New York killed 11 people.

Milt and Dots Café, ½ mile south of the junction of Highways 67 and 73 was opening on January 1.

25 Years Ago, December 24, 2000 to December 30, 2000

The City of Humboldt was seeking to identify owners of vacant and dilapidated properties who were interested in participating in the city's Community Betterment Cleanup Project. One of the goals was to enhance the neighborhoods of Humboldt, via the clearing of derelict sites.

Dr. Jon Habben of Newman Grove was selected as the new superintendent of the Falls City Public Schools. Habben had served as Superintendent of the Newman Grove Public Schools for five years and Superintendent of the Rising City Public schools for three years. His wife, Kathy, was a District Court reporter.

Anders Erickson, Jake Harkendorff and Shane Vollmer claimed gold medals at the Auburn Invite to close out 2000. Erickson, at 119, improved to 6-2 for the year. Harkendorff moved to 8-1 at 145 and Vollmer was 8-1 in the heavyweight division.

The home of Don Weddle located at 1601 Schoenheit Street was the final winner of the Noel Lights competition.

Brown's Shoe Fit Co. was having an End of Year Blowout sale with shoes ranging from 10-40 percent off.

In regular business, a public hearing was held to consider adopting a long-range plan for the one-year and six-year street improvement program. The hearing opened at 6:03 and, after no public input, closed at 6:04.

A discussion and action for adopting the 2026 One- and Six-Year Street Improvement Plan wa held.

Councilperson Frank Killingsworth requested adding an intersection improvement at 21st and Valley, and Morgan Streets be added to the list.

"They don't drain at all," stated Killingsworth.

The motion passed 7-0. Kenny Killingsworth requested moving M-282-71, M-282-72 and M-282-73 from the one-year to the six-year plan.

M-282-71 is a project on Lane Street from 35th Street to 33rd Street. M-282-72 entails Reavis Street from approximately 264 feet south of 7th Street to 6th Street, and M-282-73 is on 6th Street from Reavis Street to east of Reavis Street 400 feet.

The motion carried 7-0.

Frank Killingsworth made a motion to move M-282-86 from the six to the one-year plan. The plan calls for work on 25th Street from Harlan to Barada Street. The motion passed 7-0.

Councilperson Kaster made a motion to add 7th Street, from Harlan to Morton and 6th, 5th and 4th Street, from Morton to Fulton.

"That's the main residential travel path for your industries, and that street is absolutely shot," said Kaster.

The motion passed 7-0. Kaster also made a motion to move M-282-46 from the six to the oneyear. M-282-46 includes 14th Street from the existing pavement approx-

A motion was made to approve the amended resolution to adopt the 2026 One- and Six-Year Street Improvement Plan. The motion passed 7-0.

The Council heard a presentation on voluntary supplemental insurance options through Globe Life. The presentation was being made to allow the Council to hear information regarding optional employee-paid benefits.

Requests for special designated liquor licenses for January 17, 2026, and April 21, 2026, at the Auditorium passed 7-0. Both requests were made by Alyssa Finck on behalf of the Falls City Area Jay-

Falls City Utilities submitted a waiver/consent form to Omaha Public Power District regarding the construction of the new transmission line and delivery point under the Energy Forward Transmission Project. OPPD had requested additional details before starting their review. The previous NDA (Non-Disclosure Agreement) with OPPD didn't cover the information requested. The Council approved entering into a new NDA with OPPD by a 7-0 vote.

The Council also approved an interlocal agreement with Richardson County for warning sirens within the county. the insurance coverage of the sirens be paid for by the political subdivisions. The county will continue to maintain the warning sirens.

A resolution authorizing the execution of a Southwest Power Pool

Guarantor Document was approved. The document will provide SPP with financial assurance that the City will meet its obligations under its tariff.

The Board also approved an amended and restated agreement in regards to the SPP market assistance with MEAN. The amended agreement formalizes the energy strategy used by Falls City and MEAN over the past few years and provides a framework for a future transition away from MEAN as the City prepares for energy load growth.

After a discussion, the Council voted against a request for a burn permit at 2600 Fulton Street by Dan Simon. Voting against the measure were Killingsworth. Frank Kaster, Ruiz and Kenny Killingsworth. Simon requested permission to burn two brush piles on his property.

The Council approved moving three meetings during the next year that currently fall on Holidays. The Monday, January 19, 2026, meeting will be moved to January 20, 2026. The February 16, 2026, meeting will be moved to February 17, and the September 7, 2026, meeting will be moved to September 9, 2026.

The Council also approved a permanent easement and right-of-way agreement with the Dorothy J. Towle Revocable Trust, as requested by the CRA and EDGE. The easement is required for the extension of North Lane Street and the location of public utility in-The county has asked that frastructure of the North Commercial Corridor de velopment project. The City will pay the trust \$1,500.00 for the easement.

December 18 named "NORAD Santa Tracker Day"

A Christmas Eve tradition followed by millions around the world traces its roots to a Nebraska native, a military command center and an unexpected phone call that reshaped how the holiday is celebrated.

Nebraska Gov. Jim Pillen on Tuesday, Dec. 2, signed a proclamation designating Thursday, Dec. 18, as NORAD Santa Tracker Day in Nebraska. The signing ceremony was held in the historic Warner Chamber of the Nebraska State Capitol.

The proclamation formally recognizes the 70th anniversary of the NORAD Santa Tracker program, which began in 1955 and has continued each year as a public service that allows children and families to on Christmas Eve. The document notes the program's longevity and its role as an annual tradition observed nationally and internationally.

Dec. 18 was selected for the recognition because it is the birthday of Col. Arthur Barney Oldfield, a Nebraska native and United States Air Force officer who played a central role in shaping the public communication that launched the Santa tracking tradition. The proclamation highlights Oldfield's Nebraska roots and his contribution to the development of the program that later became known as the NORAD Santa Tracker.

The origins of the Santa Tracker date back to November 1955 in Colorado Springs, CO, when a local department store advertisements placed encouraging children to call a phone number to speak with Santa Claus. When the advertisement appeared in a newspaper, the phone number connected callers to the Continental Air Defense Command, known as CONAD, rather than the department store.

Children began calling the military command center asking to speak with Santa Claus.

At the time, CONAD's phone lines were generally quiet. The calls were answered by Col. Harry Shoup, CONAD's director of combat operations, who determined the calls were sincere and learned of the department store advertisement. Rather than dismissing the calls, Shoup directed his staff to provide children with information about Santa's supposed location.

CONAD maintained an operations board used to track unidentified aircraft, Col. Arthur Barney Oldfield, notified the media that the military command was tracking Santa's progress on Christmas Eve.

Oldfield was born and raised in Nebraska and had built a career working in journalism, military service and public relations. During World War II, he served in Europe on the staffs of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and British Field Marshal Bernard Montgomery follow Santa Claus' jour- and later headed the press ney around the world camp that followed the U.S. Ninth Army toward Berlin. After the war, Oldfield

worked in public rela-

tions at Warner Brothers Studios in California, placing him within the Hollywood studio system during the postwar era. His work focused on communications and media relations rather than film production or acting. Oldfield returned to military service in 1947 and transferred to the newly formed United States Air Force. He became a pioneer of Allied Command Europe and later served as Eisenhower's advance representative when Eisenhower returned to Europe in 1951 as Supreme Allied Commander.

He later held senior public affairs positions within the Air Force, including serving as director of public affairs for the Air Defense Command and for the North American Aerospace Defense Command, known as NORAD.

The year following the first Santa tracking announcement, news organizations contacted CONAD to ask whether Santa would again be tracked. Shoup agreed, and the effort became an annual tradition. When NORAD was established in 1958, it assumed responsibility for the program, which continued to expand in scale and reach.

Over time, the Santa Tracker evolved into a

global event. NORAD established dedicated phone lines staffed by volunteers who answer calls from children seeking reassurance that Santa is on his way. Although the program now includes a website that receives millions of visits each year, phone calls remain a central part of the experience. More than 1,000 volunteers typically participate annually, answering tens of thousands of calls.

The Santa Tracker operates through corporate sponsorships, allowing the program to function without taxpayer expense. Volunteers have included military personnel and other participants who donate their time during the holiday sea-


Oldfield retired from the Air Force in 1962 and later served as corporate director of international relations for Litton Industries in Beverly Hills, California. He was also an author who documented his experiences in military public affairs and wartime communications. Oldfield was also an active philanthropist, funding some 40 scholarship programs totaling about \$3 million. He was a significant donor to UN Foundation School of Journalism Fund according to Nebraska Authors. org.

While in Hollywood he served as a publicist for Erroll Flynn, Elizabeth Taylor, and former President Ronald Reagan. He also allegedly a counselor and extremely close friend to George Fore-

"Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus"

Editor's Note: In Sept. 1897, an eight-year-old girl in New York City named Virginia O'Hanlon wrote a letter to the editor of The New York Sun asking, "Is there a Santa Claus?" An editorial writer of the Sun Staff, wrote a response which has now become a classic, often printed in newspapers across the country this time of year. A few years ago a Journal subscriber and close friend, Scott, requested it be printed each year around Christmas. After some research we found that the first time the letter appeared in a Falls City paper was in 1909 and for several years after that it appeared in the pages of many Richardson County papers including the Journal each Christmas. We are happy to share it with you each Holiday season. DEAR EDITOR:

I am 8 years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says, 'If you see it in THE SUN it's so.' Please tell me the truth; is there a Santa Claus?

VIRGINIA O'HANLON. 115 WEST NINETY-FIFTH STREET.

Virginia,

VIRGINIA, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, VIRGINIA, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus. It would be as dreary as if there were no VIRGINIAS. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that

there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders there are unseen and unseeable in the world

unseeable in the world. You may tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, VIRGINIA, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

No Santa Claus! Thank God! he lives, and he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay, ten times ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood.

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
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

Taft, Bo Fletcher and Brenden Lemerond all sank threes in the second period to lead the Irish comeback. The holiday season is a time for joy with friends and family, goodwill, and the gift of giving. Yet, it's also a period when cybercriminals exploit the festive spirit to commit fraud. Here are some common holiday scams to look out for this holiday season.

Online Shopping Scams: Criminals create professional-looking websites and ads promoting popular items at steep discounts, but what you receive may be different than advertised—if you receive anything. Be cautious of unusually low prices and avoid clicking on ads in emails, texts, or social media. For safer shopping, go directly to a trusted retailer's website or app and pay with a credit card for stronger protections.

Delivery Scams: As holiday packages crisscross the country, scammers send out phishing emails and texts that appear to be from UPS, FedEx, or the U.S. Postal Service (USPS), notifying recipients about incoming or missed deliveries. Links lead to fake sign-in pages that reguest personal information, or to sites that may be infected

with malware. Gift Card Scams: Criminals steal gift cards in bulk from store racks, collect the information from the card, and return them to the rack for unsuspecting buyers. When the gift card is bought, criminals immediately drain the money. It is safer to buy cards that are kept behind the counter, or directly from the retailer's site.

Preventing Holiday Package Themes: With holiday shopping and shipping comes the risk of package theft. Thieves, often called "Porch Pirates," steal millions of packages from American doorsteps each year, totaling billions of dollars in merchandise. You can help protect your deliver-

ies with a few simple steps. Opt into delivery alerts, allowing you to track your package and know exactly when items arrive. If you won't be home, ask a trusted person to pick it up, or instruct the delivery person to place it out of sight. Consider requesting a signature upon delivery to ensure your package is handed to someone directly. You can also use alternative pickup options, such as ship-to-store or secure locations offered by major retailers and delivery services.

If you're going out of town, ask USPS, FedEx, or UPS to hold your mail and packages until you return. USPS can hold mail for up to 30 days, and FedEx and UPS offer similar vacation hold options. Stay informed and work with your neighbors. Agree to watch out for each other's deliveries and offer to take in mail when needed. Community resources like Nextdoor. com, Crime Stoppers, and social media updates from local law enforcement can also alert you to porch piracy in

Just because an airline customer service helpline number appears at the top of internet search results doesn't mean it's legitimate. Fraudulent numbers often surface in search results, and scammers constantly find new ways to make their numbers appear first. To avoid this risk, download your airline's official app. In addition to providing the airline's verified 800 number, the app delivers real-time flight notifications and other important updates.

Be on the lookout for red flags, such as aggressive tactics pushing you to buy a ticket immediately because "the price will go up." And if your flight is canceled, you usually do not need to pay to be rebooked. Any "agent" requesting a credit card to do so is likely after your money, not your flight.

Spot Fake Charity Donation Scams: As the year winds down and the season of giving sets in, many people look to support causes they care about but telling a legitimate charity from a fake one can be tough. While reputable organizations make their year-end push for donations, criminals also take advantage of this opportunity to line their own pockets.

Common signs of a charity scam include requests for payment via gift cards, wire transfers, or cryptocurrency, as well as high-pressure demands to donate immediately. Legitimate charities may also encourage timely giving, but they will welcome your support at any time.

To help ensure your donation reaches those who truly need it, do your research. Check organizations on sites such as give.org, CharityNavigator.org or CharityWatch. org to confirm legitimacy and find out how much of the funds are used to serve its stated mission versus overhead and fundraising.

Pay close attention to the charity's name and web address, as criminals often mimic the names of familiar, trusted organizations to deceive donors. Also, be cautious of links in unsolicited emails, texts, or social media messages, which can lead to fake donation websites and expose your device to malware.

When you do donate, use a credit card. It's easier to track your contribution, and if your card is misused, you may have protection against loss. To avoid feeling pressured by unexpected solicitations, consider having a set list of charities you support. That way, you can give confidently and on your own terms.

ORDINANCE/RESOLUTION NO. Zoning Overlay District Floodplain Management Ordinance 60.3(d)

AN ORDINANCE INTRODUCED BY THE GOVERNING BODY CREATING FLOODWAY AND FLOOD FRINGE DISTRICTS DEFINING THE SAME AND SETTING FORTH REGULA-TIONS THEREOF.

SECTION 1.0 STATUTORY AUTHORIZATION, FINDINGS OF FACT, AND PURPOSES

1.1 STATUTORY AUTHORIZATION

The Legislature of the State of Nebraska has delegated the responsibility to local governmental units to adopt zoning regulations designed to protect the public health, safety, general welfare, and property of the people of the state. The Legislature, in Nebraska Revised Statutes Sections 31-1001 to 31-1023 (as amended), has further assigned the responsibility to adopt, administer, and enforce floodplain management regulations to the county, city, or village with zoning jurisdiction over the floodprone area. Therefore the Richardson County Board of Commissioners of Richardson County, Nebraska ordains as follows:

1.2 FINDINGS OF FACT

A. Flood Losses Resulting from Periodic Inundation

The flood hazard areas of Richardson County, Nebraska are subject to inundation that results in loss of life and property, health and safety hazards, disruption of commerce and governmental services, extraordinary public expenditures for flood protection and relief, and impairment of the tax base, all of which adversely affect the public health, safety, and general welfare.

B. General Causes of the Flood Losses

These flood losses are caused by the cumulative effect of obstructions in floodplains causing increases in flood heights and velocities as well as the occupancy of flood hazard areas by uses vulnérable to floods or hazardous to others that are inadequately elevated or otherwise unprotected from flood damages.

1.3 STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

It is the purpose of this ordinance to promote the public health, safety, and general welfare and to minimize those losses described in Section 1.2 by applying the provisions of this ordinance

A. Restrict or prohibit uses that are dangerous to health, safety, or property in times of flooding or cause undue increases in flood heights or velocities.

B. Require that uses vulnerable to floods, including public facilities that service such uses, be provided with flood protection at the time of initial construction.

C. Reduce financial burdens from flood damage borne by the community, its governmental units, is residents, and its businesses by preventing excessive and unsafe development in areas subject to flooding.

D. Assure that eligibility is maintained for property owners in the community to purchase flood insurance from the National Flood Insurance Program.

1.4 ADHERENCE TO REGULATIONS The regulations of this ordinance are in compliance with the National Flood Insurance Program Regulations as published in Title 44 of the Code of Federal Regulations and the Nebraska Minimum Standards for Floodplain Management Programs as published in the Nebraska Administrative Code

SECTION 2.0 GENERAL PROVISIONS

Title 455, Chapter 1.

2.1 LANDS TO WHICH ORDINANCE APPLIES

This ordinance shall apply to all lands

within the jurisdictions of Richardson County identified on the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) panels shown on the Index 31147C0025C

snown on tr 31147C0050C 31147C0100C 31147C0150C 31147C0200C 31147C0300C 31147C0350C 31147C0380C 31147C0400C 31147C0425C, and 31147CIND0A dated 31147C0450C

October 7, 2021, as Zones A, Al-30, AE, AO, or AH and within the Zoning Districts FW and FF established in Section 3.0 of this ordinance. In all areas covered by this ordinance, no development shall be allowed except upon the issuance of a floodplain development permit to develop, granted by the floodplain administrator or the governing body under such safeguards and restrictions as the Richardson County Commissioners or the designated representative may reasonably impose for the promotion and maintenance of the general welfare, health of the inhabitants of the community and where specifically noted in Sections 4.0 and 5.0.

2.2 RULES FOR INTERPRETATION OF DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

The boundaries of the floodway and the flood fringe overlay districts shall be determined by scaling distances on the official zoning map of the effective Flood Insurance Rate Where interpretation is needed to the exact location of the boundaries of the districts as shown on the zoning or other community map, the floodplain administrator shall make the necessary interpretation. In such cases where the interpretation is contested, the Richardson County Board of Commissioners will resolve the dispute. The regulatory flood elevation for the point in question shall be the governing factor in locating the district boundary on the land. The person contesting the location of the district boundary shall be given a reasonable opportunity to present their case to the Richardson County Board of Commissioners and to submit their own technical evidence, if so desired.

2.3 COMPLIANCE

Within identified floodplains of this community, no development shall be located, extended, converted, or structurally altered without full compliance with the terms of this ordinance and other applicable regulations.

2.4 ABROGATION AND GREATER RESTRICTIONS

This ordinance does not intend to repeal, abrogate, or impair any existent easements, covenants, or deed restrictions. However, where this ordinance imposes greater restrictions, the provision of this ordinance shall prevail. All other ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of the inconsistency only.

2.5 INTERPRETATION

In their interpretation and application, the provisions of this ordinance shall be held to be minimum requirements and shall be liberally construed in favor of the governing body and shall not be deemed a limitation or repeal of any other powers granted by state statutes.

2.6 WARNING AND DISCLAIMER OF

The degree of flood protection required by this ordinance is considered reasonable for regulatory purposes and is based on engineering and scientific methods of study. Larger floods may occur or the flood height may be increased by manmade or natural causes, such as ice jams and bridge openings restricted by debris. This ordinance does not imply that areas outside floodway and flood fringe district boundaries or land uses permitted within such districts will be free from flooding or flood damage. This ordinance shall not create liability on the part of Richardson County or any officer or employee thereof for any flood damages that may result from reliance on this ordinance or any administrative decision lawfully made thereunder.

2.7 SEVERABILITY

If any section, clause, provision, or portion of this ordinance is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 3.0 ESTABLISHMENT OF ZONING DISTRICTS

Along watercourses where a floodway has been established, the mapped floodplain areas are hereby divided into the two following districts: a floodway overlay district (FW) and a flood fringe overlay district (FF) as identified in the Flood Insurance Study 31147CV000A dated October 7, 2021 and on accompanying FIRM panels as established in Section 2.1. The flood fringe overlay district shall correspond to flood zones A, AE, Al-30, AH, AO, AR, A99, and floodway areas in Zone AE that are identified on FIRM panels. The floodway overlay district shall correspond to the floodway areas in Zone AE that are identified on the FIRM panels.

Within these districts, all uses not meeting the standards of this ordinance and those standards of the underlying zoning district shall be prohibited.

SECTION 4.0 FLOODPLAIN MAN-AGEMENT ADMINISTRATION

4.1 DESIGNATION OF FLOODPLAIN ADMINISTRATOR

The Richardson County Emergency Manager is hereby designated as the community's local floodplain administrator. The floodplain administrator is authorized and directed to administer, implement, and enforce all provisions of this ordinance. If the local floodplain administrator position is unfilled, the community CEO shall assume the duties and résponsibilities herein.

4.2 PERMITS REQUIRED

A floodplain development permit shall be required before any development, construction, or substantial improvement is undertaken. No person, firm, corporation, government agency, or other entity shall initiate any floodplain development without first obtaining a floodplain development permit.

4.3 DUTIES OF THE FLOODPLAIN ADMINISTRATOR

A. Duties of the floodplain administrator shall include, but not be limited to the following:

1. Review, approve, or deny all applications for floodplain development permits.

11. Review all development permit applications to assure that sites are reasonably safe from flooding and that the permit requirements of this ordinance have been satisfied. 111. Review applications for pro-

posed development to assure that all necessary permits have been obtained from those federal, state, or local government agencies from which prior approval is required.

1v. Review all subdivision proposals and other proposed new development, including manufactured home parks or subdivisions, to determine whether such proposals will be reasonably safe from flooding.

v. Notify adjacent communities and the Nebraska Department of Water, Energy and Environment prior to any alteration or relocation of a watercourse and submit evidence of such notification to the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

v1. Assure that maintenance is provided within the altered or relocated portion of the watercourse so that the flood carrying capacity is not diminished.

VIL Verify, record, and maintain record of the actual elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the lowest floor, including basement, of all new or substantially improved structures in the floodplain.

v111. Verify, record, and maintain record of the actual elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which all new or substantially improved structures have been floodproofed.

IX. Verify, record, and maintain record of all improved or damaged structures to ensure compliance with standards in applicable sections. Track value of improvements and market value with permits. Also, ensure consistent market value estimations to evaluate against damaged or improved values.

x. Ensure comprehensive development plan as amended is consistent with this ordinance.

x1. In the event the floodplain administrator discovers work done that does not comply with applicable laws or ordinances, the floodplain administrator shall revoke the permit and work to correct any possible violation in accordance with this ordinance.

4.4 APPLICATION FOR PERMIT AND DEMONSTRATION OF COMPLI-

A. To obtain a floodplain development permit, the applicant shall first file an application in writing on a form furnished for that purpose. Every such application shall:

1. Identify and describe the proposed development and estimated cost to be covered by the floodplain development permit.

ii. Describe the land on which the proposed development is to be done by lot, block, tract, and house and streets address, or similar description that will readily identify and definitely locate the proposed building or development.

m. Indicate the use or occupancy for which the proposed development is intended.

IV. Be accompanied by plans and specifications for proposed construc-

v. Be signed by the permittee and authorized agent who may be required to submit evidence to indicate such authority. B. If any proposed development is lo-

cated entirely or partially within a floodplain, applicants shall provide all information in sufficient detail and clarity to enable the floodplain administrator to determine that:

1. All such proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood damage;

11. All utilities and facilities such as sewer, gas, water, electrical, and other systems are located and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage;

111. Structures will be anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement:

1v. Construction materials are flood resistant:

v. Appropriate practices to minimize flood damage have been utilized; and v1. Electrical, heating, ventilation, air conditioning, plumbing, and any other service facilities have been designed and located to prevent entry of floodwaters.

C. For all new and substantially improved structures, an elevation certificate based upon the finished construction certifying the elevation of the lowest floor, including basement, and other relevant building components shall be provided to the floodplain administrator and be completed by a licensed surveyor, engineer, or archi-

D. When floodproofing is utilized for an applicable structure, a floodproofing certificate shall be provided to the floodplain administrator and be completed by a licensed professional engineer or architect.

E. For all development proposed in the floodway, no-rise certification shall be provided to the floodplain administrator and be completed by a licensed professional engineer.

F. Any other such information as may be reasonably required by the floodplain administrator shall be provided. G. Letters of Map Revision: Federal

regulations in Title 44 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Chapter 1, Part 65.5 and 65.6 allow for changes to the special flood hazard area through a Letter of Map Revision (LOMR) or a Letter of Map Revision Based on Fill (LOMR-F), provided the community determines that the land and any existing or proposed structures that would be removed from the floodplain are "reasonably safe from flooding." The community acknowledgement form asserting this is required for LOMR and LOMR-F applications and must be signed by the floodplain administrator. The floodplain administrator shall not sign a community acknowledgement form unless all criteria set forth in the following paragraphs are met:

1. Applicant shall obtain floodplain development permit before applying for a LOMR or LOMR-F.

11. Applicant shall demonstrate that the property and any existing or proposed structures will be "reasonably safe from flooding," according to the minimum design standards in FEMA Technical Bulletin 10-01.

111. All requirements listed in the Simplified Approach in FEMA Technical Bulletin 10-01 shall be met and documentation from a registered professional engineer shall be provided. If all of these requirements are not met, applicant must provide documentation in line with the Engineered Approach outlined in FEMA Technical Bulletin

4.5 FLOOD DATA REQUIRED

A. All Zone A areas on the FIRM are subject to inundation of the base flood; however, the base flood elevations are not provided. Zone A areas shall be subject to all development provisions of this ordinance. If Flood Insurance Study data is not available, the community shall utilize any base flood elevation or floodway data currently available from federal, state, or other sources, including from a study commissioned by the applicant pursuant to best technical practices.

B. Until a floodway has been designated, no development or substantial improvement may be permitted within the floodplain unless the applicant has demonstrated that the proposed development or substantial improvement, when combined with all other existing and reasonably anticipated developments or substantial improvements, will not increase the water surface elevation of the base flood more than one (1) foot at any location as shown in the Flood Insurance Study or on base flood elevation determinations.

4.6 VARIANCE AND APPEALS PRO-

A. The Richardson County Board of Commissioners as established by Richardson County shall hear and decide appeals and requests for variances from the requirements of this ordinance.

B. The Richardson County Board of Commissioners shall hear and decide appeals when it is alleged that there is an error in any requirement, decision, or determination made by the floodplain administrator in the enforcement or administration of this ordinance.

C. Any person aggrieved by the decision of the Richardson County Board of Commissioners, or any taxpayer may appeal such decision to the District Court as provided in Nebraska Revised Statutes Section 23-168 (for counties) and Nebraska Revised Statutes Section 19-192 (for municipalities).

D. In evaluating such appeals and requests, the Richardson County Board of Commissioners shall consider technical evaluation, all relevant factors, standards specified in other sections of this ordinance, and: 1. The danger to life and property due

to flooding or erosion damage; 11. The danger that materials may be swept onto other lands to the injury of

others; 111. The susceptibility of the proposed facility and its contents to flood damage and the effect of such damage on the individual owner, future owners,

and neighboring properties;
1v. The importance of the services provided by the proposed facility to the community;

v. The necessity of the facility to have a waterfront location, where applicable; v1. The availability of alternative locations that are not subject to flooding or erosion damage for the proposed use; v11. The compatibility of the proposed use with existing and anticipated devel-

v111. The relationship of the proposed use to the comprehensive plan and the floodplain management program for that area:

1x. The safety of access to the property in times of flood for ordinary and emergency vehicles;

x. The expected heights, velocity, duration, rate ofrise, and sediment transport of the floodwaters and the effects of wave action, if applicable, expected

at the site; and, x1. The costs of providing government services during and after flood conditions including emergency management services and maintenance and repair of public utilities and facilities such as sewer, gas, electrical, water systems, streets, and bridges.

4.7 CONDITIONS FOR VARIANCES

A. Variances shall only be issued upon a showing of good and sufficient cause and also upon a determination that failure to grant the variance would result in an exceptional hardship to the applicant.

B. Variances shall only be issued based upon a determination that the granting of a variance will not result in increased flood heights.

C. Variances shall only be issued based upon a determination that the granting of a variance will not result in additional threats to public safety, extraordinary public expense, create nuisances, cause fraud on or victimization of the public, or conflict with existing local laws or ordinances.

D. Generally, variances may be issued for new construction and substantial improvements to be erected on a lot of one-half acre or less in size contiguous to and surrounded by lots with existing structures constructed below the base flood level, providing items E-I below have been fully considered. As the lot size increases beyond one-half acre, the technical justification required for issuing the variance increases.

E. Variances may be issued for the repair or rehabilitation of historic structures upon a determination that the proposed repair or rehabilitation will not preclude the structure's continued designation as an historic structure on the National Register of Historic Places and the variance is the minimum necessary to preserve the historic character and design of the structure.

F. Variances shall not be issued within any designated floodway if any increase in water surface elevations along the floodway profile during the base flood discharge would result.

G. Variances shall only be issued upon a determination that the variance is the minimum necessary, considering the flood hazard, to afford relief. H. The applicant shall be given a writ-

ten notice over the signature of a community that the issuance of a variance to construct a structure below the base flood elevation will result in increased premium rates for flood insurance up to amounts as high as \$25 for \$100 of insurance coverage and also that such construction below the base flood elevation increases risks to life and property. Such notification shall be maintained with the record of all variance actions as required by this ordinance. I. All requests for variances and associated actions and documents, including justification for their issuance, shall be maintained by the community.

4.8 ENFORCEMENT

A. Violations

Failure to obtain a floodplain development permit or the failure of a structure or other development to be fully compliant with the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a violation. A structure or other development without a floodplain development permit, elevation certificate, certification by a licensed professional engineer of compliance with these regulations, or other evidence of compliance is presumed to be in violation until such time as documentation is provided.

B. Notices

When the floodplain administrator or other authorized community representative determines, based on reasonable grounds, that there has been a violation of the provisions of this ordinance, the floodplain administrator shall give notice of such alleged violation as hereinafter provided. Such notice shall:

1. Be in writing; ii. Include an explanation of the al-

leged violation; 111. Allow a reasonable time for the performance of any remedial act required:

1v. Be served upon the property owner or their agent as the case may require; and

v. Contain an outline of remedial actions that, if taken, will bring the development into compliance with the provisions of this ordinance.

C. Penalties

1. Violation of the provisions of this ordinance or failure to comply with any of its requirements (including violations of conditions and safeguards established in connection with grants of variances or special exceptions) shall constitute a misdemeanor. Any person, firm, corporate, or other entity that violates this ordinance or fails to comply with any of its requirements shall upon conviction thereof be fined not more than \$500 and in addition, shall pay all costs and expenses involved in the case. Each day such violation continues shall be considered a separate offense.

11. The imposition of such fines or penalties for any violation or non-compliance with this ordinance shall not excuse the violation or non-compliance or allow it to continue. All such violations or non-compliant actions shall be remedied within an established and reasonable time. iii. Nothing herein contained shall pre-

vent the Richardson County or other appropriate authority from taking such other lawful action as is necessary to prevent or remedy any violation.

SECTION 5.0 STANDARDS FOR FLOODPLAIN DEVELOPMENT

5.1 GENERAL PROVISIONS A. Alteration or Relocation of a Wa-

tercourse 1. A watercourse or drainway shall not be altered or relocated in any way that in the event of a base flood or more frequent flood will alter the flood carrying characteristics of the watercourse or drainway to the detriment of upstream, downstream, or adjacent locations.

11. No alteration or relocation shall be made until all adjacent communities that may be affected by such action and the Nebraska Department of Water, Energy and Environment have been notified and all applicable permits obtained. Evidence of such notification shall be submitted to the Federal Emergency Management Agency. B. Encroachments

1. When proposing to permit any of the following encroachments, the standards in Section 5.1 (B) (ii) shall apply: a. Any development that will cause a rise in the base flood elevations within

the floodway; or b. Any development in Zones A, Al-30, and Zone AE without a designated floodway that will cause a rise of more than one foot in the base flood eleva-

tion; or c. Alteration or relocation of a stream; then

11. The applicant shall: a. Apply to FEMA for conditional approval of such action via the Conditional Letter of Map Revision process (as per Title 44 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Chapter 1, Part 65.12)

C. Floodway Overlay District 1. Within any floodway, any new construction or substantial improvements shall be prohibited.

11. Standards for the Floodway Overlay District

a. New structures for human habitation are prohibited.

b. All encroachments, including fill, new construction, substantial improvements, and other development must be prohibited unless certification by a registered professional engineer or architect is provided demonstrating that the development shall not result in any increase in water surface elevations along the floodway profile during the occurrence of the base flood discharge. These developments are also subject to all the standards of Section

c. In Zone A areas, obtain, review, and reasonably utilize any flood elevation and floodway data available through federal, state, or other sources, including studies done under Section 5.3 (H) 'Subdivisions", in meeting the standards of this section.

111. Only uses having a low flood-damage potential and not obstructing flood flows shall be allowed within the Floodway Overlay District to the extent that they are not prohibited by any other ordinance. The following are recommended uses for the Floodway Overlay District:

a. Agricultural uses such as general farming, pasture, nurseries, and forestry

b. Residential uses such as lawns, gardens, parking, and play areas

c. Nonresidential uses such as loading areas, parking, and airport landing

d. Public and private recreational uses such as golf courses, archery ranges, picnic grounds, parks, and wildlife and

homes to be placed or substantially improved within floodplains on sites: a. Outside of a manufactured home

park or subdivision. b. In a new manufactured home park or subdivision,

 c. In an expansion to an existing manufactured home park or subdivision, or d. In an existing manufactured home park or subdivision on which a manu-

— 11. Require that manufactured homes to be placed or substantially improved on sites in an existing manufactured home park or subdivision within special flood hazard areas that are not subject to the provisions of Section 5.2 (D) (b) be elevated so that either:

a. The lowest floor of the manufactured home is at or above two (2) feet above the base flood elevation, or

 b. The manufactured home chassis is supported by reinforced piers or other foundation elements of at least equivalent strength that are no less than 36 inches in height above grade; and be securely anchored to an adequately anchored foundation system in accordance with the provisions of Section 5.2 (F) (iv).

m. New manufactured home parks of five (5) acres or fifty (50) lots, whichever is less, shall follow the standards of Section 5.3 (H) "Subdivisions".

1v. All manufactured homes shall be anchored to resist flotation, collapse, or lateral movement. Manufactured homes must be anchored in accordance with local building codes or FEMA guidelines. In the event that over-the-top ties to ground anchors are used, the following specific requirements (or their equivalent) shall

a. Over-the-top ties be provided at each of the four comers of the manufactured home, with two additional ties per side at intermediate locations and manufactured homes less than 50 feet long requiring one additional tie per

b. Frame ties be provided at each comer of the manufactured home with five additional ties per side at intermediate points and manufactured homes less than 50 feet long requiring four additional ties per side;

c. Any additions to the manufactured home be similarly anchored.

G. Existing Structures

1. The provisions of this ordinance do not require any changes or improvements to be made to lawfully existing structures. However, when an improvement is made to a structure in the floodplain, a floodplain development permit is required and the provisions of 5.2 (G) (ii-iv) shall apply.

11. Any addition, alteration, reconstruction, or improvement of any kind to an existing structure where the costs of which would equal or exceed fifty (50) percent of the pre-improvement market value shall constitute a substantial improvement and shall fully comply with the provisions of this ordinance.

111. Any addition, alteration, reconstruction, or improvement of any kind to an existing structure in the floodway shall comply with the provisions of 5.1

1v. Any addition, alteration, reconstruction, or improvement of any kind to an existing structure that will change the compliance requirements of the building shall require applicable documentation including an elevation certificate, floodproofing certificate, or no rise certification.

5.3 DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION **STANDARDS**

A. Anchoring

1. All buildings or structures shall be finnly anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure resulting from hydrodynamic and hydrostatic loads, including the effects of buoyancy.

B. Building Materials and Utilities 1. All buildings or structures shall be constructed with materials and utility equipment resistant to flood damage. All buildings or structures shall also be constructed by methods and practices

that minimize flood and flood-related damages. 11. All buildings or structures shall be constructed with electrical, heating, ventilation, plumbing, air conditioning equipment, and other service facilities that are designed and/or located so as to prevent water from entering or accumulating within the components during

conditions of flooding.

C. Drainage 1. Within Zones AO and AH, adequate drainage paths around structures on slopes shall be required in order to guide floodwaters around and away from proposed structures. D. Water Supply and Sanitary Sewer

Systems 1. All new or replacement water supply and sanitary sewer systems shall be located, designed, and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damages to such systems and the infiltration of floodwaters into the systems.

11. All new or replacement sanitary sewage systems shall be designed to minimize or eliminate discharge from the system into floodwaters.

111. On-site waste disposal systems shall be located and designed to avoid impairment to them or contamination from them during flooding. E. Other Utilities

1. All other utilities such as gas lines, electrical, telephone, and other utilities shall be located and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage to such utilities and facilities. F. Storage of Materials

1. The storage or processing of materials that are in time of flooding buoyant, flammable, explosive, or could be injurious to human, animal, or plant life is prohibited.

11. The storage of other material or equipment may be allowed if not subject to major damage by floods and firmly anchored to prevent flotation or if readily removable from the area within the time available after flood warning.

G. Recreational Vehicles

Within any floodway, recreational vehicles and recreational vehicle parks shall be prohibited.

1. Recreational vehicles to be placed on sites within the floodplain shall: a. Be on site for fewer than 90 con-

secutive days; and b. Be fully licensed and ready for highway use, which shall mean it is on its wheels or jacking system, is attached to the site by only quick disconnect type utilities and security devices, and no permanently attached

c. Meet the permit requirements and the elevation and anchoring requirements for manufactured homes of this ordinance.

H. Subdivisions

1. Subdivision proposals and other proposed new development, including manufactured home parks or subdivisions, shall require assurance that:

a. All such proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood dam-

b. All public utilities and facilities such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems are located, elevated, and constructed to minimize or eliminate flood damage;

c. Adequate drainage is provided so as to reduce exposure to flood haz-

ards; and d. Proposals for development (including proposals for manufactured home parks and subdivisions) of five (5) acres or fifty (50) lots, whichever is less, where base flood elevation data are not available, shall be supported by hydrologic and hydraulic analyses that determine base flood elevations and floodway information. The analyses shall be prepared by a licensed professional engineer in a format required by FEMA for Conditional Letters of Map Revision and a Letters of Map Revision.

SECTION 6.0 NONCONFORMING USE

A. A structure or use of a structure or premises that was lawful before the passage or amendment of this ordinance, but that is not in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance may be continued subject to the following conditions:

1. If such use is discontinued for 6 consecutive months, any future use of the building premises shall conform to this ordinance. The Utility Department shall notify the floodplain administrator in writing of instances of nonconforming uses where utility services have been discontinued for a period of 6 months.

11. Uses or adjuncts thereof that are or become nuisances shall not be entitled to continue as nonconforming

B. If any nonconforming use or structure is destroyed by any means, including flood, it shall not be reconstructed if the cost is more than 50% of the market value of the structure before the damage occurred except that if it is reconstructed in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance. This limitation does not include the cost of any alteration to comply with existing state or local health, sanitary, or safety code or regulations or the cost of any alteration of a structure listed on the National Register of Historic Places, provided that the alteration shall not preclude its continued designation.

SECTION 7.0 AMENDMENTS

A. The regulations, restrictions, and boundaries set forth in this ordinance may from time to time be amended, supplemented, changed, or appealed to reflect any and all changes in federal, state, or local regulations provided, however, that no such action may be take until after a public hearing in relation thereto, at which citizens and parties in interest shall have an opportunity to be heard. Notice of the time and place of such hearing shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the Richardson County. At least 14 days shall elapse between the date of this publication and the public

hearing. B. A copy of such amendments will be provided to the Nebraska Department of Natural Resources and the Federal Emergency Management Agency for review and approval before being ad-

SECTION 8.0 DEFINITIONS

Unless specifically defined below, words or phrases used in this ordinance shall be interpreted so as to give them the meaning they have in common usage and to give this ordinance it's most reasonable application:

0.2% Annual Chance Floodplain means the floodplain that would be inundated by the 0.2% annual chance flood and delineated on the Flood Insurance Rate Maps.]

0.2% Annual Chance Flood Elevation means the elevation to which floodwaters are expected to rise during a 0.2% annual chance flood.]

Appurtenant Structure shall mean a structure on the same parcel of property as the principal structure, the use of which is incidental to the use of the principal structure. Also shall be known as "accessory structure."]

Area of Shallow Flooding means a designated AO or AH zone on a community's Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) with a one percent or greater annual chance of flooding to an average depth of one to three feet where a clearly defined channel is unpredictable and where velocity flow may be evident. Such flooding is characterized by ponding or sheet flow.

Base Flood means the flood having one (1) percent chance of being equaled or exceeded in any given year.

Base Flood Elevation means the elevation to which floodwaters are expected to rise during the base flood.

Basement means any area of the building having its floor sub grade (below ground level) on all sides.

Building means "structure." See definition for "structure."

<u>Critical Facility</u> means any property that, if flooded, would result in severe consequences to public health and safety. Critical facilities include, but are not limited to: facilities that produces, use, or store hazardous materials; hospitals, nursing homes, and housing likely to contain vulnerable populations; emergency support function facilities like police stations, fire stations, vehicle and equipment storage facilities, and emergency operations centers; public and private utility facilities vital to maintaining or restoring normal services to flooded areas before, during, and after a flood.

<u>Development</u> means any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate, including but not limited to the construction, reconstruction, renovation, repair, expansion or alteration of buildings or other structures; the placement of manufactured homes; streets and other paving; utilities; filling, grading, and excavation; mining; dredging; drilling operations; storage of equipment or materials; or obstructions.

Existing Manufactured Home Park or Subdivision means a manufactured home park or subdivision for which the construction of facilities for servicing the lots on which the manufactured homes are to be affixed (including, at a minimum, the installation of utilities, the construction of streets, and either final site grading or the pouring of concrete pads) is complete before the effective date of the floodplain management regulations adopted by a community.

Expansion to an Existing Manufactured Home Park or Subdivision means the preparation of additional sites by the construction of facilities for servicing the lots on which the manufactured homes are to be affixed (including the installation of utilities, the construction of streets, and either final site grading or the pouring of concrete

Flood or Flooding means a general and temporary condition of partial or complete inundation of normally dry land areas.

Flood Fringe is that area of the floodplain, outside of the floodway, that has a one percent chance of flood occurrence in any one year.

Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM)

means an official map of a community

on which the Flood Insurance Study

has delineated the special flood hazard area boundaries and the risk premium zones applicable to the community. <u>Flood insurance Study (FIS)</u> is the official report provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency. The

report contains flood profiles, as well as the Flood Insurance Rate Map and the water surface elevation of the base flood. <u>Floodplain</u> means any land area susceptible to being inundated by water from any source (see definition of

"flooding"). Floodplain includes flood fringe and floodway. Floodplain and special flood hazard area are the same for use by this ordinance. Flood-proofing means any combination of structural and nonstructural additions, changes, or adjustments to

structures that reduce or eliminate flood

damage to real estate or improved real

property, water and sanitary facilities,

and structures and their contents Floodway or Regulatory Floodway means the channel of a river or other watercourse and the adjacent land areas that must be reserved in order to discharge the base flood without cumulatively increasing the water surface elevation more than one foot.

Freeboard means a factor of safety usually expressed in feet above a flood level for purposes of floodplain management. "Freeboard" tends to compensate for the many unknown factors that could contribute to flood heights greater than the height calculated for a selected size flood and floodway conditions, such as wave action, clogged bridge openings, and the hydrological effect of urbanization of the watershed.

Highest Adjacent Grade means the highest natural elevation of the ground surface prior to construction next to the

proposed walls of a structure. Historic Structure means any structure that is: (a) Listed individually in the National Register of Historic Places (a listing maintained by the Department of Interior) or preliminarily determined by the Secretary of the Interior as meeting the requirements for individual listing on the National Register; (b) Certified or preliminarily determined by the Secretary of the Interior as contributing to the historical significance of a registered historic district or a district preliminarily determined by the Secretary to qualify as a registered historic district; (c) Individually listed on a state inventory of historic places in states with historic preservation programs which have been approved by the Secretary of the Interior; or (d) Individually listed on a local inventory of historic places in communities with historic preservation programs that have been certified either: (1) By an approved state program as determined by the Secretary of the Interior or (2) Directly by the Secretary of the Interior in states without approved programs.

Lowest Floor means the lowest floor of the lowest enclosed area (including basement). An unfinished or flood-resistant enclosure, usable solely for parking of vehicles, building access or storage, in an area other than a basement area, is not considered a building's lowest floor, provided that such enclosure is not built or modified so as to render the structure in violation of the applicable non-elevation design requirements of this ordinance.

Manufactured Home means a structure, transportable in one or more sections, which is built on a permanent chassis and is designed for use with or without a permanent foundation when attached to the required utilities. The term "manufactured home" does not include a "recreational vehicle".

Manufactured Home Park or Subdivision means a parcel (or contiguous parcels) off land divided into two or more manufactured home lots for rent

New Construction for floodplain management purposes, "new con-struction" means structures for which the "start of construction" commenced on or after the effective date of the floodplain management regulation adopted by a community and includes any subsequent improvements to such structures.

New Manufactured Home Park or Subdivision means a manufactured home park or subdivision for which the construction of facilities for servicing the lots on which the manufactured homes are to be affixed (including at a minimum, the installation of utilities, the construction of streets, and either final site grading or the pouring of concrete pads) is completed on or after the effective date of floodplain management

regulations adopted by a community.

Obstruction means any wall, wharf, embankment, levee, dike, pile, abutment, projection, excavation (including the alteration or relocation of a watercourse or drainway), channel rectification, bridge, conduit, culvert, building, stored equipment or material, wire, fence, rock, gravel, refuse, fill, or other analogous structure or matter which may impede, retard, or change the direction of the flow of water, either in itself or by catching or collecting debris carried by such water, or that is placed where the natural flow of the water would carry such structure or matter downstream to the damage or detriment of either life or property. Dams designed to store or divert water are not obstructions if permission for the construction thereof is obtained from the Department of Natural Resources pursuant to the Safety of Dams and Reservoirs Act (Nebraska Revised Statutes 46-1601 to 46-1670 as amended).

Overlay District is a district in which additional requirements act in conjunction with the underlying zoning district(s). The original zoning district designation does not change.

Post-FIRM Structure means a building that was constructed or substantially improved after December 31, 1974 or on or after the community's initial Flood Insurance Rate Map dated October 7, 2021, whichever is later.

Pre-FIRM Structure means a building that was constructed or substantially improved on or before December 31 1974 or before the community's initial Flood Insurance Rate Map dated October 7, 2021, whichever is later.

Principally Above Ground means that at least 51 percent of the actual cash value of the structure is above

Recreational Vehicle means a vehicle which is (i) built on a single chassis; (ii) 400 square feet or less when measured at the largest horizontal projections: (iii) designed to be self-propelled or permanently towable by a light duty truck; and (iv) designed primarily not for use as a permanent dwelling but as temporary living quarters for recreational, camping, travel, or seasonal use.

Regulatory Flood Elevation means the base flood elevation (BFE) plus a free-board factor as specified in this

Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) is the land in the floodplain within a community subject to one percent or greater chance of flooding in any given year.

<u>Start of Construction</u> means the date

the floodplain development permit was issued, provided the actual start of construction, repair, reconstruction, rehabilitation, addition, placement, or other improvement was within 180 days of the permit date. "Start of construction" also includes substantial improvement, and means the date the building permit was issued, provided the actual start of construction, repair, reconstruction, rehabilitation, addition, placement, or other improvement was within 180 days of the permit date. The actual start means the first placement of permanent construction of a structure on a site, such as the pouring of slab or footings, the installation of piles, the construction of columns, or any work beyond the stage of excavation; or the placement of a manufactured home on a foundation. Permanent construction does not include land preparation, such as clearing, grading and filling; nor does it include the installation of streets and/or walkways; nor does it include excavation for a basement, footings, piers, or foundations or the erection of temporary forms; nor does it include the installation on the property of accessory buildings, such as garages or sheds not occupied as dwelling units or not part of the main structure. For a substantial improvement, the actual start of construction means the first alteration of any wall, ceiling, floor, or other structural part of a building, whether or not the alteration affects the

<u>Structure</u> means a walled and roofed building that is principally above ground, as well as a manufactured home and a gas or liquid storage tank that is principally above ground.

external dimensions of the building.

<u>Subdivision</u> means the division or re-division of a lot, tract, or parcel of land by any means into two or more lots, tracts, parcels, or other divisions of land including changes in existing lot lines for the purpose, whether immediate or future, of-lease, partition by the court for distribution to heirs or devises, transfer of ownership, or building or lot development.

<u>Substantial Damage</u> means damage of any origin sustained by a structure whereby the cost of restoring the structure to its before-damage condition would equal or exceed 50 percent of the market value of the structure before the damage occurred.

<u>Substantial Improvement</u> means any reconstruction, rehabilitation, addition, or other improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure before "start of construction" of the improvement. This includes structures which have incurred "substantial damage," regardless of the actual repair work performed. The term does not, however, include either (1) any project for improvement of a structure to correct existing violations of state or local health, sanitary, or safety code specifications which have been identified by the local code enforcement official and which are the minimum necessary to assure safe living conditions, or (2) any alteration of a "historic structure,"

provided that the alteration will not preclude the structure's continued designation as a "historic structure."

Variance is a grant of relief to an applicant from the requirements of this ordinance that allows construction in a manner otherwise prohibited by this ordinance where specific enforcement would result in unnecessary hardship.

Violation means a failure of a structure or other development to be fully compliant with the community's floodplain management regulations. A structure or other development without the Elevation Certificate, other certifications. or other evidence of compliance reguired in this ordinance is presumed to be in violation until such time as that documentation is provided.

Watercourse means any depression two feet or more below the surrounding land that serves to give direction to a current of water at least nine months of the year and that has a bed and well defined banks.




the Vision Inn Motel. According to a Falls City
