## Council chooses substation site for Energy Forward Transmission Project

The Falls City Council met on Tuesday, January 20, 2026, with council member Leyden and Mayor Harkendorff absent. Joe Buckminster presided as acting mayor.

In old business, Bing Bindrum addressed the Board, requesting that they revisit an application for restricted parking in the 900 Block of Morton Street. The Council had previously approved parking restrictions in the described area on November 3, 2025. After hearing from nearby neighbors, the Council agreed to revoke the parking restrictions at the December 1, 2025, meeting. Bindrum modified his request from the original to just 25 feet across from the driveway that houses his trailer. Bindrum made his initial request at the September 15, 2025, City Council meeting.

The Council voted 6-1 in favor of the 25-foot parking ban, with Councilperson Kaster voting nay.

A public hearing was held to consider approving chicken permit applications for 523 Wilson St., 901 E 21st St., 804 E. 17th St., 1802 Huber Rd., 1402 Morton St., 2414 Fulton St. and 701 E. 14th St. The hearing opened at 6:13 and closed at 6:15.

The Council then unanimously approved the submission of the applications for the above-mentioned sites.

A public hearing was held regarding a livestock permit application at 2414 Fulton Street for Brian and Jessie Lemerond. The Lemerond's requested the approval for two goats and two mini donkeys. The hearing opened at 6:21 and closed at 6:23. The motion then passed 7-0.

A public hearing was held on an amendment to the City of Falls City's redevelopment plan, which would include the Fairview Mills Redevelopment Project. The public hearing was to discuss the use of Tax Increment Financing (TIF) for the project. TIF is a redevelopment tool authorized under Nebraska law to encourage private investment in properties that would not be redeveloped without assistance.

Duane Anderson, an employee of J-Six Enterprises, addressed the Board. Anderson told the members that the project would be a "dry pet food ingredient facility."

Anderson continued, "The building, once we get done, will look quite a bit different."

He said the facility will likely see around 20 trucks coming and going every day, while employing between eight and ten people.

The Community Redevelopment Authority (CRA) recommended approval of an amendment to the redevelopment plan to include the Fairview Mills project. The Planning Commissioner also recommended the approval of the project.

According to City Administrator Anthony Nussbaum, "One thing to understand as council is, TIF is a financing tool for redevelopment. It is not a tax subsidy. It is a tax shift."

Nussbaum stated that the increase in valuations and the base valuations or assessed values would not be in place with tax increment financing.

He continued, saying that the project is valued at \$555,000 and that the company is planning major improvements to the area, bringing the estimated valuation of the grounds to \$4 million.

"So, there's a tax increment capture there of about a little over \$3.4 million based on a levy rate of 1.8," said Nussbaum.

The Board voted 7-0 to approve the amendment.

The Council voted to extend the council president and acting president to two-year terms, rather than the current one-year cycle.

The Board also elected Derrick Leyden as Council President and Joe Buckminster as Acting President.

## Zoning regulation discussed at Board meeting

The Richardson County Board of Commissioners convened on Wednesday, January 21, 2026, with all members present.

EDGE Director Lucas Froeschl provided the Board with a quarterly report, updating the Commissioners on numerous EDGE-related projects.

Highway Superintendent Steve Darveau, Jr., provided the Board with an update on road and bridge maintenance underway throughout the county. Darveau told the Board that his department would replace bridge planks on cold

mornings and haul rock in the afternoons. He also advised the Board of a meeting on Tuesday, January 27, 2026, in Nebraska City with Whetrock Quarries.

He invited the Commissioners to attend. The meeting will include representatives from Otoe, Nemaha, and Johnson Counties to discuss available products.

The Superintendent presented pictures to the Commissioners and provided information on cables and gates attached to bridges in the county to prevent livestock from crossing under bridges onto neighboring properties. Darveau reminded the Board that any structures, such as gates or cables, must be on the property owner's side of the right-of-way and not attached in any way to bridges or county-owned structures. Darveau said the issue is widespread throughout the county.

Emergency Management Director Brian Kirkendall briefed the Board on information his office had received about a project at Indian Cave. The Nebraska Game and Parks had begun replacing a boat ramp located within a floodway. The Game and Parks obtained a no-rise certificate and commissioned an engineering study. The area in question is within Richardson County. The county was not notified of the replacement. The Game and Parks completed a floodplain permit on Tuesday, January 20, 2026.

The Board also discussed the National Flood Insurance Program and whether the County could withdraw from it. County Attorney Samantha Scheitel advised the Board to schedule a date and time to receive public comments on the withdrawal from the insurance program.

Commissioner Campbell addressed an email from Donny Christensen of NEMA (Nebraska Emergency Management Agency), which stated that participation in the flood insurance program was voluntary and applied only to floods.

"That it has no bearing whatsoever on any other type of disaster payments other than flood insurance," said Kirkendall.

The withdrawal would affect anyone in the county outside of cities and villages. The only floodways in the county are along the Missouri River. However, other floodplains exist in the county.

"We don't know who it affects, (Please turn to Page p)

## Humboldt Council approves chicken ordinance, fund transfers

The Humboldt City Council approved multiple routine items and took action on ordinances, financial transfers and board appointments during its regular meeting Jan. 20 at City Hall.

Council approved minutes from the Jan. 6 regular meeting and the Jan. 14 special meeting following roll call votes.

Claims were approved without discussion.

The public works report included updates on water shut-offs, installation of new water sampling stations, a fire hydrant installation on Long Branch Road, a water meter replacement on Edwards Street and repairs at the wastewater treatment plant. Completion of new concrete work on Grand Avenue was also reported.

The annual library report was presented. Circulation and library card numbers were reported as increased, while material expenditures were down due to budget constraints. A new craft and social group was announced to begin in February.

Council approved the removal (Please turn to Page 6)

With the college football season wrapped up, I decided it was time to revisit the past season and look forward to seeing what the future may hold for not only Husker football but college football as a whole. Before digging in too deep, I would like to congratulate the Indiana Hoosiers for winning the national championship over the Miami Hurricanes last Monday night. Raise your hands if you picked Indiana as the national champ before the season began; I'm guessing not many of you made that bold prediction.

The title was the third in three years for a Big Ten school, and, interestingly enough, all three came from different schools. Before that, the SEC had won six of the previous eight titles (Alabama 3, Georgia 2, LSU 1) with Clemson (ACC) winning the other two.

Has the Big Ten caught the SEC? Has it passed the SEC? Michigan won the championship in 2023, followed by Ohio St. in 2024 and, of course, Indiana this season. Are Big Ten coaches recruiting better, or has NIL evened the playing field in college football when it comes to snagging athletes from the South?

Let's debate NIL (Name, Image and Likeness). This mess began years ago because college athletes grew tired of universities making money off their jersey sales and video games using their likenesses without restitution.

Former Husker quarterback Sam Keller inadvertently set the NIL mess in motion way back in 2009, when he filed a lawsuit against EA Sports and the NCAA for using his likeness in the video game without compensation.

Flash forward to the college landscape of today. Big Universities with big budgets are more likely to attract the top-rated players. Now, Indiana has proven it doesn't always take the highest-rated athletes to be successful, but it sure doesn't hurt.

Different sites show different amounts, but estimates indicate schools spending upwards of \$34 million on rosters next season. It should come as no surprise to see a school such as Texas A&M leading the SEC at an estimated \$34 million. Ohio State reportedly leads the Big Ten at \$33.5 million, while Texas Tech leads the Big 12 at an estimated \$28 million. These kids are no longer kids; they are professional athletes.

Are these figures accurate? No one can say for sure, as schools are not required to disclose NIL deals. However, where there is smoke, there is usually fire, so it's probably safe to say these numbers aren't far off.

While I'm talking numbers, let's address the transfer portal and the number of athletes that entered it this period. This year, the transfer portal operated on a 15-day cycle from January 2 to January 16. Over 3,700 D-1 college football players entered their names into the portal on the first day, and by the time the period had ended, over 4,500 student/athletes had dipped their toes into the portal. An astronomical 31% of those who entered the portal did so for the second or third time. There are roughly 14,300 players in the FBS (Football Bowl Subdivision), the highest level of college football. The numbers show that basically 1/3 of those kids/men entered the portal this year.

There is no such thing as loyalty or earning your spot on the field; if you don't like where you are, put your name in the hat and see how much interest you can draw. If nothing else, it seems like a good way to make the school that you're already playing for pay more for your services.

Much will be said and debated over the following months regarding Coach Rhule and the Husker football program. Did they spend enough money? Did they spend too much? Did they spend it on the right positions/players?

Of course, no crystal ball exists to give us those answers now, but eight months down the road, as the season kicks off, we should have a clear picture of whether the right decisions were made in the offseason. Fingers crossed. Go Big Red.

### No-bid contract sought by Pillen for an acquaintance

It's one thing to try and cut out shenanigans in state government and another if you're part of it.

Gov. Jim Pillen's recent "State of the State" address laid out plenty of goals to cut out funny business in state government, from ending frivolous lawsuits to reversing tax breaks for special interests.

But not mentioned was a sizable, no-bid contract the governor approved in 2024 for a lobbyist he was well acquainted with, via overseas trade missions and events in Nebraska.

State Auditor Mike Foley - who seemingly isn't afraid to call out anyone or anything - rapped Pillen for seeking an emergency, no-bid contract of \$2.5 million for the lobbyist via her firm, Global Sustainability Developers, "a company handpicked rather than selected through a 'time-honored' and legally required open, competitive process."

Issuing state contracts via competitive bids is a "bedrock, foundational tenet of government operation," the auditor said.

"When you sidestep a foundational tenet, it's just waving a red flag for any public auditor," Foley told the Nebraska Examiner. "It just smacks of favoritism."

(My guess is that Foley isn't going to be invited to any governor steak fry any time soon.)

When issuing an "emergency" contract without seeking competitive bids, a state agency, or in this case, the governor's office, has to justify what emergency necessitates contracting for services without seeking bids - something that didn't happen in this case.

Pillen has denied that there was any favoritism shown in the \$2.5 million contract issued in May 2024 with the company, owned by lobbyist Julie Bushell, the firm's lone employee.

The contract called on Bushell to seek out more federal funds to help develop the bioeconomy in Nebraska, and to get more businesses in that arena to open in the state.

The administration says that the justification portion of the emergency contract was left blank by mistake. It now says that going through the normal process of seeking bids would have taken too long, and would have meant that the state lost out on some federal dollars during the last few months of the Biden Administration.

A spokeswoman for Pillen said that Bushell's efforts helped Nebraska obtain \$550 million in federal grant pledges (of which \$200 million, the Examiner reported, has not yet arrived).

A Phelps County official also said that her help was vital in obtaining a pledge to build a \$5.5 billion facility there to convert cornstalks into biofuel.

Foley questioned whether the Phelps County project will ever happen, given the track record of the company involved, and stated that other states obtained similar amounts of federal funds as Nebraska did,

without paying a consultant.

The Examiner reported that the \$2.5 million deal was the largest no-bid contract by far issued through the State Department of Economic Development in recent years.

The auditor said there appeared to be plenty of time to award such a contract, rather than proceed as a no-bid, emergency affair. But Pillen officials disputed that, saying it would have delayed the work by more than three months past the May 2024 award to Bushell.

Now, there are emergencies and there are "emergencies."


The COVID-19 pandemic, for instance, was a real emergency, and it prompted then Gov. Ricketts to give a \$27-million, no-bid contract to a Utah firm to quickly set up testing stations for the virus. The contract drew criticism, but the contractor, Nomi Health, mostly delivered on what was promised in what was a hectic time in state history.

Also, in government there are laws, there are rules and there are appearances.

Foley says Pillen and his people violated the law, by not justifying the "emergency."

One thing's for sure, the appearance was not good.



**75 Years Ago, January 28, 1951 to February 3, 1951**

Five Richardson County men, Ivan J. Newsman, Ralph H. Bauman, Joe H. Godemann, Roy W. Schwang, and George C. Peck, departed for Omaha to be inducted into the Army.

The worst cold wave in years hit the country, with West Yellowstone, Montana, dropping to a low of negative 52.

Keeping up with a trend that began with the advent of the machine age, the number of farming units in Richardson County dropped by roughly 5% over the prior 5 years. The 1945 census showed 1,744 farms in the county. In 1950, the 350,000 acres of farmland were split into 1,674 units, averaging 215 acres each.

Elizabeth Taylor wept in the courtroom, saying, "He used abusive language, and he said he just wished I wasn't there," regarding a divorce request from Nick Hilton. The pair had been wed for just 205 days.

A proposal to merge about 12 neighboring school districts with the Stella School District was discussed by a Nemaha and Richardson County Committee for the Reorganization and Consolidation of School Districts.

A second oil well drilled on the Philip Schulenberg farm was as good or better than the first well. The No. 1-A well had been pumping for several weeks and was producing between 300 and 400 barrels of oil per day.

Miss Lila Vice of Shubert was teaching her first school in Dist. No 94 near Preston. Miss Vice was a graduate of Shubert High School and took college classes at Peru State College. Eight were enrolled in the school, including Dwight Bletscher, Richard Malcolm, Doris Jean Schulenberg, Glenda Metzner, Joan Schulenberg, Clinton Bletscher, Donna Schulenberg and Charles Malcolm.

Another top-named band was coming to Falls City thanks to the Elks Club. It was announced that a contract had been signed to bring Lawrence Welk and his orchestra to FC for one night.

Coach Jug Brown's Irish team defeated Dwight Assumption 39-35 for the championship of the Class D Division of the Hastings Diocesan tourney. Lawrence Harpenau led SH with 15, while John Knobbe added 10.

The Falls City fire department reported making 12 runs in January, an unusually large number of calls for a one-month period.

More than 2,500 seedling trees had been ordered for windbreak and wood-lot planting under the Clark-McNary Act, according to County Agent Tom Aitken.

The Honey Creek basketball team defeated Salem 38-26. Paul Bernhard led Honey Creek with 11 points, while Ron Wagner added 10. Joe Wintz led Salem with nine. The referees were Lanthan Camblin and Roger Hansen.

**50 Years Ago, January 28, 1976 to February 3, 1976**

Vern Ketter was named administrator at Sunny Court Home for Senior Citizens. Sunny Court was located at 1010 East 21st Street and supplied 61 beds.

Ed Kirkendall and Dwight Thompson were named the Falls City High School Wrestlers of the Week. Both were earned championships at the Twin Rivers Conference Meet.

The Southeast Consolidated Mustangs won their ninth straight game, beating Dawson-Verdon 81-58. Randy Pryor, Jerry Anderson and Greg Morris all scored 16 points for SE, while Charlie Fiegener had 25 to lead the Jets.

Sunny Fabrics at 825 Main St. in Sabetha advertised Bernina Sewing Machines for sale.

Tim Wilson made his first appearance in the Class B wrestling ratings. Wilson appeared at fourth at 138 pounds.

A 100-year tradition went down the drain when the Lyons City Council narrowly approved the city's first downtown liquor license. After a two-and-a-half-hour discussion, attended by 400 people, the council voted 2-1 to grant the license to Lyons Lanes Bowling Alley.

The 4-H Council met in the County Commissioners' Room at the Courthouse and named Duane Merz as President. Charles Stanley of Stella was named vice president, and Mrs. Ed Hogue of Dawson was named secretary.

The legislature's Constitutional Revision Committee voted to approve a bill which would allow the State Historical Society to purchase Courthouse and Jailhouse rocks south of Bridgeport.

Mike Dunn, the son of Mrs. Dale Dunn, was among the Kearney State College students included on the dean's honor roll for the first semester.

Guy Cooper, chairman of the board of The O.A. Cooper Co., congratulated Chuck Hunzeker, plant manager, on the mill's contribution to Cooper's best production year. If all the Cooper feed produced and delivered in 1975 had been loaded in standard boxcars, it would have made up a train 75 miles long.

A June wedding was being planned for Miss Rita Susan Bachman and Stephen Keith Johansen. Miss Bachman was a computer operator at Richardson County Bank, and her fiancée was a lineman for the Burlington Northern Railroad.

The Journal Jaycees Basketball team defeated James Oil 40-31. Craig Stevens led the winners with 16 points, while Rick Wolstenholm paced James Oil with 21.

The City Council discussed moving the fire station from 18th and Harlan St. to City Hall at 18th and Towle.

Marlen R. Luff, 2601 Abbott, announced his candidacy for a position on the local Board of Education. Luff stated his belief that every citizen had an obligation to become involved.

Russ Colgen was named the new manager of the Gambles store. Mr. Colgen had been with the store for 41 years.

Debbie A. Randall was named the Sacred Heart High School 1976 Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow.

**25 Years Ago, January 28, 2001 to February 3, 2001**

Mrs. Luella Weddel was named the Business and Professional Women's "Woman of the Year" at the Jaycees DSA Banquet. Norma Thompson won the Outstanding Educator Award; Steve Goldsberry was the winner of the Robert J. Chab award; Randy Gottula was named Boss of the Year; Ken Kunce won the Outstanding Community Leader Award; Ann Severin won the Distinguished Service Award, and Ed Harris won the Good Neighbor Award.

## Council chooses substation site for Energy Forward Transmission Project

EDGE Director Lucas Froeschel presented the quarter report to the Council. Froeschel acknowledged the TIF project for J-Six and also stated that a couple of projects in the North Commercial Corridor are in the works and will request TIF.

He stated that Omni Tech, a consulting firm, was hired to develop a new strategic plan. The firm specializes in bioeconomy projects.

He advised the Board that infrastructure has been installed at Champions Crossing, with four of six lots at Morehead Court already sold. Once a lot is sold, the buyer has three years to break ground and one more to finish the project.

Froeschel also advised the Council that the EDGE Board voted to approve naming a second council member to the EDGE Board, if the Council chooses to do so.

After a discussion, the Council voted to approve the second seat on the Board, approving Leyden and Sara Ruiz to the EDGE Board.

The Council authorized the participation in the NC2 (Nebraska City 2) Separate Electric System Refunding as recommended by the Board of Public Works. Falls City has a .83 percent ownership of the coal-fired plant in Nebraska City.

The Council reviewed and selected the primary location of the new electric substation for the Energy Forward Transmission Improvement Project. After reviewing potential locations with Olsson, the project was narrowed to two sites. The first site is the former Falls City Cemetery located on West 14th, and the second is the former Saddle Club area. The cemetery site encompasses 10 acres and is owned by the city of Falls City. The site provides the best flexibility and accessibility for transmission connection compared to the Saddle Club. The Saddle Club would provide 4.75 acres and is owned by Falls City Recreation. The Saddle Club offers the best route for connecting to the existing PDC (Power Distribution Center), however, the ease of the cemetery site proved more beneficial. Falls City Rec originally obtained the Saddle Club site to add another ball field. They agreed to donate the property to the city, with the caveat that the city would build an additional field, likely at Legion Park. Estimated costs to build a

new ball field range from \$380,000 to \$500,000.

The cemetery site has a variable cost of \$354,000 to \$805,000, while the Saddle Club's range is \$563,000 to \$683,000. Olsson states it is common for substations to be built just on the outskirts of town, providing more flexibility for use and maintenance. Olsson also recommends burying the lines to connect to the PDC at the Power Plant rather than overhead lines.

After a discussion, the Council voted 7-0 to approve the former Falls City Cemetery site on West 14th Street.

The final agenda item was a request by resident Lucas Froeschel to update the historical marker plaque at the Aquatic Park. Froeschel cited the desire to ensure accuracy on the marker.

"There's two pieces of info on that sign that haven't been totally verifiable," said Froeschel. Froeschel stated that David Kentopp alerted him that the original settlers had not been verified as coming from Maryland, and that the timeline of the flood that forced residents to relocate has also not been verified. The Council voted to approve changes to the sign to improve accuracy at no cost to the citizens of Falls City.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:16 p.m.

In Humboldt, Richard Davis filed as a nonpartisan candidate for Humboldt City Council Ward 2. The filing indicates a four year term.

Richard L. Hardesty Jr. filed as a Republican candidate for Richardson County sheriff. The filing lists a four year term.

Two candidates filed for seats on the Airport Authority Board.

Brandon J. Keithley filed as a nonpartisan candidate for a six year term. His filing indicates he is an incumbent.

David H. Mullins also filed as a nonpartisan candidate for the Airport Authority Board for a six year term and is listed as an incumbent.

Shawn M. Fouraker filed as a Republican candidate for Richardson County commissioner in District 1. The filing lists a four year term and indicates incumbent status.

In Falls City, Mark S. Harkendorff filed as a nonpartisan candidate for mayor. The filing lists a four year term and indicates incumbent status.

The primary election is scheduled for May 12.

## NNRD Board Vacancy in Subdistrict 8

The Nemaha Natural Resources District is accepting letters of interest to fill a vacancy on its board of directors. Due to the recent passing of long-time director, Mike Speece from Auburn, the position has become open.

The NRD's board of directors will accept written applications from interested, potential directors until Wednesday, February 11. Applicants must be registered voters who also meet all other eligibility requirements for holding an elected office and reside within the appropriate boundaries of the vacant subdistrict. NRD board members are normally elected to four-year terms during the primary/general elections in even numbered years. Because of the timing of the vacancy, anyone appointed to the position will serve through January 7, 2027. The final two years of this term will be up for election in the 2026 primary/general election. Interested candidates must file with the Secretary of State's office no later than February 17 (incumbent) or March 2 (non-incumbent).

This position is in Subdistrict 8, and the other director in this subdistrict is Dick James from Verdon. The eligible area includes the southeast part of Nemaha County including the towns of Auburn, Brownville, and Nemaha, as well as a portion of northern and eastern Richardson County including the towns of Stella, Shubert, and Barada.

Twenty-one members serve on the Nemaha NRD board and represent 10 subdistricts, two directors per subdistrict, who are elected in alternating election years. One member of the board is elected at-large from throughout the entire District.

Nemaha NRD board meetings are held in Tecumseh on the second Thursday of each month, usually in the evening. Board members are eligible to receive \$65 per diem and reimbursement of mileage and other expenses incurred while conducting NRD business.

The time for new bill introductions has expired with a total of 545 new measures being introduced by members of the Legislature. Floor debate on legislation carried over from the 2025 Legislative Session occupies the morning sessions with committee hearings being held each afternoon through the end of February.

The Legislature will soon begin debating bills designated as priority bills by individual senators or committees with the deadline for making such designations set on February 19. The priority bills so designated will dominate the balance of the Legislative session.

The state of Nebraska was recently awarded just over \$218 million for the first year of the five-year grant to be received from the federal government under the historic Rural Health Transformation Program, a \$50 billion initiative established under the federal "Working Families Tax Cuts" legislation. The federal legislation is designed to strengthen and modernize health care in rural communities across the country and Nebraska's focus in utilizing these funds will be on incentivizing real food, taking care of our veterans, investing in technology, and supporting Nebraskans struggling with mental health or drug addiction.

FC held an 8-0 advantage in transition points and forced 29 turnovers while committing 23.







because we don't know who has National Flood Insurance," stated Kirkendall.

Commissioner Campbell interjected, noting that insurance can be obtained on the open market.

A public discussion date has tentatively been set for Wednesday, February 11, 2026.

Jill Garcia of Project Response provided the 2025 4th quarter report and statistics. The report showed that the entity assisted with three protection orders; held safe dates in Falls City; provided 85 food pantry assists; helped 12 with clothing vouchers; received 10 hotline calls; and received no requests for shelter.

Sheriff Rick Hardesty met with the Board and reported that the jail facility was currently housing 13 inmates. He also advised the members that his staff was preparing an application for the E-Ci-

tation grant to fund the purchase of in-car scanners and printers.

"We spend five thousand, and they give us fifteen thousand," said Hardesty.

He advised the Board that the sewage line in the Law Enforcement Center's kitchen had been cleaned and that a new pump had been installed under warranty.

Hardesty also presented the Board with numbers on family, employee/spouse, and employee/child health insurance coverage for county employees. The Sheriff stated that it has become difficult to fill positions when family insurance plans aren't offered.

"I know it's a lot of money, but every county around us is doing it," said Hardesty.

The Sheriff said it would help with hiring and retention.

A long discussion was held on zoning in the county. Commissioner

Campbell stated that he opposed zoning. Having dealt with the floodway/floodplain issue for the past year, he said, "I can't, in good faith to my constituents, try to impose any zoning ordinance on anybody in the county."

Discussions were held regarding the current project to develop a new comprehensive plan and the possibility of developing zoning regulations. Caverzagie stated that just because the rules are updated doesn't mean they have to be implemented. The guidelines were last updated in 2001.

"I still think we need to update the book," said Caverzagie. "That's just my opinion, whether we implement them or not."

It was also noted that zoning regulations help the County Assessor determine when new additions have been built in rural areas. It was stated that houses and buildings are often erected without the assessor's knowledge. Zoning would be a way to address that issue.

If a structure in the county costs more than \$2,500 to build, the property owner must report it to the Assessor's Office.

Assessor Kim Riggs stated, "A few" report the new buildings.

Without zoning, there are no regulations regarding wind or solar farms.



#### Public Hearing Announcement

The Nemaha Natural Resources District (NRD) will hold a public hearing on Thursday, February 12th, 2026, at 5:30 p.m. at the District office (62161 US Highway 136, Tecumseh, NE 68450) to receive written and oral testimony concerning the changes to the District's Groundwater Quantity Management Area (GWQMA) Rules and Regulations.

The changes to the GWQMA Rules and Regulations will apply geographically to include all lands and water bodies within the boundaries of the Nemaha NRD. Also, the proposed changes will apply stratigraphically to all groundwater located within the District. Upon NRD Board of Directors approval of the proposed changes to the GWQMA, the following changes will be enacted:

1. Definitions – Additions, Deletions & Updates

2. Well Spacing – Any well requiring a well permit to pump greater than 50 gallons per minute shall be constructed at least 1,000 feet from any domestic, livestock or "other" type well.

3. Irrigation – Only one irrigation well will be permitted to supply groundwater through one delivery system and will be allowed to irrigate up to 25% of the number of acres within the section the well is to be located.

4. Transfers – The transfer of groundwater will only be allowed for domestic, municipal and remediation purposes.

5. Well Permit Ranking System – The well permit ranking system's well density equations have been updated. Also, the minimum score required for well permit approval will vary depending upon the aquifer region underlying the well permit location.

6. Aquifer Regions – The paleovalley alluvial aquifer has been subdivided into West, East & South regions.

The NRD Board of Directors will consider all testimony provided and consider whether to adopt or rescind any of the proposed changes to the GWQMA Rules and Regulations at the regularly scheduled Board meeting to be held on Thursday, February 12th, 2026, at 7:00 p.m.



## Winter weather highlights importance of home and vehicle preparedness

Recent snow and extremely cold temperatures served as a reminder that winter conditions can arrive quickly and impact daily routines. As winter continues, residents are encouraged to review home and vehicle readiness to reduce disruptions and safety concerns.

Cold temperatures place added strain on heating systems. Furnaces and heat pumps should be operating properly and air filters should be clean to maintain efficiency. Vents and registers should remain clear to allow consistent airflow throughout the home. Residents experiencing uneven heating or system issues are encouraged to address problems promptly to avoid further damage during colder periods.

Plumbing systems are also vulnerable during extended cold. Exposed pipes in basements, crawl spaces and exterior walls should be insulated. Homeowners should know the location of their main water shutoff valve in the event of a frozen or broken pipe. Allowing faucets to drip slightly during extreme cold can help reduce the risk of freezing.

Ice accumulation and snow buildup can create hazards around homes and businesses. Sidewalks, steps and driveways should be cleared promptly to reduce slip risks. Ice melt and salt products can improve traction but should be used according to instructions to avoid surface damage. Snow shovels and other removal tools should be in good condition and easily accessible.

Vehicles driven during winter weather should be properly maintained. Tires should be inspected for adequate tread and inflation. Windshield wipers and washer fluid should be suited for freezing temperatures. Batteries often fail during cold weather and should be tested if a vehicle shows signs of slow starting.

Ice and road salt can damage vehicles over time. Washing vehicles regularly during winter helps remove corrosive buildup from undercarriages and wheel wells. Keeping headlights and taillights clear of snow and ice improves visibility for drivers and others on the road.

Drivers are encouraged to keep emergency supplies in their vehicles, including blankets, gloves, a flashlight and basic safety items. Fuel tanks should be kept at least half full during winter conditions in case of delays or road closures.

Even after recent winter storms, additional cold and snow remain possible through the season. Reviewing preparedness steps now can help residents respond more confidently to changing conditions and reduce the impact of winter weather on homes and commutes.

The Richardson County Transit (402-245-3664) provides, Door-to-Door transportation services in Falls City and surrounding areas, with priority for seniors and individuals with disabilities.

Rides are by appointment only, and the service operates for general, local, and out-of-area transit.

Residents are encouraged to review these numbers before winter storms and keep copies near landline phones cell phones and emergency kits.

## Home safety tips for cold weather

Winter weather can place added stress on homes particularly during periods of extreme cold snow and power outages. Taking steps to prepare ahead of time can help reduce safety risks and property damage.

Generators can provide temporary power during outages but must be used correctly. Portable generators should never be operated indoors or in garages even with doors open. They should be placed outside and away from windows doors and vents to prevent carbon monoxide buildup. Only extension cords rated for outdoor use and the electrical load should be used. Carbon monoxide detectors should be installed in homes and checked regularly.

Residents who rely on medical equipment that requires electricity should plan ahead for outages. This includes contacting medical providers or equipment suppliers to discuss backup power options. Some equipment may have battery backups or alternative power solutions. Keeping a list of emergency contacts and power dependent needs can help first responders or utilities prioritize assistance when possible.

Heating devices require careful use during winter months. Space heaters should be kept at least three feet away from combustible materials including furniture bedding and curtains. Heaters should be placed on stable surfaces and turned off when unattended or while sleeping. Extension cords should not be used with space heaters unless specifically approved by the manufacturer.

Fireplaces wood stoves and fuel burning appliances should be inspected and maintained regularly. Chimneys and vents should be clear of debris and buildup. Ashes should be fully cooled before disposal and stored in non combustible containers.

Frozen pipes are a common winter issue. Exposed plumbing in basements crawl spaces and exterior walls should be insulated. During extreme cold allowing faucets to drip slightly can help reduce freezing risk. Homeowners should know the location of the main water shutoff valve in case of a break.

Some winter mistakes can increase risk inside homes. Using ovens or grills for heat is dangerous and should never be done. Blocking vents or returns can interfere with heating systems and create unsafe conditions. Overloading electrical outlets with heaters or appliances can increase fire risk.

Taking time to review home safety practices before and after winter storms can help protect households throughout the season.
