### Elected officials' salary talks ongoing

The Board of Commissioners met on New Year's Eve at the courthouse for a regularly scheduled meeting. All commissioners answered the roll call.

Nemaha County Grant Administrator Linda Volker presented a memorandum of understanding to the Board for consideration. The MOU, involving Pawnee, Johnson, and Nemaha counties, concerns a grant application for community-based Juvenile Services Aid Program Funds. The grant is awarded through the Nebraska Crime Commission.

Volker advised the Board that juvenile diversion is about diversion and truancy.

She informed the Board that truancy is more common among younger children than among high school students.

Volker's handout stated that diversion allows youth who commit offenses to be redirected away from formal processing in the juvenile justice system while remaining accountable for their actions.

"No juvenile is ever turned away from juvenile diversion," said Volker.

### Frontier Bank is now Equity Bank

Effective January 1, 2026, Equity Bancshares, Inc., based in Wichita, Kansas, completed its merger with Frontier Holding, LLC. The merger allows Equity Bank to add several locations in Nebraska, renaming seven branches from Frontier Bank to Equity.

Equity Bank CEO Rick Sems stated that the bank's goal is to be in six states, and Falls City falls near the middle in size among the communities Equity Bank currently serves.

The bank currently reaches out to roughly 250 miles in all directions from its headquarters.

Sems stated that he visits each location annually.

## Richardson Co. Jail employee arrested following internal investigation

The Richardson County Sheriff's Office announced over the weekend through a press release that a jail employee has been arrested following the conclusion of an internal investigation.

The sheriff's office stated that the investigation revealed the employee was in violation of multiple sheriff's office policies and procedures as well as several Nebraska state statutes. After the investigation concluded, the findings were referred for criminal review and the appropriate charges were filed. The employee was taken into custody and is no longer performing duties with the Richardson County Sheriff's Office.

The sheriff's office said no further details will be released because of the ongoing legal process and personnel privacy laws.

In an update the following day, the sheriff's office stated that its initial announcement was released before the investigation concluded because officials believed it was important for the public to receive accurate information directly from the sheriff's office rather than through media outlets. The sheriff's office

### Strengthening Paths to Safety: Supporting Domestic Violence Survivors

When someone escapes domestic violence, their journey to healing has only just begun. As physicians, you are often the first professionals to recognize signs of abuse and can play a pivotal role in connecting survivors to lifesaving resources.

This is especially crucial in rural communities where you may be the only health care provider for miles and where stigma around domestic violence can be particularly strong. Recent research conducted across South Dakota and Iowa shelters with 47 survivors—focusing primarily on rural and Native American survivors—reveals crucial insights about the supports needed to rebuild lives after abuse.

Research in health care settings suggests that many abuse victims may disclose their situation to a health care provider before seeking specialized services, making physicians crucial gatekeepers to support resources. Below we discuss several of the key needs identified by survivors that would help them on their pathway to healing.

Housing emerged as the most fundamental need. “I have a place to live. I’m not afraid that I don’t have a place to sleep at night,” explained one Native survivor. Rural survivors faced even greater housing challenges, with one Native participant sharing: “I got assistance for the deposit, but I’m kind of struggling with the utilities.” Without stable housing, survivors often face impossible choices between homelessness or returning to abusive relationships.

Transportation barriers create profound isolation, particularly for rural Native survivors. “If they had a bus or something to bring us here, then more people would be willing to come,” noted one rural Native survivor. Another rural Native participant explained: “I think we mostly just need help with gas cards” to get to services that may be located far away.

Mental health support is essential, with many survivors defining healing in terms of emotional well-being. “I guess being able to talk without breaking down emotionally,” explained one Native urban survivor.

Physical health needs intertwine with trauma recovery. “I was really in bad shape. I had to stay in bed for a while and then go back to the hospital,” shared a rural Native survivor.

As medical providers, being aware of how abuse manifests in medical complaints, chronic pain, unexplained injuries, anxiety, depression and missed appointments can help identify patients in need of intervention. Pediatric screening is equally important, as children’s health often reflects the safety of their home environment. Documenting findings thoroughly and creating a safe, private space for disclosure increases the likelihood that survivors will seek help when ready.

The consistent support of trauma-informed advocates proves transformative. “It’s been a lifesaver. You’re around people who know what you’re going through,” expressed a Native urban survivor. The role of physicians can be to support these survivors in connecting with local advocacy services. Reaching out to your local agency and requesting information on their services, brochures to share with patients, and a greater understanding of local support opportunities provides an essential way to support your patients’ health.

Prevention remains far more effective than intervention after trauma occurs. As trusted figures in rural communities, your advocacy can be particularly powerful in breaking cycles of violence where resources are scarce, but community connections run deep.

What can you do today to make a difference? Connect with your local domestic violence organization and invite them to come tell you about their services and leave fliers in your office. ### Former state senator tries again to help Ukraine win their war

A former Nebraska state senator, once again, is calling on the United States to do more to help Ukraine win its war with Russia.

Tom Brewer, who served in the Legislature from 2017 to 2025 and earned two Purple Hearts during 36 years in the military, recently made his eighth trip to the front in Ukraine.

The trips have been part of Brewer’s personal crusade to show support for that war-torn country, and to help Americans realize that stopping Russia from overtaking Ukraine is a stand for democracy that we all should care about.

“We in America tend to take freedom for granted. They’re paying dearly for it every day, with their sons and daughters,” Brewer recently told an interviewer on a Ukrainian television network.

Ukraine, he said, is much like Nebraska – an agricultural based region with friendly, hard-working people who just want to live their lives in a safe place.

Brewer has often compared Ukraine’s fight against Russia with the patriots who fought the American revolution against Britain – a war against a much larger country with much more military assets.

Yet the patriots, and Ukraine, held their own. Eventually, the fledgling United States prevailed.

This latest trip comes as President Donald Trump is working to get agreement on a peace plan between the Russians, who invaded Ukraine nearly four years ago, and Ukraine.

Brewer, like a lot of Americans, believes the now, 20-point peace plan being proposed favors Russia, and its president, Vladimir Putin, much too much.

The state senator said that if Canada invaded and took over Montana, Americans would not stand for allowing Canada to take U.S. territory, and similarly, Ukrainians won’t accept giving Russia a huge chunk of its territory on the eastern front.

In Brewer’s view, trying to negotiate a peace deal is a losing proposition: it just allows the war to drag out, and plays into Putin’s goal of seeing Europe and the U.S. eventually give up, and allowing him to annex a huge chunk of Ukraine. Putin, he said, doesn’t want a peace deal.

Brewer, who served six tours of duty in Afghanistan, believes the better approach is to get aggressive, and supply Ukraine with long-range missiles capable of striking deep into Russia.

Russia, he said, is suffering economically due to the war, and its military is in tatters due to incredible losses of troops in Ukraine. They can’t hang on too much longer, in Brewer’s view.

If Ukraine hits hard, with the help of U.S. and European missiles,

it would force Putin to strike a peace deal that favors both sides, Brewer told the Ukrainian interviewer.

“If President Trump wants to see an end to the death and dying, this is a way of doing it,” he said.


For too long, Brewer said, the U.S. has been slow-walking military weapons to Ukraine for fear of sparking a wider war in Europe, or the use of nuclear weapons by Russia. Instead of allowing Putin to be the bully, he said the Americans should make it clear any use of nuclear weapons would be a mistake and trigger a harsh response.

At age 67, Brewer could be doing a lot of things other than risking his life by traveling to the front in Ukraine. But he’s grown to admire their tenacity on the battlefield and their thirst for freedom. He’s an old warrior, who can’t seemingly give up.

I recently watched two, excellent and brutal PBS documentaries on the war in Ukraine, “20 Days in Mariupol” and “2000 Meters to Andriivka.”

You gotta wonder, after seeing the battlefield sacrifices of Ukrainians, why we aren’t doing more to help these freedom-seeking people.





# From the Journal files

75 Years Ago, January 7, 1951 to January 13, 1951

A foreign diplomatic official estimated that Russia had 24-30 atomic bombs and hoped to reach 60 by the end of the year.

John S. W. Farger of Omaha was to take charge of St. Thomas' Episcopal Church in Falls City, succeeding the Rev. G. L. Cladius.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Zentner of 2203 Crook Street celebrated their golden wedding anniversary with a buffet dinner and open house. The couple was married on January 10, 1901, at Talmage.

W.H. Heiser, secretary of the local Elks Club, announced that Woodey Herman "and the Herd" would play a dance at Prichard Auditorium on January 24. The band had been recognized as one of the top organizations in the country.

Sgt. Leo Reichert of Falls City, who was with the U. S. occupation forces in Austria, planned to spend Christmas in the hospital recovering from pneumonia.

Bullock's Market at 13th and Stone Street was open with a complete line of groceries, meats and fresh vegetables.

The Tiger basketball team sent Auburn home with a 50-15 loss in Southeast Conference action at Prichard Auditorium. Approximately 700 fans watched as Frank Falloon scored 18 points and Kenny Kieffer added 10. Ken Clark led the Bulldogs with six points.

Oscar Johnson received clearance from the National Production Authority of the Department of Commerce for the completion of his drive-in theater on Highway 73, south of Falls City.

John Wayne and Maureen O'Hara starred in "Rio Grande" at the Rivoli Theater in Falls City.

Dawson remained undefeated on the hardwood after defeating Bratton Union 62-26. Dale Spaulding led Dawson with 15 points, while teammates Chuck Higgins added 14 and John Schulze had 12. Vernon Sullwold and Don Clark each scored 11 for Bratton Union.

The NCAA was voting on whether to ban live telecasting of football games for one year. A large majority of the members seemed to be on board with the ban. A committee proposed that live television negatively affected gate receipts at contests.

Owners of approximately 2,000 acres of land in the Arago bend bottoms met with M.R. Iakisch of the Agricultural Levee Planning Section of the Army Engineers' District Office to discuss a possible levee project north of Rulo.

A fourth fireman died as a result of a fire and explosion that destroyed a warehouse in Chicago. The fire caused nearly \$1.5 million in damage.

A second-half rally helped Pawnee City escape with a 51-44 win over Plattsmouth. Chuck Jensen scored 20 points to lead the Indians.

50 Years Ago, January 7, 1976 to January 13, 1976

The Nebraska Public Power District's Cooper Nuclear Power Station was shut down following an explosion in a building just south of the main power plant building. An NPPD spokesman said the plant's nuclear reactor was not involved, and that no injuries were reported. The building's north wall and part of the roof were blown out.

Ron Strecker was Falls City's only individual champion in the Humboldt Reserves Tournament, winning the 105-pound division.

The Twin Rivers Conference was holding the boys and girls tourney at the same site during the same week. Auburn would host the tourney, which featured Auburn, Fairbury, Plattsmouth, Nebraska City, Falls City, Syracuse and Blair.

Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Lockard were the parents of a son born at Lincoln General Hospital. The baby weighed seven pounds, 4 1/2 ounces and was named Matt Daniel.

The boiler at the Falls City Post Office went on the blink, causing temperatures inside the building to hover near 45 degrees by the afternoon. Postal Employees wore their outside coats all day as they worked.

One Stop Café advertised a Friday night special of freshwater catfish for \$2.95 or a hamburger steak for \$1.50.

Marlin Peck, a farmer and county weed control supervisor, was elected president of the Board of Education at a meeting at the Junior High School. Mr. Peck succeeded Jim Sheets.

Pupils at Dawson-Verdon officially moved into the new addition at the school. The addition included new locker rooms, an industrial arts area and a new gymnasium, capable of accommodating 600 patrons. The gym was dedicated when DV hosted Murdock on Friday, January 13, while the Lady Jets defeated Elk Creek 55-26 in the gym's first competition on Thursday evening.

The Falls City seventh graders defeated Southeast 28-16. Dennis Prichard scored 14 for FC, while Brent Johnson led the Mustangs with six.

One thousand pounds of beef were among the items taken from the new rural home of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Sailors, three miles south of Falls City. Entry to the home was gained by prying open the patio door.

Approximately 80 couples attended the Falls City Town and Country Promenaders' Winter Square Dance Festival.

Gibson's Pamida advertised 22 LR shells, three boxes of 50 shells for \$2 and a bottle of 100 Anacin tablets for \$1.

County Agent Tom Aitken was retiring after serving for over 37 years in government service.

The Irish defeated North Nodaway 61-45 in first-round action at the Fairfax Invitational Tournament. Dan Hill scored 20 points and pulled down 18 rebounds. Steve Pokorny added 14, and Bob Aitken had 11.

25 Years Ago, January 7, 2001 to January 13, 2001

Clerk-Magistrate Jeanne McGinnis administered the oath of office to Richardson County Commissioners Gayle Swisegood and Bill Ely in the County Courtroom. Swisegood was a veteran board member, while Ely was new on the job.

Sophomore Katie McGinnis averaged 5.4 points and 4.4 rebounds per game for Nebraska Wesleyan University.

Jim Gerweck was honored as a 25-year member of the Falls City Volunteer Ambulance Squad.

Winning the "What It Means to Be Patriotic" Youth Essay Contest, sponsored by the Falls City VFW, were Amanda Weaver, Mark Dunn, Jerlyn Cummings and Melissa Walker.

Nevada Williams of Shubert hosted a family Christmas with turkey and ham. Sixteen guests attended.

Olivia Palmer won a Commemorative 30-30 Winchester rifle in a raffle benefiting the American Legion Club addition. The lottery netted \$2,500 for the endeavor.

Enough money was raised to move the one-room native brick schoolhouse from its location north of Peru along Highway 75 to the Peru State College campus. The cost to move the 1905 structure was estimated at \$50,000.

A stalemate in negotiations between Richardson County and union workers in its roads department showed no signs of a winter thaw. There were 16 union employees working with the roads department; one was laid off. The three supervisors were non-union employees.

VFW Auxiliary Post #1765 met with 11 members present. Community Service chairman Kathleen Williams reported 786 hours were given for December.

Mike and Heather Howell were the parents of a daughter, Kellyn Michaela, born at St. Joseph Health Center in Kansas City, Mo.

Phillip and Laurie Froeschl welcomed their son, Anthony James, born at Community Medical Center in Falls City.

The Oasis Restaurant was now serving a two-meat buffet on Sundays, along with items from the regular menu.

Sacred Heart graduate Julie Froeschl began her college track career when she pole vaulted at the Kansas State Wildcat Indoor Invitational.

The Falls City Journal celebrated 134 years in business with a percent-off sale throughout January.

Darveau advised the Board that his workers had wrapped up hauling scrap iron to Pawnee City.

"I got word that we did get the tire grant again," said Darveau. "So, we'll do that sometime this summer."

A conversation was held regarding stockpiling more rock at Dawson to allow easier access during emergencies.

Darveau asked Karas and Campbell what the goal was they were trying to accomplish by stockpiling more rock.

Darveau preferred to keep the pile for emergencies, saying, "You haul out of it for three or four days, and your pile doesn't last long."

The Superintendent said he sees the stockpile as something to use after a significant event, when the crew can't catch up. Not something to be pulled from daily.

Sheriff Hardesty met with the Board and told the group that the Law Enforcement Center was housing 16 inmates.

The Sheriff advised the Board that the bedliner product used in the jail's showers is working so far, and he plans to use it in the remaining showers when the jail population allows.

A conversation was held regarding the purchase of a StunTronic Band-It Prisoner Control System. The product is designed to improve control of prisoners in the courtroom and during transports. The system can deliver 50,000 volts of electricity to subdue a subject.

The Sheriff has recently encountered multiple instances in which an inmate has caused issues in the courthouse, and case law prohibits the use of visible restraints on a prisoner during a jury trial.

The Sheriff also talked to the members about Guardian RFID. The system maximizes the ability to track medication, supplies, and dietary meals electronically.

"As far as accountability, the liability, I mean, you scan, I put in your name, then I scan your meds," said Hardesty. "So that is documented what time you got them."

Commissioner Karas moved to approve the Guardian RFID Interface at a cost of \$5,842.36. Caverzagie seconded, and the motion passed.

The Board also approved the purchase of the Stun-Tronic Band-It Prisoner Control System for \$1,900, which includes training for two staff members.

Emergency Management Director Brian Kirkendall addressed the Board and reviewed a request

years.

Highway Superintendent Darveau spoke up, saying, "That's why I'm here. You want to give 19.8% for inflation. Did you offer 19.8% to the Road Department employees? They are saying that, because of inflation, they deserve a 19.8% raise. Did you try to include that with the Road Department at 19.8%? Absolutely not. That's all I'm going to say. It's a fact."

Commissioner Caverzagie advised each elected official that he would be available to speak with them to obtain their thoughts and ideas on the salaries.

Amanda Bartek-Ramsey told the Board that it is difficult when "the deputies of the city, we've discussed that make more than I do."

The wages must be set by January 15, 2026.

The claims were paid.

Commissioner Campbell addressed the incorrect date in the public hearing notice for the Floodway discussion. The notice listed the date as "Tuesday, January 7"; it should have read "Wednesday, January 7, 2026."

With nothing further on the agenda, the meeting was adjourned at 11:28.

"We are much closer to being the smallest bank in the country, like by 100 times, than we are the largest bank in the country," said Sems. "We're really very much a community-focused bank; we leave decisions here."

Sems continued, saying that the same people who have made decisions at the bank in the past will continue to be the ones making the decisions moving forward.

"What we bring, though, and what they'll see differences in is an improved digital process," said Sems.

Sems stated that the number of employees at the Falls City branch will increase moving forward.

He also mentioned that the company's architect has visited Falls City and the branch will soon receive an overhaul.

Sems said that with smaller banks, the lending amounts are limited, but with Equity, the numbers will be larger.

He advised that, ideally, the bank wants loans under half a million dollars, but they can authorize loans of five, ten, and fifteen million.

fice said that at the time of the initial release, multiple media organizations had already contacted the office requesting information and that releasing a preliminary statement allowed the office to maintain transparency while the investigation was ongoing.

After the investigation concluded, the sheriff's office identified the employee as 32 year old Derek J. Olberding. According to the sheriff's office, Olberding was arrested and charged with delivering or distributing a controlled substance in violation of Nebraska Revised

Statute 28-416(2)(B), a Class IIA felony, and possession of a controlled substance in violation of Nebraska Revised Statute 28-416(3), a Class IV felony.

The sheriff's office stated that it holds its employees to the highest professional and ethical standards and that allegations of misconduct are taken seriously and thoroughly investigated. The sheriff's office said it remains committed to accountability, transparency and maintaining public trust.


She is preceded in death by her father, Raymond Finck and niece, Jennifer Malone.

## Evelyn Yanders

Evelyn Louise Yanders passed away on Friday, December 12, 2025, at the age of 98. She was born on August 8, 1927, in Falls City, Nebraska, to David Leo Gatz and Lena M. (née Trefzer) Gatz, on the family farm her great-grandfather purchased in the 1870s. She was proud of being a farm girl and of her father, a successful farmer whom banks trusted enough to extend loans to during the Depression.

Evelyn graduated from Falls City High School in 1944 and received a BA in education in 1948 from Peru State College in Peru, Nebraska. While there, she became Homecoming Queen and met her future husband.

She married Armon Yanders in Falls City, Nebraska, on August 1, 1948. They moved to Lincoln, Nebraska, where she taught second grade until 1953. The couple then lived in Oak Ridge, Tennessee, and Evanston, Illinois, before her husband entered the U.S. Navy in 1954. During his naval service, the family moved several times, including to San Francisco, California, where their first son, Mark, was born in 1956. After leaving the Navy, they lived in Lombard, Illinois, where their second son, Kent, was born in 1958. They later lived in Lansing, Michigan, for ten years and in 1969 settled in Columbia, Missouri.

Mrs. Yanders was a teacher's aide at Grant School for many years. She was active in the University of Missouri Fortnightly Club and served as its president in 1977. She and her husband were members of the Columbia Gourmet Group for over forty years.

In the mid-1970s, Evelyn was among the first people to benefit from a new type of mammogram, which she credited with saving her life. For more than a decade after her mastectomy, she volunteered with Reach for Recovery, providing kits and comfort to cancer patients in the hospital. She also worked with the American Cancer Society to raise awareness and funds to fight cancer.


Dorothy Koester, age 73 of Grafton, ND passed away on Sunday, December 28, 2025 at her home in Grafton.

## Falls City High School parts ways with head football coach Jack Bangert

**#1** November 19, 2025: The most read story of 2025 on the *Falls City Journal* website was the announcement that Jack Bangert would no longer serve as head football coach at Falls City High School, effective immediately. The school said the decision was made because the team's on-field performance had not met expectations and that the change was in the best long-term interest of the program.

"Falls City Public Schools extends its sincere appreciation to Coach Bangert for his time, leadership, and dedication to our student-athletes," the school said in a statement. Assistant Principal and Activities Director Gale Dunkhas said, "I want to thank him for his hard work and commitment during his time as our head coach." The district said it would begin the process of selecting a new coach in the coming weeks.

## Commissioners send settlement offer to road department employees and discuss floodplain floodway

**#3** September 24, 2025: Among the third top stories of 2025 on the *Falls City Journal* website was Richardson County's work on flood mitigation and labor negotiations.

Emergency Director Brian Kirkendall met with county commissioners to discuss a FEMA and Nebraska Department of Natural Resources buyout program for property owners in the floodway. The grants were designed to reduce flood risk by helping homeowners relocate outside the floodplain, though Kirkendall said there was currently no money available to purchase properties.

Commissioner Rick Karas made a motion to send letters to floodway property owners asking whether they would be interested in selling if funding became available. The county also discussed a revised floodway and flood fringe ordinance approved by FEMA. "We left in the two feet of freeboard," Kirkendall said.

Later, the board entered closed session with special counsel Jerry Piggley, County Clerk Mary Eickhoff and County Attorney Samantha Scheitel. Afterward, Karas made a motion to send a settlement offer to NAPE/AFSCME Local 61, which represents the county roads department.

The proposal included eliminating the grievance board, making the county board the final decision-maker on grievances, setting five wage ranges from \$23 to \$25 per hour based on years of service and renaming PTO as sick leave with a cap of 480 hours.

More discussions on road department negotiations and floodway properties continue at this time.

## Massive snowstorm hits Richardson County

**#5** January 8, 2025: The fifth top story of 2025 was a major blizzard that hit Falls City on January 5, producing whiteout conditions and widespread business closures. Visibility was severely limited by early afternoon and the storm intensified around 9 a.m. Residents reported snowfall totals ranging from 11 to 16 inches, though drifting made measurements difficult.

Meteorologist Joseph Meyer of KMTV News in Omaha said the five highest snowfall totals recorded at Brenner Field through 2003 were 17 inches on March 4 to 5, 1915; 15 inches on Dec. 23 to 24, 1935; 14.5 inches on March 5 to 6, 1948; 13 inches on Dec. 24 to 25, 1948; and 12.5 inches on Feb. 13, 1978.

Photos showed deep drifts at the Richardson County Courthouse and large snow piles along Stone Street. Many Falls City businesses were closed the following Monday or opened late.

## Council vote questioned amid conflicting explanations, legal standards guide next steps

**#2** November 26, 2025: The second top story of 2025 on the *Falls City Journal* website centered on confusion surrounding a Falls City Council vote on non-union wages. During a special meeting, the council approved a motion that referenced a Nov. 3 wage proposal. Several members later said they believed they had voted on a different Nov. 17 proposal. The motion was made by Don Ferguson, who said, "I would like to make a motion that we go back to what was originally proposed on November 3 with what the committee came out of committee unanimously."

At the end of the meeting, Ferguson confirmed the council had passed "the resolution that was submitted at the November 3rd meeting," which City Administrator Anthony Nussbaum also confirmed. The council voted 4-3. The *Falls City Journal* later reviewed the audio recording, which showed the motion referenced the Nov. 3 proposal. Under Nebraska law, the wording of the motion and recorded vote controlled the action, making the episode one of the most closely watched local stories of the year.



## Larry the Cable Guy Getting-R-Done for local theatre departments

**#4** February 9, 2025: The fourth top story of 2025 on the *Falls City Journal* website was Larry the Cable Guy bringing his "Larry's Nebraska Road Trip" comedy tour to Prichard Auditorium in Falls City, ending years without a major celebrity event at the venue.

The tour began January 23 in Kearney and was scheduled to conclude March 2 in Chadron. Larry, whose real name is Dan Whitney and who is a Pawnee City native, donated the tour proceeds to local theatre programs. Falls City High School and Sacred Heart High School theatre programs split the funds from the Falls City show.

About 1,600 tickets were sold, with lines forming hours before doors opened. Larry told the audience it was great to give back to the theatre departments and said he was proud to be from southeast Nebraska.

Special guest Nick Hoff opened the show and Larry performed for nearly 90 minutes.

## Tigers snap 31-game skid

The Falls City boys' basketball team earned its first win of the season, and in doing so, gave Head Coach Jaxson Balm his first win. The Tiger program has had its struggles recently, with its last winning season coming in 2017-18. However, now Coach Balm and the Tigers can cross a win off the list and move on to the rest of the 2025-26 season.

The win came on Monday, December 29, 2025, in the opening round of the Weeping Water Holiday Tournament. FC, playing in the B Division, defeated the host school, 42-36.

Bowdy Jones found Brock Caudle on the baseline for the first bucket of the contest, putting FC ahead 2-0. However, Weeping Water went on a six-point run, putting FC behind 6-2 at the end of the first period.

Falls City's Paxton Armbruster sank 1-of-2 free throws to make it 10-10 at the half.

A triple by Armbruster to open the third quarter gave FC its largest lead of the contest at 13-10. Armbruster scored the first nine points of the period for FC as they took a 21-17 lead into the final eight

minutes.

The Tigers never trailed again, building a 13-point lead midway through the fourth. Leading 36-25, FC surrendered four straight points to make it 36-29, but Ethan Morris hit 3-of-4 free throws to push the Tigers' lead back to 10 at 39-29. The Tigers hit free throws down the stretch to hold on for the six-point win.

Falls City capitalized at the foul line, hitting 12-of-17, while Weeping Water went just 3-of-9.

FC also forced 27 turnovers, while committing only 17.

Armbruster was the top scorer for FC, ending the game with 20 points, while Morris also hit double figures with 11 points and seven boards.

The top finish of the day went to Hallie Young at 115 pounds. Young ended the day at 3-1 and placed second. In the finals, Young fell to Khloe Wiseman of Adams Central by fall at 1:35.

Four FC wrestlers finished fourth on Tuesday. At 100, Keylee Olberding went 2-2, at 105, Audrey Scrivens finished 1-2, Peyton Weddle finished 2-2 at 130, and

Gabi Young finished 2-2 at 145.

At 170 pounds, Emma Gilkerson went 4-2 and placed fifth, winning by medical forfeit in her last match.

Taytum Maddox dropped to 13-3 for the season, ending her day with one win and three losses. She fell by medical forfeit in the consolation semifinals and by forfeit in the fifth-place match.

Gabbi Griffin went 1-2 and placed seventh at 235, while Leah Goff was 3-2 and placed at 140. Goff pinned Adilyn Deibert of Central City at :51 for seventh place.

At 170 pounds, Jalin Deprey went 2-3 and placed eighth.

## Lady Tigers get in win column at Weeping Water Tourney

The Lady Tigers dropped to 0-7 for the year when they fell to Southern, 37-15, in first-round action in the B Division of the Weeping Water Holiday Tournament on Monday, December 29, 2025.

FC has struggled all season in the first period, and Monday was no different as the Raiders raced to a 16-1 lead after the first quarter. The Lady Tigers have scored just 16 total points in the first quarter across the first seven contests. After the initial eight minutes, FC settled in and played much better. The Tigers were outscored 8-4 in the second and trailed 24-5 at intermission.

The second half was played much closer, as FC was outscored 13-10 and ultimately lost 37-15. The win improved Southern to 4-4, while FC remained winless this season.

Falls City shot 23 percent from the field on Monday, making 6-of-26 shots. The Lady Tigers finished with 29 turnovers, which led to 28 points for the Raiders on the other end of the floor.

Bella Johansen was FC's top offensive player with five points. Carlea Dunkhas added four points and nine rebounds, while Tessa Gossman added four points, three steals, and two assists.

The Tigers bounced back on Tuesday, securing the first win of the season with a 44-25 victory over Parkview Christian. The contest was tight early, as FC clung to a 5-3 lead after the first period.

Falls City began to separate from the Patriots in the second stanza, outscoring Parkview 10-6 and leading 15-9 at the half.

The defense continued to pressure, and the offense picked up the pace as Falls City padded its lead, outpacing Parkview 15-4 and taking a 30-13 lead into the final eight minutes. The Lady Tigers kept pace with a 14-point fourth quarter to earn the 19-point win, 44-25.

The win snapped an 11-game losing streak dating back to last season. FC's previous win was a 45-21 victory over Mead on February 6, 2025.

FC shot 34 percent in the contest, making 18-of-53 shots. The Lady Tigers went 6-of-17 from the foul line, grabbed 43 rebounds, and dished out 11 assists.

Seven Tigers got in on the scoring, with Bristol Titus leading the charge with nine points and six rebounds. Dunkhas added eight points and seven boards, while Kaytlin Rhodd had six points and eight rebounds.

The 1-7 Tigers hosted the 2-6 Nebraska City Pioneers on Tuesday and Lourdes Central (4-4) on Friday. The Tigers will play at 1-6 Mead on Saturday, January 10. The Raiders' only win of the season came against Parkview Christian, 46-25, on December 22.


