Gunshot wound; tires slashed

A 28-year-old Falls City man is recuperating after being accidentally shot in the foot late Sunday morning, Jan. 2, at 1803 Crook Street.

Bobby Howard-Vice was transported to an out-of-town medical facility for treatment shortly after the incident.

A 16-year-old juvenile was cited for discharging a firearm within city limits. Falls City Police officers, who investigated the incident, do not believe foul play was involved.

The investigation indicates that the 16-year-old had discharged a .22 caliber rifle while in the garage at the residence. Moments later the teen was surprised when Howard-Vice entered the garage. The boy turned

and the rifle discharged, with a bullet striking Howard-Vice in the foot.

The Falls City Police Department is also investigating recent incidents of slashed tires.

Hullman's Ford reported that tires were slashed on six vehicles in its lot sometime last Wednesday night or early Thursday morning. The tires on a vehicle parked at City Hall were also slashed during a similar time period.

Earlier in December, the tires on several vehicles in the downtown area of Falls City were slashed.

A New Year's Resolution

All the political bickering, blocking and gridlocking that went on in Congress during the old year is not what the public wants and certainly not the way we deal with things in Nebraska.

Unfortunately, this is what occurred for most of 2010 in Washington and in the last weeks of the year we rushed to pass tax cuts, the START treaty, and the budget for a year that started 3 months earlier.

In the past year Washington has been more about power and winning elections than about people. Washington has to move away from the extreme division and the political practice of the past year, which has been: It's better to be against everything than to be for anything.

Working Together

I am hopeful that the voice of the people that want us to work together will be heard in 2011.

Polls show 80% of the people want both sides working together. Elections are full of partisanship, but when the election is over the voters send their senators and representatives back to Washington and expect them to work to make people's lives better.

The lame duck session held in December wasn't a waste of time but it was busy because months of partisan delaying tactics left a lot to the end. We worked on jobs, national security, and trying to improve the economy by cutting personal and business tax rates.

And, we passed the START Treaty, which many current and past secretaries of state and defense secretaries and commanders at STRATCOM in Nebraska said was necessary to reduce the number of nuclear missiles. The vote, after more than six days of valuable debate, to ratify this treaty came on a bipartisan vote of 71 to 26. We need more of that in the future.

More Bipartisanship Needed

Almost a year ago I wrote, "Republicans have a responsibility to engage, not sit on the sidelines. And Democrats have a responsibility to make a renewed effort to work across the political aisle. Both parties have a responsibility and an obligation to work together now. It remains to be seen whether or not that will happen."

Well, it didn't happen much. 2010 was a difficult year at best trying to accomplish things for the American people. Working across the aisle is the way to move forward and get things done. I've tried to do that over my 10 years in the Senate and before that during 8 years as governor.

New Year's Resolution

My New Year's resolution is to continue working for solutions that help people's jobs, the economy and to bring down the federal debt in the 112th Congress. I'm hoping that my colleagues on both sides of the aisle and on both sides of the U.S. Capitol are making the same resolution. The country faces many problems and working together is the only way to solve them.

LINCOLN – Lawmakers dealing with the state's approximately \$1 billion budget shortage during the 2011 session of the Legislature face a tough situation.

Don't bleed for them. In the first place, they asked you for the job. In the second place, chances are your local elected officials may well face problems far tougher to solve than those awaiting legislators.

Lawmakers can make enormous reductions in the amount of dollars going to local school districts and other government subspecies, thus cutting state spending and addressing the budget problem, in part. And it's hard to imagine them finding a way to avoid it in 2011.

But in so reducing the state's problem the Legislature transfers financial woe downhill to those other people you elected, the local folks serving in city and county government.

It is local officeholders who must decide whether to tap the citizenry for higher property taxes - or to get rid of however many teachers and/or law enforcement officers, firefighters and other public employees, and programs and projects, to make ends meet.

And what if local governments are already taxing homes and business property at the highest rate allowed by the state? Well, the Legislature can simply give local officials the optional authority to raise the rate, or to propose higher rates to the voters.

And that is how the hottest of political potatoes are tossed from the Tower on the Plains to virtually every community, statewide.

Understanding your state government includes understanding how it impacts your life indirectly through local government. It is easy to envision a frustrated taxpayer confronting a city council member just about anywhere in Nebraska:

"They're cutting spending in Lincoln, but out here you're wanting to raise the taxes on my house!" Obviously, it's not that simple.

The Great Recession might give Nebraskans a taste of what real budget cutting means, locally and in state government

Of particular interest: In this economy, to what degree will Nebraskans in individual communities continue to exercise the option to raise their own property taxes to fund schools or other local programs?


An original thought

The view from here: It's hard to imagine any politician proposing an excise tax on coffee, even when the java costs several dollars.

Full disclosure: Walton and I are the only political writers in Nebraska who remember when the actual, total cost of a cup of coffee was five cents. And a refill or two was always included.



Is Teflon really safe?

DEAR DR. GOTT: My wife is systematically discarding all of our Teflon-coated pots, pans and utensils in response to a perceived concern that Teflon is a health risk.

Furthermore, we are significantly reducing our purchases of canned goods because of the plastic lining or thin film placed inside cans. Plastic ware is also being replaced with glass. Are there any realistic or measurable health issues associated with Teflon and plastic to justify such a concern?

DEAR READER: I had to research the topic carefully because of so many conflicting views on the subject. Let's determine whether we can make some sense of the findings.

In January 2005, CBS Healthwatch covered the Teflon issue, reporting that people throughout the United States could face "a potential risk of developmental and other adverse effects" from exposure to low levels of a chemical used in making the nonstick substance Teflon.

The EPA issued a draft assessment of the possible risks of perfluorooctanoic acid and its salts, known as PFOA, or C8. The agency emphasized its assessment was preliminary and that there were significant uncertainties in its quantitative assessment of the risks of PFOA. Studies performed on animals revealed that PFOA is carcinogenic in rats, but the potential hazard for humans is less certain. The assessment suggested that the chemical targets the liver of rodents and went on to indicate PFOA could raise cholesterol and triglyceride levels in people. DuPont, the maker of Teflon, retaliated, reporting their study failed to disclose any health problems. They further stated their study failed to find an association between elevated PFOA blood levels and liver function, blood counts, prostate cancer, leukemia or multiple myeloma.

Health Watch Center indicates Teflon has received a bad rap of late. The connection between Teflon and serious health problems is tenuous. PFOA is used in the manufacture of the coating, rather than being found in the final product. So it seems coated products can be safe to use as long as we buy good-quality products, don't heat pans to very high temperatures (above 500 F), and use wooden or plastic spoons and spatulas when stirring or turning foods.

Nonstick coatings may begin to deteriorate at temperatures above 500 F. Coatings may decompose and emit fumes. DuPont indicates that Teflon will not decompose until tempera-

tures reach about 600 F, and cooking anything at that temperature would burn food beyond any edible state.

There was an issue a few years ago about birds dying from the inhalation of cooking fumes, regardless of whether it was nonstick or otherwise. Birds have extremely sensitive respiratory systems and should not be in the kitchen or cooking area, so this cannot be blamed on DuPont.

Stainless steel, a combination of several metals, includes nickel, chromium and molybdenum. Should the stainless steel become pitted, those metals have the potential to enter foods. Anodized aluminum, copper, ceramic or other glass cookware may be safe alternatives, but the most widely used one appears to be cast iron. Minimal iron seeps off the utensil and into food products, but the body needs iron to produce red blood cells. It's a safe additive, according to the Food and Drug Administration. The list goes on and on.

Take precautions by using plastic or wood spoons and spatulas when using your nonstick pans so as not to compromise the surfaces, and keep cooking temperatures within a reasonable range.

As far as canned goods and plastic are concerned, I don't believe there is an issue, despite several highly popular e-mails claiming freezing or heating foods in plastic can cause cancer. To the best of my knowledge, no reputable source has ever confirmed this; however, be sure to use only approved plastic containers in the microwave or freezer, as they have received FDA approval for this purpose.

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
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**50 Years Ago in the Journal

Jim Hill's Paint, Glass and Wallpaper celebrated its seventh anniversary with a picture ad of Jim and Charlotte Hill and Louis Hansen.

Regents scholarship winners were: Richard Law, Falls City High; Patrick Goodin, Humboldt; Larry Lanning, Dawson, and Ronald Lockard, Stella.

Bonnie Corning sold her City Cab Co. to Mr. and Mrs. Albert Motsinger. In the three years she had operated it, she had clocked 48,000 miles behind the steering wheel of one of her cabs.

Hank Prater dumped in 24 points as Humboldt defeated Pawnee City, 46-42.

Fred Petersen hit 30 to lead the Falls City Merchants to an 89-55 win over Horton. Joe Aitken scored 19 as Sacred Heart edged Bellwood Marietta 41-40.

Bill D. Mullins resigned the county treasurer's position and Lawrence Wiltse was named to succeed him.

Mr. and Mrs. Benny Sickel, Route 1, were the parents of a son born Jan. 4.

Clark Gable and Jane Russell were starring in "The Tall Man" at the Rivoli and Oil City was showing Doris Day and Rex Harrison in "Midnight Lace."

Hinky Dinky was advertising giant size flour sack kitchen towels, four for \$1 and a large head of cauliflower for 29 cents.

The first limestone quarry in the county was opened by Hopper Bros. south of Humboldt on the Raymond Gergens farm.

Falls City's parking meter revenue for 1960 was \$2,004.

The engagement of Theresa Schultz, Reserve, and Norman Kirkendall, Falls City, was announced.

Ernest Ulmer, Dawson, and now New York City, a pianist supreme, was presented in a New York's Town Hall concert.

An estimated 3,000 persons attended Gov. Frank Morrison's Inaugural Ball. A Falls Cityan (think Charles Simon) was among the 3,000 and a photographer for the Lincoln Star snapped a picture of him dozing in an overstuffed chair.

Postmaster Mel Ernst said 161,945 pieces of mail had been clocked during the three weeks of the Christmas rush.

Several items from the United Press:

Pasadena, CA: Francis D. Loughy left his mother-in-law \$1 and 300 pounds of broken dishes and glasses. Shame on Francis, whose estate amounted to \$375,000.

The State Department opened highways and roads in Lancaster, Pawnee and Richardson Counties to Russian visitors. Previously we apparently had been off limits to the Ruskies.

Phoenix, AZ: Tom Sheridan, president of Home Savings & Loan, learning that some of his employees were drinking vodka during their lunch breaks, posted this memo: "Effective immediately, use of vodka at lunch must stop. I would prefer that if you are going to drink at noon you drink whiskey. I'd prefer to have our customers think you were drunk rather than stupid."

Greg Goltz, Rulo, was in the Army at Ft. Knox, KY.

In JC Penney's January clearance sale men's thermal underwear was selling for \$5.99.

Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Vonderschmidt, Rulo were the parents of a son born Jan. 5.

First Federal Lincoln was paying 7 percent interest on Super Checking accounts.

meeting in January, when the officers "pass the gavel" on to next year's leaders.)

The Jaycees organization is basically for young adults. Members can be male or female, and their ages range from 21 to 40. Some members are single, some are married, and many have families. Several members bring their kids to meetings, and those who do so take turns running after them.

"People can come to as many meetings as they want, and they can be as involved as they want. There are no guilt trips in Jaycees," Jennifer Willman said.

"Well," Jessica laughed, "There might be guilt trips, but we don't take them seriously."

The meetings are informal, and they rarely last more than an hour.

But boy, does this organization get things done in that short amount of time.

The Jaycees run an event in town nearly every month. There's the Distinguished Service Award/passing-of-the-gavel banquet in January, the comedy club in February, and the Easter egg hunt in March/April.

The spring and summer bring the Super Shooters basketball challenge, as well as the Pitch, Hit and Run competition.

In June and July, the Jaycees raise money by selling fireworks in the SunMart parking lot. Then, in August, every Jaycee and all of the roosters (those who have aged out), plus several people who have never even been in Jaycees, convene at the Falls City Riding Club's arena for the Jaycees' two major events — the demo derby and the tractor pull.

In September, the members run the Punt, Pass, and Kick competition, and (usually) in the fall, they organize Jaycees Basketball for kids in grades 4 through 6.

Most of the events mentioned are purely for community development. But several, like the group's two main activities, are fundraisers. The derby and the tractor pull

are on the same weekend, and they require enormous amounts of volunteer time. But the Jaycees have a blast doing them, the events bring thousands of people to town, and they raise nearly \$20,000. And all of the money — ALL OF IT — is given back to the community. NONE OF IT goes out of town.

"That's what I enjoy most about this organization," said member Stacey Bailey. "The feeling that I get when we give all of that money back to Falls City."

All of that money isn't just chump change either. After the Jaycees set aside operational funds for their annual expenses, the amount is still more than \$15,000 each year. Most of the funds are then dispersed at the DSA Banquet (which is scheduled for Jan. 24, 2011), to groups such as the volunteer ambulance squad, the fire department, Summer Rec, and many other groups that could not carry out their own agendas without the commitment and generosity of organizations like the Jaycees.

"The DSA banquet is my favorite event of the year," Jessica said. "I love to watch the looks on peoples' faces when we hand out checks."

For most of the members, making a difference in this community is their primary reason for joining. But there are other reasons as well.

Jennifer Willman said that she just plain has fun at Jaycee events. "Plus, we meet a lot of people, and forge new friendships," she said.

"Many of us were not friends before joining Jaycees, but now, we do things together outside of the organization," Jessica Fischer added.

"But that's not a requirement either," Stefanie said, laughing.

It's clear that good old-fashioned ribbing is a part of this group, but it's also clear that these people care about the organization, and they care about each other. Heck, some people even met their spouses through Jaycees.

But regardless of the reasons for joining, the message that the current members want to spread is this: If you're between the ages of 21 and 40, if you want to make new friends, work hard for great causes, and make a difference in

this community, then this organization needs you.

Membership dues are \$25 annually, then the club adds the other \$25, and the entire \$50 goes to the state chapter. But the dues check is the only check that ever leaves this post office. Every other dime that the organization raises stays here in town.

The members also want people to know that they are currently accepting nominations for the annual DSA banquet, which is coming up soon. The categories include: The Good Neighbor Award, given to a citizen who selflessly helps others, expecting nothing in return; the Robert J. Chabb Community Service Award, given to a person in the emergency services field, or in an emergency situation, who has gone above and beyond the call; the Distinguished Service Award, given to anyone 40 or under who has made a significant contribution to the community over the past year; the Outstanding Community Leader Award, given to the person who has volunteered countless hours to an organization/cause; the Boss of the Year, which is self-explanatory; and the Teacher of the Year, ditto.

Nominating someone is easy. Just send a letter that states why your nominee is awesome, and why he or she deserves to be recognized. Nominations should be sent to: Falls City Jaycees, P.O. Box 202, Falls City, NE 68355. Or, they can be dropped off at the chamber office, or State Farm.

The Jaycees have another message as well. They're currently looking for 8 to 10 acres of land so they can build their own facility for the Demo Derby and Tractor Pull.

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



The Board was furnished with a copy of the project list. Superintendent Heckenlively reported that a large window in the South School breezeway has been replaced by Jim Hill's due to vandalism over the Thanksgiving break; and Trane has been on site to address some HVAC control programming issues at the Middle School in the past month. Superintendent Heckenlively also reported on new gym floors to be installed during the summer months at Middle School and High School and possibly new carpet to be installed in specific areas at Middle School and High School. 2.4c School Improvement Process: Superintendent Heckenlively reported that in October Falls City Public Schools completed the AdvanceEd external review process for district-wide accreditation and has received the final written report from the Quality Assurance Review Team. There were seven standards used for evaluation. One of four categories is assigned to each standard for the evaluation process. They are: Not Evident - The school has not put practices in place or beginning efforts to meet the standard. Some schools have standards ratings at this level. Emerging - The school is beginning to put in place the practices necessary to meet the standard but is not meeting it. Many schools have standards ratings at this level. Operational - Evidence indicates practices and procedures are actively implemented. Many schools have standards ratings at this level. Highly Functional - Evidence indicates practices and procedures are fully integrated and effectively and consistently implemented. A small percentage of schools have standards ratings at this level. Standard 1: Vision and Purpose - Falls City Public Schools rating was Operational. Standard 2: Governance and Leadership - Falls City Public Schools rating was Operational. Standard 3: Teaching and Learning - Falls City Public Schools rating was Operational. Standard 4: Documenting and Using Results - Falls City Public Schools rating was Operational. Standard 5: Resources and Support Systems - Falls City Public Schools rating was Operational. Standard 6: Stakeholder Communications and Relationships - Falls City Public Schools rating was Operational. Standard 7: Commitment to Continuous Improvement - Falls City Public Schools rating was Emerging. Commendations - The Quality Assurance Review Team commended the Falls City Public Schools for the following strengths and accomplishments. While additional strengths are noted in the detailed review of each standard that appears in the final report, the commendations listed below are the strengths that the team believes are most deserving of being highlighted. 1. The district is an active partner in advancing economic development of the greater Falls City community. The district partners with various community civic groups toward serving youth and families, including the Library and Arts Center and the Ball Park Complex. It also cooperates with the Community Medical Center, Southeast Community College, and Peru State College to make dual credit and certificate programs available to Falls City High School students. Beyond these youth-focused community engagements, the district is also an active partner in Falls City Economic Development and Growth Enterprises, Inc. (EDGE). The main purpose of this group is to actively develop the community's economic base. The future viability of both the community and the school district requires the continued collaborative commitment of all parties, as they are intertwined. 2. For many years, students have demonstrated excellence in writing at all levels throughout the school system. Since the 2003-2004 testing, over 75% of all students tested have met the Nebraska cut score for writing. Results of the past four years are even more impressive, with over 91% of all students meeting the standards. Three different grade levels tested during this time had the entire class - 100% of Falls City students - meeting the standard. On-going success in writing indicates that students can also succeed in other areas, such as math and science, through the concerted efforts of Falls City Schools. 3. The district has the technology infrastructure in place to make the next leap forward to advance teaching and learning. The district is well positioned to achieve present and future instructional technology goals. There is currently one computer for every 2.3 students. SmartBoards are in place in many classrooms and in all buildings. Administrators, board members, teachers, and students in grades 3-12 are assigned and utilize district email addresses. Parents have access to student records and achievement data via PowerSchool. Extensive training opportunities for technology are made available to users in the district. In addition, the "Fiber to the Home" project under way by Southeast Nebraska Communications offers the potential for the entire community to be connected in the near future. Structural elements required to systemically infuse technology in the

teaching and learning process throughout the district are currently in place. 4. Students enjoy excellent learning environments in all grades and buildings in Falls City Public Schools. The school facilities are appropriately designed, spacious, and properly equipped. Instructional materials and resources are abundant. All district schools are well-maintained and clean. Students and staff feel safe. Dedicated and caring faculty and staff make all schools pleasant spaces for students and adults to work and learn. Student achievement is enhanced by the healthy learning environments provided by the district. Required Actions - In addition to the commendations, the Quality Assurance Review Team identified the following required actions for improvement. The team focused its required actions on those areas that, if addressed, will have the greatest impact on improving student performance and overall effectiveness of the school district. The Falls City Public Schools will be held accountable for making progress on each of the required actions noted. Following the review, the school district will be asked to submit a progress report on these required actions. 1. Formalize a systematic district-wide approach and protocol for continuous improvement planning to align efforts at all levels and schools toward systemic growth in student achievement and organizational effectiveness. The district has a School Improvement Committee in place that includes representation from administration, faculty, and all schools. Subcommittees for data, goals, and research review study performance data, identify goals, and research potential interventions. The resulting improvements have been episodic rather than systemic. There are no established improvement plans for either the district or individual schools. The Board of Education has formally adopted goals, but without an implementation plan for achieving them. An established improvement process, leading to the development of clearly articulated, written district and school improvement plans designed to foster systemic, sustainable growth, is a prerequisite for achieving excellence throughout the district and its schools. Next Steps - The school district will: 1. Review and discuss the findings from this report with all stakeholders; 2. Ensure that plans are in place to embed and sustain the strengths noted in the commendations section to maximize their impact on the school district; 3. Develop action plans to address the required actions made by the team. Include methods for monitoring progress toward the required actions; 4. Use the report to guide and strengthen the school district's efforts to improve student performance and district effectiveness; 5. Two years following the Quality Assurance Review, submit the Accreditation Progress Report detailing progress made toward addressing the required actions. The report will be reviewed at the state and national level to ensure that significant progress is being made toward the required actions. Lack of progress can result in a change in accreditation status; 6. Continue to meet the AdvancED accreditation standards, submit required reports, engage in continuous improvement, and document results. Proposed Mission, Vision and Belief Statements: The Board of Education will receive the proposed District Mission, Vision, and Belief Statements developed by a committee of FCPS stakeholders. A presentation will occur during the January regular school board meeting and an action item will provide the opportunity for the Board of Education to discuss, ask questions, and formally adopt the new district statements. This is an integral piece to the continuous school improvement process and will provide the foundation and direction for the Falls City Public Schools as we move into the future. 2.4d Assessment Results: Superintendent Heckenlively reported that the executive directors of NSEA, NASB and NCSA received an e-mail with attachments from Governor Heineman with regard to the reading assessment results. The Governor prepared five files containing his analysis of individual schools and corresponding assessment results. The Board was furnished with a copy of Governor Heineman's analysis and files which are categorized by NSAA classification. Falls City is 11th out of 43 Districts listed for Class C-1. 2.4e Board/District Goals: Superintendent Heckenlively furnished the Board with a list of current Board/District Goals and an update toward progress. The Board/District Goals will be discussed and reviewed as an agenda item at the Annual Board/Administrative Council Planning Workshop in February. 2.4f Transportation re: Bus purchase: Superintendent Heckenlively stated that one route bus needs rotated out and replaced. This is the rotation for 2010-2011 and 2011-2012. The timeline would include requesting bids in January with a February or March Board approval process. Fifty percent of the estimated purchase price of a new bus has been budgeted for 2010-2011 while the other 50% will be budgeted in the 2011-2012 budget, with a Fall, 2011 delivery date. Spreading the payments out over two budget years is the method Falls City Public School has used in the past for bus purchasing. 2.4g Update on P-16 Initiative: Superintendent Heckenlively reported that the P-16 Initiative, a statewide effort led by Governor Heineman and Commissioner Breed, is focused on eight goals supporting pre-school through a four-year college program.

Four of the eight goals are K-12 directed and four goals are for higher education. The goals announced by the educational leaders are designed to prepare Nebraska students for the 21st century through educational success while helping ensure our state's economic vitality through the future work force. The four K-12 goals include 1) Adopting a college and career preparation core curriculum that requires four years of English and three years each of Math, Science, and Social Studies in Nebraska school districts by the 2014-2015 school year. 2) Eliminate the achievement gap between Nebraska's K-12 Caucasian students and its African American, Hispanic, and Native American students. 3) Develop an effective longitudinal data system that provides information on the Nebraska education system from preschool through post-graduate degree attainment and entry into the workforce to help align resources with strategic goals. And, 4) Attain a high school graduation rate of 90% or higher in each Nebraska high school.

Understanding Priorities

In the roughest economy since the Great Depression, there is legitimate concern about the fiscal health of our state. Some state senators are warning that there may be a huge decrease in state aid to schools for the following year. Their argument is that other state agencies have had to make cuts in their budgets and it is now time for schools to "feel the pain." This sentiment has been repeated over and over in discussions with some policy-makers.

Feel the pain? Really? Which parent wants their child's education to be shortchanged enough for them to feel pain? Most parents would go into debt, take another job, or make major changes in their lifestyle to avoid an adverse effect on the education — and the future — of their children. If our policy-makers do not understand this, they miss the point of priorities.

Now at Risk

In the Nebraska Hall of Fame in the Capitol Building in Lincoln, there is a bust of Gov. Robert W. Furnas, who also served as first president of the Nebraska State Teachers Association. Furnas helped write the first school law while in the Nebraska Territorial Legislature, started the first school board in the state, and served as president of the first Board of Regents for the University of Nebraska. He understood the value of education for this state. His priority was education. Now that priority is at risk.

Some are suggesting that, considering the economy, a cut of more than \$100 million in state aid to our schools would be a reasonable number. After looking at effects of cuts to our schools and colleges, the question is whether any cut is reasonable. Incredibly, those who would allow schools...and students...to "feel the pain" must believe that a cut in state support for our schools would not have any real effect on students.

Loss of Teaching Jobs

The largest single expenditure in any school budget is the cost of teaching staff. That is exactly as it should be. For our children, teachers are the most important ingredient in any school. And cuts in school funding threaten the jobs of dedicated and qualified teachers. Cuts in state aid mean students will feel the effects. The pain of cuts for students will be the result of the inability of schools and colleges to attract highly qualified teachers. It also means the loss of teaching positions and resulting increased class sizes or the outright elimination of classes that students need. Up-to-date text books, teaching materials, and the maintenance and repair of clean and safe buildings are just some of the other effects on student learning.

Message Spread

In 1932, during the Great Depression, Nebraska legislators proposed both an income tax and a sales tax — just to bolster support for our schools. They understood priorities...even in a depression. This is the message that every parent, grandparent, teacher, school bus driver, real estate agent, or packing-house worker...everyone who cares about students of any age...must spread: This is the worst possible time to cut back on funding for our schools and colleges. Equalizing pain is not good judgment in any public policy. Spreading the pain of our economy to the education and future of our children is not fair or equal — it is both educational and economic nonsense.

These are tough economic times. But tough times do not mean that we change our priorities. It is exactly the time we keep those priorities safe. Our economic, social, and ethical priority should always be the sound education of young people. If we can't find other places to cut spending, it simply means that education is not a genuine priority. Don't mince words with this message. And don't neglect to say it. Letting our students "feel the pain" is not the legacy we want to leave for our children. And it is not the future we want for them...or for this state.

The 5-5 Irish defeated Mound City, 48-30, in front of a large crowd littered with people who came out to see Schawang. Unfortunately, at least for this night, there was not much "star gazing," as Schawang struggled offensively and finished the game with zero points.

SH's defense was terrific in slowing down not only Schawang, but the rest of the Panthers as well. Every shot was challenged and the Irish rebounded well limiting Mound City to one shot most of the night.

"We just wanted to stay in front of him and not let him get to the rim," said coach Doug Goltz. "They have two or three players that are good at beating close-outs and getting to the rim. Our defense was very good - to allow only 30 points was big."

Reed Barnhill started the scoring for the Irish knocking down a three from the right wing to give FCSH a 3-2 lead. Freshman Matt Goltz added two tough buckets inside and then with less than 30 seconds to go in the first, Reed knocked down another three to give the Irish a 16-10 lead after the first quarter. Panther fans had to feel good about their chances, as Schawang was 0-4 from the floor in the first half and had

missed his only two free throws.

"I like when we make the extra pass to someone who has a better shot, but I don't like when guys pass up shots and make a weak pass that leads to two points the other way."

The win gives the Irish confidence heading into Mudecas next week. First up though is Diller-Odell (3-6) tomorrow.

"Confidence comes with success. Winning makes guys buy in a little more - they focus better, practice harder and play with more energy," said Goltz.
