

Volunteers needed for Thanksgiving Basket Ministry

Thanksgiving baskets to those in need in our community and area will be delivered on the Sunday before Thanksgiving, Nov. 24.

This annual event is a joint ministry of area churches, sponsored by the Falls City Area Ministerial Association, in coordination with Southeast Nebraska Community Action. A list of needed items is included in this article. However, cash donations are preferred because needed items for the baskets in bulk quantities can be purchased. Please remember, it is easier to pack the baskets, if we are buying items of the same kind and size. Checks can be made to "FCAMA" with the notation "Food," and can be sent to FCAMA, P.O. Box 132, Falls City, NE 68355.

Donated food may be brought to individual churches to be delivered to St. Thomas Episcopal Church, 16th and Harlan St., or may be left at St. Thomas from 10 a.m.-6 p.m. Monday through Friday, Nov. 16-18. The drop-off point will be inside the southeast door marked for that purpose.

Donated items that are past the "sell by" date will not be distributed.

Items needed are: Canned green beans, canned corn, canned yams or sweet potatoes, mushroom soup, cranberry sauce, instant potatoes, canned fruit, corn muffin mix, macaroni and cheese mix, and packaged spaghetti. Please, no pie filling.

Volunteers are urgently needed to pack and deliver the food boxes. The packing will take place in the basement of St. Thomas at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 19. The baskets will be delivered following 2 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 20, Community Thanksgiving Service at St. Thomas. Volunteers do not need to attend the Thanksgiving Service, but they need to be in the church basement by 3 p.m.

A Thanksgiving Basket can be requested by leaving a message, with name address, phone number, and number in household on the FCAMA Help Line, 402-245-6111. This needs to be done by Wednesday, Nov. 16!

This is a great opportunity to give your time, energy, and resources to help meet a need that is year-round, but is especially felt at this time of feasting. Remember that Jesus told us, "Whatever you do for the least of these...you do for me." (Matthew 25:40).

Col. Chick James keynote speaker this Veteran's Day

The Nov. 11 Celebration for Veterans Day 2016 in Falls City will begin in the Falls City High School gym, with an 11 a.m. Friday program and speech by retired Army Colonel and Vietnam War veteran Dr. Charles "Chick" James Jr.

Dr. James grew up in Falls City, graduating from FCHS in 1963, and has practiced dentistry at his 2107 Stone Street office for nearly four decades. He's a Falls Citian if there ever was one, but well-traveled at the same time. After high school but preceding dental

school, starting a family and returning home to practice, Col. James served his country in a foreign land poles apart — quite figuratively and literally — from Falls City, Nebraska: Indochina. In the Vietnam War, fresh-faced American boys fought an unseen foe that employed unorthodox guerrilla tactics in the thick of relentless jungles and hostile deltas previously explored by only the Vietnamese who lived there. A generation of U.S. troops either came of age or met an untimely end during the prolonged fight; Col. James was one of the lucky ones. Twenty-seven

Expecting record voter turnout

Secretary of State John Gale says he anticipates that a record number of voters will cast ballots in the general election. That said, Gale admits it has been harder this time to predict the percentage of voter turnout.

Voter registration has reached 1,211,449, a new record and 46,000 more than for the 2016 primary. Gale said that predicting voter turnout has been a trickier process this year, not only due to the large increase in voter registration, but also due to the fact that early voting, while steady, has not been the surge expected.

"Based on what the counties reported recently, approximately 137,000 ballots have been returned by mail or voted in person. That number is certain to go up, but from what we see, many people are still holding onto ballots."

Mailed ballots must be received by the close of polls on Nov. 8 to be counted. Early in-person voting will conclude on Nov. 7. Gale said it appears that the

majority of voting Nebraskans will be sticking with the tradition of going to the polls on Election Day.

"In the 2008 presidential election, 811,923 people voted. In 2012, 804,245 people voted. Voter turnout was 70 percent and 69 percent, respectively," Gale noted. "However, voter registration was significantly lower in those years. We will need at least 848,000 Nebraskans to vote this year, to reach a turnout of 70 percent."

In preparation for the upcoming election, county officials recently wrapped up their mock elections. In addition to testing the logic and accuracy of the tabulation equipment, the process gives counties the chance to practice loading election results onto a website managed by the Secretary of State. Two sets of randomly voted fictional ballots are sent to the website by the counties and one set by the vendor.

Chautauqua Night performances net \$880 for St. Jude's Children's Hospital

Falls City Middle School's eighth grade class collected \$880 during their 9th annual Chautauqua Night performances Oct. 20, and the money will be donated to St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, TN.

Since the first Chautauqua in 2008, the project has raised more than \$6,700 for charitable causes, benefitting both local folks and others around the world. Teachers Kory Huppert and Jack Munford have spear-headed and organized the popular Chautauqua events.

This year's topic was Celebrating 150 Years of Nebraska. Historical figures from the state, such as Marlon Brando, Warren Buffett, Johnny Carson, President Gerald Ford, Red Cloud, John Sterling Morton, and Tom Osborne, to name a few, were recreated.

"After more than two weeks of researching, writing, and practicing by the eighth grade students, their effort was rewarded with a highly educational experience and the satisfaction of knowing they have helped raise money for a worthy cause," Munford said.

The eighth graders voted to donate their earnings this year to St. Jude's, which leads the way the world understands, treats and defeats childhood cancer and other life-threatening diseases.

The students thanked the community and school for their contributions and support.



Falls City Middle School eighth grader Brock Hogue is Dr. Tom Osborne, the legendary Nebraska football coach who in 25 seasons built a program on more than winning. Though, his teams won A LOT. All 25 of his Husker teams won nine games and played in a bowl, with 15 winning 10 or more games. His .836 winning percentage (255-49-3) was the nation's best at the time of his retirement in 1998. His career came to an end with a national championship, NU's third in four years, and the best five-year run in college football history (60-3). Furthermore, Osborne's program totaled 65 Academic All-Americans - more than any other program has in their schools' entire history. Notre Dame has the second-most academic All-Americans, with 50, dating back to 1952. Brock personified T.O. at the 9th annual FCMS Chautauqua Night Oct. 20.

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





Vote NO on SCC \$369 Million Bond Issue

Taxpayers in Richardson County shouldn't be disrespected. But that's exactly what's happening with Southeast Community College's \$369 million bond measure. To ask for \$369 million in new taxes (more than half a billion once interest is added) is another example of taxpayers being viewed as an endless supply of money. Everyone knows there is major frustration with skyrocketing property taxes, except apparently SCC. I encourage everyone to vote NO on this massive tax increase Nov. 8. Over the last 10 years SCC has already increased their property tax collection by 207 percent in Richardson County. That's not a misprint, 207 percent!

Most of us already have plenty of bills to pay and I'm guessing few, if any of us, saw our income increase 207 percent over the last 10 years. Most of us are working very hard to make ends meet and need every dollar we have to help pay for things we need for us and our families, like groceries, clothes, housing expenses, etc. In 2015, SCC collected more than a million dollars in property taxes from Richardson County taxpayers. If this bond measure passes, SCC is expected, at a minimum, to take another \$13 million out of the pockets of Richardson County taxpayers by the time we're finished paying off this bond. We all have personal budgets. We have to determine what are wants, what are needs, and what we can afford. If we can do that, SCC can too. This \$369 million bond is wish list of facility wants, including a brand new downtown campus in Lincoln. None of the new money in the bond even accounts for the costs associated with ongoing operations, maintenance and staffing for new facilities, which will bring additional costs as well. Even more concerning is the fact that if this bond passes, SCC still has state granted authority that can be used to raise property taxes even more, without having to go to the people. Voting against SCC's \$369 million bond is not a vote against education or progress. It's a vote to demonstrate taxpayers deserve to be respected by entities wanting our tax dollars. We can't afford SCC's wish list. I'm voting NO on SCC's \$369 million tax increase and I ask others to join me in doing that on Nov. 8.

'Vote for Education for Everyone'

The good news is Nebraska's economy is growing, adding 70,000 new jobs in the last 6 years. The bad news is we do not have enough workers to fill available jobs. "It's a dog-eat-dog world just trying to find qualified applicants to fill positions so we can continue to grow" according to Matthew Wegener, cofounder of Turbine Flats, a business startup incubator - just the kind of business we need in Nebraska to create jobs and entrepreneurial opportunities for our young people. With Nebraska's unemployment rate hovering 30 percent below the national average, Jim Waugh, President of the Omaha Southwest Iowa Building and Construction Trades Council observed, "We see a lot of people who come through the community colleges as the next generation of construction workers. We are looking hard right now for workers and they are not out there".

Southeast Community College trains our high school graduates and older adults for the jobs being created by Nebraska's employers. In 1971, the Nebraska legislature created the community college system to provide technical and academic transfer programs. SCC was formed to serve 15 counties in southeast Nebraska. With campuses in Milford, Beatrice and Lincoln, SCC has a current enrollment of over 14,000 students. SCC serves a very diverse student population including first generation students, older students, low income students, and many other student populations that are under served. SCC represents a second chance for many individuals who could not afford other higher education institutions and/or are not prepared for a four-year program. SCC's programs are among the most affordable and accessible programs available in Nebraska and surrounding states. But SCC needs to invest in facilities in order to continue to serve its students. Enrollment waiting lists for welding and allied health professions often extend two years or longer. Beatrice and Milford campus facilities date back over 50 years and were never designed for the programs or technology now used to train today's workers. The Beatrice Campus is simply inadequate to carry out the high tech instruction required for today's agriculture. SCC needs to invest in learning centers to bring educational programs closer to students across its 15 county service area. The facilities master plan has been carefully designed to position SCC to strengthen the communities throughout southeast Nebraska. All communities in the 15 county service area will benefit by having affordable access to higher education and by having the ability to hire qualified workers in career and technical fields. SCC has done an excellent job managing its resources averaging tax levies well below the state cap and below the levies assessed by other community colleges. "Unfortunately the board has no alternative for paying for the bond issue than relying on property taxes" (Lincoln Journal Star Oct. 19, 2016). Putting off this decision will result in unfilled jobs, slower economic growth and lost educational opportunities for our young people. I urge you to help make educational opportunities available for everyone in southeast Nebraska. Vote for Education for Everyone. Vote for the SCC bond issue.

of his U.S. Military Academy classmates didn't come home.

He was accepted into West Point, NY, and commissioned in 1968, moving to Ft. Benning, GA, for the grueling nine-week Ranger School, as well as Airborne Training. He landed in Vietnam in July 1970.

"By the time we were sophomores (at West Point), we knew that as soon as we graduated, we were headed for Vietnam. That was it - war was on. We were trained for it and we were doing our job," he said during a Journal interview in 2013.

"You could tell just by looking at somebody if they were new in Vietnam," James said. "In a very short amount of time, you could see it in their eyes. War changes you. I came back with a higher level of maturity and an attitude of 'how hard can it be (after surviving Vietnam)? I was glad to be going home in one piece," he said.

In Vietnam, then-Cpt. James was Commanding Officer of his Field Artillery Unit stationed in western Vietnam, close to the Cambodian border. The unit lost zero men, "which was very fortunate," and James earned a Vietnam Service Medal with two Bronze SVC Stars and A Vietnam Campaign Medal with 60 Device. James got out of the military in 1978 but re-enlisted with the Reserves in Ft. Riley, KS, about 10 years later. He made Major in 1994, Lt. Colonel in 1998 and Colonel in 2001. He retired in 2005.

FC High School will host Dr. James and all local veterans and their spouses prior to the program, at 10 a.m., with rolls and coffee in the commons area.

Veterans Day activities will continue in the afternoon, with a parade down Stone Street at 1:30 p.m. In the evening, all veterans and their spouses are invited to attend a dinner at 6 p.m. at the First United Methodist Church, 17th and

Harlan Sts. Please enter the church through the south alley door. A free will donation is requested.

Flags will be flown around the Courthouse square to honor veterans both deceased and living. Please join the VFW and VFW Auxiliary in honoring Dr. James and all our local veterans this year.

The numbers are transmitted to the secure website, to make sure the count is being displayed correctly for each candidate and issue on the statewide ballot.

Gale said the mock election went as smoothly as it has for previous elections. It is one step to ensuring the security of the election night reporting process. "If a machine is not working as it should, this gives the county time to work with the vendor to determine what corrections need to be made."

Once the polls close on Election Day, election results from the statewide races as well as the total vote on Referendum No. 426 will be published live at: <http://www.sos.ne.gov>. They will be updated every five minutes.

The website reflects the unofficial results. Gale said the official results of the election are based on paper ballots tabulated by each county and then certified by their canvassing boards.

"That's another secure feature of the state's election system. It's impossible to alter all of the statewide and local results, because they are tabulated and transmitted by the counties individually. They are not linked in any way."

Farm Family Supports SCC Bond



The need to modernize the SCC facilities on the Beatrice campus includes a new Ag center to reflect an agricultural industry of today and tomorrow. Currently, 40 year old facilities are used for farming, livestock handling and management. That would be like asking you to use a 1975 3-row 3300 John Deere combine. Yes, you could get the job done, but is this the most efficient, productive way to farm in 2016?

UNMC awarded nearly \$20 million for national center

The University of Nebraska Medical Center/Nebraska Medicine have been awarded \$19.8 million by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to develop a Training, Simulation and Quarantine Center to teach federal health care personnel procedures in treating highly infectious diseases and to create a place to monitor persons who have received a high-risk exposure to a highly infectious disease, such as Ebola.

"UNMC is a worldwide leader in the fight against Ebola and other highly infectious diseases, and this funding will strengthen their ability to share their knowledge with the broader health care community," Ashford, who helped lead the push for the funding in Congress, said.

"This federal investment in UNMC is the result of strong collaboration between UNMC, the entire Omaha community, the state of Nebraska and our federal delegation."

UNMC applied for the competitive funding, which stipulated that only "U.S. hospitals that have safely and successfully cared for patients with Ebola, for the full duration of their illness" were eligible. UNMC's primary clinical partner, Nebraska Medicine, treated patients with Ebola during 2014-2015 and received nationwide attention for its success during the crisis.

In its proposal, UNMC expressed its intention to leverage its expertise, experience and institutional commitment - in partnership with the Office of the Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response - to establish the center at UNMC/Nebraska Medicine. The UNMC Training, Simulation and Quarantine Center will be a state-of-the-art training and simulation center and will include a dedicated quarantine center, co-located on campus with the Nebraska Biocontainment Unit.

The national center at UNMC/Nebraska Medicine will fulfill a critical training need for government health care workers as well as create a unique purpose-built U.S. quarantine facility to serve the nation's needs.

Principal investigators on the project are Chris Kratochvil, M.D., associate vice chancellor for clinical research, John Lowe, Ph.D., director of research for the Nebraska Biocontainment Unit, and Shelly Schwedhelm, executive director of emergency preparedness for Nebraska Medicine.

"UNMC and Nebraska Medicine are proud to receive this award to develop training, simulation and quarantine services for the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services person-

nel," Dr. Kratochvil said. "Our campus is dedicated to the mission of preparedness, training and treatment, and we are pleased to have the support of the state and county officials, our community, our district Congressman Ashford and the entire Nebraska Congressional delegation."

To support ASPR's plan to achieve unified, interdisciplinary, multilevel preparedness for the next biologic threat, UNMC/Nebraska Medicine proposed a collaboration of state, local and federal resources to establish the national asset at UNMC/Nebraska Medicine for experiential training and quarantine.

During the Ebola outbreak, UNMC/Nebraska Medicine was recognized as a national asset and referred to as the "gold standard" for treatment and for developing training safety protocols to handle Ebola and high infectious diseases.

"In 2014, when the world needed us, Nebraska Medicine was here," said Nebraska Medicine CEO Daniel DeBehnke, M.D., M.B.A. "We saw during that crisis the importance of preparation. This grant helps us prepare for what's next, so Nebraska will again be ready not only to help, but to lead the way in teaching others how to help."

Construction of the \$102 million, 183,742-square-foot facility will begin in the next several months with completion scheduled for September 2018.

The TSQC will occupy the 30,000-square-foot first floor of the building, a highly advanced simulation facility designed to transform the training of health care professionals and develop new methods for improving human performance and effectiveness. It will leverage the other advanced simulation floors of the facility to provide additional value and exceptional training.

The TSQC will also provide training for federal employees and will feature interprofessional collaboration spaces, three-dimensional/virtual immersive technology, augmented reality, advanced clinical simulation, pre- and post-briefing rooms, and dedicated biocontainment patient care training space.

In addition to the advanced training and simulation features, the TSQC will offer a comprehensive infectious disease training program developed by key subject matter experts, scientists and educators. The training program will be responsive to the training needs of government health care workers responding to infectious disease threats in both resource-rich domestic settings as well as austere international environments.

What about soil sampling?

With a number of areas receiving heavy rains this growing season, there was potential for nutrients to be lost through erosion, leaching or denitrification. You may want to consider soil sampling fields for nutrients, such as phosphorus and potassium, but especially nitrogen. Crop yields are quite variable this year, with some very good to excellent yields and others just average. With commodity prices down and a lot of grain in storage, the prospect isn't real bright for better prices next year. With today's high input costs and lower commodity prices, it is important to use fertilizer wisely and be as efficient as possible. With generally excellent soybean yields in southeast Nebraska in 2016, don't forget to apply this nitrogen credit for your 2017 corn crop.

Nutrient deficiencies in soil can also have a significant impact on yields of both corn and soybeans. If you soil sample, you may be able to save on your fertilizer bill for next year. Soil pH can have a real impact on nutrient availability and consequently reduce yields, particularly soybeans. Liming could help improve the availability of nutrients in your fields and help improve yields. This is why soil sampling is important. If you have fields that have not been sampled for several years, it may be a good time to sample these fields.

Under irrigation where yields are usually less variable than dryland crops, there is heavy removal of nutrients in the grain that may need to be replaced for next year's crops. Soil sampling in the fall or winter also allows for more time in planning limestone and fertilizer programs for the coming year. The UNL publication EC117 "Fertilizer Suggestions for Corn" provides excellent advice for sound fertilizer management and gives you the tools to make sound decisions on fertilizer needs for corn. This publication can be accessed on the web at: <http://agronomy.unl.edu/faculty/ferguson/ec117.pdf>

University of Nebraska-Lincoln Extension also has a nitrogen calculator available on the web you can use to calculate nitrogen needs for your corn crop. With generally excellent soybean yields in southeast Nebraska in 2016, don't forget to apply this nitrogen credit for your 2017 corn crop. If you go to this link: <http://cropwatch.unl.edu/soils> and then click on Corn Nitrogen Recommendations Calculator, you will be able to access this tool.

Alice Cleaver paintings finds a home in Falls City

The Library and Community Foundation of Richardson County is the beneficiary of three Santa Fe Southwest paintings done by Alice Cleaver. One of the key missions of the Foundation is to preserve the rich history of Richardson County through the art that has been donated for over 100 years to the Library. The collection is extensive and continues to grow with many wonderful donations being made in the past five years including large donations by Merle Stalder and the Richardson County Bank and Trust. The Foundation prides itself in securing, preserving and at times conserving the works of art in the collection. The art in the collection is also available for loan to museums and galleries. Currently the John Falter "Heroes" series for the Esquire magazine is on display at the Museum of Nebraska Art.

On Friday, Nov. 4 the Stalder Gallery will present Santa Fe Southwest, paintings by Alice Cleaver both donated and on loan to the Library and Community Foundation of Richardson County. The works on display in the Stalder Gallery were painted by Alice Cleaver on her two trips to the Southwest. Three of the works were recently donated to the Library and Community Foundation of Richardson County. Jan Tynan, wife of the late Robert Tynan, donated an Al-

ice Cleaver painting that was part of the collection of Cleaver's from her mother-in-law Helen Wheeler Tynan of Falls City. Mrs. Tynan has donated work to the Museum of Nebraska Art in Kearney, Nebraska as well. We are most grateful for her contribution to the collection. The Tynan painting is an excellent example of Cleaver's paintings of the Native American of the pueblo.

Two of the Alice Cleaver paintings came to the collection via memorial of Phyllis Fischer by her husband, Joe Dougherty as well as friends and family in her honor. Phyllis was a native to Falls City and a 1977 graduate of Falls City High School. She spent most of her adult life in the Southwest, specifically Arizona. Upon her death on Nov. 3, 2015, her husband, with the help of Library Director Hope Schawang, organized her memorials for the purchase of two southwest Cleaver paintings. The Cleaver paintings were discovered to be for sale from a California collector by Karen Nunn, cousin to Alice Cleaver. Local Cleaver enthusiast facilitated in completing the transaction and the paintings were shipped to Falls City. One of the paintings is a study for a painting that was in the Santa Fe Railroad collection. Both paintings exemplify the works done by Alice Cleaver during the expansion of tourism to the Southwest by the railroads.

Once the paintings arrived in Falls City became clear that they needed to be looked at for recommendation on conservation and preservation of the over 100 year old paintings. Kenneth Bé, of the Gerald Ford Conservatory in Omaha, was consulted for the conservation. Kenneth has been instrumental in the cleaning and preservation of the John Falter paintings belonging to the Nebraska State Historical Society. Conservation work is labor intensive and expensive. Donations by Steve and Linda Yoder were made in honor of Phyllis Fischer for conservation as well as donations by the Arts and Humanities Council of Richardson County, the Library and Community Foundation of Richardson County and the Stalder Foundation. Patrons are encouraged to consider the Library and Community Foundation of Richardson County as a place to donate works of art for preservation and for use in exhibitions in the Stalder Gallery and in other museums. The Foundation has a board of members who review and accept works of art into the collection. For more information concerning this process please contact curator, Christina Wertenberger.

The Santa Fe Southwest Alice Cleaver exhibit will open with a gallery talk by conservator Kenneth Bé on Friday, Nov. 4. Gallery doors will open at 6:00 p.m. with a light reception and Kenneth Bé will talk about the work of Alice Cleav-

However on third and one from the Bulldog 15 yard line Harring fumbled the ball while fighting for extra yardage. Three plays later on third and long Noah Keller stepped in front of a Bulldog pass to get an interception and set the Irish up at the Friend 24 yard line. Two plays later Harring carried right, untouched into the end zone for the touchdown. The conversion run by Harring was also

good and the Irish had an 8-0 lead with 5:33 to go in the first quarter.

As was the case all night the Irish defense shut Friend down and SH would get the ball back at their own 24 yard line. This time the Irish moved down the field 56 yards in 10 plays, capping the drive off with a 18 yard touchdown run again by Harring. The conversion run by Bippes was good and the Irish led 16-0 with :10 to go in the opening quarter.

On their next possession the Irish again began at their own 24 yard line. This time the Irish went 56 yards in five plays for the score. From 31 yards out Harring took the handoff, broke a couple of tackles, got down to about the five yard line broke another tackle and went into the end zone for the touchdown. The conversion carry by Austin Ahern was good and the Irish now led 24-0 with 7:15 to go in the half.

Sacred Heart would force Friend into another punt, which was a fake, but Brandon Scheitel wasn't fooled as he stuck with the ball carrier and came away with the ball. The play set the Irish up at the Bulldog 26 yard line to begin their drive. After a 20 yard carry up the middle by Bippes, Sean Arnold took the handoff and ran left inside of the pylon for the touchdown. Bippes then completed a pass under pressure to Emerson Keithley in the corner of the end zone for the conversion and

the Irish had a commanding 32-0 lead.

The Irish weren't done yet. The Irish forced Friend into yet another punt but senior Michael Keithley busted through the line and not only blocked the punt attempt but recovered it and ran it in for a 13 yard touchdown with 1:37 remaining in the first half. The PAT kick by Emerson Keithley was good and the Irish would go into the half with a 39-0 lead.

SH received the kickoff to begin the second half and began their drive at the 25 yard line. On the second play of the drive Bippes faked a handoff to Harring and kept the ball, running down the right sideline for a 50 yard touchdown run with 10:35 to go in the third quarter.

The Irish JV would take over for the remainder of the game with the Irish leading 46-0. On SH's next drive the offense would move down the field 45 yards in seven plays for the score. This time William Morehead would carry it in from one yard out. The PAT was good and with 2:10 left in the third quarter the Irish led 53-0.

On the next Bulldog possession Tristan Keithley picked off the Friend pass attempt and returned it back to the Bulldog 13 yard line. Three plays later Freshman Jake Hoy would run it in from 12 yards out for the score putting the Irish up 59-0. The Bulldogs offense was shut down all night by the Irish defense. On the next drive Tanner Cromer of the Irish would get a piece of the punt and Jamie Stice would pick up the ball and race 30 yards for the score making it a 67-0 lead with 8:23 to go in the game.

SH would finish the scoring on the next Bulldog drive when Jake Hoy scooped up a fumble and ran 44 yards for the final score of the game. Austin Sells ran the conversion in and the final score would end up SH 75, Friend 0.

The Irish will be on the road this Wednesday taking on the Osceola Bulldogs. The Bulldogs are currently 8-1 on the year with their only loss coming to BDS 72-42 in the first week of the season. Osceola will run a single wing offense primarily but they will put the QB under center some times.

"They have a huge line that they

run behind. Their direct snap to their FB is a play they have hurt teams with a lot. They also run lots of sweeps with the QB or HB to the perimeter," said coach Goltz.

The Irish will have their hands full this week. Osceola puts 6'3" 300 lb John Surber on both the offensive and defensive lines. Also the Bulldogs HB and FB are averaging over 10 yards a carry this season.

"Their line from E to E is bigger than any team we have faced," said Goltz.

The Irish have been a very well rounded team this season. Coach Goltz hopes that makes them more difficult to prepare for.

"We want to be able to attack the entire field and also spread the ball around to all our athletes. We can also run up behind our big line that has steadily improved. We are not reliant on one player so that should make us difficult to prepare for. We feel like we can run it or pass it depending on what the defense is giving us," stated Goltz.

The Irish take on the Osceola Bulldogs this Wednesday, Nov. 2 at 4:00 p.m.

by Ashland-Greenwood. FC bounced back nicely with a win over Fairbury at Jug Brown Stadium. It was the only loss of the season for the Jeffs heading into the playoffs. With the help of eight turnovers Lincoln Christian defeated the Tigers by a 20-14 score. The following week the Tigers were upset by the Auburn Bulldogs on Homecoming by a score of 15-14. The Tigers responded well the next two weeks with road victories against Conestoga and Louisville. Then with a playoff berth and district title on the line the Tigers fell to Syracuse by a final score of 19-16.

On the year the Tiger offense outscored its opponents by a score of 213-153. The Tigers put up 2410 yards on the ground this year while surrendering 1221. FC was outgained through the air as their foes had 923 yards passing to just 266 for the Tigers.

Individually the Falls City offense was led by workhorse Zane Heckenlively. Zane finished his senior season with 1386 yards on the ground in just eight games for an average of 177 yards per game. Heckenlively also led the Tigers with 12 touchdowns on the ground. Junior Rudy Vrtiska was next with 468 yards and four scores. Finally senior Ed Fritz had 302 yards to go along with seven touchdowns.

Vrtiska was the leading passer on the season as he finished with 146 yards through the air while completing nine out of 28 attempts with two touchdown passes. The Tigers had just three touchdown passes on the season while throwing 11 interceptions.

Defensively the Tigers were led up front by big man Dalton Kennel with 77 total stops, 21 of those solo tackles. Eight of the top nine tackle leaders for FC were seniors. Other defensive leaders were Ed Fritz with 57 tackles, Heckenlively with 55 stops and Colton Hayworth adding 43 take downs. Vrtiska and Heckenlively each had two interceptions on the year and Chaydyn Butler added another.

(a) Any citizen of the United States who is at least the constitu-

tionally prescribed age of a voter and who comes into Nebraska after the voter registration period is closed pursuant to section 32-302 for the purpose of making Nebraska his or her place of residence; and

(b) Any registered voter who moves from one county to another county within Nebraska after the close of the voter registration period.

(2) Any registered voter who moves from Nebraska to another state or to the District of Columbia for the purpose of making such new location his or her place of residence after the close of the voter registration period for such location shall be eligible as a former resident to vote for President and Vice President of the United States at the statewide general election but for no other offices.

(3) Any person described in subsection (1) of this section shall cast his or her ballot in the office of the election commissioner or county clerk at any time between the close of the voter registration period and the close of the polls on election day. Such ballots shall be available after the close of the voter registration period. Ballots for former residents under subsection (2) of this section shall be available thirty-five days prior to the election. The ballots may be voted in the office of the election commissioner or county clerk at any time between thirty-five days prior to the election and the close of the polls on election day, or the ballots may be mailed to the office and counted if they arrive before the close of the polls on election day.

Make Election Day go smoothly

Election Day gives voters throughout the United States a chance to participate in their government. The right to vote is something to cherish, as many people across the globe do not get a chance to elect the officials who govern their countries.

While Election Day is an exciting time, voters may find it frustrating if they do not take steps to ensure things go smoothly when they head to the polls. The following tips can help voters prepare for Election Day.

- Confirm your polling location. Polling locations may have changed since last year, and voters who have moved in the past 12 months may now have to vote in a new location. Voters can contact their local board of elections or visit www.Vote411.org to confirm the correct polling locations. - Bring photo identification. Voter identification laws vary by state, but voters who want to avoid hassles or holdups may be able to do so by bringing current photo identification with them to the polling place. While such identification is not necessarily a requirement, voters who bring along a driver's license or state identification card may get in and out of the polling place more quickly than those who do not.

- Confirm registration. Voters can confirm that they have registered to vote by contacting their local board of elections in advance of Election Day. Sometimes voters' names may not appear on the registration list when they arrive to vote, even if they previously registered. Poll workers can help voters who find themselves in such situations. But voters who want to avoid such hassles on Election Day can confirm their registration beforehand.

- Be familiar with the candidates and issues on the ballot. Voting is a privilege and a responsibility, so voters should familiarize themselves with the candidates and issues on the ballot in the weeks leading up to Election Day. In addition to national or statewide candidates and issues, voters should learn about local issues that may have a more direct impact on their daily lives. The more voters learn about the candidates and issues in advance, the more quickly they can cast their votes and get to work or return home.

Voting on Election Day is a privilege that voters should not take lightly. Taking certain steps in the weeks ahead of Election Day can make it easier for voters to cast their ballots.

Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

Section 1. Section 23-3406, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is amended to read: 23-3406 (1) The contract negotiated between the county board and the contracting attorney shall specify the categories of cases in which the contracting attorney is to provide services. (2) The contract negotiated between the county board and the contracting attorney shall be awarded for at least a two-year term. Removal of the contracting attorney short of the agreed term may be for good cause only. (3) The contract between the county board and the contracting attorney may specify a maximum allowable caseload for each full-time or part-time attorney who handles cases under the contract. Caseloads shall allow each lawyer to give every client

the time and effort necessary to provide effective representation. (4) The contract between the county board and the contracting attorney shall provide that the contracting attorney be compensated at a minimum rate which reflects the following factors: (a) The customary compensation in the community for similar services rendered by a privately retained counsel to a paying client or by government or other publicly paid attorneys to a public client; (b) The time and labor required to be spent by the attorney; and (c) The degree of professional ability, skill, and experience called for and exercised in the performance of the services. (5) The contract between the county board and the contracting attorney shall provide that the contracting attorney may decline to represent clients with no reduction in compensation if the contracting attorney is assigned more cases which require an extraordinary amount of time and preparation than the contracting attorney can competently handle. (6) The contract between the county board and the contracting attorney and the county board shall provide that the contracting attorney shall receive at least ten hours of continuing legal education annually in the area of criminal law. The contract between the county board and the contracting attorney shall provide funds for the continuing legal education of the contracting attorney in the area of criminal law. (7) The contract between the county board and the contracting attorney shall require that the contracting attorney provide legal counsel to all clients in a professional, skilled manner consistent with minimum standards set forth by the American Bar Association and the Canons of Ethics for Attorneys in the State of Nebraska. The contract between the county board and the contracting attorney shall provide that the contracting attorney shall be available to eligible defendants upon their request, or the request of someone acting on their behalf, at any time the Constitution of the United States or the Constitution of Nebraska requires the appointment of counsel. (8) The contract between the county board and the contracting attorney shall provide for reasonable compensation over and above the normal contract price for cases which require an extraordinary amount of time and preparation, including capital cases.

Sec. 2. Section 23-3408, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is amended to read: 23-3408 In the event that the contracting attorney is appointed to represent an individual charged with a Class I or Class IA felony, the contracting attorney shall immediately apply to the district court for appointment of a second attorney to assist in the case. Upon application from the contracting attorney, the district court shall appoint another attorney with substantial felony trial experience to assist the contracting attorney in the case. Application for fees for the attorney appointed by the district court shall be made to the district court judge who shall allow reasonable fees. Once approved by the court, such fees shall be paid by the county board.

Sec. 3. Section 24-1106, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is amended to read: 24-1106 (1) In cases which were appealable to the Supreme Court before September 6, 1991, the appeal, if taken, shall be to the Court of Appeals except in capital cases, cases in which life imprisonment has been imposed, and cases involving the constitutionality of a statute. (2) Any party to a case appealed to the Court of Appeals may file a petition in the Supreme Court to bypass the review by the Court of Appeals and by direct review by the Supreme Court. The procedure and time for filing the petition shall be as provided by rules of the Supreme Court. In deciding whether to grant the petition, the Supreme Court may consider one or more of the following factors: (a) Whether the case involves a question of first impression or presents a novel legal question; (b) Whether the case involves a question of state or federal constitutional interpretation; (c) Whether the case raises a question of law regarding the validity of a statute; (d) Whether the case involves issues upon which there is an inconsistency in the decisions of the Court of Appeals or of the Supreme Court; and (e) Whether the case is one of significant public interest. When a petition for direct review is granted,

the case shall be docketed for hearing before the Supreme Court. (3) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the removal of a case from the Court of Appeals to the Supreme Court for decision by the Supreme Court at any time before a final decision has been made on the case by the Court of Appeals. The removal may be on the recommendation of the Court of Appeals or on motion of the Supreme Court. Cases may be removed from the Court of Appeals for decision by the Supreme Court for any one or more of the reasons set forth in subsection (2) of this section or in order to regulate the caseload existing in either the Court of Appeals or the Supreme Court. The Chief Justice of the Court of Appeals and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court shall regularly inform each other of the number and nature of cases docketed in the respective court.

Section 25-1140.09, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is amended to read: 25-1140.09 On the application of the county attorney or any party to a suit in which a record of the proceedings has been made, upon receipt of the notice provided in section 29-2525, or upon the filing of a praecipe for a bill of exceptions by an appealing party in the office of the clerk of the district court as provided in section 25-1140, the court reporter shall prepare a transcribed copy of the proceedings so recorded or any part thereof. The reporter shall be entitled to receive, in addition to his or her salary, a perpage fee as prescribed by the Supreme Court for the original copy and each additional copy, to be paid by the party requesting the same except as otherwise provided in this section. When the transcribed copy of the proceedings is required by the county attorney, the fee therefor shall be paid by the county in the same manner as other claims are paid. When such copy is prepared in any criminal case in which the sentence adjudged is capital, the fees therefor shall be paid by the county in the same manner as other claims are allowed or paid. The fee for preparation of a bill of exceptions and the procedure for preparation, settlement, signature, allowance, certification, filing, and amendment of a bill of exceptions shall be regulated and governed by rules of practice prescribed by the Supreme Court. The fee paid shall be taxed, by the clerk of the district court, to the party against whom the judgment or decree is rendered except as otherwise ordered by the presiding district judge.

(3) Nothing in this section shall limit the authority granted in sections 29-2221 and 29-2222 to increase sentences for habitual criminals. (4) A person convicted of a felony for which a mandatory minimum sentence is prescribed shall not be eligible for probation.

Section 28-201, Revised Statutes Cumulative Supplement, 2014, is amended to read: 28-201 (1) A person shall be guilty of an attempt to commit a crime if he or she: (a) Intentionally engages in conduct which would constitute the crime if the attendant circumstances were as he or she believes them to be; or (b) Intentionally engages in conduct which, under the circumstances as he or she believes them to be, constitutes a substantial step in a course of conduct intended to culminate in his or her commission of the crime. (2) When causing a particular result is an element of the crime, a person shall be guilty of an attempt to commit the crime if, acting with the state of mind required to establish liability with respect to the attendant circumstances specified in the definition of the crime, he or she intentionally engages in conduct which is a substantial step in a course of conduct intended or known to cause such a result. (3) Conduct shall not be considered a substantial step under this section unless it is strongly corroborative of the defendant's criminal intent. (4) Criminal attempt is: (a) A Class II felony when the crime attempted is a Class I, IA, IB, IC, or ID felony; (b) A Class III felony when the crime attempted is a Class II felony; (c) A Class IIIA felony when the crime attempted is sexual assault in the second degree under section 28-320, a violation of subdivision (2) (b) of section 28-416, incest under section 28-703, or assault by a confined person with a deadly or dangerous weapon under section 28-932; (d) A Class IV felony when the crime attempted is a Class III felony not listed in subdivision (4)(c) of this section; (e) A Class I misdemeanor when the crime attempted is a Class IIIA or Class IV felony; (f) A Class II misdemeanor when the crime attempted is a Class I misdemeanor; and (g) A Class III misdemeanor when the crime attempted is a Class II misdemeanor.

Sec. 8. Section 28-202, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is amended to read: 28-202 (1) A person shall be guilty of criminal conspiracy if, with intent to promote or facilitate the commission of a felony: (a) He or she agrees with one or more persons that they or one or more of them shall engage in or solicit the conduct or shall cause or solicit the result specified by the definition of the offense; and (b) He or she or another person with whom he or she conspired commits an overt act in pursuance of the conspiracy. (2) If a person knows that one with whom he or she conspires to commit a crime has conspired with another person or persons to commit the same crime, he or she is guilty of conspiring to commit such crime with such other person or persons whether or not he or she knows their identity. (3) If a person conspires to commit a number of crimes, he or she is guilty of only one conspiracy so long as such multiple crimes are the object of the same agreement or continuous conspiratorial relationship. (4) Conspiracy is a crime of the same class as the most serious offense which is an object of the conspiracy, except that conspiracy to commit a Class I felony is a Class H felony.—A person prosecuted for a criminal conspiracy shall be acquitted if such person proves by a preponderance of the evidence that his or her conduct occurred in response to an entrapment. Sec. 9. Section 28-303, Reissue

Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is amended to read: 28-303 (1) A person commits murder in the first degree if he or she kills another person (a) purposely and with deliberate and premeditated malice, (b) or (2) in the perpetration of or attempt to perpetrate any sexual assault in the first degree, arson, robbery, kidnapping, hijacking of any public or private means of transportation, or burglary, or (c) by administering poison or causing the same to be done; or if by willful and corrupt perjury or subornation of the same he or she purposely procures the conviction and execution of any innocent person. The determination of whether murder in the first degree shall be punished as a Class I or Class IA felony shall be made pursuant to sections 29-2519 to 29-2524. (2) Murder in the first degree is a Class IA felony.

After the information has been filed, the prosecuting attorney shall endorse on the information the names of such other witnesses as shall then be known to him or her as the court in its discretion may prescribe, except that if a notice of aggravation is contained in the information as provided in section 29-1603, the prosecuting attorney may endorse additional witnesses at any time up to and including the thirtieth day prior to the trial of guilt.

The court may consider such placement if the offender (a) is a male or female offender convicted of a felony offense in a district court, (b) is medically and mentally fit to participate, with allowances given for reasonable accommodation as determined by medical and mental health professionals, and (c) has not previously been incarcerated for a violent felony crime. Offenders convicted of a crime under section 28-303 or sections 28-319 to 28-322.04 or of any capital crime are not eligible to be placed in an incarceration work camp. (3) It is also the intent of the Legislature that the Board of Parole may recommend placement of felony offenders at the incarceration work camp. The offenders recommended by the board shall be offenders currently housed at other Department of Correctional Services adult correctional facilities and shall complete the incarceration work camp programming prior to release on parole. (4) When the Board of Parole is of the opinion that a felony offender currently incarcerated in a Department of Correctional Services adult correctional facility may benefit from a brief and intensive period of regimented, structured, and disciplined programming immediately prior to release on parole, the board may direct placement of such an offender in an incarceration work camp for a period not to exceed one hundred eighty days as a condition of release on parole. The board may consider such placement if the offender (a) is medically and mentally fit to participate, with allowances given for reasonable accommodation as determined by medical and mental health professionals, and (b) has not previously been incarcerated for a violent felony crime. Offenders convicted of a crime under section 28-303 or sections 28-319 to 28-322.04 or of any capital crime are not eligible to be placed in an incarceration work camp. (5) The Director of Correctional Services may assign a felony offender to an incarceration work camp if he or she believes it is in the best interests of the felony offender and of society, except that offenders convicted of a crime under section 28-303 or sections 28-319 to 28-322.04 or of any capital crime are not eligible to be assigned to an incarceration work camp pursuant to this subsection.

SENCA receives \$1,400 from SunMart as a result of company wide effort to end hunger


The students are given a brief simple description of the jobs that each office does and got to tour the jail that was in use here at the Courthouse until this past September.

"Monument Circle Indianapolis, Indiana" October 28, 1961



Monument Circle takes its name from the limestone memorial to soldiers and sailors at its center. And the circle is at the very center of Indianapolis, which is right in the middle of the Hoosier state. Artist John Falter discerned a faintly French flavor in this scene--perhaps because Indianapolis was planned on the pattern of Washington, D.C., which was laid out by a Frenchman. But consider the English Gothic architecture of Christ Church Cathedral at the left, the vaguely Tudor air of the neighboring Columbia Club, and the bluntly modern design of the Fidelity Building. French, English, or just plain American, the circle suits a city with a half-Greek name--a name so long that Indiana's capital is sometimes known as "Naptown."


