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

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

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
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Warning: Election year Legislative session coming

Short session long. It's an election year and half of the legislative seats – the odd-numbered districts -- are on the ballot. Ten seats belong to termlimited lawmakers who can't run again. An additional one was held by Senator Jeremy Nordquist of Omaha who resigned to go to work for Congressman Brad Ashford.

Another 12 belong to senators who will have completed one term and are eligible for another.

Most are expected to run again. Nordquist's replacement, Nicole Fox of Omaha, will also have to run for the seat

to which she was nominated by Governor Pete Ricketts.

The session, from January 6 to April 20, is officially known as the short -60 day - session. The early adjournment gives incumbents time to return to their districts to campaign. It has ever been thus. But many of them will lace their legislative agendas and floor speeches with campaign rhetoric. No speculation here - it's a given.

On the flip side, the term-limited senators will be more likely to speak their minds and try to push the unfinished business remaining on their legislative agendas. The frankness will be refreshing. The desperate push to fulfill their 8-year-old campaign promises may prove tiresome. Rule of thumb here: if it was a bad idea eight years ago, it is probably still a dud.

The short-timers and the folks who want another four years will talk enough to make for some long days. I remember in the late 80's when the senator from Kearney, who hadn't spoken much during her ready-toend first term, decided to launch a filibuster during one of those late night sessions when her colleagues were grabbing dinner at the lobbyist's trough across the hall from the legislative chamber. Her speeches were tangential and didn't win her any voter approval. They simply lengthened the time to adjournment for the day. Her re-election bid failed.

The last-year senators include Speaker of the Legislature Galen Hadley of Kearney. He served a number of years as chairman of the Revenue Committee as well. Others are: Sen. Kathy Campbell of Lincoln, Chair of the Health and Human Services Committee; Sen. Colby Coash of Lincoln, an influential lawmaker who was the floor manager of the successful death penalty repeal last session; Sen. Tanya Cook of Omaha who was just appointed to the Appropriations Committee, the first African-American to serve on that powerful committee; Sen. Mike Gloor of Grand Island, Chairman of the Revenue Committee; Sen. Ken Haar of Malcolm, a member of the Appropriations Committee; Sen. Beau McCoy of Elkhorn, Chair of the Committee on Committees; Appropriations Committee Chairman Heath Mello of Omaha; Natural Resources Chairman Ken Schilz of Ogallala and Education Committee Chairwoman Kate Sullivan of Cedar Rapids.

Nearing the end of their first

term are 12 more senators, four of whom are committee chairs and three members of Appropriations. Eligible for another term (if they choose to run) are: Agriculture Committee Chairman Jerry Johnson of Wahoo; Government and Veteran's Affairs Chairman John Murante of

> Omaha; Banking Chairman Jim Scheer of Norfolk and Judiciary Committee Chairman Les Seiler of Hastings. **Appropriations Committee** members Sen. Kate Bolz of Lincoln, Sen. Bill Kintner of Papillion and Sen. Dan Watermeier of Syracuse are also eligible for a second term.

Senators Sue Crawford of Bellevue, Al Davis of Hyannis, Sara Howard of Omaha and Rick Kolowski of Omaha are also in the final session of their first terms.

Last, but not least, is Senator Ernie Chambers of Omaha. The 78year-old has served 41 years, 38 of those before term limits forced him out. He was re-elected in 2012 after sitting out the mandatory four years required by the law which some say was drafted to get rid of him in the first place.

So there you have the personal dynamic that will color the Second Session of the 104th Legislature. Next week we'll look at the issues that will define the session.

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THINKING ABOUT HEALTH

Healthcare 'consumers' not likely to force down prices

Early in December, David, a reader who lives in the foothills west of Denver, sent me an email. "It's scary when you go into any healthcare facility and don't know whether to bring your check book, loan application papers, or bankruptcy processing papers," he said. "Nobody seems to care or be concerned about it." He wanted to know why we aren't told all costs up front so we can make informed decisions.

David had a point. When we go in for a procedure, most of the time we don't know the total price or even what we will pay after insurance covers its share. In the last few years the lack of transparency has provided opportunities for entrepreneurs to create websites aimed at giving patients some price information for the handful of procedures that you can actually shop for. But it's one thing to shop for a low-cost stress test or a spinal X-ray. It's a lot trickier when you need heart by-pass surgery or a back

I am all for price transparency that sheds light on our high-cost health system, and I want it to spark a serious conversation about why we have the most expensive care in the world and what we as a country can do about it. But don't count on turning patients into consumers who can force prices down and magically give us cheaper healthcare. That's a lot harder than something like boycotting the local Ford dealer in favor of the Chevy dealer who offers rock bottom prices.

The fundamental relationship between patients and their doctors is different from the relationship between buyers and sellers of cars and other consumer goods. Patients have to trust their healthcare providers since it's hard to judge the proposed care or treatments unless you have a medical degree. For most other products, the admonition "buyer beware" is at the heart of the relationship. Furthermore, shoppers generally have an idea of what makes a good car, and can more easily judge if the seller is giving them one.

If you buy a bad car, you live with it for a while and try not to make the same mistake again. If you pick the wrong imaging center or the wrong doctor, you could die or suffer serious harm. The stakes simply are higher. In the last couple of weeks I came across another barrier to price shopping - marketing activities by pharmaceutical companies. Those activities are designed to help patients pay for their expensive prescriptions while at the same time keeping the underlying price of the drugs high.

An e-book I found on the website of "Medical Marketing & Media," a trade publication, advises healthcare sellers how to market their products. This book, titled "Pathway to Specialty Access," offers instructions to drug companies for using coupon programs to sell more drugs particularly the new, very costly specialty drugs and how to stop customers from not filling their prescriptions because they are too expensive. That's apparently a big problem in the drug business.

Those coupons available online or from doctors and pharmacies offer discounts on medicines especially those with high price tags like the new specialty drugs coming on the market. One example notes that a patient's out-of-pocket costs for multiple sclerosis or rheumatoid arthritis drugs could be as little as \$5 a prescription thanks to coupons and discounts. It could be hundreds of dollars without them.

Other coupons take the form of e-vouchers. A pharmacist sends a prescription to a vendor. The drug makers and the vendors establish how much they will cover of the costs insurance requires the patient to pay. While the process is going on, the patient "doesn't know what he will pay," says Andrew Pollpeter, a senior principal with The Amundsen Group, a pharmaceutical consulting firm. "But they are happier when they see a lower copay," he added.

What's wrong with this? After all, the patient gets cheap medicine; the drug company gets more sales. The high drug prices, however, are still with us. "Coupons shield consumers from the true cost of medications, and (consumers) are less likely to make decisions based on the true cost of the drug," says Troy Filipek, an actuary with the consulting firm Milliman. In short, discounts mask what the drug maker is really charging.

And that, of course, means all the advice about price shopping goes out the window. At least when it comes to medicines, lots of middlemen are involved in what drugs you get and how much they cost. There's nothing transparent about drug pricing, and there's not likely to be.

State's job website gets upgrade

The Nebraska Department of Labor has announced the rollout of enhancements to the state's job website, NEworks.nebraska.gov

The upgrades improve efficiency for both users and the Department through several time-saving features and the integration of unemployment insurance functions into the site.

"These enhancements follow this summer's upgrade that eliminated separate logins for job search functions and unemployment claims," said Commissioner of Labor John H. Albin. "We are streamlining processes, leaving workers more time to focus on their employment strategy rather than technical requirements."

Workers on unemployment are required to make and record job contacts and applications as a condition of eligibility, including at least one job contact per week using NEworks. Work search activity performed in the site is now automatically saved in the unemployment claim, reducing time spent filling out the weekly certification of eligibility. Fact-finding screens for unemployment insurance were enhanced to allow staff to capture more information up front to make determinations regarding benefit eligibility. The change reduces

phone calls to claimants and expedites claim processing.

Following the completion of the weekly certification, claimants are now automatically directed to the Employment Strategy Page, allowing them a quick look at the available jobs in the area, as well as access to tools such as a virtual recruiter used by both employers and job seekers. Nebraska is the only state with a workforce website that provides a one-stop Unemployment Services page, which links to various instruction guides for completing registration in NEworks, filing a claim, and logging job contacts.

Thirty-two counties lack behavioral health provider of any kind

The Behavioral Health Education Center of Nebraska recently released its legislative report summarizing its efforts to improve access to behavioral health care across the state by developing a skilled and passionate workforce.

With 78 out of 93 counties in Nebraska experiencing a high need for behavioral health services and 32 counties lacking a behavioral health provider of any kind, BHECN continues to develop solutions to recruit, train and retain behavioral health professionals, especially in rural and underserved communities. With over half of the state's practicing psychiatrists, psychologists and psychiatric nurse practitioners over the age of 50, the shortage is expected to grow in the next decade.

"Now in our sixth year of serving the state, we've come a long way in building relationships and establishing a common ground to facilitate workforce growth," said Howard Liu, M.D., director of BHECN.

Through the Ambassador Program, BHECN introduces students from rural communities to behavioral health careers beginning in high school and following them through professional studies. With this "grow our own" approach, BHECN has connected with nearly 2,000 high school and college students to create a pipeline of future behavioral health professionals.

Using a two-year grant awarded by the University of NE Rural Futures Institute, this effort is extended through the Virtual Mentorship Network, which connects students statewide via teleconferencing to behavioral health mentors in their area of interest.

BHECN also funds and supports behavioral health trainees and psychiatric residents who experience firsthand what it's like to provide care in rural communities. This year, seven of the 11 psychiatric residents chose to stay in Nebraska to begin their ca-



The charms of "Doby Town," 1863

In the fall of 1863 soldiers of the Eleventh Ohio Volunteer Cavalry traveled Nebraska's Platte Valley en route to the unit's station at Fort Laramie. From there the Eleventh Ohio would garrison small outposts on the transcontinental mail and telegraph route. One of the men was Ben Arnold, whose recollections of frontier life were later published as *The Exploits of Ben Arnold: Indian Fighter, Cowboy, Hunter, and Army Scout* (1926, rpt. 1999). He included a vivid description of "Doby Town," the civilian settlement about two miles west of Fort Kearny on the Platte.

"Doby Town was a frontier settlement—the outpost of civilization, if its brand of conduct could be called civilization. There were no streets, and people built their houses wherever preference or caprice dictated. The townspeople were mostly frontiersmen who settled there for the sole purpose of trading with, or preying upon, those who traveled on the Oregon Trail. The population consisted chiefly of men: about two dozen permanent inhabitants, mostly gamblers and saloon keepers, some loafers who had no employment but hung around town to rob the passing immigrants, and a few women of well-known reputation....


"After we had rested about a week in Doby Town . . . our commanding officer decided to break camp and renew our westward journey. . . . As this was to be our last night, of course all of us were bent on having a good enough time in the few hours of freedom still remaining to last us for some weeks of monotony on the march.

"In a small place like Doby Town there was little of life or spirits outside of the saloon and the ramshackle dance hall. Being impartial in our patronage, we went from one to the other . . . seeking such thrills as the coarse monotony of their daily program offered. Most of the men drank, some gambled, and others were merely interested spectators passing away the time. I belonged to the latter class.

"The saloons were all built of sod and similar in size and appointments." The one in which I spent most of the evening consisted of a long narrow room with a bar made of rough boards extending the entire length of one side. Out in front of the bar stood a few square pine tables covered with woolen blankets, which were used for card tables. Some gambling was going on night and day, but at night while we were there the tables were always full. When I stepped into the saloon I took a place behind one table of players and watched the game an unobserved onlooker. The clink of glasses and the noisy badinage around the table were conspicuous. The languages in use were Mexican, French, English, and one other, common to all nationalities: profanity. Occasionally some exultant winner would express his delight by firing his pistol through the roof or into the sod walls of the saloon and a little loose dirt would trickle down. The air was heavy with the blue smoke from the guns and the lighter tobacco smoke; and the fumes of both, mixed with the stench of the liquors slopped over the bar by unsteady drinkers, made a combination of foul smells unknown outside a whiskey dive

"Dealing out drinks behind the bar was a dark slender young man named Jack Morrow, whom I met and worked under several times in after years. Jack was a good man for the place; he had strength, nerve, and speed—qualities necessary not at rare intervals but daily, and almost hourly. It was occasionally his duty to drag an unconscious drunk across the dust-covered dirt floor to a back room where he would lie in a heap for hours, only to awaken with pockets rifled."

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





Notable events from the last year

The dawn of a new year is not only a great time to look ahead and make plans for the future, but it's also a great time to reflect on the previous 12 months. The following are some notable events from 2015.

• Just seven days into the new year, a terrorist attack on the French satirical newspaper Charlie Hebdo shocks the world. Twelve people, including several cartoonists and two police officers, are killed, while five others suffer critical injuries. The attacks are later linked to the terrorist organization Al Qaeda, which reportedly ordered the attacks in retaliation for the publication's caricatures of the Prophet Muhammad.

• United States President Barack Obama and Cuban President Raul Castro meet in early April, marking the first time in more than half a century the two countries' leaders met face-to-face. Less than two months later, the United States removes Cuba from its list of state sponsors of terrorism, moving one significant step closer to restoring full diplomatic relations between the two countries.

• Ireland becomes the first country to legalize same-sex marriage in a national referendum on May 22. Roughly 62 percent of voters approve changing the country's constitution to allow same-sex marriage, a vote that comes 22 years after the Irish government decriminalized homosexuality.

• Just one day after American Independence Day, the United States Women's National Team wins the Women's World Cup in Vancouver, British Columbia. The game is a rout, as American Carli Lloyd scores a hat trick in the first three minutes of the game en route to leading her team to a 5-2 victory over Japan. Lloyd's hat trick was the first such feat in Women's World Cup Final history.

• Alexis Tsipras wins a snap election on September 20 to once again become Prime Minister of Greece. The elections come roughly one month after Tsipras announces his resignation as a result of intraparty defections that have cost him his majority in the Greek parliament.

• The Chicago Cubs clinch a postseason series at Wrigley Field for the first time ever when they defeat the St. Louis Cardinals 6-4 to win one of two National League Division Series. And for the second time in franchise history - and first since 1985 - the Kansas City Royals won the World Series.

January 1 more than just New Year's Day

January 1 marks the first day of the new year according to the Gregorian calendar, which is the most widely used calendar across the globe. The arrival of January 1 is a cause for celebration in many countries, but the first day of the year has also played host to its fair share of history. This year, New Year's revelers might want to reflect on some of the more notable events that have taken place on January 1 as they pop some champagne corks and count down to the dawn of 2016.

- 42 B.C.: Julius Caesar becomes the first historical Roman to be deified. This honor is bestowed posthumously by decree of the Roman Senate.
- 1068: Romanus IV is crowned Byzantine Emperor. His reign would prove to be relatively brief, as he was captured and held prisoner by the Turks in 1071. Romanus IV was eventually released, only to be overthrown by a coup and forced to retire. Despite agreeing to retire to a monastery, Romanus IV suffered one additional indignity when he was intentionally blinded. The injuries ultimately became infected, costing Romanus IV his life in 1072.
- 1502: Present-day Rio de Janeiro, which will play host to the 2016 Summer Olympics, is first encountered by Portuguese explorers. The timing of this discovery contributed to the city's name, which translates to "January River" in English.
- 1515: Francis I succeeds to the French throne. Francis I's reign lasted 32 years, during which he is credited with initiating the French Renaissance that brought many Italian artists, including Leonardo da Vinci, to France.
- 1772: The London Credit Exchange Company issues the first traveler's cheques. The cheques, which can be used in 90 European cities, were designed to offer travelers more financial security than cash.
- 1773: The lyrics to "Amazing Grace" are used in a prayer meeting for the first time. The lyrics were written by Englishman John Newton, who worked as a captain of slave ships and had a reputation for being profane.
- 1804: French rule in Haiti ends. This makes Haiti the first independent nation of Latin America and the only nation in the world that was established thanks to a successful slave revolt.
- 1863: The Emancipation Proclamation, an executive order that immediately changed the federal legal status of more than three million enslaved persons in the United States, goes into effect. The proclamation was issued during the American Civil War and proclaimed the freedom of slaves in 10 states that were still rebelling against Union forces.
- 1908: The Times Square Ball is dropped for the first time to commemorate the dawn of a new year. The ball has dropped every year since, with the exception of 1942 and 1943, when blackouts related to World War II had been instituted.
- 1959: Cuban dictator Fulgencio Batista is ousted by Cuban revolutionaries led by Fidel Castro. Remarkably, Castro would retain his leadership until 2008, when his deteriorating health led him to retire. Castro's brother, Raúl, unanimously won election as president in February of 2008.
- 1990: David Dinkins is sworn in as Mayor of New York City, becoming the city's first black mayor. To date, he is the only black man or woman elected to that position.

Mrs. Walker was taken to Community Medical Center and then flown by Life Flight to a Lincoln hospital. She received round-the-clock care for five days before succumbing to her injuries. The Walkers moved to FC from California in 1991; she worked at FC Care Center and Victory Village.


