City to handle dispatch services

The City of Falls City and Richardson County have entered into an interlocal cooperation agreement that designates the Falls City Police Department dispatch center as the provider of all dispatch services in the county.

Members of the city council, during their regular meeting Feb. 6, voted in favor of the agreement. The Richardson County Commissioners had previously voted their endorsement.

Sheriff Randy Houser spoke about the issue before the council last Monday night, explaining that activity in his department has increased "substantially," with the Richardson County Jail at or near capacity. He said he does not see that trend changing.

With a jail full of inmates, the jailer/dispatcher on duty has his or her hands full, Sheriff Houser said. Inmates need to be booked and supervised, he said, and when dispatching duties are included the task can be just too much. The Sheriff described the situation as a "recipe for disaster."

With all dispatch services at the Police Department location, the efficiency will be increased, Sheriff Houser said. No employees of the Sheriff's Office/Jail will lose their jobs as a result of this action, he said, plus the move "will help us with Jail Standards requirements."

Any details will be worked out within the Sheriff's Office, Falls City PD and the Enhanced 911 board.

Richardson County will pay all initial costs associated with relocating telephone lines, radio communications equipment and necessary computer systems to establish an integrated dispatch system between FCPD and the Sheriff's Department. Costs to develop, install and operate an Enhanced 911 system for Richardson County (after application of all available grant funds and 911 fees maintained by the City) will be shared on a 50-50 basis. All 911 service charges will be paid to the City.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Councilman Brad Campbell notified Mayor Tim Hersh and the council that he would vacate his seat, probably in May or June, as he has purchased a house in another Ward and will be moving.

Last week's Journal provided extensive coverage of the successful Ballpark Improvement fund drive. In addition to Rod Vandenberg's statement, committee chairman Brian Poppe thanked the City for its backing for the project. "Your support started this whole thing," he told the council. Poppe said all involved look forward to working with the City and Utility Supt. Alan Romine to complete the major ballpark renovations. He thanked all of the donors who supported the community project. Donations can still be made, Poppe said, as unexpected costs will likely occur.

Poppe said Vandenberg's role in leading the fund-raising effort provided the "kick we needed." He personally thanked the former mayor, who received a round of applause.

Physical work on the project should begin in early July.

Total knee replacements at CMC

Many surgeries have been performed at Community Medical Center over its 93-year history, but 2011 brought a new type to CMC — total knee replacement. The procedure was done for the first time in June, and by the end of the year, 11 patients had knees replaced at the hospital.

CMC offers a variety of orthopedic surgeries. Dr. David Clare has been coming to Falls City since 1996. Dr. Daniel Samani began seeing patients at CMC in 2011. While both surgeons perform cases at the hospital, it was Dr. Samani that started doing knee replacements at the hospital and who has done all of CMC's knee replacements to this point. The two doctors are from separate Lincoln groups and typically alternate weeks in which they offer clinics to see patients.

Orthopedics has a long history at CMC. Well regarded specialists such as Dr. Bruce Miller of Lincoln and Dr. Dick Brennan of St. Joseph helped lay the

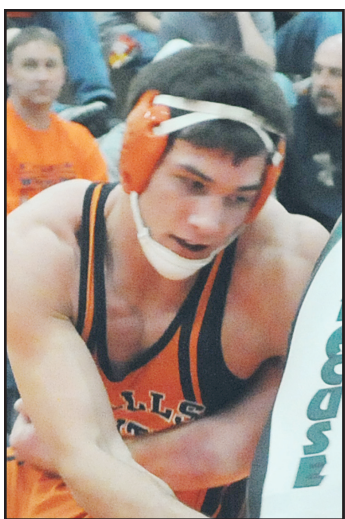
foundation for orthopedic clinic success at CMC in the 1970's and 1980's. Today, CMC's orthopedic clinics are doing well. "Both doctors are very busy and booked well in advance," reports clinic supervisor, Kim Liberty.

Dr. Samani approached hospital administration and medical staff about an orthopedic clinic in late 2011, having treated several patients from Richardson County at his Lincoln practice. Dr. Samani made the assessment that, not only could a second visiting orthopedic practice be successful in Falls City, but that the location and upgraded facilities and technology would make it practical to conduct more advanced orthopedic cases, like knee replacement and reverse shoulder arthroplasty, at CMC.

Dr. Samani remarked, "I believed we could help the community in southeast Nebraska and expand the services given at CMC." With the assistance of

Photog Kenny Bahr walks on the wild side

It's said the serious photographer will do anything for the shot. Kenny Bahr once awoke in a tent to the sound "of something trying to inhale my tent." He was nose-to-nose with a grizzly bear, separated by thin fabric designed to keep out the elements. Most elements. "I moved to the center of the tent and turned on my flashlight. I was camped in a berry patch and he was just curious." The bear's curiosity waned, he moved on and Kenny went about, as he puts it, "waiting for a magical moment to present itself." Yes, Kenny is a serious photogra-

pher.

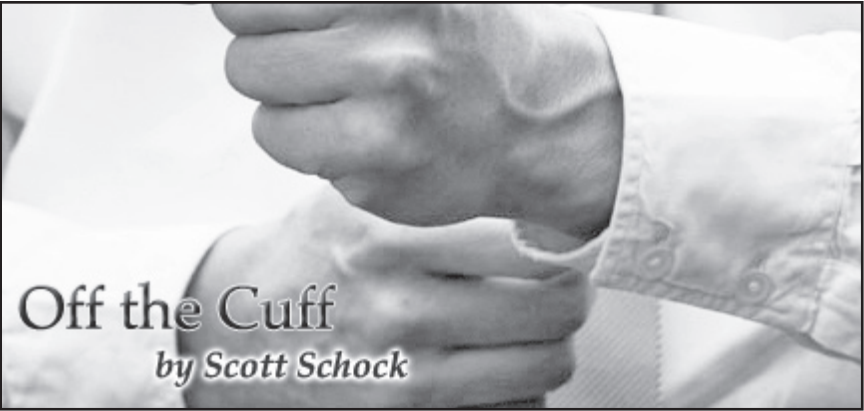
An exhibit of Kenny Bahr's amazing wildlife photography has been on display at the Stalder Art Gallery at the FC Library & Arts Center since Jan. 16 and it's scheduled to end Friday. The acclaimed 61-year-old Falls City wildlife photographer, whose pictures have appeared and continue to appear in many magazines, on calendars, advertising brochures, posters and websites, gave a Gallery Talk Friday, Feb. 3, to capacity crowd at the FCLAC.

"Wildlife photography trips my trigger," Bahr said. "Part of the reason is that when

you're dealing with wildlife, each species has its own characteristics that give photographers something to work with. No two moments in nature are the same."

Nature photographers must be persistent and patient, Bahr, said, and that can be problematic. Bahr has made 12 trips north to Alaska and spent countless 8- to 10-hour shifts hidden in a photo blind shooting bears, elk, moose and caribou, to name a few subjects. However, much of his time is spent right here locally, shooting waterfowl, turkey, songbirds, fox, raccoons, insects and butterflies until late summer, when he mi-

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Old habits die hard. In fact, humans are very much creatures of habit. Have you noticed that you follow the same scrubbing routine in the shower every morning or every other morning or once a week or once a month (please)? And when you brush your teeth, do you consciously consider where to start and where to finish? Isn't it pretty much the same every time?

One of my habits or routines is to turn on the TV, whether there's anything I want to watch or not. That was the case for part of last weekend, although I managed to delay hitting the remote's "power" button later than usual both Saturday and Sunday. In an almost unheard of personal behavior, I watched "Meet the Press" from 9-10 a.m. Sunday and then turned TV off and left it that way until 2 o'clock to kind of watch Phil Mickelson's fabulous final round of golf at Pebble Beach. I say "kind of," because that's another of my habits. Have the TV on, the sound turned down and a book in my lap. Last weekend, I completed one book on Saturday and dove right into another.

Two of the best novels I've read in a while.

One of my favorite authors is Dean Koontz, who writes finely crafted, stylish thrillers that pack lots of suspense between their covers. His latest, 77 Shadow Street, is no exception. Actually, it's one of his best. I'm sure it's available at the Falls City Library and Arts Center and I'm equally sure the waiting list is a long one.

77 Shadow Street came to a conclusion for me on Saturday morning. I'd put off learning what happened to Mickey Dime, Bailey Hawks, Winny, Iris, Sparkle, the Cupp sisters and others for as long as possible, not wanting to put the book down but not wanting it to end, either. It's the story of The Pendleton, a mansion in an unidentified city that experiences some strange goings on every 38 years. These happenings are not necessarily good for the families that have called the place home, or for the residents after the building is converted to luxury apartments.

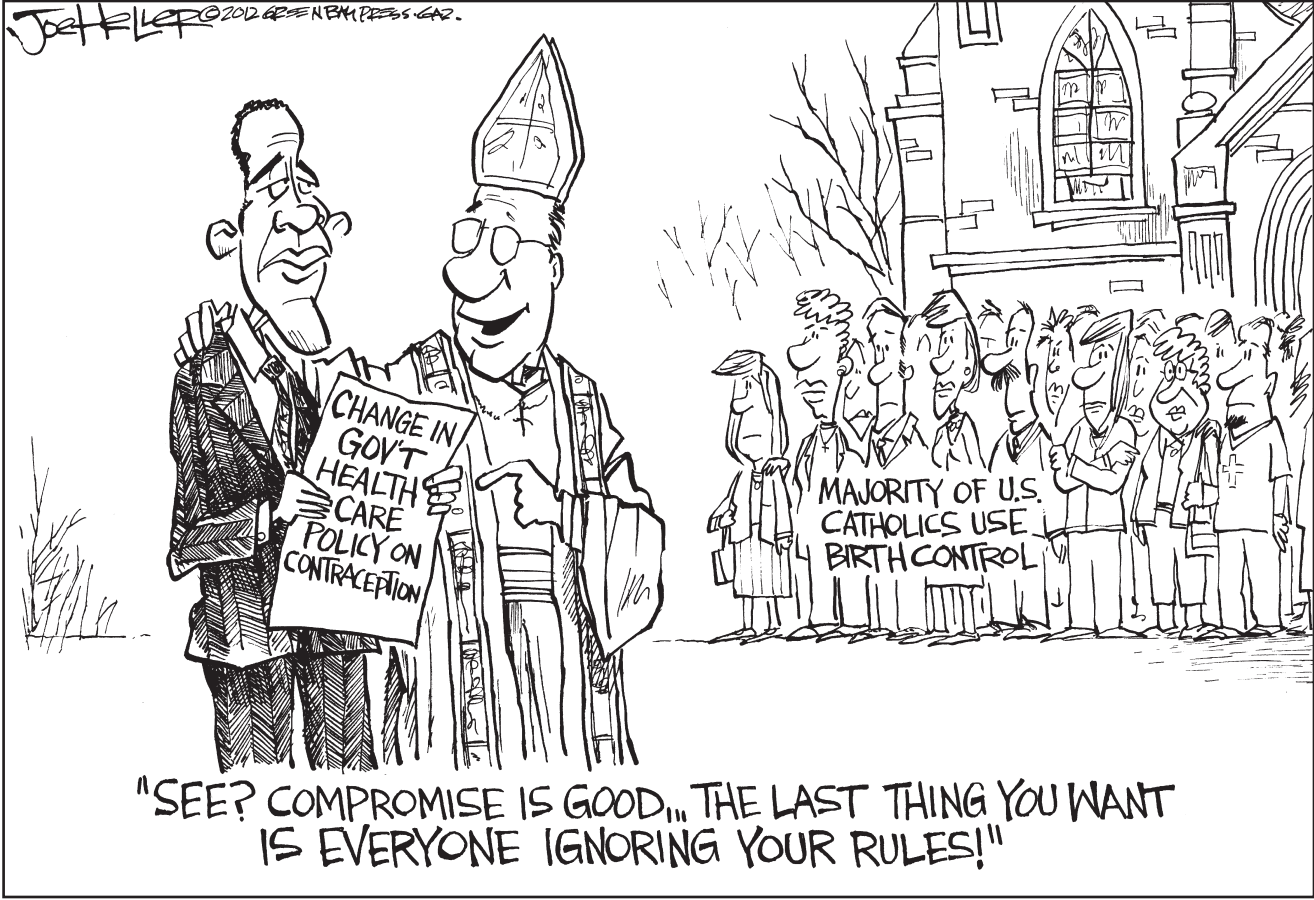
I won't give away Koontz's story. But I will say that he always has a point and it's not about monsters or creepy crawlers. It's that nightmares are human in origin and that the human spirit is capable of overcoming them. Human nature is, or can be, predominately good.

The second book — this one just started — is by an author I really haven't read much, Stephen King. 11/22/63 is still on the New York Times Bestseller List for fiction (77 Shadow Street was on the list for several weeks, starting at No. 1). Anyone in my age group (give or take a decade or two) will recognize the title-date as the day JFK was assassinated in Dallas.

I'm only a couple hundred pages into what is a fascinating and lengthy novel. King is a great storyteller who has hit upon a captivating idea: basically, returning to the past to change history — not only U.S. and world history, but also the history of an ordinary family in Derry, Maine, who were the victims of a Halloween tragedy. The author so accurately captures the times and a culture that I can relate to given my advanced age. 1958? I remember it well. 1963? That, too.

King's book is undoubtedly available at our local library, too. And that waiting list will be a long one, as well.

You may not consider yourself a fiction reader. But I'd suggest you give one of these two books a shot. Both of these authors are highly accomplished, include plenty of humor and have important points to make in such entertaining ways. With a little snow on the ground and with very little on TV, a couple of nights with a good book might be just the ticket.



Safety Committee reviews issues

During a quarterly Safety Committee meeting held Tuesday, Feb. 7, several topics were discussed by the Richardson County Commissioners and committee members.

In addition to Commissioners Dave Sickel, Bill Ely and Jim Davidson, the meeting was attended by Sheriff Randy Houser and Investigator Roland Merwin, Road Dept. representative Matt Cromer, and Courthouse maintenance supervisor Tammie Beckner.

Cromer reported on an inspection conducted by NIRMA in September of 2011, which made note that the fuel containment areas at the county shops needed to be improved. He also noted an ongoing problem with department employees not keeping vehicles clean. Cromer said the shop areas need to be kept tobacco-free.

Sheriff Houser said a Taser gun training was to be held in his department later in the week. Bunks in the two-man jail cell will be removed for safety reasons, the Sheriff reported. He said radio reception remains a problem, especially for car-to-car communication and that steps are being taken to correct the problem. Quotes for solutions will be sought. Houser said an emergency restraint chair has been obtained for the jail.

Insurance claims submitted from Oct. 1-Dec. 31, 2011, were reviewed by the committee and action that could be taken to keep those kinds of incidents from happening again were discussed.

Al Povondra of Carlson West Povondra Architects met with the board to review the future plans for the Armory Building. Povondra presented the previous plan designed by his firm. County Attorney Bob Meyer and Sheriff Houser attended this portion of the meeting.

In other developments, the commissioners:

- Adopted resolutions and programming agreements with the Nebraska Dept. of Roads on two projects: Verdon Northwest and Stella Southeast.

- Adopted a resolution to donate a 2002 van to SENCA. The van has been used by SENCA since it was purchased in 2002 for Richardson County Transit.

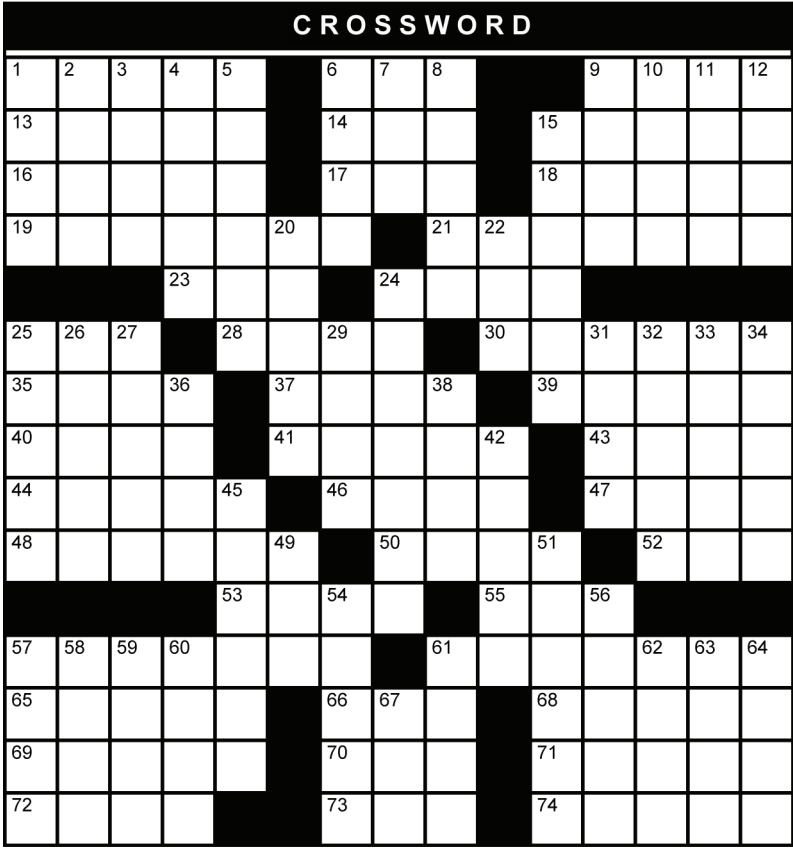

February is annual financial campaign for Falls City’s Itha Krumme Arboretum

This month is the annual financial campaign for the Maintenance and Endowment Funds associated with the Itha Krumme Memorial Arboretum in Falls City.

Located near Stanton Lake, this 2.2-acre site has about 70 species of plants native to Nebraska and adjoining states. The facility is open to the public and has a concrete sidewalk.

All donations to the arboretum are made to The Richardson Foundation, Inc. a 501 (c) (3) charitable organization. Contributions can be earmarked for Maintenance or Endowment and can be sent to: The Richardson Foundation, P.O. Box 161, Falls City, NE 68355.

A financial campaign helps fund maintenance supplies needed for things like Eagle Scout projects (using \$2,200 last year), mowing, brochures, utilities, plant removal, new trees and building an Endowment fund for sustaining labor in the future. All costs are covered by private contributions; no tax support from the City of Falls City or the county of Richardson is involved. In 2011, volunteers put in over 500 hours.

Within the last 12 months, memorials have been received, earmarked for new trees and an Eagle Scout-built bench.

Special plans for 2012, the 20th year since the first trees were planted, now include a Falls City Walk and Concerts in the Park.

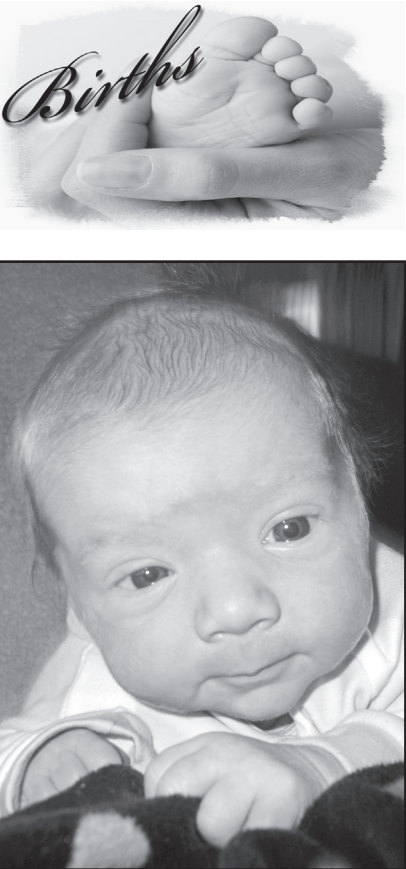

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Look for stink bugs,
Japanese beetles in ‘12

In 2011, we were invaded by an unusual looking caterpillar that caused some significant crop damage to soybeans late in the summer. The silver spotted skipper caused defoliation of soybeans in a number of fields. A few fields were almost completely defoliated by very high populations of this caterpillar.

Some producers treated fields with insecticides, while others decided not to treat. A number of factors determine if treatment with an insecticide is feasible. The only information I found concerning treatment was from Ohio, where they recommended treatment if one third of the plant was defoliated. The caterpillar had a yellow body, narrow neck and brown head with orange eyespots. The caterpillar came from eggs laid by a butterfly that has brownish-black wings with white spots on the underside of the wings. There were thousands of these butterflies in the area last summer as well.








Will we have an invasion of the silver spotted skipper in 2012? That is difficult to determine. The generally mild winter we have had to this point may impact the number of cocoons that survive the winter and produce butterflies next summer. If we do see a large number of these butterflies in early summer, we need to be aware of the potential of a repeat infestation of these caterpillars.

Both green and brown stink bugs are potential pests. Brown stink bugs are more numerous in corn and green stink bugs are more numerous in soybeans. Nebraska is conducting research on stink bugs to determine economic threshold levels. Until we have more definitive information, the recommendation for corn is to treat when populations are 1 stink bug per 4 plants prior to pollination and 1 stink bug per 2 plants after pollination to early dough stage. There are several insecticides labeled for treatment of stink bugs. For soybeans, the most common threshold level is 1bug/row-ft. during the reproductive stages. If using a sweep net, .25 bugs per sweep is the recommended threshold level. Another type of stink bug that was identified in Nebraska was the brown marmorated stinkbug. It is a pest of corn and soybeans in several states east of Nebraska. While no established populations have been identified here, it will eventually get here. There is concern because it does not appear to be affected by any of the seed treatments or GMO insecticide traits that are available in several corn hybrids.

Another insect pest that has been identified in Nebraska is the Japanese beetle. This insect has been identified in the urban areas of Lincoln and Omaha for several years, but it hasn't been an issue in corn or soybean fields in Nebraska. A few years ago near Kansas City, fields of corn required treatment due to the beetles feeding on corn silks. Japanese beetles are an annual white grub species, with the adult beetles having a metallic green thorax and head and copper brown wing covers. They are easily identified by 5 tufts of white hair on each side of the abdomen, with an additional pair on the top of the last abdominal segment. The beetles are voracious feeders of flowers and foliage or several species of plants. In soybeans, during the reproductive stage and insects are present and defoliation is expected to exceed 20%, treatment is recommended. In corn, University of Missouri entomologists suggest treatment if 3 or more Japanese beetles are present per ear during silking, and pollination is not complete. In both corn and soybeans, populations are usually higher on field edges. Scouting should be conducted before treating the entire field. Several insecticides are effective in controlling the Japanese beetle.

CHANGES IN WASHINGTON THAT MAY IMPACT YOUR TELECOM SERVICES

The “Universal Service Fund” – a program overseen by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) and funded by telecommunications providers across the country – has been essential in ensuring that rural consumers like you (living in difficult to serve areas) have access to high-quality networks and affordable services. But, new Federal regulations, and others under consideration, put rural networks and services at risk.

Like electricity and telephone service, reliable, high-speed broadband is becoming an essential part of daily life for businesses and consumers. Access is critical commerce, civic participation, health care, and education across the far reaches of rural America.

The new FCC rules, however, do not promote these objectives. Although the FCC has stated its intent to ensure that all of American has comparable access to the Internet, new FCC regulations will reduce support for many smaller, locally based cooperatives and commercial telecom providers such as ours. Among other things, under the new rules, our company will face:

- New limitations on our ability to recover investments made years ago;
- New rules that will be subject to changes *every year*, making it difficult for companies to plan ahead in accordance with unknown regulatory requirements;
- Federal requirements to increase consumer rates in order to quality for full Universal Service Fund support and;
- Reduced payments from other (often larger) carriers who use rural networks.

Even where carriers and rural consumers can adapt to these changes, however, the FCC is considering further rule changes that threaten to reduce the ability of rural carriers to recover their costs. The additional changes now being considered include:

- Reducing the opportunity for returns on rural telecom investment and operations;
- Applying additional limitations on the ability to recover costs; and
- Reducing Universal Service Fund support if a competitor serves even just a small part of our serving area.

The Universal Service Fund cuts arising out of the new rules will put existing investment in rural broadband at risk, and they will discourage future investment in new broadband-capable networks by small companies such as ours. The FCC’s cuts could also lead to increased rates for many customers for telephone, broadband and other services.

From the earliest days of telephone service, Congress has enforced policies that require affordable access to reasonably comparable communications services throughout the Nation. The Universal Service Fund is essential to fulfilling this policy. But rather than supporting true universal service, the new FCC rules now being considered promise better service to some Americans at the expense of lesser service, and higher cost, for others.

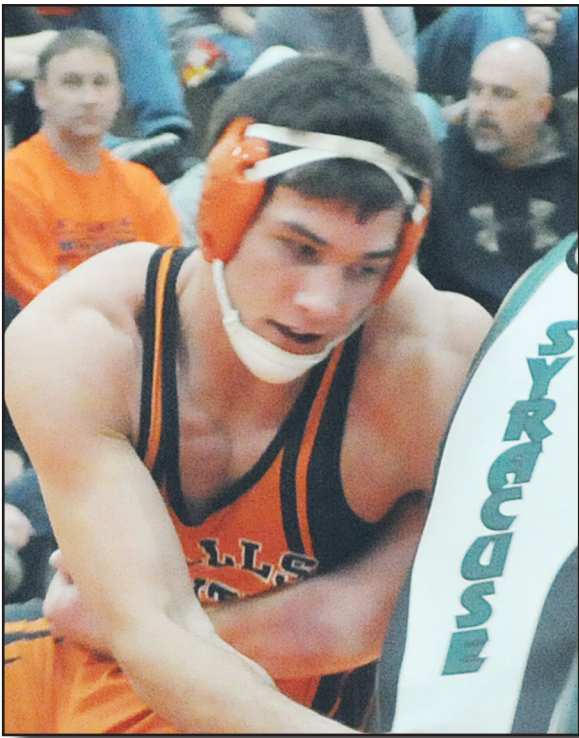

Four county qualifiers to wrestle in Thursday's morning session

Four area wrestlers will be representing their respective schools this weekend at the NSAA State Wrestling Championships at the Century Link Convention Center in Omaha.

Two Falls City High seniors - Tate Hayes (126 pounds) and Cole Ackerman (182) - and two Humboldt-TR-S seniors - Lucas Snethen (195) and TJ Standerford (220) - will take their talents

to Omaha with the goal being to wrestle their way to podium Saturday afternoon.

Ackerman, Snethen and Standerford each won their respective districts this past weekend and should have very favorable seeds this weekend. Ackerman, who is now 27-4, defeated Syracuse's Avery Stevenson 10-4 in the district championship. Snethen improved to 34-4 on the season by pinning Malcolm's James Burruss in the first period of the district final and Standerford, now 31-2, was victorious over Carson Homolka of Wilber-Clatonia in the title match. Hayes earned fourth place at the district tournament.

Fortunately for fans from the area attending the state tournament, all four area wrestlers will be competing in the first session Thursday morning. Falls City

High is Class B and Humboldt-TR-S wrestle in Class C and B-C first round session begins at 9:30.

First round matchups for the four are as follows: Hayes will be facing Omaha Skutt sophomore Jake Walker (31-15); Ackerman will face Cozad junior Martin Rascon (12-12); Snethen will take on Centennial junior Lucas Gruber (28-7); Standerford will square off against West Holt's Caleb Akins (28-12).

This will be the second state tournament for Ackerman (5th in 2011), Hayes (qualifier in 2010) and Standerford (6th in 2011), while Snethen will be making his debut in Omaha this year.

In the team competitions of the respective classes, Falls City High finished 11th with 38 points. H-TR-S also finished 11th, but tallied 61 team points.

New Class

Signing Day is in the books for 2012, and despite having a limited number of scholarships to offer Nebraska was able to land the No. 3-ranked class in the Big Ten and among the top 25 classes in the country according to both Rivals.com and 247Sports.com. Here's a brief look at how Signing Day shook out, along with some of the players I see making an immediate impact in 2012.

Heading into Signing Day, NU was awaiting formal decisions from five prospects. When the dust settled, three of those young men had chosen the Big Red.

At 7 a.m., D-tackle Aaron Curry (6-3/275) of Keller, Texas, signed with the Huskers over Iowa and Missouri. New Nebraska defensive line coach Rick Kaczinski recruited Curry at Iowa and was instrumental in NU getting in late with the talented lineman. Curry's frame should allow him to add weight and maintain his 4.8-second 40-yard dash quickness.

Next to decide was four-star athlete Alonzo Moore (6-2/170) of Winfield, La., who had been leaning towards the Huskers since a summer camp visit. He chose NU over Mississippi State and Southern Miss among others. Moore could play QB or receiver, but Bo Pelini said in his press conference that Moore will start at defensive back.

The third and fourth decisions of the day didn't go NU's way, as four-star D-back Devian Shelton (6-1/185) of Inglewood, Calif., and five-star offensive tackle target Andrus Peat (6-7/305) of Tempe, Ariz. picked USC and Stanford respectively.

The Trojans offered Shelton two days before he signed, and the hometown school was too much to pass up. The loss of Peat was unexpected, as his brother Todd signed with NU in 2011 and cousin Avery Moss (6-4/245) signed this year. Adding to the intrigue was that Peat made his announcement live on ESPN. Pelini said that the staff felt good about getting Peat right up to the announcement.

Signing Day ended with D-tackle Vincent Valentine (6-3/300) of Edwardsville, Ill., inking with NU. Valentine is a true zero- or one-technique tackle who can plug the middle. He will reshape his body during a redshirt year, and then could make a contribution in 2013.

NU also lost out on Old Tappan, NJ, athlete Devin Fuller (6-0/185) in the days leading up to Signing Day, as Fuller chose UCLA. NU recruited Fuller as a quarterback, and it remains to be seen whether the Bruins' new coaching staff will give him a shot at that position.

Impacts

Who will make an immediate impact during the 2012 season? I believe there are four or five who could see the field.

Juco CB Mohammed Seisay (6-2/200) is already on campus and will go through spring practice. He's expected to play, and may even start from day one.

Juco LB Zaire Anderson (6-1/220) will get a look to take over for LaVonte David. Anderson is a blitzing machine who tackles well. He needs to work on his coverage skills, but could be a big playmaker for the Blackshirts.

Despite young depth at receiver, I believe Jordan Westerkamp (6-2/195) of Lombard, Ill., is unlikely to redshirt. Westerkamp broke every Illinois state receiving record, and capped his high school career with 12 receptions for 331 yards and five touchdowns in the state championship game. NU survived a strong push from Notre Dame to get him.

With the lack of scholarship depth at linebacker, I expect either Jared Afalava (6-3/215) of South Jordan, Utah, or Michael Rose (6-0/230) of Kansas City, Mo., to play right away. Afalava has yet to qualify academically, so his arrival this summer may be delayed which would make Rose the more likely of the two to play.

Running back Imani Cross (6-1/220) of Gainesville, Ga., fills a role that NU lost when Quentin Castille left the program before last season. Cross can take some of the burden from Rex Burkhead's shoulders, and will provide a short-yardage option as well. Whether he plays in 2012 depends on Mike Marrow's development while sitting out as a transfer last season, but down the line Cross will be important to this program.

Finally, I expect QB Tommy Armstrong (6-2/210) to redshirt in 2012. Armstrong's skill set is more attuned to what Tim Beck wants in his offense, but unseating third-year starter Taylor Martinez will be difficult with only summer workouts and fall camp under his belt. Look for Armstrong to challenge strongly in 2013, though.

Working on 2013

With 2012 completed, work has begun on 2013. Nebraska has several prospects coming for junior day Feb. 18 including:

- NU commitment Tre'Vell Dixon (6-1/195), a three-star cornerback from Baldwin, La.;
- Missouri City, Texas, LB/defensive end Deon Hollins, Jr. (6-2/220) with offers from Arkansas, Notre Dame, Oregon, and Stanford;
- Milton, Wis., defensive end A.J. Natter (6-5/240) with offers from Minnesota and Purdue;
- West Des Moines, Iowa, tight end Jon Wisnieski (6-5/215) with offers from Iowa and Purdue;
- St. Louis, Mo., running back Exekiel Elliott (6-0/200) with offers from Arkansas, Illinois and Iowa.

Another intriguing prospect for 2013 is five-star safety Su'a Cravens (6-1/205) of Murrieta, Calif., from the same high school as 2012 signee Corey Whitaker. Cravens plans to travel with his high school coach to NU's coaching clinic this spring, and is also close with Whitaker. Getting him from the Pac 12 will be difficult, but NU will at least get to show him their campus first-hand.

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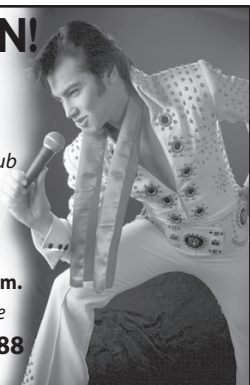
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GFWC Art Contest

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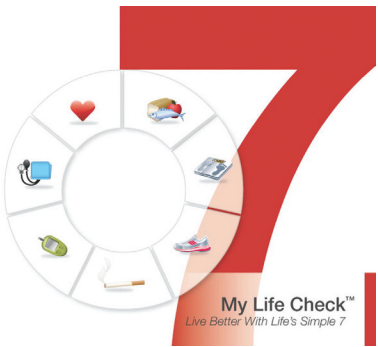
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Get active. Just 30 minutes of physical activity every day is enough to keep your heart, body and mind healthy. Play with your kids, walk the dog or so some quick laps around the office at lunch – find a way to work 20 minutes of movement into your day.

Control cholesterol. Know your numbers and get your cholesterol checked. A cholesterol level of 200 mg/dL or higher puts you in a high-risk category and is cause to take action.

Eat better. Aim for getting in more vegetables and fruits. They are high in vitamins, minerals and fiber and low in calories. Eating a variety of fruits and vegetables may help you control your weight and your blood pressure.

Manage blood pressure. By keeping your blood pressure in the healthy range (less than 120 mm Hg systolic AND less than 80 mm Hg diastolic), you are: Reducing your risk of your vascular walls becoming overstretched and injured, reducing your risk of your heart having to pump harder to compensate for blockages, protecting your entire body so that your tissue receives regular supplies of blood that is rich in the oxygen it needs.

Lose weight. 145 million Americans are overweight or obese. If you have too much fat – especially if a lot of it is at your waist – you're at higher risk for such health problems as high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol and diabetes.

Reduce blood sugar. The American Heart Association considers diabetes and high blood sugar one of the six major controllable risk factors for cardiovascular disease. Adults with diabetes are two to four times more likely to have heart disease or a stroke.


Stop smoking. Smoking is the most important preventable cause of premature death in the United States. Smokers have a higher risk of developing many chronic disorders, including atherosclerosis – the buildup of fatty substances in the arteries – which can lead to coronary heart disease, heart attack (myocardial infarction) and stroke. Controlling or reversing atherosclerosis is an important part of preventing future heart attack or stroke.

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
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Staying Heart Healthy In Your 20s

In your 20s, it can be easy to overlook the importance of living a heart-healthy lifestyle. Yet, this is the time to check your family history of heart disease. Don't smoke and stay away from secondhand smoke. Drink in moderation. Be aware that some oral contraceptives can cause an increase in your blood pressure.

In Your 30s

In their 30s, many women get so involved with their careers and family, they neglect to pay attention to their own health. You're young, but you're not a kid anymore.

Now is the time to build heart healthy habits. If you don't already exercise regularly, now is the time to start. You don't have to join a boot camp class or run a half-marathon. All it takes is about 30 minutes of exercise a day on most days.

In your 40s


In your 40s, you may feel like you are too set in your ways to make a change, but it's never too late. Focus on nutrition and working healthy foods into your diet. Make sure you are getting enough calcium. Sometime in your 40s or 50s (usually around the lead-up to menopause), you may notice it becomes harder to maintain your usual weight. That's why it's all the more important to manage stress and stick to a healthy diet and exercise routine now.

In your 50s

Unfortunately, the number of women who have heart attacks increases dramatically once you turn 55 – especially after menopause. But the good news is that you have the power to reduce your risk, and if you do have a heart condition, there is plenty that you can do to manage it. Rather than trying to look like you did 20 years ago, your goal should be to feel like you did then. Finding the balance of healthy eating and regular exercise will allow you to feel better and reach or maintain a healthy weight.

In your 60s and beyond



The older we get, the trickier exercise can be. Whether you've been active for years or you are just getting started, it's important to find an activity you enjoy that provides the right level of activity for your body. For some women, taking short brisk walks (as little as 10 minutes) throughout the day or water aerobics can be just the right amount of exercise.

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Heart disease doesn't discriminate, affecting men and women regardless of their age or where they live. In the United States, cardiovascular disease is the number one cause of death, according to the American Heart Association. North of the border, one Canadian dies from heart disease or stroke every 7 minutes. So says the Heart & Stroke Foundation of Canada, a charity that annually spends millions of dollars researching heart disease and promoting healthier lifestyles.

For most men and women, the prevalence of heart disease is no great surprise. Nearly every adult can point to a loved one who has dealt with heart disease. Many men and women can even point to a friend or family member who lost their battle with heart disease. That familiarity should make people even more willing to adopt a heart-healthy lifestyle, something the AHA admits is the best defense against heart disease and stroke. Though not all risk factors for heart disease can be controlled, there are ways to reduce that risk considerably.

Control your blood pressure

High blood pressure is the number one risk factor for stroke and a major risk for heart disease. Blood pressure measures the pressure or force of blood against the walls of your blood vessels, also known as arteries. Having your blood pressure taken is a routine on most doctor visits, but many people are unaware what the number actually measures. The top number measures the pressure when the heart contracts and pushes blood out, while the bottom number is the lowest pressure when the heart relaxes and beats. Blood pressure that is consistently above 140/90 is considered high. A normal blood pressure is one between 120/80 and 129/84. Because of the relation between blood pressure and heart disease and stroke, men and women must take steps to control their blood pressure. Having your blood pressure checked regularly is a good start. Once you get checked, reduce the amount of sodium in your diet, replacing high-sodium snacks with healthier fare and monitoring sodium intake during the day. The Heart & Stroke Foundation recommends eating less than 2,300 mg of sodium per day, and that includes salt added when making meals or eating at the table. Maintaining a healthy body weight and successfully managing stress are additional ways to control blood pressure.

Limit alcohol consumption

The AHA notes that excessive consumption of alcohol can contribute to high triglycerides, produce irregular heartbeats and eventually lead to heart failure or stroke. There is some evidence that people who drink moderately have a lower risk of heart disease than nondrinkers. But it's also important to note that people who drink moderately also have a lower risk of heart disease than people who drink excessively. So when it comes to alcohol, moderation reigns supreme. One or two standard drinks per day is enough depending on gender. The Heart & Stroke Foundation suggests that women who drink should not drink more than nine drinks a week, while men should not exceed 14 drinks in a single week. Of course, if there are extenuating circumstances then all bets are off. Men and women with liver disease, mental illness or a personal or family history of alcohol problems should avoid alcohol entirely. In addition, those taking certain medications should avoid alcohol consumption as well. For the latter group, discuss alcohol consumption with your physician when he or she writes you a prescription.

Quit smoking

The decision to smoke tobacco is the decision to invite a host of potential physical ailments, not the least of which is heart disease. Smoking contributes to the buildup of plaque in the arteries, increases the risk of blood clots, reduces the amount of oxygen in the blood and increases blood pressure. As if that's not enough, smoking also harms those around you. According to the American Cancer Society, secondhand smoke is responsible for 3,400 lung cancer deaths among nonsmokers in the United States each year. In Canada, nearly 8,000 nonsmokers lose their lives each year from exposure to secondhand smoke.

What might surprise some people, however, is how quickly quitting smoking can reduce a person's risk for heart disease. According to the Heart & Stroke Foundation, within 48 hours of quitting a person's chances of having heart disease have already started to go down. For those who successfully avoid smoking for one year, the risk of a suffering a smoking-related heart attack has been cut in half. After 15 years, the risk of heart attack is the same as someone who never smoked at all.

Embrace physical activity

People who are physically inactive are twice as likely to be at risk for heart disease or stroke than people who are physically active. The AHA notes that research has shown that getting at least 30 minutes of physical activity on five or more days of the week can help lower blood pressure and lower cholesterol while helping to maintain a healthy weight. If starting from scratch, even light physical activity can provide some health benefits. Gradually work your way up to more demanding activities, and make physical activity a routine part of your daily life.

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Ways Pets Can Improve Your Health

Keep Blood Pressure in Check

You still have to watch your weight and exercise. But having a pet can help you manage your blood pressure. In one study of 240 married couples, pet owners had lower blood pressure and lower heart rates during rest than people who did not own a pet. That held true whether they were at rest or undergoing stress tests. Another study showed that children with hypertension lowered their blood pressure while petting their dog.



Help for Lowering Cholesterol

To manage cholesterol, doctors still recommend that you follow guidelines regarding diet, exercise, and medication. But owning a pet has the potential of making it easier to avoid the dangers of cholesterol. Researchers have noted lower levels of cholesterol and triglycerides in people who own pets compared to people who don't. However, this could be attributed to lifestyle factors of pet owners.

Cats and Dogs Good for the Heart

Research has shown the long-term benefits of owning a cat include protection for your heart. Over the 20 years of one study, people who never owned a cat were 40% more likely to die of a heart attack than those who had. Another study showed that dog owners had a significantly better survival rate one year after a heart attack. Overall, pet owners have a lower risk of dying from any cardiac disease, including heart failure.

IS IT A HEART ATTACK?

Is it a heart attack?

While some heart attacks are sudden and intense like in the movies, most heart attacks start slowly, with mild pain or discomfort. Often, women having a heart attack aren't sure what's wrong and wait too long before getting help. Signs you may be having a heart attack:

- Uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain in the center of your chest that lasts more than a few minutes or goes away and comes back,

- Shortness of breath or sudden fatigue,
 - Pain or discomfort in other areas of the upper body like one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or upper stomach,
 - Other signs of discomfort like breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.
- As with men, women's most common heart attack symptom is chest pain or discomfort. But women are somewhat more likely than men to experience some of the other common symptoms, particularly shortness of breath, nausea/vomiting, and back or jaw pain.
- Surveys have shown that only slightly more than half of women are likely to call 911 if they personally experience these symptoms. And yet, 79 percent of women said that they would call 911 if someone else was having a heart attack. Don't hesitate to call 911. It could save your life.
- The American Heart Association cautions to learn the signs, and even if you're not sure it's a heart attack, have it checked out immediately and tell a doctor about your symptoms.

\$43,000 in mini-grants to PSC

surgery supervisor Linda Winkelman, the physical therapy department, nursing personnel and the medical staff, a plan was developed and implemented. Dr. Samani now states, “The patients are receiving the same professional care here (F.C.) as they would get in the city and maybe better! The CMC surgical staff is an excellent team to work with.”

One of Dr. Samani’s patients, Marlene McKim, is overjoyed with the success of her surgery. “I couldn’t ask for better care then I had with Dr. Samani. I just love him. My surgery was done before Dr. Samani started offering the service in Falls City, but that’s such a great idea, because my family would have been able to be with me more and the expense of my travels would have been so little. We, the Falls City community, are so lucky to have this service available at our hospital.” Glenn Godemann, a recent surgery patient of Dr. Samani in Falls City, commented, “The surgery went great, the hospital stay was fantastic, and I was very pleased with the results. Dr. Samani utilizes Minimally Invasive (MIS) technique in performing knee replacement and is one of only several surgeons in the Midwest qualified in that technique. Patient recovery period is typically one half the time required by standard surgery. na Cummings is personally not performing her duties as County Assessor.” The recall initiative has been filed jointly by the two men, who will serve as the principal circulators. A successful recall effort would require just over 850 validated signatures (35 percent of the 2,431 voters who participated in the previous election). If a sufficient number of recall petitions were circulated, an election would be scheduled. That election could be included in the May 2012 primary. The Journal will have additional information and comment from those involved.
