## Pancake feed helps FC Rec make ball, swimming, soccer, etc., possible

Falls City Recreation will hold its 17<sup>th</sup> annual pancake feed from 8 a.m.-1 p.m. Sunday, Feb. 28, in the commons area of Falls City High School. Pancakes, sausage and drinks will be served.

A free will offering will be collected; all profits derived from the annual pancake feed, along with the business fund drive conducted in early summer, are FC Rec's main public fundraisers for all programs, including baseball, softball, tee ball, swim team, swim lessons, soccer and flag football.

On an annual basis, it takes more than \$36,000 to run those programs, which provide activities to approximately 1,300 young participants each year.

More than half the cost (55 percent) comes from registration dues, and the City of Falls City kicks in another 15 percent or so. The bal-

ance is acquired through donations made by the public and other civic, church and fraternal groups, as well as the local business community.

In addition to the annual program costs, Falls City Rec, in conjunction with the City of Falls City, undertakes the improvements and upkeep of the ball facilities at Fielder Family Ball Complex. The soccer and flag football programs are in the spring and fall and these games will again be held on Thomas Field at Jug Brown Stadium.

"We thank Falls City Public Schools for the use of their facility," Rec Board Member Kevin Malone said. "This is all made possible by the generosity of everyone that has made a donation of money or time to our program, all of which benefit the youth of the Falls City area."

Those unable to attend the pancake feed Sunday can still make a donation to FC Rec at F&M Bank.

\*James Standerford has filed on the Republican ticket; Rick Martin has filed as a Democrat candidate.


**School Districts 56 and 70** all have three positions up for election this year, with up to six candidates being considered for nomination at the May 10 Primary Election.


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Since its an election year, I'm reminded of one of the most fun and painful days of my life. I'm not sharing this story to start a political argument, I'm sharing it because it was such a huge part of my life and truly a once in a lifetime event for a girl from Dawson, Nebraska.

In Aug. of 2008 I got a call asking if I would be interested in going to the Democratic National Convention. The 2008 convention was in Denver and I had been jokingly saying we should just go stand outside for the fun of it. I hadn't thought in a billion years we would get passes for the event but our friend who was working the convention had gotten us a couple and a hotel room. I hastily took two days off explaining to my boss at the time that it was a big deal for us. So Brian and I loaded up my Grand Am that I'd been driving since high school and made our way west. The drive was miserable as gas prices were over \$4.00 at the time and it was the middle of August and we didn't have an air conditioner.

We pulled into downtown Denver around 2 a.m. and found the hotel. We were up most the night talking with everyone in our hotel who was working the event. The atmosphere was incredible and the excitement was contagious.

The next day after two hours of sleep we made it downtown for a quick lunch. A little after noon it was time to go get in line for the speeches that evening. We knew getting in would be no picnic so we decided to be there very early. Brian and I boarded the train headed to Invesco Field where the final night of speeches would take place. Here is where it gets fun.

We rode the crowded train filled to the brim with the smell sweaty adults, bad cologne and general giddiness. We were told to get off about two miles from Invesco because everything was shut down from there on out. The train, the interstate, the buses, everything. We hopped off and started our long walk. I was walking on air until we saw the sight before us. Thousands of people trying to get into the stadium while dodging the thousands of protesters blocking the way. There were protesters against Obama, against marijuana, for marijuana, for Obama, against people who bird watch, and so on. To say it was ridiculous would be an understatement.

We were literally standing in front of Invesco when we rounded the corner to see people everywhere. We walked around for about an hour before we found the end of the line. We got there and expected to be there a few hours. I was tired, hot, thirsty, and that garlic-alfredo pasta I stupidly had for lunch was trying to make a comeback. We stood in the direct sun for hours. We would take turns going to sit in a shady spot on a hill near the line so we wouldn't pass out like so many other people around us. Six hours in, I was weak, burned, and so dehydrated I could hardly stand. The only thing getting me through at this point was adrenaline and that too was fading. Finally that's when gobs of Denver's finest showed up with cases of warm bottled water. They first walked around handing it to anyone who looked a bit peaked. Luckily I was one of the first and I downed four bottles in about 10 minutes. Finally everyone around us had water and we were all relieved. I know a few of us actually discussed how we may not make it, but our spouses should go on with out us. It was very dramatic, but when you are in the state we were in, you'd start to talk crazy too.

Near hour seven the line started to move. During the hustle of finally moving I got my second wind. We were so close, or so I thought. We still had miles to cover and if we didn't keep up, we were trampled. So, I'm huffing, near tears, complaining as loudly as I can as we weave in and out of the weirdest places. Up some wooden steps, down some wooden steps, by small den surrounded in police tape, back to the parking lot where I nearly died, in front of the stadium, around the stadium, down a hill, along a fenced in sidewalk, up a hill, down another hill, under an over pass and finally to the tents. Oh the glorious tents! Then I heard it-Al Gore speaking. And here came the biggest break down of my life thus far. I was yelling at the secret service to hurry up-dumb, don't do that. But I had followed and invested so much in the 2000 election that I had really gotten to love Al Gore. I respected him and admittedly was mostly there to see him speak.


We got into the stadium, and guess who's seats were on the entire other side? I was crying, yelling and generally having a mental breakdown. We got to our seats and sat for the first time in over seven hours. Brian said he was going to get food, and I stayed for the end of the Al Gore speech.

I was so happy I had gotten to hear the last of his speech that I sat back and sort of zoned out for a while. I got to see Stevie Wonder, Will.I.Am., John Legend, Sheryl Crow, and Michael McDonald. Nothing prepared me for what happened next. Brian returned to let me know that there was no food. No food-I was in a panic and felt as if I was at death's door. I'm a bit dramatic when I'm hungry. In all reality when future Vice President Joe Biden got up to speak everything from the day just faded away. After Biden finished, it was time for the main event. Barack Obama. The man who would soon be President of the United States. After the final word of his speech, fireworks started and confetti dropped. It was surreal, maybe I was overwhelmed over the American pride or severely dehydrated, but it felt magical to be there in that moment.

After everyone had gotten off stage, it was time to leave. I told Brian I wanted to wait it out a bit so, we walked around soaking everything in. We stopped and talked to Scott Kleeb who was running for senate in Nebraska. The place cleared out rather quickly. We walked out with a normal size group of people. Except we didn't remember how to get back to the hotel. We figured it couldn't be that far. We would just walk out, find a train or group to follow and walk back. The joke was on us. We were cattle. We were trapped in a fenced in parking lot. Hilarity, panic, and riots ensued. People were freaking out and we just sat watching it all go down. It was like an out of body experience. Cops were everywhere, sirens and total darkness in some areas. It was a bit like that scene in 'War of the Worlds.'

We were told over a loud speaker after an hour of watching everyone freak out that we could cross a small bridge up ahead and head one mile north to the train station. The thought of another mile in my fragile state put me in a tailspin. Before we could even wrap our heads around what was said, people broke the fence down that kept everyone in order and started to run. Naturally we followed assuming the riot mentality was the way to get through this. We crossed the bridge and ran into the darkness. We could hear people praying and I started to pray under my breath that we were going the right way. About an hour of walking got us to the train station. We both sighed a breath of relief and then waited, in line, yet again. An hour and a half later we boarded a train. We were almost the last ones in line so the train wasn't very packed. We were exhausted and just sat in silence. I leaned my head on the window watching it all go by.

Weak, tired, hungry, dehydrated, and hot we walked into the hotel. My head was pounding so hard from the heat and lack of water that I almost couldn't bare it. Brian insisted on finding food. I lay down in bed and turned on the TV. It was almost 2 a.m. and somehow Brian had talked a hotel staffer into making us some hot wings in the hotel restaurant. Brian made it back and my eyes were swollen from the migraine I had developed. I had some ice on my face trying to get it under control. We still didn't really talk about the day, just sat on the bed with our hot wings. I got one down and picked up the next one put it in my mouth and fell asleep. I had fallen asleep while eating. The next day we woke up and started the long drive home. Nearly eight years later and I still haven't recovered from that day I spent over seven hours in a line that spanned over six miles. I'll never do that again-probably.



# Lawmakers see faces of uninsured

The governor doesn't like the bill. The Tea Party doesn't either. Some lawmakers have railed against it.

A proposal to provide some form of healthcare to an estimated 77,000 uninsured Nebraskans (LB1032) has been characterized as Medicaid expansion. Others call it an extension of Obamacare. Some say it's too risky to rely on unused federal dollars that Nebraska is apparently "missing out on."

A trio of lawmakers, two Republicans and one Democrat in the officially nonpartisan Legislature, have championed the measure and they put together nearly four hours of proponent testimony before the Health and Human Services Committee on a dreary winter afternoon. The opponents muster about 90 minutes.

The bill's Nebraska sponsor, Senator John McCollister of Omaha, said the measure would provide health care coverage for the 77,000 - two-thirds of whom fit the definition of the working poor, by accessing federal Medicaid dollars that are available to Nebraska under the Affordable Care Act. The plan would use those Medicaid funds to purchase private health care insurance.

A health policy and regulatory adviser, Patricia Boozang of Boston, said the Arkansas model that would partially guide Nebraska's plan has resulted in a 13 percent decrease in uninsured residents, a 55 percent decrease in uncompensated care at hospitals and a \$118 million decrease in state general fund spending.

The committee has yet to take action on the measure. Proponents - some of whom have pushed for adoption for at least three years - say it is long overdue. Opponents note that it will likely be vetoed by the governor and possibly not win by an override.

No matter. Win or lose, the Nebraska Legislature - and the folks who follow it closely - have gotten the point.

The hearing finally put a face to the problem. And it's a face that Nebraskans can recognize. A face that is as sure to touch the lives of average Nebraskans as it does the lives of the office holders and the policy makers. It's the face of people we see every day, at the grocery store or in church. It's the people working part-time or at underpaying jobs.

Sarah spoke first, identifying herself as one of the faces of the 77,000. She's a 20-year Nebraska resident, a Wesleyan College graduate who worked full-time until 2011 when she went part-time to take care of her ailing father.

She is now working temporary jobs and struggling with health issues. She told the committee that she has to pick and choose which health condition she wants to have treated depending on how much money she has. Her mounting medical bills could lead to bankruptcy. She asked the committee to give her a chance. "Help us so we can have our best shot at a healthy life."

Paulette was next. She had a college degree and five children when she moved to Nebraska. Her hus-

band left her and the child support she receives combined with her Social Security payments put her \$42 over the eligibility line for Medicaid. But she can't afford private insurance either. She suffers from insomnia and hypertension, both of which have had to go untreated. She recently wound up in the hospital after days of going with no sleep.

A teary-eyed Lisa Metzler told the committee that she and her husband are in their mid-50s and can't afford the treatments for their son who is sick with recurring renal failure.

And so it went, well into the early evening. More than four hours from proponents, most of whom were similarly situated.

Speaking in opposition were Bry-

an King, an Arkansas State Senator and member of Americans for Prosperity. He called the proposal, loosely based on an Arkansas plan he opposed, a boondoggle for insurance companies and a nightmare for state government.

Speaking for the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services, Medicaid Director Calder Lynch warned about the costs associated with the proposal and questioned whether the federal government could be trusted to meet its obligations.

A representative group of Nebraska residents have spoken. They outlined the problem clearly. Their need is real.

If they rule the day, here's hoping that the opponents can provide a plan to meet that need. The ball will clearly be in their court.

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
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# Financial mistakes people make at different ages

There's a saying that with age comes wisdom, but this may not always be true in the financial world. As people move through different life stages, there are new opportunities--and potential pitfalls--around every corner.

### In your 20s

Living beyond your means. It's tempting to want all the latest and greatest in gadgets, entertainment, and travel, but if you can't pay for most of your wants up front, then you need to rein in your lifestyle. If you take on too much debt--or don't work diligently to start paying off the debt you have--it can hold you back financially for a long, long time.

Not saving for retirement. You've got plenty of time, so what's the rush? Well why not harness that time to work for you. Start saving a portion of your annual pay now and your 67-year-old self will thank you.

Not being financially literate. Many students graduate from high school or college without knowing the basics of money management. Learn as much as you can about saving, budgeting, and investing now so you can benefit from it for the rest of your life.

### In your 30s

Being house poor. Whether you're buying your first home or trading up, don't buy a house that you can't afford, even if the bank says you can. ## Proposed cigarette tax increase has positive effect

One of the most important bills that will improve health outcomes introduced this session of the Nebraska legislature is LB 1013. This proposal would increase the cigarette tax from its current rate of \$.64 per pack to \$2.14 per pack, a \$1.50 increase. Most importantly, it will save lives. If this tax increase seems significant, then let me say it is. What is also a significant cost, is the cost of tobacco related illnesses placed on an already burdened healthcare system. Healthcare expenditures caused directly by tobacco use is approximately \$795 million annually in Nebraska alone. By placing a significant increase on the tax of tobacco products, tobacco use in Nebraska will be reduced along with the impacts associated with tobacco use. Smoking is estimated to increase the risk of cardiovascular disease and stroke by two to four times, and the risk of lung cancer by 25 times. With raising the cigarette tax by \$1.50, projections have shown approximately 12,300 current smokers will quit, 12,100 youths under the age of 18 will be deterred from starting smoking, and 7,000 premature smoking caused deaths will be prevented. This increase of \$1.50 tax on cigarettes has the long term potential to save \$493.44 million in health care costs for Nebraska.

Smoking is a vice that impacts not just the user, but those exposed to second hand smoke. The negative effects of second hand smoke occur in adults and youth. In children some of the effects are earaches, frequent asthma attacks, respiratory illness, and in infants a greater risk of sudden infant death syndrome (SIDS). Adults who have never smoked but have been exposed to second hand smoke have a greater likelihood of heart disease, stroke, and lung cancer. Differing sides will liken this debate as a battle, regardless of this hyperbole, as I have demonstrated this battle does indeed have casualties. I am a proponent for personal rights, as well as personal responsibilities, it is when a person's actions have the ability to negatively impact the rights and health of those surrounding them, we have to speak up as a community. As a community we have an opportunity to impact health in a positive aspect. By utilizing our political system, we have the opportunity to drive change by contacting our representatives and voicing our concerns. The senators in Lincoln are men and women sent by us to represent our interests, and it is our duty as members of the community to let them know how we stand on issues facing the health of our community. I urge the community to contact, not only their senator, but also those who sit on the State's Revenue committee. 
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# Nice weather brings out bikes

With a pre-spring warm up forecast for the Cornhusker state, the Nebraska State Patrol is reminding all motorists of the need to "share the road" in an effort to reduce and prevent serious injury and fatality crashes involving motorcycles.

Last year, 26 people were killed in crashes involving motorcycles on Nebraska roadways. There were 20 motorcycle fatalities in 2014 and 14 in 2013. According data from the Nebraska Department of Roads, six of the 26 motorcycle fatalities that occurred in 2015 happened during the months of Jan. and March.

"I know it is still winter, but along with the forecast for warmer weather comes an anticipated increase in motorcycle traffic on our roadways," said Colonel Bradley Rice, Superintendent of the Nebraska State Patrol. "We are hoping to increase awareness and encourage all drivers to



watch out for each other."

With a much smaller profile, motorcycles are often hidden in a vehicle's blind spot or missed in a quick look. Motorists are encouraged to always make a visual check for motorcycles by checking mirrors or blind spots before entering or leaving a lane of traffic and at intersections.

Motorcyclists are reminded they must obey the same rules of the road as the rest of the motoring public. Nebraska law requires motorcycle riders and passengers to wear a DOT compliant helmet. A Class M (motorcycle) license or Class M endorsement on a regular operator's license is also required.

Colonel Rice said, "A big part of roadway safety is sharing the responsibility and watching out for one another. We hope you'll join us by doing your part."

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
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# Days of Yore...

The season came to a close for Frederick and the Lady Tigers, who posted an 8-13 record in 2015-16. Three of FC's losses came against Auburn, which improved to 19-5 and will take on 22-3 Class C1 No. 7 Louisville Friday in Syracuse for the District Final and a trip to the state tournament on the line. The Bulldogs lost at Louisville 60-43 back on Jan. 26. The Lady Tigers beat Humboldt-TR-S in the regular season finale at FCHS, and defeated Wilber-Clatonia 62-58 in overtime of the C1-1 Sub-district semifinals at Beatrice to advance to a third ill-fated meeting with Auburn.

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## Tigers seek third straight trip to Lincoln

FC sophomore Brandt Chapple scored a game-high 16 points and pulled down 13 rebounds, and junior Kyle Leafy scored 12 Friday night in the regular season and home finale, as the Tigers registered a 49-32 win over Fairbury to enter the postseason with a 12-8 record and riding a three-game winning streak.

The Tigers tonight start postseason play and are seeking a third straight trip to state. FCHS needs three more wins to get back to Lincoln, the site of devastating heartbreak each of the past two years, starting at 7:30 p.m. tonight against 14-6 Wilber-Clatonia at Beatrice HS. The winner will face either top-seeded JCC or Fairbury in Thursday's 7 p.m. final. Syracuse (16-7) is the favorite to emerge from the C1-2 District.

While FC was hammered by 18 by Syracuse in the season opener, the Tigers have yet to face either Wilber-Clatonia or No. 1 seed Johnson CC. The Thunderbirds have some strong wins (by 12 at Syracuse in December, 15 over Freeman, 17 over Wilber, 13 over Elmwood-Murdock and by a whopping 27 over 20-2 Mead at the conference tournament. They've also shown some vulnerability, edging HTRS by one, 42-41, in January, and recently lost to Elmwood-Murdock by five, 44-39, in their conference championship game. E-M beat the Tigers by four, 60-56, back on Jan. 16, during a tough stretch for FC. After winning seven in a row to improve to 7-2, the Tigers lost 6-of-8 before snapping the cold spell with a blowout win over Nebraska City Feb. 9.


FCHS ended the regular season strong, sending five seniors (Bradly and Bryan

## Irish need to win sub to preserve .500 season

The FC Sacred Heart boys' basketball team will need to win the Class D2-1 subdistrict tournament this week to avoid handing its renowned coach just his second losing record in an illustrious 30-year career.

Sacred Heart, 10-11 on the season, will take on 18-5 D2 No. 6 Sterling at 7:45 p.m. tonight at Johnson. The winner will face either 18-5 No. 4 Lincoln Parkview Christian or 12-12 Lewiston in the subdistrict final at 7 p.m. Thursday in Johnson. That's the hard part - all four teams in the D2-2 subdistrict stumble into the postseason after enduring harsh winters: 9-12 Exeter-Milligan, 0-21 Meridian, 2-19 Dorchester and 4-16 Hampton.

No Nebraska high school coach reached 500 wins faster than Goltz and Sacred Heart's eight state championships is tops among the current Class D2 field. Since his rookie year in 1986, Goltz has coached just one team that lost more games than it won: In 2009-10, FCSH went 9-12, though all those losses came to very good teams (three were to a 26-2 DI State Champion Freeman team).

Likewise, this winter, as is the case every winter, the Irish played a bear of a schedule. Unlike perhaps any other year, though, FCSH has seemingly regressed. They're riding a five-game losing skid into tonight's game and have captured just two wins since mid-January. That, after starting the year 4-0, which includ-

ed a season-opening victory over Sterling and near-misses over the holidays to both Elmwood-Murdock (47-46) and Freeman (44-41), where they lost on a three-pointer at the buzzer. But in a rematch with Freeman in the MUDECAS semis, FCSH was on the wrong end of a 19-point beat-down, and in a second meeting with Sterling earlier this month, Sacred Heart suffered an 11-point loss.

Sterling is coming off a 48-47 overtime loss to Freeman, while FCSH lost 62-49 at D1 No. 3 Lourdes CC Saturday at Nebraska City. The Irish took a two-point lead into halftime (30-28) and trailed by just two after three quarters, but NCL was nails at the free throw line in the final period and used a 20-9 run to finish the game. The Knights, now 20-4 and winners of 11 straight, made 10-of-14 foul shots in the final period. Senior Julius Sakinis, a 6-foot-8 monster, had 19 points, while junior guard Hayden Miller scored 13, hitting four big foul shots in the final period.

It was a game in which both teams put a premium on each possession. Lourdes took just 21 shots inside three-point land (hitting 14) - and 18 beyond the arc (making six), while FCSH was 17-of-39 overall from the floor. Senior guard Bailey Witt led the Irish with 13 points, hitting 6-of-7 from the line in the second quarter alone. He also dished out five assists. Senior Henry Arnold and sophomore Theo Rohrer each finished with 10 points and six boards.



**ROAD AND BRIDGE DEPARTMENT**  
Highway Supt. Scott Huppert updated the Board on the routine maintenance being done on county roads and bridges this week. A Safety Meeting is being scheduled for March 11, 2016. Huppert also has been in contact with the NE DEQ regarding the used oil collection program. He was informed the used oil collection trailer is the property of Richardson County.

He reported that the One & Six Year Road Plan Public Hearing has been scheduled for 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, March 1, 2016.

Huppert also stated that all the rock trucks are out and hauling rock.

**COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE**  
Extension Educator Kaytlyn Kennedy, Extension Board member Neal Kanel, 4-H Assistant Jamie Ankrom and Dave Varner, Associate District Director of the University of Nebraska SE Research and Extension Center, met with the Board and submitted the annual extension board report. Another report was given to the Board on funding for the 4-H aide. Kennedy explained how the position of the 4-H assistant was created

in 2009 with six organizations funding the position: FC EDGE, three schools within the county, the University of Nebraska and the County. Varner then further explained how the funding from the university would be reduced each year over the next four fiscal years until it is not funded at all by the university. The funding of this staff person would be completely shifted to the local funding sources. Varner also explained that the current funding be offered by the University of Nebraska would be reallocated to the larger metropolitan areas to meet their funding needs.

**SHERIFF DON POUNDS**  
Motion was made by Sichel to approve the change order proposal #4 for the construction project of the Jail/Law Enforcement Center for the costs associated with converting records room #154 to offices at a total increased cost of \$6,156,000. Sheriff Pounds also provided an update on the possible remodeling of the kitchen area at the jail/law enforcement center. According to zoning and building codes of the City of Falls City it indicates that a grease trap/storage tank must be located outside of the building and have a capacity of 500 gallons. The Board will review this matter further.

A discussion was held on the possible relocation of the 911 PSAP to the Jail/Law Enforcement Center. Representatives from the City of Falls City were present: Mayor Jerry Oliver, City Administrator Gary Jorm and Police Chief Duane Armbruster. Discussion was also held on the ideas of the Sheriff as stated in his letter submitted to the Board at the Jan. 26, 2016 meeting.

Sheriff Pounds once again stated that of utmost importance at this time is to get a radio antenna/tower in place so that radio communications can be received at the Jail/Law Enforcement Center once it is ready for occupancy.

It was also decided that representatives from the City of Falls City, the Sheriff and a County Board member will meet later this month along with the EMA Director to review more facts and figures that should be put together by all interested parties for a more clearer view of the idea of moving the 911 PSAP dispatching to the Jail/Law Enforcement Center and come up with a solution that would be in the best interest for all Richardson County taxpayers.
