New Castle, Del., (pop. 4469), on the busy Delaware River, is six miles south of the state's largest city, Wilmington, and two miles off the main highway. Once it was Delaware's capital. Founded in 1651, it was William Penn's landing place when he came to America in 1682. Penn is thought to have spent a night in the house at the extreme right of our cover. The spire atop the Court house (left foreground) was used as the center of a twelve-mile radius in part of the 1763-67 survey--to settle a boundary dispute-- that resulted in the Mason-Dixon Line, which later played a key part in United States history.

Pet food processor expanding to Falls City

Falls City Economic Development and Growth Enterprise has announced that Great West - Teeuwissen is planning a Falls City location for its processing, exports, imports and trade of animal by-products serving pet food and animal feed industries.

The facility will be located in the Industrial Park at 404 Pacific St. (the former Gold Star Sausage plant).



"While there is still work to be done, we feel our strategic location and the advantages of doing business in the Falls City area will continue to move this project through the due diligence phases. The plan calls for \$1.7M in capital investment for acquisition of the building and the purchase of equipment. They will also create 20 new full-time jobs. Falls City EDGE plans to host a job fair in order to assist the company with recruitment of its employees.

The jobs being created are in the food processing industry and will include managers, maintenance, warehouse, production and office personnel.

Great West - Teeuwissen President Doug Haycock and members of his management team have made several site visits to the facility and they are excited about the opportunity to launch operations in Falls City.

"We appreciate everyone who has assisted us in the site location process including the Nebraska Dept. of Economic Development and Falls City EDGE," Haycock said. "Kris Benson and Beckie Cromer have helped us advance our goal of acquiring

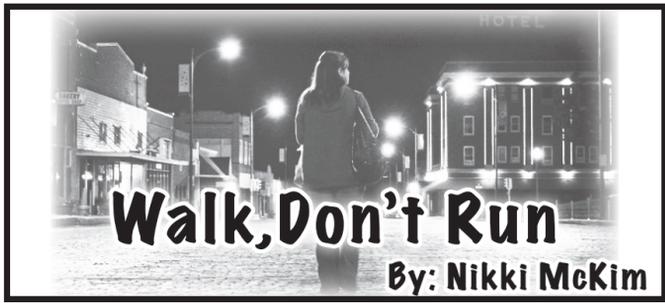

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Walk, Don't Run

I come from a long line of animal lovers. My grandma never met a dog she didn't love immediately and need right now, same with my mom, myself, my son and my nieces.

Dogs are my favorite people on earth. They listen, they rarely talk back and they don't judge you for getting up in the middle of the night and eating a bowl of cereal. I just have a huge soft spot for dogs of any kind.

When we lost Beans early last year, we decided we wanted to honor his memory in some way. As the months flew by and life got hectic we decided to honor him in some way on the year anniversary of his death. Beans was not a shelter dog, but from a litter a friend of ours had. Beans had a home all set up, but it fell through. Brian and I decided to take him and never regretted it for a second. Much like Beans, we got Lewis from the same family. Beans needed a friend and who could be better than his own brother?

When I started working for the *Journal* I had a hard time putting the Humane Society of Richardson County ads together. Each week I read about a cat or dog who needed a home. Sometimes the story explained that the animal was relinquished or dumped on the side of the road. Those poor little souls had no idea why they were left to die. It broke my heart and I truly wanted to save each one of them. After a couple years asking Brian if we could take in dog after dog, one stood out.

Jackson had been given up by his owners. When I first laid eyes on him he was a ball of matted hair covered in mud. I asked the dog catcher to bring Jackson to the *Journal* office so I could have Brian meet me there to see him. His time was limited and he was going to be put down the next day. When the dog catcher opened the back of the truck Jackson just stared at us. You could hardly see his eyes as they were covered in mud and hair. We had to have him. You could tell that he had led a rough life. We took him home and started to question our decision. It took hours to get him clean enough to tell that he was mostly white with gray spots and had one blue eye and one brown eye. We later found out that he had been badly abused during the beginning of his life. Knowing the stories of how he was treated, we are always amazed at how he has never growled or bit anyone ever. He was and is the most loving dog I've ever come across. Though he's been with us for about six years now, he will still do anything just to sit next to someone and get any kind of attention.

As the date of Beans' death approached Brian and I discussed how we would honor him. We had saved some money to use for whatever we chose. Immediately we knew that we wanted to do something for the Humane Society of Richardson County. They had provided Beans with his best friend Jackson. Though Beans was an 'old man,' who had bad knees and a hard time getting around, he loved to run circles and play with Jackson. I think having such a happy and well-mannered dog in the house added a few years to Beans' life. They played and played up until a few hours before Beans died.

We checked the Humane Society website and noticed that we could buy a bed for a dog and have it shipped to the shelter. We were going to do that, but I then decided to ask Julie Phroper for her advice on what to do. We wanted to help with what was needed most. After talking to Julie, we found out that right now they needed some treats. We were excited that we were going to get to go pick out some treats for the animals. Buying a bed or donating money would have been great, but getting to go shop and pick out the treats we thought they would like was a lot more fun for us.

Last week Alex and I put tags on each box and bag of treats that said 'Enjoy these treats given with love in memory of Beans McKim.' Alex and I were excited of the pile we had accumulated; we took some pictures and posted them to Facebook. It was met with some excitement and a little hesitation at what was perceived as 'fishing for a pat on the back.' I wanted to show Alex how exciting it is to help others, especially those who can't help themselves. He was proud of the money he personally worked for and used to add to the pile of treats and I was proud of him for using his money in such a way. He wanted to scream it from the rooftops, so we did.

The great thing about the Humane Society of Richardson County is the people who volunteer and take care of the animals. They are happy to have any help, whether it be volunteering or donating. I would love to volunteer, but to be honest I just don't think my heart could take it. I would start hoarding dogs in my basement and I don't think my husband would like it. I would love to give out treats to each dog and cat, but seeing them without a family is difficult. I wish I could do what Ardis, Julie, Marion, Bev and the others do for them. They power through and take care of them all even though it breaks their hearts too. We need more people like them.

Urgent action needed on Dept. of Corrections

The Nebraska Legislature needs to concentrate on the Nebraska Department of Corrections and solutions to its myriad of problems for the rest of the 2017 session. Period.

While the governor and the attorney general and the corrections director all say that the most recent incident at the Tecumseh State Prison wasn't a riot and didn't jeopardize public safety, I'd like to see the three of them convince the family and friends of the late Damon Fitzgerald and Michael Galindo of that. The two lost their lives in the March 2 incident.

Officials have no idea who killed the two men when a group of 40 or more inmates were burning state property in a yard outside their housing unit. The same housing unit where a May riot in 2015 left two inmates dead. That murder has never been solved. Odds are pretty high that this one won't be either. Snitching in prison is an automatic death sentence.

The 39-year-old Fitzgerald was serving 310 to 470 years for Douglas County charges of sexual assault, robbery, burglary, use of a weapon to commit a felony, assault by a confined person and assault on a police officer. The 31-year-old Galindo was serving 12 to 21 years on Buffalo and Scotts Bluff County charges for robbery, forgery, misdemeanor attempted possession of a controlled substance, driving under suspension and sale of alcohol to a minor. What were these two doing in the same prison? Even more alarming, why were they in the same housing unit?

Corrections Director Scott Frakes said it has to do with length of sentence and timing of arrival in the system. He said officials do pay attention to vulnerability of certain inmates. Isn't it strange then that the two victims of the 2015 riot were both convicted child molesters, clearly among the most despised in a prison population.

In remarks on the floor of the Legislature, Sen. Dan Watermeier (who represents the district where the prison is located) noted that the response to this latest incident was much quicker than the Mothers Day incident in 2015 and the recent one was much shorter duration and no prison staff were injured.

Lincoln Sen. Patty Pansing Brooks, who last year chaired the prison investigative committee, and others took issue with the characterization. She said she and her committee colleagues were sorry and terrified by the incident, but not surprised. Then she said, "... if we continue to sugarcoat something like this, refusing to call it a riot, it's a crisis."

Many problems facing the Corrections Department are directly related to lack of funding and resources. There's also staff shortages, inadequate pay for officers, staff assaults, inadequate programming and lack of social activities for inmates. Those are being addressed in the two-year budget under consideration. But lawmakers still need to address alternative sentencing and reforms that affect prison population.

Several senators said it is unacceptable that the state cannot at least provide minimum protection for people working and residing in

the prison system. Frakes said the public's safety was never compromised. I suggest we need to redefine public to include people both outside AND inside prison walls.

ACLU of Nebraska Executive Director Danielle Conrad, a former state senator, said the latest riot is yet another painful reminder that Nebraska's prison system is failing our state. Prison population has been over emergency levels of 140

percent for nearly a decade. She said the time is now for Governor Pete Ricketts to declare an emergency and bring smart reform.

Lawmakers must pass meaningful reforms pending this session to slowly remedy the crisis. Conrad said it's no longer a question of if litigation will be filed, but a question of when.

Omaha Senator Bob Krist said that although Frakes and Ricketts did not create the problems, they and the Legislature own this situation. It's time to fix it now.



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Senators support Keystone XL

A majority of Nebraska state senators are urging the Public Service Commission to approve routing of the Keystone XL through the state. In a letter hand-delivered last week and signed by 33 of the Legislature's 49 members, senators emphasized the positive impact the TransCanada project would have on job growth, the economy and property taxes.

The senators, citing a 2013 report by the Nebraska Dept. of Environmental Quality, pointed to the estimated 4,560 Nebraska jobs that would be supported by the construction of the pipeline.

"Whenever we as a state have the opportunity to create jobs, we need to seize it," said Senator Mike McDonnell of Omaha. "These are good-paying jobs. They will benefit our communities and our working families."

According to the DEQ Final

Dear Members of the NE Public Service Commission:

As members of the Nebraska Legislature, we are well-versed in the issues and history surrounding the Keystone XL Pipeline project and wholeheartedly support the project moving forward. We respectfully urge the members of the Public Service Commission to approve the route outlined in TransCanada's recent permit application.

The Keystone XL project has undergone almost a decade of review by multiple federal agencies and the State of Nebraska and has been the subject of extensive public input. At the federal level, the Federal Environmental Impact Study outlines 57 special conditions to be determined by the U.S. Dept. of State in consultation with PHMSA. These additional measures will result in the Keystone XL project being one of the safest oil pipeline systems ever constructed. At the state level, after a thorough review, the NE Dept. of Environmental Quality stated in its Final Evaluation Report released in January 2013 that the proposed route would avoid the Sand Hills, areas of fragile soil and if built as proposed, "could have minimal environmental impacts in Nebraska."

Equally as important as the project's minimal environmental impact is its potential for major economic impact. The proposed Keystone XL project would generate significant monetary benefits in Nebraska and nationwide, including the creation of direct and indirect employment opportunities. The NDEQ report estimated construction of the pipeline would support 4,560 new or existing jobs in the state and would result in a \$418.1 million benefit to the economy. In addition, \$16.5 million in use taxes would be generated from construction materials and up to \$13 million in property taxes would be generated in the first full year of valuation.

Not only will the construction of the Keystone XL pipeline create Nebraska jobs and generate local property tax revenue, it will give our state the opportunity to play a major role in North American energy independence. This internationally important project will ultimately reduce reliance on foreign sources of oil. The Keystone XL project is in the best interest of Nebraskans and America and for this, we strongly encourage the Public Service Commission to approve TransCanada's application.

Evaluation Report, the letter states, the Keystone XL project would result in a \$418.1 million benefit to the economy, including \$13 million in additional annual property tax revenue.

"Construction alone will generate over \$16 million in use taxes," said Senator Jim Smith of Papillion. "Additional jobs will increase the tax base and the property tax revenue generated from the project will ease the property tax burden for Nebraskans living in those counties along the route."

In the letter, the senators pointed out to the PSC that in addition to the significant economic benefits, the Keystone XL project would have minimal impact on the environment, is safer than transporting oil by truck or rail, would be one of the safest pipelines ever built and would allow Nebraska to play a major role in North American energy independence.

involved in so many facets of the civil rights era.

She was involved in one of the most famous and violent sit-ins of the movement at the Jackson Woolworth lunch counter and helped plan and organize the March on Washington.

Special inspection underway at Cooper

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission this week is conducting a special inspection at Cooper Nuclear Station to review operator errors that affected a safety-related heat removal system. The plant, located in Brownville, is operated by the Nebraska Public Power District.

"This special inspection will help us better understand the circumstances that led to the operator error," NRC Region IV Administrator Kriss Kennedy said. "We need to assess the potential impact on plant safety and the licensee's corrective actions to ensure that the cause has been effectively addressed."

On Feb. 5, workers discovered that a misalignment of valves may have rendered one of the plant's residual heat removal systems inoperable for several months. Operators also performed maintenance and testing on a second residual heat removal system during the same period. As a result, there may have

been a period of approximately 72 hours when both systems were unavailable. The residual heat removal system is used to mitigate the effects of a variety of accidents.

Two NRC inspectors began their week-long inspection on Monday. A report on the findings will be publicly available within 45 days of the end of the inspection.

I'll be the first to admit that I've been guilty of drinking the so called "kool-aid" when it comes to Nebraska football. Anything that was published in print about them or about recruits had to be true. Anything that was discussed on my beloved sports talk radio was the gospel. These people I trusted had to know everything, right? Well obviously that's not always the case, it's their job to get the discussion started whether it be by painting a rosy picture or by insulting your favorite team or player. The really good ones find a middle ground between the two. The reason I bring this up is I was reading an article the other talking about an out of state caller that called into a local sports talk radio show. He had a little different take on certain issues, one in particular got me thinking. He had the gall to bring up the notion that Nebraska falling into mediocrity somehow falls squarely on the backs of Husker fans themselves.

I have been a season ticket holder for a number of years, making a "donation" each year to ensure your seats. I have dragged by family all over in search of player or coach autographs. And why do I do this you might ask? The answer to that is easy, because I'm a Husker fan.

Now back to my original question, how are the fans to blame? Let me tell you how. Each and every week we fill the seats of our sacred Memorial Stadium. Not that Patrick O'Brien or Tristan Gebbia won't turn out to be great QBs, but right now our best option is Lee. In two years at Tulane, the 6'4, 205 pound QB started 19 games, not to mention he was named the scout team mvp last season. There will be plenty of competition at all positions throughout the spring. So far at the receiver position Stanley Morgan and De'Mornay Pierson-El seem to be distancing themselves from the rest of the receiving corps. Who will take Terrell Newby's place at running back is up in the air. Devine Ozigbo had a nice game to end the season against Tennessee in the Music City Bowl, but watch out for sophomore Tre Bryant. Bryant showed flashes of speed and athleticism last season, he just needs to become more consistent. On the defensive side of the ball all options are on the table. With new defensive coordinator Bob Diaco's 3-4 defense no one is quite sure what to expect out of the Blackshirts this season. No matter what I have said in the previous paragraphs we will be there to support our Huskers, and we will continue to do so. One thing about us Husker fans, we are loyal to a fault. As always Go Big Red!

Dental health is important for children's 'baby teeth'



Dept. of Veterans Affairs Secretary Dr. David J. Shulkin, while testifying in a House Veterans Affairs Committee hearing on March 7, announced his intention to expand provisions for urgent mental health care needs to former servicemembers with other-than-honorable administrative discharges.

This move marks the first time a VA Secretary has implemented an initiative specifically focused on expanding access to assist former OTH servicemembers who are in mental health distress and may be at risk for suicide or other adverse behaviors.

"The President and I have made it clear that suicide prevention is one of our top priorities," Shulkin. "We know the rate of death by suicide among Veterans who do not use VA care is increasing at a greater rate than Veterans who use VA care. This is a national emergency that requires bold action. When we say even one Veteran suicide is one too many, we mean it."

Some 500,000 former service members with OTH discharges would be able to seek treatment at a VA emergency room, Vet Center or contact the Veteran Crisis Line.

"Our goal is simple, to save lives," Shulkin continued. "Veterans who are in crisis should receive help immediately. Far too many Veterans have fallen victim to suicide, roughly 20 every day. Far too many families are left behind asking themselves what more could have been done. The time for action is now."

Before finalizing the plan in early summer, Shulkin will meet with Congress, Veterans Service Organizations, and Dept. of Defense officials to determine the best way forward to get these Veterans the care they need.

"I look forward to working with leaders like Congressman Mike Coffman from Colorado, who has been a champion for OTH servicemembers. I am grateful for his commitment to our nations Veterans and for helping me better understand the urgency of getting this
