MODEL T's

Keep Chuggin

"I will build a car for the great multitude. It will be large enough for the family, but small enough for the individual to run and care for. It will be constructed of the best materials, by the best men to be hired, after the simplest designs that modern engineering can devise. But it will be so low in price that no man making a good salary will be unable to own one - and enjoy with his family the blessing of hours of pleasure in God's great open spaces."

The great industrialist Henry Ford authored those words in his 1922 autobiography, "My Life and Work," describing his motivation for developing the Model T. More than 90 years later, a group of Model T and Model A owners from

Kansas City, - the KC Chuggers Model T Ford Club - are keeping Ford's words alive and enjoying "God's great open spaces" with their families.

Two Fridays ago, Falls City's brick-covered Stone Street provided a resting point for the Chuggers, as nearly 30 Model T and Model A's rolled into town just after the noon hour for lunch at A&G Steakhouse and Pizza. The Chuggers, on a tour north to Lincoln's Smith Collection Museum of American Speed, stopped to eat and stretch out a bit before finishing the 100-mile second leg.

Chuggers Gary and Carol Hylton of Prairie Village, Kansas said Falls City was chosen as a stopping point after Gary and Chuggers Tour Chairman Frank Kelley detailed and planned the trip back in late January. However, the "Speedway Tour," as this trip was called, has been an idea since January of 1993 when "Speedy" Bill Smith of Lincoln's Speedway Motors brought much of his Model T collection to the Chuggers annual meeting. It was during that trip to Kansas City that Smith extended an invitation to the Smith Collection and Museum of American Speed, founded a year earlier at 599 Oak Creek Drive in Lincoln. The museum, which is now more than 150,000 square feet of display space, houses thousands of after market accessories and speed equipment for the Ford Model T, including the five millionth Model T to roll off the Ford assembly line.

Now, more than 20 years later, the trip finally happened.

The Hylton's arrived in Falls City in their 1919 Model T Touring, which featured an Ames aftermarket body. It was one of 286,935 produced in 1919, originally available in the color black and sold for \$525. It averaged

Attorney General candidate pledges 'push back' to EPA on agriculture regulations

Brian Buescher admits that when it comes to the issues, little separates himself with the other three Republican candidates - Mike Hilgers, Doug Peterson, Pete Pirsch - for Nebraska Attorney General. There's a big difference, however, he says in experience.

All four lawyers, for instance, pledge to aggressively prosecute criminals, protect the unborn and limit spending and government. Buescher, though, says he's the right candidate to fight the Federal Government against intrusive regulations imposed on Nebraska farmers. That's the main reason he's running for the office.

"We need to push back on regulations now," he said Friday, in a campaign stop in Falls City. "It's not the only issue, but it's my focus. I have an extensive ag background and that's going to help me."

The 39-year-old Omaha

lawyer grew up on a farm near Deweese, NE (population 67). After graduating valedictorian of Sandy Creek High School near Fairfield, Buescher attended the University of Nebraska-Lincoln where he graduated Chancellor's Scholar. Buescher then attended Georgetown University Law Center in Washington, DC where he served as Editor-in-Chief of the Georgetown Journal of Legal Ethics and vice president of a student body of approximately 1500.



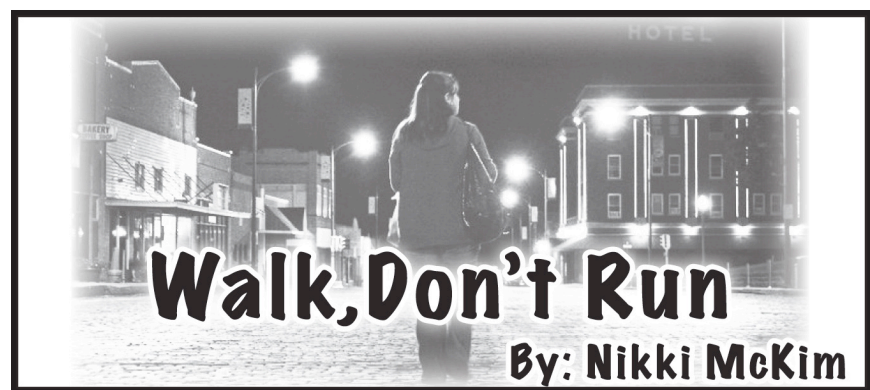
At the conclusion of his legal education, he returned to his home state of Nebraska to practice law. Buescher currently leads the agribusiness litigation team at Nebraska's largest law firm, Kutak Rock LLP, where he represents farmers, ranchers, agribusinesses, and other businesses in a variety of complex matters—including matters involving Federal Government

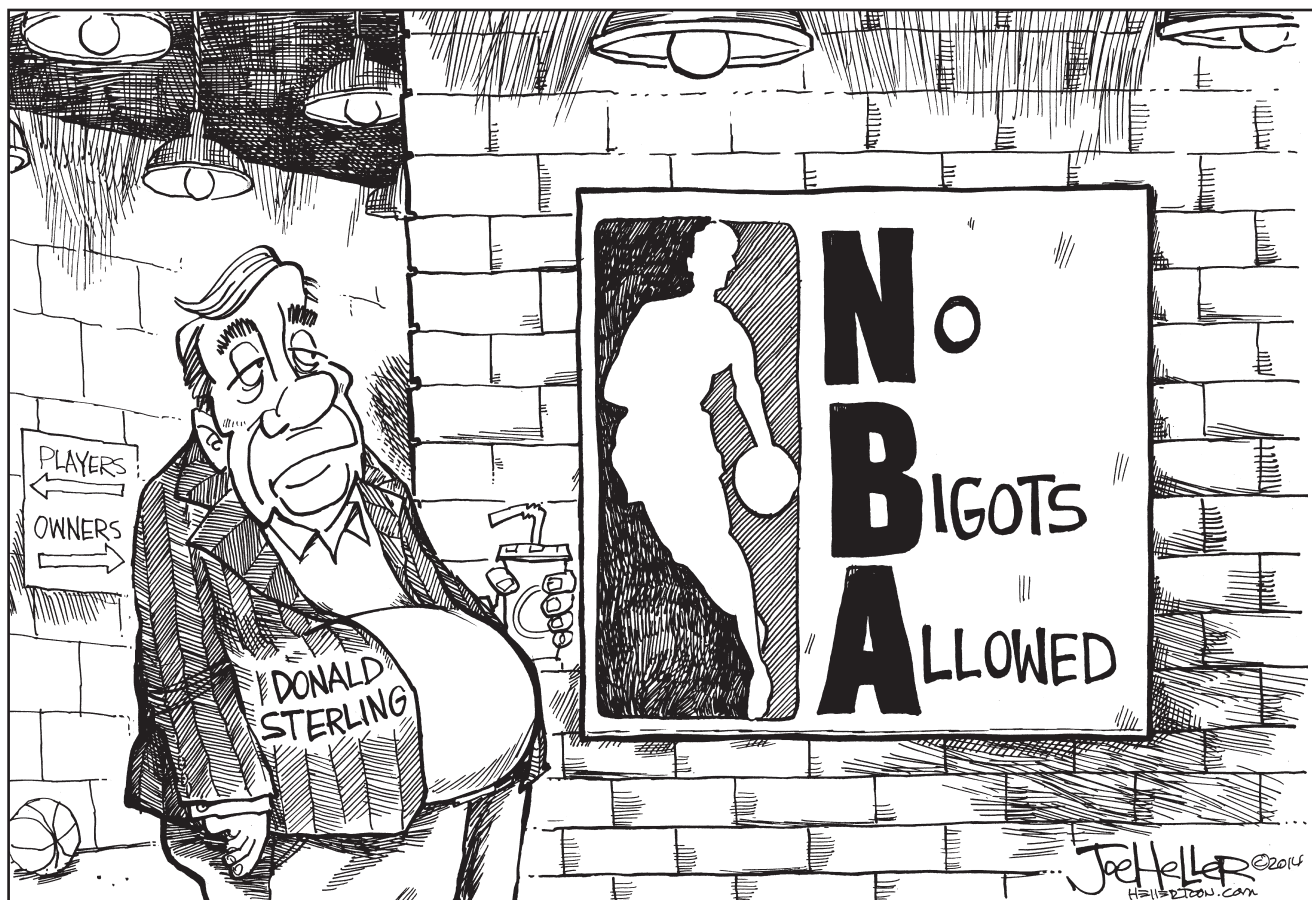

Again I tried to keep it together for him but, it's hard when you watch your child hurt. Alex is only 8 and I know I still have the worst to come. That is scary. I remember what I tried to get away with and I know he is like me in a lot of ways. I'm sure my parents sit back and laugh that soon I will get more than my fair share of payback for my actions. Which is why I often break out in hives and have to keep my hair dyed to cover my premature graying. Did I mention I am only 30?

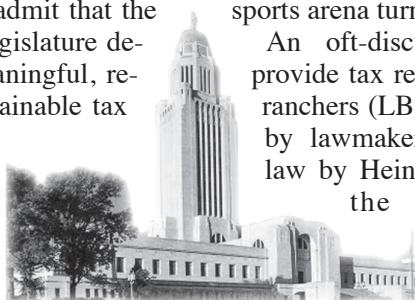

The Legislature did provide tax relief

In spite of some complaining to the contrary, even Governor Dave Heineman had to admit that the 2014 Nebraska Legislature delivered some "meaningful, responsible and sustainable tax relief." That was in contrast to his chastisement of a tax modernization committee that recommended more study before tinkering with the status quo.



Of course, it was Heineman's hope going into the session that the committee would create sweeping tax reform that would help the 10-year governor leave his legacy. The committee was formed after massive public testimony last year against two Heineman-inspired tax reform measures. Out of the limelight this year, the Legislature's Revenue Committee filtered, tweaked and advanced a handful of bills that won Heineman's belated OK.

"We are providing \$412 million of tax relief to Nebraskans over the next five years," Heineman said at the 103rd Legislature Second Session neared a close. "We've indexed Nebraska's individual income tax brackets for inflation. We've begun the process of exempting social security income and military retirement income from taxation. We have helped farmers and ranchers by eliminating the sales tax on repair parts for agricultural machinery and equipment."

He said that highlights of the five bills included an expansion of Nebraska's homestead exemption program (LBs 986 and 1087) so that more Nebraskans -- including honorably discharged 100 percent disabled veterans and their spouses and people with developmental disabilities -- will qualify.

Heineman also praised the expansion of the Property Tax Credit Program (LB905) by \$25 million, adding that he had hoped to increase that amount even through last minute budget vetoes and a suggestion that the money saved be funneled toward property tax relief. The property tax credit program, started in 2007, provides a state-funded discount on a local homeowner or landowner's property tax bill. As passed this session, the state will direct \$140 million to the fund. That could mean a savings of \$74 per \$100,000 valuation for property tax payers.

The governor said he didn't ask the Legislature to introduce a specific bill because he knew that all of the tax bills that were needed for this discussion were already introduced or would be introduced. He also had to be thinking about his failed two-bill package that crashed last year.

Heineman also signed into law a measure (LB987) to index Nebraska's individual income tax brackets for inflation. Provisions of the measure will exempt social security income for folks with an adjusted gross income of \$58,000 or less if married persons and filing jointly, and \$43,000 or less for all others. It also allows veterans to either exclude 40 percent of their pay from state taxation for seven consecutive years, or exclude 15 percent of their military retirement pay in perpetu-

ity, starting at age 67.

A variety of sales tax reductions were approved in a bill (LB867) on issues ranging from acquisitions by historic automobile museums to postage, as well as changes to the sports arena turnback provisions.

An oft-discussed measure to provide tax relief for farmers and ranchers (LB96) was also passed by lawmakers and signed into law by Heineman. It eliminates the sales tax on repair parts for agricultural machinery and equipment.

Nebraska implementation dealers, especially those in communities near the state's borders, have long complained about

losing parts and service business to nearby states that don't have the tax. In some cases, those Nebraska dealers have bought dealerships in those states to stem the loss of revenue.

Parts for a \$300,000 combine can be expensive, and even more pricey when the sales tax is added.

The governor contends that tax relief is a major force for economic success, especially as Nebraska competes in global markets. Hats off to the Legislature for addressing the important issue through a variety of bills that were able to make it through the process without creating headlines, grandstanding and political advantage for those who would seek such in a crucial election year.

Former Salem Grain driver: 'I was wrong!'

I would like to take this opportunity to voice my opinion of a local agricultural business.

A few years ago I was approached by Salem Grain Manager Dave Irwin about the proposed grain elevator coming to Falls City - CGB. At that time, there was quite a debate regarding the effects of a large corporate elevator on the local small businesses, specifically Salem Grain. It was felt that they were going to be "hurting the locals" and that it would cause a domino effect, hurting other businesses - such as Rowland Trucking - by taking away hauling and giving it to "out-of-towners."

The City Council allowed citizens a time to voice those concerns and my wife and I were asked to speak on behalf of our company and the other small businesses to be affected. For the fear was that CGB would be sending our money out of town affecting the entire community. We were reminded to shop locally to save our community.

Our voices weren't loud enough and CGB did build a new elevator. Now I was approached by Salem Grain to solicit farmers to bring the grain to Salem Grain rather than CGB. They claimed this would be added business not only for Salem Grain, but it would keep my business profitable and busy. It was a "win-win" situation. I was promised that I would always have a job working for Salem

Grain because of my loyalty to them.

We were fortunate to have another plentiful harvest this past year and my trucking company was hauling for local farmers and for Salem Grain. As harvest ended it was my assumption, due to my "loyalty," that my trucks were going to, in turn, haul grain for Salem out to various destinations. I was wrong! Salem Grain decided to broker their grain to a large elevator, Bunge. Rather than keeping their money local, they used out-of-town truckers to haul all of this local grain. Meaning the brokered trucks are not spending any money here. No fuel, tires or repairs.

This is the exact thing we told the council would happen if CGB were allowed to build. The reality is it has happened with our local business. I no longer haul for Salem Grain, but I was able to find new work for my company. I am now hauling for Bartlett in Stella and Morrill Elevator. I have contacted CGB and they are willing to hire local trucking companies - keeping their dollars local.

Where are those who faithfully cheered for these young

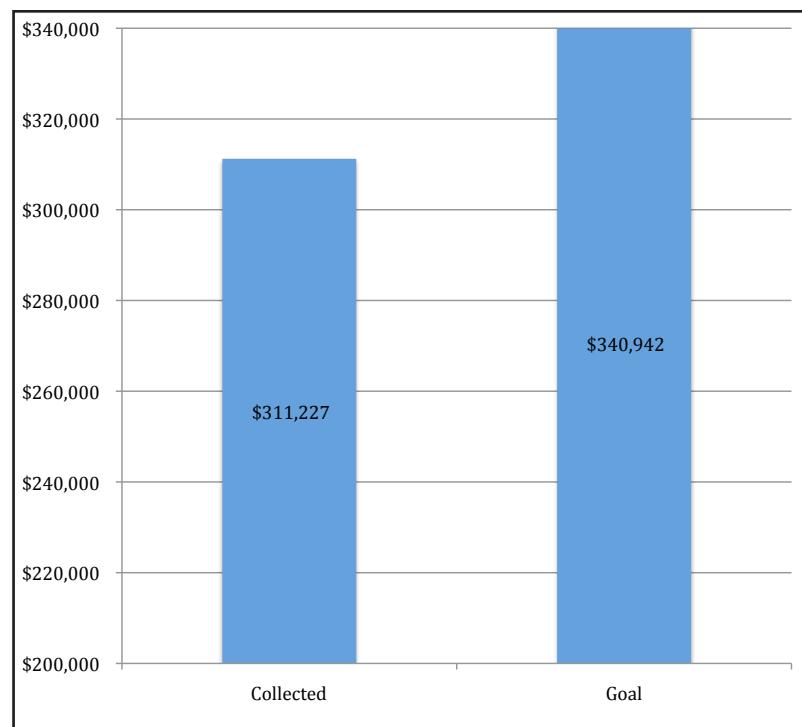
Falls City Elks 963 Remodeling Project

I am asking for your vote for one more term as Sheriff. I would like to keep the Sheriff's Office moving forward to solidify the progress we have made over the past 3 years.

The most important thing I have done since becoming Sheriff was to hire the right people. They make my job much easier, and they do great work for the people of Richardson County. We have had very low turnover, which improves stability. After I took office, the Sheriff's Office employee's voluntarily dropped their labor union. **Every deputy and jailer-dispatcher is certified by the Nebraska Law Enforcement Training Center, and they all have further training and certifications in their positions.**

We have developed positive working relationships with other agencies, including NSP, FBI, U. S. Marshal's, and the U. S. Attorney in Omaha, as well as surrounding local agencies and FCPD. The U. S. Attorney took one of our "felon in possession of a weapon" cases which resulted in more time in federal prison than a state case would have yielded. There is no "good time" in federal prison. DNA evidence was used in that conviction.

Here are some of the capabilities we have added since 2011:

All **jailer-dispatchers** have been certified as emergency **medical** dispatchers and have been trained on Scott Airpacs to help evacuate prisoners in case of a fire. They are also certified to operate our own FBI data terminal. **We handle all NCIC entries.**

Deputies have been certified as: a drug dog handler, a DARE Instructor to teach drug awareness and avoidance to children, a STOP class instructor to teach this traffic offender diversion program in Richardson County, and a drug recognition expert to examine suspects to determine which drugs they may have taken. Deputies and I have been to advanced training on roadside drug investigations and highway drug interdiction practices. All of this training was tuition free. We obtained our canine for free from the FC pound.

I hear people saying they want us to do something about drugs. Every known habitual drug user in our County has an arrest history. They go to jail, and they get out. The Sheriff's Office has an active drug dog, and we have focused much of our training on drug enforcement AND anti-drug education. We continue to look for lawful ways to fight this problem, like the "Drug Takeback" collections. Inmates who are meth users tell me they know it's too hot for them here and they plan to relocate. Several already have. As part of our efforts to combat rural theft, you have seen us on county roads more than ever before.

I took over the former chief deputy job functions to add patrol hours to the schedule. We re-structured the Sheriff's Office to increase the number of hours of patrol coverage by 31% without an increase in spending. Not only does this improve responsiveness, it reduced overtime and call-outs. We now have more patrol coverage than ever before.

The U. S. Dept of Justice certifies me as a Jail Administrator, and I manage the jail. I constantly shop for bargains when we purchase supplies and equipment. We have bought used equipment at great prices. We saved over \$1.00 on every breakfast for inmates by changing our purchasing of the same food items.

As an active law enforcement officer, I do all of the things the deputies do. I go on emergency calls, write my share of accident reports, and make arrests. I do regular patrol work. I arrested a subject that was sentenced to 10-12 years for burglary and other offenses because of evidence found during a traffic contact. I am the "backup officer" for the day shift on weekends. I average at least 50 hours a week...I am NOT a 40 hour per week Sheriff.

As I promised when I ran for office, I have declined the County's health insurance, saving taxpayers about \$10,000 per year.

I also said there would be no "hard guy stuff" when it came to traffic enforcement. Our traffic stop statistics show that only 1/3 of traffic contacts result in a citation, 2/3's receive warnings. The goal is increased safety, not traffic fines.

There are many more positive things going on in your Sheriff's Office than can be put in an ad. Over the last three years, we have become a more active and responsive law enforcement agency, operating on budget and working hard for the people of Richardson County. 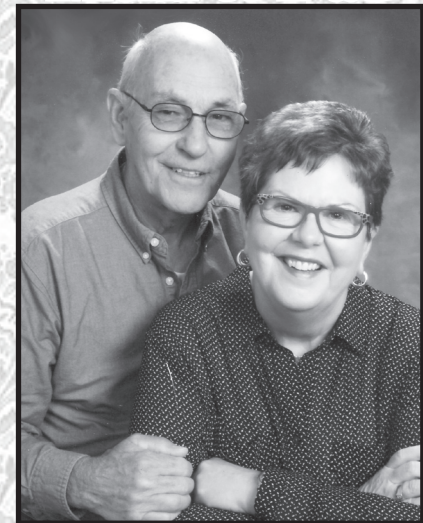

Kansas man arrested for counterfeit bills

A 36-year-old Hiawatha, Kansas man was arrested Saturday evening after allegedly using counterfeit \$20 bills at several Falls City businesses.

According to Falls City Assistant Police Chief Jamie Baker, Sergeant Sean Nolte and Officer Charles DiGiacomo shortly after 5 p.m. Saturday responded to a call at Sapp Brothers where one of the alleged fake \$20 bills was used. Nolte and DiGiacomo examined the bill and determined it was counterfeit. A description of the suspect's vehicle was provided to the officers, who later located the vehicle and Lear at Shopko where he was apprehended.

Baker said a subsequent investigation revealed purchases were made at seven businesses and described the total dollar amount spent as "substantial."

Baker said the FCPD contacted the Secret Service Agency in Omaha and learned that recently there has been quite a bit of this activity in the area. Baker and Chief Duane Armbruster

reminded anyone who handles money and suspects it to be counterfeit to contact authorities immediately. 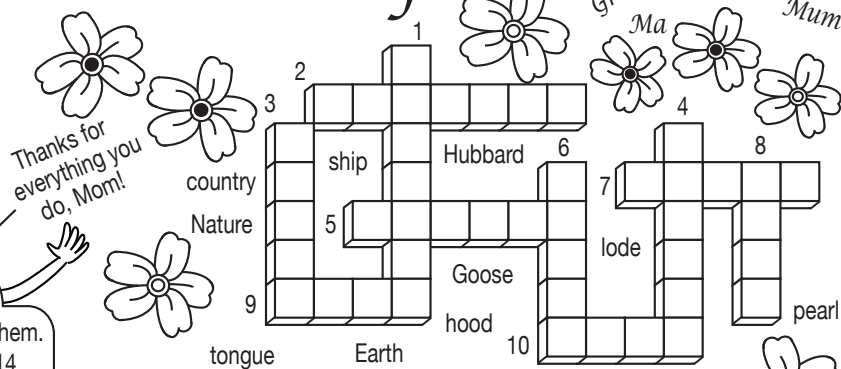

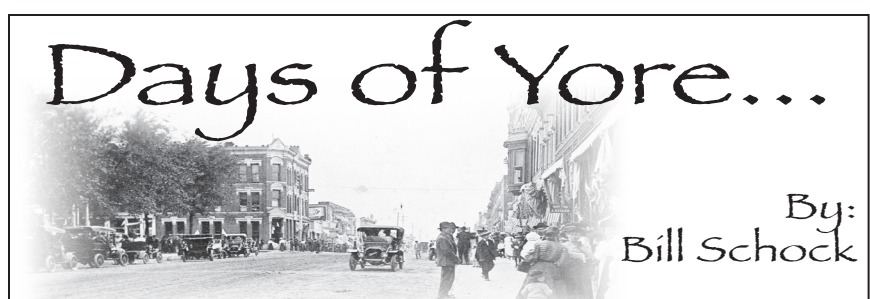

Irish boys sprint to Pioneer Conference title

The Falls City Sacred Heart boys' track team ran away with first place at the Pioneer Conference Track Meet Saturday at Auburn, earning eight gold medals and 25 overall in scoring 164 points - 45 more than runner-up Sterling.

The Irish dominated the sprints and jumps (finishing 1-2-3 in both the triple and long jump) and won two of the three relays, setting a new conference record in the process. Senior Yianni Haralabidis took the 100 (:11.2) and 200 (:23.4) and anchored the 4x100 team (Sawyer Kean, Chaz Dunn, Austin Malone), which set a new conference meet record with a time of :44.4.

The Irish senior won the long jump (20-3.75), ran the first leg of the gold medal-winning 4x400 team (Kean, Malone, Henry Arnold), which ran 3:35.2 - nearly three full seconds ahead of runner-up Diller-Odel, and came in second in the 800 (2:03.7), finishing behind Sterling's Trey Trauernicht, who set a meet record at 2:01.1.

Arnold, a sophomore, also won the 400 (:52.5) and finished second in the 200 (:23.8) and triple jump

Celebrate MOM Sunday May 11th

Mother's Day History

Every May women around the world are celebrated for their sacrifices and contributions to the family. With all that Mom does for her children, it would seem like the concept of honoring her would be ages old. However, it really wasn't until relatively recently that a celebration of mothers was instituted.

In ancient Greece individuals honored Rhea, mother of the gods. Christians also celebrated Mary the mother of God. But it wasn't until the 1900s before the general mothering population was celebrated in earnest.

Ann Marie Reeves Jarvis was a young Appalachian homemaker who, beginning in 1858, attempted to improve sanitation and nursing procedures through women's clubs and what she called "Mothers Friendship Day." It wasn't Anne Marie, but rather her daughter, Ann Jarvis, who created the Mother's Day that we celebrate today.

Anna spent many years caring for her aging and ailing mother. Anne Marie died on May 9, 1905 and Anna missed her terribly. Anna noticed that many children failed to respect and honor their mothers while they were alive, and it wasn't until after they died that these children recognized what they had lost in their parent. She intended to start a Mother's Day to honor mothers.

In 1907, Anna Jarvis attempted to establish Mother's Day to "honor mothers, living and dead." She started the campaign to establish a national Mother's Day. Together with her friends, Jarvis started a letter-writing campaign to urge ministers, businessmen and congressmen to declare a national Mother's Day holiday.

Her efforts paid off. The first Mother's Day was celebrated on May 10, 1908 and honored the late Anne Marie Reeves Jarvis. After this initial celebration, Mother's Day caught on. The Mother's Day International Association was established on December 12, 1912, to promote and encourage meaningful observances of the event. And on May 9, 1914, a presidential proclamation declared that every year the second Sunday in May would be observed as Mother's Day.

The Nebraska Department of Roads (NDOR) will hold a public information open house regarding two proposed bridge improvements in southeast Nebraska. The meeting will be held at The Meeting Place, 718 3rd St., in Humboldt, on Thurs., May 29th, 4:00 - 6:00 P.M.

The first proposed project, identified as Turkey Creek Bridge South of Steinauer, on Nebraska Highway 4 (N-4) in Pawnee County, 1.35 miles south of Steinauer would redeck the bridge over Turkey Creek.

The other on Nebraska Highway 105 (N-105) in Richardson County, is identified as Big Nemaha River Bridge in Humboldt. This proposed project would redeck the bridge over the Big Nemaha River, crossing over the southern corporate limits of Humboldt.

The planned constructions for both projects include deck replacement of the existing bridges, repairs on abutments, and adding approaches. Additional work on the Turkey Creek Bridge project includes the removal of the old substructure along with debris that has collected in the channel.

The purpose of both projects is to preserve the N-4 & N-105 transportation asset, improve the reliability of the transportation system and perpetuate the mobility of the traveling public. The needs for these projects are based on the condition of the bridges.

Additional property rights for the Big Nemaha River Bridge are anticipated. Minor wetland impacts are anticipated and would be mitigated on site or at a local wetlands bank.

Construction could begin as early as spring of 2016 and be complete as early as fall of 2016.

Both projects would require temporarily detouring traffic. The Turkey Creek Bridge project would utilize Nebraska Highway 50 (N-50), Nebraska Highway 8 (N-8), and Nebraska Highway 99 (N-99).

The Big Nemaha River Bridge project would utilize Nebraska Highway 4 (N-4), United States Highway 75 (US-75), and Nebraska Highway 8 (N-8). Details of both detours will be available at the public meeting.

This public open house meeting is being held to provide information regarding the project, currently in the design phase, and to receive the public's input. All interested persons are invited to attend and present relevant comments and questions. Design information will be displayed and personnel from NDOR will be present to answer questions and receive comments. The information "open house" format allows the public to come at any time during the advertised hours, gather pertinent information about the project, speak one-on-one with project personnel, and leave as they wish.

NDOR will make every reasonable accommodation to provide an accessible meeting facility for all persons. Animal Clinic next Tuesday at Prichard Auditorium

The animal clinic will be held Tuesday, May 13, from 6-7 p.m. at Prichard Auditorium.

This clinic allows residents to get their animals shots and licenses at the same location. Shots will be given by Animal Health Center staff and city animal licenses will be issued by Police Department staff.

City ordinance requires all dogs and cats within city limits, six months of age and older, be licensed. Licenses expire in May of each year. Pet owners must present current rabies vaccination certificates. Male and spayed female licenses are \$6. Un-spayed females are \$11. Delinquent licenses will double in price.

The cost for the rabies vaccination will be \$15 and the animal must be five months of age. Other vaccina-

tions may also be available. The cost for the city licenses and shots must be paid for separately.

For owners of: American Pit Bull Terrier, American Staffordshire Terrier, Staffordshire Bull Terrier, Rottweiler, Bull Mastiff, Cane Corso aka. Italian Mastiff, Canis Panthers, Presna Canario or ANY MIX of these breeds. When applying for a license you must present written documentation the animal has been spayed or neutered. You must currently carry a minimum of \$100,000 in liability insurance with premium payment sufficient to cover a minimum of one year of coverage. 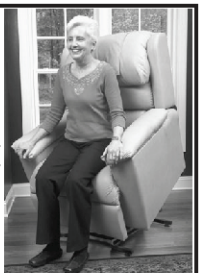

intrusion in the rights of farmers and businesses beyond that allowed by law.

Buescher's specific regulatory target is the Chesapeake Bay litigation, where the American Farm Bureau Federation and Pennsylvania Farm Bureau have sued the Environmental Protection Agency. In this litigation, AFBF and PFB, along with several other ag-related parties, including the National Corn Growers Association, the Pork Producers Council and the Fertilizer Institute, seek to prevent the EPA from implementing a watershed pollution control plan.

Plaintiffs argue that the EPA exceeded the authority granted to it under the Clean Water Act.

Buescher said that EPA regulations concerning the Chesapeake Bay could greatly impact agriculture throughout the country, including Nebraska.

"When the EPA issues regulations, they don't just apply to one area," he said. If the regulations are imposed in Chesapeake Bay, Buescher said, the EPA could potentially "tell farmers they couldn't farm when the wind blows," or farm their fields during a storm.

"They could tell us how much fertilizer to use, when to use it and how to apply it," he said. "This is why I'm running - If we don't stop this, it could hurt farming badly. I think the regulations are unnecessary and not allowed under federal law."

Buescher has served as the Chairman of both the Agricultural Law and Environmental Law Sections of the Nebraska Bar Association. He is also active in the American Agricultural Law Association and has been a frequent presenter at conferences relating to various aspects of Agricultural Law.

Buescher has never held public office and noted that by leaving his

position at Kutak Rock to be Attorney General would result in a big pay cut.

But, he said, "we need someone there to fight the fight on the behalf of rural Nebraskans," he said. "I'm the only candidate who's sued the federal government. I've represented farmers, ranchers, and ag interests in matters that directly relate to what the attorney general does when it comes to regulation and over regulation. I have been up against the EPA, I have been up against the National Park Service and the interior department and the soil conservation service. I understand what Nebraska faces."

Buescher previously served as a misdemeanor prosecutor at the Douglas County Attorney's office where he prosecuted domestic violence offenses. In 2012, Buescher was appointed by Gov. Dave Heineman to serve as the legal profession representative on the Nebraska State Records Board.

Buescher also touched on the state's overcrowding prisons problem and said, if elected, he'd push to limit the "good time" law for violent offenders and in turn release non-violent offenders under intensive probation and tracking devices.

"There would be less recidivism, hence less crime," he said. Buescher quoted Platte Institute statistical information that finds probation is half as expensive as incarceration. And, according to Platte, non-violent offenders make up more than half of Nebraska's prison population.

"I believe we could actually decrease the prison population," he said.

Though he's never held office, Buescher is no stranger to politics. He is the former Chairman of the Douglas County GOP and has been a delegate to the past two Republican National Conventions.

"I've spent a lot of time assisting other candidates," he said.
