## 'The creative process is not a destination but a journey'

Vicki Beilke, of Stella, retired long-time teacher and coach at Southeast Consolidated Schools, and her husband, Bob, in May learned how to take pictures from one of the best in the business when they spent six nights in Monument Valley in southeast Utah to shoot the magnificent sandstone buttes that adorn the clearest blue skies in all of North America.

The Beilkes traveled to Mexican Hat, UT, for one of Frank Comisar's "Scenic Aperture" photography

workshops, shooting pictures "for four hours each morning and four hours in the evening to set up and catch the ever-changing sunlight," she said.

"We took 300-400 photos each day and did a two-hour photo editing workshop in the day - we were absolutely exhausted but we learned how to run our cameras. We would make changes (aperture, shutter speed, ISO) every few seconds as the sunlight changed," she said.

Comisar, a retired Omaha architect who now lives and operates a gallery in Durango, CO, is a renowned, award-winning nature photographer and the founder of Scenic Aperture. The professional landscape and wildlife photographer travels throughout the country guiding the workshops while accumulating more and more awe-inspiring material for his Durango gallery (frankcomisar.com). In addition to Monument Valley, Comisar has conducted workshops, which are limited to 4-to-8 people, to capture canyons in Moab, UT, and snap Sandhill Cranes and other exotic prairie birds in Kearney and Burwell, Nebraska, and Bradenton, FL.

This fall, workshops will be held in Ouray, CO, on the Grand Tetons in Jackson, WY, and, in December, the white sands of New Mexico. The same trips are scheduled for 2016, though Comisar does provide individual, private instruction (at just \$600 per day!) at the destination of your choice. It costs anywhere from \$800 to \$2,200 per person to participate in one of Comisar's public workshops.

"It's pricey," Mrs. Beilke said. "We paid \$3,000 to stay in a dumpy motel, but we got top instruction. (Comisar) gives lots of individual attention."

Influenced by his previous architectural career, Comisar's images are well known for artistically depicting a three-dimensional world in a two-dimensional medium. "The creative process is not a destination but a journey. It is a journey that includes research, planning, timing, technical skills, creative judgment, and a bit of good luck," he said.

"We were in the right place at the right time," Mrs.

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

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## TSMF to auction off meet/greet with Alex Gordon

Thursday and Friday's Community Medical Center Foundation Celebrity Gala Dinner and 5th annual Charity Golf Tournament aren't the only events benefiting from their association with the Tanner Shelby Merz Foundation this summer.

The second annual "Sauce and Cycles" BBQ and motorcycle rally, scheduled for July 10-11, will also get a lift from the TSMF, Chamber/Main Street Executive Director David Branch, said, as the third annual "Memorial Cruise" will begin the morning of July 11 and lead directly into the "Cycles" portion of the Chamber event. 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

The Falls City Police Department has hired its first female police officer.

Following a unanimous City Council vote on June 15, Millie King, a 21-year-old from Troy, KS, was officially hired to fill a position on the force vacated by former officer Travis Mitchell.

Council members John Vaughn, Judy Murphy, Steve Scholl, Anthony Nussbaum, Mike Dougherty, Jim Wisdom and Don Ferguson all voted in favor of the new hire (Angie Nolte was absent) and Mayor Jerry Oliver made the appointment.

King was one of two people suggested for the position, which opened when Mitchell took a different job in the Omaha area. The 2012 Troy High School graduate studied law enforcement at Missouri Western State University and earlier this month graduated from the Missouri Western Law Enforcement Academy. King this fall will attend the Nebraska State Patrol Police Officer Training Program in Grand Island.

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Last weekend I hit my old stomping grounds to attend the 160th Anniversary of Miles Ranch. I was looking forward to seeing the renovations that the Bruxellas family has made to the old farm estate and to be exploring an area of Richardson County that I love so much.

As I drove over I took the route that I've taken my entire life down to the ranch. The old country road with beautiful views and the old Cooper farmhouse where I spent much of my youth always makes my stress melt away. I rolled down the windows, turned down the radio and just took it all in. I breathed deeply and smiled as I drove west.

When I was a kid we always spent time down at the river near Miles Ranch. We passed that old familiar sign hundreds of times to camp, fish and swim. It's one of my favorite places in the county, if not my favorite. It had been years since I was down this old road and my heart sank at how unfamiliar my surroundings now were. Trees have been cleared out in areas, leaving stunning views to the south. In other areas weeds and trees were overgrown making it look like this part of the world had been left abandoned.

It reminded me of a trip I took to Texas almost exactly 13 years ago. It was the first time Brian and I had gone to Texas together. On our way to Killeen to meet our first niece, I begged Brian to swing through Belton. It was where my grandparents had lived for years and I wanted to show Brian where I had spent countless summers and Christmases. As we pulled into the area that I vividly remember to this day, I was suddenly lost. Gone was the A frame house that signaled how close we were to our grandparents home. Trees had overgrown, homes had been abandoned or torn down and the pool that brought my sister and I so much joy was overgrown and chained up. It had all changed so quickly. In a matter of nine years-nothing was the same. It was absolutely heart crushing for me. Everything I had been so excited to return too was gone or different. It was like losing my grandfather all over again. I would never have the chance to show Brian a place that held some of my greatest memories.

Saturday as I got closer to my destination I was a bundle of nerves. I knew I'd be devastated if I rounded the corner and didn't see the familiar "Miles Ranch" sign. But it was there and it instantly brought me comfort. I walked the grounds envious of this family who had done something that I dreamed of as a kid. I wanted to live on this beautiful piece of land and make-over this gorgeous home. I couldn't have done half as good of a job as the Bruxellas have done. They have taken a beautiful and historic part of Richardson County and brought it back to life. I never thought I would see the day, I had anticipated that the house would eventually cave in on its self and another piece of my childhood would disappear. (Thank you Paulo and Vanji for working so hard to preserve such a beautiful home.)

As I drove home tears streamed down my face. I blame the lack of sleep and being sick all week but most of it was how emotional I was seeing how things have changed. I almost felt betrayed by the landscape of my youth. Perhaps I was angry that it had the nerve to change on me. How dare nothing stay the same. The longer I drove, the more I realized that things have to change because that is life. Nothing can stay the same as it was in our youth. Things are constantly changing, sometimes it's unfair, but most of the time it's for the good. I am not a fan of change, I want Alex to stay little, I want the lines of my head disappear, I want that old road to Miles Ranch to be bright and full of life again and I want that old Belton, Texas neighborhood to look exactly how it did when I was seven years old. I know it's a lot to ask, but I just want everything to stop changing. If that isn't possible; I wish it would at least slow down and stop changing so quickly.

It makes me sad that I won't be able to take Alex to many of the places that gave me such joy as a child. I always imagined taking my children back to Belton to see how magical it was, or drop them off for their first day of school at Dawson-Verdon. But, those are my memories and hopefully the new places we find along this ever changing path will bring him the same joy I felt and feel now when I think of them. Perhaps he will think of days out at my Grandma and Grandpa Harmon's house flying a kite and the gorgeous southern view. Maybe he will think of my mom's house in Auburn where he can run wild with cats, chickens and horses. Or he will think of his papa's cabin near Rulo where we catch dozens of tiny fish off of a small dock on the pond. His memories will be different than mine as mine were from my parents. We want to give our children the same love of certain places and the memories that mean so much to us but they need to make their own. I may not like how everything changes, but that's life. As long as we have a breath in our body we will move forward. As a civilization, things will always change and I guess that is what life's all about. But how I'd give anything to let him see these places through my eyes so he would know just how magical they once were.



### Mirror, Mirror in the Chamber, Who's the Best and Worst?

Being a state senator is, at best, a thankless job. The pay is lousy, the hours are long. Even though lawmakers meet in the most beautiful building in the state, things often get ugly. Colleagues often belittle and degrade each other as they mount their bully pulpit on matters of public policy.

The recently completed 104th Legislature – First Session – was contentious and the final two weeks were riveting. Reporters and lobbyists often play a game to pick the "best" and "worst" lawmakers of the session. Sadly, only a few stand out as the best. The worst has more contenders than the Republican presidential primary. And most of them lived up to the label by pitching fits and showing their true colors.

To their credit, lawmakers considered 664 bills. Of those, 243 were passed and signed by Governor Pete Ricketts. Five bills were vetoed and did not have override attempts. Compromises were in the works on a couple of those when the session ended May 29th. Senators also crafted and passed a two-year budget that survived Ricketts' scrutiny.

Some say the defining moment of this Legislature was three veto overrides of major issues, which Ricketts had loudly – and often – lambasted. In case you have been under a rock – lucky you – and missed it, lawmakers overrode Ricketts' vetoes on: driver's licenses for the so-called dreamers, children of illegal immigrants; a hike in the gas tax to pay for much-needed road construction projects; and the death penalty.

A close second in the defining moment category would be the filibuster. It seemed like a daily occurrence as lawmakers pushed protracted debate to the limits to halt progress on certain bills. Among the victims were measures by Omaha Sen. Jeremy Nordquist to provide enhanced tax credits for wind energy and a bill to allow meat packers to own hogs (currently banned in Nebraska) sponsored by Senator Ken Schilz of Ogallala. This seemingly independent bunch of renegades even filibustered measures on second-round debate and final reading, two rarely seen practices.

For me, the defining moment of this Legislature came in the opening days when some tried to do the bidding of the state Republican Party and change the legislative rules to require that senators reveal their votes for committee chairs. The secret ballot has been a sacred practice for years and rightly so in an officially nonpartisan public body. But, the party has taken notice that there are 35 Republicans, 13 Democrats and one independent in the legislative body. Party leaders have openly complained that too many Democrats have been elected to head committees.

When the rules change failed by a wide margin, Senator Bill Kintner of Papillion introduced a bill to do the same thing. It was killed. Striking out twice seemed to be more than the party leaders could handle and the tone of the session turned nasty.

Kintner, whose wife is the director of Ricketts' policy research division, appeared as the ringleader. He was quickly joined by Mike Groene of North Platte and Ricketts' appointee Senator David Schnoor

of Scribner as the Senators Against Virtually Everything. Senators Lydia Brasch of Bancroft and Beau McCoy of Elkhorn soon joined the club. The group used filibusters to inflict pain and impede progress. But, in the waning days of the session, theirs speeches intensified with name-calling and threats to work against the re-election of senators if they voted a certain way. What an embarrassment.

I haven't seen it this bad since an Omaha senator called a Lincoln senator a horse's ass during heated floor debate in the late 1980s. He was gavelled down by Lt. Governor Bill Nichol who was presiding at the time. But the


mood lightened the next day and the session ended without incident. And nobody called for a massive change in the way the Legislature operates.

Now, some are calling for an end to the nonpartisan Unicameral. Some want to give Ricketts more power by requiring more than the 30 votes to override a veto. Some have talked of a two-house legislature. The parties – well at least the Republicans – want control. They want to make a unique and very effective system of government more political.

Give me a break. The rules of the sandbox have been clearly defined for years. If you must throw sand and cannot play well with others, get out! Keep your tantrums to yourself. Try something constructive for a change. Come up with some actual solutions to problems. Be adults.

# Calorie labeling an important step toward sensible eating, better health

Not long ago my husband showed up with a sandwich for lunch that he bought at a local supermarket. I thought it was going to be our usual: turkey and provolone with lettuce on a hard roll, always plenty for both of us. At \$6.50, how could you go wrong?

This time the sandwich was different. It now cost \$9.50 and was piled high with turkey and cheese on a roll that was much bigger than what we were used to. In short, it was awful—enough meat and cheese for four people on squishy bread that tasted more like a morning sweet roll. But the bigger serving probably looked like a good deal to a lot of people who thought only about size relative to cost and nothing about size or cost relative to calories.

After surgery on the sandwich, the two of us ate some of it and saved slices of the meat and cheese for later. My guess is most buyers would have eaten the whole thing believing they were getting great value for the money. Maybe they were, but they were also getting at least half the calories most of them needed for the day.

Take the calories we consume at breakfast and dinner plus a bunch of Cokes and other sweet drinks we sip through the day, and that sandwich likely would put people well over their ideal daily caloric intake.

Too many calories, as we all know, leads to obesity and serious health complications. The picture isn't pretty. According to the National Institutes of Health, more than two-thirds of adults are overweight or obese and more than one-third are obese.

Yet if we connect the dots, we see more and more of this money-for value proposition in the foods we buy away from home, which prompts us to consume more calories than we need. An average American eats about one-quarter of his or her calories from chain restaurants, says Margo Wootan, the national nutrition director for the advocacy group Center for Science in the Public Interest.

Think about how many times you want a Coke in the afternoon. I do, but I won't pay for a 16 or 20-ounce soda. It's way more than I can drink, and for me a waste of calories at any price. But if it seems like we're getting more for less money, people will probably drink more.

Would our collective behavior change if the food we eat out outside our kitchens came with calorie labels that clued us in on what exactly we were consuming? The Affordable Care Act called for supermarkets, movie theaters, convenience stores and restaurant chains with more than 20 outlets to post the calories for the items they sell.

The Food and Drug Administration issued regulations late last year, but the final rules have been delayed until the end of 2016. In the meantime, several localities like New York City and Philadelphia now require calorie labeling.

What prompted me to take a second look at what seems a sensible public health measure was a post I read recently on the blog of the Incidental Economist where Aaron Carroll, one of the editors-in-chief and a professor of pediatrics at the University of Indiana, argued that a systematic review of all the studies done in the few localities where labeling exists showed "Although current evidence does not support a significant impact on calories ordered," labeling is a "relatively low-cost education strategy that may lead consumers to purchase slightly fewer calories."

Carroll quarreled with the idea that labeling is actually a low-cost strategy. I tried to reach him, but he did not respond. So I phoned Wootan, who said the studies and the conclusions were based on very small numbers of participants.

Besides that, she said, small dietary changes can make a big difference.

"The whole obesity epidemic can be explained by 100 to 150 calories more than people need on average per day," she said. It boils down to choices like the one we made not to eat the overstuffed sandwich at one sitting.

My neighborhood Chipotle says a burrito could have 450 calories or 1,025 depending on what you put on it. The order taker said salsas had fewer calories than cheese and sour cream. Chicken, she said, was the most popular meat. Apparently customers believe that calorie-wise it's better to eat chicken than the beef or pork options. But chicken with sour cream and cheese could pack more of a caloric hit than pork carnitas with salsa.

That's why calorie labeling is an important step toward sensible eating and better health.

mated 2,500 people passed through during the day Saturday and 700 purchased wristbands for the evening's entertainment. As was the case in 2014, the "High Heel Band" will both perform Saturday night, from 7-11 p.m.

The Kansas City BBQ Society Sanctioned Contest will be staged with \$1,850 going to the Grand Champion, \$950 to the Reserve Champion, and \$500 to the Second Reserve Champion. In the four individual categories (ribs, pork butt, brisket and chicken), \$500 will be awarded for first, \$400 for second, and so on, with \$50 going to 8<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> place finishers. That's a total of \$10,500 in prize money.

Last year's Grand Champ, Iowa's "Smokey D's," which had previously been featured on TLC's hit show "Pit Masters," will not return to FC this summer, Branch said, so someone else is assured of walking away with the big money.

For the Backyard Grillers, \$500 is on the line for the Grand Champion and \$250 for Reserve Champ. Six places will be paid in both "ribs" and "pork butt" categories, starting at \$400 for first, then \$300 for second and so on, to \$50 for sixth place, for a total of \$3,000 in prize money.

The locals also proved to be heavy hitters in both categories a year ago, with Matt and Danelle Cromer, of "Crome's Smoke," upsetting "Smokey D's" for second place in the professional "brisket" category. Jason Mackey's "SunMart" team also finished in the money in the sanctioned contest, placing sixth in both "brisket" and "ribs."

Beilke said she hopes to join Comisar in western Nebraska early some spring to capture images of prairie chickens.

## U.S.S. Keppler shipmate visits Stalder Gallery to see Falter's "Keeper of the Faith"

Steve Mooney, shipmate of the U.S.S. Keppler and New Jersey resident, visited the Stalder Gallery inside the Falls City Library and Arts Center May 3rd to view the John Falter painting "The Death of a Sailor" that was showcased in the November 2014 exhibition "Heroes".

The painting was part of a series commissioned by the Esquire Magazine to honor the Congressional Medal of Honor Recipients during W.W. II. Reinhardt J. Keppler was a shipmate aboard the U.S.S.

San Francisco. During an attack against the Japanese, the ship suffered major damage and many lives were lost. Keppler, severely wounded, tried to salvage the ship and offered aid to his crewmates all the while he was bleeding to death. Many lives were saved by his efforts and Keppler gave the ultimate sacrifice for his country.

In 1947, the ship, U.S.S. Keppler, was named after Reinhardt J. Keppler and served through 1972 when it was decommissioned and sold to Turkey. Steve Mooney was aboard the U.S.S. Keppler during

two tours in the Vietnam War and was part of the team that delivered the ship to Turkey. Mooney was in Lincoln on May 2nd for the Tin Can Sailors Bull Session (Tin Can Sailors are the sailors who served on Destroyers such as the U.S.S. Keppler) and made his way down to Falls City to see the John Falter painting that commemorated the hero for which the ship he served on was named.

"She was a good ship and got us home safely," said Mooney. In parting he gifted a hat with an embroidered emblem of the U.S.S. Keppler. You can see more about the U.S.S. Keppler and the stories of its crew on Facebook.

Southeast Nebraska Community Action Partnership has added of an AmeriCorps VISTA member, Stephen Huetter, of Bellevue, to the Cass County office in Plattsmouth.

Stephen began his year of service with SENCA on Monday, June 15, 2015, following a four day training seminar in Chicago provided by the Corporation for National & Community Service. AmeriCorps VISTA is a national service program designed to fight poverty. President John F. Kennedy originated the idea for VISTA, which was founded as Volunteers in Service to America in 1965 and incorporated into the AmeriCorps network of programs in 1993. VISTA's legislative purpose, as defined under the Domestic Volunteer Service Act (DVSA) of 1973, is to supplement efforts to fight poverty in low-income communities by engaging Americans from all walks of life.

VISTA members sign up with a host agency to a full-time term of service-365 days. Members are provided with orientation and training, a living stipend calculated at no less than 105% of the poverty line, settling in and transportation costs, child care benefits, and a basic health care plan. Upon completion of the one year term, VISTA members have the option of receiving a cash award or the Segal AmeriCorps Education Award to help pay for qualified education costs at an eligible post-secondary educational institution.

Stephen's project with SENCA will consist of the development and implementation of an agency wide Emergency Preparedness Plan for the eight counties of southeast Nebraska where agency programs are provided to economically challenged residents. In addition, Stephen will be working with local staff in expanding partnerships and generating awareness of Community Action programs and services throughout the northern counties of Cass, Douglas, Otoe and Sarpy.

Stephen, a 2008 graduate of South High School in Omaha, and a December 2014 graduate of the University of Omaha, has a Bachelor of Science degree in Emergency Management. He is the son of Rosemary Huetter of Bellevue and

the late Michael Huetter. Stephen has two sisters, Anjel and Stephanie (Joe) of Ralston. 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## Tiger star - who's District Final heroics helped FC make back-to-back state hoops appearances, is All-Star Game's first-ever unanimous MVP

Falls City graduate Weston Witt went into the Southeast Nebraska All-Star Boys Basketball game just looking to have a little fun.

Witt had a little more than just "fun" on his mind, however, when he took the Southeast Community College-Beatrice Truman Center court Saturday night.

The former Tiger led the East boys squad, scoring 18 points in the first half of a 91-82 victory over the West and put his name in the game's history book along the way. Witt finished with 24 and was named as the game's Most Valuable Player on a unanimous vote by coaches and media attending the game.

According to Southeast Athletic Director Dan Johnson, having a unanimous selection for MVP was a first in the 27-year history of the all-star contest.

"It's never happened before," Johnson said. "There have always been two or three players at least getting votes."

The Southeast Nebraska All-Star Basketball games, for both boys and girls, were started in 1988 and have been sponsored and hosted by Southeast Community College-Beatrice since then.

Witt said winning the MVP award wasn't something he thought about before the game started.

"I played with a great group of guys who made it a lot of fun," Witt said. "We had pretty good chemistry for only having two practices together."

"But the (MVP award), I definitely did not think would happen."

Witt attributed his success in the game to being in the "right spot at the right time."

"I couldn't have done it without my teammates, but it feels awesome," Witt said.

East All-Star head coach Chris Hutt of Johnson County Central said Witt played exactly like he ex-

pected him to play in the game.

"He's kind of instant offense," Hutt said. "I've seen him do that all throughout the years. He sees the court very well. He has a good head for the game and a good feel for the game and he's just a really good basketball player."

Early in the game, Hutt said Witt "couldn't miss" when he shot the ball.

"He (Witt) really brought us back into it," Hutt said. "In the beginning, we got down a little bit, but he was just solid all night."

Witt led all scorers in the game with 24 points on two three-point-

ers, seven two-pointers and a four-for-four free-throw performance.

Also scoring for the East team were Sacred Heart graduate Austin Malone with eight points and Fall City graduates Jack Hartman with four and Jordan Stoller with two.

"I came out and hit my first couple shots and that kind of sparked me," Witt said. "I just did what I could to get the team going and we went on a pretty good run in the second quarter."

Like Hutt on the bench, Witt's high school coach Don Hogue, who was watching from the stands, expected no less from his former player than a solid performance.

"Weston played really well tonight," Hogue said. "He's been an integral part of us going to the state tournament back-to-back years for the first time at Falls City High School since 1940."

"He's an overall team player. He can do a lot of things and he can shoot it extremely well like he did tonight."

Hogue said he had talked to Witt last Wednesday, after the East team had a practice.

"He (Witt) told me how much fun it was going to be (to play)," Hogue said. "You could tell he came out really relaxed and shot the ball well. He really did a lot of good things."

Hogue said it's "great" for the Tiger program to have a player win an MVP award in an all-star game.

"We've had players in the game in the past, but we've never had an MVP," Hogue said.

Hogue said it was appropriate Witt was the first Tiger to win the award because he was an important part of "turning around" the Falls City program.

Witt being a unanimous selection was also "pretty special," Hogue said.

While he's helped the Tigers win ball games the past several years, many of the team's opponents were represented on the East All-Star team.

Witt said a lot of his all-star teammates and coaches are people he has played against throughout

## Big Red RECRUITING REPORT

### New Commitments

Things have picked up on the recruiting front for Nebraska. QB **Patrick O'Brien** (6-3/230) of San Juan Hills, CA, pledged to NU in late May. O'Brien held offers from Colorado, Colorado State, Texas Tech and UNLV when he committed and had been hearing from USC and UCLA as well.

O'Brien competed in the prestigious Elite 11 camp and was named one of 18 national finalists for the competition July 5-10 at "The Opening" at Nike World Headquarters in Beaverton, OR. His spring performances have raised his ranking on Rivals.com from a low 3-star to a mid-4-star prospect, and his offer list and attention from other schools will only grow leading up to Signing Day in February. NU will have to work to hold onto O'Brien, but his relationship with OC Danny Langsdorf is strong.

Then over two days in early June, NU received commitments from DE **Ben Stille** (6-4/231), of Ashland, and safety **Marquel Dismuke** (6-2/180) of Calabasas, CA. Stille was impressive during NU's camps this spring, and also held offers from Iowa, Iowa State, Vanderbilt and Wyoming before his pledge. He had narrowed his list to the Huskers and Hawkeyes before choosing NU.

A versatile prospect who could play TE or DE, Stille told *Husker Online* his preference, "Nebraska is fine with me at defensive end and that's where I'd prefer to play. Coach Riley is fine with that and I'm just looking forward to starting out there on that side of the ball." Dismuke initially committed to Cal over offers from Michigan, Arizona State, Mississippi State and others. He visited Lincoln in March during the first Keyshawn Johnson "Team 19" 7-on-7 team and was impressed with Nebraska's tradition and campus atmosphere. In mid-June, he decommitted from Cal and five days later pledged to NU. Rivals lists Dismuke among the top 50 overall players in California for 2016.

Finally, this past weekend NU added Wayne, NJ, LB **Quayshon Alexander** (6-2/235) who had been kicking around committing to Nebraska since before an unofficial visit in May.

"I thought it was the best for me," Alexander told *Husker Online*. "I was just there for three days and I got a personal feel for what it's like and what they really want to do there."

Alexander's other two finalists were North Carolina and Virginia Tech, and he also had Miami, Michigan, Notre Dame and Wisconsin among his offers.

### Satellite Camps

For the first time, Nebraska took advantage of an NCAA rule that allows coaches to assist with other schools' camps. The Husker staff worked camps in Atlanta, Miami, Dallas and Los Angeles, hosting 140 campers in Atlanta, over 400 in Miami, approximately 125 in Dallas and just under 100 in LA. Another scheduled camp in Houston was cancelled due to Tropical Storm Bill.

The Atlanta camp showcased DB **Jordan Bertrand** (5-11/195) of Suwanee, GA, WR **Ty Patterson** (6-4/200) of Lithonia, GA, and 2017 DE **Michael Allen** (6-5/220) of Sugar Hill, GA. Bertrand and Patterson are on NU's radar now, and Allen is expected to garner national interest starting this fall.

The "A-list" in the ATL might have been the coaches and former players in attendance, though. Former Husker DB **Tyrone Legette** was there with his son, 2018 DB **Tyrone Legette, Jr.** (5-9/150) of River Ridge, LA. Also working the camp were former Lincoln Northeast and current Woodstock (GA) Etowah Head Coach **Dave Svehla** and two Georgia State coaches - former Nebraska DL coach **Tony Samuel** and former Omaha Night Hawk Head Coach **Jeff Jagodzinski**.

Former Husker and NFL linebacker and current personal trainer **Eric Johnson** trains 2015 Husker LB signee **Mohammad Barry** and had a number of other players participating in the camp.

In Miami, NU identified and offered scholarships to 2016 DB **DiCaprio Bootle** (5-11/170) and 2017 DB **Trajan Bandy** (5-9/173). Both players ran in the 4.3 to 4.4-second range in the 40-yard dash and were impressive in one-on-one drills. Bootle's biggest other offer is Central Florida; however that should be changing soon, as Colorado and Rutgers were also among the guest coaches at the camp. Bandy has offers from Tennessee, Cincinnati and Rutgers, with the Vols leading.

Receivers coach **Keith Williams** was also able to work with previously offered 2016 WR **Freddie Pinder** (6-4/201). Pinder has Tennessee, Miami, W. Virginia, and Alabama leading right now, but Williams made an impression on him.

"It was good; I really connected with him today. It was good spending more time with him today..." Pinder told *Husker Online*.

In Dallas, the headliner was Nebraska's first QB commit, **Terry Wilson** (6-3/193) of Del City, OK. Wilson was extremely impressive, clocking a 4.53-second 40-yard dash and showing off a quick release with great arm strength and accuracy. His biggest takeaway was to work on his footwork.

Wilson plans to visit Oregon, telling *Husker Online*, "You know, I bleed red and I'm 100 percent with Nebraska. Oregon offered, and I can't turn that visit down. I'm just going to go check it out and see how I like it." He will visit Oregon in late July, and the Ducks' pursuit of Wilson won't likely end until Signing Day.

Another Dallas prospect to watch was 2018 DE **Zachary Gilson** (6-5/190) of Sachse, TX, the same school as '15 Husker RB signee **Devine Ozigbo**. Gilson's athleticism was on display, and as he gains experience as a rising sophomore he should receive some big-school interest.

Among an impressive group at the LA camp were O'Brien, Harbor City, CA, WR **Devaughn Cooper** (6-0/175), '17 Calabasas, CA, QB **Tristan Gebbia** (6-3/180), '17 Anaheim, CA, WR **Terrell Bynum** (6-1/175) and '18 Harbor City, CA, LB **Raymond Scott** (6-0/200).

O'Brien was his usual stellar self, but Gebbia looks to be one of the top signal-callers on the West Coast for 2017. Already holding offers from Alabama, Arizona State, Louisville, and Miami, Gebbia could add Nebraska soon. He visited Lincoln in March with Keyshawn Johnson and holds the Huskers in high regard.

Another "Team 19" visitor, Bynum dominated DBs all evening with his route-running and solid hands. He has a Nebraska offer, along with Miami, Oklahoma, UCLA and USC. He's among Rivals' top 100 overall players to watch for 2017, and is in no hurry to make a decision.

Cooper was also impressive, showing great speed along with unrivaled route-running. Arizona, Michigan and Washington are among his offers. Coach Williams was in his ear much of the night, so don't be surprised if the Huskers offer soon.

Finally, Scott looked to be thicker than his listed 200 pounds and moved very well in space covering running backs. A rising sophomore, Scott has yet to garner his first offer. Nebraska might be that team.

Expect recruiting to be busy leading up to fall camp in August, with another two to three players joining the current list of 10.

## NRD Board finally back to full force

The Nemaha Natural Resources District board of directors is finally back to full-force again with the recent addition of its 21<sup>st</sup> member, Jenny Kearney from Nebraska City.

She was sworn in last Thursday, June 11, during the board's regular monthly meeting. Kearney fills the vacancy in Subdistrict 4 that occurred following the death of long-time director John Albrecht in September 2014. Her term will extend only through the end of 2016 when state statute requires the seat be put back up for election to fill the final two years of the four-year term. Kearney indicated that her father-in-law is a geologist, and that stirred her interest in joining the board.

In other action during their regular meeting, the board approved the bid submitted by Graham Quality Contracting, of Tecumseh, to install fence at the Duck Creek Watershed site. When completed this project will include not only a flood control dam but also public recreation facilities. Only two bids were received for the work.

The board's Programs and Projects Committee recommended approving two well permits for Tony and Janet Ahern in Richardson County. Both wells will be co-mingled in order to achieve the desired flowrate.

General discussion also took place on the District's present groundwater rules as they pertain to irrigated acres listed on well permits. Currently nothing in the NRD's rules limits the number of acres that may be listed on the permit though it must match what is reported on the well registration. More discussion and investigation into potential updates to various sections of the rules will likely occur, but no plans were made for any changes in the near future.

As part of the preliminary discussion on the FY2016 budget, the board also reviewed annual salary schedules. Action was taken to approve a one percent cost-of-living increase along with funds for merit and service increases. The total package of salary increases for all staff results in just over a three percent increase above the amount budgeted last year.

Some early figures for next year's budget were also presented, but with nearly three weeks remaining in the current fiscal year, many numbers were not yet available. Major projects would include dam construction and road improvements for the Duck Creek project near Peru as well as fees for consulting involved with watershed dam assessments and creation of a district-wide watershed management plan. Funds will also be included for urban special projects in Auburn and Unadilla, upgrading a two-mile stretch of the Steamboat Trace Trail, and construction of a cost-share dam through the Small Dams Program. More detailed numbers will be reviewed at the July meeting.

A three-year extension to the contract with Judi Schmidt for janitorial services at the NRD's office facilities was approved. The contract requires weekly cleaning services with the contractor to provide her own supplies.

A resolution that combines some previous amendments and restates the District's retirement program was approved. This resolution was required to bring the program into compliance with the Pension Protection Act. No changes were made to the plan itself, however.

Bobbie Meints from the Five Rivers RC&D presented their annual report to the board. She reviewed the various projects and programs undertaken over the past year. Funding continues to be a concern for the organization since federal funds were discontinued a few years ago.

The next regular meeting of the Nemaha Natural Resources District board of directors will be at 8 p.m. Thursday, July 9. Committees will meet prior to the regular meeting.

## NET News looks at death penalty debate

The Nebraska Legislature repealed the state's death penalty law in its recently-completed session – replacing lethal injection with life in prison. The NET News special "Nebraska's Death Penalty: What's Next?" examines the historic repeal of the state's death penalty and the petition drive underway to have voters decide the issue.

State Sen. Beau McCoy (District 39, Omaha), co-chair of Nebraskans for the Death Penalty, and former State Sen. Danielle Conrad, executive director of ACLU Nebraska, will be the guests on "Nebraska's Death Penalty: What's Next?" airing Friday, June 26, at 6:30 p.m. on NET Radio; and at 7 p.m. on NET

Television that same evening. Fred Knapp of NET News will moderate the program.

During the next three months, people who want to reinstate the death penalty will be collecting petition signatures to put the measure on the ballot in November 2016. Meanwhile, those who favor repeal of the death penalty will be urging people not to sign. Death penalty supporters need to collect about 57,000 valid signatures to add a proposal to reverse the Legislature's decision on the ballot. They need twice that number to suspend the Legislature's decision to repeal, pending a vote of the people.

Pay periods will be every two weeks. 5) Article 11: Conform to the same amount of leave offered to non-union employees that will be implemented within the new Richardson County Employee Handbook which is being reviewed and revised at the current time.

The Union representatives will submit this proposal to the group for review and consideration.

# Husker legends coming to FC Thursday, Friday for golf tourney, gala dinner

Community Medical Center Foundation has partnered with the Tanner Shelby Merz Foundation for its 5th annual charity golf event in an effort to raise Traumatic Brain Injury Awareness and this weekend will host some of the biggest stars in Nebraska sports, particularly Husker football, history.

Former Nebraska football greats Tommie Frazier and Jerry Murtaugh, former Husker, Kansas City Chief and Denver Bronco Neil Smith, as well as WBO World Lightweight Champion Terence "Bud" Crawford, Lady Husker basketball great Maurice Ivey, and many others will all be in Falls City Thursday, June 25, for a "Celebrity Gala Dinner" at the Elks Club and Friday, the 26th, for the four-person golf scramble at the FC Golf Club, event coordinator Linda Santo said.

Heisman Trophy winner Johnny "The Jet" Rodgers will not be at the dinner or golf tournament, as originally expected, but he will instead appear at the FC Library & Arts Center from 11:30 a.m. until 2 p.m. Johnny will read *C is for Cornhusker*, a book illustrated by Falls City native Sandy Appleoff, pose for pictures and sign autographs.

Thursday, following dinner, attendees will hear from guest speaker Dr. Arthur Maerlender, the University of Nebraska's Director of Clinical Research and Associate Director for the Center for Brain, Biology & Behavior.


CB3, as it's dubbed, is housed in Memorial Stadium's newly expanded east side, which underwent a \$55 million renovation and opened in the fall of 2013. Dr. Maerlender and his associates at CB3 and the adjoining Athletic Performance Lab are producing groundbreaking research in the field, expanding the understanding of brain function and its effects on human behavior like never before. A vision of legendary retired football coach and athletic director Tom Osborne, CB3 and the Performance Lab are looking for ways to diagnose and treat TBI and make football and other sports safer.

A long list of Coach Osborne's former players will be in Falls City to help CB3, CMC and TSMF spread the word about TBI, including:

— "Touchdown" Tommie Frazier, widely considered to be one of the greatest players, and the greatest option quarterback, in the history of college football.

A four-year starter, Frazier led his

team to three consecutive national championship games, winning titles in 1994 and 1995 (NU lost to 18-16 to Florida St. his sophomore year) and compiled a 33-3 overall record. In 1995, eight organizations recognized the Florida native as a first-team All-American and Frazier, Tom Osborne's one and only QB to start as a true freshman, became the first Husker ever to win the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, finished second in the Heisman Trophy voting, received the UPI's Player-of-the-Year and The Sporting News Offensive Player-of-the-Year Awards.


More recently, Frazier was one of six Huskers named to Sports Illustrated's 85-player All-20th-Century Team, joining NU legends Rodgers, Mike Rozier, Rich Glover, Dean Steinkuhler and Aaron Taylor.

One of the 10 greatest college football players of the century according to Sport magazine, Frazier's No. 15 jersey was retired in 1996.

Though he signed a deal to play, like Steve Taylor before him, in the CFL, Frazier health issues prevented Frazier from playing professional football. He was an assistant coach at Baylor and Nevada before taking the head coaching job at Doane College for two years, in 2005-06.

Frazier now works as a Senior Account Executive for American Energy and also co-authored a book that illustrated his life after football (*Touchdown Tommie*). He resides in Lincoln and he and his wife have a son and a daughter.

— Neil Smith was the second player selected in the 1988 NFL draft, before receivers Tim Brown, Sterling Sharpe and Michael Irvin, all three of whom



now members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame. The former Husker All-American (1987), with Derrick Thomas headlined one of the NFL's best defenses throughout the early- to mid-1990s. Smith's 7-foot, 1-inch wingspan

eventually formed a home run swing rivaled in fame by only that of maybe George Brett at the Truman Sports Complex, and nose strips became all the fashion at Arrowhead. Smith didn't miss a Pro Bowl from 1991 to 1995. He then went to Denver and helped the rival Broncos win back-to-back Super Bowls (XXXII and XXXIII). In 2006 he was inducted into the Chiefs Hall of Fame.

— Steve Taylor came to Nebraska from San Diego in 1985 as perhaps its most heralded blue chip recruit ever, after breaking Heisman Trophy winner Marcus Allen's school records, which included topping Allen's 11.2 yards per carry. He left as arguably its most accomplished quarterback ever, and remained so until the aforementioned Frazier came to Lincoln. The fastest signal-caller in Husker history (4.54 in the 40) was also Coach Osborne's first true freshman QB to get significant snaps, as he entered the 1986 Fiesta Bowl in the 4th quarter with NU trailing Michigan 27-14 after two Jim Harbaugh TD runs. Taylor engineered a pair of long drives, the second a 12-play, 77-yarder he capped with a QB sneak for a score. Nebraska ultimately ran out of time and lost the game, but Taylor had won a job he'd keep the next three years. He would compile a 31-6 record, with half of those losses coming in heart-wrenching fashion to archenemy Oklahoma.




He earned All-America honors after a sterling junior season in which he set a 51-year-old school record with five TD passes in what was for him a homecoming rout of UCLA. Taylor won fewer individual awards as a senior, yet "settled" for the biggest prize of all: A win over Oklahoma, NU's first in five years, and a Big 8 title. When his career came to an end, Taylor held most every QB record in Nebraska's book, including single-season rushing (826 yards), career rushing (2,215), single-season rushing TDs (13), career rushing TDs (32) and passing TDs in a game (five, UCLA).

A Husker for life, the California prep star played eight years in the Canadian Football League, throwing for nearly 5,000 yards, before returning

to Lincoln to dominate the real estate business. He also hosts pre- and post-game shows on the Husker Radio Network

— Keith "End Zone" Jones, like Taylor, came to Nebraska after breaking the high school records of a legend. He ran for 1,710 yards and 18 TDs as a senior for Coach William Reed at Omaha Central, breaking records set by Gale Sayers. Jones was a four-year letterwinner and Taylor's two-time All-Big 8 I-back in '86 and '87. Jones closed his career at Nebraska as the third-leading rusher in school history (2,488 yards), trailing only Rozier and I.M. Hipp. He went out with a bang, rushing for a career-high 248 yards in the regular-season finale at Colorado, a 24-7 Husker win. Jones played five years in the NFL.

— Jerry Murtaugh, an All-American and two-time All-Big 8 honoree was one of the very first true "Black-shirts" and to this day serves as a fitting model of the type of player Bob Devaney knew he needed in Lincoln to build win championships. And the kind Tom Osborne recruited and the kind Mike Riley had better get if Nebraska is going to snap what has become a 14-year slumber into national irrelevance.



Murtaugh, from Omaha North, led the Blackshirt defense in stops three consecutive years, setting a career tackles record that would stand for nearly 40 years. He was a two-time All-American and First Team All-Big 8 and in 1970 was named the Big 8 Player of the Year. In the 1971 Orange Bowl, Murtaugh had nine tackles to help Nebraska earn the first of five National Championships as the Huskers beat LSU 17-12. Murtaugh, Willie Harper and the Blackshirts held LSU to 51 yards rushing.

"The 1971 Orange Bowl. I will nev-

er forget that because I think that is when tradition started," Murtaugh would say years later in an interview.

Murtaugh later signed with the New England Patriots and played two seasons before knee injuries ended his career.

Murtaugh is President of The Nebraska Greats Foundation, an organization he founded. It has one clear and simple mission: to help former Nebraska collegiate athletes in their times of medical need. The Foundation directly funds the medical services and products needed by its recipients.


